CHESTER F.C. GOALKEEPERS

Tonight we conclude our feature on Chester F.C. goalkeepers with a look at the careers of the two top men who between them played close on 500 League games for the club.

TERRY CARLING was born at Otley in Yorkshire and joined Leeds United from minor soccer side Dawsons in 1956. He played just five games for Leeds before moving to Lincoln in July 1962 and his two season stint at Sincil Bank brought Terry his first taste of regular League soccer and eighty four appearances. Next port of call was Walsall where he made one hundred and one appearances and during season 1965-66 he was an ever-present for The Saddlers. When Chester acquired Terry's services in December 1966 therefore, they obtained a keeper with a fine pedigree and what a shrewd piece of business it turned out to be.

Terry's debut for Chester came on December 10th, 1966 in an away game at Bradford City and the dividends were immediate – a 3-2 Chester victory ended a run of three consecutive defeats! Despite the presence of Dennis Reeves, Terry played in all the remaining games of that season bar four and with Dennis's departure he was firmly installed as first choice for season 1967-68. He played in the first 21 games of that campaign but was then forced to sit out three matches – December must have been a good time of the year for Terry, however, because the team marked his return to action with a 6-0 thrashing of Lincoln which was their first victory for six games.

After missing just those three games in 1967-68, Terry went even closer to that "ever present" position in 1968-69—he missed just one game, against Lincoln on April 23rd and thus ended a run of 65 consecutive League appearances. The following campaign finally saw Terry play in every League match, along with Mike Sutton and he was still number one choice as season 1970-71 got underway. Terry was a keeper rarely troubled by injury but damage to his ankle ligaments forced him to sit out the match at Peterborough on October 31st ending another fine run of 63 consecutive appearances.

By the end of that campaign the team had just missed out on promotion, finishing in fifth place just one point behind York. Just 18 players had been used and Terry was again one of the team's most consistent performers, however, he'd decided that the time had come to hang his gloves up thus ending an association with the club which had lasted for just over four seasons and which had brought Terry within two games of the 200 mark. During his time with the club, he missed just thirteen League games and so it was a fitting reward that he should become one of the few Chester players to have a testimonial game arranged for him - on May 7th, 1971, a crowd of 1,664 saw Chester beat Wrexham 10-6. The score was 2-1 to Wrexham after an hour but a shrewd tactical move saw Alan Tarbuck go between the sticks and Terry play out, scoring two goals in the process.

Finally no mention of Terry Carling's career at Chester would be complete without reference to one particular game, probably his finest for the club. On February 28th, 1970 in an away game against high flying Chesterfield, Chester scored with virtually their only attack of the game and then Terry defied the Chesterfield forwards almost single handedly earning himself a maximum rating in one Sunday newspaper and collecting himself a fortune in coins thrown at him by the Chesterfield fans!



And so to the man who finished top of the list, the man who by making his debut against Lincoln on April 23rd, 1969 prevented Terry Carling from being an ever-present that season, **GRENVILLE MILLINGTON**. Gren had joined the club as an amateur at the start of that season and was a regular performer in the Cheshire League side before his debut. That one game, however, proved to be his only senior appearance during his first stint at the club as he was

released at the end of the following campaign. He moved into non-League circles by joining Rhyl, but far from it being a move that ended his League career, it was one which was to eventually boost it. During his first spell with the Welsh side, Gren was the star as they reached the third round of the F.A. Cup and then the following season he was an ever-present as Rhyl pulled off their third Cheshire League title win, the first time they'd finished as Champions for 21 years. Gren then joined Witton Albion under the management of former Chester star Mike Metcalfe and was adding to his Welsh amateur caps and generally turning in the performances which were attracting the League club scouts. Gren was called into the Great Britain Olympic squad preparing for the Munich games and then when Gordon Banks suffered his horrific car accident, he was given trials at Stoke City and then also at Bury. A tour to Japan and Korea with a team of amateurs known as Middlesex Wanderers followed and then another trial period, this time with Brighton. That trial again ended in disappointment and so Gren had decided to thrown in his lot with Rhyl again and posted off his forms only for Ken Roberts to intervene and give him a second chance at Sealand Road and what a move it proved to be for both club and player.

