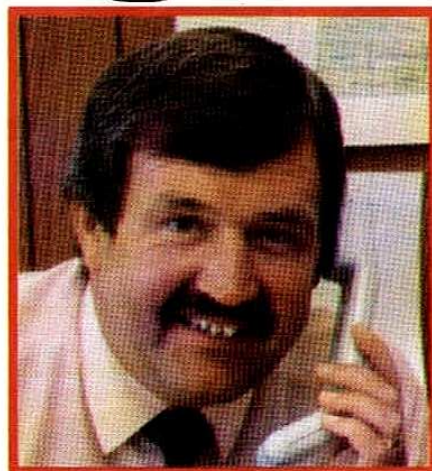

Saturday September 19th

Town trainee Paul Hunt was a hat-trick hero in the South East Counties League Cup match at Lydiard Park where the Town Youths were 4-1 victors over visiting Portsmouth. Fitzroy Simpson scored the Town's other goal. This was a particularly fine performance by the Town youngsters taking into account that the Fratton Park Club play in Division One of the South East Counties League and have a network of scouting for youthful talent that is the envy of most Clubs in the League.

The afternoon did not bring such good news for the senior team, they were defeated 3-2 by Ipswich Town at Portman Road. Two early goals from a Frank Yallop penalty and Mick Brennan in the first quarter of an hour were an immediate setback. A Leigh Barnard header made the scoreline more respectable. A third goal from Mitch D'Avray virtually put the match beyond the Town's reach. Despite the fact that Jimmy Quinn scored his seventh goal of the season the Town were unable to reduce the arrears any further. To add to the loss of three points the Town look likely to lose midfielder John Kelly in the near future for a remark he made to the referee after the final whistle for which he was shown the red card.

Town Manager Lou Macari asked the referee to explain his decision to the Town players after the match

and was obviously annoyed to think he had lost a key player through no on-the-field incident.

SUNDAY

Sunday September 20th

It was departure time for the Town players. They were due to 'fall in' again at Colerne for some more internment at the Army Camp before next Tuesdays match with Portsmouth in the Littlewoods Cup. A measure that is very popular with the Town boss.

MONDAY

Monday September 21st

Vince Farrar, the Clubs Company Secretary, confirms his decision to quit the Club after only thirteen months in the position. In the meantime he has intimated his intention to assist the Club in the interim period until a new appointment is made. Vince intends to set up business in the Town as a financial consultant. He will be dealing with insurance, pensions, investments and tax problems.

The Club continue their search to have the turnstiles electrically monitored. This will make the counting system much easier for the accounts department and also assist the Club to satisfy the Safety Team.

against Southampton at the Dell in a 5-1 defeat. Town Assistant Manager John Trollope returned stating it could have been twelve, such was the gulf between the two teams. Paul Hunt was the Town's solitary goalscorer. John felt that the team lacked what he termed as 'bottle' for this match. Southampton have an extensive scouting system throughout the South of England and although they may not produce high numbers for their first team they are often able to transfer several of their Youth products for moderate fees at a later date.

TUESDAY

Tuesday September 22nd

'You've not seen nothing like the mighty Quinn', must have been the message to the Portsmouth defenders as the Town powered their way to an impressive 3-1 win at the County Ground in the First Leg of the Second Round of the Littlewoods Cup. The amazing Jim, who scored a hat-trick in the previous round against Bristol City, repeated the act. Two first half goals and a second half penalty were too much for First Division 'Pompey' on the night, although a late goal from Mick Quinn gives the Fratton Park Club some hope for the Second Leg.

Jimmy Quinn had been presented with a personal memento from Littlewoods Group by local store Manager Mr. Gilman. Asked by the sponsoring

competition organisers to donate an award of £500 for his Bristol City hat-trick to a local charity, the charitable Northern Ireland International striker named the P.C. Richard Webb Scanner Appeal Fund for his choice.

Prior to the match, Lou had been making further enquiries about the availability of Bobby Barnes from Aldershot. The Recreation Club's Manager Len Walker was an interested onlooker at this evenings match. Also numbered among the crowd were Bill Nicholson of Tottenham Hotspur, representatives of Wimbledon, Reading, Coventry City, Norwich City, West Bromwich Albion, Queens Park Rangers and Bristol City.

