# Comment

These notes are written before the Christmas fixtures, but hopefully the team managed to glean some reward from the tough trips to Watford and Sunderland and move into the second half of the season with high hopes of making a swift return to the First Division.

Earlier this season we played Swindon at the County Ground, but in spite of taking an early lead through Mark Chamberlain, the Wiltshire men gave us as stiff a test as most this year and gained a well deserved equaliser just before the final whistle. No doubt the Pompey team will also be anxious to settle a score from last season when Swindon dumped us out of the Littlewoods Cup 6-2 on aggregate.

In our last home match it was good to see Warren Aspinall back among the goals, and equally pleasing to see Paul Hardyman slot home his first League goal of the season in fine style.

He was desperately unlucky not to be credited with a goal at Chelsea, when his header came down off the bar and seemingly over the line, but the referee waved play on.

"In recent weeks I have swopped over with Lee Sandford and am really enjoying it at the moment. Scoring against Brighton certainly made up for the Chelsea disappointment," he commented after the game.

As we reach the half-way stage in the season, the editorial staff on The Chimes are also taking stock. I wish I'd had a crystal ball when I sat down to think about this first programme of the New Year.

If I had then I'd have known how we got on at Watford and Sunderland.

But, because of the Christmas holiday at the printers, I had to write them immediately after the match against Brighton.

That left me with mixed feelings – disappointed in a way with our performance but with that disappointment offset by the satisfaction of three more points.

It took us into the real Holiday programme in a very handy position indeed, just four points adrift of leaders Blackburn.

By now, of course, that can have changed radically since we've all played two more matches – and both of ours were away from home.

But whatever our results and of the matches involving the teams around us, it's still been a pretty good – perhaps even a very good – first half of the programme for us.

Today's match against Swindon sees us begin the second half of our fixtures and, as I wrote in the Brighton programme, since we have most of the top teams – and most of those near the bottom of the table – to come to Fratton, I have to be very optimistic.

Certainly it looks a very open division at the moment; I don't think I can remember one in recent years when the lead changed hands so frequently as it has this time and it would be a brave man who forecast what the table will finally look like.

But I fancy us to be in at the kill - I've just got that feeling about things.

We seem to have developed a nice knack of pulling something out when it's most needed – in a way the Brighton match typified that.

Not our best performance but we still managed to fashion two rather special goals.

Today's match is one I very much want to win - I feel we owe Swindon something.

We've played them three times in the past two seasons and we've got very little from the matches — it's time we did. And if we can, it will give us a boost for next Saturday when they're back here in the third round of the F.A. Cup. As they say, that will be a very different match — but whoever comes out on top today will fancy their chances of taking that first step towards Wembley.

Finally, I hope you've all had a good Christmas and that 1989 will be kind to you all.

# DIARY

Good afternoon and welcome to Fratton Park for our first match of 1989. Today's game against Swindon marks the commencement of the second half of the season. For our final 23 League games of 1988-89, we have twelve home games and eleven away fixtures; with promotion hopefuls Watford, Chelsea, Blackburn Rovers and Manchester City all having to visit Fratton in the next five months.

# **SWINDON WELCOME**

Today we extend a very warm New Year welcome to the Officials, Players and Supporters of Swindon Town, who travel to Fratton as the side who ended our one hundred percent start to the season. They achieved this in the fourth game of the new campaign, when Steve Foley cancelled out Mark Chamberlain's 7th minute opener with a 86th minute equaliser.

# POMPEY PLAN FOR THE FUTURE

Pompey have laid further foundation stones for a future team by signing another four associate schoolboys.

The latest young hopefuls are Selsey winger Jonny Bines, a member of the West Sussex Schools U14 side; Basingstoke midfielders Shaun O'Mahoney and Marc Pattison; and Portsmouth Schools representative Mark Jones, who is a utility player.

#### NO TO MEMBERSHIP

The campaign to protect soccer from the Government's Compulsory Membership Scheme is now under way, headed by no less a person than League President Jack Dunnett, who recently pointed out that it will cost at least £34 million to install the technical equipment necessary for processing the controversial cards.

