**Five goals, none in reply and two victories, what a way to begin our County Ground programme for the new season. Within the space of four days we had defeated Bristol City 3-0 in the Littlewoods Cup and Sheffield United 2-0 in our first League match at home.**

This evening we welcome Hull City to the Country Ground and I would like to extend the hand of hospitality to the Directors, officials and supporters of the Humberside Club.

During our recent home match it was becoming quite apparent that the majority of those present were dissatisfied with the amount of off-side decisions during the match.

Interestingly there is a bold new move to reduce the stranglehold of the offside rule in football.

G.M. Conference League games will see an experiment with the off-side laws, sanctioned by F.I.F.A.,

which could further promote attacking football and if successful be taken up at other levels in the game.

The experiment comes in Law 11 which declares players exempt from off-side at goal-kicks, corners, throw-ins and referees' drop ball. That has now been extended to take in free kicks as well.

That amendment will give an edge to strikers and also raise the value of free-kicks, especially around the penalty area.

The Football Association will be monitoring the experiment sending representatives to every Conference fixture in preparation for a full report. Conference Clubs will also be quizzed for their views.

Off-side is undoubtedly the games most controversial law and this experiment will be worthwhile.

**I would like to appeal to you all to enter the County Ground at future matches on time and permit your Club from having to explain to the Barclay Football League why the police keep delaying the kick-off times.**

**The Club face enough problems with local authorities and do not NEED added complications.**

If you recall I finished off my programme notes for the Sheffield United match by stating how important it was for us to set a standard here at the Country Ground. We have set the precedent by defeating Sheffield United in our first Division Two match at the County Ground.

Mind, I must confess I was not here to see the game. Instead I was at a First Division fixture looking at three players I would like to bring to the Country Ground.

Previous to the United fixture I had tried to bring Gary Chivers from Q.P.R. here on loan but he had other ideas. Looking back I am glad I found out that he was not one-hundred per cent sure he wanted to come here. A months loan period would have given him the ideal opportunity to have seen whether he liked the Club and also if we wanted to pursue our interest in him.

Injuries to some players and a distinct lack of application by one or two players prompted me to try and recruit one or two new faces. We shall need them as the season progresses.

We travelled to Bristol City on Tuesday last with the advantage of a three goal lead from the First Leg of our Littlewood Cup tie. Following our 3-2 defeat at Ashton Gate we can now see how we needed that lead. We conceded early goals which



was the last thing we needed to do and who knows what would have happened if Alan Walsh had put City 3-0 up instead of missing that penalty. Over the two games we did enough to go into the Second Round draw last Thursday.

I must admit it was a match that I missed due to another scouting trip to the North of England. We need to strengthen the squad here at the County Ground with more players. One in each department of the team. I hope to have concluded at least one of these deals before tonight's match with Hull City.

The players we have out of action at the beginning of the season dictates new faces are needed. I know you will be asking yourself what will happen when they are fit. They will face a fight for first team places. That can only be to the benefit of everyone.

We make the long trip to Middlesbrough next Saturday and it will be interesting to see which team has made the most progress since being promoted.

A.F.C. Bournemouth have made good progress beating both Sheffield United and Bradford City in their opening matches. Harry Redknapp is not complacent about their start for he was here watching our Reserve fixture with Chelsea last Tuesday afternoon. It just shows you cannot afford to rest on your laurels in this game.

## Tuesday August 18th

A late Safety Inspection of the County Ground sees the Littlewoods Cup tie against Bristol City go ahead. Second half incidents decide the result with City down to ten men following Gordon Owen's dismissal. An amazing Jimmy Quinn hat-trick following his penalty miss gives the Town a three goal lead.

The Town Youth team gain their second win in three days when they defeat Wimbledon 3-1 at Lydiard. Two goal Nigel Packer and John Kennedy score the Town goals.

## Wednesday August 19th

Former Town star of the 60's Mike Summerbee sees his son Nicky give an impressive display in a specially arranged trialists match at the County Ground against a Cardiff City team.

The Town's Combination team open their programme with a 2-1 defeat at Welling against Charlton Athletic. A display that left Town boss Lou Macari privately seething.

## Thursday August 20th

Attempts to bring Queens Park Rangers defender Gary Chivers to the County Ground in time for

the Sheffield United match fail when the player rejects the move.

A traineeship is offered to Nicky Summerbee to join the other nine trainees currently on the County Ground staff.

Both Bryan Wade and Gary Marshall are making progress towards full fitness and both can be seen cycling round the Town in a bid to recover from their early season setbacks.

## Friday August 21st

Lou Macari is still active in trying to secure the signing of a full back and is currently in talks with Watford regarding a possible loan deal. Although no move is expected until after the weekend. Lou decides that it is imperative that he strengthens his team and decides to go on a scouting trip and will give tomorrow's match with Sheffield United a miss.