WEDNESDAY

Wednesday September 23rd

Town midfield player John Kelly, who could not be considered for the previous evenings match because of injury, joined Mark Jones on the Town's injury list with a stomach injury. The main talking point of the day was Jimmy Quinn's hat-trick the previous evening and whether the two goal lead would be enough to ensure the Town's passage into a possible financially lucrative third round draw.

The Swindon Chamber of Industry and Commerce hold their Members lunch in the Rendezvous Club. Town Director Dick Mattick is one of the guest speakers in a six-minute slot. The Chamber staff members

present were Mr. John Gregory - President, Mr. Jimmy Duncan - Executive Director, Jane Copson - Advertising and Membership Secretary, Mary Davies - Services Secretary.

The Town's Combination team could not improve on the first team result when they lost 2-0 to Ipswich Town at Portman Road. A match which marked the return of Alan McLoughlin to Town action following his return on loan from Torquay United.

The Football League informed the Club that highlights of the 'Barclay' Second Division match against Plymouth Argyle on Saturday November 14th would be filmed by HTV.

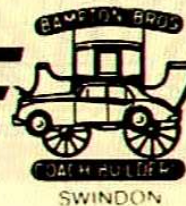
THURSDAY

Lou was busy preparing for the visit to Reading. The previous evening he had stopped off at Elm Park on the return journey from Ipswich to watch Reading defeat Chelsea 3-1 in the First Leg of the Second Round of the Littlewoods Cup. Meanwhile John Kelly, the former Chester City player, is still under treatment from Town physio Kevin Morris.

PROFILE • PROF



Caution – was the byword of Town skipper Colin Calderwood. His warning came just before the match with Birmingham City earlier this month. Prophetic, in hindsight, for the Town tumbled to their first home defeat of the season.

"It is pointless anyone making any comment on our start this season, for we have thirty odd matches to play." Colin had no hesitation in stating he found a difference in the standard of play in the Second Division. All the matches appear to be like Cup games. There is always a game to look forward to and it is easy to slip up in this Division."

Colin was also quick to point out that it is a Division where we could not afford to concede early goals. "It would be nice to go ahead in most matches."

The former Mansfield Town defender was well aware that the recognised big Clubs would be on his trail even more in the Second Division. "It is flattering to receive attention, but really it's all 'pie in the sky'. The newspapers are no different to the weather forecast, they get more wrong than right."

Irrespective of that fact it is no secret that Aberdeen, Tottenham Hotspur and Oxford United have all taken a keen interest in his future destiny, so surely he must have ambitions?

"I would love to play in the First Division and of course I want to reach the top of my profession. I am as ambitious as the next man," said Colin.

During his three seasons at the County Ground the progress that the Cub has made is notable, a point not lost on the dedicated Scot. "Yes, the team has improved each season, the squad we had here pre-season showed we could have fielded two teams. Competition is healthy."

Colin is a believer that match practice is the best form of training. "Pre-season

means nothing, remember when we beat Wimbledon and then made a bad start. This time we were outclassed by Swansea City and yet we fared better."

Colin had a clear message for Town supporters. "People have to be realistic, we will do well to consolidate in this Division, we will scare a few teams though."

There is probably more speculation about the futures of Colin and Town boss Lou Macari than anyone else on the staff

at the County Ground. A tribute obviously to their talent. Interesting to note how Colin viewed his Managers future.

"I can't see the Gaffer leaving here really, at least not for some considerable time. Half the Clubs that are supposed to be interested in him have gone for other Managers, so once again a lot of it is speculation. He is well settled here at Swindon and why should he take a chance somewhere else when he has so many people on his side, the fans here love him and he can do little wrong"

Super fit Colin had not long returned from a 6 mile run, and he was quite definite in how he had personally advanced on this aspect of his game. "When I was at Mansfield we did nothing like the training we do here at Swindon. We can win on a Saturday but it still means we have to train on a Sunday, that would be unheard of at Mansfield. We did nothing like the running there, we were basically fit, but here you are above that level." Colin continued to explain. "Steve Foley said when he arrived that he was in the top four or five at Sheffield United, but not here, that shows the difference in the type of training."

