


MAY I WELCOME YOU ALL TO THE COUNTY GROUND, FOR THIS DIVISION AFTERNOON'S THIRD MATCH OF THE DAY AGAINST MIDDLESBROUGH. I would like to extend a special welcome to the Directors, officials and supporters of the Avresome Park club. The North East club have been foremost in the promotion race from the Third Division this season. Todays match will be vital in the eventual outcome of the Championship race.

This is an opportune moment for me to welcome Phil King to the County Ground. Phil is now half way through a months loan with the Club. At the same time, both Charlie Henry and Mark Gardiner have moved to the Plainmoor club for a similar period.

The exchange deal was nothing short of a miracle in many ways. The deal was first mentioned at 2.30pm on the Thurday afternoon, our Club Secretary, Dave King, had been attending a meeting in Bristol with our Assistant Manager, John Trollope. It meant a quick ride back down the M5 for him, along with Lou Macari to a motorway rendezvous, South of Bristol, to meet with Torquay United officials and register all three players before the 5pm deadline. On the same day, Jimmy Gilligan was joining Newport County, so we were involved in four registrations in one day! The fact that there were no hitches in any of the deals, was a compliment to all concerned, a minor miracle had been achieved, all four players were able to turn out for their new clubs immediately.

While we were all very disappointed at the outcome of the Leeds United Cup tie, credit must be given to Lou Macari and the players since. We have drawn at Blackpool, knocked Hereford United out of the Freight Rover Competition, and



taken three points from our trip to Rotherham. That is resilience of the highest order.

This is the first opportunity that I have had of paying tribute to the administration staff of the Club, the Stewards and the Police for the manner in which the Leeds United cup-tie was allowed to pass without incident. It was a hair-raising prospect and one which we all felt was handled magnificently. The help of the Stewards from Leeds United was also a contributory factor.

Once again we have been fortunate to have been drawn at home in the Freight Rover competition when we entertain Aldershot at the County Ground on Tuesday March 10th Kick off 7.45. Can we make it to Wembley? Why not come along and see for yourself?

Swindon Town Football Club are rightly proud of their relationship with the Press. They are welcome to the County Ground and entitled to an opinion of what they view. In return we obviously request that they report accurately and sensibly. On the occasion of the visit of Leeds United we found that the usual responsible standard fell below par in

one instance.

The 'Western Daily Press' represented by a Mr Jim Holden who normally reports on Bristol City matches covered the County Ground Cup-tie.

Mr Holden's subsequent match report printed the following day bore no resemblance to the accuracy of a situation

'At the same time Leeds fans escaped their obviously ill - prepared pen and proved a destructive distraction?


If Mr Holden had taken the time to check the facts he would have been informed by Chief Superintendent Wakeley that the police had opened another section on the Stratton Bank to allow 200 late comers supporting Leeds United to enter the ground. A calculated move, the brief skirmish that ensued, was staged by two brothers from Leeds who wanted to draw the police into that section by their staged fight. Police are trained and knowledgeable about such matters and refrained from the bait. Mr Holden, we suggest, should check his facts. We had three arrests that evening, a record that is below a normal Third Division match at the County Ground. Swindon Town Foot-


Last season, Jamie Reynolds, was selected for the England Youth International Squad and eventually made several appearances for his country. It just goes to show that young players can obtain recognition at Swindon Town Football Club.

Young players will get opportunities at the County Ground, if they can prove that they have the ability and determination to succeed. Good character is all important and the right way of living is essential if a young player is to reach the pinnacle of his career.

Although Mark Gardiner has joined Charlie Henry on loan at Torquay United, here is another situation where players who joined Swindon Town at a young age have forged successful careers at their chosen profession.

Our Reserve team at Luton Town earlier this month included no fewer than eight players who began their careers here at the County Ground. Of the remainder, Denny Mundee who was a member of the Swindon Schoolboy team of three years ago, chose to join Queens Park Rangers, but eventually found his way back to Swindon Town, Alan McLoughlin was discarded by Manchester United at a young age, but has been given the opportunity to forge a career at the County Ground. Bryan Wade who had to withdraw from the Reserve team at the last minute is another example of how opportunity knocked for a local player.