Gren played his second game for Chester at Brentford in November, 1973, some 3½ years after his first and quickly made his point as he kept six clean sheets in his first ten games and he went on to play 23 games in all that season. His name is forever written in the history of Chester F.C., however, for his heroics of the following season when our incredible League Cup run took us within sight of Wembley and Gren rightly finished that momentous season as an ever-present. Injury forced him to miss the game at Brighton on September 13th, 1975, bringing to an end a run of 60 consecutive League appearances but he soon bounced back with a run of 53 consecutive games which ended after a 5-0 defeat at Tranmere on September 30th,

1977

Until then Gren had had no real rival for his jersey but the arrival of Brian Lloyd brought fierce competition for the spot and over the next two seasons Gren played just 15 games. By the time season 1979-80 had progressed, however, in true Millington style, Gren had started to win the battle and that season he played in 30 League games. He'd played in the final 6 games of that season and followed that by not missing a game in season 1980-81, he played in the first 26 games of season 1981-82 making a total of 78 consecutive League appearances. By this time Phil Harrington was coming through the ranks and Gren was suffering more and more with injuries, he'd decided to become a part-time player whilst setting up in business and then even had a spell as the club's Promotion's Manager! Despite his part-time status, Gren started season 1982-83 as first choice keeper but then an arm injury suffered against Mansfield in October and the arrival of John Sainty as manager virtually brought an end to his Chester career. He was released by the club in December but returned to help the club out of a crisis for the final game of the season, against Scunthorpe. That really was to be his final game for Chester and so an association that had started some 15 years earlier finally ended with Gren just 9 games short of 300 League appearances. Incidentally, he clocked up the 300 in total by making a handful of appearances for Wrexham during the following season.

Not only do those statistics show that Gren is the keeper with the most appearances for the club but they are also a tribute to his consistency in that neither the average number of goals conceded nor clean sheets kept can be bettered by any Chester keeper other than Frank Adams, but he only played 8 games anyway!



WHISTLER'S VIEW

One of the most irritating aspects of our game as far as spectators are concerned is time wasting by players. As far as the referee is concerned, it is one of the most difficult things to detect.

Law 5 tells referees that they must add on all time lost through injury or "other cause". If however the referee added on a few seconds each time the ball went out of play or a player delayed taking a free-kick or throw-in, the game would last probably over two hours!

The official in charge does of course have to use discretion when adding on "stoppage time" and you will see that during the game the referee does speak to the players in an attempt to get them to

get the ball into play quickly.

Referees must always be alert to blatant time wasting. This is most often done by players faking injury. It is of course very difficult to identify this and as we all know a player who is seriously injured needs urgent attention and any delay could be of vital importance.

So as we can see time wasting is probably quite an easy "tactic" for players to employ but it is a

very difficult one for referees to identify and punish.



Tonight's meeting with "The Robins" from Swindon is the twenty-fourth in the Football League and a win for ourselves would level the score at ten victories each. Games between our two clubs have always been tight and though only four have actually ended all square, no fewer than twelve of the remaining nineteen fixtures have been decided by a single goal either way and generally have gone in favour of the home team. Having made that last comment, however, Swindon recorded the double against us last season, a feat they also achieved in season 1983–4 whilst we won both games back in season 1980–81.

Our two teams have also met on three occasions in cup football – a fourth round F.A. Cup meeting in season 1969–70 ended 4–2 in Swindon's favour whilst a two legged second round League Cup match also went in "The Robbins" favour, 2–1 the aggregate score in that one.

Back in September our clash at The County Ground ended all square at 1-1, Graham Barrow scored his first League goal for Chester and Steve White equalised. That left our record against Swindon standing at:

Just four players have appeared for both clubs in post-War soccer: Ray Betteridge, Ken Brandon, John Thomas (not *The JT!*) and Paul Richardson.

Manager Lou Macari has assembled a very experienced squad of players as Swindon push for a second successive promotion but goalkeeper FRASER DIGBY is only just beginning his League career. Born in Sheffield, Fraser served his apprenticeship with Manchester United gaining England Youth International honours in the process. He had loan spells with both Swindon and Oldham last season but only made his Football League debut this season after his move to The County Ground became permanent. Despite his lack of League games Frazer has already appeared in the England Under 21 squad. Fraser's understudy is youngster ALAN CHURCHWARD who still awaits his League debut.