## Saturday August 22nd

While Lou is taking in the Wimbledon v Oxford United first Division fixture at Plough Lane Colin Calderwood decides its time for the 'annual goal'. Colin puts the Town into an early lead

with a far post header from a Leigh Barnard corner kick.

Jimmy Quinn, a minute before the interval, ensures that the Town gain their first win of the season in Division Two.

The Town Youth team experience their first defeat of the season when they go down 3-0 away to Oxford United, more inspection drama as the Fire Department are satisfied with the Club's efforts to bring requirements up to standard.

The Football League decide the Tribunal for the settlement of the fee for Chris Ramsey will be heard at the F.A. Headquarters, Lancaster late next Wednesday.

Southern United have offered £5,000 while the Town's asking fee is £40,000.

The Club are notified following a Commission of the Football League that they retain the registration of Jamie Reynolds but he is now free to join any non-league Club if he wishes. Compensation can be sought if he returns to the Football League.

Fitzroy Simpson is the Clubs latest injury problem as he limps into the County Ground following the Youth teams return from Oxford. Philosophically he announces 'I'll be ready by next week'. In the meantime he collects a pair of crutches from Town physio Kevin Morris.

Town Manager Lou Macari

returns to the County Ground more than interested in one of his three targets from his scouting mission.

## Monday August 24th

Town midfielder player John Kelly is doubtful for the trip to Bristol City tomorrow as he reports to Town physiotherapist Kevin Morris with a groin strain. John joins Bryan Wade, Gary Marshall, Steve White and Mark Jones on the treatment table.

Lou re-affirms that he is still interested in strengthening his squad of players. Injuries and lack of form have left him with a depleted squad to select from.

Andy Rowland is forced out of virtual retirement when he has to name himself in the Town's reserve team line-up to face Chelsea at the County Ground tomorrow. The Town are down to bare numbers as the injury crisis worsens, with John Kelly ruled out by injury.

Is the face of soccer changing? A Bristol City fan offers to pay for damage he caused following his teams visit to the County Ground the previous week, when he swung on some guttering which he brought down.

## Tuesday August 25th

The Town's medical room is now at battle stations. Steve White, John Kelly, Bryan Wade, Gary Marshall, Mark Jones and Richard Morgan are all out of action. Dave Hockaday and Steve Tobin are suspended.

The Town Reserves are routed as Chelsea avenge their 5-0 defeat at Stamford Bridge last season with an identical scoreline at the County Ground.

For the second successive match Town boss Lou Macari decides to go on a scouting mission and leaves his team for the second leg of the Littlewoods Cup First Round tie against Bristol City at Ashton Gate in the charge of his assistant John Trollope.

Lou heads north to watch another Littlewoods Cup tie as the Town slump to their seventeenth defeat in 25 visits to Ashton Gate since 1945. A torrid opening for the Town when they conceded two early goals was followed by a missed penalty by Alan Walsh. How penalties have cost City dear in recent matches with the Town. Goals from Dave Bamber and Steve Berry (pen) see the Town into the second round with a 5-3 aggregate win. Over the two matches the woodwork was hit no fewer than five times.

With the return to school this month can I make my annual mention of the fact that if you need a new pair of football boots or any other sporting equipment you can do yourselves and the Club a favour by visiting Doug Woodman in the Swindon Town Sports Shop. Originally the brain-child of former Town Managing Director Robert Stephenson, former Town player Doug has built it up to one of the most respected Sports suppliers in the area. A visit to this establishment will ensure not only that you get good quality equipment, but the all important advice that goes with it.

If you are starting at Secondary School, it may be that you have your first pair of football boots. It is an oft repeated saying that 'look after your boots and your boots will look after you'. Good boots cannot make a good player but, kept in good condition, they can help save you from injury. Make sure your boots are properly treated after each match. Remove the surplus mud (preferably not on mum's best carpet), take out the laces and wipe the boots over with a damp cloth. Allow the boots to dry and then apply a good coating of dubbin before relacing the boots. You should always allow boots to dry naturally. Left near a radiator or in direct, strong sunlight the leather can

To help our Junior Robins improve their game we have asked Colin Calderwood this question . . .

In the Town's second match of the season he made a hash of a penalty and then proceeded to nonchalantly hit a hat-trick! Jim was not content with this all-action display against Bristol City in the Littlewoods Cup, for four days later he scored a dramatic goal when Horsham based referee, Mike James, penalised Sheffield United keeper, Andy Leaning, for time wasting. With the whole of the United team lined up on the goal line, Jim found a gap from Chris Kamara's free-kick to score the Town's second goal.

The Belfast born striker is now in his second spell at the County Ground. Frustrated by a financial disagreement at the end of the 1983/84 season, he opted for a move to Blackburn Rovers. Two seasons with the Northern Club obviously whetted his appetite for a higher grade of football. So his move back to the County Ground last season appeared to be a down grade.

