for this evenings Freight Rover Trophy, First Round match with A.F.C. Bournemouth.



The dates for the ensuing rounds areas follows.



We have to dispose of Bournemouth before we can do so and I think that this is the best tie of the First Round.


Their confidence will be sky high following their resounding 3-0 win against Notts County last Saturday in their Third Division match.

Only maximum effort will see us through tonight and I will warn my players that those who do not perform with maximum effort will not be in the team for the Leeds Cup tie, this match is important to me and I know to all of you.

We comfortably defeated Newport County on Sunday despite the fact that I thought a couple of players were not performing as well as they should be, they were left in no doubt at half-time and at the final whistle my thoughts on the matter.

Last week I read in the local evening newspaper, a letter written by a spectator criticising my selection of a player. This gives me an opportunity to reply to all those who think that they can do better. Firstly such comments are not conducive to team spirit. It does no one any good slating the team in the press. The twin towers of Wembley, can come a little closer, for the winners of this evenings first round match, here at the County Ground.

Our tie with Bournemouth is probably the best match of the round, on paper at least! Both clubs are striving to obtain promotion. The recently contested league encounter at Dean Court adds further interest to the match. The single goal that divided the two teams on New Years Day seems set to ensure that we will witness another close match. Hopefully on this occasion we shall be the victors.

The Freight Rover, Trophy attracted more spectators to last years Wembley final than two recent England internationals!

The First Round has been thrown into chaos following the recent bad weather. The Southern section has seen only one definite result, when Port Vale scored the only goal of the match at Exeter City last week. Paul Maguire being the Vale Park clubs marksman.

Brentford who finished top of our preliminary group entertain

Walsall. The Midland club are a free scoring outfit and if only they could defend as well, they would be amongst the leading clubs in the Third Division. A difficult tie to predict but Walsall may well join Port Vale in the Area Quarter Final.

Gillingham should prove to be too strong for Fourth Division Colchester United and it would surely be a major surprise if the Layer Road club, survived, to take their place in the Quarter Final.

Aldershot and Swansea City provide an all Fourth Division tussle. Swansea City have been having a good season and if league form is any guide they should survive.

Our F.A. Cup opponents, Fulham, will have to be at their very best to survive the blitz they can expect from Fourth Division leaders Northampton Town. With Richard Hill in such free scoring form this season, the Craven Cottage club will be severely tested.

Last years trophy winners, Bristol City, should survive against visiting Southend United at Ashton Gate. A return to the West Country for former Town players Derek Hall, Paul Roberts and Martin Ling. They will have to raise their form to put City off the Wembley trail.

Wolverhampton Wanderers and Hereford United provide another all Fourth Division struggle and it seems that luck must change for Graham Turner and Wolves at some stage. This may be the competition to lift their flagging efforts.

The Northern Section contained some interesting ties. Carlisle United looked home and dry after winger John Halpin scored a 65th minute solo goal - racing 30 yards to poke the ball past Preston North End 'keeper Alan Kelly. In the 88th minute, Nigel Jemsen grabbed the equaliser with a 15 yard shot. Then two minutes later Gary Brazil fired a 25 yard shot on the run which Carlisle 'keeper Kevin Carr could only help into the net. Those two goals in the last three minutes took Preston into the Second Round.

It was no surprise that Chester City and Lincoln required penalties to settle their differences. Second half goals from Bennett for Chester and Simmons for Lincoln City ensured extra time. Chester won 5-4 on penalties.

Chesterfield travel to Rochdale now under the guidance of former Leeds United manager Eddie Gray. It would give his career, at Spotland, a boost to remove a Third Division club from the competition.

Halifax Town appeared to have a most difficult task at home to Third Division leaders Middlesbrough and that is how it proved.

Stuart Ripley fired Middlesbrough into the next round with his 20 yard shot three minutes from time, so it was not all one way traffic.

The York City and Mansfield Town match is difficult to attempt to forecast, but City's fomidable record in Cup competitions apart from this seasons shock F.A. Cup dismissal should see them survive.

Home advantage in Cup competitions is always considered to be most important and Scunthorpe United will be hoping that this is a fact as they entertain European Cup Winners heroes Wrexham.

The tie to probably cause the most interest in the Northern Section is the match between former First Division giants Bolton Wanderers and Burnley. Bolton will be hoping to make the most of their Burnden Park advantage. This match should attract a good attendance and probably rival the attendance here at the County Ground for the highest of the round.

A competition that has taken on the name of Wembley with real meaning for the clubs in the lower divisions. Can we manage to reach the famous stadium this season?

