





REDUCED TO SEVEN!

With the arrival of Wolves today, only eight clubs have still to make an appearance here as Football League opponents. West Ham will reduce that number in February, leaving only Arsenal, Everton, Liverpool, Manchester United, Tottenham and newcomers Scarborough and Maidstone.

Wolves have opposed Swindon on five occasions in Cup competitions, four of those confrontations being in the Football League Cup, as it was known prior to sponsorship. The semi-final clashes of 1979/80 will be remembered long after the Second Round meetings of four years earlier, although both ties ended in similar fashion - an odd-goal defeat for the Town.

WOLVES LAST VISIT

When Wolves were visitors on September 9 1975, they had not won away for almost a year. Hopes were high therefore, when Swindon took the lead after only ten minutes. Northern Ireland International Trevor Anderson crossed from the left for Wolves old boy Peter Eastoe (see separate feature) to head down towards the bottom corner of the net. Keeper Gary Pierce seemed to have the situation covered but defender John McAlle intervened with an ill-timed foot and Pierce was beaten. 'My goall', cried Peter. 'Own goall', claimed Wolves boss Bill McGarry. It mattered not, the score was 1-0 and seven minutes before half-time. it was 2-0. Pierce could only parry a fearsome volley from David Moss and John Trollope applied the finishing touch with his right foot. The warning signs were evident after the break, however, when Town keeper Jim Barron - with Wolves from 1961 to 1965 - had to produce some fine saves to keep the visitors out. As the First Division side piled on the pressure, it looked as though luck might favour Swindon when defender Colin Prophett kicked a Kenny Hibbitt shot off the line in the 70th minute. But the ball fell to Alan Sunderland and the Town's lead was suddenly reduced. That lead evaporated altogether minutes from time, Swindon's defence was completely bamboozled by a Bailey-Munro freekick and John Richards sneaked an equaliser.

THE REPLAY

For the replay at Molineux a fortnight later, the Town were without the injured Barron, Jimmy Allan taking his place. At the interval, they led by a Moss goal, but Wolves stormed in front with Sunderland, Richards and Hibbitt netting. Scarcely a minute after the third goal, Eastoe kept the crowd on tenderhooks by heading home an Anderson cross, to make it 3-2.

SNOW . . . A BRIEF INTERLUDE

The scheduled date for the semifinal first leg meeting in 1979/80 was January 15, but on that day the County Ground was covered in snow and the game was postponed seven days.

Again, Swindon took the lead.

The 13th minuted proved unlucky for Wolves when Chris Kamara waltzed past three defenders and planted a cross onto the head of Andy Rowland, who duly netted for the 21st time that season. Not to be outdone his partner up front, little Alan Mayes, snatched a dramatic 88th minute goal to give the Town a slender 2-1 lead to take to Molineux for the second leg. Peter Daniel had replied for Wolves.

And so the stage was set for Swindon Town to attempt a return to the twin towers where they had enjoyed their finest 'hour' eleven years earlier.

UNLUCKY TUCKER

RECORD

BOOV

Swindon's centre-half that night, Billy Tucker, is probably still wondering how he didn't get on the scoresheet! On the half-hour a Brian Williams corner was flicked on by Andy Rowland and Tucker's downward header found the net. Referee Neil Midaley not only disallowed the effort, but waved away claims that the defender had been pushed in the process. Luck turned against Tucker again in the 54th minute when a shot was kicked off the line. It was a severe blow to the Town, who had just gone behind to a Richards goal. And a second shock awaited them only five minutes later. Mel Eves collected a throwin and floated a high cross into the far top corner, over the despairing hand of Jimmy Allan.

A DEVASTATING BLOW

The next blow was delivered to Alan Mayes, who suffered a gashed mouth in a collision with keeper Paul Bradshaw. While he was off the field receiving attention, Ray McHale slotted home the penalty to put Swindon level on aggregate at 3-3. The drama continued as McHale saw an acute-angled shot cleared off the line by Derek Parkin in the 69th minute.

The irony was complete just four minutes later when Parkin fired in a shot. The ball bounced off Allan to the waiting Richards and out went the Town.

Wolves went on to lift the trophy - as they had done following their first victory over Swindon Town, 2-0 in the F.A. Cup, back in 1908.




YOUTH IS BEING ENCOURAGED

Our groundsman, Geoff Warren, has asked me to appeal to all of you to please KEEP OFF the playing surface at the end of each game.



Mark Jones has been battling to return to full fitness for two years and the National Rehabilitation Centre at Lilleshall has become a second home for the unfortunate former Oxford United midfield player. However, Mark is hoping to be given the all clear this week in his bid to return to match action. His determination and hard work to overcome his problems deserve reward. I am sure you will join me in wishing Mark the best of luck in his latest bid.

LILLESHALL

Lilleshall is probably more easily recognised as the home of the Football Association's school for young footballers. Actually there is more to soccer than the 90 minutes that the supporters witness. Expertise out of the public eye also wins matches.

The sports injuries unit was set up by the Football Association in 1986. Lilleshall protects the massive investment in players by treating the serious injuries similar to the one that Mark Jones suffered and which eventually developed into a long term injury.

A £250 a week course at Lilleshall incorporates intensive work in the gymnasium, specialist treatment from the physiotherapists, running, swimming and cycling.