From playing with Bath City and Trowbridge Town, he was given the chance to play in the Football League, if they are good enough the door is open to all who join Swindon Town to reach the top or at



least have a worthwhile career. It is simply up to the player to apply himself in a dedicated manner and he will be given every opportunity to prove his worth.

A lot of you may have been surprised to find that my latest signing, Phil King from Torquay United, was not included in the team to play at Blackpool. This was due to the fact that I made two or three changes and I did not think it was fair to place too much responsibility on a player, who had only joined the club the previous day.

Also, Phil will find the training schedules demanded here at the County Ground different from what he may have been used to at Exeter City and Torquay United.

Phil was asked to come in on the Sunday for extra training and responded willingly and I am sure he will prove to be an asset during his time at the club.

The point we took from our league match at Blackpool, again showed what we have achieved in the past two seasons, we are now a very difficult team to defeat on our travels. If we can become as difficult to beat at the County Ground for the remainder of the season we will come very near to promotion for the second successive season.

Phil made his debut for us at Rotherham last Saturday. Following our period of inactivity the previous weekend it was important that we bounced back with three points. Our second half display was enough to make sure that we did just that. Today's match against Middlesbrough is one that we cannot afford to lose. Following their surprise away defeat at Chesterfield two weeks ago the North East club will be making sure that we do not inflict a second successive defeat on their away record.

The Third Division league table is now beginning to take shape. Following last Saturdays matches it would appear that Middlesbrough are now favourites to take one of the definite promotion spots. It would take a loss of form to stop them. The Town are now ten points adrift of the Ayresome Park Club and our meeting with Bruce Rioch's team at the County Ground today will be vital. We must be looking for nothing less than three points from this fixture and also from our match with Bournemouth on Saturday April 18th. Maximum points from these two matches will deprive them both of three possible points.

We could also take advantage of the fact that A.F.C. Bournemouth and Middlesbrough clash at Dean Court on Tuesday next March 3rd. We travel North to meet York City at Bootham Crescent, if we could snatch a victory that night, we would undoubtably do our promotion chances a lot of good.

The point we took from our visit to Blackpool and the three we obtained at Rotherham last Saturday took our total of away points to 23! only two less than we have taken from our home matches! Only Middlesbrough have collected more points on their travels this season. Before todays match they had collected 26 points. Prior to todays matches the totals of the leading clubs read as follows: Bournemouth 17, Notts County 18, Bristol City 20, Gillingham 15, Blackpool 18, Wigan Athletic 16 and Mansfield Town 19.

Now study the difference in the points collected from home matches, where as the Town have recorded 25 at the County Ground, those same clubs have totalled the following amount of points:

Middlesbrough 32, A.F.C. Bournemouth 38, Notts County 36, Bristol City 20, Gillingham 33, Blackpool 29, Wigan Athletic 28, Mansfield Town 24. Obviously the County Ground has proved less of an advantage safer this season than it did last campaign. Our four defeats are of an higher total than any of the clubs in the nine leading positions. The recent form and signings of former Scottish International Joe Jordan from Southampton and Steve Galliers from Wimbledon, coupled with the visit of the then divisional leaders A.F.C. Bournemouth had the fans packing the terraces at Ashton Gate last Saturday. A Crowd of 14,539 saw City depose the Dean Court club of the league leadership with a 2-

Today's visitors, Middlesbrough, took full advantage of the slip up by Harry Redknapp's team when a five star performance gave the Ayresome Park Club a well deserved 3-0 win over Fulham. A quality performance by Scottish striker Bernie Slaven and his team mates helped to destroy the myth that their close passing style would flounder on heavy pitches. On a heavy surface Bernie Slaven was in his element opening the scoring after nine minutes.

