Before I became professionally involved in this game, I was a football supporter, just like you. And so I know how delighted you must have felt when the league tables came out on Saturday night and there, at the top of the Second Division, stood Sheffield United.

Incidentally I wonder when that last happened?

I would not for one moment attempt to spoil the enjoyment of our followers. Indeed, I share it but I remember, last season, when we were expected to get promotion, saying that it was the position in May that I was interested in, not in September.

That, of course, is still how the professionals look at it. But I have to admit that if we were stuck at the bottom of the league without a win. I would be concerned. As we are at the other end, well, let us say that I enjoyed the weekend as much as you did.

We all know that the Second Division is a different ball game from the Third but, apart from our disappointing exit from the Littlewoods Cup at Rotherham, we have done well and continued to score goals.

In a recent interview I gave, I insisted that I wanted the scoring responsibility spread around, not just left to Brian Deane and Tony Agana.

So it is nice to see lan Bryson with his name on the sheet and a splendid bonus to have John Francis doing his job. John, as you know, took the opportunity of enhancing his career prospects when Tony Agana was forced to rest his damaged foot and we are all delighted at his contribution.

His two goals against Brighton could not have been put away with more skill by anybody in the game. That winner, in the last minute, was a memorable goal. And to think that inside the club John's heading ability is not his strong point. In fact, from time to time he has taken a bit of stick about it.

The Brighton match was perhaps one of the most exciting in my time as manager here. From three up we went to 4-3 down and that is the way it is with us. We are not

vastly experienced at this level and the way we play means we are not a side that sits back, closes the game down and starts passing back to the goalkeeper. We go looking for more; that is the way

Some days that can let you down. We kept at it, gave Brighton their chances and, to be fair, they took them well. We defended a bit naively at times but a lot of what happened was due to the skill of the Brighton players.

When we went 4-3 down, I felt, as I am sure you did, that we might lose a game we thought we had won, but in fairness to the lads, they kept at it and won 5-4. It caused us problems along the way, but if we can always get the winner in the last minute, I won't mind too much.

The message is clear — if you are watching Sheffield United don't go home until the final whistle. You never know what you might miss. I bet there are a few hundred Blades fans kicking themselves for missing John Francis' late winner.

Tonight we have an opportunity to build on our good start. But Swindon had a fine result on Saturday, drawing at West Ham, after beating Wolves 3-1 the previous Sunday.

We can't promise nine goals again — but just don't leave until it is all over. Six goals at Middlesbrough, nine at Bramall Lane; you can't say we don't entertain.

When are Sheffield United not Sheffield United? When they are in the Littlewoods Cup. Or so it would seem. The performance at Rotherham left a great deal to be desired. No goals, very few scoring opportunities and, generally, a listless performance by the front men. Nobody but the most biassed of Blades supporters could begrudge Rotherham their success over the two legs.

With this in mind — and with painful memories of the team's last visit to Middlesbrough two seasons ago when they were on the wrong end of a 6-0 thrashing — the Blades faithful made their apprehensive way to Ayresome Park. What a difference! An aggressive, battling performance gave United a good share of the possession against a Middlesbrough team playing the type of sophisticated passing game that had torn United to shreds on that previous meeting. It was a pleasant and entertaining contrast of styles. Up front, Boro always looked slick and dangerous; at the back, hesitant and unsure, their close passing in and near their own penalty area frequently landing them in trouble. United, of course, played their normal long-ball game, constantly pressurising the uncoordinated Middlesbrough back four. So a high-scoring game always looked a distinct possibility. And so it proved.

A curious goal by John Francis — a looping header that seemed to be misjudged by goalkeeper Poole — and a screaming shot by Bernie Slaven produced a half-time score

of 1-1 — with no real indication of the drama to come in the second half.