Can Colin Calderwood reach the height of his ambitions at Swindon Town? Only time will tell us the answer to that question.

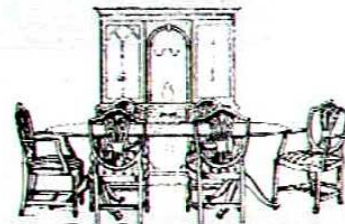

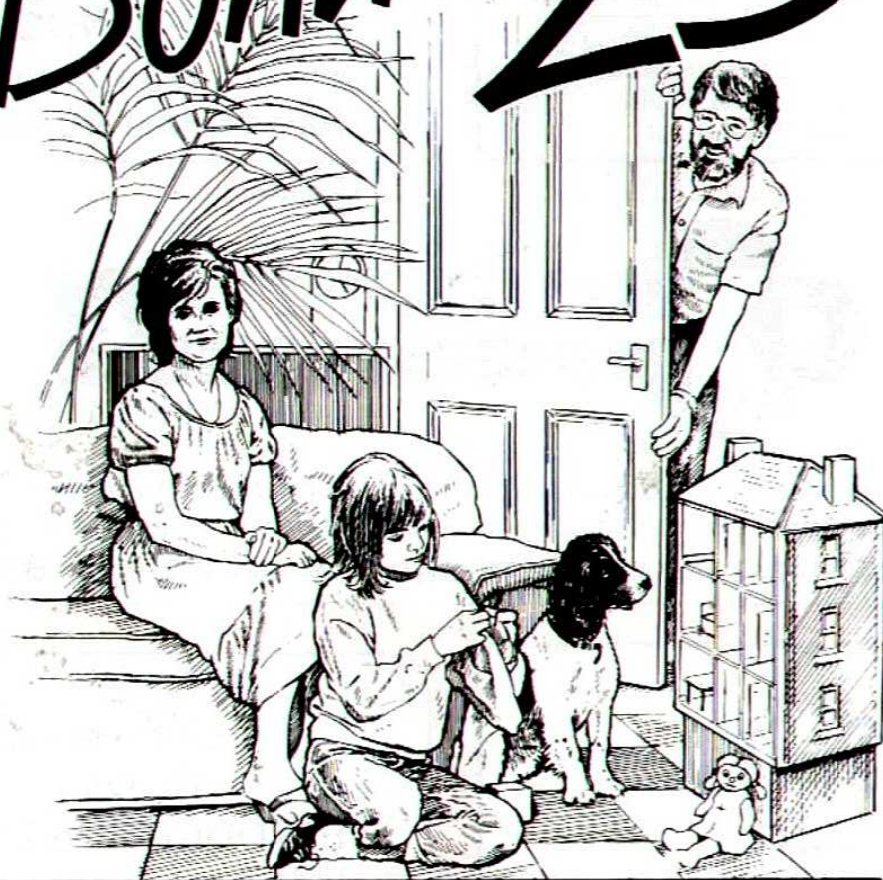

Almost three sides of the ground are covered and recent additions include a new office and administrative block, a club shop, a modern stand seating over 4,000 and dressing room accommodation.

Shrewsbury entered League Football in the autumn of 1950, and had one season in the old Third Division North, followed by seven seasons in the Southern Section. Promotion was gained from the newly formed Fourth Division in 1958/59, and apart from one season, 1973/74 in the Fourth Division, the Club remained in the Third Division until season 1978/79, when they won the Third Division Championship and were promoted to Division Two. Twice in seasons 83/84 and 84/85 8th place was achieved - their highest League placing.

The ground holds 18,000 people in comfort and great steps have been taken in the last few years to make the Gay Meadow a modern and well-appointed enclosure. The record attendance is 18,917 versus Walsall in a Football League match on 29th April, 1961.

In 1978/79 Shrewsbury Town created a club record by reaching the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup being defeated narrowly by Wolves in a replay.