This evenings match will provide us with part of the answer, if we survive, if not, we shall be left to hope for better luck next season. After this round there will be no more than four matches left to play before the final. That fact should be enough to spur on any would be pretender.

An explosive last six minutes at Dean Court on New Years Day provided the only blemish on Swindon Town's Christmas and New Year campaign.

After wins at Gillingham and at home to Brentford, Swindon and their very large following had every reason to hope for a draw in spite of Bournemouth's tremendous form and consistent home record

The sheer number of fans arriving at Dean Court caused the kick off to be delayed for 15 minutes, just as it had been at Gillingham a week earlier, the game that followed though, was not quite so pleasurable to watch and the result was certainly not as satisfactory.

The first clear attempt on goal came from Bournemouth's Carl Richards, whose 13th minute header was cleared off the line by Alan McLoughlin.

Only quick work by Morrel three minutes later, prevented Steve White from opening the scoring after Chris Kamara had headed down to him. Bournemouth were forced to reorganise at half time by an injury to Mark Whitlock who had to be replaced by Morgan Lewis. The second half was fairly similar to

the first with much of the action taking place in midfield as two sides of equal ability fought to make the single breakthrough that seemed likely to decide the result. That breakthrough came through


Bournemouth's Carl Richards who capitalised in a huge gap in the "Town" defence to slide the ball past the uncharacteristically hesitant Fraser Digby.

Swindon's response was typically swift, a Mark Jones cross was fumbled by Gerry Peyton and Jimmy Quinn was on hand to crash the ball into the net. What followed was all to familiar for Swindon fans, as referee Lester Shapter ruled the goal out and then proceeded to send Mark Jones off for disagreeing too forcefully with his decision.

Despite a chance falling to Peter Coyne in the last minute the game was effectively lost for Swindon in that one moment and the many "Town" fans had the chance to reflect once more on the night in November 1985 which saw an equally controversial decision by the Devon referee so nearly rob Swindon of their victory over Sunderland in the Milk Cup.

The chance of swift revenge for that New Years Day set back is one incentive for Swindon Town, the other is perhaps the biggest incentive in football, the chance to appear at Wembley in a cup final -could this be the year for Swindon Town?

Tonights visitors Bournemouth were the first winners of this competition when was introduced in the 1983/84 season as the Associate Members Cup.

They fought their way through the South ern Section to defeat Millwall 2-1 in the Southern Final and earn the right to mee the Northern winners Hull City.

In front of a crowd of 6,544 at Villa Park Birmingham, goals from Graham and Morrell gave the Cherries a 2-1 victory and their first piece of league silverware The following season, the competition was renamed The Freight Rover Trophy with the lure of a visit to Wernbley for the outright final rather than Villa Park, The Cherries were unable to repeat their success and enjoy this time a very profitable Wembley pay out that they had missed the previous year.

Brentford, who went on to lose to Wigan 3-1 at Wembley dismissing the Cherries in front of their own Dean Court fans 3-2 in the Southern Section Semi-final. Like Swindon, Bournemouth made a swift exlast season from the competition - eve: though they defeated Reading who were onto win the 3rd Division title 5-0!!, with Colin Clarke scoring four times in one

game. During the summer Bournemouth manager Harry Redknapp considerably strengthened his line-up after selling Clarke to neighbours Southampton for a huge fee of £400,000.

And the pundits forecast that the south coast side would feature prominently in the promotion race this year has been proved right so far.

Summer signings included goalkeeper Gerry Peyton, experienced defender Mark Whitlock, striker David Puchett, the latter two from Southampton. Tony Pulis, and Carl Richards for £10,000 from non-league Enfield.

Puchett was leading the Cherries score charts until an injury just before Christmas seems certain to side-line him for the next of this campaign.

But with cash still in hand, Redknapp is at present trying to strengthen his side further and maintain their push for a Second Division place next season.

Harry Redknapp (Manager)

Has become one of the most popular Managers in the Club's history. His shrewd signings and Youth Scheme have given the Club their best teams in years. Played many years with West Ham before joining Bournemouth as a player. Has valuable coaching experience in the North American Soccer League with Seattle Sounders. Now in his fourth season as Manager.

Gerry Peyton (Goalkeeper)

An Eire International of considerable experience Joined Bournemouth in July 1986 after ten years with Fulham. Previously with Aston Villa and Burnley.

Tommy Heffernan (Full Back)

In his second spell with the Cherries having spent two years in between with Sheffield United. We started his career with Tottenham Hotspur before joining Bournemouth. An attacking full back with a flair for goal.

Paul Morrell (Full Back)

A strong attacking defender who can play at full back central defender or midfield. Has progressed well at Bournemouth after considerable Non-League experience with Bath City and Weymouth.

