VIEWPOINT



The government is often accused of creating a North-South "divide."

That may or may not, be true, but looking at the plans recently announced by the Football League to celebrate their centenary, one wonders whether they are perhaps set fair to create a little 'divide' of their own.

The events, to which all football fans are invited, are certainly attractive enough and include a great Centenary dinner, a game between a Football League XI and the Rest of the World, a Centenary gala concert, a Festival pop concert, a Six-a-side competition, a Fun-run and a challenge match between English and Scottish League champions. This all sounds superb and very exciting, BUT, apart from the Fun-run which will cover the whole country and the challenge match which will take place at a Northern venue as yet unknown, ALL the events are scheduled to take place in . . . Yes! you've guessed it, LONDON.

Bearing in mind the great expense and inconvenience of travelling to the big city from many Northern areas, I should think that a great many dedicated soccer fans will not be taking advantage of the Football League's generous invitation.

Now why couldn't the events have been equally split between venues in the North and South?

We do have some very splendid football stadia and concert halls North of the 'great divide'. The world does not end at Watford.

We have had occasion to list the twelve founding clubs of the Football League more than once in this column. Just to refresh your memory they are: PRESTON, ASTON VILLA, WOLVES, BLACKBURN, BOLTON WANDERERS, WEST BROMWICH ALBION, ACCRINGTON STANLEY, EVERTON, BURNLEY, DERBY COUNTY, NOTTS COUNTY, STOKE. (Not one London club).

These are the clubs which saw the League through it's early formative years and with the exception of Accrington, are members still today. Followers of our national game do not need reminding of the glorious history and traditions associated with these clubs, or of their pioneering spirit.

None of these clubs are in the London area, and although we now have many great Southern clubs, they certainly do not outnumber the great Northern clubs and Midland clubs. And it is interesting to reflect that Arsenal for instance, were formed originally through the enthusiasm of a number of young men principally from the Midlands and the North who were employed at Royal Arsenal at Woolwich, and were keen to introduce the sport to the area.

There is little doubt that organised professional soccer spread from the North and Midlands, Southwards rather than the reverse.

Wouldn't it be fairer to supporters in all areas who may wish to share in the great celebration of 100 years of League football, to move the venues for ALL the events nearer to the centre of the country. Or alternatively, split them between say Liverpool (or Sheffield) and London.

However you think it could be reorganised, it certainly seems out of court for virtually all the celebrations to take place in London.

ON THE BRUNTON BEAT



High flying Swindon Town are our visitors today and we welcome them and their travelling supporters to Brunton Park.

After an indifferent start to the season, the "Robins" have played with a great deal of consistency, and have been amongst the front runners for promotion for some months.

The club was founded in 1881 by the Rev. W. Pitt and played as amateurs until 1894 when professionalism was adopted. Swindon were one of the original members of the Southern League in which they competed from 1894 until season 1920/21 when they were admitted to the newly formed Third Division of the Football League. They moved from the Croft to their present home, the County Ground, in 1896.

Judging from United's activities on the "fixit" front in recent times, Jimmy Savile is in danger of being toppled from his throne!

When a friend of the family of young United supporter, 14 year-old Jonathan Snowling, wrote in and asked if we could "fixit" for Jonathan (who is blind) to achieve his ambition of sitting with the manager and the "sub" on the bench at one of United's home matches, and listening to a broadcast commentary through headphones, no time was lost by United officials in making his dream come true.

The Easter Monday match with Middlesbrough was the occasion chosen for Jonathan's great day, and as well as a seat in the "dug-out" during the match, he got the full VIP treatment, met manager Harry Gregg and all the players, received match programmes autographed by both teams, and was right royally entertained in the executive lounge.

We couldn't do anything about the radio broadcast mind you, but did the next best thing by seating one of our young apprentice players beside Jonathan to relay all the action to him. And a superb job he made of it too, as well as acting as "minder" for Jonathan throughout the afternoon.