To the delight of the travelling fans, United suddenly found themselves 3-1 to the good. With Alan Roberts having a splendid game on the right and a stream of good crosses coming over from that flank, Ian Bryson, getting into positions that proved so profitable at the beginning of last season, scored twice, first with a well-angled header at the far post, then with a fierce drive into the roof of the net from a similar position. So, at this point, United looked well set to maintain their 100% league record.

To their credit Middlesbrough refused to lie down and pushed forward relentlessly, putting United's defence under immense pressure. Unfortunately, it was a debatable goal that brought them back into the game. A long ball over United's defence found Alan Comfort, but Slaven was in what appeared to be an offside position. Simon Tracey, misjudged his dash to reach the ball outside the penalty area — just as he had done at West Bromwich. Again, he found himself stranded — but this time he was not so lucky, Comfort chipping the ball coolly and accurately over his head and into the empty net.

Boro, seeing the possibility of saving what had looked like

a lost cause and of salvaging a point, increased their attacking momentum, and it came as no real surprise when Slaven snatched the equaliser. Before the match, most Unitedites would have settled happily for a point, but they left the game feeling that two points had been thrown away. A bitter-sweet feeling. Still, it was a stirring match and, looking at the game as a whole, nobody could complain about United's determined performance.



SPEAK Personally

David Barnes signed for United from Aldershot on 1st June, 1989. His previous career took him to Coventry City, Ipswich Town and Wolverhampton Wanderers. David is married to Tina and they have two young children.

United's new left full-back has already made a big impression on our supporters. Determined, elegant and two-footed, he has settled quickly and comfortably into the new United defence. He speaks enthusiastically about his move to Bramall Lane.

"It's great to have this opportunity to get back to a big club — though I have to say that I was very well treated at Aldershot. But to be cheered on by big crowds — particularly away from home — creates a totally different kind of atmosphere for the players. It gives them an extra lift — in contrast to the ghost-like atmosphere we had when Aldershot visited a small club. The fans in Sheffield are terrific. They've got right behind us and this has helped the new players to settle in very quickly indeed."

David is, of course, accustomed to playing for "big" clubs. His career started as an apprentice with First Division Coventry City, though, as a young man, he made only nine first-team league appearances for the Sky Blues — plus four F.A. Cup appearances including a quarter-final match against West Bromwich Albion.

During his two-year stay at Coventry (1979-81) he made an international impact at Youth level.

"I won seven England Youth caps and helped England to win the European Youth Championships in Leipzig, East Germany. I have also had the good fortune through my football career, to travel to the United States and Saudi Arabia. I find it very interesting to see different lifestyles and cultures. It gives you a much broader perspective on everyday life back home — makes you more tolerant, I think."

In 1981, David moved to Ipswich Town. He was, in fact, Bobby Robson's last signing before he took over the job as England's Manager.

"Bobby's new job was a minor disaster for me", says David. "Obviously, he must have rated me or he wouldn't have signed me. Ipswich Town is a very nice club and I was really looking forward to playing with them.

Unfortunately, although I am a fairly easy-going sort of person, I didn't see eye to eye with the new manager, Bobby Ferguson, and, eventually. I asked for a transfer. Wolves came in and paid £35,000 for me. They were then in the Second Division - but I didn't seem to do them much good. We slumped down to the Third Division and then to the Fourth in consecutive seasons. Wolves seemed perfectly happy with my performances - I played for them in 88 league matches - because they offered me a two year contract. But I didn't really fancy playing in the Fourth, so I asked for a transfer. Aldershot made an offer and a tribunal fixed my transfer fee at £17,000. So I spent two happy years with the Shots, but my ambitions were not being fulfilled and it was very exciting to learn that Sheffield United were interested in me. So here I am - and looking forward very much to a new challenge."

"Changing clubs is always a worrying experience. On the one hand are the domestic problems — moving house and so on. On the other is meeting a lot of established players and wondering if you will fit in. On this occasion, I needn't have worried. The atmosphere in the dressing room is great and the new players have all been given a very nice welcome.

