

Fred along with Mick Murry run a school of excellence every Thursday evening at the Fox Hollies Leisure Centre. Mick is the man who scouts the schools and Sunday Leagues looking for potential.

Here is the line-up of City youngsters waiting in the wings hoping they will one day make the big time with Blues...

Tony Elliott (Birmingham). Aged seventeen, a full-time professional, who came to Blues via Bobby Robson's School of Excellence. He is the current England Under-19 'keeper who is building a reputation as a shot stopper. Follows on in the Birmingham City tradition of finding great goalkeepers.

Jason Lowe (Stourbridge).

Aged seventeen, a product of the youth training scheme. Played his first game last Saturday since breaking his leg in the pre-season friendly at Highgate. Plays right back who is a tough tackler.

Paul Masefield (Birmingham). Aged sixteen, a youth training scheme utility defender who can play bull-back or centre-back. He is a big lad with good ball control who joined the club during the summer.

Gavin Jones (Tamworth). Aged seventeen, a youth training scheme left-back in his second year with the club who came through Mick Murrys ranks.

Jeremey Healey (Sutton Coldfield). Aged sixteen, a youth training scheme left full-back who likes to get forward at every opportunity.

lan Clarkson (Birmingham). Aged sixteen, a youth training scheme promising central defender, who works hard at his game and is very quick.

Matthew Fox (Birmingham). Aged sixteen, a strong youth training scheme defender



who plays along side lan Clarkson and is the one who wins the ball.

Micky Burton (Birmingham). Aged seventeen, a member of the youth training scheme who plays wide on the right. Has good vision and two good feet.

Andy Rolfe (Birmingham). Aged seventeen, a hard working youth training scheme midfielder who's a bit on the small side but makes up for it with strong running and aggression.


Dean Peer (Stourbridge).
Aged seventeen, this full-time professional has already played a handfull of games for the first team, and is definitely one for the future.

Mark Yates (Stourbridge). Aged seventeen, who is joint top scorer with Simon Sturridge. A member of the youth training scheme who is and allround, whole-hearted player and gives everything. He is prepared to play in any position

to get into the team. A good competitor.

Paul Tate (Birmingham). Aged-sixteen, tall, slightly built lad who oozes ability. A member of the youth training scheme who has scored eleven goals and has potential to go all the way in the game.

FRANK MITCHELL-REMEMBERED

Frank Mitchell, born at Goulburn, New South Wales, Australia, on 3rd June 1922, was a stylish and constructive defender, equally at home in the full-back or wing half positions.

His career was delayed by the Second World War but he still managed to appear in more than 300 competitive games between 1945 and 1957.

Particularly adept in his use of the long ball, swung across the field, which he directed almost inch-perfect, Mitchell was never seemingly under pressure. He held his position splendidly, was never flustered and always gave 100% effort.

Standing 5 ft 11 in tall and tipping the scales at 12 st 12 lb, Mitchell was a solidly-built player, always holding his own and he tackled hard and true, hardly ever relying on the robust approach.

As a youngster he was on amateur forms with Coventry City (1938-43) and he joined the St. Andrew's staff in 1943 after having earlier 'guested' for the club during season 1942-43, making 11 appearances. He made 60 appearances for Blues during the hostilities and then proceeded to accumulate a further 106 (in League and F.A. Cup competitions) before transferring to Chelsea in January 1949.

He spent a little over three seasons at Stamford Bridge, making 85 appearances and scoring one goal, and was then 'sold' to Watford (August 1952) for a small fee, this after losing his place in Chelsea's senior side to Billy Dickson.

At Vicarage Road he continued to do well and added another 207 appearances to his overall tally, up to May 1957, when he called it a day and retired from top-class football.

When Blues reached the Semi-Final stage of the F.A. Cup in season 1945-46, Mitchell was part of that wonderful team when, of course, Blues also won the

League (South) Championship. Harold Bodle, Don Dearson, Neil Dougall, Ted Duckhouse, George Edwards, Fred Harris, Dennis Jennings, Wilson Jones, Gil Merrick, Jock Mulraney and Arthur Turner were the other members of that wonderful team of 40 years ago.