Former Manager, Arthur Rowley, is the holder of the record number of goals to be scored by any player in Football League matches, and up to his retirement at the end of 1964/65 season he had scored 434 goals, this also beating the Scottish record held by Jimmy McGory.

'Chic' Bates, a former favourite at Swindon, who signed for the second time for Shrewsbury in December 1980 was appointed player/manager in July 1984 when Graham Turner was appointed manager of Aston Villa. Other managers have been Sammy Crooks ex-Derby and England; Walter Rowley ex-Bolton; Harry Potts, Arthur Rowley, Harry Gregg, Maurice Evans, Alan Durban and Richie Barker.

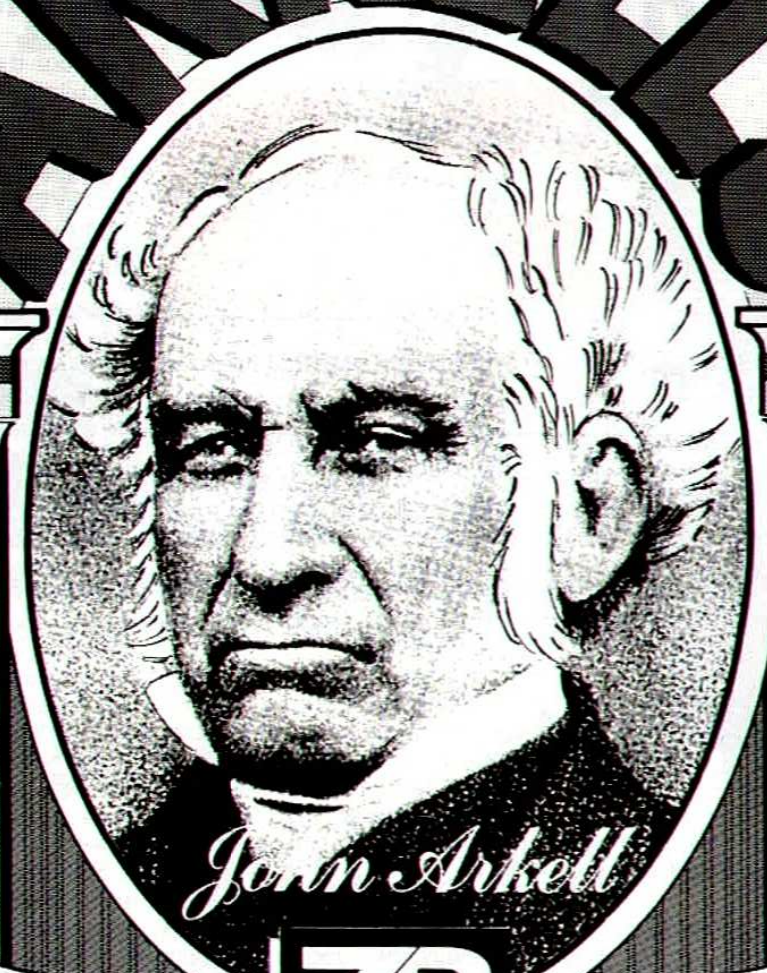

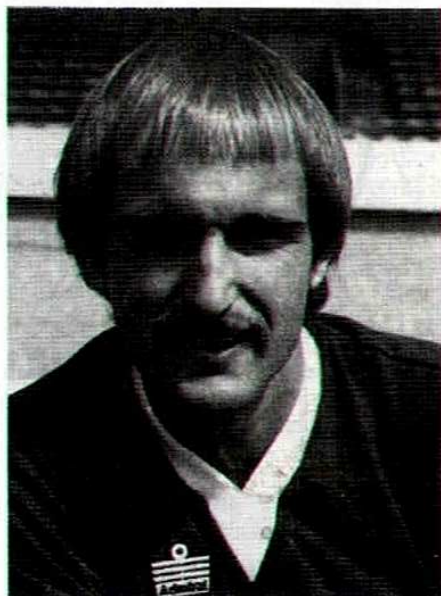


A to Z

OF SWINDON TOWN

Andy Ford



The muscular frame of Andy Ford was a versatile feature of the 'Town' back four from his signing in 1977 until his departure 3 years later.

