What A Nightmare Inept united cave in again

Every Oxford United fan's nightmare came true last night as the team crashed 3-0 to old rivals Swindon for the second season running

If anything, the players were even more inept than those who marched away from the County Ground after their drubbing in February.

Far from repaying the tremendous loyal following of an estimated 2,000 United fans – as they had pledged to do – Oxford's players merely piled on the agony.

For 28 minutes last night United competed well and looked as likely to take the lead as their in-form opponents.

When Swindon won their first corner in that 28th minute United went back to their amateurish defending at set pieces as unmarked Swindon captain Colin Calderwood sent a thumping header past Peter Hucker.

Desperate

If only one of them had possessed a handkerchief. United might as well have held up the white flag for they then caved in and only a combination of Hucker's brave keeping, erratic finishing and desperate clearances stopped them being burie d under an avalanche of goals.

The visitors let Cosse Ardiles' side overrun them in midfield. The defence, without a sweeper, looked about as secure as the stock market and wingers David Penney and Paul Simpson had the kind of games that only wingers can have disappearing acts that Billy Smart's Circus would have been proud of

Frantic

But it was at the back where United were having most problems with Greenall and Slatter failing to put their vast experience to any good use.

In a ten minute spell Swindon might have scored five times but for the brilliance of Hucker and it was no more than Swindon deserved when they scored a second goal on the stroke of half time.

Eighteen-year-old Hunt, held the ball up on the edge of the area, and with no player challenging. White fired a low 20 yard shot into the bottom left hand corner

Oxford at least showed greater urgency at the start of the second period and had a much better spell.

Stein, the one United player always full of running, was unlucky not to pull a goal back when he chipped over Digby only to see Calderwood make a flying headed clearance. But when that didn't go in United's heads again dropped and Town grabbed a third goal on the break as Hunt slipped past Grenall and teed up a simple tap-in for White.

Mustoe and Stein had shots in a crowded goalmouth blocked and in a frantic scramble Digby made a great save at Durnin's feet.

At the end, though, woeful United ended up well beaten, and it might have been more Swindon sub John Cornwell unleashed a vicious 15 yard drive which Hucker just managed to deflect against the bar

ZENITH DATE

FROM THE HAMMERS NEWS

The October edition of West Ham United's 'Hammers News' carried this account of our match when we visited Upton Park on Saturday, September 9th

West Ham 1, Swindon Town 1

If West Ham needed a timely warning that all is not plain sailing in Division Two, then this disappointing draw with Swindon Town

Hammers slipped from top spot to third in the table and couldn't honestly complain at the result of this hard-fought battle, littered with ill-tempered challenges and nondescript play

Swindon's former Spurs winger Tony Galvin was the main antagonist, committing a series of reckless and invariably late

He was pulled off by Ossie Ardiles with 20-odd minutes remaining, before running the likely risk of being sent off by a referee who had his hands full keeping control in the second half.

Julian Dicks rose to Galvin's bait and earned himself another booking, although George Parris was fortunate not to add his name to a list which also included skipper Alvin Martin who, despite his experience. allowed himself to be provoked by the niggly Steve White.

The untidyness of the second half upset Hammers' early rhythm when they seemed on course for their third successive home League win.

Martin Allen's well-struck goal was reward for some early enterprise by Hammers who piled on the pressure despite the absence of Stuart Slater, injured in training and the latest victim of the iinx that has stalked our strikers so far this season.

With Mark Ward again proving a menage in and around the opponent's box, and David Kelly taking up intelligent positions. it was only a matter of time before West Ham went ahead

Even left-back Julian Dicks went on the rampage and was unfortunate not to find the net on at least one occasion.

Yet there was a warning, just two minutes after Allen's goal, that West Ham were vulnerable to the counter-attack. The diminutive front pairing of Shaun Close and White unsettled Martin and Cale at times and only a fine blocking save by the perceptive Phil Parkes prevented White from equalising

The Swindon players - as Lou Macari no doubt anticipated - fought for everything and as Hammers began to run out of fresh ideas about how to score a second. Town came more into the picture with several second half efforts that at least kept Parkes busier than he had been in either of the previous two home games.

