

ood afternoon.

A deluge of rain restricted the attendance at our derby match against Millwall a fortnight ago, but the faint-hearted missed an entertaining and exhilarating afternoon in which both teams coped more than admirably with the treacherous, rain-soaked conditions.

It was inevitable on such a slippery pitch that chances would occur in plenty, both from defensive mistakes and those created purely by attacking guile. In this respect I thought that our makeshift defence did us proud, for if errors were made there was no doubt that young Mark Hone, making his League debut, coped extremely well against an experienced opponent whilst also making several vital clearances. My fellow Scouser, David Burke, fitted in with his new colleagues admirably after his transfer from Huddersfield, showing that our money has been well invested and demonstrating some quality play. We shall see much more of David, but both defensively, and, in the last quarter of the match, going forward, Palace fans were given a foretaste of the talent that is now available to us at left-back.

The match itself was decidedly by Mark Bright's brave and spectacular header, after Geoff Thomas had headed back a deep cross from Neil Redfearn. It was a goal of great quality, proving again the ability, courage, and resourcefulness we have in our team when we are playing as we can do.

What a credit the occasion was too, to the players of both sides: so much at stake, such difficult conditions, the intense pressure — yet the game was played in the best of sporting traditions, hard and fair. I'd like to think other clubs would be accorded some respect for that fact.

Next Wednesday I'm privileged to be taking a Palace team to Old Trafford for the second time in little over two years. That's great news, both personally and for the club. Not only will it be great for me to return to my old haunts but our players are going to gain a lot from this opportunity of matching our abilities against one of the leading sides in the land.

Of course we realise the size of the task we are faced with — United beat Hull 5-0 at Old Trafford in the last round — but we promise we won't let the club down and we know we shall have a lot of supporters there again. In fact Old Trafford tell me that we're likely to take more fans north than some of the southern 1st Division sides. We'll do our best for you and we know you'll help us all you can.

This afternoon I bid a warm welcome to a former Manchester United colleague of mine, Lou Macari, and his Swindon players, officials and fans. Lou was tireless on behalf of United as a player — he's been equally so on behalf of Swindon Town and I'm delighted for him at the terrific success he has earned for the Wiltshire club, bringing them from nowhere in the 4th Division to the top of the 2nd Division. His Swindon outfit play hard and attacking football. The contrast in styles between our sides will be interesting and I'm sure it will be an enjoyable afternoon for the followers of both clubs.

#### A SINCERE APOLOGY

Misbehaviour among part of the crowd spoiled the enjoyment of some supporters at our last home game. Crystal Palace Football Club extends an apology to all genuine fans and offers a handsome inducement to any supporter who can help lead to the successful prosecution of those who cause disorder at Selhurst Park.

In spite of the weather our match against Millwall was a pretty good afternoon for football, but this fixture has always been and appears likely to continue to provide a

problem in the matter of crowd behaviour.

Sensible supporters naturally realize that even among an attendance of just over 10,000 it is quite impossible for the police and our own security officers and stewards to ensure a trouble free afternoon if there are people there who are determined to cause a disturbance in one way or another, by any means available.

For the reason Crystal Palace Football Club would like to extend a sincere apology to all genuine fans of both the Palace and Millwall for the behaviour of the hooligans who disrupted our enjoyment of the match between the two clubs a fortnight ago. The trouble they caused was particularly prevailent in the Arthur Wait section of the

ground.

The actions of this idiotic minority are deplored by the Directors, Management, Players and Staff of Crystal Palace and, we have no doubt, by all other clubs as well. Such behaviour poses a direct threat to the game itself and all that it stands for. The sooner that one hundred per cent of a football crowd are there solely to admire the skills and teamwork of two sides of professional sportsmen, the better for everyone, and for football itself.

There is no place and no sympathy whatever for hooligans at Selhurst Park — or at any other football ground — and as the announcement below proves, we are eager to prosecute anyone found to be misbehaving

here.

# Today come Welcome

# **SWINDON TOWN**

WINDON Town are back in the 2nd Division after an absence of 13 years (they were relegated, along with Crystal Palace in 1974) following the most dramatic excitement at the end of last season in which their fortunes swayed so greatly that the emotion of their players, officials and fans ran the whole gamut from abject despair to utter elation.

