

I would like to welcome to the County Ground this evening the directors, officials and supporters of Bolton Wander-

ers. We commenced our Third Division campaign last August with a 2-1 win at Burndon Park

There have been many requests for the club to explain the disaplinary procedure. For your information it works as

If a player accumilates 21 or more penalty points between the opening day of the season and the last Sunday in November of the same season he is suspended automatically for a period covering 3 first team matches.

If a player accumulates 21 or more penlaty, points between the opening day of the playing season and the last Sunday in February of the same season, he is suspended automatically for a period covering 2 first team matches.

If a player accumulates 21 or more penalty points between the opening day of the playingd season and the last day of the same season will be censured and warned to his future conduct.

A player who has already been subject to disciplinary action as a result of accumlating 21 penalty points and then goes onto accumulating 31 or more penalty points is he subject to the following punishment:a) If 31 points are reached on or before

the last Sunday in February he is suspended for a period covering two first team matches

b) If 31 points are reached on or before the last Sunday in March he is suspended for a period covering one first team

c) If 31 points are reached on or before the last day of the season he is severley censured and warned as to his future

A player who has already been subject to disciplinary action as a result of accumulating 21 penalty points and 31 penalty



points and who goes onto accumulate a total of 41 or more points at any time during the same season shall be required to attend a commission hwo shall have power to deal with the player in such manner as they deam fit.

Any period of suspension arising from the accumulation of penalty points shall commence on the 14th day following the date of the last offence. The suspension shall cover all domestic League and Cup matches and friendly matches until such time as his club's recognise senior team has completed the number of matches appropriate to the punishment in approved competitions during the period covered by its opening match in the Football League and ending with the final match in which the club is playing in a domestic competition organised by the F.A. or the Football League.

Hopefully that will help clarify the situation for you all.

Football at the County Ground next season will be slightly more expensive. To keep abreast of rising costs and the improvements to the Ground as required by Wiltshire County Council extra finance must be found. The simple fact that football at this Ground is cheaper than anywhere else in the Third Division is


also a contributory factor to the price increases which will be announced in May.

More than one club have been amazed at the lower admission fees that exist at Swindon Town. At this stage we cannot be aware of whether we shall be witnessing Second or Third Division soccer next season. A higher grade of football demands further increased costs all of these factors have to be borne in mind when the final decisions are taken shortly.

The progress that Swindon Town Football Club has made in the past eighteen months is phenomenal from an average Fourth Division team to one on the verge of Division Two is the main part of the rise, it should also be taken into account that this club was running with considerable deficit. Last years accounts showed a small profit. This proves that Swindon Town Football Club is now being run in good order. Improvements to the Stratton Bank and Shrivenham Road stand have to be made, there is no choice, for they have

to come within the terms as specified in the Safety Certificate team. Although the Football League Grounds Trust are committed to seventy-five per cent of the cost, this Football Club have to find the remaining percentage. That can be quite considerable, the team must be financed to help gain promotion and the normal day to day running costs have to be met. This can only be met with an increase in admission.





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Well done! That is my first reaction to both my players and to all of the supporters who travelled to Chesterfield on March 13th and 14th.

The players responded to the Aldershot defeat in magnificent fashion by taking the club three points nearer to the Second Division. It could be described as a test of character although I personally do not see it that way we have shown our resolve on previous occasions when we have faced setbacks. It really is a case of repeating that character, it is always there.


I hope and think you will now see the way in which Swindon Town Football Club cares about its fans. There was no hesitation on the part of the Club directors to provide alternative transport for you who were able to travel the following day, free of charge may I add.

I know some of you were unable to make the return journey and were therefore deprived of watching the actual game. Circumstances were obviously beyond our control and your eventual response was magnificent and a credit to the Club.

Eventually when the match was played we took an early lead through Jimmy Quinn and held our lead until shortly after half time. Their goal did annoy me because one or two players were not following the instructions given to them if we were forced to defend from corner kicks. Inevitably we paid the penalty and found ourselves at 1-1. Fine opportunism by Steve White put us ahead once again and then the penalty award should have meant that we had the game sewn up.

Mark Jones hit his shot at a convenient height to enable Jim Brown in the Chesterfield goal to save the shot. Once again Steve White proved to be our saviour with his second goal. I had watched Chesterfield lose by a single goal to Newport County the previous Sunday afternoon and I left Somerton Park convinced that if we applied ourselves in the right manner we should collect maximum points.

