

#### Although Christmas is fast approaching, we have a heavy schedule of matches to fulfil before the holiday period arrives.


Note that Mansfield Town have increased their top seating price considerably since promotion from the Fourth Division last season.

Extra revenue enables any Club to improve facilities, team strengthening and also pay the astronomical costs incurred with the Ground Safety Act. At Swindon Town we have not kept step with prices, that other Clubs have increased this season. Those same clubs will also increase their prices next summer!

Swindon Town Football Club will have to keep step with their counterparts in this division to enable the Club to meet increasing costs, if we're to reach second division soccer in the not too distant future.

Swindon Town Football Club have kept faith with their fans in recent seasons, not increasing prices when First Division opponents have arrived in Cup competitions, meanwhile enjoy the cheapest football in the division and the finest fare.

Following a 4-0 home win it is a normal emotion for any Manager to feel excited. I have to confess that I felt exactly the opposite following our 4-0 home win against Farnborough Town, in the first round of the F.A. Cup.

Some of you may find that a little strange, but to a Manager, apart from the result, he is also looking at the general performance. To be honest, I thought we were dreadful in certain areas and it is no secret that the scoreline flattered Swindon Town. After dwelling on that performance over the weekend I soon realised I must act swiftly to put some areas of the team right.


I have had three players in mind for some time now, who I am sure would improve the team considerably. Yet, the first player I have brought in to put matters right in defence was not one of my priorities, but after our woeful defensive display against Farnborough Town, where only their inability to find the back of the net saved us from an embarrassing situation, I moved quickly to bring Paul Franklin to the County Ground from Watford.

Paul who had spent the previous month on loan to Second Division Shrewsbury Town, has moved to the County Ground with a view to a permanent move. Able to play in several defensive positions, his preferable position is at the centre of defence.

There are times when you can wait to see if your players can find the form that you know they are capable of, but so often fail to produce. This is where a Manager has to use his instinct, and act swiftly to save any further risk of results going against his club. New faces mean that there have to be departures to balance not only the financial side, but also to save the playing staff becoming overburdened in certain positions.

It is really up to players to prove to any Manager that they are worth a) their position in the team, b) their retention in the squad, c) ability to adjust to a higher division, d) to prove that money invested in their transfer fee is money well spent.

Since I have been at the County Ground, every player has been given an opportunity to prove his worth. It is up to the player to prove whether my initial faith in him has been proven



worthwhile or not. Sentiment has little or no part in football and whether I have paid a relatively substantial fee or not, this will not influence my thinking on team selection.

It is often the situation that people do not blend into the pattern of play adopted by some Clubs, or often the team has to alter the style of play to suit a certain division. Factors which are not always apparent at the time of signing. Individuals can be disappointing, and as in the case of Martin Ling it is too long a period for the Club to wait for the individual. That may be the situation with some of the players on the staff at present, if so, it is in their interests to find another Club and rediscover form that they are not able to show here at the County Ground.

There is plenty of action to come in the Freight Rover Trophy and F.A. Cup and along with important League matches and by the completion of December we shall be aware of our involvement in all three competitions when the New Year commences. It is important that we have a large enough

squad to cope with this heavy commitment as well as fulfilling our fixture list at reserve and youth level.

I want Swindon Town Football Club to be heavily involved in promotion, the F.A. Cup and the Freight Rover Trophy. We could also be in contention for the Football Combination Championship this season. It all adds up to involvement for the players and supporters, higher pay days for the players, also the Club and no-one can begrudge anyone that privilege.

If any Club has pretentions to grasp either of the guaranteed promotion positions at the end of the Season, these are surely the two Clubs that have to be toppled. Whatever the form of the chasing pack, both Clubs ably managed by Bruce Rioch and Keith Peacock show no intention of relenting the grasp on those two vital positions at present.

However, there is a long way to go yet and there has been many a slip twixt cup and lip! How Lou Macari and his players must be still regretting those lost points at home to Notts County and Bristol Rovers, matches that our general form should have brought maximum reward from. Our meritorious away form continued, with goals from Jimmy Gilligan and Bryan Wade being just too

much for Bury whose late reply came from the penalty spot by Alan Taylor last Saturday.