If you wish to help in campaigning against the scheme, there are several things you can do. You can:

- Write to Colin Moynihan, Minister of Sport, Department of the Environment, 2 Marsham Street, London. Outline your objections and ask for a prompt reply.
- Write to your MP. Tell him/her why you oppose the scheme and urge them to oppose the legislation in the House of Commons. Remember, your MP has been elected to represent your views.
- Write to your club and express your support for their opposition to the proposals.
- Write to Jack Dunnett, President of the League, expressing support in his leadership against the proposals.

Write to the Prime Minister. Let her know why you consider the scheme to be pointless and why you think it could do more harm than good.

Remember, the National ID card will affect YOU.

Act now to save the game.

# HORNE HOPES FOR QUICK RETURN

Barry Horne is confident that he will be challenging for his place in the side any time now. Recovering well from the cartilage operation which he had at the beginning of December, Barry was even hoping that he would be fit enough for our match at Roker Park a couple of days ago.

Interestingly, the past few matches have been the first that Barry have missed in his career through injury. "It had to happen some time I suppose — I've had a pretty good run really," reflected Barry.

"In my three years at Wrexham, when I played something like 180 matches in various competitions, I never missed one through injury."

"I hadn't here until this one – I just hope I have another run like that once I get back to playing."

# **FORMER POSITION BRINGS SUCCESS**

Paul Hardyman's impressive displays on the left wing in recent games have earned him the praise of a Fratton crowd who are normally used to seeing him as a left back. Yet as Paul explained, he began his career in a more forward role. "When I started in the Pompey Youth side," said Paul, "I played as a left sided midfielder who often pushed out onto the wing."



However, when Bobby Campbell took over from Frank Burrows as manager, Paul was converted to a left back, a position he remained in when Alan Ball resumed control – until, that is, this season.

Beginning 1988-89 in his regular defensive role, Paul found himself in midfield against Bradford during October before being given the opportunity of operating on the left wing against Hull in the Simod Cup. Celebrating his selection by scoring our winner, Paul has since challenged Mark Kelly for the number eleven shirt.

Looking confident in his ability to take on opposing defenders, Paul has also been looking dangerous in front of goal, and against Brighton, crashed home his second goal of the season. Receiving a neat pass from Aspinall, Paul raced into the left side of the Seagull's area before hitting a stunning shot past John Keeley for our last Fratton goal of 1988.

# REPLACEMENT AVAILABLE

The injury to striker Terry Connor has left Alan Ball with only two recognised centre forwards: Mick Quinn and Warren Aspinall. However, if one of these two should suffer an injury or suspension, Alan could find a temporary replacement immediately. For as soon as he learned of Terry's predicament, Alan contacted a number of managers, and quickly had assurances from one First Division club that a young striker would be on his way South if the need arises.

#### DARBY HAS MAJOR SURGERY

Lee Darby became Pompey's third player in December to have major surgery following an operation to remove a cartilage from a damaged knee. The 19 year old who made his Pompey debut almost a year ago in our 2-1 FA Cup Third Round win at Blackburn, received the unfortunate injury after making a first minute tackle during a Combination match against Millwall at Fratton.

#### **FURTHER INJURY NEWS**

19 year old striker Phil Carroll and apprentice Dave Pettican are both currently suffering from injury. With Phil waiting for a decision on a back problem which has kept him out of action for much of the season, and Dave suffering similar frustration due to a serious knee injury, which is likely to require major surgery.

## **DID YOU KNOW?**

In our first eleven home League games of the season, Pompey have kicked off the first half on eight occasions; with Oxford, Bournemouth and Oldham being the only visitors to have the honour of starting a League match at Fratton. During these eleven games, we have also attacked the Milton End goal during the first half on eight occasions.

#### **NEWS OF FORMER PLAYERS**

Former Pompey striker Trevor Senior is back among the goals with Reading after experiencing mixed fortunes in the First Division with Watford and Middlesbrough. Hitting his 9th goal in ten games as Reading defeated Maidstone 2-1 in a FA Cup 2nd Round Replay, Trevor is looking as sharp as he did during his first spell with the Royals, when he hit 102 goals in 164 League appearances.

Other former players among the goals include Mario Walsh for Colchester, Kevin Bartlett for Cardiff, Steve Berry for Northampton, Brendon O'Connell for Burnley, Kevin O'Callaghan for Millwall, Scott McGarvey for Bristol City and Paul Sugrue for non League Newport County.