A happy and delighted youngster's reaction was summed up in one breathless sentence. "Fantastic, I want to thank everyone who made this wonderful day possible for me".

It was a great privilege and a pleasure to have the opportunity of bringing some light into the life of a handicapped child.

And of course, there were the two young ladies, Susan Armstrong and Nichola Sharpley, who had an ambition to meet all the players of their favourite team, Carlisle United. Unknown to the girls, the mother of one of them had asked the Carlisle South Rotary Club who were organising a "grant a wish week", to try and "fix it" for Susan and Nichola to meet the players. We were pleased to oblige, and the girls couldn't have had a bigger surprise or a nicer Easter present, than suddenly finding themselves meeting and chatting with their heroes on Easter Monday at the Middlesbrough match. We have received a letter of thanks from Susan and Nichola — "Thank you all for making Monday such a memorable day. It was a lovely surprise as we knew nothing at all about it. A special thank you to Mr. Bingley, Mr. Gregg and the players who gave us their time on such a busy day. Good luck for the remainder of the season." Glad you enjoyed it girls.

MEMORY LANE A look back at season 1932-33



In 1933, the players were numbered for the first time in a Cup Final. The numbering was rather different from nowadays, 1-11 for Everton and 12-22 for Manchester City.

Everton ran out easy winners with a 3-0 scoreline, thus completing a notable 'hat-trick' of winning the Second Division, the First Division and the Cup in successive seasons.

Mighty Arsenal took the First Division championship in 1933, finishing four points clear of runners-up Aston Villa.

The Scottish First Division champions were Rangers who reversed the previous seasons placings with Motherwell, and the Scottish F.A. Cup went to Celtic who defeated Motherwell 1-0 in the final at Hampden Park.

The F.A. Amateur Cup was lifted by Kingstonians who defeated Stockton 4-1 at Darlington after a 1-1 drawn game at Dulwich.

The leading league goal scorers in the season under review, were Jack Bowers of Derby County in the English First Division with 35 to his credit, and Ted Harper of Preston N.E. with 37 in the Second Division.

Willie McFadyen of Motherwell led the way with 45 that counted, in the Scottish First Division — Willie's second year running as Scotland's leading goal scorer.

Johnny Arnold's selection for England against Scotland in 1933 admitted the speedy Fulham and Southampton winger to the ranks of double internationals. One of the most exclusive 'clubs' in the world. Arnold had already represented his country at Cricket while playing for Hampshire in the County League.

So much for the national scene in season 1932-33. But what of the domestic scene? Great changes were in progress at Brunton Park. Following the departure of Manager Billy Hampson for Leeds at the end of the previous season, there was a dramatic clear-out of established players during the summer months. Among them such well known names as McConnell (the club's leading goal scorer), Hutchison, Watson, Armes and Sharp.

This provided funds for the signing of 14 new arrivals at nominal fees and some relief from financial problems. Off with the old, and on with new, seemed to be the theme.

Sadly, after a bright start to the new season with five points from the opening three games, United fell away badly, finishing in 19th spot with only 33 points from 42 games in the Third Division (North). This was one position worse than the previous disastrous season, and United narrowly escaped having to apply for re-election to the League.

Our cup dreams for that season also faded early on when we were defeated by Hull in the second round of the competition.

Returning to the national scene, the Home Internationals competition was won by Wales for only the fifth time since the inception of the competition in 1884.

And Newcastle United half-back Sam Weaver was gaining fame for his long throw-ins (which I personally have never seen equalled by his imitators). Surprise packet indeed for defences not yet familiar with the dark haired lad's cunning. And mighty troublesome, even when they were!

3RD DIVISION SCENE



Swindon Town, who come to Brunton Park this afternoon, are still hoping to win the second guaranteed promotion place but it is beginning to look as if Middlesbrough will join Bournemouth in the Second Division next season. Swindon will, obviously, still stand an excellent chance of going up if they figure in the play-offs for they are recognised as one of the best teams in the division.

