

Our historian takes a look back at some previous meetings with tonight's opponents.

ONLY THE TWELFTH

Tonight is only the 12th meeting of Swindon Town and Bolton Wanderers and the first in the Little-woods Cup or any of its earlier equivalents. Most of the previous encounters came in the Second Division – eight in fact. But the Clubs last crossed paths during the Town's brief passage through Division Three in 1986/87.

LAST VISIT TO BURNDEN PARK

'Swindon's last visit to Burnden came in the opening game of that season. Peter Covne gave the Town the lead ten minutes before the break. George Oghani put Bolton on level terms in the 46th minute but Coyne struck again, for what proved to be the winner, just four minutes later. The two goalscorers had been on the same side a few years earlier, when they were with Hyde United, in the Northern Premier League. Peter has recently been released by Swindon while George has been on the move too. to Hereford United.

RELEGATED

In the last meeting between the two Clubs, in March 1987, Steve White and Mark Jones (one of six penalty successes that season) secured a 2-0 victory for the Town. Both Clubs were involved in end-of-season play-offs but, sadly for Bolton, their fate was to be relegated to the Fourth Division.

'FRANNY' LEE

Relegation also followed the first two occasions that Bolton and Swindon met, in 1964/65. This time it was the Town who had to suffer. The Wanderers' first visit to the County Ground in search of League points was on November 14, 1964.

Francis Lee gave the visitors the lead five minutes before half-time. John Trollope put Swindon level from the penalty spot in the 58th minute, but also immediately Bolton went in front again through Wyn Davies. Lee added another nine minutes before the end to complete a miserable afternoon for the Town. In was the last of four brief appearances by Frank Haffey before the former Scotland goalkeeper sought refuge in Australia. Speedy winger Peter Leggett had also played his last League game for Swindon that afternoon.

The two departures made way for two new faces for the Town's next game, at Middlesbrough. One of them, Dennis Brown, was the scorer of an 81st minute equaliser in Swindon's 1-1 draw at Burnden in the following March. Lee was on the mark for Bolton again, from a penalty.

LEAGUE DOUBLE

The Clubs next met on the Town's return to Division Two in 1969/70. Swindon recorded a League 'double' – and repeated the feat a season later.

Arthur Horsfield scored the only goal as the Town tasted victory at Burnden for the first time in October 1969 – and added the first of three at the County Ground in the following January. Donald Rogers supplied the others.

NOBLE TIME!

Another brace from Rogers and a first League goal for Chris Porter gave the Town a more emphatic victory at Bolton, 3-0, in December 1970. A Peter Noble hat-trick at Swindon sent the Wanderers tumbling to one of twenty-five League defeats that season. The visitors did manage a consolation goal from Roger Hunt, who had many years earlier assisted Devizes while with the Royal Army Pay Corps.

FIRST SUNDAY MATCH


Bolton's visit to the County Ground in February 1974 marked the occasion of Swindon Town's first League game on a Sunday. It also caused a dilemma for goalkeeper Jimmy Allan, who became the first Football League player to refuse to play on a Sunday. Alan Spratley took his place. Ray Clarke and Terry Hubbard gave the Town a 2-0 interval lead, but two goals from Neil Whatmore gave Bolton a point.

ONLY ONE CUP MATCH!

Only once have the two Clubs met in Cup competition and that was all of 75 years ago. It came in the old Second Round of the F.A. Cup in January 1914. Bolton had beaten non-League Port Vale 3-0 at the previous stage. Swindon, also a non-League' Club in those days, had faced slightly sterner opposition in First Division Manchester United, but they had accomplished victory with a last gasp goal from International Harold Fleming. The Town thus faced a trip to Burnden Park on January 31.

A crowd of 50,453 saw each side score once before the interval. Billy Batty, in the Swindon side because Fleming was unable to play, was the Town's scorer and the tall Yorkshireman added another in the second half. Unfortunately for the visitors Joe Smith, given excellent support by his partner on the left-wing Ted Vizard (see separate feature), hit a hat-trick to give the Wanderers a 4-2 win.