Meanwhile, Kenny Swain is enjoying life at Fourth Division Crewe Alexandra. Playing an influential role in Crew's bid for promotion, which saw them lying joint top on the Saturday before Christmas, Kenny is also in charge of coaching 21 apprentices and YTS youngsters.

#### **RESERVES TRAVEL TO SWINDON**

Pompey Reserves kick off the New Year tomorrow, when we travel to Wiltshire to play the second team of Swindon in the Ovendon Papers Combination.

#### VISIT TO FILBERT STREET

Barring a FA Cup Replay, our next away game is on Saturday, January 14th, when we journey to Filbert Street to play Leicester City in a Barclays League Division Two fixture.

For this 3pm kick off, The Travel Club are running efficient, organised and official coaches, with Tickets and Times available shortly from Don at the Pompey Shop.

#### **FACUP MAGIC FOR FRATTON**

# TOWN SPLASH OUT DURING SUMMER

On their return to the Second Division. after an absence of thirteen years, Swindon Town completed last season in a mid-table position. During the close season freedom of contract dictated that several players exercised their right to join other clubs, and therefore Jimmy Quinn the leading goalscorer in the Second Division last season joined Leicester City. To replace the free scoring Northern Ireland international, Lou Macari signed Duncan Shearer from Huddersfield Town for £250,000. A record transfer deal for both clubs. Other players to leave the County Ground during the close season were. Dave Bamber (Watford), Chris Kamara (Stoke City), Bryan Wade (Swansea City), and Kieran O'Regan (Huddersfield Town).

Once again, which now appears to be an annual summer trait, the future of the Clubs highly successful Manager, Lou Macarl, was a matter of conjecture. His future was linked with a possible move to Chelsea. It was with relief, that Lou finally

committed his immediate future to Swindon Town. Behind the scenes moves, ensured that former Shrewsbury Town Manager, Chic Bates, who joined the Club coaching staff during the course of last season, accepted a greater responsibility with first team affairs.

The Second Division is a highly competitive Division, and once again Swindon Town have made moves in the transfer

market, to compete with the rest of the Division. Ross Mac-Laren, the Derby County central defender was added to the clubs payroll in July, after a Football League tribunal had set the fee at £150,000, following Swindon Town's request, that a compensation fee be set.

# "As the clock turns into a new year – despite the ups and downs of football – **Richard Owen** reports on today's opponents..."

The first Pompey football match of 1989 and the start of the second-half of the current season. Results from our two previous matches away at Watford and Sunderland are unknown at the time of writing but by now the team, Officials and supporters will know whether Pompey really mean business by hovering around the top five League positions or perhaps the away trips have proved extra effort and confidence are needed. This afternoon's Bank Holiday opposition may know a little more about the rest of their season too as **Swindon Town** are situated in mid-table and with the majority of clubs so tightly packed together with the same League points, their destiny is in their own feet. At the time these notes were penned, Swindon's next two games were both at home versus Plymouth and Manchester City and maximum points would have place the Wiltshire club on the fringe of the promotion race. Two defeats may well have allowed others to overtake and place Swindon into the bottom six mire.

Swindon Town, regular visitors to this ground during the seventies and early eighties, arrive to challenge Pompey for three League points for the first time since May 1982 and have not scored a League goal here since January 1978. Town's last League visit was one their supporters would care to forget as a **Jeff Hemmerman** hat-trick brought the 1981-82 season to a close, sending down already-relegated Swindon to the Fourth Division for the first time in their history. Since that 3-0 end-of-season victory much has happened to both clubs. **The Robins**, a nickname which is hardly-ever chanted by their fans, have scrapped their way out of the Fourth Division under the managerial guidance of ex-Manchester United star **Lou Macari** and have never looked back. A remarkable escalating rise now brings regular Second Division football back to the **County Ground**, much to the relief of their average 9,000 supporters who converge fortnightly at the only Football League ground in England which was used as a Prisoner of War camp during the last World War.

The club was founded 107 years ago and won League status in 1920 joining Pompey in Division Three. For over forty years, the towns' football club — in an area more renowned for Railways — remained in the Third Division until 1963 when, for the first time in their history, promotion was achieved finishing Runners-up behind Northampton Town. Sadly second-grade football only lasted two seasons and Town were relegated but in 1969, Swindon Town became the giant-killers of the year as they fought their way through to the League Cup Final to play Arsenal at Wembley. The club, who represent the only-ever League team from **Wiltshire**, pulled off a magnificent victory defeating First Division high-flyers Arsenal 3-1. Two of the goals were scored by Don Rogers whose team-mates included **Frank Burrows** and **Stan Harland**. Swindon fans often recall those heady days nearly twenty years ago when the club chalked up an unusual double that season — winning the League Cup and promotion to the Second Division! Their most recent claim to fame since then was winning the Fourth Division Championship with a record 102 points two years ago.