"On the playing side, Dave Bassett's style is new to me - I have always 'played to feet'. But, as a professional, it's my job to adapt to the requirements of the club and I think I have fitted in quite well. I have really enjoyed the matches in which I have played so far and, on our first few performances, we seem to be able to hold our own in the Second Division. If we can cope, as we have done, with West Brom, Ipswich and Middlesbrough, I don't think we have too much to worry about.

"On behalf of all the new players, I should like to thank our fans for giving us such a nice welcome. You can be sure that we shall do our best to repay them by playing as well as we can."

SWINDON RECOVER AFTER POOR START

Following their wonderful achievement of last season, when they qualified for the promotion play-offs, Swindon made a poor start to the new season. They lost their opening game 0-2 at home to Sunderland though they looked a vastly improved side a week later when they went to Oldham.

Alan McLoughlin and Duncan Shearer scored to give them a 2-0 advantage shortly after the interval. But they relaxed late in the game and ultimately had to settle for a 2-2 draw.

But Swindon recovered to score their first victory of the season at home to Wolves. Tom Jones, Duncan Shearer and Alan McLoughlin got the goals in a 3-1 success.

Ossie Ardiles, who took over as Swindon's player-manager during the summer, played as substitute in their early games and, if we are lucky, we may well see him in action at Bramall Lane this evening.

Mr. Ardiles, the Argentinian international who spent ten outstanding seasons with Spurs, succeeded Lou Macari as manager this summer. Mr. Macari, who had lifted the club from the Fourth Division to the brink of Division One, has now moved on to West Ham.

Last season Swindon qualified for the promotion play-offs. Sadly, their bid for First Division glory ended in the semi-final of the play-offs when they were beaten 1-2 on aggregate by Crystal Palace. Only one of last season's successful team, midfielder Charlie Henry (now Aldershot), left during the summer. One new face to join the squad belongs to Republic of Ireland international winger Tony Galvin. Striker Alan Biley, who includes Derby and Everton among his many clubs, was also signed for a trial period.

We welcome Swindon tonight for only their 6th league visit to the Lane. The results of the previous encounters are:

There have been no draws as yet, and Swindon's record here is poor, but United's record at Swindon is even worse!

The clubs have met in two F.A. Cup ties. Swindon have won both. In 1907-8, as a non-league club, they won 3-2 at the Lane after a 0-0 draw, and in 1920-1 they won 1-0 at home.

FIRST LEAGUE MEETING

The clubs first met in the league at Swindon, in Division 2, on 11th October 1969. Swindon were newly promoted and League Cup winners and managed by ex-Rotherham favourite Danny Williams. United were top of the league at the time, after 14 games, and Swindon were unbeaten at home. The game was the best seen at the County ground so far that season. It was open and several

more than three goals could have been scored. United missed many chances and towards the end Alan Hodgkinson had to make a series of saves with Swindon favourite Don Rogers playing well. As it was. Swindon won 2-1, Peter Noble heading in a Don Rogers free-kick after 20 minutes and Rogers himself scoring after 71 minutes. United's goal was a 30 yard Alan Woodward special, 90 seconds from time.

IT'S A FACT!

Swindon played in all 31 seasons of the old Division 3(S). Swindon have won more than half their league games against United (6 wins from 10 games). Only two other clubs have managed this. Shrewsbury and Southend (both 5 from 8). Seven clubs have won just half their league games with the Blades, namely Cambridge (2 games), Chesterfield (18), Colchester (6), Gillingham (10), Wimbledon (8), Wrexham (4), and, long ago, Bootle (2)!

There have been no draws in the 10 United-Swindon league games. Other clubs still to record a league draw with the Blades are Crewe (4 games), Southend (8), Peterborough (2), Rochdale (2). York (2), Bootle (2) and Burton United (2), Newport (6).

Although United first met Swindon in a competitive game in 1907-8, the clubs had met, in a friendly, as far back as 12 November 1892, at Swindon. United won 6-0 and ex-Scots Guard Corporal Wood played in goal for the Blades.

