We all look forward to the 1988/89 seaon with great enthusiasm. Have a happy summer and good holidays, and buy your Season Ticket early!



STOKE CITY 1-0 SWINDON TOWN

City bounced back to winning ways against Swindon with the only goal coming from Simon Stainrod in the 16th minute, his first in 14 matches, after he had latched on to a poor Phil King back

MANCHESTER CITY 2-2 BRADFORD CITY

Bradford's hopes of going top took an early knock at Maine Road, where they went two behind within 11 minutes. The Yorkshire men fought back to draw level despite having a player sent off. An lan Brightwell header opened the scoring after 7 minutes, which was soon followed by a Tony Morley effort.

The turning point came when paul Lake was stretchered off, he was soon missed when Ron Futcher replied with a penalty 5 minutes before the break.

Substitute Mark Leonard equalised in the 54th minute before team mate John Hendrie was given orders after a second bookable offence.

PLYMOUTH ARGYLE 1-3 CRYSTAL PALACE

The Londoners can still dream of promotion with a precious victory in Devon.

Phil Barber hit the first just before the break, then within seconds of the re-start Mark Bright gave Palace a two goal lead.

Bright was again on target with his 24th of the season nine

minutes from time to settle the match.

Argyle managed a consolation through Stewart Evans 5 minutes

LEICESTER CITY 1-0 READING

City central defender Steve Walsh scored the only goal with an early 12th minute header, neatly met by a Peter Weir cross. Mike Newell should have extended the home side's lead having a close range header blocked, then missing a glorious chance when he was clearly put through by Simon Morgan and with only keeper Steve Francis to beat he shot straight at him.

IPSWICH TOWN 4-0 MIDDLESBROUGH

Transfer listed Dalian Atkinson destroyed the hopeful promotion visitors with a superb hat-trick.

The 20 year old netted the first after only 4 minutes, with a fierce 18 yard strike, then scoring the second after 30 minutes, before setting up Mick D'Avray for the third five minutes later.

Boro, holders of the best defensive record in the second were in ruins, their day of misery was completed when Colin Cooper was sent off after Atkinson scored his third on 56 minutes.

LEEDS UNITED 1-1 OLDHAM ATHLETIC

Oldham took their unbeaten run to 8 matches after holding United to a home draw, where they were unlucky not to come away with a win.

Roger Palmer twice tested United's Mervyn Day along with Earl Barrett who wasted a fine chance for the visitors

Mike Cecere finally broke the deadlock in the 63rd minute after confusion between Day and Jack Ashurst, but 4 minutes later lan Baird set up midfielder Glynn Snodin to equalise.

HULL CITY 4-0 HUDDERSFIELD TOWN

Huddersfield finally suffered the drop having been completely outplayed at Hull, who stormed to a first half four goal lead. Keith Edwards scored his first home goal since his return to the club on 15 minutes, then Ray Daniel (19), Andy Saville on the half hour, opened up an early goal advantage.

The stunned visitors day of misery was completed and their return to the Third known when Edwards hit his second and City's fourth in the 39th minute.

PAST MEETINGS WITH SWINDON

This afternoon is the 80th League meeting between AFC Bournemouth and Swindon Town. Swindon are in fact the fifth club we have played the most, largely helped when both sides met in successive seasons from 1923 to 1963. The latter year Swindon finally won promotion to the Second Division finishing as Runners-up to Northampton.

For such a comprehensive background both club's have an almost equal League and Cup record, as the following statistics show:

A couple of convincing victories have occurred during the past encounters, way back in the 1925/26 season 'Boscombe' suffered an 8-2 result at the County Ground. Decades later Swindon's heaviest defeat against AFC arose in 1957 losing 7-0 at Dean Court.

In the F.A. and League Cup competition's the record is all square at won 2, lost 2, drawn 2.

The team check below is from the season when we completed our last double over Swindon, Boscombe won this match by the odd goal from Ron Bolton, Bolton was on target again along with Chris Weller in the return match later that season with a 2-1 victory. Swindon, however, managed a higher final league position of 16th, Cherries came 19th.