Players who have brought success to the club over the years include **Harold Fleming, Harry Morris, Maurice Owen, Ernie Hunt, Mike Summerbee, Norman Uprichard** (ex-Pompey), **Billy Lucas** and **John Trollope**. Undoubtedly the last surname will be familiar with young football supporters for **John Trollope** wore a Swindon Town shirt between 1960 and 1980, playing 878 matches for the club (770 in League form) to become the most loyal 'club man' in Soccer History. John overtook the previous record held by our very own **Jimmy Dickinson** who played 764 games for Pompey. Both men were awarded MBE decorations for services to football during their careers.

Games between both clubs over the years have always produced a goal or two at Fratton Park and being drawn against each other in Cup Competition is almost a speciality! Reflecting back on Cup exploits will be relayed in our next programme, against Swindon in the FA. Cup this Saturday. However, Pompey's best League victory over The Robins is a 5-0 scoreline recorded in September 1964 when **John McClelland** and **Cliff Portwood** netted a brace of goals each backed by an Albert McCann solo effort. All the goals came in the first half to leave the 12,501 crowd bemused after half-time. To ensure 1989 gets off to a positive and goal-cracking start, I'm sure todays' Bank Holiday crowd could put up with the same sort of game!

#### JANUARY

A tricky month for Pompey, but two wins and a draw in the League keep the promotion bandwagon rolling. Defeat at West Ham in the Fourth Round of the FA Cup is a disappointment though. Non-League Sutton knock First Division Coventry out of the Cup.

#### **FEBRUARY**

A 2-1 home defeat by Manchester City get the month off to a bad start for Pompey, but three wins out of the next four matches keep us more or less on course for promotion. Liverpool surprisingly lose 2-1 at home to Middlesbrough in the FA Cup.

#### MARCH

Two draws, two wins and two defeats for Pompey this month, but the 3-1 win over Watford at Fratton on Easter Monday leaves us just five points behind the side in second place, West Bromwich Albion, Everton, Nottingham Forest, Spurs and West Bromwich Albion reach the FA Cup semi finals.

#### APRIL

Three wins, two draws and a defeat virtually ensure Pompey's place in the play offs, but leave the final promotion place — Chelsea having already won the championship — up for grabs. England follow up their 1-0 win in Albania with a 1-1 draw at Wembley. The Sun devotes its first three pages to 'a national scandal'.

#### MAY

Pompey squeeze into that second promotion place by virtue of a 2-0 win at West Bromwich Albion, then follow it up with a 3-1 victory over Chelsea in front of 28,000 at Fratton. Spurs win the FA Cup, Arsenal the League and England win the Rous Cup.

#### IUNE

England restore their pride with a fine 2-0 win over Poland in the World Cup.

#### JULY

In the 1989/90 fixtures, published this month, Pompey start their First Division campaign at Coventry. This is followed by home matches with Spurs and Newcastle.

#### **AUGUST**

Pompey tour Scandinavia and win five matches out of five then draw their first three matches. Charlton are the shock leaders of the First Division. Champions Arsenal 17th.

#### SEPTEMBER

Manchester United splash out £1.7m to bring John Barnes to Old Trafford. The new Fratton End opens for the first time in a 2-2 home draw with Everton.

#### OCTOBER

Mick Quinn bags his first First Division hat trick to seal a 4-1 win over Aston Villa at Fratton Park, a result which puts Pompey in eighth place. England lose in Poland and will have to play off for a World Cup place. Scotland qualify at the expense of France.

#### DECEMBER

Pompey defeat Southampton 2-1 on the Saturday before Christmas to send a 26,000 Fratton crowd wild with delight, and a mystery 'big money' signing rumour fills the air. Alan Ball is keeping quiet though. The Pompey programme editor says, with a satisfied grin. "Didn't I do well with my predictions..."

Somehow I can't see it happening. But what do you think.