Having concluded the ordinary League programme in third place behind Bournemouth and Middlesbrough the Wiltshire club were committed to the newly inroduced Play-offs and found themselves two down at half-time in the first such game at Wigan. However a remarkable three-goals blitz in the second half took them back to the County Ground with a slender advantage and they were never in any difficulties in the home len.

difficulties in the home leg.

In the Play-off Final Town contained Gillingham at Priestfield Road — until the 81st minute and things looked bleak when they fell further behind on aggregate after 17 minutes at their own headquarters. But two goals in the last half hour took the tie to a replay here at Selhurst Park, and Swindon fans who were present (Palace weren't allowed to sell tickets locally) will never forget the drama of Steve White's very early, 2nd minute goal and his decisive 66th

#### minute strike which settled the outcome. SWINDON SWOOP

Early in the close season Swindon swooped

for Sheffield United's leading scorer Steve Foley. 25 year old Steve had joined the Blades from Grimsby in August 1985 and is a versatile player who can also appear in midfield or defence and he held a regular place in both the Mariners and Blades second division sides. His transfer fee was a matter of some contention and was ultimately fixed by League tribunal at £35,000

A further adroit summer signing was that of former tailor **Jon Gittens**, the big strong, coloured centre-half from Southampton at a fee, again set be the tribunal, of £40,000. Jon played a third of the Saints' League games last season but his opportunities were limited at The Dell and the move appeared to be a good one both for the player and for Swindon Town.

Then, just as the new season opened, The Robins signed Eire International Keiran O'Regan from Brighton. O'Regan is very much a utility player who can contribute to the game in midfield or at full-back and he quickly made a big impression at The County Ground.

#### THE ROBINS RECORD

The Robins record so far this season has been impressive, but arguably their best victories to date were their outstanding 3-1 defeats of 1st Division Portsmouth in both legs of the Littlewoods Cup, 2nd round. A Jimmy Quinn hat-trick at the County Ground, made up of two goals of supreme quality and a penalty, gave the Robins a tremendous first leg advantage, while at Fratton Park they held Portsmouth at bay at 1-1 for 84 minutes, then scored twice in the last six minutes to go through by an amazing 6-2 aggregate, leaving the 1st Division side and their fans utterly devastated.



There are a number of players for both clubs, but one, especially for Swindon supporters, stands out from the rest. Local lad DON ROGERS had joined Swindon straight from school and made his debut as a 17-year-old in 1962 and went on to make 400 League appearances for the Robins before his transfer to Crystal Palace in November 1972. Don was a two-footed outside-left who thrived on scoring spectacular goals such as those that beat Arsenal in the 1969 League Cup Final and this writer remembers his debut goal at Selhurst Park against Everton.

Despite his dramatic entrance to the First Division Don's goals were not enough and Palace were relegated in May 1973. Malcolm Allison was now manager and he tried to turn Don into a midfield player which did not really succeed, and in September 1974 he was transferred to Q.P.R., in exchange for lan Evans and Terry Venables, but his appearances were hampered by injuries. A return to Swindon came in 1976 and after a few more games in which he scored his 150th Leeague goal for the Robins, Don then took to coaching the youth side. Nowadays he has thriving sports and building businesses in Swindon and still takes an active part on match-days with the club.

It was a former Swindon manager BERT HEAD who had brought Don to Selhurst Park for £150,000 and other players Bert had earlier been with at Swindon who found their way to Crystal Palace under his management were forwards BOBBY WOODRUFF and CLIFF JACKSON, who were part of the 69 promotion team. Other players of recent years include midfield/defender TONY TAYLOR and forward TONY EVANS and earlier in the clubs histories are CECIL BLAKEMORE, STAN WILCOCKSON, LESLIE ROBERTS, BOB SHANKS, inside-forward MORRIS JONES and full-back GORDON McDONALD.

#### **LOU MACARI**

Lou Macari was born in Aberdeen but it was in the green hooped shirts of Glasgow Celtic that he came to the attention of Scottish and then British soccer fans as a tough, tenacious snapper-up of goal chances.