TOMMY GODWIN (Goalkeeper) - Signed for Bournemouth in June, 1952 from Leicester City. Tommy started his career with Shamrock Rovers, and he gained an international cap for Eire. He was in the Eire team which defeated England at Goodison Park in 1950. Born Dublin, 5ft 11in., 11st.

IRVIN BROWN (Right Back) - Signed for Bournemouth in September, 1958, from Brighton and Hove Albion, where he spent several seasons. Born Lewes, 6ft 4in., 13st. 12 1/2 lbs.

PETER GLEDSTONE (Left Back) - A local player who signed professional for the Dean Court Club in November, 1955, from Bournemouth Gas Works. Peter is equally at "home" in the wing-half position. Born Ferndown, Dorset. 5ft 91/2 in., 11st. 5lbs.

JOHN ARNOTT (Right Half) - Signed for Bournemouth in July, 1956, from Shrewsbury Town; was previously with West Ham. He came as a centre forward, but has been converted to the wing-half position, where he seems to have settled down. Born Sydenham. 5ft. 91/2 in., 11st. 8lbs.

TONY NELSON (Centre Half) - Signed for Bournemouth in June, 1956, from Bristol City, was previously with Newport (2 seasons) and Bristol City (2). Tony gained a regular place in the first team last season, Born Cardiff, 5ft. 111/2 in., 11st. 3lbs.

JOHN KING (Left Half) - Manager Don Welsh's biggest close season signing from Everton. John has also been made captain of the team. Born London. 5ft. 6in., 10st. 91/2lbs.

BRYN JONES (Inside Right) - Signed for Bournemouth in February, 1960, from Newport County; was previously with Swansea Town (7 seasons) and Newport County (2 seasons). Bryn is the brother of Cliff Jones, the £30,000 buy of Spurs from Swansea. Born Swansea. 5ft. 61/2 in., 11st.

DICKIE DOWSETT (Inside Right) - Signed for Bournemouth in June, 1957, from Southampton. Was previously with Tottenham (3 seasons), Southend (1), and Southampton (1). Born Chelmsford. 5ft. 9in., 10st. 31/2lbs.

RAY BUMSTEAD (Centre Forward) - Signed for Bournemouth as a professional in May, 1958, from Ringwood Town. Ray was leading goalscorer last season with 16 goals to his credit. Born Ringwood. 5ft. 10in., 10st. 12lbs.

RON BOLTON (Inside Left) - Signed for Bournemouth in April, 1958, from a Lancashire League side - Crompton Recs. At present doing his National Service at Winterbourne Gunner, Wilts. Born Golborne, Lancs. 5ft. 10in., 11st.

RON SMITH (Outside Left) - Signed for Bournemouth in May, 1959, from Liverpool. Ron was "first choice" so far this season, but he broke an ankle at Tranmere and will be out of the game for several weeks. Born Liverpool. 5ft. 8 ½ in., 11st. 9lbs.
















Captains Corner

Despite many wretched injuries the team have pulled together and have kept their morale high. For all our efforts the prime reward we need is another season of Second Division football to begin this August.



GEORGE BEST

Born 1946, Best became a superb winger cum striker. His skill made him a legend before he was even at the age to vote.

He joined Manchester United when 17 years old, his scoring ability soon made him the Division 1 joint top scorer of the 1967-68 season with 28 goals. The same year he was voted Footballer of the Year.

Six months after his league debut he gained his first cap for Northern Ireland against Wales in April 1964.

A month later he was 18, by the time he was 21, Best had won two league championship medals.

During the 1967-68 season Matt Busby's United side won the European Cup defeating Benfica 4-1. Best can take much credit in that victory having set up the crucial goal to force extra time. His hard work and determination was well noticed, also being awarded the European Footballer of the Year Trophy.

Best had a very impressive club record number of appearances from his first full season, 1964/65, up until the end of 1971/72, he played in 313 out of 336 league matches, including 17 outing's made in 1963/64. He made a total number of 330 appearances

In the process he scored 131 goals, Best became United's leading scorer in his final 5 seasons, competing with striking rivals Denis Law and Bobby Charlton.

