

To Lowndes Lambert girls who stand in all winds and weathers selling the magazine to the supporters who purchase the magazine.



This afternoon I would like to make this strong appeal to you all, please get behind the lads throughout the match.

I felt at our recent match here at the County Ground against Darlington that the tension apparent in the County Ground was transmitted onto the pitch.

Performances at this stage of the season are secondary compared to the final result and I think you must be made aware of how difficult the surface here at the County Ground has been for the players.

A rutted suface and bone hard grounds, are the scourge of English football at this stage of the season. Our pitch at the County Ground since I have been at this club appears to have less grass than the majority of league grounds. Can you recall how concerned I was when I first arrived here from Manchester United? In fact we were concerned whether we would have a pitch to start the season and actually had to postpone our pre-season matches.


The referee who officiated our recent match with A.F.C. Bournemouth reported the condition of the ground to the football League. I found this a strange observation for if the ground was fit to play the match, why report the fact? Surely you need only to make a report if the ground is unfit.

The ground leaves a lot to be desired and there have been several matches where the players have felt that they have been handicapped by its irregular bounce and surface. The summer months will be very important to see if we can improve the surface ready for next season.

These are not excuses for my players but purely facts and we would appeal to you all to please get behind us, we are all in this game together and yet I have felt in recent matches that the only response the players have been receiving is when they actually score. They need every help before that statistic. So PLEASE RESPOND, DO WE WANT SECOND DIVISION FOOTBALL AT THE COUNTY GROUND? OF COURSE WE DO, BUT WE ALL HAVE TO PULL TOGETHER. We have had a fantastic two season and the players deserve your full support.

The match against Darlington was not a classic but we keep going to the final whistle and that in itself earnt the lads a deserved reward.

Every team finds the end of the season matches more difficult, pitches are



invariably hard and unlike the Brazilians and the rest of the South Americans we find difficulty in controlling the ball in these circumstances. If you believe that it only applys to matches at the County Ground then I suggest you take a trip to any match in the Third Division and the fare you will see is less exciting with the same problem with ball control.

With our match against Gillingham today being played on a Bank Holiday and the needs of the printers due to holiday not allowing me to comment on our matches of last week I can only hope that we have managed to take maximum points from our visits to Notts County and Carlisle United. Obviously a repeat of the score of our match at Gillingham would be ideal but at the time of writing these notes Keith Peacock's team were in urgent need of points to secure a place in the play offs and there is no reason to believe that this will not apply for this afternoons match also.

Don't forget we have Walsall as our visitors on Wednesday evening, they are always an attractive and skilful team to

watch and this season they attracted a lot of attention with their performances in FA Cup matches with Watford. Do you remember that fantastic 4-4 draw at Vicarage Road? It should be a match worth seeing, so come along and get right behind Swindon Town the players deserve your whole hearted support for their efforts this season. We at least look set for the play offs even if we don't take second position these last three games will be vital for both causes.

Gillingham's unbeaten home record and confident second position were both shattered by a fine Swindon performance on December 27th.

The Priestfield ground was swamped by nearly 10,000 fans, Gillingham's biggest gate of the season, causing the start to be delayed by 15 minutes. Once the match did begin, the "Gills" must have hoped that it hadn't, as Swindon took early control and never really looked back.

The "Town" took the lead in only the ninth minute, Peter Coyne beating Hillyard with a shot from a Jimmy Ouinn cross.

Missed chances by the home side kept Swindon in the game, with Elsey missing a particularly good shooting opportunity from only ten yards.

A dubious free kick given against David Hockaday, brought Gillingham level as Colin Greenall headed Graham Pearce's cross into the net.

Despite that set back, Swindon came out for the second half still believing that the points were there, only four minutes into the second half Peter Coyne went on the run that clinched the victory.

Tantalising the defence on a run that took him to the edge of the six yard box, Coyne was inveitably pulled down, to give the "Town" a penalty that Mark Jones duly converted.

Another missed chance by Karl Elsey emphasised that it would be neither his nor Gillingham's afternoon.

At the other end, Steve White


nearly put Swindon even further ahead, but after beating Hillyard, shot inches wide.

White was not to be denied though, as Swindon did indeed add a third. A through ball from Alan McLoughlin was met by White, whose presecence confused the home defence so much that Elsey deflected the ball past Hillyard and into the net, just crossing the line before Jimmy Quinn had chance to add a final Swindon touch to the ball.