# BLACKBURN LEAD THE WAY – AT LAST

The Christmas period traditionally heralds the midway point of the season. With a number of very important matches having been played during the past two weeks, both at the top of the table and at the bottom, the future of various clubs should now become clearer.

However, although a few promotion contenders may use the Festive fixtures to announce their ambitions, the battle for promotion and relegation will still remain uncertain. For with the play offs in operation and less than 30 points currently separating the top club from the bottom side, any team capable of putting together a good run of victories could leap frog from the lower reaches into the promotion cauldron.

On the last Saturday before Christmas, six teams were within five points of each other at the top of the table. Leading the Division were Blackburn Rovers, who had beaten Watford 2-1 at Ewood Park to top the table for the first time in two months. By doing so, Rovers had jumped ahead of Friday night leaders Chelsea, who moved back down into third place, two points ahead of Watford and Pompey, who both had 35 points from 21 games.

Occupying sixth position were West Bromwich Albion, with 34 points from 20 games, only a point more than seventh placed Barnsley and seven points more than 15th placed Swindon Town.

Chelsea have announced their determination to return to Division One by persuading striker Kerry Dixon to sign a new four year contract – despite a £1.4 million offer for him from Arsenal

The Gunners, who were also prepared to offer the Blues Niall Quinn as an immediate replacement, were turned down by Chelsea Chairman Ken Bates, who had earlier accepted a £1 million bid from London neighbours West Ham United. Dixon though, declined the move to Upton Park, saying that he preferred to remain at Stamford Bridge. "I've always known Chelsea were the club for me and now I want to finish my career with them", said Dixon after signing his new contract. "I had no hesitation in accepting the offer made and I just want to help Chelsea back into the First Division".

His signing pleased manager Bobby Campbell, who commented: "We want to keep our best players in order to get back into the First Division".

Ipswich Town have clinched the most intriguing transfer deal of the season to date by signing Soviet defender Sergei Baltacha from Dinamo Kiev for £200,000.

Town manager John Duncan travelled to Moscow with Director David Sheepshank to complete the deal, and after returning to England said: "I'm sure he will prove a superb ambassador for his country and a great help to this club".

Thirty year old Baltacha has signed an eighteen month contract at Ipswich, although due to possible social differences and the uniqueness of the move, there is a get out clause for both player and club after six months. Arriving in England with his wife and two children, Baltacha is expected to make his Ipswich debut sometime in the next six weeks after receiving his work permit, and when he does he will become the first Soviet player to appear in the Football League.

Born on February 17th, 1958, Sergei Baltacha has won 46 Soviet caps and appeared in the 1988 European Championship Final against Holland, when he came on as a 67th minute substitute for Sergei Gotsmanov. Joining Kiev from Karkhov in 1977, Baltacha won Soviet League Championship medals while at Dinamo, as well as a European Cup Winners' Cup medal, which he received after

helping Kiev defeat Athletico Madrid 3-0 in the 1986 final at Lyon.

At the bottom of Division Two, at least five clubs are in danger of slipping into Division Three. The club most likely to go down is Birmingham City, who have been rooted to the bottom position since October 22nd, when both Shrewsbury and Brighton leap frogged over them.

The Seagull's though have fared little better since overtaking Birmingham, and suffered their 13th defeat of the season when they lost 2-0 at Fratton on our last home game of 1988. Six of their 13 defeats were recorded in succession at the beginning of the campaign.

Shrewsbury, however, look as if they might avoid the drop. Since losing their opening match of the season at home to Pompey, The Shrews have gradually begun the slow climb up the table. And although on the last Saturday before Christmas they were only four places from bottom, they had just recorded a 3-2 away victory against Leeds and a 2-2 draw at Manchester City, thanks largely to Carl Griffith, who scored twice in both games.


The side who could provide the biggest — and most welcome — surprise this season are AFC Bournemouth, who began their hectic schedule of Christmas matches lying in eighth position after defeating Walsall 2-1 at Dean Court. Their first goal in this game which was watched by 6,985 fans was scored by Trevor Aylott, who celebrated his 100th League appearance for Bournemouth by scoring after only 100 seconds. Their winner though, was scored by Luther Blissett, who took his tally to eight goals in five games to ensure the Cherries of victory.


After the match, Trevor Aylott revealed the faith that the players have in their ability to gain promotion. "There is no one we should be afraid of", he said. "With six teams playing off, who is to say we won't do it?"

