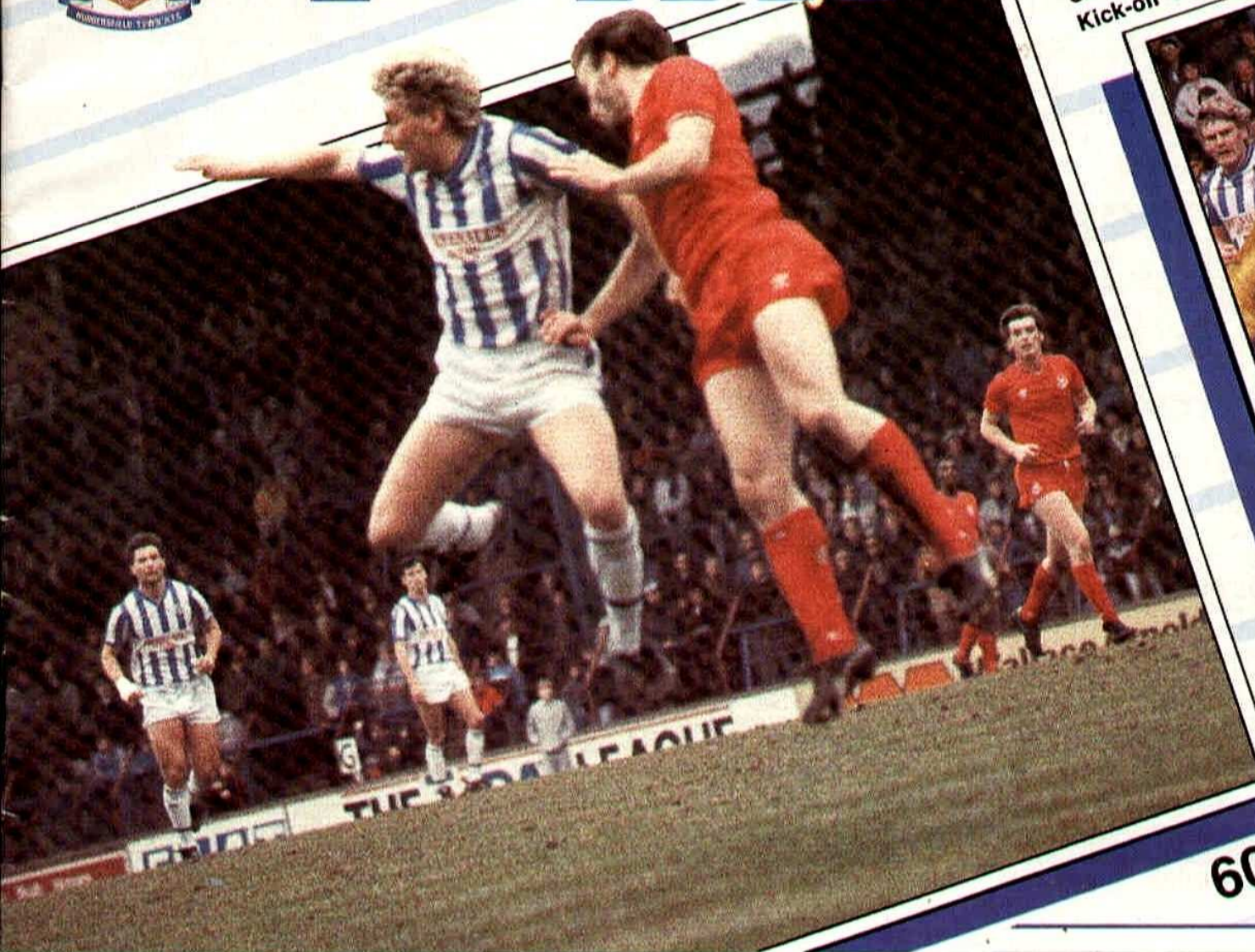




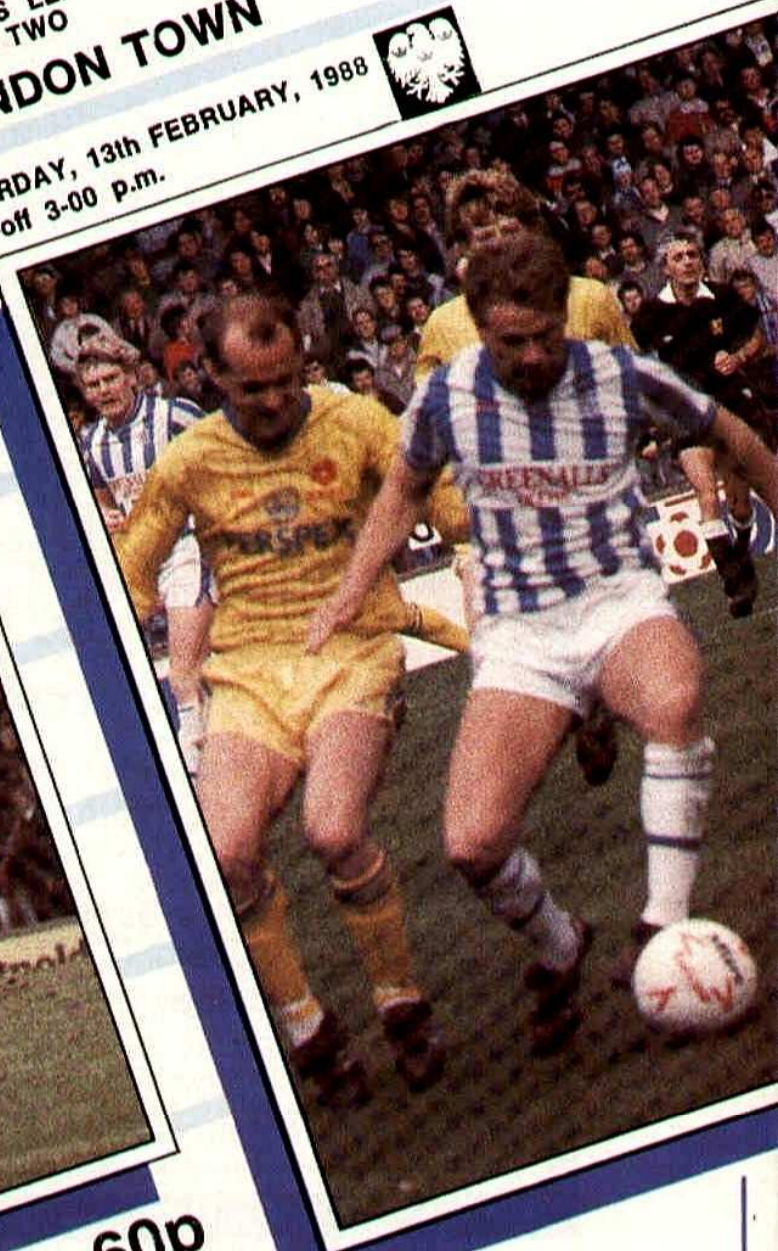

My fears were not slight at the prospect of only one League match in a month. It was a time for fellow-strugglers to leave us with an almost insurmountable gap to close.

When snow fell heavily enough to postpone that one and only game against Oldham those fears increased.

Bradford City didn't help our cause by tanning the rears of Oxford United in the F.A. Cup causing yet another gap to open up.

But all in all, as we prepare for the Swindon match, we don't seem to have been dealt as severe a blow as could have been.

I firmly believe that our fate is still very much in our own hands. Fifteen matches remain, six away, but more importantly nine at home, starting today with one of the toughest of those nine.

We have most of the bottom sides to entertain at Leeds Road, so realistically we have six 'six pointers' with the balance tilted in our favour.

It is the least that can be expected and offered. Our destiny is very much in our hands, and the right response to the challenges ahead I am sure can retrieve what appears to be a dire situation.

I welcome all from Swindon to this afternoon's game and in particular that great competitor Lou Macari. Lou has done wonders at the County Ground. Apart from this afternoon I wish him well in his efforts.

Ten teams from Barclays League Division Two contested the Fourth Round of the F.A. Cup recently and six teams were eliminated from the competition. The only club outside the top two divisions still battling away is lowly Third Division club Port Vale who provided the shock of the tournament so far with their 2-1 disposal of Tottenham Hotspur.