Jim explained the move like this, "When I left the Club I didn't imagine I would be returning. I just concentrated on my job. Perhaps I was lucky in the fact that my wife's family come from here. She was homesick, so the return was an opportunity I could not pass up. I was happy to return".

It is fair comment to describe Jim's style of play as characteristic of a past era. Tall, dominant in the air and to all intents and purposes requiring the service of a winger. A point not lost on Jim, "I would prefer to play with two wingers. At Blackburn, Ian Miller was fast and provided a service to begin with but teams used to put a double cover on him and the service

automatically dried up." The Town's long ball style was a different type of game for Jim. "It catches a lot of teams out and I have had to do a lot more laying the ball off to other players. The 'gaffer' has told me to be more selfish and have a go at goal this season".

Jim, who played continual Second Division soccer during his two-and-a-half seasons at Ewood Park, described the difference between the

Clubs and his team mates. "The lads here are more honest, they know what is expected and are fitted. My form varied at Blackburn, some matches I could be brilliant, others I was knackered. I could hardly breathe after some matches at Blackburn, now I am fitter".

The Northern Ireland striker conceded there were probably two or three players with the Ewood Club who were more skilled than the overall standard at the County Ground. "We play for each other here and are a team. You could describe it like England and Northern Ireland. England have the individuals but we always played as a team."

Jim was hoping to regain his Northern Ireland place this season, "If I keep banging in the goals they won't be able to ignore me."

The Town's hat-trick hero from the First Leg win in the Littlewoods Cup likened his national Manager - Billy Bingham - to Town boss Lou Macari. "Shrewd, determined to succeed and that rubs off on anyone".

I just have that sneaking feeling that this could be Jimmy Quinn's best ever season. He was certainly quick off the starting block, four goals in three matches, and the finishing line is a long way distant.

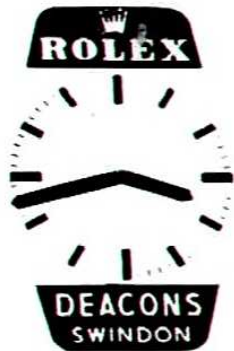

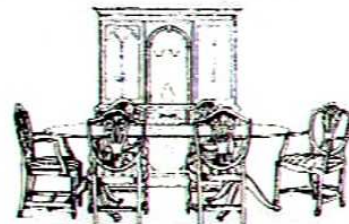

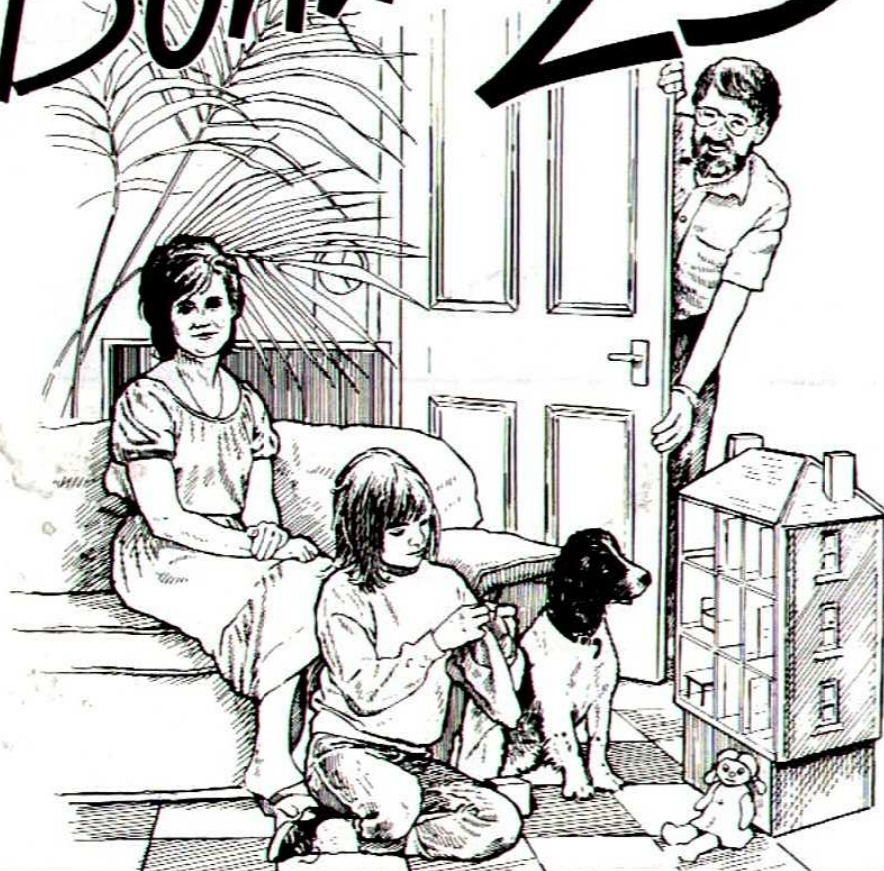

### MEET THE PLAYERS AND MANAGER

**Brian Horton (Player/Manager)** Joined Hull City in June, 1984 as Player/Manager after a distinguished playing career which started as an apprentice at Walsall in 1964. Had a spell at Hednesford Town before joining Third Division Port Vale. In 1976 was transferred to Brighton, then in the Third Division.

