

MATCH REPORT

HULL CITY 1 - NEWCASTLE UNITED 3

Ten of the most topsy-turvy minutes the Second Division is likely to see this season saw the game end in further torment for the Tigers. They provided some good football for most of the match, and in particular the first half. City began the game in fine style using a 4-3-3 formation with Peter Swan playing up front. From a Billy Askew corner Steve Terry got in a fine header which just went over the bar. After further good work from Askew and Roberts that earned another corner, City took the lead on 12 minutes. Askew took the corner and Swan flicked it on at the near post for the unmarked McParland to head home. However, the lead was short-lived as Newcastle equalised on 17 minutes when John Anderson's 25-yard shot went in off the post.

The second half saw City still on top of their opponents and after Leigh Jenkinson came on as substitute for McParland (59 mins.), they created even more chances. A Roberts free-kick headed over the bar by Terry, a Jacobs cross met by Swan who headed wide, and an Askew corner from which Terry headed against the bar. But the ball just wouldn't go in the net. The tide suddenly changed, though, as Newcastle brought on substitute Gary Brazil who put the visitors 2-1 up on 71 minutes with a diving header. Three minutes later he played a ball to Mark McGhee who raced through to score the killer goal. Certainly that 10-minute spell knocked the wind out of the Tigers' sails. They deserved at least a draw and it just shows that justice is not always done in football.





MEET THE MANAGER

After guiding Swindon Town from the depths of the Fourth Division to the brink of the First Division, over a period of five years, Lou Macari decided to pursue his Management career with West Ham United in July, when he signed a two-year contract with the East London Club.

Within the space of a two-week period, Swindon Town were able to announce his successor as Ossie Ardiles, the Argentinian International who earned world fame with their World Cup triumph of 1978 in Rio de Janeiro. Ossie, along with Mario Kempes were widely regarded as the stars of the impressive Argentinian line-up.

Along with fellow international Ricky Villa, Ossie shook the Fleet Street tabloids, and British soccer, when they signed for Tottenham Hotspur in 1978. The skilfull midfield player was an instant success with the North London Club's followers, and he quickly established a reputation as a player who knew how to cope with the varying demands of English soccer and its climate. Following a ten-year period of playing for Tottenham Hotspur, Ossie moved to London neighbours, Queen's Park Rangers with his career moving into its twilight days, when he was given a free transfer by the North London Club in June 1988.

Ossie had a spell on loan to Blackburn Rovers in his final season at White Hart Lane, and therefore met the demands of Second Division football in a practical sense. Ossie's appointment to his first Managerial post will be met with obvious nationwide interest, and although a novice by any standard in the Managerial stakes, the diminutive Argentinian has shown a capability to cope with any demand made of him in England. Management may well be within the bounds of his considerable talents.

CURRENT SQUAD

The current squad includes in goal Frazer Digby and Nicky Hammond. Frazer is a Sheffield-born England U-21 International and made a maximum number of appearances for the Robins last season. He began his career with Manchester United and has since attracted the attention of many First Division clubs. He joined Swindon for £12,500 in December 1986. Nicky Hammond, meanwhile, has spent the summer months recovering from a broken leg. He made his League debut with Bristol Rovers although commencing his career with Arsenal as a trainee. He has proved an able understudy to Frazer Digby.

In defence the Robins have **Dave Hockaday**, a player who has given the club stirling service since joining them from Blackpool in 1983, originally as a winger, and has given the club excellent service for six seasons. Dave made his 450th appearance in the early part of the season in a career spent with two clubs. **Tim Parkin**

joined Swindon in 1986 from Bristol Rovers. He had previously played for Blackburn and Malmo (Sweden) and has proved to be a shrewd signing in playing a major part in helping the club to last season's Second Division Play-offs. Edinburgh-born **Ross Maclaren** moved to the County Ground in 1988 from Derby County for £150,000 and soon settled into a sweeper role last season. He made 37 League appearances for the club last season scoring four goals. Club captain **Colin Calderwood** is widely regarded as one of the Second Division's strongest central defenders. He joined Swindon from Mansfield Town in 1985 for £27,000 and has since made over 170 League appearances for the Robins. Former Exeter and Torquay full-back **Phil King** joined Swindon in 1987 and is regarded by many clubs as one of the most promising young defenders in the Second Division, even though he lost his place in the first team for a short period to **Paul Bodin**, a Welshborn utility player, who proved he was adept in a full-back or midfield role last season. **Jon Gittens** joined Swindon from Southampton for a tribunal fee of £40,000 in 1987. The Birmingham-born central defender's appearances were limited last season due to disciplinary suspensions. He was also suspended for the first two matches of this season after passing 51 points.

In midfield, Swindon can rely on the services of **Steve Foley**, signed from Sheffield United in 1987 for £35,000. The former Liverpool apprentice failed to make an appearance with the Anfield Club at senior level but it was generally regarded that Steve helped Town to the Play-offs last season with some fine performances alongside **Alan McLoughlin**, the former Manchester United apprentice who joined Swindon on a free transfer in 1986. Last season Alan established a regular position in the side after spending two periods on loan to Torquay in previous seasons. Also in midfield is **Tom Jones**, a skilfull player who, after drifting into non-League circles, attracted the attention of several Football League clubs. After only a year with Aberdeen, the ex-Chelsea apprentice joined Swindon Town. He is currently recovering from a cartilage operation that has forced him to miss the early part of the season. **Leigh Barnard** is the club's longest-serving player after joining the County Ground's staff on a free transfer from Portsmouth in 1982. His appearances have been restricted in recent seasons and he has spent several periods on loan to Peterborough and Exeter.