DO NOT UNDERESTIMATE BOLTON

SOUTH AND SOUTH WEST REGION Along with the Club Chairman, Mr. Brian Hillier, I recently attended the first of the recently resurrected Football League regional meetings. Our area concerns the South and West regions.

This area incorporates the following Clubs: Plymouth Argyle, Bristol City, Bristol Rovers, Exeter City, Torquay United, Southampton, A.F.C. Bournemouth, Swansea City and Cardiff City. Portsmouth were the only club not present.

POLICE COSTS

Among the topics for discussion were the vast amounts being spent on policing games. Especially the lack of uniformity throughout the country on police and safety team demands.

Representation from the Football League to the Police Authorities is imminent. There was a suggestion that a central fund should be set up to pay a realistic cost to the St. Johns Ambulance Brigade. A levy may be placed on each Club to pay these costs. At present there is a sum of £250,000 which could be utilised for this purpose from the Centenary Trust fund.

FOOTBALL SPECTATORS BILL
The meeting was advised by the Football League Secretary, David Dent, that the Football Spectators Bill would proceed with haste in the near future.

The House of Commons was due to return on the 17th of October and the third reading of the Bill was likely to take one full day. The Bill would then be returned to the House of Lords for any amendments. It was expected that the Bill would receive Royal Assent in early November. The Government's intention is for the Bill to be enforced at the commencement of the 1990–91 season.


TECHNOLOGY - YES OR NO? The general consensus of opinion is that technology may still have the final decision. There is a general opinion that there is no satisfactory

conclusion vet!

The Football League were looking for Clubs to volunteer to be involved in a pilot scheme. Norwich City had volunteered recently, but they were a Club situated in a rural area without the problems which would be an ideal test. Liverpool were seen to be an ideal Club. The Football League had discovered that on each matchday there were only 3,000 cash admissions to the Anfield ground The remainder enter the ground by ticket admission!

FOOTBALL LEAGUE
APPEALS COMMITTEE

There is a definite conclusion to the





findings of the Football League Appeals
Committee. After several years of
arbitration they will be asking for the
two Clubs to attend the tribunal within
fourteen days of application.

In future they will ask that the Managers of the respective Clubs attend the hearing accompanied by a Club official. At present they have found that Clubs vary in their assessment of value. However, when the Managers are closeted in a room with the Appeals Committee the valuation of the player is more realistic.

Clubs are to be asked to pay within six months and the fee will be calculated from the day the player signs for his new Club. It is likely that Clubs will be asked to pay a small fee for the cost of the Appeals Committee hearing.

The Football League were convinced that the majority of clubs had faith in the Appeals Committee system.



The Football League are negotiating with Wembley Stadium for the three play-off finals to be played at the famous venue. These matches would be played over the Bank Holiday weekend, incorporating Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

This suggestion would be financially beneficial in lieu of a two leg final although the present two leg semi-final would still be applicable.

SKYS THE LIMIT ON ZENITH DELTA SYSTEMS

Sky Television are negotiating to screen matches live in the newly sponsored Zenith Delta Systems Cup. Their proposal is to commence next season.

Sky Television are willing to pay £44 million over three seasons, this would be an obvious inducement for all full members to compete in the competition. They also hope to begin screening, in a limited way, this season. It was also revealed by the Football League Secretary that British Satellite Broadcasting will screen live matches from Scotland into England.

SEMINAR

A seminar will be held in March to discuss the system of fixture arrangements. The League Secretary outlined the problems incurred in compiling the fixture list.

There were several problems concerning the two blank days allowed for the First Division programme to enable the England International team to prepare for the World Cup. The restructuring of the Divisions in recent season and the pairing of Clubs had has a knock-on effect through to the Fourth Division. Incidentally, we are paired with Oxford United and we alternate our fixtures accordingly. The Football League also revealed that they are negotiating with several of the National newspapers to include notification of all-ticket matches alonside the printed fixtures.

