



fact which I am sure Gillingham would


testify to.

At long last the conclusion to the 1986/87 season is nigh and we will know our destiny by 9.30pm this evening.

This evening we entertain Gillingham to decide which club will enter Division Two next season. In two highly entertaining matches the Priestfield Park Club were locked in intriuging battle with Sunderland. The demise of the Roker Park Club was complete when despite a 4-3 win against Gillingham in the Second Leg the famous Roker roar was silenced as the famous North Eastern Club head for Division Three for the first time in their history.

The first leg match at Priestfield saw a remarkable Tony Cascarino hat-trick give Gillingham a 3-2 win in a thrilling encounter. Sunderland who attempted to stage a rearguard action played

five men at the back with Frankie Gray utilised in a sweeping role. Gillingham started at a frantic pace and soon had the Sunderland defence looking shaky. Yet it was against the run of play that the Roker Park Club took the lead in the 28th minute. Paul Haylock handled a shot from David Corner and Mark Proctor scored from the penalty spot.

Three minutes into the second half Gillingham striker Tony Cascarino equalised, his shot helped into the net by Sunderland keeper Ian Hesford. The Eire International struck again in the 64th minute to give Gillingham the lead and complete his hattrick. Mark Proctor gave Sunderland hope for the Second Leg when he scored fifteen minutes from the final whistle.

A crowd of 13,804 watched the First Leg match at Gillingham.

The 3-2 scoreline set up an even more exciting prospect for Roker Park on the following Sunday and the 25,470 who made their way to the final swan song of Sunderlands depressing season, more in hope than faith, were to see their worst fears confirmed. Poor defences were to contribute to a seven goal thriller.

A missed penalty by Mark Proctor when Sunderland were leading 2-1 proved vital. Two goals by Eric Gates had given Sunderland false hope after former Town winger Howard Pritchard had given Gillingham an early lead.

Yet it was once again Tony Cascarino who proved a thorn in Sunderlands side with two goals to take his personal tally to five goals from the two matches Goals from Gary Bennett and Keith Bertschin proved to no avail as the Roker Park Club stirved to snatch that vital fifth goal to increse their 4-3 lead. The aggregate 6-6 scoreline saw Gill ingham away goals earn them a place in the play off final.

Sunderland joined the Third Division for the only time in their 108 year history. Amazingly the Sunderland fans saw their team fail to win having led for the 19th time this season. Mark Proctor's miss from the penalty spot was his second penalty in consecutive matches!

Gillingham manager Keith Peacock made an apt statement after the match when he said, 'We were fighting for a place in history, Sunderland were fighting to avoid one'. Keith went onto say "I think we deserved to win over the two games but I am heartbroken for Sunderland as my family are Sunderland supporters.



Telephone The defeat brought an end to a rescue opeartion that backfired for the Roker Park Clubs directors had hoped that Bob Stokoe, the Sunderland hero who brought Cup glory to the Club in the Seventies and returned to the Club only a few weeks previous failed to save the North East team from the drop.

Sunderlands slide had been obvious for a long-time and their ageing stars had neither the legs or the heart for a long season fight.

After their exit from the play-offs Bob Stokoe ruled himself out of the Sunderland managerial stakes by saying, "I've had a chat with the Chairman and made it perfectly clear to him I don't want the job" he continued by adding "It is a sad day in the history of Sunderland but life must go on and the rebuilding job started as soon as possible". Bob Stokoe offered to stay on in some capacity and if necessary assist in the appointment of a new manager.

Bristol Rovers have released several players in their end of season clear out. Wayne Noble, Tarki Micallef and part-timer Gary Smart have been released along with player coach Kenny Hibbitt while recent newcomers Bob Newton and David Rushbury have also been released.

Robbie Cooke of Brentford was named by a Sunday National Newspaper as the Third Divisions most consistent performer, for he headed the poll where marks for each match were awarded out of ten. No Town player was included in the leading thirty players it just proves that we have a team and not individuals.

A mere twenty one days have passed since the Gills last visit to the County Ground, on May Day Bank Holiday. A 1-1 draw seemed at the time to have condemned the Medway side to Third Division football next season, but by holding Bristol City at Ashton Gate the following Saturday, we opened the door to the play offs for Keith Peacocks men.

A crowd of 10287 witnessed Gillingham take an early lead in a match which sealed Swindon's participation in the play offs as Middlesbrough picked up two more points from their game with Mansfield, to open up a five point gap.

Former "Town" winger Howard Prichard capitalised on the home sides end of season early goal sale with a speculative effort that drifted into the top corner after only four minutes.

The goal was met with a stunned silence from the County Ground crowd, but obvious jubilation from the visitors, still smarting from Swindon's 3-1 win at Priestfield during the Christmas period.

