

RAY'S REVIEW



On Saturday, February 20th, a small party of disabled supporters of the "Hatters" travelled to QPR to see their team in the FA Cup.

On arriving at the ground they went to collect the tickets for their escorts, these having been paid for in advance. As we had been promised, they were ready for collection. It

was then that the trouble started. When we got to the gate where we were to go in we were told by a steward that they hadn't got any separate enclosure for the disabled supporter, and we would have to get out of our wheelchairs.

Well after a lengthy discussion with officials, it became only to clear that the only way we were going to see the match was to do as they insisted. After showing our escorts where they had to put us, we were let in. We then had to be lifted out of our wheelchairs over a three-foot wall into a seat to watch the match. This was to become a very uncomfortable 100 minutes. But then we're "Hatters" supporters! It's no wonder OPR don't have any disabled fansl

What I'm saying is that any disabled supporter who has been to QPR will never complain about Luton Town's facilities for the disabled supporter.

All mad as Hatters!

What have Andrew Cornelius, Industrial Correspondent on the Guardian, Graham Miller of Thames TV, and Nick Owen of Sporting Triangles got in common? All of them are Luton Town supporters and, befitting the friendly family nature of our Club, there are indirect connections between them. I knew both Andy and Graham at Luton VI Form College, and Graham met Nick whilst working in Birmingham. Small world isn't it? Co-incidences go even further. Nick first saw Luton play in 1957 against Leeds then first left the area to live in Leeds where he studied classics at the University.

One of Graham's jobs whilst working for local radio in Birmingham was to report on the West Brom. v Luton match in 1974. The draw ensured Luton's promotion to Division 1. Graham failed to remain impartial! His partiality for Luton began in the 1960s and he claims he and his school friends were the original Oak Road Choir.

Andy's youthful memories are of "testing" his front lawn to see if the Kenilworth Road pitch would be playable, and collecting autographs from players like Alan Slough, Bruce Rioch, Ray Whittaker (I thought my girlfriend at school was the only fan he had), and Freddy Jardine. Andy modelled his football on Jardine's, which is probably why he became a journalist.

Unlike Graham and Nick, Andy doesn't like reporting on Luton's match but prefers just to watch. Nick now takes his children with him – even the year old baby has been – and thus is actively supporting the family image. Each has his own favourite players and matches, though both Nick and Andy mentioned a game at Hillsborough in 1970 when we beat Sheffield Wednesday 5-1, as being particularly memorable. Nick also recalled the 4-4 draw at Stoke as exciting.

They've each supported Luton through the bad times as well as the good, including the season we narrowly avoided seeking re-election. As Graham put it, "Those of us who've supported in the bad times are the real fans." Although I wonder what's happened to those fans now – our gates were bigger then!

Arsenal 2 Luton Town 1


A nine-match unbeaten run came to an end when the Town lost at Highbury on February 13. It was our first defeat in 1988.

On a bitterly cold day and with a high wind blowing, Arsenal took control of the match with two quick goals in the first-half from Michael Thomas and David Rocastle.







Les Sealey

Our Littlewoods Cup semi-final triumph over Oxford United brought great pleasure to everyone at the club, but none could have enjoyed the feeling more than our goalkeeper Les Sealey. In tonight's Football Focus, he expresses his feelings on clinching the first Wembley appearance of his career:

My first appearance at Wembley

"I have been to Wembley three times so far – as a spectator so it is going to be a very special day for me. There is no doubt it is the highlight of my career and it is a great feeling. The spirit is fantastic right through the club. We have a terrific dressing room and I am sure that is the chief reason for our great season.

"When I first came to the club, we used to leak a few goals at the back, but now it is completely different. The team has got better and better. This is a much better side, much more matured, than the one which reached the FA Cup semi-final in 1985. All I have to do most of the time is try and keep concentrating and enjoy it!

"We have a really good feeling that we can win every game now and the young boys who have come in and out of the side have done brilliantly. We had terrific celebrations after the Oxford match, but I had better not go into all that in too much detail. One of the big things has been the professionalism of the lads. We all try to aim to win the next match and prepare for it properly each time.

"When I am asked about different clubs and about Luton Town, I can say with pride that it is a big club with big thinking now. We are much bigger and better than some people think and it is a tremendous feeling to be part of it."