He captained the South Coast side to promotion to Division Two and to promotion to the First Division in his first season. His promotion winning sequence continued to his first season in Management as he led the 'Tigers' back into the Second Division.

**Billy Askew (Midfield)** Born in Lurnley in 1959, he began his Football career at Middlesbrough making a dozen appearances for the Ayresome Park Club.

In 1981 he signed for a non-League club (Gateshead) and joined the 'Tigers' a year later after a two month trial. League Appearances 169. Goals 15.

**Frankie Bunn (Forward)** Born in Birmingham in 1962, signed from Luton for £40,000 in June, 1985. Made his League debut at 17 years old against Derby County in the Second Division. Made 35 League appearances for Luton, scoring 4 goals. League Appearances 73. Goals 18.

**Ray Daniels (Midfield)** Born in Luton in 1964. Made 30 appearances for Luton Town. Signed for the 'Tigers' in the close season of 1986. League Appearances 9.

**Alex Dyer (Winger)** Born in Forest Gate, London in 1965, has played for Watford and Blackpool before signing for City in February, 1987. League Appearances 17. Goals 4.

**Pat Beard (Midfield)** Born in Hull in 1960. He started his career with Everton but had made only eleven League appearances when he was transferred to Aston Villa for £100,000 in 1979. It was after joining Sheffield Wednesday for £60,000 in 1983 that he really started to make progress.

Newcastle signed him a year later and he moved onto Middlesbrough in 1985. After a trial period with the 'Tigers' in March 1986 he signed at the end of the season. League Appearances 44. Goals 1.

**John Jobson (Defender)** Born in Hull in 1963. Joined the 'Tigers' from Watford in February, 1985 for £40,000. Started playing for Burton Albion when he was 19 years old and signed for Watford in October, 1982. During the 1983/4 season made six appearances in UEFA Cup Matches and played in the F.A. Cup Semi-Final against Plymouth Argyle. League Appearances 82. Goals 12.

**Stan McEwan (Defender)** Born in Cambuskenneth in 1957. Began his professional career with Blackpool making well over 200 first team appearances before

moving on to Exeter in 1982. Spent a month at Cardiff in 1982 and played in the Welsh Cup-Final against Swansea. Under 18 Scottish Youth International joined the 'Tigers' in 1964 after a spell on loan. League Appearances 111. Goals 25.

**Tony Norman (Goal-Keeper)** The 'Tigers' regular First Team Goal-keeper. Joined them in February, 1980 from Burnley for £33,000. He spent four years at Turf Moor but was unable to break into the First Team.

Won two Welsh Under 19 caps and was selected for the Welsh Under 21 squad while still at Turf Moor. Was named in the P.F.A. Third Division side for 1984/85 season. Last season he gained his first full Welsh International Caps playing against the Republic of Ireland and Uruguay and then went on to tour Canada with the Welsh F.A. League Appearances 307.

**Charlie Palmer (Defender)** Born in Aylesbury, Bucks. in 1963. Played for Watford and Derby before signing for City in February, 1987 at a cost of £32,000. League Appearances 17.

**Gary Parker (Midfield)** Born in Oxford in 1965. Joined the 'Tigers' in February, 1986 from Luton Town for £72,000. Under 21 England International. Made his League debut against Huddersfield Town in February, 1986. League Appearances 47.

**Garreth Roberts (Midfield)** Born in Hull in 1960. City's longest service player, joining them in 1976 as an Apprentice. Signed professional in 1978 and made his League debut against Bury on 10th March, 1979. Appointed Captain in 1981. League Appearances 286. Goals 41.

**Andy Saville (Forward)** Born in Hull, signed as a Professional in June, 1985 after playing on a non-contract basis during previous seasons. Found a regular scoring touch in the Central League side and made his first team debut against Port Vale on 31st December, 1983. League Appearances 36. Goals 10.

**Peter Skipper (Defender)** Born in Hull in 1958. Joined the 'Tigers' in 1979 and made his League debut against Blackburn Rovers in December, 1979. Went to Darlington on a free transfer in 1980. Re-joined the 'Tigers' for £10,000 in 1982 and was voted 'Player of the Year' in 1982-83. Ever present over the last 5 seasons, missing only 4 League games. League Appearances 237. Goals 17.