MIDDLESBROUGH, of course, were the last Second Division club to leave the competition. Boro' did well in the first game when they visited Goodison Park and it was a memorable return for ex-Everton players Bruce Rioch and Colin Todd, manager and coach respectively of the Second Division visitors. Everton failed to produce their mid-week form which had seen them win away at Sheffield Wednesday 5-0, and Paul Kerr scored the visitors' equaliser which ensured the return at Ayresome Park. And what a thriller it turned out to be with first one team being denied victory in injury time and then the other being similarly thwarted in injury time of extra time. Everton's Dave Watson broke the deadlock after 67 minutes but Middlesbrough's captain Tony Mowbray headed the equaliser just before the whistle of normal time. The 25,235 spectators were treated to a Boro lead from substitute Alan Kernaghan and it looked almost certain that the other Merseyside team would be

visiting Ayresome Park in the next round, that is until Trevor Steven snatched the sensational equaliser seconds from the end of extra time. Unfortunately, fate was against Boro' in the second replay.

BRADFORD CITY had no such problems against First Division opposition as Oxford United became the fourth team from the top flight to be defeated by the Bantams in cup competitions this season. Having beaten Charlton in the Littlewoods Cup and Southampton and Newcastle in the Simod Cup it was no surprise to City supporters that anyone playing at Valley Parade this season will need an exceptional performance to force victory. New signing from Portsmouth, Mick Kennedy, gave an influential midfield performance and opened the scoring with a ninth minute penalty and Stuart McCall and Dave Evans made it 3-0 without reply as early as the 32nd minute. Although Oxford twice reduced the arrears John Hendrie soon restored a two goal winning margin which was retained to the whistle.

MANCHESTER CITY scored an injury time equaliser at Leeds Road against HUDDERSFIELD TOWN before progressing through to a meeting with Blackpool, and history repeated itself as Paul Lake scrambled the injury time equaliser at Bloomfield Road to keep City's Cup hopes alive. In the Maine Road replay ex-Blackpool striker Paul Stewart opened the scoring with a glancing header, his 22nd of the season, but after John Deary had equalised Stewart himself shot wide from the penalty spot. Paul Simpson scored what proved to be the winner through a crowded goalmouth.

PLYMOUTH ARGYLE in the next round, Argyle narrowly winning their home all-Second Division clash against opponents SHREWSBURY TOWN. Stewart Evans scored the all-important goal in the 14th minute at Home Park.

BIRMINGHAM CITY were without a Barclays League win in their previous eight games and they were not expected to have much chance at Oakwell against an improved BARNSELEY side, especially as the visitors had three key strikers missing. City took an early lead however through Tony Rees who latched on to a weak back-pass from Julian Broddle, but Allan Clarke's men failed to equalise despite many desperate attempts. Steve Wigley doubled their lead in the last minute when he converted a long clearance.

To quickly summarise, the results of the remaining losing teams from the Barclays Second Division were as follows: ASTON VILLA attracted 46,324 spectators despite the match receiving television coverage and predictably Liverpool continued their success with a 2-0 win. SHEFFIELD UNITED gave new manager Dave Bassett a first minute goal away at Portsmouth but the First Division side hit back to win 2-1. Finally, this afternoon's visitors SWINDON TOWN had the chance to defeat their fifth First Division side this season away at Newcastle United, but the Geordies were in no mood for defeat, running out convincing winners by 5-0.

SWINDON TOWN

Swindon Town's victories over Wigan Athletic and Gillingham in the play-offs meant a return to Division Two for the first time since 1974. During their absence the club fell to Division Four for the first time in their history, spending four seasons in the bottom flight.

Swindon's march up the League began in 85-86 when a record-breaking 102 points saw them lift the fourth division championship. Last season the winning streak continued with third place and eventual promotion the outcome.

For a while it seemed that more honours could be on their way to the County Ground again. Early season form saw Swindon rise to fourth spot in mid-October. Yet, although there may not be promotion for a third successive year, Cup glory could be on the way. For already in this season's competitions four Division I clubs have failed to conquer Swindon. Interest may have finished in the F.A. and Littlewoods Cups, but victory over the Full Members Cup winners and two other top flight clubs means a place in the quarter finals of the Simod Cup.

Much credit must go to Lou Macari who initially joined Swindon as player-manager in 1984. Macari had an illustrious career as a player with Celtic and Manchester United. He was also awarded 24 caps for Scotland.

This season's opening line-up showed just two changes from the one that finished the 86-87 campaign. The two debutants were Jon Gittens (ex Southampton) and John Kelly who moved south from Chester. Kelly's stay was short lived. He was sent off at Barnsley in September, never played for the first team again and was transferred to Oldham Athletic in November.