His tough tackling approach to the game was not his only virtue, as he pushed forward well during the 'Town's' marauding attacking style period. More often seen at left back, Andy left the 'Town' to bring David Peach in replacement, perhaps the most 'interesting' £150,000 that the Club has ever spent, emphasised by our 6-2 defeat at Millwall on the ex-Southampton players debut.

Andy Ford's service to the Club, however, was exemplary, joining the 'Town' from Southend where he had made 135 appearances.

'Cherries' Manager John Bond's efforts to revitalise the South Coast outfit limited

Andy's chances at Dean Court as a huge 25 man squad was built up.

After 2 years at the Club Andy found himself the victim of a reshuffle and was given a free transfer.

His future was not in doubt for long, with Southend moving in for the teenager and drafting him straight into the first team at left back. Four successful years at Roots Hall brought him the Clubs 'Player of the Year' award in 1977/8 and a place in the PEA select team of the same year.

With these accolades received, Andy felt it not unreasonable that he should be better financially rewarded for his loyalty but Southend felt otherwise.

This attitude brought a rapid decision to further his career elsewhere. With the same pace that Southend had moved in in 1973, Swindon Town secured the signature of Andy Ford to strengthen their defence. His stylish displays at left back or in the centre of defence are still memorable, alongside Aizlewood and Trollope.

The image of Swindon Town seems to have changed little in the past ten years, Andy Ford's impression of the Club seems very similar to today's newcomers

- "I can sense that things are going to happen." It is a great pity that a player of Andy's calibre was not around to ensure that Swindon Town's success came sooner rather than later.

Fred Ford

Although it is the performance of players that ultimately win matches, the influence of the Manager is of paramount importance in bringing success to any Club, as we have certainly witnessed at the County Ground recently.

The footballing 'gentleman' seems at times a liberally applied cliché, but in the case of Fred Ford is an accurate description of a man whose death in 1981 robbed the game of one of the 'old' school of footballing minds.

The League Cup was still on display in Swindon when Fred was appointed in July 1969, emphasising the pressure on the likeable ex-Bristol City and Rovers chief.

Danny Williams' departure to Sheffield Wednesday in the euphoria following our Wembley triumph could possibly have heralded a decline in the 'Town's' fortunes but Fred Ford ensured that quite the opposite occurred.

The team's final fifth position in his first season is still the closest that Swindon Town have ever got to Division One, a fine testament to his efforts and the continued talents of the players that he inherited.

His overall record at the Club is admirable, losing only 30 of the 99 League games he was in charge for.

His departure from the Club heralded an era of utter disaster for the 'Town' as the slide to Division 4 gained momentum.

In his two and a quarter years with Swindon Town, Fred Ford gained many friends and achieved a great deal more than some of his successors for whom a gentlemanly nature was an effort rather than the norm.

A brief spell as assistant at Torquay followed by coaching duties kept Fred Ford involved in the game he knew so well, before his death left only memories of a great man who lived for the game of football.

EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIP 1986-87 - UPDATE

As England take on Turkey at Wembley on Wednesday October 14th in their penultimate game in the qualifying group, our Club Chaplain, the Rev. Nigel Sands, reviews the current situation with regard to the national side and our future prospects, whilst also highlighting a peculiar attitude of England Manager, Bobby Robson.

England's players line up against Turkey at Wembley on Wednesday with a welcome opportunity to redeem their individual and collective reputations in the European Championship, for their last performance in Qualifying Group 4 for the 1986-88 tournament was one of the poorest by an England side for many years. In that match, also against Turkey at the port of Izmir on the Aegean Sea, on April 29th, England were pitiful to behold: lethargic, lacking in any cohesion, urgency or even apparent incentive - it was not until the 86th minute that we actually troubled the Turkish goalkeeper for the first and only time! And let me remind readers that this was against Turkey, scarcely one of the leading European footballing nations!

No, there was no disputing the fact that this was a disgraceful performance by our national side and no amount of defensive explanations by the plausible, garrulous England Manager, Bobby Robson, could disguise it to discerning fans.