After making 56 Scottish League appearances

for the Celts and scoring 27 goals Lou joined Manchester United in mid-January 1973 for £200,000 at the instigation of Tommy Docherty, who was prepared to pay a record fee for a Scottish player to acquire the little man's talented services.

Whilst at Old Trafford Lou transferred his

Whilst at Old Trafford Lou transferred his attentions to the midfield areas of the park, made 329 Football League appearances, finding the net on 78 occasions, and played for The Reds in the 1976, 1977 and 1979 FA Cup Finals at Wembley along with our own Steve Coppell. He also became a regular choice for the full Scottish International side where he gained 24 full caps (plus two at Under 23 level), and was in the Scott 1978 Wald Cup and in Appendix Appendix Appendix Cup and Indian Company (plus 1978).

Scottish international side where he gained 24 full caps (plus two at Under-23 level), and was in the Scots 1978 World Cup squad in Argentina, When Lou left Old Trafford he received a testimonial game in May 1984 against his former club, Celtic, and over 40,000 fans turned out in appreciation of his endeavours for United. The receipt, over £80,000 represent a record for a testimonial match in this country. Mr. Marshi was appointed Manager at The

Mr Macari was appointed Manager at The County Ground, Swindon, in July 1984 – player-manager in fact, because Lou did make 36 League appearances for Swindon in the course of his first two seasons with the Wiltshire 'Robins'.

In 1985-86 Lou steered Swindon out of Division Acet machine in the course of his first two seasons.

In 1985-86 Lou steered Swindon out of Division 4 not merely as impressive Champions but with a record 102 points and he was obviously the only serious candidate for the Bells 4th Division Manager of the Season Award Immediately. Mr Macari took Swindon to third place in Division Three in 1986-87 and, after a play-off replay here at Selhurst Park, restored them to the frightful place in the 2nd Division.

Now the cynosure of several of the top clubs Lou aims to do even better, and there are very few pundits in the game who are prepared to state that the man who is never content with partial success when there are bigger prizes to be won will not eventually take Swindon Town

to the 1st Division.

FRASER DIGBY Born: Sheffield. The former Manchester United apprentice spent two loan periods at the County Ground before eventually joining the Club for a fee of £25,000 in December 1986. Fraser's outstanding displays last season not only helped Swindon Town to gain promotion for the second successive season but also helped him to gain England Under-21 honours. He had previously been capped at Schoolboy and Youth level. Age: 20.

NICKY HAMMOND Born: Essex. Signed on a free transfer from Arsenal in July 1987. The former Highbury club Keeper had a brief loan period with Bristol Rovers last season where he made his League debut against Blackpool on 27th September 1986 at Twerton Park. Nicky also spent loan periods with Scottish Club Aberdeen and with Peterborough United last campaign, without appearing in their senior team. Age: 19.

DAVE HOCKADAY Born: Billingham, the former Blackpool player moved to the County Ground in August 1983. After several seasons of appearing in midfield or as a winger the Billingham born player made the successful transition to full-back during Swindon Town's Fourth Division Championship winning season of 1985/86. Dave is one of only two players to remain on the County Ground staff from the day Lou Macari was appointed to the position of Team Manager in July 1984. An influential member of last season's promotion campaign from Division Three. The Town full-back should make his three hundreth League appearance in the early part of this season. Age: 29.

TERRY MERRIMAN Born: Oxford. The former Coventry City defender joined the County Ground staff in July 1987 on a free transfer. Terry, who had joined the Highfield Road Club as an apprentice, found his appearances limited to the "Sky Blues" Central League team last season. Terry is another newcomer to Swindon Town who will be eagerly looking to make his League debut this season. Age 19.

ALAN McLOUGHLIN Born: Manchester. The former Manchester United defender joined Swindon Town on a free transfer in July 1986. Alan did not appear in the Old Trafford club's League team and made his debut for Swindon Town against Newport County at Somerton Park on September 6th 1986 in a 2-2 draw. Alan in a versatile performer who can play in a variety of positions. He spent a period on loan to Torquay United last season. Age: 20.

