## STEVE sees it

OOD evening.

What a marvellous occasion the visit of Plymouth Argyle to Selhurst Park 10 days ago turned out to be! Our fans had previously been denied a victory in the League to cheer this term, but we turned on our most effective performance of the

season to date and were in rampant form. Not only did we score four goals of high quality but we could easily have had several more and were only denied by the woodwork no fewer than four times!

I know that many supporters were particularly pleased and relieved to see Alan Pardew net our conclusive fourth goal three quarters of the way into the match. Of course it was an important strike because it emphasised to everyone that in spite of our misfortunes with the woodwork it WAS to be our day, even in the face of Plymouth's determined second-half performance — but it was also a thoroughly deserved reward and first senior goal by our former Yeovil Town midfield man, and I was pleased for him in that respect too.

However, welcome as that result was, we all know that we had further improvements to make in most departments — and that our game against table-topping lpswich four days later would provide us with a far sterner test.

In the event the match against the Suffolk club lived up to everyone's expectations with lots of incident, excitement and drama, plus two goals of supreme quality and made a memorable evening for Palace supporters, not to mention the Palace team!

Certainly the support we received against Ipswich was a great help to us. The atmosphere, particularly in the first half hour when we had Ipswich in some torment, was the best we've had here this season, but I was equally pleased with our display after the break when we knew the visitors would come at us with all the resources they could muster in their counter attack

In the end I felt we were full value for our win. Our strikers claimed a goal apiece from one of the best defences in the division while Brian Parkin and his colleagues were caused little serious trouble by the division's leading scorers.

Just a word on the Neil Redfearn issue. I have no wish to see Neil leave Selhurst Park. His performances for us in the last couple of games have been indicative of his talent and I should be sorry if he chooses to depart.

This evening cup action returns to Selhurst Park for Crystal Palace and our fans after an absence of over a year. There's a special flavour to any knockout competition and I'm sure our supporters will welcome tonight's game. I'm delighted to welcome my former Old Trafford team-mate Lou Macari and his Swindon Town players, fans, directors and officials, back to our headquarters and expect a fast and entertaining tussle between two capable sides.

However, one word of caution to Palace fans. Swindon may be a goal behind at start of play this evening, but they are always dangerous and must never be underestimated. So, let me again urge you to really encourage our team with your continuous, enthusiastic vocal support so that, together, we see this tie to a satisfactory conclusion.

## The Littlewoods Challenge Cup



The Littlewoods Challenge Cup is an impressive solid silver trophy made in the late 19th century. It is elaborately engraved and has a detailed Victorian footballer surmounting the lid. The Cup stands 2ft. 9in. on its plinth and the combined weight of the Cup, lid and plinth total 3.789kg.

The Cup represents a perfect example of the Victorian silversmith's art. It is superbly hand chased and it was assayed in London in 1895 and bears the

mark of Turner Bradbury, who was registered as a plate worker on 30th May 1889.

The Cup was first competed for as the Viscountess Furness' Football Cup by the employees of Furness, Withy and Co., a renowned firm of shipbuilders in the North East of England. The Cup formerly bore the names of the sections in the shippard winning the trophy such as The Platers Helpers in 1923. Presented by the Viscountess Furness in 1898, the trophy is arguably the oldest football trophy in Great Britain and probably the world.

## PALACE HOLD SWAY AT SWINDON

It took a late and somewhat controversial goal, headed home in spectacular fashion by lan Wright, to separate the two teams in the first leg match between the Palace and Swindon at the County Ground two weeks ago. However, let no-one from either camp think that tonight's second leg is a formality. Palace boss **Steve Coppell** was adamant. "This tie is not all over by any means. Swindon are a strong attacking side and have proven goal-scorers in their team. We have only reached half-time in this contest," Steve told us, "and we still have plenty of work to do to secure our place in the next round."