Last Tuesday evening we again collected three points in our promotion bid when we defeated Port Vale by the only goal of the game scored by Chris



Ramsey. I had recalled Chris to first team duty and he responded by bravely diving amongst flying feet to provide us with priceless points. His recall meant that Dave Bamber was relegated to the substitute role. Dave has been a bit in and out with his performances of late and we have been missing the flair that he had been providing when he beats the full back with that devastating turn of speed.


Port Vale always provide a stern test for us and it came as no real surprise that one goal was enough to settle the match. I sometimes have difficulty in convincing my players that it is possible to win by a single goal! The way some of our defenders go chasing balls in our opponents half with few minutes remaining of play disturbs you as much as myself. It is a time when we should be protecting our slender lead and not taking any unnecessary risks.

Our Football Combination match the following day saw our reserve team become the highest goalscorers in the competition when we defeated Southampton 3-2 Dave Bamber with two goals and Nicky Hughes with his usual goal were our marksmen. With the transfer deadline now fast approaching in fact it is this Thursday, I will be hoping to bring in a couple of new faces and in the next programme I will give you an insight into the dealings that took place to bring one or two players to the club. 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Our eight away win of the season, in league matches in the hastily rearranged fixture at Chesterfield meant that we had secured more victories on opponents grounds than any team in the Third Division.

In fact throughout the 'Today' Football League only Derby County in the Second Division and Northampton Town and Southend United from Division Four can beat our total of eight wins. All three clubs having won nine matches.

Only Blackpool have scored more goals than the Town on their travels. The Bloomfield Road club having scored 35 goals compared to our twenty-six. Following our 3-1 win at Saltergate only the Fourth Divisions leading clubs Northampton Town and Preston North End could claim to have scored more than the Town in away matches with 35 and 28 respectively.

On the transfer front Bury have recently signed goalkeeper Simon Farnworth from our visitors this evening, Bolton Wanderers for a fee of £6,500.

Bristol City have forged a link with Glasgow Rangers intended to benefit both clubs. City manager Terry Cooper, Rangers chief Graeme Souness and his assistant Phil Boersma reached agreement during a late night dinner after the Ashton Gate clubs recent Freight Rover Trophy win against Gillingham. Under the agreement, Rangers will have first choice of any young City players who could make the grade at top level.

The intended agreement means that City will have the pick of Rangers players not thought good enough to play regular Scottish Premier League football.

Terry Cooper set up this alliance with his former Middlesbrough team mate when he heard that Rangers were on a recruiting drive in England.

Apparently Souness was visiting Ashton Gate to take a look at full back Andy Llewellyn, utility player Rob Newman and defender Keith Curle. To date the City manager has yet to sell a young player to a club in a higher division in his five years at Ashton Gate.

Near neighbours Bristol Rovers have boosted their back room staff by the appointment of Des Bulpin as a full-time coach. For the past three years he has been director of the F.A. centre of excellence based at Rovers' Hambrook Training Centre.

The free-scoring Trowbridge Town striker Jeff Meacham has accepted an offer to play for Rovers on a non-contract basis. The loss of Robbie Turner the towering free-transfer signing from Cardiff City with broken ribs sustained in Rovers match at Blackpool left Rovers in need of additional forward power.

A national Sunday newspaper recently published the leading sixteen players for consistency in the Third Division. Marks are awarded each week out of ten and to date these players have proved to be the most consistent.

Manchester United have been viewing two Third Division players with more than a little interest. Gary Pallister of Middlesbrough and Paul Stewart of Blackpool the players under the Old Trafford microscope.

The crowd of 7,332 that watched Walsall defeat Middlesbrough 1-0 on Saturday March 14th was the highest league attendance of the season at Fellows Park.

That same Saturday and scoreline meant a happy birthday for former Southampton defender Mark Whitlock. For Mark hammered home only the second goal of his career in Bournemouth's 1-0 victory over Bury at Dean Court.

Walsall striker David Kelly could not disguise his delight and relief when he scored the second of Walsalls goals in their recent 3-0 win at Twerton Park against Bristol Rovers.

It was his first goal in eleven games, which is a long time for a striker who had collected 17 in his

previous 28 appearances.

Walsall were delighted to find the Twerton Park pitch in better condition than they had been led to believe. Bath City had played their the previous evening and that meant that Rovers groundsman Jackie Pitt had to work to the small hours of the morning to get the surface flat for the visit of Walsall the following evening.

The opening day of the season, saw the "Town" travel to Burnden Park for the first time since December 1973, to play their much awaited first game back after four years in the basement of the Football League.

For the many fans who made the trip North, it seemed that the glorious season of 1985/6 had never ended, Lou Macari rewarding his promotion heroes with a taste of Third division football, in spite of his close season signings.