KEVIN SMITH continues his trip through the Football League recalling memorable Pompey matches by dropping in at Filbert Street, home of Leicester City.

Pompey approached their trip to Filbert Street in October 1928 with caution. In the previous season they had lost there 6-2, and Leicester were making a bold bid for the championship, while Pompey were once again at the other end of the First Division.

And they suffered a severe setback to their relegation struggle in a 10-0 rout, which remains to this day our record defeat.

There could be no excuse for the amazing debacle. Leicester played extraordinarily well, but a team can only play as well as their opponents let them, and City were allowed to do practically as they liked.

The onslaught began in the ninth minute when Leicester winger Hine opened the scoring, dribbling through the Pompey defence. For the record further goals were added before half time by a Chandler hat trick and Barry.

There was no respite after the interval, Chandler scored his fourth and fifth of the afternoon, set up Hine for his second, before completing a double hat trick. The rout was completed when Hine scored his third of the afternoon.

The Leicester Sports Mercury commented: "It was one of the most wonderful exhibitions of football ever seen on the Filbert Street ground. As the players left the pitch the crowd cheered wildly for several minutes."

But inspite of that result Leicester failed to take the championship, and Pompey managed to retain their First Division place at the end of the season.

# "DOUBLE"

And by the time we met in March 1949 in the F.A. Cup semi-final Pompey were going for the coveted 'double' while Leicester were languishing in the Second Division.

Pompey had topped the table throughout the season and the twin towers of Wembley seemed to be beckoning, but it

was the Midlands side who won the right to step out on the Wembley turf with a great display of fighting spirit.

Hundreds of their wildly excited fans ran on to the field after their 3-1 victory to carry shoulder high the players who had taken the club to their first F.A. Cup final.

Leicester went into a shock lead after just five minutes. And what a goal it was too.

A thirty yard run by winger Griffiths ended with his cross being knocked down by Chisholm for Revie to score. It transformed the game and Pompey's Defence uncharacteristically wavered and slipped.

But it was Pompey who scored next, in the 28th minute, when Harris netted with a deflected shot. Undismayed, Leicester had to wait until two minutes after the interval to regain the lead when Chisholm was given acres of room to score.

Revie settled the match in the 55th minute with a fine header as Pompey goalkeeper Butler came to claim the ball. Leicester went on to lose 3-1 to Wolves in the final, but Pompey had the very large consolation of winning the championship.

Silverware was also in contention when Leicester arrived at Fratton in May 1971 for a Second Division match. Alas Pompey's glories were long over, but the Filberts were in with a chance of taking the championship if they could defeat lowly Pompey.

The season was ending badly for Pompey, and Leicester were duly presented with their trophy after the match after defeating Pompey 2-1. It was Pompey's tenth game without a win and an inglorious end to Harry Harris's 12-year and 400 appearance career with the club.

Leicester had the stature of champions as they swept into a two goal lead at half time with Brown and Farrington scoring.

After the interval Pompey surged forward and Leicester were grateful for the

safe hands of Shilton. Pompey had chances to have saved the game but could only manage a fierce shot from Ray Hiron in the dying seconds.

But it was a different story the next time First Division Leicester came to Fratton to play a now Third Division Pompey in the Second Round of the League Cup.

#### BLUNDERED


It was a traumatic time at Fratton, but the worries were forgotten as Pompey staged a remarkable giant-killing act. Pompey merited their win because on the night their will-to-win and honest work were too much for a Leicester side who failed to couple their skills to endeavour.

But with less than ten minutes to go Leicester looked like taking Pompey back to Filbert Street. Then goalkeeper Wallington blundered and Clive Green shot Pompey on the road to glory. David Kemp's second goal – even though it looked offside – was merely the icing on the cake.

Pompey's glory was only temporary though, and in the next round they bowed out to fellow Third Division club Swindon in a replay.

The first ever meeting between Pompey and Leicester was also in a cup competition – the F.A. Cup, or English Cup as it was then known – in 1908. And again it took a giant-killing performance to do the trick.

Southern League Pompey entertained Second Division promotion-chasers Leicester for a Second Round tie. On the run of play Pompey were a little fortunate to win, but Leicester's forwards rarely looked like scoring. The decisive goal came from McDonald in the second half.