Wing-half was by far Mitchell's best position—he always said that—yet he was also a pretty useful cricketer and during the 1940's, being a lower order right-hand bat and medium right-arm off-break bowler. He played 17 county matches for Warwickshire, having 29 innings for an average of 8.29 (highest score: 43). His bowling anaylsis was 22 wickets for an average of 38.90, with a best return of 4-69. He also played a game or two for Cornwall after retiring from football in 1957.

Frank Rawlinson Mitchell died on 4th April 1984, at the age of 63.

SWINDON

Swindon Town have never been in the First Division...but prior to the start of this current season, their manager Lou Macari, the former Celtic, Manchester United and Scottish international, insisted that his priority was to aim for promotion, and try and bring the top clubs to the County Ground on a regular basis.

During the opening games of 1987-88 Swindon were up with the leading clubs in Division Two, and their overall performances were regarded as being 'professional, methodical' and above all, entertaining, with the emphasis on scoring goals.

Macari, along with so many others manager in the game, believes in attacking football. Goals win matches, we all know that, and the Swindonboss, himself a scorer of fair means as well as being a creator, inchief, loves to get players going forward in search of strikepower.

When Macari took over the managerial hot-seat at Swindon, the 'Robins' were in the Fourth Division. He knew there was potential there and he immediately set about the challenge of getting Swindon Town into contention for honours. This he has done splendidly, but he's not finished yet!

There is still a long way to go before this 1987-88 season ends, and a lot more points are there to be won; Macari, and Swindon Town will be aiming to collect as many as they can, in a bold and brave effort to finish on a high note, perhaps in the promotion play-offs, which is how they regained their Second Division status at the end of last term.

They had been out of the limelight

(that is out of Division Two) for twelve years, and it had been the first time in their 106 year history that they had tasted Fourth Division football when Macari first took over the reins.

A professional club since 1894, Swindon were, for many years, prominent members of the 'old' Southern League, and were duly elected to the Football League Division Three in 1920, transferring to the Southern section the following year.

Since then they have fluctuated in the three 'lower' Divisions, spending spells in Division Two from 1963 to 1965 and from 1969 to 1974.

Their most successful season, in terms of success, was in 1969 when the 'Robins' beat 'mighty' Arsenal in the League Cup Final at Wembley, when, inspired by Don Rogers, they knocked over the 'Gunners' 3-1 in a classic encounter on a heavy pitch. A year later they triumphed in the Anglo-Italian Tournament, which is now confined to non-League clubs.

Swindon Town of 1987-88 have the following players available for selection, and whoever Macari chooses to pull on the red jersey this afternoon, you can be sure that he will give 100 per cent (and more) for this friendly, family club...

FRASER DIGBY (goalkeper). Aged twenty, England Youth and Under-21 international, who has been on loan to Manchester United and Oldham Athletic, and cost Swindon £30,000 two years ago.

JON GITTENS (defender). Aged nineteen, signed from Southampton at the start of this season, and a player who is still seeking to establish himself in the first team.

PHIL KING (defender). Twenty last week, a Bristolian, who has served Exeter City and Torquay United and was a key figure during the second-half of Swindon's promotion challenge last season.

TIM PARKIN (defender). Aged thirty, the 'Robins' centre-half who has been in the game fourteen years, having served Blackburn Rovers, Malmö FF, Almondsbury Greenway and Bristol Rovers, before joining Swindon last season. He made almost 250 appearances for Bristol Rovers.

JOHN KELLY (midfield). Aged twenty-seven, former Tranmere Rovers, Chester City and Preston North End player who has now topped 300 senior appearances in his career. He joined Swindon last August.

CHRIS KAMARA (midfield). Aged thirty, in his second spell at Swindon, having also played for Portsmouth (two periods) and Brentford. Has been in League soccer thirteen years and to date has amassed 550 appearances and has scored almost eighty goals. Stands 6' 1" and weighs 12 st 2lb.