Martin Ling, now of course with Southend, was the only newcomer named, and even then only as Substitute

The illusion of a continuation of past glories was further emphasised by events on the field as Swindon registered their first away win in Division Three since a 3-0 win at Bristol City in April 1982. As early as the 14th minute, Dave Bamber was causing the home defence problems, heading on to Peter Coyne whose effort was cleared off line by Derek Scott Bolton struck back four minutes later, as Elliot's first time shot brought a fine reflex save from Kenny Allen.


A lapse in the Bolton defence in the 35th minute gave the "Town" a crucial breakthrough. Phillips was not positive enough in his actions on the edge of the box and was robbed by Coyne who scored to send Swindon in one nil up at half time. Another defensive error 19 minutes into the second half enabled Wanderers to draw level. A suicidal back-pass by David Cole left. Allen stranded, allowing George Orghani the simplest of chances.

With Bolton down to ten men following an injury to Derek Scott in the 66th minute, Peter Coyne grabbed his second with a shot that trickled over the line from a Bamber cross. Two minutes later, Orghani had a chance to equalise but shot just wide, sealing Bolton's fate on an afternoon they may desire to forget but which will be fondly remembered by Swindon Town.

Wanderers last visit to the County Ground resulted in a 2-2 draw, Swindon's goals being scored by Ray Clarke and Terry Hubbard, way back in the literally dark days of February 1974. That season, was our last in Division 2. Finishing bottom with only 25 points as opposed to the Division 2 champions 65, those champions? Middlesbrough....... how times change!

It is less than seven years ago that Bolton were playing in the First Division, but a steady decline in fortunes has seen the club drop into the Third Division for only the seond time in their history.

At present they lie close to the relegation zone and player-manager Phil Neal will need to call on all his vast experience if the club are not to drop into the Fourth for the very first time.

Bolton were founder members of the Football beaque in 1888 and enjoyed full membership until 1971 when they forced to taste life in the Third for the first time. From 1899 to 1911 the Lancashire side fluctuated back and fourth between the first and second divisions before finally establishing themselves in the top bracket.

During this twelve year period they won the Second Division title once, in 1908-1909 and finished runners-up on three occassions.

First Division status was retained from 1911 until 1964 apart from a break of just two years.

It was during the years between the two world wars that the club enjoyed its finest hours winning the F.A Cup three times, ample consolation for two earlier final defeats in 1894 and 1904 at the hands of Notts County and Manches ter City respectively.

Bolton's first cup success came in 1923 the first final to be staged at Wembley - when they defeated West Ham 2-0. The official attendance was given as 126,047 but thousand more gained entrance and the match had to be delayed for 40 minutes owing to the crowd invading the pitch.

Three years later a single goal victory over Manchester City saw the cup return for a second time to Burnden Park.

The treble was completed in 1929 with 2-0 success over Portsmouth.

As far as we know, the goalkeeper who kept a clean sheet in all those three finals Dick Pvm s now in his nineties but still going strong down in

Bolton were to appear again in two more F.A. Cup finals in the 50's with mixed success.

In 1953 they led 3-1 but were finally beaten 4-3 by Blackpool who scored the winner in the dying seconds - "the Matthews final"

Five years later they faced the re-built Manchester United side following the tragic Munich disaster. Nat Lofthouse scored both the goals one when he bundled Harry Gregg into the net - in the 2-0 victory

From 1964 until 1978 Bolton saw action in the Second Division apart from two seasons in the Third. The second 1972-73 saw them win the Third Championship with a four point advantage over Notts Co.

Bolton were promoted again to the 1st at the end of 77-78 season but lost that status two years

Last year they reached Wembley again as Northern Winners of the Freight Rover Trophy but in front of 54,506 they were beaten 3-0 by the Southern winners Bristol City.

Mike Salmon (Goalkeeper)

In July, Bolton paid Stockport County £18,000 for the former Blackburn Rovers goalkeeper, the fee being set by a transfer tribunal. The 6ft 2ins. Leyland-born player made his League debut for the Wanderers against Swindon Town on the opening day of the season.

Jimmy Phillips (Defender)

Another product of the Bolton youth academy. The local-born defender has made the majority of his appearances at left back, but has also played in the centre of defence and in midfield.

Mark Came (Defender)

Made an enormous leap from North West Counties League tootball to the professional ranks when he joined Bolton from Winsford United in April, 1964. The central defender, who made his Wanderers League debut in September that same year, has been a regular in the first feam squad ever since

Dave Sutton (Defender)

The tall, blond central defender joined Bolton from Huddersfield Town in the summer of 1985 for a £12,000 fee. He was a member of two promotionwinning teams at Leeds Road after moving from Plymouth where he started his career.