But, whereas Swindon have been dropping some valuable points — particularly when being held at home by lowly Doncaster last weekend — Middlesbrough have been powering away. Their 2-0 home win over Brentford last Saturday was their fourth victory in a row and their eighth game without defeat. Manager Bruce Rioch can certainly feel very pleased at what he has achieved in little more than a year at Ayresome Park.

Middlesbrough, relegated from Division Two at the end of last season, now look likely to make a quick return.

Meanwhile, celebrations are expected to take place at Dean Court this afternoon. An all-ticket crowd of around 13,000 is expected for the visit of Port Vale. Depending upon what has happened in mid-week, Bournemouth could make absolutely sure of promotion by beating Vale.

Bournemouth have been members of the Football League since 1923 but have never before risen above Third Division level. And this will be the first time they have won a divisional championship. For manager Harry Redknapp, promotion has come as the culmination of a lot of hard work.

"Most of our supporters had felt it was impossible for the club ever to reach the Second Division so it is lovely to feel we have been able to give them this success," said Mr. Redknapp.

"Some people even felt the club didn't want to move forward and that certain people in the town didn't like the idea of the larger crowds we expect in the Second Division. But I can assure you that my chairman is very ambitious for the club to progress.

"He has certainly given me the feeling of security and this has helped enormously. I must be one of the most secure managers in the League because I have a three-year roll-on contract. That means I have three years with the club today and from tomorrow, and so on.

"In return I have worked hard for this success. Now that we are at last in the Second Division I feel there is no reason why the club should not go even further. I'd certainly like to be a part of any future success.

"It is a smashing little club and I see no reason why we should not do well in the Second Division."

Wigan Athletic, with only two defeats in 24 League matches prior to the holiday, have certainly been playing well enough to go into the play-offs with confidence. That's if they don't manage to pip Middlesbrough for second place.

Newport County were doomed at least to figure in the play-offs at the bottom of the table before the holiday programme commenced. It is more likely that they will finish in one of the three certain relegation spots. With Swansea City now unlikely to win promotion from Division Four, this will mean that all four of the League clubs in Wales will be playing together in the Fourth Division next season.

This is at a time when the F.A. of Wales is trying to make out a case to have a UEFA Cup place awarded to one of its clubs each season. UEFA has refused to admit the Champions of the Welsh League into the European Cup as their major clubs play in the Football League.

Though the winners of the Welsh Cup gain entry to the European Cup-Winners' Cup, Wales has no other representative in the European competitions. The idea was once put forward that the four Football League clubs could play off in a mini-league with the winners being declared Champions of Wales. But this idea was quickly rejected by UEFA.

SWINDON TOWN



Swindon's exhilarating late run has put them in line for promotion for the second successive season. Even if they do not make the two guaranteed promotion places, they must stand a good chance if they are involved in the play-offs.

Last season Swindon smashed all League records when collecting 102 points as they won the Fourth Division Championship.

The return of N. Ireland international striker Jimmy Quinn in December added more punch to the Swindon attack. He had scored nine times by last weekend and was giving good support up front to Dave Bamber and Steve White.

Bamber, who had scored 19 times by last weekend, was signed from Portsmouth last season when he scored nine times for the Robins. Blackpool gave him his chance in League football in 1980 and he was top scorer in his last two seasons at Bloomfield Road before moving on to Coventry in 1983. He spent only part of a season at Highfield Road and then signed for Walsall. Portsmouth signed him for £20,000 in 1985.

