

#### Ron Ashman

One of the greatest names in Canary history, of course, with all manner of proud records and memories of 22 glorious years with the club.

His 662 appearances (56 goals) have been beaten only by Kevin Keelan and it is remarkable how similar his Canary progress has been, compared to that of our present manager Dave Stringer.

Like Dave, Ron progressed to the City coaching staff after he finished playing. Like Dave he was made acting manager and like Dave his appointment was confirmed around Christmas.

He was manager for three years before moving on to Scunthorpe with whom he had two spells as manager with a two-year stint at Grimsby in between.

He says: "I remember Dave as a good young full-back who perhaps lacked only confidence in his own ability. But he was a fine young man and I was delighted to hear that he has been made manager.

"He has been a loyal club servant and there are not too many of them these days. Please pass on my very best wishes to him for a long and happy time in charge."

Ron now 61, runs his own travel agency in Scunthorpe called Ron Ashman Travel and employs six people — as well as his hard-working wife!

He especially remembers, of course, THE run of 1959 and winning promotion to the Second Division soon after. He doesn't see too much football nowadays, although he's an occasional visitor to Scunthorpe, but is looking forward to seeing City play again quite soon.

### Welcome to ...

A warm welcome to Swindon Town on their first visit to Carrow Road in 16 years, when we met in Division 2 action.

Tonight's replay sees them here on F.A. Cup duty for only the second time — and it would be great to think that things could turn out as they did on that occasion.

An Errol Crossan goal in 1958 saw us go on to reach the semi-finals in that memorable run when we were a Third Division side.

Tonight Lou Macari brings his Second Division side to East Anglia hoping to go one better than their drawn performance at the County Ground on Saturday.

This is the squad on whom he is pinning his faith.

FRASER DIGBY (Goalkeeper). The former Manchester United apprentice spent two loan periods at the County Ground before eventually joining the Club for a fee of £25,000 in December 1986. England Under-21 honours and previously capped at schoolboy and youth level.

NICKY HAMMOND (Goalkeeper). Signed on a free transfer from Arsenal in July 1987 after a brief loan period with Bristol Rovers last season where he made his League debut against Blackpool.

DAVE HOCKADAY (Defender). The former Blackpool player moved to the County Ground in August 1983. After several seasons of appearing in midfield or as a winger the Billingham born player made the successful transition to full-back during Swindon Town's Fourth Division championship winning season of 1985/86. Dave is one of only two players to remain on the County Ground staff from the day Lou Macari was appointed.

TERRY MERRIMAN (Defender). The former Coventry City defender joined the County Ground staff in July 1987 on a free transfer. ALAN McLOUGHLIN (Defender). The former Mancflester United defender joined Swindon Town on a free transfer in July 1986. Made his debut for Swindon against Newport County. Alan is a versatile performer who can play in a variety of positions.

PHIL KING (Defender). The Bristol born

full-back joined Swindon Town from Torquay United for a fee of £12,500 in March 1987. Phil quickly slotted into the Town defence and helped the club to eventual promotion. Had only been at Plainmoor for a few months following his move from Devon neighbours Exeter City in July 1986. A Football League tribunal had settled the fee between the two Devon clubs at £3.000.

TIM PARKIN (Defender). Joined Swindon from Bristol Rovers in July 1985 for a tribunal fee of £27,000. Tim began his career with Blackburn Rovers before moving to the Continent for a brief spell with Swedish club Malmo.

It is a measure of the dedication and fitness of the former Mansfield Town defender that he has not missed a single match for the club since his £27,500 in July 1985.

JON GITTENS (Defender). Jon moved to the County Ground in July 1987 and therefore became the fifth close season signing for Lou Macari. The former Southampton central defender cost Swindon £40,000 at a Football League Tribunal appeal. Jon had joined the First Division club from non-League Birmingham club Paget Rangers.

CHRIS KAMARA (Midfield). The Middlesbrough born player is now in his second spell at the County Ground, Chris rejoined the club from Brentford in August 1985 for a fee of £12,500. His earlier spell with the club came following a move from Portsmouth in July 1977.

PETER COYNE (Midfield). Following some brilliant displays with England Schoolboys Peter joined Manchester United. His early promise declined after two appearances in the Old Trafford clubs League line up and following a free transfer he drifted into non-League football. Peter eventually returned to League action with Crewe where he spent four seasons. Another free transfer took him back to non-League soccer and it was from Hyde United in August 1984 that Lou



Shortly after that Wimbledon let him go and then Q.P.R. manager Tommy Docherty came in to sign him on as an apprentice.


The Doc was sacked a fortnight later — but Graham insists it had nothing to do with him!

Then it was Terry Venables who


signed him on full professional forms, although Graham only played once — an F.A. Cup tie against West Brom — before moving to Norwich, initially on loan and then on a full-time basis.