**Neil Williams (Midfield)** Born in Waltham Abbey in 1964, signed for the 'Tigers' in 1984 from Watford. Started his career as an apprentice with Watford in 1980 and signed professional in 1981. Was a member of the side which won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1980-81 beating Manchester United. Regular first team appearances have confirmed him as a useful member of the 'Tigers' squad. League Appearances 54. Goals 8.

Hull City, today's visitors, were formed in 1904 and elected to Division 2 the following year.

To coincide with their elevation to the League they switched grounds from the Boulevard Ground (Hull R.F.C.) to Anlaby Road (Hull C.C.) - their home until switching back to the Boulevard in 1944/5.

The following year City moved to their present home - Boothferry Park.

After being elected to the League the Tigers spent 31 years in the Second Division apart from a three year spell in Division 3 (N) between 1930 and 1933, and in the season 1932/33 they claimed their first League Championship. Relegated from the Second Division in 1936. City spent another thirteen years in the Third North before finally regaining a place back in Division 2 as champions of the Third North. Seven years later the Tigers tasted relegation once more.

And then, for the next 22 years, they fluctuated between the Second and Third Divisions at regular intervals. The drop back to the Third came again in 1978 and three years later in 1981, for the only time in their history, they made the plunge into the Fourth.

It was only a short two year stay though, finishing as runners-up in the 82/83 season.

Brian Horton was appointed manager in June 1984 and in his first season led the Tigers back into the Second.

In their first season back in the higher grade they finished a very creditable sixth.

Last season though wasn't so successful. For a considerable period the Tigers hovered around the relegation zone until a late burst of points hauled them up to a final 14th position.

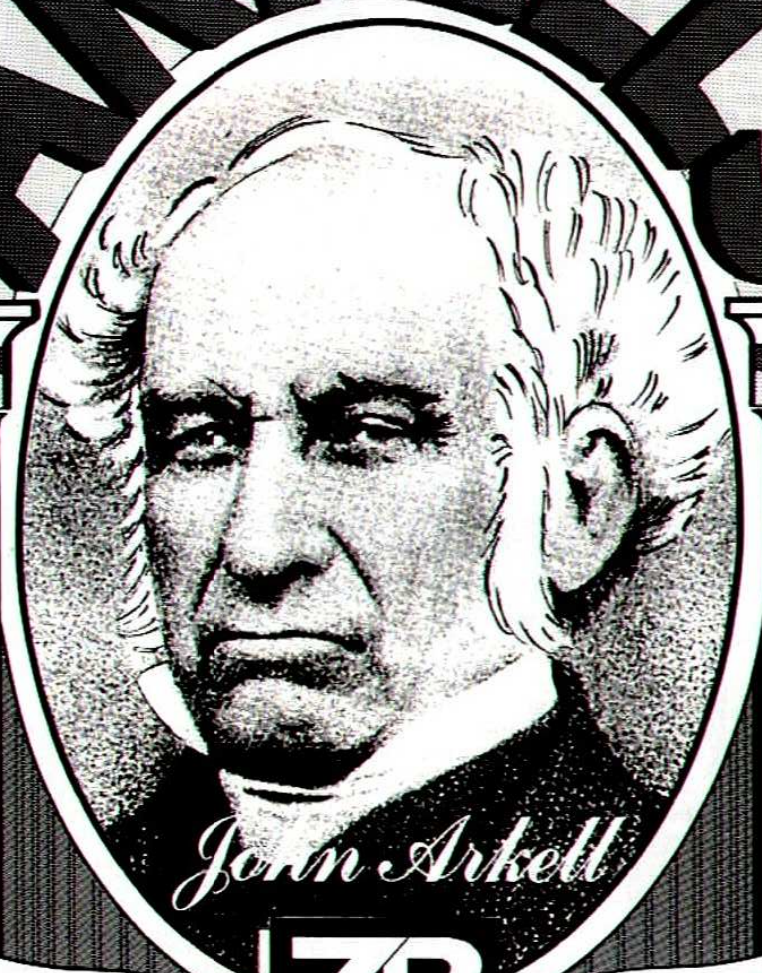

## A to Z

### OF SWINDON TOWN

#### Glenn Cockerill

On his arrival from Lincoln City in March 1980, Glenn Cockerill was obviously dazzled by the County Ground set up, as he wore sunglasses constantly from then until his departure at the end of the following season. His shades would also serve well to hide the glare of the crowd during his stay, for his form can at best be described as erratic, during one of the least successful periods of his career. He made just 26 appearances for the 'Town' before returning to the Club that had sold him, Lincoln City, for a vastly reduced fee. Despite his obvious ability, Glenn never really gelled into a 'Town' line-up which included Ray McHale, Chris Kamara and Brian Williams.