Derek Scott (Defender)

The most versatile player in the Bolton squad. The former England Schoolboy International, who halts from Gateshead, played in almost every position during his 11 seasons with Burnley, making his League debut in the First Division, Joined Bolton in June 1985 for a £20,000 fee. Suffered serious chest injury in the opening game of the season against Swindon.

Mark Winstanley (Defender)

In his first season as a regular member of the Bolton senior squad. The young central defender made his League debut at Bournemouth in March last season.

Julian Darby (Defender)

Can play in defence or midfield, the Bolton-born youngster came onto the scene last season when he made his League debut against Blackpool in March.

Asa Hartford (Midfield)

Capped 50 times by his country, the former Scottish International was considered in the "veteran" stages when he joined Bolton in the summer of 1985 from Norwich, for whom he scoted the winning goal in the Milk Cup Final that year. But he proved his durability by ending the season as Bolton's only ever-present. Still a great influence in midfield, the former West Brom, Manchester City Everion and Nottingham Forest star is the Bolton captain.

Warren Joyce (Midfield)

In his fifth season in the Bolton first team, after making his League debut at Carlisle in the Second Division in April 1983. He won representative honours as a schoolboy at cricket and rugby before turning to a cateer in football. Missed last season's Freight Rover Trophy Final through injury.

Steve Thompson (Midfield)

A talented midfield player with a powerful shot, who is a penalty spot specialist. A Bolton regular for the past three seasons after graduating from the junior ranks of the Club.

Mark Gavin (Midfield)

Phil Neal's first transfer "buy" in April 1986. Wanderers paid Carlisle United a small fee for the speedy former Leeds United winger, who is at home on either flack.

Steve Elliott (Striker)

Bolton paid Walsall £25,000 for the former Nottingham Forest apprentice who has had spells with Preston North End and Buton Town. Came to prominence at Deepdale after a £95,000 transfer. Made his Bolton League debut against Swindon on the opening day of the season.

Tony Caldwell (Striker)

It's been goals galore for the Salford-born striker since he made a sensational switch from non-league football in 1983 when he joined Bolton from local club Horwich RMI. He was a part-time professional when he set a club and Third Division record with five goals in a game against Walsall in September 1983 and has been Bolton's top scorer three seasons in a

George Oghani (Striker)

Another capture from non-league football, he joined Solton from Hyde United in October 1983. Loves to score goals and a sparkling spell towards the end of last season helped Wanderers along the way to their Freight Rover Trophy Final appearance at Wembley. Made his Loague debut at Wimbledon in January 1984.

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

However Phil King settled back into the team after his short return to Torquay United it was almost as if he had never been away!

It was nice to see that Charlie Henry scored a goal for Northampton Town while Mark Gardiner scored for Torquay United in their recent 2-2 draw at home to Scunthorpe United.

Don't forget to keep cheering tonight and help us to complete the double over Bolton, it was at Burnden Park where this season got off to a flying start.


The popular Yorkshireman is the most successful manager in the Town's history having led the club to promotion from the Third Division in the season 1968/69. The same season saw Danny lead Swindon Town to a Wembley success story in the League Cup against mighty Arsenal.

We thought many of our supporters would like to see the feature on Danny and interestingly Danny was actually at the match which we won 2-1.

Days Gone By... DANNY WILLIAMS A Town's Most Successful Son

This extract from 'Millmoor Personalities 1946-86' by David Watson is part of one of 114 huge archives of Rotherham United's leading personnel over the past 40 years and is reproduced by kind permission of the publishers – Rotherham Metropolitan Borough Council. The book is priced at £6.95 in softback and £9.95 in hardback, and is available at local bookshops and Millmoor's Red & White Shop.