* * *

Club Captain COLIN CALDERWOOD was last season's 'Player of the Year' despite it only being his first season with the club. A Scot, he joined Mansfield from Scottish amateur soccer in 1981 and made exactly 100 League appearances for "The Stags". He was an everpresent for Swindon last season. DAVID HOCKADAY switched from midfield to defence last season, his third with the club. David began his career with Blackpool in 1975 and had eight seasons with them playing 147 League games. His 37 appearances last season took his Swindon total to 95. CHRIS RAMSEY was on Bristol City's books as a youngster but earned his League debut in 1980 after joining Brighton. Chris spent four seasons at The Goldstone Ground but made just 30 League appearances though he did appear in the 1983 Cup Final against Manchester United - unfortunately he was injured in the original game. He joined Swindon in December 1984 and them missed just 3 games last season taking his clubs total in the League to 75. ANDY ROWLAND is the club's longest serving professional as he enters his ninth season,

though these days he tends to concentrate on his coaching rather than playing duties. Most of his career with Swindon and Bury has been spent as a striker during which time he's played 461 League games and scored 138 goals. The new additions to the defensive ranks this season are TIM PARKIN and PHIL KING. Tim served his apprenticeship at Blackburn but played just 13 League games in four years before moving to Sweden in 1980. After playing for Malmo he returned to this country in 1981 and made his debut for Bristol Rovers against Chester on the opening day of season 1981-2 - that was the first of 206 League games for "The Pirates". Phil was signed recently from Torquay. He served his apprenticeship at Exeter and played 27 games for them before joining Torquay at the start of this season.

Midfield man CHRIS KAMARA is in his twelfth season as a pro. His first club was Portsmouth for whom he played 63 times in two seasons before joining Swindon in 1977. After 147 games and 21 goals he returned to Pompey but then after just 11 more games he joined Brentford. 152 more League games were added to his record before he rejoined Swindon last season and played 20 more. LEIGH BARNARD is another ex-Portsmouth man. Leigh joined Swindon in 1982 after 79 games in five seasons at Fratton Park. He was an everpresent in his first season with "The Robins" and at the end of last season his total for the club stood at 152. Leigh has also had loan spells with Peterborough and Exeter. PETER COYNE has been in and out of League football since making his debut for Manchester United back in 1975. Peter was released by United after playing just 2 League games but after a spell in non-League soccer Crewe gave him another chance and he scored 47 goals in 134 games fot "The Alex". Lou Macari signed him from Hyde United in 1984 and over the past two seasons his faith has been repaid with 25 goals from 76 games. MARK JONES joined "The Robins" on loan in September and made his debut against ourselves. The former Oxford man has now made the move permanent bringing with him seven years and 129 League games experience gained with "The O's". MARTIN LING and ALAN McLOUGHLIN are also newcomers this season. 20 year old Martin played 116 games for his previous club Exeter whilst Alan is another

former Manchester United youngster. CHARLIE HENRY made his Swindon debut in 1980 after coming through the ranks and had played 176 League games by the end of last season. Charlie was last season's leading scorer with 18 League goals – he'd only scored 3 previously – but this season he's lost his place and has had recent loan spells at Torquay and Northampton. JAMIE REYNOLDS is another local discovery – he made his League debut against Crewe in March 1984 but didn't add to that last season.

* * * Competition for forward places is also fierce. DAVE BAMBER began his career with Blackpool in 1979 and scored 29 goals in 86 games before Coventry acquired his services. After just 3 goals in 19 games he moved on to Walsall (7 goals in 20 games) and Portsmouth (1 goal in 4) before joining Swindon last season when he scored 9 goals in 23 games. BRYAN WADE is also in his second season at the club. Bryan was signed from non-League Trowbridge last season and made a successful entry into League soccer with 10 goals in his 34 games. MARK GARDIN-ER has come through the County Gound ranks. He made his debut in April 1984 but despite being a prolific scorer at reserve level had added only 5 more games before this season. Mark scored his first League goal, against Bury, on January 3rd of this year and has recently been on loan to Torquay. Three newcomers complete the squad. JIMMY GILLIGAN and STEVE WHITE were both pre-season signings. Jimmy scored 6 goals in 27 games for Watford and then spent last season with Grimsby where he scored just 4 times in 25 games. He's been in and out of the Swindon team and recently completed a loan spell with Newport. Steve is a very experienced striker having played for ten seasons in the League. He's had two spells with Bristol Rovers where he scored 44 goals in 151 games and has also played for Luton (25 goals in 76 games) and Charlton (12 goals in 29 games). The most recent acquisition is Northern Ireland International JIMMY QUINN. Jimmy is in his second spell with the club - he joined them in 1981 from Oswestry Town and scored 10 goals in 49 games before moving to Blackburn and was re-signed recently after scoring 14 goals in 56 games for the Lancashire club (before this season).