Jimmy Gilligan replaced Jimmy Quinn right on the final whistle, but by then Swindon had pulled off one of the best results of the season and won at Preistfield and for the first time since the war.

Since that match just after Christmas, the positions of the two sides, have changed fairly dramatically, with Swindon moving up to the top three and Gillingham slipping to fifth. That change in fortunes makes todays game an even more enthralling encounter, as Swindon try to get into second spot and the "Gills" try to consolidate their position as play off contenders.

Gillingham have never sampled life above the Third Division but in the last three seasons have made a bold challenge to rectify that situation.

And should they reach Division 2 this year - it will be a case of third time

lucky.

In both the 1984/85 and 1985/86 seasons they were up with the leaders from the outset only to fade in the closing stages finally finishing fourth and fifth respectively. This term they have led the division, but since Christmas have stuttered slightly.

However, at the time these notes were penned they are in with a good chance of reaching the end of season play-offs. Present Manager Keith Peacock took charge in July 1981 and is the longest serving manager in the Third Division. And has been instrumental in bringing the Kent side to the verge of honours.

The Gills were original members of Division 3 in 1920 and a year later Division 3 South.

But in 1938 they failed to gain reelection losing their place to Ipswich and spent the next twelve years mopping up titles in both the Southern and Kent Leagues.

When the Third Division South was extended in 1950 Gillingham were reelected to the League.

Eight years later they became founder members of the fourth. The Gills only Football League Championship was clinched during the 1963-64 season.

In an exciting race they pipped Carlisle to the Fourth title on goal difference with Workington just one point behind in third place, and Exeter one point further back in fourth. Third Division status was lost in 1971 but three years later regained again when the Gills finished as runners-up to Peterborough in the fourth division championship.

Since 1974 they have enjoyed life in the third under just three managers - Len Ashurst, Gerry Summers and Keith Peacock.

Keith Peacock (Manager)

Seceeded Gerry Summers as manager of Cillingham in July 1981 after two years in the United States with Ohio and Tampa Bay Rowdies. The Third Division's longest serving manager.

Keith spent his entire playing career with Charlton, joining them in 1960 and going on to score 107 goals in 591 appearances. In August 1965 he made history by becoming the tirst ever substitute to be used in a football league fixture, when coming on midway through the Second Division game against Bolton

Tony Cascarino (forward)

Tony Cascarino (forward)

Won international acclaim during 1985/86 and became
Gillimpham's most capped player by gaining three full
caps for the Republic of Ireland. A frequent source of
attraction to other clubs, top scorer last with 21 goals.
Joined the Gills in January 1982 from Kent League side
Crockenfull and progressed rapidly.

Karl Elsey (fullback)

Ever present last season after being snapped up on a free transfer from Cardiff City in June 1965. He broke into League football with Q.P.R., joining them from Pembroke Borough in January 1979 He moved on to Newport 18 months later and thence to Cardiff in July

Mel Eves (forward)

Experienced former England B international secured during the close season. He netted 44 goals in 180 league appearances for Wolves and also won a League Cup winners medal in 1980 before transferring to Shelfield United in 1984

Colin Greenall (defender)

A £40,000 purchase from Blackpool in September. Joined the Tangerines from school and broke into the first team at the age of 16. He was capped by England at youth level and figured in 200 senior games for the omfield Road club

Paul Haylock (defender)

Cost Gillingham £25,000 from Norwich City in August A former apprentice at Carrow Road and went on to make nearly 200 appearances for the Canaries. Won a Milk Cup winners' medal in 1985.


Ron Hillyard (goalkeeper)

Evergreen goalkeeper now in his 13th season with the club. He arrived at Priestfield from York City in June 1974 and has been first choice for the green jersey virtually ever since. He was ever present last season and has now featured in over 550 games for Gillingham

Trevor Quow (midfield)

Another of Gillingham's close season acquisitions, bought for £7,000 from Peterborough in August. Joined the Posh as an apprentice, went on to figure in well over 200 Fourth Division games for them

Martin Robinson (forward)

Marin Koninson (forward)

Goalscoring winger - 26 in the last two campaigns secured from Charlton Athletic for a £15,000 fee in
October 1984. A former Tottenham apprentice, he
scored twice in six games for Spurs before moving
across London to the Valley in February 1978. For the
Valiants he registered 70 goals in 250 senior appear-

Dave Shearer (forward)

He was snapped up by Middlesbrough from Highland League club Inverness Clachnacuddin in January 1978 and went on to net 23 goals in 88(9) outings. After a loan spell with Wigan and season 1983/84 at Grimsby he joined the Gills during the summer of 1384.