Danny Williams started work at Silverwood Colliery when 14 years old and played football for the colliery team and, in 1943 he had trials with Rotherham United. Thus started a one-club playing career which was to last nearly 20 years and culminate in his becoming manager in 1962. He



was a wing-half of immense strength and stamina and started each day's training by running 3 times round the pitch while increasing the speed of each lap and on completing the last had sufficient breath left to immediately start cracking jokes! If with a more fashionable club he would almost certainly have played for England, and but for his manager's honesty would indeed have been an international player. In 1952 he was chosen to represent Wales, but manager Freeman felt obliged to tell the selectors that although qualified in ability he was disqualified by birth and parentage - despite the Celtic connotations to his name. Yet if he had been born 20 years later he might well have represented England, for Joe Mercer who later managed the national team saw the Millers' 2-0 victory at Swansea in February 1954 and said if he could select the England side the first to be chosen would be Danny Williams. He was appointed Manager of the club in July 1962. He fielded essentially attacking teams with wingers and his management seasons was a style of play by a team of young talented men the like of which Millmoor had seen neither before or since, and he remained in post until May 1965. The Williams family then moved to Bournemouth and in the summer he accepted an invitation to manage Swindon Town, just relegated from the second division. Four

years later his efforts brough triple success with the winning of the Anglo-Italian Cup, promotion into Division 2 with the same points as the champions and the great achievement of winning the Football League Cup by beating Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley. He was then appointed manager of Sheffield Wednesday and remained there until December 1975. Soon afterwards he rejoined Swindon Town where he remained for 11 years - first as team manager and then general manager. Three years ago he re-established his home in the Rotherham area and commuted weekly until taking learly retirement in August 1985. Danny Williams still has the happy outlook on life which in his Millmoor years made him such an enjoyable companion, and the same competitive spirit which helped make him an invaluable team-mate. As a player he epitomised everything which was good about Rotherham United; his club record of 459 League games will never be beaten and in all he played for the first team on 620 occasions. As manager he produced one of the most exciting teams Millmoor has ever seen, and with Swindon Town became one of only two men to manage a Third Division side which won a major Cup Final at Wembley stadium. With such accomplishments he is undoubtedly Rotherham's most successful footballing personality.

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

DAVE COOPER

Dave Cooper is in charge of Lottery opeartions at Swindon Town Football CLub. Wiltshire born, Dave, lives at Bradford-on-Avon. "I have been with the club for eight years, come June, previously I was with Trowbridge Town where I was club secretary and also pools promoter". The day he was interviewed Dave was wearing a Cricket Club sweater with the decorative motif visible, "Yes I love cricket and I captain Bath Exiles 2XI, we play our home fixtures at Lansdown and it is a game that I enjoy".

Dave enlarged his views on the summer sport by stating 'Cricket' is the best game to play and although I am 45 years of age and probably the best description I can give of myself is to say that I am a non-playing captain I do enjoy battling in a high position

The Bradford-on-Avon resident is almost a Spring chicken compared to one or two at the club, "There are one or two at the club who are 56 years old". Cricket on the playing front was always a more feasible prospect for him as he felt that he lacked the stamina to succeed at football.

Asked to describe his function within the Commercial Department he replied, "Really, I am Doug Buswell's assistant, in recent times I have been concerned with the Lottery competitions, whereas Doug, is primarily concerned with advertising and sponsorship, so I deal with the Competitions and the 5,000 club. I collect from agents as far afield as Westbury, Stroud and Trowbridge, we have some agents who live further afield than that but we do not collect

from them on a personal basis".

Dave was very reminiscent of the past history of Swindon Town, "When I joined the club Bobby Smith was the manager we reached the League Cup Semi-Final and I well remember how disappointing the season ended. I started supporting the club in the 1950's but it was in the early 1960's that I began to watch every match. Those were the days of Mike Summerbee, Ernie Hunt, Cliff Jackson and Terry Wollen". When he left school Dave entered the world of Accountancy although sport was in his blood at an early age, Finding that I could not play football I used to travel the area watching Bristol City and Rovers and Bath City but Swindon Town then seemed to be the club that were going places.

Reflecting on the Bert Head era at the Club he said "That team played exciting football, several of the players here at that time were potential internationals and I am convinced tha Ernie Hunt never realised his full poten-

Dave however thought that the team Danny Williams built in 1969 was the best Swindon Town team he had seem and gave him

personally the most pleasure.

"I have visited 53 League grounds and seen Swindon Town play on fifty two of them". Dave had no hesitation in stating that SWINDON TOWN would finish as THIRD DIVISION CHAMPIONS this season. "We will overhaul Bournemouth, Middlesbrough and Notts County and finish as champions. I believe in statistics and if you work on the principle of 3 points for a home win and one for an away match we will do it, on that basis we are six points to the good at this stage." Dave is a connoisseur of our national game. secretary of a Youth team at Devizes at the age of sixteen, now a member of a Sunday morning team and a member of the League management committee of the local Sunday league 'Sport is my life and we should all put back what we take out of it, for me it is a pleasure to be involved in football in a full time capacity and even more so when we are crowned champions in May".





This was achieved with no apparent reduction in ability, a lesson perhaps for many of the serious young men of the first division?