A BOOST

Cup action, Littlewoods Cup style, returns to the County Ground this evening. In extending a warm welcome to Bolton Wanderers we obviously hope that we are able to extend our run in this competition.

The rewards are high in any Cup competition and an obvious boost to the morale of players, officials and supporters and also an uplift to the Clubs financial resources. Enjoy the match and help cheer Swindon Town into Round Four.

PAUL PLOWMAN LOOKS BACK AT THE LIFE AND TIMES OF A MAN WHO SERVED BOTH SWINDON TOWN AND TONIGHT'S OPPONENTS

SAM ALLEN

Back in 1933, the board of Swindon Town decided that after thirty years of combining the duties of club secretary with those of looking after team affairs, 65-year-old Sam Allen would be relieved of some of his responsibilities and a full-time team manager would be appointed.

TED VIZARD

That appointment brought to Swindon Ted Vizard, who had a twenty-year playing career with Bolton Wanderers.



• Ted Vizard

Born Edward Thomas Vizard on June 7 1899. near Cardiff. Ted was spotted playing for Barry Town and invited the Burnden Park for a onemonth trial in August 1910. He immediately impressed and made a Second Division debut against Gainsborough Trinity on November 5. Within another three months Ted had been called up for International duty. He partnered the former Swindon forward Grenville Morns on the left wing as Wales defeated Ireland 2-1

At the age of just 30, Ted Vizard found himself temporarily in charge at Burnden Park. after the Great War had come to an end, in

FAMOUS WHITE HORSE

Four years later he was in the victorious Wanderers side in the first Wembley Cup Final, when West Ham were defeated 2-0. Ted. with a little assistance from a spectator, created the second goal for John Smith eight minutes after half-time. The story goes that the touchline onlooker, one of several thousands who had over-spilled from the stands, used a subtle foot to keep the ball in play as Ted sped up the wing. But Bolton's victory on that day was really made possible by the efforts of P.C. George Scorey and his famous white horse Billy

Ted collected a second winners' medal three years later when Manchester City were beaten by a single goal. Bolton lifted the Cup against after another three years, but by then most of the heroes of 1923 had either departed or, like Ted, spent their time predominantly in the reserves

OVER 450 APPEARANCES

He made over 450 League appearances for the Club and then took charge of the Wanderers' junior side until his invitation to come to the County Ground - at a salary of £6 per week!

Mr. Vizard's first task was to initiate a major clear-out, following the Club's inability to finish above last place in the Third Division South. Of Following just one defeat in the opening seven the entire professional squad, only three players games of 1938/39. Swindon sat proudly at the

good fortune of four home F.A. Cup ties in 1934/35, which aggregated over £4,200 in gate receipts No such luck came a year later, however, as the Town went tumbling out to non-League Southall in the First Round and then slumped to a final League position of nineteenth. Ted asked the board for his contract to be terminated, but he was eventually persuaded to stay on.

In November 1937, Ted was given the goahead to break the four-figure transfer barrier by signing Ben Morton from Torquay United.

ONE DEFEAT IN SEVEN

were left to represent the Town under the new boss. Even the legendary Harry Morris departed. Only experienced goalkeeper Arthur Briggs and centre half Alec Lambie were retained along with young wing half Harry Cousins.

ALLOWED £200 TO SPEND

With a hefty bank overdraft the Manager was allowed just \$200 to invest in the transfer market and with it he purchased Bolton's full back Tom Duckworth early in 1934. That summer Ted signed a three-year contract - and also signed another former Wanderer's man in Rollo Jack. an old playing colleague. Rollo's brother David had scored the other goal in that inaugural Wembley final

OVERDRAFT DISAPPEARED


The overdraft disappeared as Swindon had the

top of the Third South but were unable to maintain that exalted position. Despite thrashing the then leaders. Newport County, 8-0 on Boxing Day, the Town had slipped to ninth place by the close of the season.