Charlton Athletic are at home at Selhurst Park on Saturday next, 15th October, when Aston Villa provide the opposition, kick-off is at 3.00pm.



## **ELCOME TO**

## SWINDON TOWN

## **ADMIRED**

THE rise and rise of Swindon Town from Fourth Division obscurity to a growing status among the Second Division challengers has been observed and admired by football fans everywhere, Palace supporters among them.

However, it may possibly be that The Robins' recent achievements in the cup competitions — some of them quite stunning — may have eluded one or two of the observers at tonight's proceedings, and even if Eagles' fans are well aware of Town's rising and fearsome reputation in knock-out competitions, Swindon readers will be more than happy to recall the triumphs of their Wiltshire favourites that have gained them such prestige as a tremendous cup-fighting side.

## SUCCESSFUL SWINDON

Whilst Swindon were still a Fourth Division outfit they disposed of Laurie McMenemy's Sunderland and First Division Sheffield Wednesday in the Milk Cup (immediate predecessor of the Littlewoods Cup) in 1985-86, thus giving rise to the local in-joke 'when did Wednesday fall on a Tuesday?'! The following season saw them reach the fourth round of the F.A. Cup before losing out in a thriller to Leeds United by the odd goal in three, whilst last term, if their success in the League Cup was restricted to beating Bristol City and First Division Portsmouth, Swindon more than compensated by beating First Division Norwich City in a third round F.A. Cup replay at Carrow Road and by reaching the semi-final of the Simod Cup with victories over Blackburn (away), Derby County, Chelsea and Norwich before going out on the dreaded plastic pitch at Luton Town (1-2).

## 1988-89

More pertinent perhaps to the outcome of this evening's clash is the way in which Swindon have fared in the opening weeks of the current League season.

To begin with, like the Palace, Town found the scoring of goals not quite the simple matter it had been last term, but they have proved a difficult side to beat and have gained battling away points at Barnsley (1-1) and Blackburn (0-0).

Meanwhile at home they powered their way to two emphatic home wins in a week in mid-September, scoring three times on each occasion to despatch Bournemouth and Brighton while sending themselves soaring into the top half of the table. Then the Town registered a stunning 3-2 victory at table-topping Watford — so let no-one be in any doubt as to their ability to rescue this two-legged cup-tie!


## HE PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS — BOBBY WOODRUFF

Bbbby joined his local club Swindon Town from school when 18 in 1958 and was an attacking wing-half in the team that manager Bert Head was building that went on to gain Second Division status at the end of 1962-63. Bobby played alongside another player who was to join up with him again at Crystal Palace — Cliff Jackson — and also another well-known player from the '60s and '70s Mike Summerbee. In March 1964 he joined Wolves after scoring 19 goals in 180 League games for Swindon and then in June 1966 he joined his former manager Bert Head who was now manager of Crystal Palace, at Selhurst Park. In his first two seasons he was leading scorer with 18 goals in each season, but in the next season in March 1969 he broke his collar bone in the home game with Oxford United and was sidelined for the last dozen games as Palace went on to attain First Division status for the first time, and in 1969-70 his appearances were limited as Palace struggled. His last game for Palace was in November 1969 and he moved on to Cardiff City for five years and ended his playing career with Newport County. Bobby had scored 48 goals for Palace in 125 League games (including two as substitute) and played over 550 League games in total.

Bobby Woodruff was probably better known for the strength in his arms rather than his legs for he possessed probably the longest throw in League football during his time and could easily throw up to 40 yards as Palace and probably Swindon supporters will recall as throw-ins as good as corners were launched by Bobby. Unfortunately it was this attribute that ended his career as he had to undergo an intricate spinal operation whilst with Newport, but then later returned as Youth Coach at Cardiff City in the late '70s.





LOU MACARI was born in Aberdeen but it was in the green hooped shirts of Glasgow Celtic that he came to the attention of Scottish and then British soccer fans as a tough, tenacious snapper-up of goal chances.