Mark Newson (Central Defender)

Ex-England semi-professional who joined Bournemouth from Gola League Maidstone. Has impressed with his positive play after only one year in League football.

Trevor Aylott (Striker)

Tail, powerful striker who started his career as an apprentice with Chelsea and has since played for Barnsley, Millwall and Luton Town. Recently moved to Bournemouth from Crystal Palace.

Mark O' Conner (Winger)

Previously with Q.P.R., he was signed from Bristol Rovers. An Eire Under-21 International who also had a loan period with Exeter City.

Morgan Lewis (Midfield/Defender)

Local boy who joined the Club straight from school and has come through the Youth Scheme.

Adrian Randall (Midfield)

A youngster of great promise who is an England Youth International. He has already played in the league team.

Tommy Keane (Striker)

An Eire Youth International who made one appearance last season

Billy Clarke (Defender)

FREIGHT ROVER TROPHY CONTINUES TO SCALE NEW HEIGHTS

The success of last season's Freight Rover Trophy confirmed that the competition is now an integral part of the football calendar. The increasing popularity of the Freight Rover Trophy was not only in evidence at the Wembley Final between Bristol City and Bolton Wanderers, but also throughout the competition, because attendances, as a whole, increased by a staggering 12.9%. Indeed, the Freight Rover Trophy was the only major knock-out competition to boast increased attendances.


The financial re-structuring which the League underwent during the close season has placed additional emphasis on the Freight Rover competition. It is now a vital source of revenue to Third and Fourth Division clubs which, in some cases, could even provide a lifeline. The gate receipts from the 67 matches played increased last season to £612,000 – to put that into perspective, 1,104 League matches in Divisions Three and Four generate approximately £8,600,000, including season ticket sales. With the number of matches in the competition increasing this year to more than 80 and gates in the Preliminary Round already showing a healthy 6% increase, last year's figures are bound to be surpassed.

The Freight Rover Trophy does, of course, offer a realistic opportunity for Third and Fourth Division clubs to reach Wembley. Last season's showpiece game attracted a record 55,000 gate to what has become known as the 'family final'. The previous final had seen Wembley's first family area and this innovation was continued last year with a 4,000 seater enclosure. The 1987 Freight Rover Trophy Final will certainly live up to its own high standards because arrangements are in hand for a massive 8,000 seater family enclosure with discounts for children's tickets and give-aways for the whole family.

With an increased prize fund and plenty of other incentives for clubs who do succeed, the Freight Rover Trophy is sure to scale new heights this season.

Peter Downsborough

In October 1977, Bradford City visited the County Ground and won by a single goal. Nothing out of the ordinary in that you may think, but the victory was in no small measure helped by a superb goalkeeping performance.

The goalkeeper that night for Bradford City just happened to be a Swindon Town legend - Peter Downsborough.

Arguably one of the greatest goalkeepers never to play for his Country, Downsborough was without doubt a true Colossus between the sticks and his greatest moment came in March 1969 – more on that later.

Peter came to Swindon in August 1965 and made his debut in a goaless home draw with Oxford United, the first of forty two league appearances during that campaign. In the League Cup, Swindon made a hasty exit going down two-one at Darlington, somebody called Don Rogers netting the Town goal.

In the FA Cup Swindon were slightly more successful scoring five against Merthyr Tydfil and six against Grantham in round two, before going out to First Division Coventry City in round three.

The following season was a frustrating one for the pigeon fancier from Yorkshire, he was confined to the sidelines for much of the campaign due to injury. His place being taken by Tony Wicks and it was Wicks who proved an able deputy as the Town marched through to round five of the FA Cup. Downsborough played in the round one defeat of Horsham but missed out as the Town accounted for firstly Ashford Town in the second round and then the mighty West Ham in a memorable third round replay.

After accounting for Second Division Bury in the fourth round, it took First Division Nottingham Forest three matches to get rid of Swindon, who by then had made a spirited recovery in the league and they eventually finished eight. Downsborough regained his place in April and managed twenty six league appearances that season.

In 1967-68 Downsborough again had his league outings restricted, making twenty seven, he shared the No.1 spot with Corporal Roy Jones from the R.A.F. Swindon again did well in the FA Cup this time reaching round four, unluckily losing two-one at Sheffield Wednesday. In the League Cup Swindon fared less well

losing in a first round replay to Newport County:

The next season, 1968-69, is well chronicled, Peter Downsborough kept his goal intact for the opening five league games, a record which stood until last season's Fourth Division championship campaign. The first defeat and goal against came at Bournemouth, The Cherries inflicting a two-nil reversal on the Town. By that time Swindon had moved into three of the League Cup, knocking out Torquay and then, ironically bearing in mind Downsborough's future move, Bradford City after a replay in round two.