David Smith (forward)

Another of Gillingham's close season captures, transferring in August from Southern League champions Welling United for £3,000.

Steve Lovell (midfield/forward)

Welsh international capped six times by his country, who became Gillingham's 11th signing in eight months when purchased from Milwall for £20,000 in February. Started his career with Crystal Palace and moved across London to the Den in February 1983.

Irvin Gernon (defender)

Tall defender signed from Upswich for £30,000 in early March this year. A one club man - apart from loan periods with Newcastle and Northampton - he joined Ipswich from school during 1979/80. He was capped by England at under-18 and under-21 levels and gradu-ated through the ranks to figure in 87 games for the Portman Road club

Les Berry (defender)

Ex-long serving Charlton player and son of Gillingham director Dennis Berry who was secured on loan from Brighton shortly before the deadline. He attained full pro status with Athletic in March 1974 on completion of his apprenticeship. He registered almost 400 first team appearances prior to his move to Brighton in the summer of 1986.





been making ourselves a mountain to climb for conceding early goals.

For instance take our last two home matches against Darlington and Doncaster Rovers. We did not concede a goal against Darlington and then managed to snatch a last minute effort. The opposite happened against Doncaster Rovers for we conceded a first half goal and then had to fight an uphill battle to gain a point. It is easy to say we should beat these type of sides but they come to the County Ground fighting for their lives and are equally as determined as ourselves.

Have you thought what would have happened if we had not conceded that early goal against Doncaster Rovers? We would probably have won 1-0 just like we did against Darlington. There is another way of looking at this and that is to say we have always fought back and have not been beaten.

I am well aware that several of our supporters believe that the long ball style we play has not been so effective recently. I would simply answer by saying that we have pumelled sides who rarely get time to clear their own penalty area, that does not give our strikers the chance to use their speed behind our opponents defence. It may not always be particularly attractive to watch but we have been winning games with this style and it has not deterred people from coming back to watch us again. Players cannot adopt to a style that is alien to their nature. Imagine what would happen if Fraser Digby started throwing the ball out to me, I passed back to him he then found 'Rambo' who would pass it square or back. What would your reaction be? You would probably murder us particularly if we were a goal down. The opposition penalty area is the best place for the ball to be, all of the match preferably! We have to play to our strengths and that has been the right way this season.

A lot of you have been asking if anything has gone wrong the last few matches, really there is nothing wrong with the team except that perhaps we all expect other teams to come here like lambs to the slaughter, that simply will not happen particularly with the introduction of the play-off system.

The two teams who automatically gain promotion will have earnt that right and we must all remember this, whether it is Swindon Town or not. For those clubs who partake in the play-offs there is an equal chance for all four clubs. No excuses, it is simply a case of getting on with the job and trying to win the four matches. If we are involved we will stand the same chance as anyone else. Of course with the Bank Holiday looming and printing deadlines to be met it is impossible for me to comment upon any likely outcome. We will have given our best as we have done so all season.

Perhaps todays match will arrive with all to play for and I am sure that will be the situation for Gillingham this afternoon. We have two equally difficult matches left, at home to Walsall and away to Bristol City, so we are going to need all the help we can get.

There is a lot to play for and lets all resolve to make one last determined effort to round off the season in style. We have had some great times again this season.

The crowds have been coming to the County Ground in increasing numbers this season and that must be a tribute to all at the Club. They say winning is the measure for filling grounds if this is so we have had our fair share of victories this season. There may be a few more important victories to come before May is finally finished. Just keep cheering the lads on.


ONE OF THE ALL TIME GREATS'

Last Thursday, April 30, marked the 100th anniversary of the birth of perhaps Swindon Town's most celebrated figure and most-capped England international.

Harold John Fleming was born in Downton, not far from the Hampshire border. He came to Swindon as a boy and, for a time, attended Sanford Street school. When ill-health put paid to his ministerial aspirations, Harold turned his attentions to outdoor pastimes, assisting his church, St Mark's, at both cricket and football. A playing colleague Godfrey Dibsdall, had assisted Swindon Town on a number of occasions, as had his brother Arthur, and it was not long before Harold's skills brought him to the attention of Sam Allen and the Town management.