It was thirteen seconds into injury time at Somerton Park, when Tony Mowbray headed the winner for leaders Middlesbrough against Newport County from a Bernie Slaven corner. The Welsh Club had been unbeaten in their previous six League and Cup matches. The Ayresome Park Club have now won five away matches in the League this Season.

Gillingham retained second spot, they made it seven home League wins in succession when they defeated Notts County 3-1. Two goals from David Shearer and one from Tony Cascarino were too much for the Meadow Lane Club whose lone reply came from the giant Mick Waitt.

Speaking of successive home

wins, Bournemouth made it eight on the trot when they defeated Chesterfield 2-0 at Dean Court, due to goals from former Southampton striker. David Puckett and Mark O'Connor, once of Bristol Rovers.

The best performance of last Saturday and pride of place must go to Walsall who took York City's defence apart at Bootham Crescent with a 5-1 away win. Goals from the highly fancied David Kelly (2), Craig Shakespeare, Gary Childs and Nicky Cross exposing the uncertain home defence. To add to City's misery, they also had Sean Haselgrave sent off.

Darlington had John Moore to thank for their first win in eight matches. John on loan from nearby Sunderland, gave the Feethams Club a first half lead in front of the Divisions lowest attendance of the day 1,612.

It took a late equaliser from Tony Lowery, two minutes from time, for Mansfield Town to hang onto their unbeaten home record with a 2-2 draw against lowly Bolton Wanderers. After Paul Garner had given the Field Mill Club a half-time lead, goals from Tony Caldwell and Warren Joyce saw their unbeaten record in jeopardy until Tony Lowery struck.

Two goals from Dean Coney and one from former Chelsea and Manchester City striker, Gordon Davies, saw tóday's visitors, Carlisle United, tumble to their eighth defeat of the season. Malcolm Poskett being on the mark for the home club.

Chester City had two goal Gary

A disjointed display from Bristol City enabled Rotherham United to gain an unexpected victory at Ashton Gate, in front of 6,756, the highest attendance of the day in Division Three. Darryl Pugh's first half effort proving enough.

Honours were even at Griffin Park where Brentford were held to a 1-1 draw by Blackpool, former Shrewsbury Town striker, Gary Stevens, put the London Club into a half-time lead. A second half goal from Kevin Taylor gave the Bloomfield Road Club a point.

Preston North End have been rebuffed in a £10,000 bid for Port Vale's transfer listed defender, Geoff Hunter. Preston's former Vale manager, John McGrath has been told that Hunter is valued at double their bid.

Chesterfield made enquiries about Derby County midfield player Graham Harbey and striker Andy Garner, but were put off by the joint asking price of £75,000.

Port Vale manager, John Rudge, who donates £10 from his own pocket to a players pool every time the team keeps a clean sheet, is saving his money this Season. Last year it cost him £190 - but so far this Season only £20.

An F.A. cup third round replay in 1983/4 at the County Ground, brought the last visit of Carlisle United to Swindon. Goals from Jimmy Quinn, Paul Batty and Andy Rowland gave the "Town" a 3-1 victory over their 2nd Division opponents, after a 1-1 draw at Brunton Park.

The last league action between the clubs came in a memorable season for both sides – 1981/2. But whilst Carlisle fans reminisce about the season which saw them regain the 2nd Division status they had lost five years earlier. Swindon were relegated to Division 4 for the first time in their history.

The performance of Peter Beardsley for the Cumbrians on October 10th 1981 gave plenty of indication that he was destined for a much higher grade of football, culminating of course in his success alongside Gary Lineker in the Mexico World Cup.

Beardsley's 30th minute goal gave Carlisle a deserved half time lead after a poor first half Swindon performance.

The introduction of another developing talent, seemed to revitalise the "Town" in the second half. Paul Rideout, now of course in Italy, scored from an Andy Rowland flick on to put Swindon very much back in contention. His cross to Bryan Hughes later in the second half brought the winning goal and sent Swindon to second place in the table.