Downsborough's goalkeeping throughout League and Cup Campaign was immaculate and he helped Swindon through to Wembley and the greatest game in Peter's career.

He was called upon to make an important save in only the fourth minute pushing a drive round the post for corner. For the rest of the match he was seemingly invincible. After Swindon had taken a 35th minute lead through Roger Smart, Downsborough and the Town defence had to deal with numerous Arsenal attacks and at one stage eight corner kicks in a four minute spell.

His greatest save that day came from a full bloodied John Radford, Downsborough flung himself to his right to push the ball away. "What a man this is" said ITV Commentator Brian Moore - who were we to disagree.

Arsenal did eventually equalise through Bobby Gould, but of course the afternoon had a right and happy ending when two Don Rogers goals gave Swindon the 3-1 win and the League Cup.

Promotion too for the Town that season and Peter Downsborough was a hero amongst heroes.

He continued to be a hero as the Town went on to new success in Cup, league and Anglo-Italian ventures.

His final league game for Swindon was on April 24th 1973 in a 2-1 home win over Hull City before going of to firstly Brighton and then Bradford City.

Peter continued playing league football until 1979 and as that rainy October night in October 1977 proved he remained as good as ever.

There are many people, including me, who say that 1968-69 side were worthy of first Division football. Peter Downsborough certainly was.





INTERVIEW



Doug Wiltshire is the clubs Chief Steward and along with his three assistants, George Sims, Joe Faux and Doug Coombes, he supervises the army of stewards and gatemen at each match. Doug took up his position as Chief

Steward after 24 years service to the club in a stewarding capacity. A man who takes a sincere and concientious attitude to his responsible position. His jovial outlook keeps the serious side masked away from all those who do not come into regular contact with the local magistrate. How does the genial, Cheney Manor resident, see his position at the club, 'I think it is a great honour to serve Swindon Town in this capacity and the prime responsibility of the Chief Steward who ever he may be, is to ensure that staffing arrangements in all departments on matchdays or on the occasion of other events at the Ground are satisfactory'.

Doug continued on his theme of stewarding, 'With the innovation of the Safety Certificate, there is really a new meaning to the word. For me personally it is now as much a job of administration as a practical exercise? He paused before adding, 'Stewards now have to attend courses and regular meetings. Five marshals have to attend five fighting exercises at Potterne, near Devizes and really most people are not aware of the amount of dedication the post of a steward demands'.

Doug who is employed by British Rail as a Member of their Headquarters Management staff is 54 years of age and is rightly proud of his family link with Swindon Town.

My first experience of the County Ground was when my late father, brought me to the club to watch the first match played here after the Second World War, at the time, one of my most vivid memories was of the goalkeeper by the name of Wildman'

Forty two years with British Rail and Twenty four with Swindon Town, show a loyalty and dedication to be admired. An understanding family is something Doug was proud to remember, 'My wife Betty has always supported me and I am proud to say that Paul, my son and Margaret my daughter have always helped me'.

Paul probably holds a Football League record! As Doug explained. 'Paul manned a turnstyle at the County Ground at the age of 16, yellow, in the North Stand, along with Fred Thorp who at the time was ninety years of age. The combination of young and old was probably never surpassed'. In a capacity, taken for granted, Doug, had some definite views on stewarding. When you visit some of the other clubs, for instance Bournemouth recently, their organisation does not compare with Swindon Town. We have a distinct advantage with Radio microphones at our disposal. We now have the right mixture with the young and experienced on the staff.

The Swindon magistrate believes that, 'Good public relations with the paying customer is essential and a sense of humour is vital'.

Doug saw the other side of the public equally as well 'Some people are awkward and do like complaining for the sake of it, but we are paid to deal with all types'?

A man who has seen many changes during his time at the County Ground, Doug concluded by stating, 'Only those who have served time or who are at the heart of things know what an efficient club this has become. It is a well run organisation always looking to improve and look at new ways of dealing with matters. Swindon Town is really a big part of my life'. For their part the Club are pleased to have the Wiltshire family in the fold

One thing that remains a problem at football grounds is the chanting of obscene language. A number of







Denny Mundee is another player in the same situation as Alan. Denny plays for Southern League club Salisbury City when he is not on duty with the Town.











The football fan is, essentially, a creature of habit and is resigned to fixture congestion and impersonating a brass monkey for four months of the year, any change to that routine



offers the only exception to this home domination would probably still have too much bounce if the Harlem Globetrotters played there, emphasising the folly of its introduction.