At the age of twenty, Harold was invited to turn out for Swindon reserves against Salisbury City on October 12, 1907. He immediately impressed with two goals in a 4-0 Town win - and was plunged into the first team on the following Saturday when Swindon entertained Luton. The newcomer did not disappoint. He set up two goals, scored a third and even allowed himself the luxury of missing a penalty as his side cruised to another 4-0 victory. On the following Monday, Harold signed professional forms for the Town, earning the sum of £4 a week. He finished season as the club's top scorer and, when his goal haul increased during the following winter, the England selectors were prompted to inlcude him for the Scotland game at the Crystal Palace on April 3, 1909. During the next five years. Fleming was to represent his country on eleven occasions, scoring nine goals including a hattrick against Ireland in Dublin in February 1912.

Just seven weeks after the Ireland game, personal triumph turned to tragedy when Swindon faced Barnsley in an F A Cup semi-final at Stamford Bridge. Somewhat over-zealous tackling by the Yorkshiremen put paid to the more subtle skills of Swindon's international. Harold went closest of any to scoring, when a header thudded against the Tykes' crossbar, but he was soon to be reduced to a passenger, hobbling bravely on the wing. Without his presence, non-League Swindon did well to hold Second Division Barnsley to a single goal in the replay. Ironically, the winning goal came from defender Phil Bratley, one of the chief offenders in the first game. Harold suffered a severe groin injury and twisted leg muscles that

kept him out of football for ten months, forcing him to watch the Town's summer tour of Argentina and Uruguay from the touchlines

With the outbreak of War in Europe in 1914, many young sportsmen were forced to give up promising careers in football. Harold Fleming was spared from taking part in the hostilities when he went to Cambridge as a physical education instructor in 1915. There, in 1918, he married a Swindon girl, Grace Haskins. Harold celebrated Swindon Town's elevation to Football League status in August 1920 in some style. In the opening game,

Luton Town again suffered the wrath of Fleming. Although now 33, he hit four goals in Swindon's tally of nine and was again the club's top scorer that season. He repeated the feat in 1921/22, for the fifth and final time in a career in which he had steadfastly refused to display his talents on either Good Friday or Christmas Day. By 1923/24, Harold was being used very sparingly and made his farwell appearance against Brighton on April 19. Again he inspired the town to a 4-0 victory, just as he had done seventeen years previously on his debut. And again he contributed a goal.

Mr Fleming was no longer to grace the football field, but kept in touch by demonstrating his skills to school children and running his own sports shop. Sadly, the great man did not live to see Swindon Town's finest hour at Wembley in 1969. He died from cancer in August 1955.



If any Swindon supporters feel they would be interested then could they please contact me on the above address, by the end of April please.




The sickening scenes from a minority of morons at the top of the table clash last month were bad enough to witness, but they have also given rise to ill informed local comment and yet another stick to beat football with. Swindon Town have already announced that troublemakers will be banned for life from the County Ground, this in some "experts" eyes is not enough. The assumption that without football there would be no violence seems to be the key to many people's theories on hooliganism – try telling that to the inhabitants of Weston after a Bank Holiday or Old Town pub landlords on a Saturday night! Hooliganism is basically a

social, not sporting, problem that is looking for somewhere to happen. Football is unfortunately a sport that is followed by those most likely to cause violence in society, the class background and traditions of other sports keeping their violence mainly on the pitch. Though I would agree that the magistrates treatment of offenders has to be tougher, I fail to understand how a membership scheme with a subscription fee would attack hooligans, remember, they are no longer bristle headed Neanderthals, but 'designer' hooligans. Do we see pubs with memberships imposed when trouble occurs or all ticket seaside resorts? The


revenue lost in such a situation, would cause the true desire of those who comment without any regard for fact, or realistic solutions - the financial collapse of the game, not as one local correspondent sarcastically commented, less money in the kitty for a 'new boardroom carpet' or a 'new roof for the stand'. The same correspondent considered sweeping the streets whilst being pointed at the suitable punishment for offenders, emphasising the simplistic attitude with which the problem is often approached.

Frankly I feel that people with no knowledge or concern for the game should stop suggesting the imposition of ludicrous controls on the followers of football and look in more detail at the society that creates the problem in the first place. For too long football has been the unfair recipient of blame for problems that are outside its own limited control.