In the five months between that game and the return fixture at Brunton Park, Swindon won only 3 league matches, Carlisle, however, went from strength to strength and stood at the top of the

table on February 27th.

With only two minutes gone, Beardsley was on the scoresheet again, pushing a Crabbe cross past Allan. The early set-back seemed to jolt Swindon into life, eventually resulting in one of their best away performances of that season.


A sixth minute shot from Paul Rideout, came within inches of bringing the "Town" level, after Kenny Stroud had put him through.

In the next half hour or so, Hughes, Pritchard and Rideout again all went close as Swindon pressed for the equaliser.

The vital goal came in injury time at the end of the first half, a typical Roy Carter glide down the left, brought a cross to Rideout, who was on hand at the near post to crack the ball past Swinburne.

Only a brilliant second half display from Jimmy Allan, could keep Peter Beardsley at bay as the league leaders struggled against a "Town" side showing much of its early season form. This afternoon we meet again after another important season for both clubs, this time though, the situation is reversed. Swindon winning the 4th Division title and Carlisle returning to Division 3 after losing their Division 2 relegation battle last season.

The present club - Carlisle United - was formed in 1903 when Carlisle Red Rose F.C. and Shaddongate amalgamated. In those days, they played at Millholme Bank moving to Devonshire Park in 1906 and thence to their present home, Brunton Park in 1909.

Playing in the North Eastern League with some success, Carlisle, at the third attempt were elected to the Football League in 1928, taking the place of Durham City in the old Division 3 (North).

And that is where they remained, even despite the attempts of managers such as Ivor Broadis and Bill Shankley to gain promotion for the club until the end of the 1957-86 season. With the Third Divisions South and North scrapped Carlisle became founder members of the present fourth division. It was at around this time that the directors, no doubt dismayed at the propect of life in the fourth division, contemplated applying for election to the Scottish League. North Northumbrian club Berwick Rangers had set a precedent, but the Scottish League authorities refused even to consider the election of a second English club.

Promotion was gained to the third division in 196; but alas the following year they were relegated again. But success was just around the corner Under Alan Ashman Carlisle were promoted at the end of the 1963-64 season as runners-up to Gillingham.

More was to follow. Twelve months later a 3-0 home win over Mansfield before 18,000 delirious fans gained United the Third Division Champion ship, and entry into the Second Division for the first time in the club's history.

Carlisle then established themselves as a very good Second Division club and in season 1966-6 they finished in third place, in the days when only two clubs were promoted. They just missed out or promotion again in season 1970-71 losing out by only three points.

In the previous season, Carlisle had smashed another club record by reaching the semi-finals of the then League Cup. After winning at home in the first leg, they crashed out to West Brom at the Hawthorns.

In 1973-74 Carlisle finally gained promotion to the First Division, finishing in third place above Orient who could only draw their last match.

It was a remarkable achievement for then manager Alan Ashman who had piloted the club right through from the Fourth Division, during his spells at Brunton Park.

Carlisle's first season in the premier division was short-lived. After three games they found themselves at the top of the table. However, the momentum was not maintained and at the end of

season they finished as "wooden spoonists" thus making a swift return to Division 2.

From then on it was a downward trend. Relegation to the Third in 1977 and in 1981 just escaped the drop into the fourth by one point.

But the following season saw the return of Bob Stokoe for his second spell at Brunton Park and a win at Chester in the final match of the 81-82 season pushed Carlisle back into the second division.

Last season 1985/86 was a disastrous one. Carlisle had only 12 points from their opening 21 games and were set for the drop. A remarkable recovery almost worked but a defeat at Oldham and a win for Blackburn in the final games pushed the Cumbrian side back into the third, Stokoe announced his retirement and was succeeded by Harry Gregg.

Born Liverpool A former apprentice at Everton, making just one appearance for the 1st Division club. Joined Carlisle in Oct 84 for a fee of £10,000 and cost the Blues an extra £5,000 a few months later when he made his 20th league appearance.

Kevin Carr (Goalkeeper)

Born Ashington. Made nearly 200 appearances for Newcastle in nine years. Joined Carlisle in July last year and made 15 league appearances last season.