The bearded Irishman was automatically chosen for his country since his young debut to 1972. When sadly he retired at only 27 years of age, he missed 11 internationals, but in all collected 30 caps and scoring 9 goals.

Few people were surprised when this great player hung up his boots, mainly due to the off-field difficulties that troubled him. But there is no doubt his skills and goals brought joy to millions. George did not disappear completely from the League scene, appearing for Hibernian and AFC Bournemouth, when in 1983 he played 5 matches for the Cherries.

Former AFC midfielder Bobby Savage began his career as an apprentice with which Division 1 club?

Assistant Manager Jimmy Gabriel joined AFC in July 1972 from Southampton. Then in October the following year joined Swindon Town after 51, 53 or 55 appearances for the Cherries?

Ron Bolton who scored the winning goal against Swindon in our last double over them in the 1960/61 season, left Boscombe for Ipswich Town in October 1965 for £10,000. Almost a year later he rejoined us for half the previous fee, but after making a total number of 260 appearances left again to join which South African side?

In the League Cup competition of 1974/75 which Division 4 side did we lose 1-0 to at the fourth attempt, after 3 previous drawn matches played in the Second Round?

David Langan who joined us from Oxford United made his AFC debut against which club earlier this season?

Which North Devon side who play in the Great Mills Premier League did we defeat 4-1 away in the FA Cup 1st Round of 1954; Ilfracombe, Bideford or Barnstaple?

MEMORABLE CLUBS

BARNET

At the time of preparing the below information, Barnet F.C. seem likely contenders to join the League, if they can clinch the GM Conference Championship in this their centenary year.

Formed in 1888, the club first played in the Olympian League, then going on to appear in various other local leagues. Having merged with another club, Barnet

Alston as they were re-named in 1906 became one of the nine founder members of the Athenian League in 1912, of which they finished runners-up in the first season

After the First World War Barnet dropped the Alston name from their title in 1919. The change in name brought change in fortune as they became Athenian League Champions a record 7

In 1966 Barnet won promotion to the Premier Division. In 1974 they returned to the first but bounced back to regain Premier status two years later.

In between time they defeated Hereford United in the 1972 Southern League Cup Final.

Four years after this cup success the Hertfordshire club joined

the New Alliance Premier League, having avoided relegation for the first few seasons the club began to settle and reached their previous highest placing of 9th.

Manager Barry Fry who had been in charge since the beginning of their Alliance reign, left the club in 1985. This was an unusual move particularly as relegation was haunting them. However, only 1 defeat in their last 13 matches assured the club of safety. Fry returned to the Underhill ground club in July 1986, after a brief spell at Maidstone. Since then he has achieved much league success. Last May Scarborough pipped them to promotion, but this month Barry and Barnet could make amends by finishing as Champions, although the question remains will it be Barnet or Lincoln City?

FASCINATING FACTS



London born Tony Geidmintis is the only full back to head a League club's scoring list in a season. He achieved this with former League side Workington in 1972/73 with 8 penalties among his 12 Division 4 goals.

Geidmintis then went on to play for Watford, Northampton & Halifax.

Former Sheffield United winger Chico Hamilton played in all four divisions of the Football League. He

Chico started his career with Southend United in the Fourth, then played in the other three divisions with Aston Villa, before moving to Bramall Lane during the summer of 1976.

For their 1969 achievement of defeating Arsenal 3-1 in the League Cup Final, Swindon were invited to take part in the newly formed Anglo/Italian Cup, the reason being then as a Third Division club, they were not allowed to participate in the Fairs (now U.E.F.A.) Cup. The first two seasons both the Anglo/Italian Cup and the Anglo Italian League Cup Winners were contested and Swindon were the first winners of both competitions.

In 1969 Town defeated AS Roma 5-2 on aggregate, followed by a 3-0 aggregate defeat over Napoli in

October 27, 1987, a disappointing night as regards the result, but a memorable one as the Cherries travelled to Highbury, for the Littlewoods Cup 3rd Round.

This was our first ever meeting with Arsenal in any official match, and just reward for our fine achievement against Southampton over the previous 2 legs.