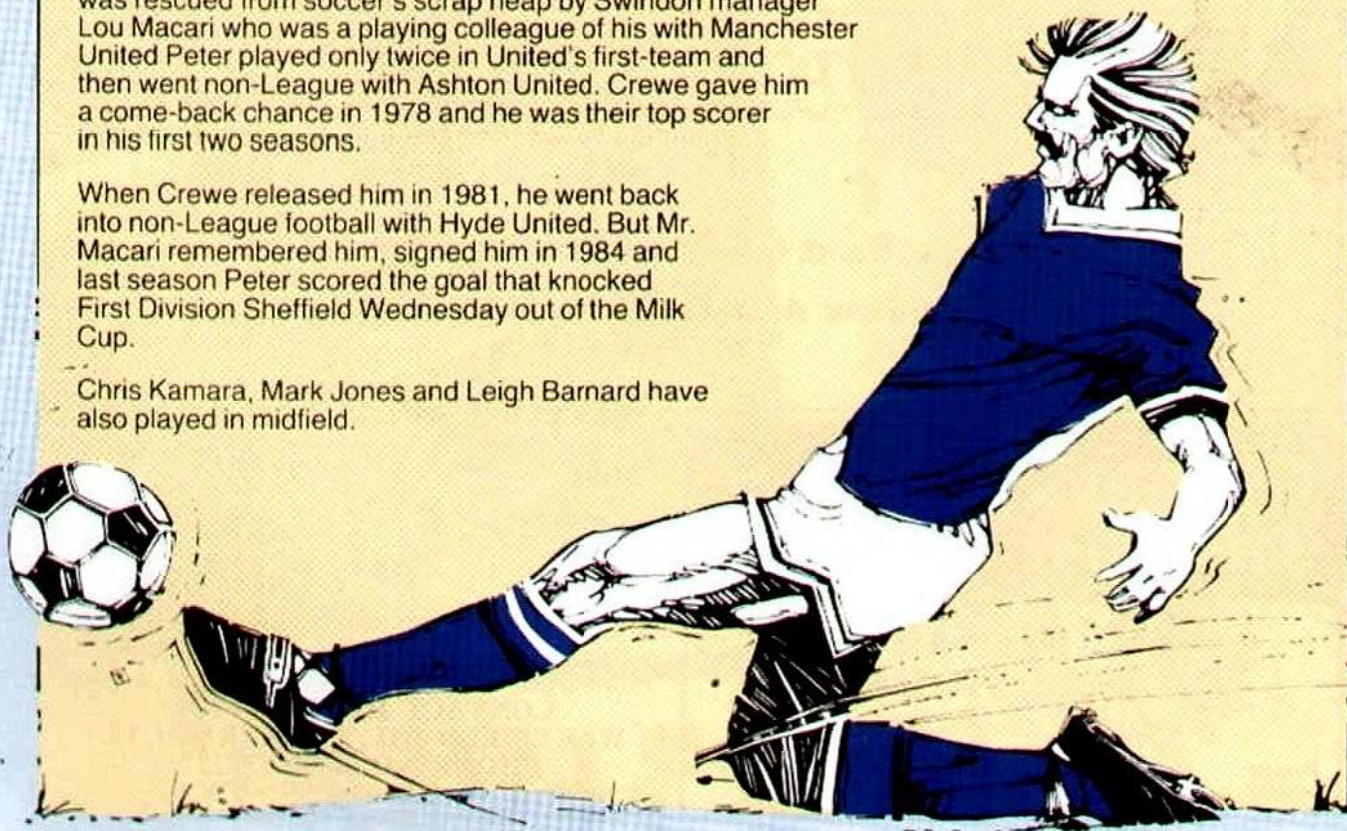
White was signed from Bristol Rovers last summer. He began his career at Eastville, first making their League eleven in 1978. Steve scored consistently and thus attracted a big-money offer from Luton Town where he served for just over two years. Charlton invested £80,000 in his transfer in 1982 but he remained at The Valley for only one season before returning to Bristol Rovers in a £45,000 deal.

Bryan Wade has also played in attack. He made a quick impression after joining Swindon from Trowbridge Town last season. He contributed 12 goals as the Robins raced to the Fourth Division Championship.