His loping 'slow motion' style was deceptive, hiding a blistering shot and superb passing ability, unfortunately these were well hidden during his stay at Swindon, scoring only one goal. That came in a typically fiery encounter with Gillingham on 19th April 1980, netting the final goal in a 3-0 win.

Glenn's only cup appearance for the 'Town' came against somewhat grand opposition - Liverpool at Anfield. This taste of things to come was an unhappy one with Dalglish & Co. sweeping the 'Town' aside 5-0 in the League Cup.

After joining Southampton from Sheffield United for £225,000 the Grimsby born midfielder settled in well to the pace and style of the top flight and has become a firm favourite at the Dell. Everpresent last season,

Glenn collected the Saints' player of the year award, no mean feat with the competition including Shilton, Wright and Clarke.

With the majority of the reasons why Southampton are still playing First Division football now gone, a large responsibility falls on Glenn Cockerill's shoulders - with his long journey to Division One finally complete, he is sure to fight to stay there and current performances suggest that he is likely to do so.

#### Roy Carter

In his chequered career at the County Ground, Roy Carter developed from midfielder to defender, came within ninety minutes of Wembley and missed the penalty that virtually condemned the 'Town' to Division 4 for the first time.

Signed by Danny Williams in December 1977 from Hereford United, Roy soon established himself in the Swindon side with his displays of effortless class and versatility.

The Torpoint born player made his debut from the subs bench against Carlisle, replacing Trevor Anderson in a 2-2 draw. By the end of the 1977/8 season he was a regular in the number 8 shirt that was to be his hallmark for most of his stay.

The following season saw more of his marauding runs from midfield result in goals, 10 coming from 46 appearances.

As Andy Rowland and Alan Mayes became the new 'Smash and Grab' in 1979/80, Roy was a member of the side that were victims of 'floodlit robbery' at Molineux. The vision of Carter trooping from the pitch, his big chance stolen, mirrored the utter dejection on the terraces on the night that Emlyn Hughes put me off 'A Question of Sport' forever.

Towards the end of his stay the roles of Captain and penalty taker seemed totally



suitable, with his calm influence occasionally dragging a poor 'Town' side onto a more even keel.

But with a kick straight from the Gordon Owen textbook of vital penalties, Roy Carter turned from hero to villain late in the ill-fated 1981/2 season as his effort against Newport was saved when points were like gold dust at the County Ground.

The Club's first season in Division 4 saw Roy fade from favour, finding himself on loan first to Torquay, scoring five times in six games, then to Bristol Rovers. He returned to Plainmoor on a permanent basis to become an ancestor of the 'Town's' current player drain to Devon.

Making a mere 21 appearances before moving again, Roy ironically chose a transfer to Newport, where he settled very well, having made 152 appearances up to the end of last season compared with the 200 he made for Swindon scoring 34 goals.

His performance in the 2-2 draw at Somerton Park at the beginning of last season was typically inspirational as he surged and thrusted in an otherwise limp Newport outfit. A free transfer at the end of the 86/7 season does not seem to recognise the vast amount that he could still offer the Club.

Roy Carter is an unforgettable player in the recent history of Swindon Town and should be remembered as a classy, accurate worker who, particularly in his last full season with the Club, seemed at times to be an oasis of skill surrounded by an endless desert.