PETER COYNE (forward). Aged twenty-nine, former England schoolboy international who has played, in turn, for Manchester United, Ashton United, Crewe Alexandra (147 appearances, 49 goals), Hyde United, and of course Swindon (1984-to date), and has now totted up over 150 appearances for the 'Robins'.

DAVE BAMBER (forward). Aged twenty-eight, 6' 3," 13st 6lb striker, who has been around a bit, scoring consistently for Blackpool (thirty-six goals). Coventry City, Walsall, Portsmouth and Swindon, who he joined two seasons ago.

JIMMY QUINN (striker). Twentyeight later this month, a Northern Ireland international (thirteen caps) who bagan with Oswestry, moved to

Swindon (twelve goals in fifty-eight games first time round), then on to Blackburn Rovers (twenty-three in eighty-two outings) before returning to Swindon last season.

CHARLIE HENRY (midfield).

Aged twenty-five, one of the club's longest-serving players who has now

longest-serving players who has now made 250 appearances for Swindon. Has also been on loan to Northampton Town and Torquay United.

LEIGH BERNARD (midfield).

Aged twenty-nine from Worsley, who has served Portsmouth, Peterborough United and Exeter City, as well as Swindon, during his twelve years

career which has seen him accumulate over 350 senior appearances, biggest part of them for the 'Robins.

COLIN CALDERWOOD


(defender/midfield). Aged twentytwo, club captain, a Scot from Stranraer who played 117 games for Mansfield Town before joining Swindon for £27,500 in 1985. Has now had more than 150 outings for the 'Robins'.

STEVE FOLEY (midfield). Aged twenty-five, signed from Sheffield United five months ago. Began with Liverpool, moved to Fulham (on loan) and then to Grimsby Town before United. Had a League record of sixteen goals in 100 games at the start of 1987-88.

KEIRAN O'REAGAN (defender).

Aged twenty, taken on as a full-time professional only this season, and held the number two slot for the opening fixtures.

steve berry (forward). Aged twenty-four, also a competitive midfielder who has been with Portsmouth, Newport County, and Sunderland, and to date has chalked up in excess of 175 senior appearances for his four clubs.

BLUES MEINS

He Played for Both Clubs

Wing-half Stan Harland, a Liverpuddlian, appeared in 472 League matches between 1961 and 1973, including 237 for Swindon Town and 38 for Blues.

Born on 19th June 1940, he joined New Brighton on leaving school in 1956 and later switched to Everton. Sadly, he never broke into Everton's first team and in June 1961 was transferred to Bradford City.

With the Valley Paraders he amassed 120 League outings (scoring 20 goals) and after three years in Yorkshire he switched north to join Carlisle United in 1964.

With the Cumbrians he added a further 77 League appearances to his total (seven goals) and in August 1966 he teamed up with Swindon Town, where he was to stay—and play—for five and a half years, helping the Robins win the League Cup in 1969 and the Anglo-Italian Cup a year later, each time as skipper. He also steered Swindon to promotion from the Third Division in 1970.

Stan became a 'Brummie' in December 1971 and helped steer Blues back into the First Division in 1971-72. He retired from the top-class game in 1973 through injury but continued to play occasionally in minor football and in various Charity matches for a number of years after.

Blues v Swindon Town—Match Facts

Blues, at present, have a 100 per cent record against Swindon Town—three wins from three games, which were all played inside 26 months (1969-72) all in the Second Division.

Of the seven previous League encounters Blues have achieved five victories, Swindon one with the other game drawn.

In November 1969 a crowd of 28,167 at St. Andrew's saw Blues win 2–0, Bert Murray and Geoff Vowden the scorers, and there was a turnout of 20,835 at the County Ground for the return fixture in March when Swindon won 4–1, Don Rogers 2, Butler and Horsfield hitting the target with Phil Summerill replying for Blues.

The following season Blues 'doubled-up' over the Robins, winning both games 2-1.

At St. Andrew's in October 18,502 fans saw Johnny Vincent and Dave Robinson bridge the Swindon 'gap' and two strikes from Trevor Francis enabled Blues to collect the points in the away game in February which attracted a near 20,000 gate.