19 coaches, convoys of mini-buses and cars displaying the AFC name and colours travelled to North London on that cold

Victory was far from our thoughts, but of course always a possibility. Only twice before had we gone beyond this round, when we lost away 1-0 to York in 1961, then at Stoke 2-1 two

Apart from these two matches we appeared in the Third Round only once before, losing 2-0 at home to Leicester City in 1969

So could we pull off a surprise, as half-time closed in neither side made any real attempt at scoring. It seemed the 26,000 plus crowd were to witness a goaless first period when as luck would have it, a disputed penalty was awarded to the opposition. Then the inevitable happens and the deadlock

The Gunners at this time were enjoying a good Cup and League unbeaten run, never did they look likely of losing the

However, despite the defeat this was a proud night for the player's who put in a fine performance and for our huge following whose behaviour was perfect, giving AFC such a good reputation.

COMPETITORS CHAPTER

SWINDON TOWN

Swindon Town were formed in 1881, after moving around various grounds the club settled by playing in the location of the county ground, originally on what is now a cricket pitch.

The club became successful and were able to move into the county ground where a large stand was to be built by 1911.

Along with most other club's they joined the League for 1920/21 season. Then during the Second World War the ground became a prisoner of war camp.

The 'Colditz' image was soon removed from the ground which eventually became quite modern. Floodlights were first switched on in April 1951, then 7 years later the Shrivenham Road Side New Stand was built, formerly a Aldershot Military Tattoo Stand.

The club's highest attendance is 32,000 for the visit of Arsenal, who won this particular F.A. Cup 3rd Round tie.

F.A. Cup success has denied Swindon over the year's, although it is in this competition they achieved their record scoreline of 10-1 in the First Round of 1925 against Farnham United Brewery (hardly surprising!).

During Swindon's early days they had a goalscoring hero in Harry Morris who netted 216 times between 1926 and 1933. Morris also hit a club record 47 goals in 1926/27, 5 of which came in the Division 3 South fixture against Q.P.R.

John Trollope holds the Robins record of the most appearances, a unique total of 770 was achieved between 1960-79. His loyalty remains strong now serving the Robins as Assistant Manager.

Swindon look set for their 9th season in all of Second Division football when August arrives. Much of their past has existed in and out of the two lower divisions.

Under the guidance of Lou Macari the Robins finished as 1986 Division 4 Champions, then promotion again last season winning the play-off's.



TOWN F.C.



FRASER DIGBY: Born: Sheffield. The former Manchester United apprentice spent two loan periods at the County Ground before eventually joining the Club for a fee of £25,000 in December 1986. Fraser's outstanding displays last season not only helped Swindon Town to gain promotion for the second successive season but also helped him to gain England Under-21 honours. He had previously been capped at Schoolboy and Youth level.

DAVE HOCKADAY: Born: Billingham. The former Blackpool player moved to the County Ground in August 1983. After several seasons of appearing in midfield or as a winger the Billingham born player made the successful transition to full-back during Swindon Town's Fourth Division Championship winning season of 1985/86. Dave is one of only two players to remain on the County Ground staff from the day Lou Macari was appointed to the position of Team Manager in July 1984. An influential member of last seasons promotion campaign from Division Three. The Town full-back should make his three-hundredth League appearance in the early part of this season.

TERRY MERRIMAN: Born: Oxford. The former Coventry City defender joined the County Ground staff in July 1987 on a free transfer. Terry, who had joined the Highfield Road Club as an apprentice, found his appearances limited to the "Sky Blues" Central League team last season. Terry is another newcomer to Swindon Town who will be eagerly looking to make his League debut this season.

PHIL KING: Born: Bristol. The Bristol born full-back joined Swindon Town from Torquay United for a fee of £12,500 in March 1987. Phil quickly slotted into the Town defence and helped the Club to eventual promotion. The former Torquay defender had only been with the Plainmoor Club for a few months following his move from Devon neighbours Exeter City in July 1986. A Football League tribunal had settled the fee between the two Devon Clubs at £3,000. During his brief spell at Torquay Phil was the subject of interest from Tottenham Hotspur and he spent a brief spell training with the White Hart Lane Club.