PHIL KING Born: Bristol. The Bristol born full-back joined Swindon Town from Torquay United for a fee of £12,500 in March 1987. Phil quickly slotted into the Town defence and helped the Club to eventual promotion. The former Torquay defender had only been with the Plainmoor Club for a few months following his move from Devon neighbours Exeter City in July 1986. A Football League tribunal had settled the fee between the two Devon Clubs at £3,000. During his brief spell at Torquay Phil was the subject of interest from Tottenham Hotspur and he spent a brief spell training with the White Hart Lane Club. Age: 19.

TIM PARKIN Born: Penrith. Joined Swindon Town from Bristol Rovers in July 1986 for a Football League Tribunal settled fee of £27,500. The former Rovers stalwart eventually established himself in the Town defence and was prominent in helping the Club to promotion last season. Tim began his career with Blackburn Rovers before moving to the Continent for a brief spell with Swedish Club Malmo. On his return to the Football League with Bristol Rovers he proved to be a great favourite with the fans of the former Eastville Club. Age: 29.

COLIN CALDERWOOD Born: Stranzer. Stranzer born, Colin, had the distinction of captaining Swindon Town to promotion in consecutive seasons. It is a measure of the dedication and fitness of the former Mansfield Town defender that he has not

missed a single match for the Club since his £27,500 move in July 1985. Tipped by many to gain eventual honours with Scotland, Colin has often been the target for many of the leading clubs in both England and Scotland. After completing a century of League appearances for Mansfield Town. Colin is set to do likewise with the Wiltshire Club in the early part of this season. Age: 22.

JON GITTENS Born: Moseley. Jon moved to the County Ground in July 1987 and therefore became the fifth close season signing for Lou Macari. The former Southampton central defender cost Swondon Town £40,000 at a Fooball League Tribunal appeal. Jon had joined the First Division Club from non-League Birmingham club Paget Rangers. Jon first attracted the attention of Lou Macari when he gave a commanding display against lan Rush when the Welsh International was with Liverpool. Further impressive displays against Swindon Town for "the Saints" in last seasons Littlewoods Challenge Cup prompted the Town manager to move for the Saints defender. Age: 23.

CHRIS KAMARA Born: Middlesbrough. The Middlesbrough born player is now in his second spell at the County Ground, Chris rejoined the Club from Brentford in August 1985 for a fee of £12,500. His earlier spell with the Club came following a move from Portsmouth in July 1977. One of the few players to have appeared for two clubs in different spells. Chris rejoined the Fratton Park Club in 1981 although his second spell with "Pompey" was short lived. Chris, who celebrated his 400th League appearance last season againfst his home town club at Ayresome Park, was the driving force in the Town's midfield section as the Club moved into Division Two, Age: 29.

PETER COYNE Born: Manchester. Following some brilliant displays with England Schoolboys Peter joined Manchester United. His early promise declined after two appearances in the Old Trafford Clubs League line up and following a free transfer he drifted into non-League football. Peter eventually returned to League action wth Crewe Alexandra where he spent four seasons with the Gresty Road club. Another free transfer took him back to non-League soccer and it was from Hyde United in August 1984 that Lou Maceri signed Peter for £5,000. He probably played the best football of his career in the first half of the club's Fourth Division Championship winning season of 1985/86. Age: 29.

LEIGH BARNARD Born: Worsley. Leigh, along with Dave Hockaday, is one of the only Town players remaining from the squad of players who were at the County Ground before the arrival of Lou Macari in July 1984. Leigh was actually signed on a free transfer from Portsmouth in July 1982. A player with endless stamina, Leigh has now made nearly 200 League appearances for Swindon Town. Once had a loan spell with Exeter City and actually played for the Devon Club against Swindon Town! Age: 29.

CHARLIE HENRY Born: Acton. One of Swindon Town's most popular players over recent seasons. His natural enthusiasm for the game having won him many admirers. Charlie originally joined the Club as an apprentice. Capable of playing in a variety of positions. At the completion of the Town's Fourth Division Championship winning season of 1985/86 he was the club's leading goalscorer with 18 goals. Last season was more difficult for Charlie in Division Three as he struggled to recapture his form of the previous season. Another of The Town players close to completing a personal milestone for he is now approaching 200 League appearances. Charlie spent brief loan periods with Torquay United and Northampton Town last season. Age: 25.