£1,000 A YEAR

It was to be Mr. Vizard's last at Swindon. He took the managerial seat at Oueens Park Rangers, at a reported salary of £1,000 a year. in May 1939. After the War he succeeded Major Frank Buckley at Molineux but soon handed over to Stanley Cullis. Ted retired to business, running an hotel near Chester. He died just before Christmas in 1973, at the age of







Goalkeepers - Manager Phil Neal has two experienced goalkeepers at his disposal David Felgate, (29), began his career with Bolton but made his debut on loan to Rochdale. David was later sold to Lincoln City, making 198 appearances for the Sincil Bank club before moving to Grimsby Town He returned to Burnden Park in February 1987. Kevin Rose, (28), was signed from Hereford United for £20,000 in the close season. Kevin began his career with Ledbury Town before joining Lincoln City for £10,000. He failed to make a League appearance at Sincil Bank. He made 249 consecutive appearances for the Edgar Street Club.

This is the first meeting betwen the two Clubs in this competition.

Defenders – Former Halifax Town full back Phil Brown, (30), a player with enthusiasm was signed for the Burnden Park Club in a £17,000 transfer deal from Halifax Town in June 1988. Phil has made 217 League appearances for Hartlepool before joining Halifax Town for whom he made 135 League appearances. Phil like to join in the attack. Former West Bromwich Albion's Barry Cowdrill, (31), has made the left back position his own since joining the Wanderers in July 1988. Barry made 112 League appearances in his eight year spell at the

Hawthorns Paul Hughes, (20), has made 11 League appearances for Bolton Wanderers Last season was a virtual write off through injury for the home grown full back. Dean Crombie, (31), whose previous Clubs include Lincoln City and Grimsby Town, scored his first goal for the Club in the Sherpa Van Trophy final at Wembley against Torquay United. A veteran of 421 League matches Mark Winstanley, (21), is the mainstay of the defence and joined Wanderers from Winsford United in 1984. Mark has made 80 League appearances and collected the Clubs Player of the Year award last season. Another former Winsford United player at Burnden Park is Exeter born Mark Came, (28). Mark has made 146 League appearances but missed most of last season with a broken leg sustained in a Littlewoods Cup-tie at Chester. He made his first appearance for over twelve months against York City in a Pontins League match on September

The highest attendance to watch a Swindon Town v. Bolton Wanderers fixture was the 50,453 who saw Wanderers defeat the Town 4-2 on January 31st 1914 in an F.A. Cup Second Round match at Burnden Park.

Midfield - Liverpool born Robbie Savage, (28), is an aggressive player. He failed to make an appearance with Liverpool Robbie made his debut on loan to Wrexham. Spells at Stoke City, A.F.C. Bournemouth and Bradford City preceded his move to Burnden Park in September 1987 for £35,000 Leeds born Gary Henshaw, (24), was signed from Grimsby Town in the summer of 1987. Gary spent most of last season on the transfer list at his own request. Former Everton midfield player Stuart Storer, (22), joined Wanderers in January 1988 for £25,000 Stuart commenced his career with Mansfield Town, he then moved to Birmingham City before moving to Goodison Park in a part exchange deal. He also had a loan spell with Wigan Athletic while he was with Everton. Watford found Stuart to be a problem in their Littlewoods Cup-tie recently. Steve Thompson, (25), is the Clubs longest serving professional who was recently placed on the transfer list at his own request. Steve has made 243 League appearances for the Club after progressing through the Youth ranks Local born Julian Darby, (21), joined Wanderers from school and is the only Bolton born player in the first team squad. Julian had the pleasure of scoring at Wembley against Torquay United last May. One of four goals put past former Town keeper Kenny Allen He has now made 121 League appearances for Wanderers. Former Blackburn. Rovers, Wigan Athletic. Wrexham and Burnley player Paul Comstive, (28), made his debut for Wanderers in the 2-1 win against Leyton Orient on September 23rd at Burnden Park. Essentially a left footed player, Paul has played for Blackburn Rovers, Wigan Athletic and Burnley before his recent move to Burnden



Irrespective of this advantage it was due to defensive mistakes that Steve Restarick and Mark Kinsella gave the home team a comfortable half time lead.