In all, three Swindon players have received their marching orders since August. Apart from Kelly, other new signings Steve Foley

was dismissed at Leicester in November and Bobby Barnes against West Bromwich Albion on New Year's Day.

Lou Macari has called up 22 players to fulfil this season's fixtures. That total includes four goalkeepers, two of which, Tim Flowers and Paul Crichton, were signed on loan. Flowers spent a month at the County Ground from Southampton and Nottingham Forest's Crichton spent Christmas and New Year with Swindon.

Last season's regular custodian FRASER DIGBY began the season as first choice and played in the opening 14 League games. He returned from injury last weekend and was immediately drafted into the England Under 21 squad.

Former Arsenal apprentice NICKY HAMMOND, another close season acquisition, took over in Digby's absence and made his first team debut against Watford in the Littlewoods Cup.

Two of the three 'ever-present' players appear in Swindon's defence. Scottish born central defender COLIN CALDERWOOD completed a century of appearances for Mansfield before continuing his journey south. He joined Swindon in July 85 and is well on the way to a third successive season of maximum appearances. PHIL KING's form this season has seen him attract attention from a number of first division scouts. The Bristol-born left back was signed in March last year and scored his first goal in League football on December 28th.

Likely to be at right back is the experienced DAVE HOCKADAY. Formerly a winger, Hockaday made the transition to full back towards the end of the 85-86 campaign. This season has seen him make the right back berth his own.

Completing the rearguard are TIM PARKIN and JON GITTENS. Parkin is another ex-

perienced campaigner who spent many years at Bristol Rovers before joining Swindon in the 1986 close season. He also had a spell with Swedish club Malmo. Gittens was one of the several 'new faces' this season moving from Southampton in July. He struggled to gain a regular place in the early part of the season, but has not missed a game since November.

Middlesbrough born CHRIS KAMARA is now in his second spell at the hub of Swindon's midfield. He originally spent four years at the County Ground in the late 1970s and was re-signed in August 1985. Joining him should be Eire Under 21 international KIERAN O'REGAN. The former Brighton man was granted a free transfer last summer and made his Swindon debut against Bristol City in the Littlewoods Cup.

Also in contention for a spot is former Liverpool apprentice STEVE FOLEY. He too is in his first season under Lou Macari and was last season's leading scorer for Sheffield United. In and out of the side for most of the season has been CHARLIE HENRY. The popular utility player is just a handful of League games away from the 200 milestone and could find himself on the substitutes' bench today.

An ever-present until November LEIGH BARNARD has been out of favour in recent weeks as has former England schoolboy PETER COYNE.

BOBBY BARNES returned to action as a substitute last week following suspension. Barnes was signed from Aldershot in October in a deal that took Steve Berry in the opposite direction. Since his move Barnes has fitted in well with 8 League goals. Leading the attack will be Northern Ireland World Cup star JIMMY QUINN. The Belfast born striker was signed from Oswestry Town and had a spell at Blackburn before returning to Swindon last

season. Quinn's 24 League and Cup goals make him the Second Division's most successful marksman.

Up front with Quinn should be ever-present DAVE BAMBER. The much travelled striker was signed in March last season following a loan period. Bamber's two goal strike against Norwich recently provided Swindon with one of the few F.A. Cup upsets. Another much travelled forward is STEVE WHITE who will also be remembered for a two goal haul. That came against Gillingham in last season's play-offs and ensured promotion for Swindon. Bolton born BRYAN WADE has come into the reckoning recently with several appearances as substitute. Wade spent a number of seasons in non-league football and was signed by Trowbridge Town.

SOCCER SCENE

Bravo! At long last the Second Division takes centre stage in front of the national television cameras tomorrow.

Fourth-placed Middlesbrough take on leaders Aston Villa at Ayresome Park with an added responsibility of putting Division II on the map.

Bruce Rioch's character-soaked side — looking for a second successive promotion — have done their bit recently in coverage of stirring F.A. Cup battles with Everton.

Villa, too, fought bravely against the big, red Anfield machine before falling like so many before.

But glimpses into the Second Division have been all too rare for armchair supporters and that's a crying shame.

The second sphere of English football has provided some interesting, enticing and exciting entertainment which has gone largely unexposed on our TV screens.

The continual diet of Everton and Liverpool — particularly this season — amounts to square-screen malnutrition.

Kenny Dalglish's side are in magnificent form, their record is tremendous, they possess outstanding talents and rightly deserve celebration.