After making 56 Scottish League appearances for the Celts and scoring 27 goals Lou joined Manchester United in mid-January 1973 for £200,000 at the instigation of Tommy Docherty, who was prepared to pay a record fee for a Scottish player to acquire the little man's talented services

Whilst at Old Trafford Lou transferred his attentions to the midfield areas of the park, made 329 Football League appearances, finding the net on 78 occasions, and played for The Reds in the 1976, 1977 and 1979 F.A. Cup Finals at Wembley along with our own Steve Coppell, He also became a regular choice for the full Scottish international side where he gained 24 full caps (plus two at Under-23 level), and was in the Scottish 1978 World Cup squad in Argentina.

When Lou left Old Trafford he received a testimonial game in May 1984 against his former club. Celtic and over 40,000 fans turned out in appreciation of his endeavours for United. The receipt, over £80,000 represents a record for a testimonial match in this country.

Mr. Macari was appointed Manager at The County Ground, Swindon, in July 1984 — player-manager in fact, because Lou did make 36 League appearances for Swindon in the course of his first two seasons with the Wiltshire 'Robins'.

In 1985-86 Lou steered Swindon out of Division Four not merely as impressive champions but with a record 102 points and he was obviously the only serious candidate for the Bell's Fourth Division

Manager of the Season award. Immediately, Mr. Macari took Swindon to third place in Division Three in 1986-87 and, after a play-off replay here at Selhurt Park, restored them to their rightful place in the Second Division



Last season was somewhat disappointing for the former Manchester United goalkeeper, who joined the club in December 1986, for a fee of £32,500, after an initial period on loan at the County Ground. A thumb injury sustained at Crystal Palace in late October, restricted Fraser's appearances to 31 League matches. It also cost him his England Under-21 position, although he was included in several of the end of season squads named by England Under-21 manager, Dave Sexton.

### NICKY HAMMOND

Signed on a free transfer from Arsenal in July 1987, the former Highbury apprentice was forced into first team action last season, due to the injury that Fraser Digby sustained in October 1987. Previously Nick's League experience had been confined to his spell with Bristol Rovers, on loan. The former Arsenal 'keeper signed a new two year contract with the club in May 1988.

### DAVE HOCKADAY

Dave signed a new two-year contract with the club in the summer of 1988. The former Blackpool player, who moved to the County Ground in August 1983 as a winger, enjoyed one of the best seasons of his career, last season. Since his conversion to a full back position, his form has been enhanced. Dave has been a regular member of the Swindon Town team that has risen from the Fourth Division under the guidance of Lou Macari's managership.

### PHIL KING

Phil was the only player to appear in every League match last season. Phil began his career with Exeter City in May 1985, before joining Torquay United in July 1986, for a League tribunal settled transfer fee of £3,000. Although Phill originally joined Swindon Town on a month's loan in February 1987, his transfer became permanent one month later for a £12,000 fee. Torquay United are entitled to one-third of any transfer fee, if Phil is transferred in the future.

### TIM PARKIN

During the close season, Tim signed a new two-year contract with the club. The former Blackburn Rovers, Malmo and Bristol Rovers central defender was named 'Player of the Year' in May 1988 by the club's supporters. The vastly experienced defender must rate as one of Lou Macari's best signings, when he secured the signature of the Penrith-born player in July 1986. The subsequent fee of £27,500 was settled by a League tribunal. The same tribunal had sat only minutes earlier deciding the fee that Torquay United had to pay for Phil King, who is now on the club's staff!

## COLIN CALDERWOOD

Colin, who joined Swindon Town from Mansfield Town in June 1985, for a Football League tribunal fee of £27,500, has been a stalwart at the heart of the Town's defence in the club's last three seasons. Colin had the honour of captaining the club through two successive seasons of promotion in the 1985-86 and 1986-87 campaigns. After making 131 consecutive League appearances since his signing in July 1985, injury interrupted Colin's progress last season. Although the form of the Scottish-born defender has often attracted the attention of several of the country's leading clubs, he remains at the County Ground.