Peter Coyne has appeared both in midfield and attack. Peter was rescued from soccer's scrap heap by Swindon manager Lou Macari who was a playing colleague of his with Manchester United. Peter played only twice in United's first-team and then went non-League with Ashton United. Crewe gave him a come-back chance in 1978 and he was their top scorer in his first two seasons.

When Crewe released him in 1981, he went back into non-League football with Hyde United. But Mr. Macari remembered him, signed him in 1984 and last season Peter scored the goal that knocked First Division Sheffield Wednesday out of the Milk Cup.

Chris Kamara, Mark Jones and Leigh Barnard have also played in midfield.



Kamara returned for his second spell with the club at the beginning of last season. He took his bow in League soccer with Portsmouth in 1975 and first joined Swindon in 1977. He returned to Portsmouth four years later but stayed for only a few weeks before transferring to Brentford where he remained until his latest move.

Jones was signed from Oxford United in September. A one-time Oxford apprentice, he made his League debut in 1980 and completed some 150 senior games for the club.

Barnard made his name with Portsmouth in the late 'seventies and it was after a loan spell with Peterborough that he signed for Swindon in 1982. He completed 150 League appearances for the Robins last season. Two seasons ago he served Exeter for a short loan period.

Colin Calderwood and Tim Parkin usually play in the middle of the defence.

Calderwood developed in the junior sides at Mansfield and made his League debut in 1982. He made exactly 100 appearances in the Stags' League eleven before transferring to Swindon for £27,500 in 1985.

Parkin, signed from Bristol Rovers last summer, first played in the League with Blackburn Rovers in 1977. He left Ewood Park in 1980 to join Swedish club Malmoe. Bristol Rovers signed him in 1981, he went straight into their senior team and made more than 200 League appearances before he left.

David Hockaday and Phil King are the full-backs.

Hockaday entered League soccer with Blackpool in 1976/77 and went on to make more than 150 first-team appearances for the Tangerines. Since joining Swindon in 1983, he has been a fixture in their successful senior side. Normally a forward or midfield player, David has been playing in defence this season.

King took his League bow with Exeter in 1984/85 but moved on to Torquay last summer. Swindon signed him in February. Chris Ramsey has played both in defence and midfield. He was a reserve player with Bristol City and it was with Brighton that he made his League debut during 1980/81. He made 30 League appearances for the Seagulls before transferring to Swindon two seasons ago.

Goalkeeper Fraser Digby initially joined Swindon on loan from Manchester United at the start of the season but, after making his League debut in September, a string of outstanding performances persuaded Mr. Macari to complete the transfer.

Swindon have won away League games at Bolton (2-1), Fulham (2-0), Port Vale (4-3), Bury (2-1), Gillingham (3-1), Rotherham (2-1), York (3-0), Ghesterfield (3-1) and Bristol Rovers (4-3).

They drew at Newport (2-2), Mansfield (0-0), Doncaster (2-2), Blackpool (1-1) and Brentford (1-1).

The Robins were beaten at Middlesbrough (0-1), Walsall (0-1), Bournemouth (0-1), Wigan (2-3) and Chester (0-2).

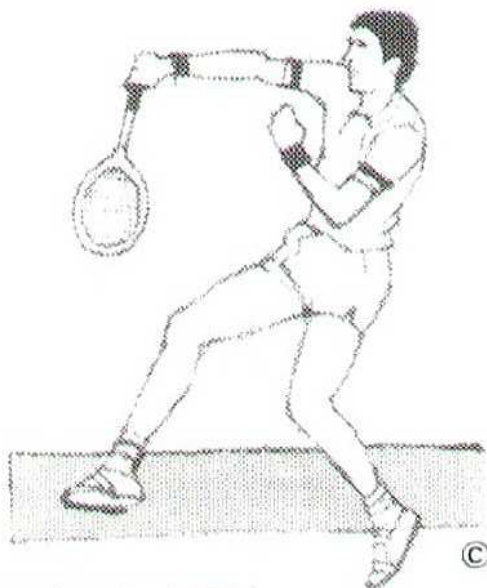