John Cooke (Forward/midfield)

Born Salford. An apprentice with Sunderland and went on to make over 50 appearances for them. Went on loan to Carlisle, but then signed for Sheffield Wednesday. Rejoined Carlisle permanently in October 85.

Scott Endersby (Goalkeeper)

Born Lewisham. The youngest player to appear in an F.A. Cup tie at just 15 years 279 days for Kettering. Previous clubs include Ipswich, Tranmere and Swindon Town. Joined Carlisle on loan from Swindon in November 85, signed permanently in February 1986

Paul Gorman (Midfield)

Born Dublin, A Republic of Ireland under 18 and 21 international. Previous clubs Arsenal and Birmingham City. Signed for Carlisle just before the transfer deadline in 85

Paul Haigh (Defender/midfield)

Born Scarborough. An England Youth and under 21 international whilst at Hull, his only other chib. After completing 180 league appearances for the Tigers signed for Carlisle in November 1980 for £100,000... the second highest fee ever paid by the club. Has now played in nearly 200 matches for the Blues.

John Halpin (Forward).

Born Broxburn Scotland. Made his league debut for Carlisle in the home game with Huddersfield on 27 Oct 84. Had signed two days earlier from Glasgow Celtic for a fee of £10,000. Suffered a broken leg at the end of last season.

Mick Halsall (Midfield).

Born Bootle. Missed just one league game for Carlisle last season. Has made a total of 69 league appearances altogether since joining the Cumbrian side from Birmingham in October 84 for a sum of £5,000.

Geoff Lomax (Defender).

Born Droylsden. Signed for United from Manchester City on 5 Dec 85 for a small fee. Made his debut for the Blues two days later against Millwall. Married his fiancee Suzanne during the close season.

Mick McCartney (Defender/midfield).

Born Edinburgh. The 32 year-old Scotsman is in his

second spell with Carlisle having rejoined them in March 1983 in a deal that took Gordon Staniforth to Plymouth. Previous clubs West Brom, Carlisle, Southampton and Plymouth.

Scott McGarvey (Striker).

Born Glasgow, Made 25 league appearances for Manchester United whom he joined as an associate schoolboy. Spent a time on loan with Wolves before signing for Portsmouth for £100,000. Last season, on loan to Carlisle making ten league appearances. Returned to Pompey but signed permanently by Carlisle in July of this year. Wes Saunders (Defender).

Born Sunderland. Came to Carlisle on loan from Newcastle in September 85. After completing a three months spell signed permanently and made 35 league appearances last season.

Garry Worrall (Winger).

Born Salford. A close season signing from Peterborough United. Began his career with Manchester United but never made a first team appearance. Made his league debut at Peterborough and in all made 96 appearances for them in three

Billy Wright (Defender).

Born Liverpool. Began hs league career with Everton making 192 appearances. Signed by Birmingham on a free transfer in the summer of 1983. Capped at England Under 21 (six times). Joined Carlisle in August this year on a month's loan. Offered contract after only two weeks.

Malcolm Poskett (Forward).

Born Middlesborough. The much travelled striker recently joined Carlisle for his second spell with the club after completing a one month loan period. Previous clubs include Middlesborough, Hartlepool, Whitby T. Hartlepcol, Brighton, Watford, Carlisle and Stockport.



Ground in the F.A. Cup against Farnborough Town gave us a flattering 4-0 home win. It would be amiss of me to say that we played well, but we also have to be realistic. we did score four times without reply and although Farnborough Town played surprisingly well they did have enough chances to have fared better.

We had no problem in being motivated for this match, for it was an F.A. Cup tie and we did not concede a goal and that in itself was pleasing as a defender.

The draw for the Second Round of the F.A. Cup was pleasing. It is always an advantage to be drawn at home in any Cup competition. Enfield will provide as difficult an opponent as any League team. They are members of the G.M. Vauxhall League, a league that I think is of a very good standard, those of you who travelled to watch us in our pre-season match against Cheltenham Town will know what I mean.

Taking a look at Enfields record this season, I have noted that they have won eight away matches! By any standard that is an impressive record. You know the rest, as Alan Taylor scored from the penalty.