League Division 3, 6th September, 1980, Crowd: 12,089

Swindon's visit to the Lane on this occasion is as poignant a reminder as any that the changing fortunes of football clubs and the characters in it can be devastating.

Sheffield United and World Cup Star Martin Peters in particular can look back on the Blades 3-0 victory with doubtful pleasure whereas Swindon's plight at the time turned out to be relatively unimportant.

It was an early season of high promise for Lane fans. Their team had won three of the first four games, were about to make it four from five, and were top of the league.

Under the guidance of Harry Haslam and the coaching and playing ability of the highly acclaimed Peters they were confident of making a sustained challenge for Division II status.

Swindon were installed as one of the pre-season favourites for promotion but

unaccountably found themselves without a point.

The game itself went according to the script and provided entertaining fare for the now much-lamented "Match of the Day" coverage on Saturday nights.

United were blending their new players in nicely and developing their own style of football but the fans and team alike needed to show patience, despite their superiority they did not put the game beyond Swindon until Peters' goal late in the game.

The 41st minute penalty expertly put away by KENWORTHY was made by Tibbott who was pulled down by Allen. United's left-back turned midfielder was earning praise for his growing standards in his new role, as was Mick Trusson.

The tall signing from Plymouth was improving rapidly and showing greater assurance in supplying the incisive pass instead of the safe one; the penalty was a good example

Old warhorse Bob Hatton was the major thorn in Swindon side, oozing class and unlucky not to score, despite the cameras recording one uncharacteristic bad miss after he had drifted past the goalkeeer.

His all-round display gave ample credence to his pre-match award of the 2nd Division's best player during the previous April.


With Butlin rejuvenated and the new midfield running intelligently. United had the visitors in real difficulties, hitting the woodwork twice before the penalty award. A second goal was needed though to avoid the tragedy of being pegged back by a Swindon breakaway. PETERS, master of the surprise, supplied it in typical fashion.

He made it look ridiculously easy, sneaking in to nod Trusson's inswinging corner home and score his third goal for United (78 minutes).

When TRUSSON added a somewhat fortuitous third after a Matthews miscue five minutes later, Swindon were sunk. Their acclaimed pairing of Rowland and Mayes, perhaps the deadliest strike-force in the Division, threatened only fitfully and the skilful visitors lacked the conviction to make things happen.

Things were looking so bright for United — top of the league, no goals conceded at home, the experience and emerging coaching promise of Peters and so on. Even Haslam was moved to assert, "We don't lose our way any more."

They were to be kicked in the teeth. By January, Peters had to take over from the seriously ill Haslam and when Don Givens missed THAT penalty on 2nd May the early-season table-toppers were relegated. Troubled Swindon reversed the situation and stayed up. Such is the stuff of football fortune.






Above: Jubilation as John Francis' looping header drops behind the goalkeeer and into the net to give United an early lead.

United won their first points in the new Pontins League with a 5-2 scoreline after twice falling behind in the first half.

The experienced United side began well when Wilder's lob caught the goalkeeper of his line, but he managed to scramble back to tip it for a corner. But it was Huddersfield who took the lead in the 9th minute. After a flick-on in midfield, the ball fell into the path of the unmarked Maguire. Benstead came off his line and, for his pains, got the striker's studs in the ribs - a painful blow. The ball ran loose, the referee surprisingly allowed play to continue. and Maguire had the easiest of tasks to roll the ball into the net. Benstead required lengthy treatment before continuing. Five minutes later, the Blades were level. Dane Whitehouse received a ball on the left wing, controlled it well, beat two players

An unmarked Maguire received the ball on the right wing, crossed it and found the head of Huddersfield's new scoring sensation Unvora who put the ball tidily into the net.

In the 20th minute, an inswinging corner from the right by Dane Whitehouse reached Carl Bradshaw who headed the ball firmly into the net to put United level again.

Martin Pike, playing in midfield, was booked for what appeared to be a harmless foul.