TIM PARKIN: Born: Penrith. Joined Swindon Town from Bristol Rovers in July 1986 for a Football League Tribunal settled fee of £27,500. The former Rovers stalwart eventually established himself in the Town defence and was prominent in helping the Club to promotion last season. Tim began his career with Blackburn Rovers before moving to the Continent for a brief spell with Swedish Club Malmo. On his return to the Football League with Bristol Rovers he proved to be a great favourite with the fans of the former Eastville Club.

COLIN CALDERWOOD: Born: Stranraer. Stranraer born, Colin, had the distinction of captaining Swindon Town to promotion in consecutive seasons. It is a measure of the dedication and fitness of the former Mansfield Town defender that he has not missed a single match for the Club since his £27,500 move in July 1985. Tipped by many to gain eventual honours with Scotland, Colin has often been the target for many of the leading Clubs in both England and Scotland. After completing a century of League appearances for Mansfield Town, Colin is set to do likewise with the Wiltshire Club in the early part of this season.

JON GITTENS: Born: Moseley. Jon moved to the County Ground in July 1987 and therefore became the fifth close season signing for Lou Macari. The former Southampton central defender cost Swindon Town £40,000 at a Football League Tribunal appeal. Jon had joined the First Division Club from non-League Birmingham Club Paget Rangers. Jon first attracted the attention of Lou Macari when he gave a commanding display against lan Rush when the Welsh International was with Liverpool. Further impressive displays against Swindon Town for "the Saints" in last seasons Littlewoods Challenge Cup prompted the Town manager to move for the Saints defender.

PETER COYNE: Born: Manchester. Following some brilliant displays with England Schoolboys Peter joined Manchester United. His early promise declined after two appearances in the Old Trafford Clubs League line up and following a free transfer he drifted into non-League football. Peter eventually returned to League action with Crewe Alexandra where he spent four seasons with the Gresty Road Club. Another free transfer took him back to non-League soccer and it was from Hyde United in August 1984 that Lou Macari signed Peter for £5,000. He probably played the best football of his career in the first half of the Clubs Fourth Division Championship winning season of 1985/86.

LEIGH BARNARD: Born: Worsley. Leigh, along with Dave Hockaday, is one of the only two players remaining from the squad of players who were at the County Ground before the arrival of Lou Macari in July 1984. Leigh was actually signed on a free transfer from Portsmouth in July 1982. A player with endless stamina, Leigh has now made nearly 200 League appearances for Swindon Town. Once had a loan spell with Exeter City and actually played for the Devon Club against Swindon Town!

CHARLIE HENRY: Born: Acton. One of Swindon Towns most popular players over recent seasons. His natural enthusiasm for the game having won him many admirers. Charlie originally joined the Club as an apprentice. Capable of playing in a variety of positions. At the completion of the Towns Fourth Division Championship winning season of 1985/86 he was the Clubs leading goalscorer with 18 goals. Last season was more difficult for Charlie in Division Three as he struggled to recapture his form of the previous season. Another of the Town players close to completing a personal milestone for he is now approaching 200 League appearances. Charlie spent brief loan periods with Torquay United and Northampton Town last season.

MARK JONES: Born: Berinsfield. Mark moved to the County Ground in October 1986 from Oxford United for a fee of £25,000. He joined the Manor Road Ground Club as an apprentice and helped the meteoric rise of the Club to the First Division. Mark spent an initial loan period at the County Ground before his eventual signing. His non-stop running was a contributory factor in Lou Macari's decision to bring him to Swindon. Once again Mark proved to be as lucky an omen for Swindon Town as he had previously for Oxford United! Another season of promotion followed.

STEVE FOLEY: Born: Liverpool. Another of Lou Macari's close season captures. Steve moved South to join Swindon Town from Sheffield United in July 1987 for a Football League Tribunal fee of £35,000. The Liverpool born player began his career as an apprentice with Liverpool. Steve failed to make the Anfield Clubs League line up and actually made his League debut while on loan to Fulham. Eventually given a free transfer from Anfield he joined Grimsby Town in the close season of 1984, making 31 League appearances for the Blundell Park Club. Once again given a free transfer he joined Sheffield United in July 1985. During two seasons with the Bramall Lane Club he made 55 League appearances. Steve finished last season as the Yorkshire leading goalscorer with 9 goals.