## JON GITTENS

The former Southampton defender proved himself a firm favourite with the County Ground faithful, with some determined and enthusiastic performances last season. Jon, who moved to the County Ground for a £45,000 Footall League tribunal fee, in July 1987, was playing non-League football for Paget Rangers in the Midland Combination league, before accepting a successful trial period at the Dell. It was a commanding central defensive performance against lan Rush, for the Saints versus Liverpool, that first brought him to the attention of Lou Macari.

## **ROSS MacLAREN**

Ross joined Swindon Town on a conditional transfer fee, decided by a Football League tribunal at £150,000, in July 1988. Ross entered the Football League from Glasgow Rangers on a free transfer to Shrewsbury Town. After five seasons with the Gay Meadow club. Ross joined Derby County in July 1985, after a Football League tribunal commission had set the fee at £67,500. In three seasons with the Baseball Ground club, Ross helped the East Midland club to win promotion from the Third Division, to the First Division. Ross was an ever-present during his first two seasons with Derby County.


## STEVE FOLEY

Steve joined Swindon Town in July 1987 for a League tribunal fee of £35,000. The former Sheffield United midfield player had joined the Yorkshire club from Grimsby Town in July 1985. Steve began his career with Liverpool, without making a breakthrough into the Anfield club's League team. His actual League debut came while he was on

loan to Fulham in December 1983. Suspensions dogged his first season with the club.

## LEIGH BARNARD

This hardworking midfield player is one of only three players who were at the County Ground, before Lou Macari arrived to take over the managerial role in July 1986. A free transfer signing from Portsmouth in July 1984, Leigh has played a significant role in the club's successful efforts to regain its Second Division status, after languishing in the lower Divisions for 12 seasons. Leigh signed a new one year contract with the club in July 1988.

## CHARLIE HENRY

Charlie, who is due a testimonial match this season, after 10 years service with Swindon Town, originally joined the club as an apprentice, and epitomises all the good factors of our national game. A utility player, who can virtually play in any position, he was the club's leading goalscorer in the season that Swindon Town won the Fourth Division championship, with a record number of points — 102 in 1985-86. Charlie signed a new one-year contract with the club in July 1988.

## ALAN McLOUGHLIN

The former Manchester United apprentice moved south to join Swindon Town on a free transfer in August 1986. Another of the players on the Town books who can be rightly be described as a utility player. Alan, who has spent two loan spells with Torquay United, signed a new two year contract with the County Ground club in May 1988. Alan was a member of Manchester United's Central League team during Lou Macari's playing career at Old Trafford, and played alongside the former Scotland international in the latter days of his bareer.

## PAUL BODIN

Paul was signed from Newport County in March 1988 for a fee of £25,000. Amazingly he had only been with the Somerton Park club for four weeks following his signing from Bath City. The former Cardiff City midfield player must have been relieved to have another opportunity to build a career in League soccer, for Newport County were destined to leave the Football League at the completion of last season. Paul will be hoping to establish a regular position, in the Town's midfield section this season.

## PETER COYNE

The former Manchester United apprentice was Lou Macari's first ever signing for Swindon Town, when he took over as manager in July 1984. The former England Schoolboy international, who was outstanding at this level, never matured to the level expected of him, and despite a short period at Old Trafford, and several seasons with Crowe Alexandra, he twice drifted into non-League soccer between spells with these two Football League clubs. Peter cost Swindon Town £5,000, when they signed him from non-League Hyde United. The former 'wonder boy' of English schoolboy soccer played the best tootball of his career as Swindon Town swept from Fourth Division to Second in the space of two seasons.