Fractures, pelvic, rebuilt knees, back injuries and groin strains are all grist to the mill at Lilleshall. It will probably come as a surprise to you that there is an out-patients clinic in the evening where anyone can make an appointment.

While each Football League Club has its own physiotherapist he may find himself with half a dozen injuries to attend and maybe five of those have a chance to be fit for the following week's match. The remaining injury may be the longer term setback who needs help the most but finds himself at the back of the queue. It is then that the advantage of **Lilleshall** can be utilised

There have been few players in recent times who have generated the excitement that a 20 year-old striker brought to Swindon Town back in that gloomy winter of 1973/74. Some sixteen years on, PETER EASTOE is still turning out regularly on a Saturday afternoon.

When Peter had completed his apprenticeship at Molineux, in the summer of 1971, a wealth of strikers, including four Internationals, were competing for a first team spot. Hugh Curran, Bobby Gould, John Richards, Jim McCalliog and Derek Dougan were amongst them.

After a brief appearance as substitute against Liverpool, the big day came for Peter in April 1972 when, in front of nearly 40,000 at Highbury, he took the number ten shirt normally worn by the 'Doog'. Peter's recollection of that day was vivid. "Frightening!" he said, "a very difficult baptism", Wolves suffered a narrow 2-1 defeat.

His first-team chances were few and far between and, in November 1973, Peter took on a fresh challenge in coming to Swindon on loan. The Town had lost eight of the previous eleven games and were desperately trying to get out of the relegation zone. His debut, against Carlisle ended painfully. Having already scored twice, an accidental collision saw Peter leave the field with a broken cheekbone. "And that was the end of the month's loan!" he said.

Manager Les Allen was quick to extend the loan, however, and Peter had added a further five goals in ten games before new boss Danny Williams signed him for a Club record £88,000 fee in March 1974.

Peter became a firm favourite with

County Ground supporters who were always appreciative of his efforts, not least his 31 goals in 1974/75. "I shall always remember Swindon as a friendly, happy-go-lucky Club. I had a good association with the fans", he added. Plans were afoot to launch an official fan club when, quite by surprise, the opportunity came for Peter to go Queens Park Rangers.

"The offer was too good to refuse" he commented. "I always wanted to get back into the First Division and here was my chance". At Loftus Road, Rangers were flying high. They won seven out of their last eight games of the season, but were just pipped for the championship by Liverpool.

1982, when Ronnie Allen took him to West Bromwich Albion. But a year later. Peter found that he was out of favour and was on his travels once more.

Leicester, Huddersfield, Walsall and his old Club Wolves all took him on loan during the next two seasons. "It wasn't the best of things to do" said Peter, "but at thirty, I needed first team football".

In the summer of 1985, Peter's contract at the Hawthorns was cancelled and he was invited to go to Portugal. "Sporting Farense in Faro needed a couple of good experienced pro's and Jim Smith recommended me and Bill Rafferty". Peter spent two seasons there, during which the Club gained promotion. He stayed in the sun for a third season, with

It was some time before Peter got a taste of the action. "I was 13th man a few times and when the new season started the Manager kept favour with the team that finished second" he recalled.

The Manager, Dave Sexton, gave him his chance in due course. Unfortunatly for Peter, he left for Old Trafford in the following July. Peter played in fewer than half of Rangers' games in 1977/78 but still finished as top scorer.

In March 1979, he was on the move again, signing for Everton in a 'swap' deal with Micky Walsh. Peter remembers his stay on Merseyside with some affection. "They're smashing people" he said. Again Peter put away the goals and was leading scorer for the Club in 1980/81.

It was time to return to the Midlands in

neighbouring Louletano, before coming home' and into non-League football in 1988

An old school pal, Alan Kendall, an ex-Walsall apprentice, was Secretary of the Beazer Homes Division One Midland Club Atherstone United and signed Peter on. Atherstone promptly finished runners-up to Gloucester City this spring. Alan was full of praise for Peter's efforts. "He did a great job for us, particularly towards the end of the season, and was instrumental in us gaining promotion".

But Peter, seeking a coaching position, decided to stay in the Midland Division. This season he will be trying to help Brignorth Town to the same success and will still be looking to get a few goals along the way!



Wolverhampton Wanderers have given Manager Graham Turner, the man who has taken Wolves off the scrapheap and into the Second Division with promotion in successive seasons plus Wembley glory in the Sherpa Van Trophy, a one-year extension on his present contract which had ten months left to run.

Goalscorers: Football League (3): Bull, Mutch, Thompson (penalty). Littlewoods Cup (1): Westley. (30), moved to the Midland Club in August 1987 from Cardiff City for a fee of £11,500. The England. B' International was signed for a small fee from Multipart League Club, Southport, in February 1986. Two close season signings are expected to add competition for the striking positions. The former Roots Hall Club defender had been one of four signings made by Manager Graham Turner during the summer. He joined the Midland Club for a fee of £150,000. Floyd Streete, (30),

made 35 appearances for Wolves last season and is expected to add backbone once again to the defence. Floyd joined Wolves from Derby County in October 1985 for a small fee. He was previously with Cambridge United. Floyd missed the opening matches with a rib injury. Full back Mark Venus, (22), was signed from Leicester City in March 1988 for a sizeable fee. The experienced Gary Bellamy, (27), made 34 League appearances last season and joined Wolves from Chesterfield in July 1987 for a £17,000 fee. Tom joined the Molineux Club from Aston Villa at the beginning of last season.