Fearless Everton, the only side to have toppled their neighbours this season, can also be engrossing to watch and have recorded a number of stunning goals for the slow motion replay.

There is life outside Merseyside (Manchester and Highbury as well).

Blackburn manager Don Mackay has been an outspoken advocate of Second Division football this season and has bashed the TV bosses.

He argues that top flight matches are purely academic at the moment because Liverpool are so far clear that the championship is virtually guaranteed.

In Division II, however, a whole host of clubs are still doing battle for the honours and that has made for some compelling competition.

Mackay's own team have contributed generously with the ambitious import of Barcelona's Steve Archibald and the Full Members' Cup holders have been rewarded with a Wembley return in the Mercantile Credit Centenary Festival during April.

Bradford City stayed on the promotion trail with a last-gasp victory at Millwall last weekend. Both these sides have shone this season — City with the mercurial talents of Stuart McCall and John Hendrie and Millwall fielding Tony Carcarino's goal power.

Manchester City, Leeds, Hull, Barnsley and today's visitors Swindon are also capable of raising the roof while Town, themselves, have shown in all too fleeting

periods that they can rub shoulders with the best.

Tomorrow, however, it's up to Boro and Villa to show the nation what they've been missing.

PAUSE FOR THOUGHT

A personal view
by Des Loughrey

A GLOOMY PICTURE

No argument about the current picture so far as Town is concerned, for our playing record could hardly be more depressing. It would take a brave Town follower to declare the outlook so far as survival is concerned to be very bright.

And while I would not place myself amongst those expecting failure it would be foolish to deny that recent returns suggest the matter could all too quickly become desparate.

What features then give any grounds for hope?

The situation relating to the audible volume of support is an important point to be made. Knowing the characteristics of local support, this backing of a side by fans is a vital matter and I would go so far as to suggest that if the following has been critical of much of Town's play of late, there is still a good solid West Riding crowd. They have avidly followed Town when given just the slightest encouragement from the play and for me crowd reaction at Leeds Road has always provided much of the pleasure for one who has to travel some way to see 'his' side in

action.

For, if critical comment might be heard when things are not going as they should, I know of no sound which brings such a thrill as the one which rings forth from Leeds Road when Town are on the rampage.

A good result today certainly will do something to improve the situation and to provide no further ammunition for our local pessimists.

But, for true fans, the effort must be made to find signs of hope amidst all the distress of recent weeks. For an amateur critic the finger of criticism points surely at defensive performances. For years and years when problems have arisen it has been the front line which has been the root of the problem, but on this occasion, as it appears to me, that is not now the case. For our forwards have not, in my view, performed at all badly, and appear to be not far short of requirements. It is the backs where various individual and collective failures come instantly to mind.

I cling to the hope that we have a group of players available who, with ordinary good fortune, are capable of taking the side to safety at the season's end. Though I admit I am beginning to look with some anxiety for

signs that this revival is imminent.

Today I shall be looking for certain evidence that this is about to become fact rather than mere fiction. I will be looking for positive signs that the crisis is being firmly tackled by everyone who has a connection with the side.

For the diehard fan such thoughts provide the evidence that continued support of a wholehearted nature both on and off the field must remain a prime example of what I have in mind. I would personally underline the fact by stressing that control of the midfield is another important requirement for any side with hopes of success. More effort is needed here.

With the problems sorted out, I am convinced relegation difficulties can be put to one side. But certainly improvements on the lines suggested must be immediate or the outlook indeed will be grim.

To you all — get behind the lads this afternoon, be tolerant when matters do not go as they should. The players need a full measure of support from their followers, possibly more so than at any time in their history.

Today's game with Swindon I take to be of exceptional importance. We Town followers must ensure we do all we can to ensure a happy outcome. UP THE TOWN!