## BOBBY BARNES

Bobby joined Swindon Town from Aldershot for £50,000 in an exchange deal that took midfield player. Steve Berry to the Recreation Ground in October 1987. Bob was an instant hit with Swindon Town fans, with some dazzling displays. The former West Ham United apprentice scored 11 goals last season, to help the Wiltshire Club attain a comfortable mid-table position on their return to the Second Division.

## **DUNCAN SHEARER**

Duncan was the subject of a \$250,000 transfer deal during June, that was a record for both Huddersfield Town and Swindon Town. He had been a target for Town boss. Lou Macari, when he was with Chelsea before moving north to Huddersfield. The free-scoring striker would appear to be an ideal replacement for Northern Ireland international striker. Jimmy Quinn, who moved to Leicester City in June, on a freedom of contract move.

## STEVE WHITE

Steve must represent one of the best transfer signings in the history of the club. Since he was signed from Bristol Rovers in July 1986, he has scored 35 goals, in 61 full first team appearances. The former Chariton Athletic and Luton Town striker, had no hesitation in renewing his links with Swindon Town in the summer after his contract had expired. Steve, who was once the subject of a six-figure transfer fee between Bristol Rovers and Luton Town, in his first spell with Rovers, signed a new three-year contract in June 1988.

## MEET THE PLAYERS

It's not always easy to get autographs and chat to your favourite players, but if you're in the Family Lounge between 2pm and 2.30pm on matchdays there's a good chance of doing just that.

At the Plymouth match we welcomed Perry Suckling, Andy Woodman and Mark Hone. For 20 minutes they chatted on the stage and answered questions from you girls and boys. Afterwards they signed dozens of programmes and autograph books. Here are some of their answers to your questions.

QUESTION: What was your favourite team when you were young?

PERRY: "Spurs, they were near to where we lived. But now, of course, it must be Palace. (TO CHILDREN) What's your favourite team?"



## Points of Interest

In spite of the arrival of an experienced manager in Alan Mullery, Palace fared no better in 1982-83 than in the previous season. Indeed, this time it was only in the final match that our Second Division safety was secured by a single goal victory over Burnley at Selhurst Park which doomed the Clarets to Division Three.

Ultimately the Palace finished 1982-83 with exactly the same number of points and in **precisely the same position** as we had managed in the previous campaign.

Palace badly missed the goalscoring talents of **Kevin Mabbutt**, sidelined from November to April with a pelvic injury. Kevin had scored eight goals in the first 16 League games before his injury, but, in spite of his long absence, still finished as our leading scorer by a considerable margin (see above).





## TAFFS OUT TALKABOUT

IN MY last article I began to investigate the reasons for the so-called loss of flair and individualism within the game. We looked at speed of play, systems and statistics and considered whether these were relevant factors.

Another consideration we must take into account is whether the ball is being 'worked through' as it used to be. The goalkeeper does not roll it out to his full back, his full back does not play it through to the centre half and the ball is not worked through midfield as it used to be. It is now a case of getting the ball into our opponents half as quickly as possible, i.e. from the goalkeeper or from long upfield clearance-style passes from the full back. This may be down to the facts and figures of the game showing that this is the way many of today's goals are scored. Managers and coaches today may be dictated to by these facts and take the view that their teams should not be 'messing around' with making creative passes when the team have more chance of getting the ball in the net by other means. I myself always maintain that there should be a happy medium between the individual type of play and the teamwork requirement.

The Rodney Marshes and George Bests of this world may not have been equipped totally to play in today's game but certain aspects of their game would have been ideal, because at some stage of a game you are always going to get a one-versus-one situation. If you have the ability of these players you have what is needed and it can easily be accommodated within the framework of today's game.



Players still have to take in their stride the one-versus-one situation and must not fear the wrath of the manager's tongue if they fail to beat their man. He must be given the licence to try.

To conclude tonight I must ask you for more of your comments about the game. The postal strike has not helped but I would like to hear much more from supporters both junior and senior to give me an idea of what you want to know — send them to Taff, C.P.F.C., Selhurst Park SE25 6PU.