Striker with a big future







DRESSING ROOM

with Mal Donaghy

Mal Donaghy will complete a decade with Luton Town this year and go into his benefit season with the club at its highest point in a proud 103-year history. Tonight, in Dressing Room Talk, he reflects on the pride he feels at sharing the club's tremendous progress in his 10 years at Kenilworth Road:

A great feeling

"I remember the feeling we had at Villa Park in 1985 when we lost to Everton and I suppose that was in the back of my mind when we played Oxford here. It makes you want to ensure you don't get caught out again. It is a very satisfying feeling in clinching a place at Wembley, but we want to make sure we can do our best in the final and try to win that too.

"The feeling I had after that Oxford win took me back to the night we clinched promotion to the First Division in 1982. The fans were all on the pitch and we went in the directors' box then... It is a great feeling and when you think of the progress we have made, it is quite a fantastic achievement really.

"But we have to remain professional and treat the next game as the most important all the time. We shall not let thoughts of Wembley effect us until after we have been there and got something to talk about. We can win the trophy. That is for certain. We have got the flair players for the big occasion.

"Brian Stein has been going through a very hot spell recently and has a knack of producing match-winning moments and goals. In fact, we have got two or three lads for the big occasion. Mick Harford and Mark Stein produce the vital touch, beat players, score goals and turn a game. It could all hinge on how they play on the day.

Right decision

"I have been and played at Wembley a few times so it will not be a new experience to me - and several of the lads have been there to play before as well. Steve Foster




Wembley-bound: Mal Donaghy.

has played there a few times for England as well as Brighton and Ashley went there with Manchester United for an FA Cup final.

"Looking back a year or two, I can now say I think I was absolutely right to commit my future to the Town when I did. I was 29 then and it was a very important decision for me. If you play for a big club there is always an expectation that you should be winning things, but if you are playing for a club like ours the pleasure is fantastic.

"We had a good celebration after the Oxford match that Sunday. I went with a group of the lads for a Chinese meal and a few drinks and then off home to bed... by taxi, of course. It was a great night for everyone – but now we have to get on with all our other games and keep on doing the business."





Swindon Town returned to the Second Division last year after an absence of twelve seasons. During that absence they have sampled Fourth Division soccer for the first time in their history. It was during that decline that Lou Macan, the former Clasgow Celtic, Manchester United and Soctland International joined the County Ground staff in July 1984 as player-manager.

Since then the former Scotland star has masterminded the phenomenal rise of the Wiltshire Club in successive seasons of promotion. In 1985-86 Swindon Town set up a Football League record of 102 points as they raced away with the Fourth Division Championship finishing the season 18 points

clear of Chester City, their nearest challengers.

Not content at basking in the glory of this achievement, Lou-Macari then set about mounting a challenge for Third Division honours last season. Deprived of the Championship by A.F.C. Bournemouth and the runners-up spot by Middlesbrough, Swindon Town had to battle their way through the nail biting play-off system.

Five matches ensued, two with Wigan Athletic and three with Gillingham, which included a deciding match at Selhurst Park, Crystal Palace last May. Two goals from former Hatter Steve White ensured that their 2-0 win meant Second

Division soccer at the County Ground this season.

After rejecting offers from Glasgow, Celtic, Coventry City and Leicester City the previous summer Lou Macari was once again the target for other clubs during last close season. Both Wimbledon and Ipswich Town approached Swindon Town asking permission to speak to one of the games brightest young managers.

Lou Macari graciously declined the opportunity to speak to both clubs and preferred to guide Swindon Town on their return to the Second Division and full membership of the Football League. One of the clubs most popular ever managers, he is now launching an assault on Wembley in this Simod Cup semi-final tonight

THRILLING PROMOTION BATTLES WERE THE HIGHLIGHTS IN 1980-81

With the selling of marksman Bob Hatton to Sheffield United in the summer of 1980 we all wondered where the goals were going to come from but manager David Pleat was fully confident that Brian Stein had served his apprenticeship under the artful eye of Hatton and would be able to assume the goalscoring mantle on his own shoulders, writes club statistician Roger Wash.