MARK JONES Born: Berinsfield. Mark moved to the County Ground in October 1986 from Oxford United for a fee of £25,000. He joined the Manor Road ground club as















an apprentice and helped the meteoric rise of the Club to the First Division. Mark spent an initial loan period at the County Ground before his eventual signing. His non-stop running was a contributory factor in Lou Macari's decision to bring him to Swindon. Once again Mark proved to be as lucky an omen for Swindon Town as he had previously for Oxford United! Another season of promotion followed. Age: 25.

STEVE BERRY Born: Gosport, Joined the County Ground staff just before the transfer deadline of March 1987 from Newport County. A virus prevented Steve from making his debut for Swindon Town until the final League match of last season against Bristol City at Ashton Gate. Steve commenced his career as an apprentice with Portsmouth. He made 28 League appearances for the Fratton Park club before moving to the North East to join Sunderland in 1984. Steve appeared in the 1985 Milk Cup Final for the Roker Park Club against Norwich City at Wembley. Eventually Steve returned South joining South Wales club Newport County before leaving the Somerton Park outfit for Swindon Town. Age: 24.

STEVE FOLEY Born: Liverpool. Another of Lou Macari's close season captures. Steve moved South to join Swindon Town from Sheffield United in July 1987 for a Football League Tribunal fee of £35,000. The Liverpool born player began his career as an apprentice with Liverpool. Steve failed to make the Anfield club's League line up and actually made his League debut while on loan to Fulham. Eventually given a free transfer from Anfield he joined Grimsby Town in the close season of 1984, making 31 League appearances for the Blundell Park club. Once again given a free transfer he joined Sheffield United in July 1985. During two seasons with the Bramall Lane Club he made 55 League appearances. Steve finished last season as the Yorkshire side's leading goalscorer with 9 goals. Age: 24.

JOHN KELLY Born: Bebbington, John's move from Chester City for a £15,000 transfer fee in July 1987 was Lou Macari's first venture into the Summer transfer market in an attempt to strengthen his squad of players in preparation for the club's return to Second Division soccer. John had perviously spent his career with Tranmere Rovers before making eventual moves to Preston North End for a fee of £35,000 and then to Chester City, John was much sought after during the Summer months receiving approaches from Bristol City, Wigan Athletic and Port Vale before deciding to settle for the County Ground, Age: 24.

JIMMY QUINN Born: Belfast. The Northern Ireland International rejoined Swindon Town from Blackburn Rovers in Dedember 1986 for a fee of £50,000. Jim had originally joined Swindon Town from Oswestry Town in 1982. The tall striker had made 49 League appearances in his first spell at the County Ground before moving North to join the Ewood Park Club in a £32,000 transfer deal. Ironically it was the first of Lou Macari's transfer deals for Swindon Town. Jim scored 9 goals in last season's successful promotion bid. Age: 27.

DAVE BAMBER Born: St. Helens. The much travelled striker has probably produced the best soccer of his career with Swindon Town following his move from Portsmouth in March 1986. Dave had previously spent a loan period with the club prior to his E12,500 move. Few would guestion that he has played a prominent role in the County Ground club's successive seasons of promotion. Dave began his career with Blackpool and his early promise attracted the attention of First Division Coventy City where he moved in 1983. Subsequent moves to Walsall and Portsmouth were a prolude to his eventual move to Swindon Town. A maker and taker of goals, he could be a key factor in the club's hopes for consolidation this season. Dave Scored 19 League and Cup goals last campaign. Age: 28.

STEVE WHITE Born: Chipping Sodbury, Incredibly allowed to join swindon Town on a free transfer from Bristol Rovers in July 1986. What a signing he proved to be for the Club as he headed both the League and Football Combination goalscoring charts for the 1986/87 season. The Chipping Sodbury born striker had two spells with Bristol Rovers where he began his League career. Steve left Rovers after his first spell in a £200,000 move to Luton Town. He eventually rejoined Rovers in August 1983 from Charlton Athletic. Steve wrote his way into the Wiltshire club's history when his two goals gave Swindon Town that vital 2-0 win against Gillingham at Selhurst Park, Crystal Palace on May 29th 1987 and ensured their passage into the Second Division this season. Age: 28.