Up front Swindon have what has proved to be one of their best free transfers in the history of the club in **Steve White.** A consistent goalscoring record has made the experienced Steve one of the most feared strikers in the League. He joined Swindon from Bristol Rovers in 1986 after periods with Luton, Charlton and Lincoln City. In his first three seasons at the County Ground Steve never failed to reach double figures in the goalscoring charts and is a firm favourite with the fans., He is joined up front by **Duncan Shearer**, the club's record buy from Huddersfield Town in 1988 for £250,000. The Scots-born striker was the leading scorer at the County Ground last season, with 14 goals. It was his goalscoring feats with the Northern Club that attracted Swindon's interest and he returned South to prove his fee was an investment well spent. Muchtravelled striker **David Geddis** rejected a close season move to Grimsby Town during the summer for £40,000 – the same outlay Swindon paid Shrewsbury in October 1988. His appearances were limited to a handful of games last season. Several of Swindon's Youth Scheme players have recently made the grade to professional status. These include **Adrian Viveash** and **Paul Hunt**. Adrian made a maximum number of appearances for the reserves last season and although considered a striker, he is capable of performing in several roles. Paul was a consistent scorer of goals at Youth Team level and earned the plaudits of David Pleat, the Leicester manager last term, following an outstanding display in a Midland Youth Cup tie at Filbert Street.



Miscellaneous Information

The early history of today's opponents SWINDON TOWN

The club was formed in 1881 by the Reverend W. Pitt and was first an amateur organisation until professionalism was adopted in 1894. Swindon were one of the original members of the Southern League, formed in 1894, and played on the Croft until 1896, when they moved to the County Ground which has been Town's HQ ever since, although they began playing on the area where there is now a cricket pitch.

Swindon did not stay long at their first ground, it was a field in the Old Town area, next to a quarry, now part of Bradford Road and Avenue Road. After a child fell into the quarry during a match, Town moved to Glove Field, now Brunswick Street and Lansdowne Road, before moving to The Croft in 1884; this was the home of Swindon Rangers Rugby Club.

The club colours were changed in 1904 from green shirts to the now familiar red shirts, which gave birth to the nickname of "The Robins". Swindon are also known as "The Moonrakers" from a Wiltshire legend and "The Railwaymen" due to the long-established local industry.

Season 1907/08 saw the start of Town's rise to fame. They competed in the FA Cup for the first time in 1907 and reached the Third Round. Three years later they won their way into the Semi-finals where they were beaten by Newcastle United.

Town won the Southern League Championship in 1911 and again in 1914 and during the

period 1907-14 never finished lower than fifth in the table.

To hark back to the days of long ago, many fine players were the club's colours including Rob Reynolds, Dick Jones and Grenville Morris, a fine inside-left who represented Wales on no fewer than twenty-one occasions and, along with Harold Fleming, was one of a feared pair of inside-forwards. Fleming was recognised as one of Wiltshire's greatest players "an artist with the ball, a weaver of patterns with a subtle swerve and a great goal-getter, always attractive and ever dangerous."

Entry to the Football League came in 1920 with the formation of the Third Division. They got off to a spectacular start with a 9-1 win over Luton Town in their opening match, only to be followed by a 0-4 defeat against Southampton. They were the most widely contrasting results

on record in a team's first two League games in a season.

1921/22 saw the introduction of the Third Division South and North sections. Swindon became

residents of the South until the return to a national Division Three in 1958.

Thus, Swindon didn't make their first visit to Hull until 1 September 1958, when a 12,035 Boothferry Park gate witnessed a goalless Third Division draw. The Tigers line-up those 31 years ago read: Billy Bly, Frank Harrison, Dennis Durham, Les Collinson, Paul Feasey, Brian Bulless, Jimmy Duncan, Bill Bradbury, Chris Morris, David Coates and Mike Bowering.



An article in the August edition of the Association of Football Statisticians' Report has revealed the comparisons of distances to be travelled by Second

Division clubs in the coming season.

Contributor Nigel Gibb explained "One northern, three midland and two London teams have said goodbye to the Second Division and been replaced by three northern, two midlands and one London team. In addition to a northern drift the division has also experienced a move eastwards so teams in the north and east have a reduced total mileage and an increase is in store for those in the south and west. Leicester City take over from West Bromwich Albion as the Second Division's central team. The three teams relegated from the First have an additional four away games to increase their totals and especially so that of West Ham United in leaving a southern orientated division. Nomadic Middlesbrough are the current record holders in the League for successive divisional changes, having done so the last four times to give a divisional sequence of 2nd, 3rd, 2nd, 1st and 2nd. The Second Division is well spread, having four south coast teams and three in the north east to give an average Division Two journey of 155 miles." And from the following table, you will notice that that is exactly the mileage of the average away Hull City trip.