The first game of 1980-81 was away to West Ham where fortunately the euphoria caused by the parading of the FA Cup which the hammers had won the previous season, got to the home players and despite being in front two late penalties expertly placed by David Moss

sent the 27,933 crowd home deflated.

Three days later Steve White, signed the previous December from Bristol Rovers, scored his first goal for the club in the rather lucky 1-0 home win over local rivals Watford, "Barborous Seville" was the headline in the "Watford Observer" aimed at referee Alan Seville who had refused to play the advantage role in one particular Watford attack when Mike Saxby had attempted to pull back Luther Blissett.

If the Town had been fortunate in their first two games luck certainly deserted them in match three when Derby County visitors to Kenilworth Road, suffered a severe pounding but broke away twice to go home with the

This defeat knocked the stuffing out of the team and a poor patch developed with only one point being gained from the next three games, this solitary point being obtained by Frank Bunn scoring his first goal for the club in the final minute in the home game against Wrexham.

A last minute effort by Ricky Hill in the next home game against Orient secured the points but David Moss's missed penalty at Grimsby the following week meant that the Town had to settle for a point in a 0-0 draw rather than the two that their play deserved in a game marred by "strongarm" tactics by the home side.

Three defeats in a row then followed - Notts County at home and away at Bristol City and Preston - which left the Town fourth from bottom of the table with only goal difference keeping them from a relegation place.

Aglimmer of hope was seen in successive home draws with Shrewsbury and Swansea before the season suddenly took off at the most unlikely of places - Cambridge.

David Moss had given the Town the lead from the penalty spot at the Abbey Stadium but Cambridge had equalised before half-time. Clive Goodyear headed his first goal for the club early in the second half before Moss limped off injured to be replaced by Raddy Antic.

With the Town goal under seige a further equaliser looked on the cards and when Jake Findlay received a nasty injury in making a brave save from George Reilly leaving the Hatters with only 10 men and Mal Donaghy in goal all looked lost.

But, as so often happens in these circumstances, the 10 men played brilliantly and it was no surprise when Brian Stein netted the Towns third goal in the final minute to record a famous victory.

The Town never really looked back following that win as three out of the next four games were won with style.

Firstly Sheffield Wednesday were hammered 3-0 at Kenilworth Road, Watford were again beaten by a Steve White goal, this time at Vicarage Road and finally West Ham finished 3-2 losers here in a pulsating match watched by a best of the season crowd of 17031.

watched by a best of the season crowd of 17031.

With this win over West Ham the Town had forced themselves up to 10th position and as they were the only side to beat the runaway Hammers at that stage of the season promotion talk was once again in the air.

A couple of draws were followed by four straight wins leading up to the New Year which shot the Town up to 6th position. The first of this run of wins marked a fairytale comeback for Lil Fuccillo, out for two years following successive leg fractures, as he scored in the 4-2 walloping of Preston.

Christmas belonged to Brian Stein that year as he scored both Luton goals in the 2-0 win over Chelsea on Boxing Day followed up with a hat-trick in the 4-2 victory

over Bristol Rovers at Eastville.

January 1981 did not prove to be too successful with no wins being recorded but we did have a chance to see a certain Mick Harford make his first appearance at Kenilworth Road albeit in the colours of Newcastle. He rather ungratefully scored the only goal of the game and watched as David Moss missed, yet again, from the penalty spot. He was also booked!


The next home game saw the Town score three second half goals to see off fellow promotion aspirants Blackburn but with Crimsby winning at Kenilworth Road soon after in another "four pointer" perhaps our thoughts of Division

One were a shade premature.

This surmise was borne out the following week when the Town were unable to break down the Orient defence in a boring 0-0 draw at Brisbane Road. The fact that both teams seemed sleepy was perhaps caused by the 11.30am kick off on a Sunday morning - an experiment not since tried again by the Town.

Something needed to be done to rekindle any faint hopes of promotion and it was then that David Pleat introduced his sweeper system using Raddy Antic in the role. The system worked to perfection as the Town bamboozled Notts County at Meadow Lane and returned

with both points in a 1-0 win.

The Town started climbing the table again with a 3-1 home win over Bristol City but a defeat at Sheffield Wednesday by a similar scoreline sent hopes stumbling again. All must be lost now!