Blues were promoted from Division Two in 1971-72 and 'en route' back into the top flight they whipped Swindon 4-1 at home and earned a point from a 1-1 draw at The County ground.

A crowd of 27,824 witnessed that four-goal romp when Francis, Bob Latchford (2) and Bob Hatton found the net with Horsfield grabbing a consolation goal for the visitors. And at Swindon, Horsfield and Latchford

were on target in front of a 14,024 audience.

Earlier this season Ian Handysides and Steve Whitton scored to give Blues a 2-0 win down in Wiltshire, and this afternoon another 'double' could be on the cards for the Brummies. We hope so anyway.

★ Former Blues goalkeeper Mark Prudhoe, has joined Carlisle United on a month's loan from Walsall. It will be Prudhoe's eighth League club during a career which began seven years ago with Sunderland, and since then he has served, in turn, Hartlepool United, Blues, Walsall, Doncaster Rovers, Sheffield Wednesday, Grimsby Town, Walsall (for a second spell) and now Carlisle.

★ Kevin Dillon, who appeared in 209 competitive games for Blues (1976-78) was sent-off twice in three weeks while playing for Portsmouth earlier this month.





Looking Back...to 5th January 1957

The draw for the Third Round of the FA | Cup in 1956-57 paired Blues with Carlisle United, then members of the Third Division (North). Blues, beaten finalists in that 1956 FA Cup Final with Manchester City, wanted desperately to start off with all

guns firing in this season's competition but they trekked north to Brunton Park not kidding themselves that they would have an easy passage into the next round.

On the day, Brunton Park was packed to capacity with a record 27,500 crowd eased inside. And those present saw a quite brilliant, all-action ninety minutes which produced six goals and a dozen near misses.

The rain lashed down incessantly and the pitch was nothing more than a quagmire, which perhaps suited the under-dogs Carlisle. Blues, however,

adapted themselves to the atrocious conditions expertly and this certainly made the tie a cracker.

Blues went off like a bomb, and inside three minutes had created two chances. Carlisle defended stubbornly and they hit back with persistence and grim determination, Blues' 'keeper Gil Merrick having to save magnificently from Ivor Broadis, the former England international, who had played alongside Merrick in many internationals of the early 1950's.

The first goal arrived on 22 minutes, and it was Peter 'Spud' Murphy who broke the deadlock, heading home Alex Govan's corner to edge Blues in front. Carlisle, battling like soldiers, fought back and on 47 minutes they equalised, Alf Ackerman sending a brilliant header past the diving Merrick following a free-kick 20 yards out.

> A minute later Garvie was put clear by Mooney but he fluffed the simplest of chances by firing wide of the flatfooted Blues' keeper. Within five minutes Blues had made Carlisle pay for that miss when Gordon Astall restored their lead and three minutes later it was 3-1 when Murphy flashed in Noel Kinsey's pass with sweet aplomb.

But, roared on by the supporters, Carlisle launched a

magnificent fightback and that man Ackerman completed his hat-trick with two terrific goals in the space of four minutes at the

death, netting a powerful header and a ferocious shot to earn the underdogs a replay, they so richly deserved.

 The replay, at St. Andrew's on 8th January, drew a 56,000 crowd. It was the first 'floodlit cup-tie' on the ground, and Blues won in style by 4-0, Astall, Kinsey and Brown 2, sinking the Cumbrian battlers.



VIEWPOINT

A Happy New Year to both my readers—and everyone else, too. Let's hope we will all have more to smile about in 1988.

We would all help ourselves by being more positive and optimistic. Ask any American how he is and he will invariably answer 'fine' or 'great'. Here, even a raging optimist can hardly force himself to mumble 'not so bad'.

So my personal New Year's Resolution is to be on the sunny side of the street as often as possible. If I am feeling a little low, I will think of something which I know will make me smile.

Like the day a Blues manager solemnly told me he was not retaining a certain goalkeeper because: "His reflections aren't fast enough."

That was years ago, though all us scribes have experience of assault and battery on the English language by some of the people we interview and, of course, we are often guilty ourselves of the same crime.