CITY'S TIME TRAVELS

Continuing our series of match details from three significant seasons:

'A STAR IS BORN - the 1979/80 season'

City usually had luck on their side when they visited Millmoor, home of Rotherham United, but the Third Division encounter on April 1st 1980 proved to be the exception. A 2-0 win flattered the Millers but City soon realised it wasn't to be their night. After only ten minutes our side of Lloyd, Jeffries, Walker, Storton, Cottam, Oakes, Sutcliffe, Jones, Rush, Phillips(T) & Phillips(R) were incensed as we had an amazing goal disallowed. The two Phillips were at the centre of the controversy - Trevor scored probably 'the goal of the season' with an overhead kick (which would have been his first in a Chester shirt) but the linesman adjudged Ron who was on the other side of the box and quite near the touchline to be offside. Incredibly F.I.F.A. referee John Hunting agreed with his linesman and the goal was disallowed, to the relief of the 4,631 crowd. Alan Oakes echoed the thoughts of all City fans when he said it was impossible for Ron to be interfering with play. Eight minutes later Trevor Storton stretched to intercept a through ball and tore a hamstring and was replaced by Keith Fear.

The first Millers goal came from the penalty spot when Jim Walker it appeared accidentally handled a spinning ball. Gerry Forrest (now Southampton) sent Brian Lloyd the wrong way. 40 seconds after the break a cross from the left was flicked on by Vic Halom to Steve Winn who volleyed into the corner. To complete our night of misery we hit the woodwork twice in the last quarter of an hour, first with an Ian Rush header on 78 minutes, then a piledriver from Keith Fear!

'NEW HORIZONS - the 1975/76 season'

When Halifax town came to 'The Stadium' on April 7th City sought revenge for the 5–2 reverse suffered at The Shay earlier in the season. Although both sides were still fighting against relegation City's mid table position was much healthier – Town were now 20th. The Shaymen intent on defence would not surrender easily and although they had few positive attacking ideas Chester almost handed them the lead when Dunleavy and Millington confused each other and nearly scored an own goal. This gave Halifax encouragement and after 26 minutes play Millington missed


David Pugh's corner and Overton netted. The City side of Millington, Edwards, Loska, Storton, Dunleavy, Draper, Whitehead, Pugh, Owen, Mason & Redfern now had all to do but were still one down at the break. Norman Whitehead had started a league game for the first time since October 4th.

The match turned in a six minute spell, during which Town's George Jones was carried off. Trevor Storton ran through the middle as Halifax stood expecting offside, drew keeper Smith and picked his spot. Bob Delgado replaced Stuart Mason and went straight up front. Halifax were now under intense pressure as the 3,369 fans encouraged City to get the winner. Twice Delgado went close – a shot blocked and a header cleared off the line. On 83 minutes Drapers precise through ball allowed Jim Redfearn to cooly net for a 2–1 victory.

'THE GOALDEN SEASON - 1964/65'

Coincidentally twenty two years ago we travelled to Yorkshire to play at Halifax in a Fourth Division game and there would surely have been a much bigger gate than only 1,754 had the public been able to foresee the happenings. This was a case of City getting home in the end although down at half time and yet another exciting game involving our side of Reeves, Jones(R), Starkey, Evans(G), Butler, Durie, Humes, Metcalf, Talbot, Ryden & Morris. (George Evans was in for Peter Hauser who had pulled a thigh muscle). The only first half goal was on 37 minutes from Town's Westlake.

Just after half time Hugh Ryden equalised when home keeper Peter Downsborough made a hash of a cross. Three minutes later Hugh had his second, disposessing Taylor, taking the shortest route to goal and skilfully placing his shot well out of Downsborough's reach. On 63 minutes the game looked over when Mike Metcalf City's best forward cleverly set up Elfed Morris for the third. Halifax then showed their fighting qualities to get back level only two minutes later! First Fidler scored followed by Westlake's second – a header well out of Reeves reach. There had been 5 goals in 20 minutes but for a while both defences regained their composure. We had the final word though on 85 minutes when Jim Humes header sealed it at 4–3. City's last 5 games had now produced no less than 34 goals!