In welcoming Paul Franklin to the Club from Watford, I must say that he played well in his debut for the Club, it is always difficult for any player coming into the team for

his first match. During the two days training that Paul had taken part in, we had not practised any defensive tactics. I know Paul was very surprised at the pace in which we all come racing out of defence. It will take him time to settle, after playing with two clubs previously this season.

At the top of the League table both Gillingham and Middlesbrough have opened up a 3 point gap, it is not difficult to imagine how important our fixtures with Gillingham and Bournemouth, home and away will be, also the visit of Middlesbrough to the County Ground. Having met Notts County at home we still have to travel to Meadow Lane.

On a personal note I have just moved into a new house in the West of Swindon, so you can imagine it is a busy time, although I must admit it is not me that is busy with the paint brush! It is nice to move into your home and something I had been looking forward to for some time. I suppose it is what could be termed as a nice Christmas present.

Talking of Christmas, what a busy December we have in front of us, with F.A. Cup, League and Freight Rover Trophy fixtures to come this month. Time to spare a thought for our groundsman Geoff Warren, as he tries to accomodate not only first team matches but also reserve games. Not the easiest of jobs with the incessant rain we have experienced of late. It is to his credit that not one match has been called off at the County Ground, through ground conditions. I am sure after he has been here for a couple of seasons he will produce the best playing surface that the Club have seen.

Keep cheering this afternoon and help the Town to another three points.

#### Ray McHale

When Swindon Town reached the League Cup semi-finals in 1979, the Club had one of their finest ever line-ups. They also had one of their finest ever captains in Ray McHale. The combative mid-fielder was discovered in local non-league football by Chesterfield, and it wasn't long before he made his mark in the Derbyshire Club's first team. In the 1972/73 season McHale was the leading goalscorer for Chesterfield notching up twelve goals. The following campaign saw him score nine more and that tally included a goal which finished Swindon's interest in the 1973/74 League Cup, ironic really, bearing in mind McHales influence in later seasons in that particular competition.

Rays next move was to Yorkshire and Halifax Town, where he again featured high up in the goalscoring charts. However, he couldn't prevent Halifax being relegated into the Fourth Division, and it wasn't long before he found his way down to Wiltshire and Swindon Town.

It was during September of 1976 that McHale signed for Swindon, Danny Williams payed Halifax the princely sum of £8,000. Surely that was one of the transfer bargains of all time, a mere snip for such a talent.

Ray made his debut on September the eleventh 1976 in the 0-0 away draw with Lincoln City, his influence not immediately evident.

His first goal came in a 7-0 FA. Cup thrashing of non-league Bromley, the Town struggled for much of the game, but a late deluge of goals saw them reach round two of the competition, and they eventually went out in round four to First Division Everton after a replay."

Back in the league McHale showed what was to come in a game against Brighton on New Years day 1977. Swindon stormed into a 4-0 lead in a blistering display, but the heavens opened and the combined rain and snow brought about the abandonement of the match, much to the crowds disgust.

Ray shone that day and he must have been bitterly dissapointed at that decision. However, he helped put the record straight scoring one of the goals in the 2-1 victory when the match was replayed later in the year.

Swindon finished that season eleventh in Division Three and improved the following season - to tenth. In the F.A. Cup in the 1977/78 season, Swindon went out in round three to the all conquering Nottingham Forest team of that era.

The final scoreline was 4-1 and the Forest goalkeeper was Peter Shilton, now haven't I seen him playing for someone else recently? In the League Cup, Swindon made round four and were defeated 2-0 by a strong Wrexham side.

During the summer of 1978, Swindon made managerial changes, Danny Williams became Football Executive and Bobby Smith was made the new Manager - Wilfe Tranter was his assistant.

I think its true to say that during this spell Ray McHale was at his dominant best, helping the side as they swept desperately close to promotion into Division two.

A nerve tingling run-in to the end of the season saw Swindon right in the thick of things and only a defeat, ironically for McHale, in Yorkshire, by Sheffield Wednesday robbed them with just two games left in the season.