The Ayresome Park Club went two up ten minutes after the interval thanks to Gary Hamilton who then scored his second and Boro's third with a spectacular mid-air volley in the 71st minute. Blackpool inflicted a humiliating 6-1 defeat upon Bristol Rovers at Bloomfield Road. Rovers crumbled after losing striker Robbie Turner through injury. Mark Taylor opened the scoring for Blackpool with goals in the 25th and 32nd minute. Mike Davies grabbed the third before David Mehew reduced the arrears for Rovers, but new signing Craig

Paul Stewart scored from the penalty spot in the 78th minute and added another a minute from time. Needless to say that Ian McParland of Notts County was on target in the Meadow Lane clubs 2-1 home win against Chesterfield. One of Ian's goals coming from the penalty spot.

The all Yorkshire derby between York City and Doncaster Rovers ended all square at 1-1. Dale Barton equalising a first half goal from Redfearn of Doncaster.

The away league debut of "Town" keeper Fraser Digby earlier this season, could not have come at a more awesome venue or against more difficult opponents.

The match also marked a personal milestone for "Town" midfielder Chris Kamara as he made his 400th league appearance on the ground of his home-town club.

After their much publicised problems. Middlesbrough were back at Ayresome Park and on top of the Third Division.

The legendary partisan support of the Teeside faithful was much in evidence that evening and contrasted with the small band able to make the mid week trip up from Wiltshire, the actual attendance was at the time the best Third Division gate of the season at 9221.

The match itself was a fluent encounter and showed how Middlesbrough had got to the top of the table.

After only six minutes Fraser Digby was forced to dive through a forest of legs to retrieve the ball with the "Town" under intense early pressure. In the 26th minute Digby pulled off an even better save from an Archie Stephens header tipping the ball away for a corner to give Swindon brief respite.

The home pressure finally paid off in the 36th minute when Brian Laws collected a loose ball on the edge of the box and fired in a perfectly judged shot which gave Digby no chance. An injury to the Middlesbrough midfielder will prevent any repeat performance of that tremendous goal today.


Swindon came back at the league leaders in the second half but were hampered by an injury to Jimmy Gilligan whose immobility caused a lack of firepower up front.

Jimmy still managed to shoot just over in the 60th minute after Dave Bamber had knocked the ball down. Moments later it was Bamber himself who was clear through but a desperate last gasp tackle robbed him just as he was about to shoot.

Nine minutes from time Archie Stephens mis kicked from only six yards out to save Swindon from an unjustifiably heavier defeat.

The greater confidence and fluency of the home side particularly in midfield decided the final outcome, with Boro still at the top and Swindon away from the middle of the table group that they inhabited in September todays game is of vital importance to both sides and should be an intriguing clash of promotion hopefuls.

This will be the first time that Swindon and Middlesbrough have met at the County Ground for nearly fourteen years.

And it is a vital match for both clubs seeking promotion to the Second

Division.

Currently the 'Boro' head the table. have done so for most of the season, and boast the best away record in Third Division.

They have won at Wigan, Bristol Rovers. Rotherham. Darlington. Newport, Brentford and Bury and drawn at Gillingham, Fulham, Bristol City, Mansfield and Port Vale. The only three defeats came at York (3 1), Notts County (1-0) and Chesterfield (2-1).

But it is not so long ago that it was no all milk and honey at Aryesome Park, a venue for the 1966 World Cup. Relegated from the Second Division at the end of last season there then began the saga of whether the club would continue t function.

The official receiver closed the ground and sacked manager Bruce Rioch.

He continued to train the players but the situation was not finally resolved until Middlesbrough had beer forced to play their first home league game of the season at Hartlepool. Hopefully the financial problems are now behind then and this famous club can once again rise to pas glories.

It was only back in 1973/74 that they ran away with the Second Division title with a record 65 points.

The Championship was won with 7 games left to play and in the end the largest margin ever - 15 points. After losing the first game at home they reached top spot in the league after 8 games and were never headed again.

Whilst in the 1st Division, Middlesbrough then reached the sixth round of the F.A. Cup three times, the Football League Cup Semi-finals once, and won the Anglo-Scottish Cup. The 'Boro' finally lost their status in the top flight in 1982 being rele gated together with Wolves and Leeds United.

Pete, who works for British Rail, as does Bob, is also a man who loves his connection with the Football Club.





FROM THE TERRACE


It takes a trip to a place like "Stalag" Rotherham to bring the realisation that around the country travelling football fans do not get too bad a deal from the local Police forces.