Five minutes from half time, a through ball from Mark Todd reached John Francis, who was up-ended in the penalty area. Unfortunately, Mitch Ward's poorly-struck penalty kick was easily saved by Leake. Just before half-time, the Huddersfield keeper again saved his side when he tipped over a good shot by John Francis, who had looked a lot happier with a recognised striker — Bradshaw — playing alongside him.

United dominated the second half, with Benstead virtually a spectator. The skilful Whitehouse and the energetic Francis were particularly impressive.

In the last 15 minutes, the Blades took total control and scored three times. 

HOME ADVANTAGE FOR SALE

Did you notice that the F.A. Cup has got under way again? Simon Barnes, a sports correspondent in The Times, picked out the highlights of the preliminary round as Annfield Plain - he pointed out that this team came from County Durham but gave it the Liverpool spelling of Anfield - v Shotton Comrades: Clitheroe v Bedlington Terriers: Friar Lane Old Boys v Farsley Celtic; Milton Keynes Wolverton Town v Irthlingborough Diamonds. I wonder what progress they will make on that long journey which ends at Wembley?

Part of the magic of the F.A. Cup certainly lies in the progress of the little clubs, but as they advance through each succeeding round, financial temptation lies in store, with the possibility of switching a home tie to the ground of the bigger club, or finding a nearby ground with more suitable accommodation. These matters seem to be arranged amicably enough these days - Unitedites will remember Burscough coming to the Lane - but in years gone by, there could be a real trial of strength and a reminder of such an episode comes with Swindon's visit to the Lane today.

United had played two friendly matches at Swindon in the early 1890's but the Cup-tie in January, 1908, was the first competitive game between the two clubs. The County Ground accommodated far fewer spectators in those days and so the Swindon Club approached United as to the possibility of switching the match to Bramall Lane.


United offered Swindon a guarantee of £350, and a half share of the income if the gate exceeded £700, but received a telegram in reply asking for £500 and half the gate if it exceeded £800. The United Directors were unanimous in deciding to reject the offer and the game was played at Swindon. The price of admission

was fixed at one shilling with reserved seats at three shillings and applications had to be made to Mr. S. Allen, Evelyn Street, Swindon. Unitedites were asked to forward their requests for seats with some urgency as numbers would be limited, and were informed that our Secretary, John Nicholson would shortly be travelling to Swindon "to inspect the ground arrangements."

Swindon had never reached this stage of the competition before but they were on a rising tide with a splendid inside forward called Harold Fleming who would soon win a regular place in the England team. Their tactics according to the writer - almost certainly Secretary Nicholson — in the United programme seem curiously familiar. With dash and energy . . . to get the ball into their opponents' quarters and have a shot at any distance or angle." They certainly unsettled United who were happy to draw the game at Swindon and two rare errors from Joe Leivesley brought a victory for the Wiltshire men in the replay.



A PROBLEM OF SPELLING

Some of you may have noticed the difference in spelling of the name Leivesley in my article compared to that on the cigarette card of our old goalkeeper. Names can still provide spelling problems and my own surname seems at times to provide scope for an infinite number of variations.

Joe Leivesley was his preferred method of spelling though his name usually appeared as Lievesley in the United programme. Another famous goalkeeper of ours suffered the same fate. Bill Foulke was correct, or so the big man claimed, but Foulkes was seen more frequently in print.

The problem was more acute in the nineteenth century as anyone of you who might have tackled a little bit of ancestor tracing will have discovered, but the problem persists to this day. Two of our recent players provide examples. Are the correct spellings Bob Atkins and John MacPhail or Atkin and McPhail? Both appear in United programmes but our Club seemed to settle on the first pair and I assume they are correct.

Other former United players with this problem as to the correct spelling of their surname include Billy Beer (Beers); Joe Brooks (Brookes); Alf Jeffries (Jefferies); Mick Killourhy (all sorts of possibilities with this one) and Alf Tootill (Toothill).