Commanding

Fortunately, thanks to a steady if uninspired showing against Northern Ireland at Windsor Park in the previous game, England had eased into a commanding position at the top of Group 4, which even the Yugoslav's success in Belfast four weeks later did little to disturb. Our largely effortless victory over the Irish was secured in one of the two most important matches we have planned in Group 4 - the other was the 2-0 victory over Yugoslavia at Wembley last November.

After the goal-less draw in Turkey some England critics opened discussion by casting doubts on our chances of actually qualifying from our group. But, even if admittedly Yugoslavia have cleverer footballers than we do, they do also have a considerable history of self-destruction and your humble correspondent would not be surprised for example to see Northern Ireland take a point off the Slavs in Zariajevo next week.

As it is, although originally Manager Robson had hoped to be able to go to Belgrade for England's match there in November without needing to gain a point or points in order to qualify, it should not be beyond England to prise a draw from this game thus leaving their hosts to rue the three clear chances spurned by Zlato Vujovic at Wembley last year.

Robson's obsession... with Robson

Now, a curious feature of Manager Bobby Robson's outlook has become apparent over the last two years, and that is the obsessional importance he attaches to the presence in his team of Bryan Robson, the current England captain.

This was very clearly manifested in Mexico in 1986, and again when England were due to play Turkey last April. The game in Izmir should have been a none-too-difficult qualifying tie for England against moderate opposition - if we are ever going to actually win anything again as against simply qualifying for places in the Final eights (European Nations Cup) or twenty-fours (World Cups) we've got to be able to get results against such second-rate international opponents as Turkey - but the preparations were clouded (some might argue they were distorted) by Manager Robson's overt anxiety about the possible absence of his skipper.

Of course Bryan Robson, on his day and fully fit, is a truly inspirational player. Yet England proved in Mexico that they can manage perfectly well without him when they have to do so, and they did so again last summer against Yugoslavia and Northern Ireland at Wembley. Against Turkey, Robson played, but along with his colleagues, did nothing to enhance his reputation.

Certainly England are a better side when a 100% Bryan Robson is in the line-up - but it is a mistake to consider that he is indispensable.

With the Scots

Unfortunately Scotland's prospects of qualifying for the Finals in West Germany were virtually extinguished in the April Fools' Day defeat by Belgium at the Heysel Stadium. Scotland, and the Republic of Ireland under Jack Charlton, face an enormous task in this very tough group, and, by all account, the Jocks' defeat was a painful lesson in chance-taking - Nicko Claesson scored a hat-trick for Belgium - rather than a true reflection of the play.

After their return fixture with Belgium next week Scotland still have to make the very difficult trip to face Bulgaria in Sofia, where Eire felt very hard done by in the Spring.

... and the Welshmen

Following their morale-boosting victory over Denmark at Cardiff last month Wales are still in with a chance of making the Finals, although their prospects would have been even brighter if they had been able to defeat Czechoslovakia at their beloved Wrexham in April, and the men from the Principality do still face the testing away matches in Denmark (next week) and the return in Prague in November.

Still, in football one has to be optimistic, and Welsh Captain Kevin Ratcliffe, now Everton's most capped player, stressed the feelings of the Welsh players and supporters when he said defiantly "We are as good as England even if we don't have the chance to prove it any more. This is our strongest-ever squad and we still have every chance of qualifying for West Germany".