JIMMY QUINN Born: Belfast. The Northern Ireland International rejoined Swindon Town from Blackburn Rovers in December 1986 for a fee of £50,000. Jim had originally joined Swindon Town from Oswestry Town in 1982. The tall striker had made 49 League appearances in his first spell at the County Ground before moving North to join the Ewood Park Club in a £32,000 transfer deal. Ironically it was the first of Lou Macari's transfer deals for Swindon Town. Jim scored 9 goals in last seasons successful promotion bid.

DAVE BAMBER: Born: St. Helens. The much travelled striker has probably produced the best soccer of his career with Swindon Town following his move from Portsmouth in March 1986. Dave had previously spent a loan period with the Club prior to his £12,500 move. Few would question that he has played a prominent role in the County Ground Clubs successive seasons of promotion. Dave began his career with Blackpool and his early promise attracted the attention of First Division Coventry City where he moved in 1983. Subsequent moves to Walsall and Portsmouth were a prelude to his eventual move to Swindon Town. A maker and taker of goals, he could be a key factor in the Clubs hopes for consolidation this season. Dave scored 19 League and Cup goals last campaign.

STEVE WHITE: Born: Chipping Sodbury. Incredibly allowed to join Swindon Town on a free transfer from Bristol Rovers in July 1986. What a signing he proved to be for the Club as he headed both the League and Football Combination's goalscoring charts for the 1986/87 season. The Chipping Sodbury born striker had two spells with Bristol Rovers where he began his League career. Steve left Rovers after his first spell in a £200,000 move to Luton Town. He eventually rejoined Rovers in August 1983 from Chariton Athletic. Steve wrote his way into the Wiltshire Clubs history when his two goals gave Swindon Town that vital 2-0 win against Gillingham at Selhurst Park, Crystal Palace on May 29th 1987 and énsured their passage into the Second Division this season.

BRYAN WADE: Born: Bolton. Plucked from the virtual obscurity of non-League soccer with Southern League Trowbridge Town for a nominal fee in the Summer of 1985. Bryan had previously had a spell with Bath City following his rejection after trials with Manchester City. A strong and powerful player with pace he often causes defenders problems with his forceful play. Bryan scored many crucial goals in Swindon Towns consecutive seasons of promotion.

KIERAN O'REGAN: The Republic of Ireland Under-21 international joined the Glub in August 1987 on a free transfer from Brighton and Hove Albion. Kieran, 24, made his debut for Swindon Town in the First Round of the Littlewoods Challenge Cup Competition on August 18th, 1987 against Bristol City. Kieran, born in Cork, made 86 League appearances for Brighton after his signing from Tranmore Athletic.



Six years later Morgan returned to Dean Court under the role as Assistant Manager. Then in September 1985, decided for the challenge of being in the hot seat himself by becoming Manager of Torquay United then placed and finished at the bottom position of the Fourth Division. Another struggling season followed for Morgan and his Devon side, who needed an injury time goal in their final game of the 1986/87 season to remain in the League.

Soon after this achievement Stuart re-joined Weymouth as Manager. His main object, to steer the side into Division 4, but a poor

run of mid season results soon dented their hopes. So now after some fine recent results the 'Terriers' look contenders for a finish in the top 10.

Morgan also hopes to end this season by winning the GMAC Cup Final, having lost the toss, the Final is to be played at opponents Horwich this coming week.

In July 1980, after ten years with AFC, this fine player joined Dorchester Town who he now manages Keith has been in charge for just over 3 seasons, and has built up a good side who have coped well with Beazer Homes Premier Division football, a league he hopes to climb eventually out of and into the GM Conference.

Reading went well over the top with their physical approach against their fellow relegation rivals in this goalless draw. The home side were guilty of many




unfair challenges, yet the unfortunate happened for Bournemouth's Tony Pulis who became the victim of the only booking during the match.