However, they seemed well set for the following campaign and it looked as if nothing could stop McHale and Swindon Town as they stormed up the table. In the League Cup, Portsmouth and Chester were the Towns first and second round opponents, before an away draw with First Division Stoke City in round three.

A superb fight back from being 2-0 down to 2-2 brought City to the County Ground for a replay and on a memorable night Swindon won 2-1. McHale blasted home an unstoppable 20 yard shot for Swindons first goal and the Town were on the move.

In round four Wimbledon were beaten 2-1 away and it set up a fifth round encounter at the legendary Highbury ground of the mighty Arsenal.

On a cold December night Arsenal went in front by means of an extremely dubious Alan Sunderland penalty and it seemed that Swindon would be snowed under not so.

Ray McHale drove his men forward and Billy Tucker equalised with minutes left. The Town fans, including, me, went wild and McHale led his side over to take the Salute at the Conclusion of the match. A dramatic game, but nothing to what happened one week later at the County Ground.

Steve Walford scored an own goal, 1-0 to Swindon. Alan Mayes curled home from the edge of the box 2-0 to Swindon...Half time and Swindon were two goals to the good! Liam Brady pulled one back for the Arsenal just after the break, 2-1 to Swindon... A Chris Kamara header deflected past Pat Jennings by John Hollins, 3-1 to Swindon...But a Liam Brady inspired Arsenal, came back to force extra time and thirty of the most stomach churning minutes I've ever had the honour to sit through.

Ray McHale was an inspiration, as were all the other Town players. Kenny Stroud played Brady out of the game in that last half hour and the immeculate Andy Rowland scored from two yards out in the last minute. One of the classuc Cup ties and I've certainly never seen better.

Swindon went to the semi-finals and eventual cruel elimination by...Wolves, I can barely mention the name. McHale and Swindon went into a decline after the turn of the year, following their League Cup defeat and an unfortunate F.A. Cup exit at Tottenham where McHale scored a penalty. Ray left Swindon in the summer of 1980 and went to Brighton for £100,000, he never recaptured the glory of that mid-season spell, but McHale was a superb Captain of Swindon Town, without doubt one of the





I kept Tim Flowers who is now with Southampton out of the side and played with Franz Carr who is now a prominent member of Notts Forest team and of course who made his debut for England Under-2l's recently, Fraser added 'Mark Seagrave of Liverpool, who has been on loan to Norwich City recently, was also in the England teams at the same time. Tony Adams who has been earning some rave reviews with Arsenal this season was another player I appeared with.'

Training at Old Trafford was different to Swindon Town due to the numbers there, said Fraser. 'We were divided into three groups, the first and second teams and then the Youth team.' 





Chris Kamara's hat-trick in our fifth consecutive Football Combination win against Norwich City on November 11th was the fourth hat-trick scored by a Town player this season.









## STANDING VIEW

### FROM · THE · TERRACE

In a week that saw the publication of a poll on peoples reasons for shunning football, the trip to Bury brought ample evidence itself. The 1970's gift to football was hooliganism, and subsequently fencing and caging to combat it. The major finding of the poll in the Today newspaper was that violence has driven and is continuing to drive families away from football, a vast number of potential supporters being lost to the game.


Bad crowd behaviour and the restricted view offered behind fencing has prompted many of those families still supporting football to seek refuge in the seating areas of football grounds.

Which leads me on to Gigg Lane, Bury and one of the most disturbing and ridiculous sights I have seen on a football fround for many years. Not content with caging standing supporters on a largely wooden terrace, Bury also chose to erect a very high and very obstructive fence in front of the seating section reserved for away fans. If it is now felt necessary to treat seated fans with little history of trouble like caged animals there is surely no way back for football, and no way that it is going to lure back those who could safeguard its future.

Fencing on terraces should be as unnecessary an evil as hooliganism itself but has been made necessary by the access an unfenced terrace gives to the morons "battlefield".

Fencing grandstands is both dangerous and offensive, those who consider it necessary should perhaps consider a safer alternative if the problem cannot be coped with any other way - shut down the ground.






Acrobatic Peter Coyne leaps to avoid clashing with Farnborough 'keeper Cleevely in the Town's FA Cup win at the County Ground.