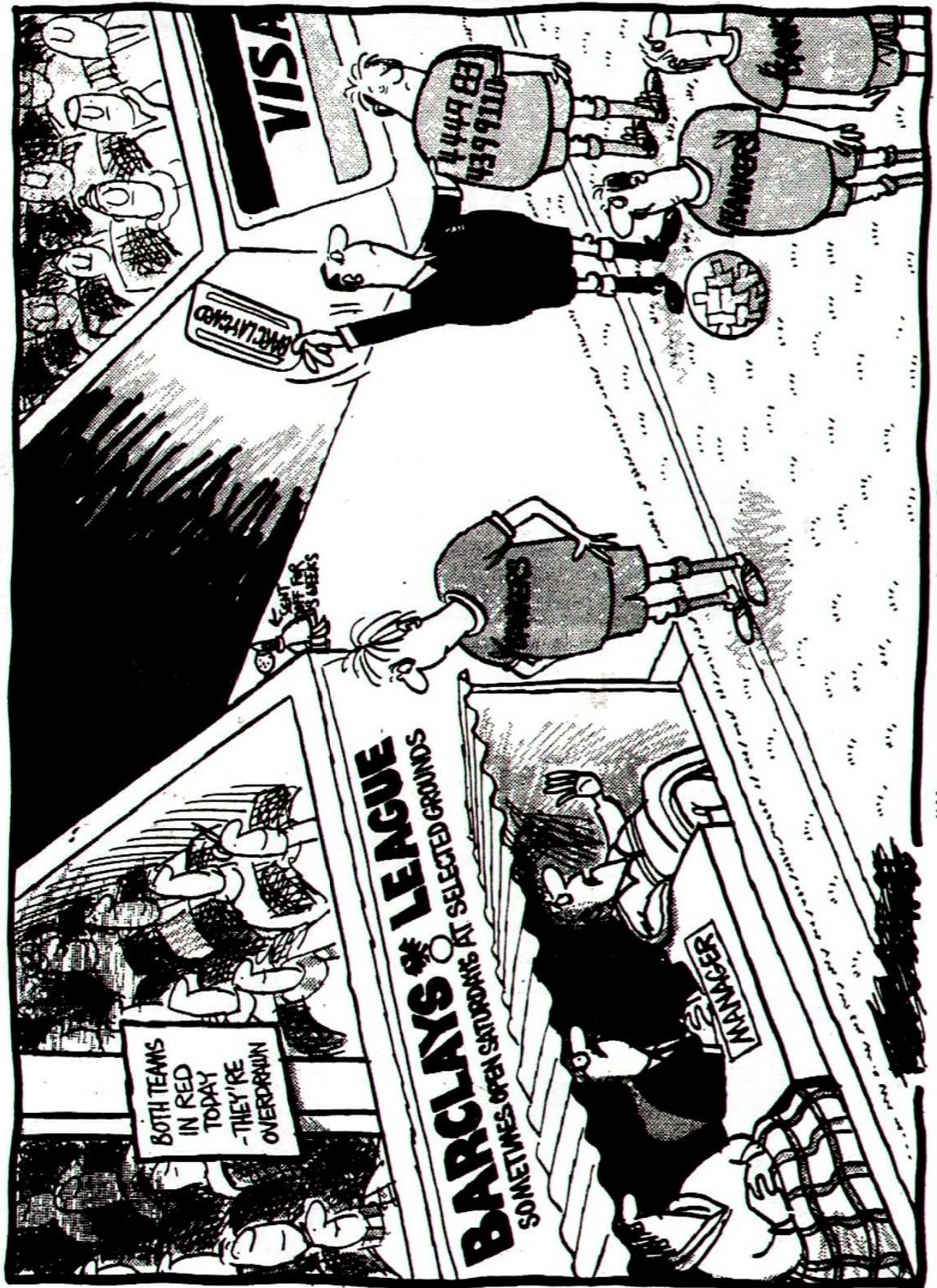

### Was it the fixture computer?

Did you notice how coincidence matched six of last seasons Wembley finalists together on the first Saturday of the season?

Littlewoods Cup winners Arsenal met Liverpool again while F.A. Cup rivals Coventry City and Tottenham Hotspur were facing each other at Highfield Road. 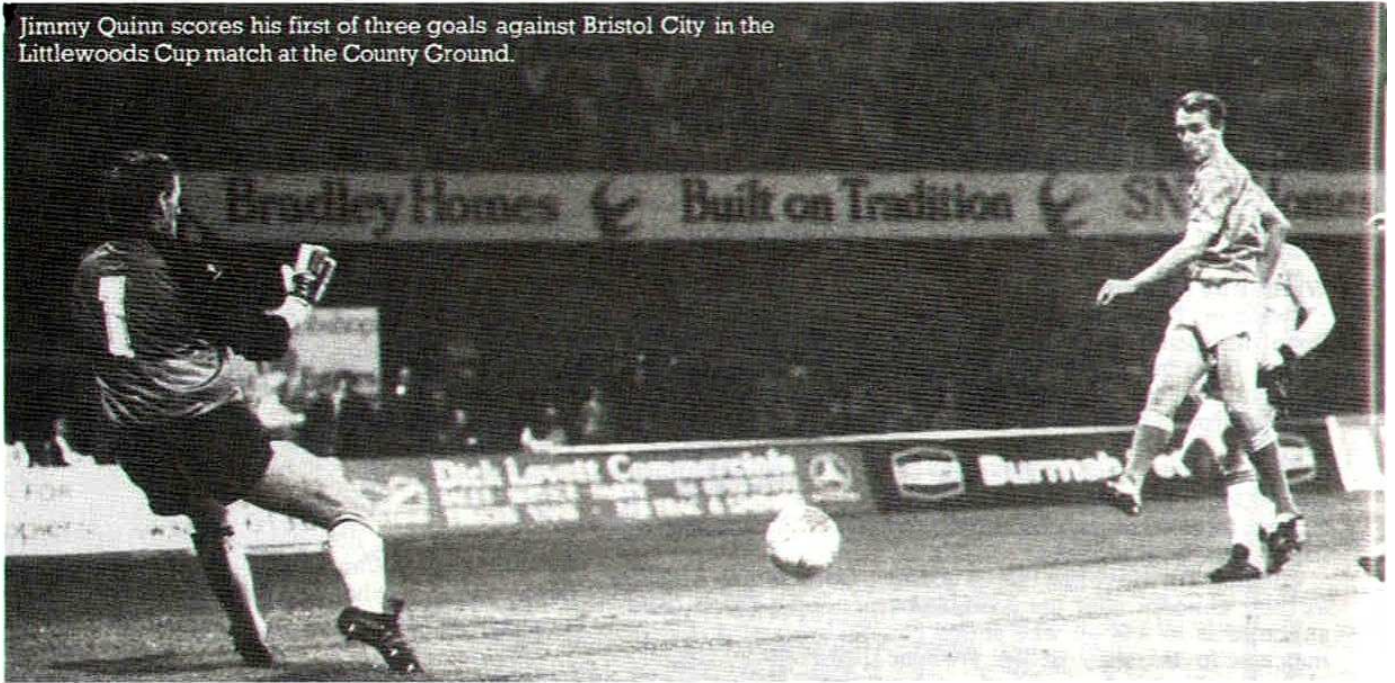