Intensive pressure failed to bring the all important equaliser for Swindon, as they closed the half a goal down and very nearly further behind with a Cascarino header cannoning off the bar. Eighteen minutes into the second half, came Swindon's big breakthrough, with memories of 85/6 flooding back as Dave Bamber was sent sprawling in the area by

Paul Haylock. Mark Jones made no mistake with the spot kick, to bring the "Town" level and herald an exhaustive search for the winner. Despite the tireless running of Bryan Wade and the introduction of substitute Steve White, that elusive goal did not materialise. Even a blatant handball by Gills Karl Elsey from a Chris Kamara shot went unpunished as it became clearer and clearer that the result would suit neither sides quest for promotion. Gillingham will probably be hoping for more of the same tonight as they attempt to fulfill their dream of becoming the first club to finish fifth in Division 3 and still gain promotion. Swindon on the other hand will be striving for a performance of the calibre achieved at Priestfield earlier in the seaon when a 3-1 win rekindled the belief that promotion was possible. One fact is certain though, we will soon know if we are to return to the level of football we left thirteen years ago, when Eastoe, Moss and Trollope were the heroes of the "Town" side.

Gillingham reached the Today League Division 3 promotional playoff final following two incredible games agaist Sunderland.

They won the first-leg of the semifinal in front of a partisan 13,804 Preistfield crowd narrowly thanks to a hat-trick from Tony Cascarino.

If that game had drama it was nothing compared to the second lea at Roker Park that drew an attendance of 25,470. Despite taking an early lead through Howard Pritchard the Gills were trailing at half-time to two goals from Eric Gates - and Mark Proctor had also missed a penalty for the North - Easterners. That man Cascarino followed up to net after Colin Greenall's spot kick had been saved but then Gary Bennett added a third for Sunderland just before normal time to send the tie into extra time.

Another goal from Cascarino and one from Sunderland's Keith Bertschin in the additional thirty minutes gave a final scoreline of 4-3 in Sunderland's favour.

But with the scores tied on aggregate 6-6 it was Gillingham who went through to the final against Swindon on the away goals rule.

It is ironic that they should now meet the Wiltshire club with the winners claiming a place in Division 2 next season.

Gillingham's hopes of promotion seemed over for a third successive season. Each time they had been up with the leaders early on only to falter in the latter stages. In 1984/85 they finished fourth and in 1985/86 fifth.

This season with one game remaining they had to beat Bolton and just hope and pray for a miracle.

They duly despatched the Lancashire side with a single strike from leading scorer Tony Cascarino.

The miracle came when Swindon drew at Ashton Gate denving Bristol City a place in the play-offs and

literally allowing the Gills in through the back door into fifth place.

In the past this would have meant for manager Keith Peacock disappoinment again - but under the new system it has given him and the club fresh hope.

Gillingham re-elected to the league in 1950 have never sampled life above the Third Division, but now they stand before today's kick off just ninety-minutes away from rectifying that situation and setting a new chapter in the clubs history.

Also during the summer manager Peacock will obviously have a struggle on his hands to keep Cascarino who has been the centre of attention from several of the top first division clubs

MEET THE MANAGER & PLAYERS

Keith Peacock (Manager)

Succeeded Gerry Summers as manager of Gillingham in July 1981, after two years in the United States with Ohio and Tampa Bay Rowdles. The Third Division's longest serving manager

longest serving manager.

Kerth spent his entire playing career with Charlton, joining them in 1960 and going on to score 107 goals in 591 appearances. In August 1965 he made history by becoming the first ever substitute to be used in a football league facture, when coming on midway through the Second Division game against Bolton Wanderstein. Wanderers.

Tony Cascarino (forward)

Won international acclaim during 1985/86 and became Gillingham's most capped player by gaining three full caps for the Republic of Ireland. A frequent source of attraction to other clubs, top scorer last with 21 goals. Joined the Gills in January 1982 from Kent League side Crockenhill and progressed rapidly. Scored 5 goals in the games with Sunderland to take his total for the in to W

Karl Elsey (fullback)

Ever-present last season after being snapped up on a free transfer from Cardiff City in June 1985. He broke into League football with Q.P.R., joining them from Pembroke Borough in January 1979. He moved on to Newport 18 months later and thence to Cardiff in July

Colin Greenall (defender)

A £4000 purchase from Blackpool in September. Joined the Tangerines from school and broke into the first team at the age of 16. He was capped by England at youth level and figured in 200 senior games for the

Paul Baylock (defender)
Cost Gillinghem £25,000 from Norwich City in August. A former apprentice at Carrow Road and went on to make nearly 200 appearances for the Canaries. Won a Milk Cup winners medal in 1985.

Graham Pearce (defender)

Optamed on a free transfer from Brighton during the close season. The South Coast club siged him from Gola Desgue thub Barnet in 1982 after the two sides had met in the F.A. Cup. Played for Brighton in the 1983 F.A. Cup final against Manchester United.