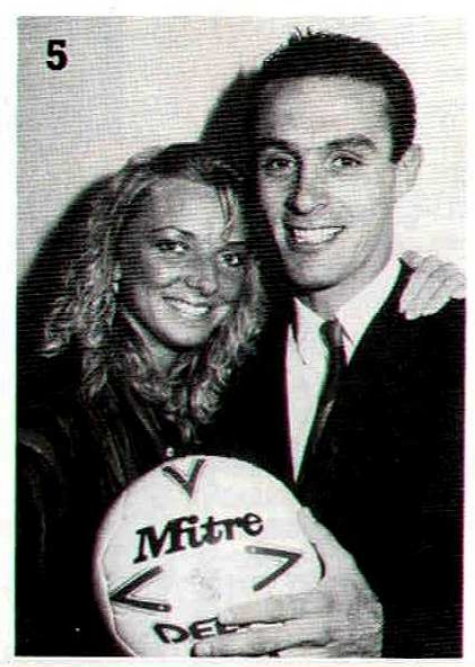

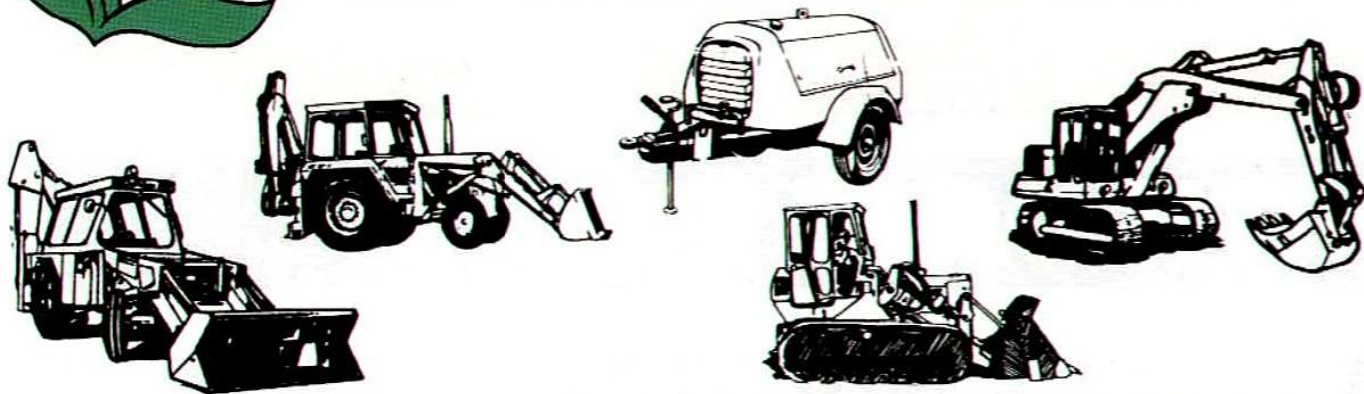

"Kelly was sent off as the players left the pitch for swearing at the ref and calling him a cheat." Macari said later.

"I wanted there to be no misunderstanding. There might have been some sympathy among the players for Kelly, so I asked the referee to come in and leave them in no doubt that Kelly deserved to be sent off."

But there were no complaints from Macari. "The referee made mistakes like every referee in the country has done but none were drastic and whatever Kelly thought he shouldn't call him a cheat," he said.

The after-the-match events left Philip with little space to add the match details in the curtailed Sunday newspaper report.

Gerry Harrison of 'The People' concentrated on the on-field events and in particular the impressive Mark Brennan who would appear to be destined for a higher class of football eventually.

Mark Brennan, temporary captain of a makeshift Ipswich side, led from the front in spectacular style to give his team a perfect two-goal start.

It was tough on Swindon that they should find Brennan in such sparkling form.

They twice pulled back bravely through a good goal from Barnard and a gift for Quinn and for much of the second half looked capable of retaining their unbeaten away record.

With two Ipswich skippers, Ian Atkins and Ian Cranson, injured along with leading scorer David Lowe, 21-year-old under-21 International Brennan was given the captains job.

Someone forgot to tell Gerry we did not have an unbeaten away record to defend. Having been defeated at Bradford City on the opening day of the season.

Peter Jackson of the 'Daily Mail' gave Jimmy Quinn's hat-trick against Portsmouth pride of place in his report of our 3-1 win against the Fratton Park Club last Tuesday.

Jimmy Quinn responded to Swindon's glorious Cup fighting tradition last night with the instantaneous goals which threatened to add Portsmouth to his Club's long list of First Division victims.

As a devastating sequel to his hat-trick against Bristol City in the previous round, the Northern Ireland International striker blasted two more in the first ten minutes to put Swindon in early control of their two-leg Littlewoods Cup tie.

Quinn, an ice-cream salesman when Swindon discovered him several years ago, hammered the first goal in 90 seconds against a team unbeaten in four First Division matches.

Pompey, bolstered by clean sheets in their two away matches since being hit for six by Arsenal last month, had no sooner set foot on the County Ground than were coming apart at the seams.