BRYAN WADE Born: Bolton, Plucked from the virtual obscurity of non-League soccer with Southern League Trowbridge Town for a nominal fee in the Summer of 1985. Bryan had previously had a spell with Bath City following his rejection after trials with Manchester City. A strong and powerful player with pace he often causes defenders problems with his forceful play. Bryan Scored many crucial goals in Swindon Town's consecutive seasons of promotion.

KIERAN O'REGAN Born: Cork. The Republic of Ireland Under-21 international joined the Club in August 1987 on a free transfer from Brighton and Hove Albion. Kieran, 24, made his debut for Swindon Town in the First Round of the Littlewoods Challenge Cup Competition on August 18th 1987 against Bristol City. Kieran made 86 League appearances for Brighton after his signing from Tranmore Athletic.



full-backs, Jack Little and 'Dusty Rhodes', played their 100th consecutive game together (including Cup ties and Friendlies) - still a club record.

Manager Edmund Goodman signed a deputy goalkeeper from WBA who was later to become a Palace manager himself – George Irwin.

The great if diminutive Albert Harry joined Palace from Kingstonian during 1921-22. He made the first of his 410 League appearances at centre-forward when Bury were our vistors at The Next on March 25th 1922, and scored a brace

On April 1st 1922 two Palace players were on opposite sides in the N. Ireland Wales international (1-1) played at Belfast. Roy McCracken was in the Irish side while 'Tom' Jones was at number five for Wales.

Palace reached the Final of the London Challenge Cup for the third time running but surrendered the trophy to Arsenal who beat us by the only goal of the game.

Assessment of 1921-22

The Palace had done well enough to finish their first season in Division 2 in mid-table, and the fullest credit was due to Mr Goodman and his players.

Palace's defensive record of conceding only 34 League goals remained the club's best in the Football League until 1978/79 and has only been improved upon that once. Similarly, the 3rd Division Championship of 1921 remained the Glaziers/Eagles only such honour till we won the 2nd Division in

As well as winning the 3rd Division Championship the Palace also won the London Challenge Cup, beating Clapton Orient by a John Conner goal in the Final at White Hart Lane.

Assessment of 1920-21. To become the first champions of Division Three was a splendid performance by Mr Edmund Goodman and his team - and it was achieved without the considerable assistance of our Irish International wing-half, Roy McCracken. Roy sustained a badly broken leg in our home game against Swansea in mid-December and was unable to play again for the rest of the season.





# CLUB CHATTER

#### TAFFS JUNIOR TIPS No. 3

lan Evans continues his series of tips for Junior Eagles. Today he looks at the forward unit and in particular the 'third man run'

The game today is in the main played in a small area twenty yards either side of the halfway line. This is caused because defences are now schooled to push further and further forward. To break beyond the defenders is now becoming all important.

It is therefore very necessary to know (i) How (ii) Where and (iii) When make the all important run. Anticipation is a very vital factor in this particular facet of the game. Much practice should be put into what we term the 'Third Man Run' and when you visit a professional match you should be able to recognise the different types of run being made.

The diagrams illustrate three different forms of the 'Third Man Run'. Diagram (1) Geoff Thomas passes

the ball forward diagonally to Mark

Bright. Mark lays the ball back to Andy Gray who hits a ball past the defence for Neal Redfearn (who is classed as the 'Third Man') to make a well judged run, collect and then have the option of shooting or crossing the ball; the timing of the passes and Neil's run are all important.

Diagram (2) Illustrates well the diagonal nature of the passes with Geoff Thomas both starting and being in a position to finish the move.

Diagram (3) Ian Wright 'bends his run' American Football style to confuse opposition once again the 'Third Man Run' situation is evident.


So what you have to do is recognise the 'Third Man Run', practice it and put it into action. Remember do not run forward straight — bend your run and hit diagonal balls — and watch the offside.