Howard Pritchard (forward)

Became the first of Gillingham's many summer signings, transferring from Bristol City for £22,500 in July. He joined them as an apprentice and became a full pro in August 1976. After a two year interlude at Swindon, returned to Ashton Gate in 1983. Capped by Wales, course Mourant is 1998. against Norway, in 1985.

Swindon Town, bottom of Division One thus met Cillingham (then known as New Brompton), champions of Division Two, at the end of sesson 1894/95

The match was played at a neutral venue, Cavershain Cricket Ground, Reading. Swindon escaped relegation when the First Division was extended from nine to ten clubs - the vacancy being filled by New Brompson.

Trevor Quow (midfield)

Gillingham's close season acquisitions bought for £7,000 from Peterborough in August. Joined the Posh as an apprentice, went on to figure in well over 200 Fourth Division games for them.

Martin Robinson (forward)

Scalscoring winger - 28 in the last two campaigns - secured from Charlton Athletic for a £15,000 fee in October 1984. A former Tottenham apprentice, he scored twice in six games for Spars before moving across London to the Valley in February 1978. For the Valiants he registered 70 goals in 250 senior appearance.

Dave Shearer (forward)

He was snapped up by Middlesbrough from Highland League club Inverness Clachnacuddin in January 1978 and went on to net 23 goals in 88(9) outlings. After a loan spell with Wigan and season 1983/84 at Grimsby, he joined the Gills during the summer of 1984.

David Smith (forward)

Another of Gillingham's close season captures, transferring in August from Southern League champions Well-ing United for £3 000.

Mark Weatherly (utility)

Loyal long serving player who has twice been voted Player-of-the-Year Now in his 13th season with the Gills. He made his debut in August 1974 -at the age of 16, and has since clocked up over 450 appearances in League and Cup

Phil Kite (goalkeeper)

Acquired from Southampton in January 1987. Was formerly with Bristol Rovers. Where he figured in 101 league games before joining the Saints in August 1984 for £30,000. He has also spent loan spells at Tottenham and Middleshaus. and Middlesbrough

Steve Lovell (midfield/forward)

Welsh international, capped six times by his country, who became Gillingham's 11th signing in eight months when purchased from Millwall for £20,000 in February. Started his career with Crystal Palace and moved across London to the Den in February 1983.

Irvin Gernon (defender)

Tall defender signed from Ipswich for £30,000 in early March this year. A one club man - apart from loan periods with Newcastle and Northampton - he joined pswich from school during 1979/80. He was capped by England at under-18 and under-21 levels and gradu-ated through the ranks to figure in 87 games for the Portman Road club.

Les Berry (defender)
Ex-long serving Charlton player and son of Gillingham director Dennis Berry who was secured on loan from Brighton shortly before the deadline. He attained full pro status with Athletic in March 1974 on completion of his apprenticeship. He registered almost 400 first team appearances prior to his move to Brighton in the summer of 1995.

So one-all at the break and thats the way it stayed until the end of the match, Town keeper Kenny Allen making one splendid save to deny Mansfield a Second and Swindon were champions of Division Four

The final whistle was the signal for the celebrations to begin.

The Mansfield Contingent in the 8.416 Crowd politely left the party and allowed the Swindonians their moment of supreme triumph. Not one Town fan left the ground after the finish of the match and they were soon to be rewarded by the appearance of Scantily clad Swindon players coming out onto the pitch to join in the fun. Lou the tall man from Torquay United.

Macari had kindly come up to the "Box" to give his immediate reaction and on the way up had been spotted by the red and white hordes who made their feelings of joy evident to the man who had masterminded the clubs greatest triumph since Wembley 1969. In my interview with Lou it was easy to see how emotionally moved he was by the days events and soon he too was on the pitch taking the accolades along with his marvellous team.

Trying to relay the scenes back to Wiltshire was not easy when I was wishing I could be on that terrace as well, as there anything to match the feeling of celebrating when your team's won something? Kenny Allen came up to be interviewed clutching a bag full of what looked suspiciously like cans of lager Kenny kindy allowed us to confirm that was indeed the case by donating a couple of cans to G.W.R.'s thirsty contingent.


The Town keeper became a hero in his short stay in Wiltshire and can there have been a more "Roy of the Royers" like tale than the one that concerned Plucked out of football's basement by Lou Macan, Kenny's arrival corresponded with the Town's rise up the league and a string of superb performances ensured his popularity. One save during the championship campaign will remain with those lucky enough to see it. At Northampton on a rainy and cold February afternoon, Kenny Allen arched backwards and tipped away a goalbound effort from a Cobblers player. I was directly in line with the shot and just could not believe it when the ball was put behind quite incredible.

However back to Field Mill, the fans drifted away eventually and it was left to us to clear up the equipment after the outside broadcast. A rainy journey back to Wiltshire followed and a feeling of having witnessed something quite unique. Lets hope we see other days like that April afternoon, maybe tonight's a good chance to repeat it.