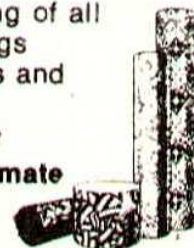

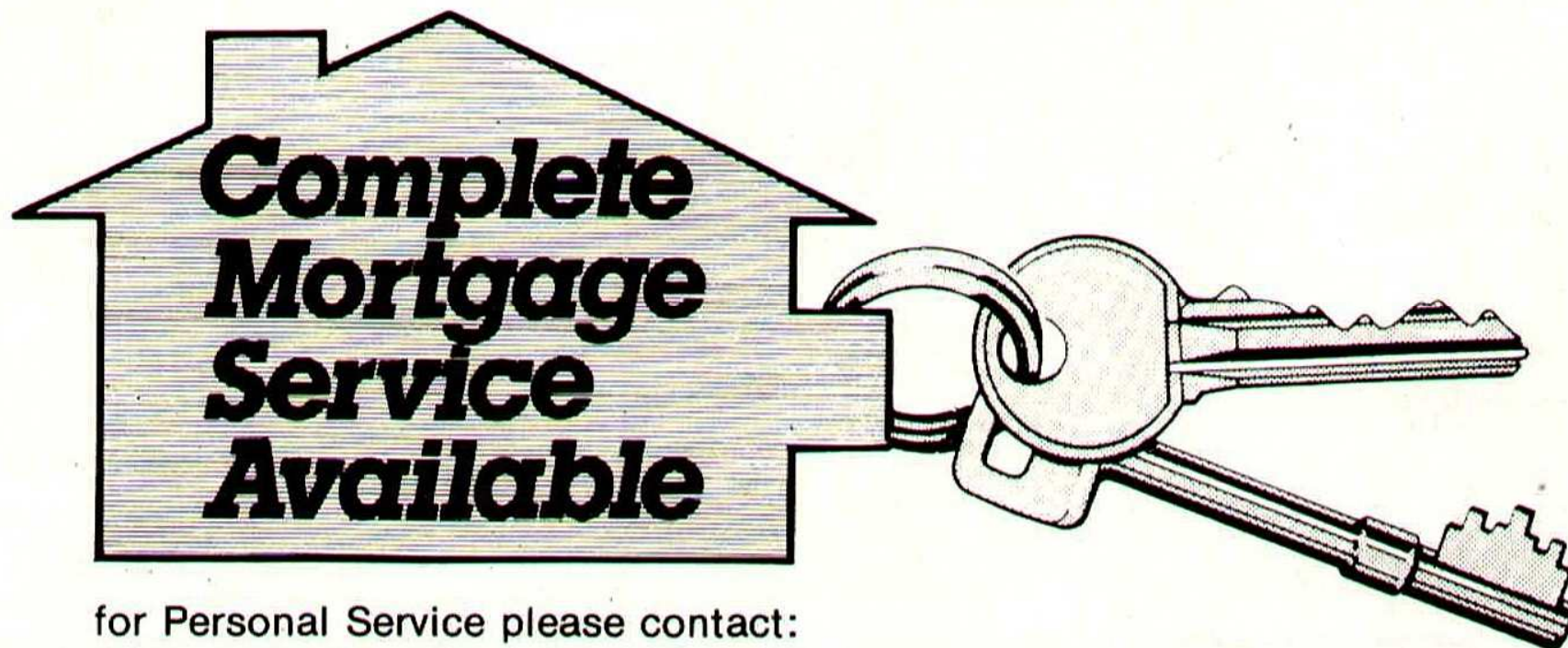

DOWN MEMORY LANE

The first reference to a 'record crowd' at Leeds Road is probably that for the visit of Chelsea (15,459 who paid £400) in Town's first season of League football, 1910-11.

The next mention of a record 'gate' is that for Swindon's first ever visit in the F.A. Cup Competition of the 1912-13 campaign. On Saturday, 1st February 1913, 17,585 paid £595 to see this second round clash (equivalent to the modern-day fourth round) It was reported that the Wiltshire supporters in the crowd 'let out a wierd war-cry almost like the New Zealand Rugby tourists'! It seemed to do the trick for the Southern League outfit as Wheatcroft scored after 20 minutes. Another goal 10 minutes from time by Brown sealed the issue despite a consolation goal for Town by Mann near the final whistle.

Little did those who saw this match realise that they were watching a little piece of F.A. Cup history. For, from that date hence Huddersfield Town played 25 matches in the competition on our own pitch with a single defeat! Not only that, but no fewer than 24 of these were victories with one single drawn game. Spanning almost two decades, this must constitute one of the most successful runs in the history of the competition. During these 25 games Town scored an incredible 83 goals with just 17 conceded. A record for any club to be proud of.