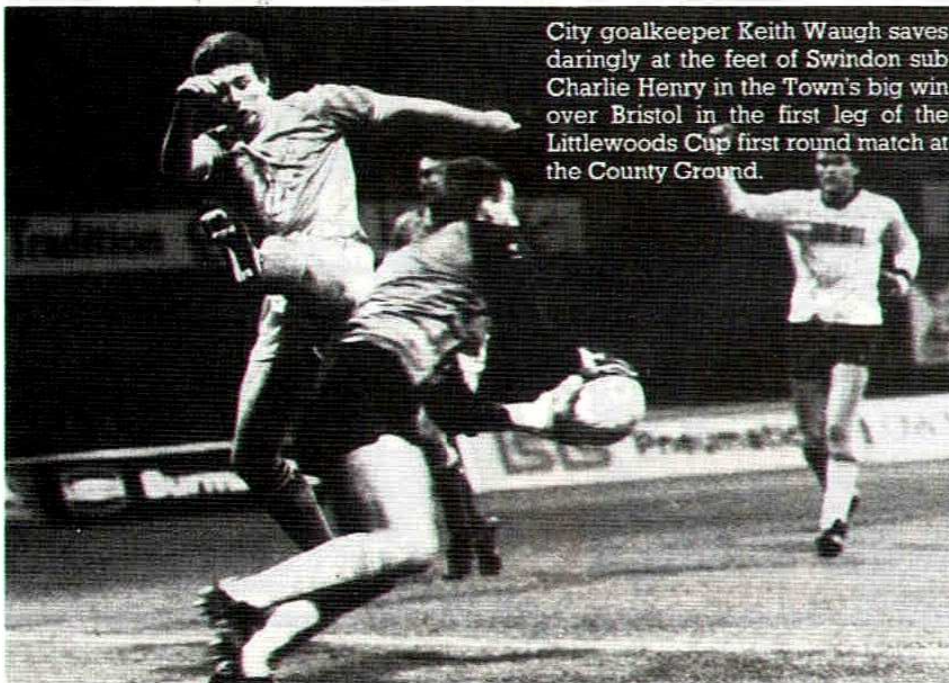

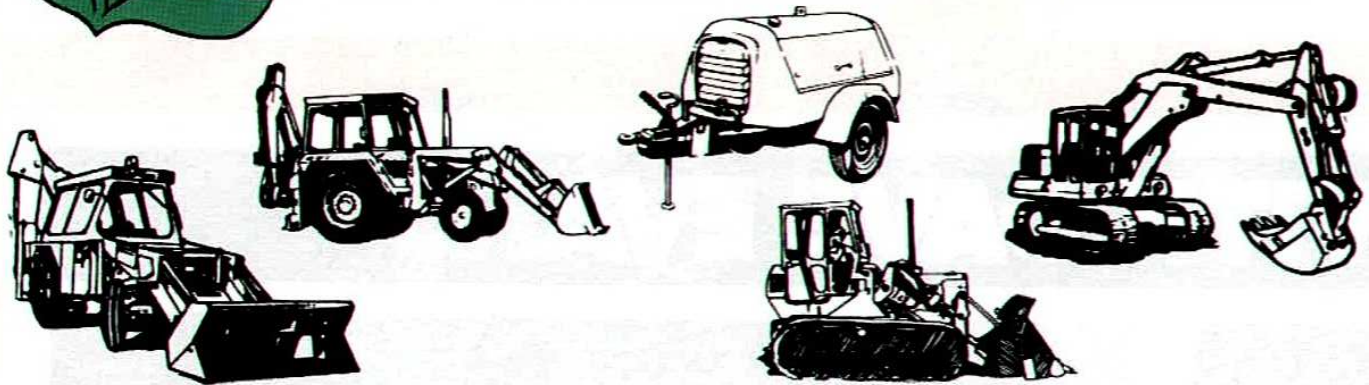