The most amusing comment of '87 for me came relatively early in the year; the day when Walsall had an F.A. Cup-tie date with Watford at Fellows Park.

It was a bitterly cold Saturday afternoon and I was grateful to be indoors following the action by proxy, as it were...watching *Grandstand* on TV with the sound turned down, and listening to local radio at the same time.

The BBC's Radio WM commentator was warbling away on his warm-up before the kick-off in arctic conditions. He clearly was feeling the pinch where it hurt most, so it was hardly surprising he went waffling on about the weather.

In fact, when the teams ran out he pounced on the fact that John Barnes was wearing gloves – which gave me, and presumably all the other listeners an instant mental picture of the conditions.

But when Jim Barron, a former Wolves Assistant Manager and the other half of that days commentary team, drily observed: "Yes, it's very cold, and I can understand Barnes using gloves. But why is he wearing a short-sleeved shirt?"

Football needs humour particularly now, with so much at stake for the players and a general public fully aware of increasing players earnings and admission charges, less ready to forgive mistakes, pressure to win almost at any cost is getting out of hand.

Referees can, and do, make mistakes. The wonder is that they make so few controlling the current 100 miles an hour playing pattern. If only, like us, they could officiate by watching aTV screen with the benefit of near total vision and instant replays, they would be as faultless as those who are so ready to criticise.

Joe Public, of course, sees things differently. He wonders why footballers paid a fortune, make mistakes at all, and thinks how lucky they are to be so handsomely rewarded for doing something they would do for nothing anyway.

But not all footballers are paid a fortune. Those who are fighting to maintain their high earnings; those who aren't have the fear of the insecurity which is part and parcel of a players career. There is so much risk it might explain why there is so much dissent, and so many more players being ordered off.

A lot more tolerance and self-discipline all round will be more than welcome this year – from the public, the players, the referees, the managers, the directors – and the media.

The late, great Bill Shankly, when asked whether a Liverpool win was a matter of life or death, replied: "No-it's more important than that." He wasn't joking. And for once in his life, he was wrong. MARTIN RUSSELL

TACTICAL AWARENESS

In a ninety minute game of football, the ball is likely to be in play for only sixty minutes. In an evenly fought contest, each team will be in possession for thirty minutes. Each individual player will have about three minutes with the ball and fifty-seven minutes without it.

Those three minutes in possession are the key to team selection for the alert and sensible Team Manager. Players must produce consistently in terms of good first touch, range of techniques available, effective passing, accurate finishing and aggressive running with the ball. Tactically, it is essential that each player selected is confident in his ability on the ball so that he can produce consistently and effectively without the stress that stems from anxiety. Being aware, the Team Manager will select the best players he can and sharpen up their techniques. He will attempt to let his players operate in those areas of the field most suited to their ability on the ball.

Factors such as left- and right-sided, good crosser of the ball, good striker of the ball and good passer of the ball will all affect his team selection. But what about those fifty-seven minutes without the ball? Surely, that long period of the game must be taken into consideration of tactical awareness.

Even Glen Hoddle will be expected to take his share of pressurising,

funnelling-back and supporting other defenders in order to win the ball, and then spread out in order to create time and space in attack. Team Managers who are successful, learn from their hard-earned experience what will and will not succeed. They play the percentages and try to get the best performance out of each of their players. Their concern is less about 4-4-2, 4-3-3 or 4-2-1 and more about effectiveness during the game.

Football is a game of opposites and a tactically aware Team Manager thinks in terms of opposites. When the opposition have the ball, we must defend by taking up positions which make it difficult for them to attack. When we have the ball, we must attack by taking up positions which will make it more likely for us to score.

The percentage in such simple tactics is that the players in a team are more likely to understand what is required of them for fifty-seven minutes of the game. They will need to be physically fit and mentally alert in order to work both as individuals and as a team.

Keep it simple, aim for opposites, select the best possible players, play the percentages and aim to occupy all outfield players in both attack and defence—those are the main factors in tactical awareness. Applying them for sixty minutes in a game may still not be enough, however, because (fortunately) one good player can upset any of the best laid plans.