Another proud record for the Club was that of their home form in the Second Division Championship year of 1969-70. Swindon came very close to dehting that on March 24th, 1970 — a cold Tuesday evening which marked the debut of Dick Krzywicki. The two promotion rivals (Swin-

don were 4th) put up an uncompromising show with the Swindon defence in superb form. After 25 minutes Lawson centred and the ball was deflected onto the foot of a post. Quick as a flash, Krzywicki pounced and forced the ball over the line. Burrows equalised for the Wiltshire men seven minutes later when he seized onto a partially cleared corner. Krzywicki showed well despite the uncompromising attentions of Trollope and he played no small part in the successful conclusion to the season. On this evening, however, the two Towns shared the points before a gate of 24,854.

FACE TO FACE

PROFILE ON SIMON TREVITT

I started playing regular football when I was about 9 or 10 years old and played for Roberttown Under 10s. After just a season I joined the top side in the area, Unsworth Juniors, and played for a number of years in their various teams between the ages of 11 and 16.

We were quite successful and it was during my time in the under 16s that the team manager wrote to both Leeds and Town recommending me for a trial.

I went for a week's trial at Elland Road one Christmas but nothing happened. Then I started training with other Town hopefuls on a Thursday evening. I also came down to Leeds Road for a week during school holidays.

In 1984 I played several games for the juniors in the Northern Intermediate League and it was after one, ironically against Leeds, that I was offered apprentice terms. It was like a dream come true. I had supported Town and often stood watching the first team from the terrace side. It was also pleasing for the rest of the family who also follow Town.

When I first joined the club I played in

the centre of midfield and spent my first season there. It was only later that Steve Smith switched me on to the right wing and later to right back. I began playing regularly for the reserves at full back and felt more comfortable there.

Three months before my 18th birthday I was called into the manager's office and was told that at the end of my apprenticeship I would be offered terms until the end of the season. That came as a great relief although at the time I thought I had been progressing steadily.

I spent all that season (85-86) playing regularly for the reserves. My first team call up came the following season. Regular right back Malcolm Brown was injured and I was brought into the side to face Derby County.

I thought I played quite well and had a run of about six games in the first team, including a Littlewoods Cup tie against Arsenal. Malcolm regained his fitness and I was dropped for the trip to Ipswich. I was disappointed, but the manager explained that at the time Malcolm's experience would be better for the side.

Early last year Steve Smith offered me a new two-year contract. I was injured at the time and almost snapped his hand off at the offer.

Hopefully, I am now starting to repay some of Town's faith in me. I have been a first team regular for most of this season. I am happy to play in midfield, but think I can offer more to the team at right back. Our new coach Eoin Hand has helped my game and hopefully the progress will continue and the team can lift itself out of the doldrums.

10 YEARS AGO

Town went four weeks without a first team match in February, 1978. The team drew 3-3 at Aldershot on January 28th, but did not play again until February 25th.

Disappointment was felt all round when the proposed visit of 4th Division leaders Watford was called off. There was further disappointment for Tom Johnston a fortnight later. York City's visit to Leeds Road was postponed — Johnston had spent seven years as manager and coach at Bootham Crescent.

However, Leeds Road did not close, and activities continued on the transfer front. Wingers Francis Firth and Jim McCaffrey signed for Halifax Town and Portsmouth respectively. Goalkeeper Dick Taylor joined Sunderland on a month's loan.

20 YEARS AGO

A dull and uninspiring goal-less draw was fought at Blackburn on Wednesday, 14th February, 1968.

The home side made life hard for Town particularly in the early stages. Oldfield was called upon to make a fine save after just 3 minutes and soon afterwards he could only watch as a Rovers' shot hit the crossbar. Shortly before the interval centre half Mielczarek conceded a penalty, but the spot-kick struck a post.

Town's best effort belonged to Tony Leighton who shot narrowly wide in the first half. Together with McGill and Worthington, Leighton showed most endeavour of any of the Town players, while our former centre forward, Alan Gilliver, was Blackburn's man of the match.

30 YEARS AGO

15th February, 1958, was F.A. Cup 5th round day and left Town without a League or Cup fixture.

The blank date was filled by a friendly against First Division Leeds United.

Town showed they had the ability to join the promotion pack by thrashing the visitors 5-0. France and Simpson both scored twice with the fifth coming from Les Massie. Not to be outdone 'keeper Sandy Kennon saved a penalty.

There were no real surprises in the Cup with lower division contenders Darlington and Scunthorpe bowing out. Of the seven ties played, four produced attendances of 50,000 or more with the highest being 56,667 who saw First Division Bolton beat Stoke of Division Two.