A mistake by Gale left Steve Potts needing to clear the danger, but at the expense of a corner. A costly one, because from Maclaren's mishit shot, the ball fell conveniently to defender Gittens who couldn't miss putting his team level.

Although Kelly, before he was injured to the head, and his replacement, Eamonn Dolan, both managed headers on target, it needed something extra to beat the always impressive Fraser Digby in Swindon's goal

He didn't put a hand wrong and will surely be displaying his talent at a higher level before much longer:



Our historian looks back at some previous meetings between Swindon Town and today's opponents.

ON THE THIRD MATCH

Today is the 14th occasion that Swindon Town and Stoke City have met in competitive games, but only the third Football League encounter at the County Ground.

Two League meetings in Division Two and two in the Southern League here have produced a remarkable sequence, whereby in every game Swindon have scored three times and on each occasion a Swindon player has scored twice!

A win for the Town here in May ensured that they would go into the hat for the play-offs. It was not a happy day for the visitors who lost Carl Beeston through injury and Mark Higgins through dismissal. Higgins' departure came just five minutes after Duncan Shearer had given Swindon the lead in the 61st. Tommy Jones added a second four minutes from time, quickly followed by another from Shearer – his 16th and last of the season.

Jones also found the net in the Victoria Ground clash almost a year ago. His 65th minute effort was in reply to a George Berry penalty. Graham Shaw gave City the points with a header five minutes before the end.

THE FIRST BETWEEN THE CLUBS

The 1987/88 encounters were the first between the Clubs in the Football League. Stoke City's visit to the County Ground on October 20 started disastrously for the men from the Potteries. Jimmy Quinn gave the Town the lead with just fifty seconds on the clock. City survived the half without further damage but conceded two goals to Steve White in the 60th and 71st minutes. The match marked the debut of Bobby Barnes for Swindon.

The return fixture saw the Town go in arrears in the 16th minute, to a Simon Stainrod goal, and then bombarded the home goal for most of the game. But Stoke City's lowest home crowd of the season – 6,293 – saw them cling on to the points.

Although there were no League meetings earlier, many will remember the League Cup tussles of 1979/80 and a few the classes F.A. Cup ties of 1951/52. Not many will be able to recall the Southern League encounters of over 75 years ago!

FORMED IN 1925

After resigning from the Football League in 1908, Stoke (the Club did not become known as Stoke City until 1925) spent a period in the Southern League. They won promotion from the Second Division, as runners-up to Reading in 1911, while Swindon were First Division champions.

THE DAYS OF FLEMING

And so the two met for the first time on Christmas Day 1911, at the County Ground Swindon were without England International Harold Fleming who always declined to play on Christmas Day, Alex McCulloch took his place at insideleft. But they raced to a 3-0 half-time lead with two goals from flying winger Bob Jefferson and one from dead-ball expert Billy Tout. There was no further scoring until the Clubs met again on Boxing Day at the Victoria Ground.

McCulloch did enough to retain his place in the Town line-up, winger Sammy Lamb giving way for Fleming's inclusion in the ranks. A massive crowd saw Harold give the visitors a 1-0 advantage at the interval. Archie Bown scored twice in the second half and Jefferson added a fourth in a fine 4-1 victory.


On returning to the Potteries in the following November, Swindon were without Jefferson, Bown and Fleming, but gained a point from a 1-1 draw. Billy Batty rifled home a twenty-yarder in the 52nd minute after Revill had put Stoke ahead in the eleventh.

Fleming, who had been absent from the Town side for nearly a year through injury, had recovered by the time Stoke came back to the County Ground in March 1913. He scored twice as the Town edged home 3-2. Stoke took the wooden spoon at the end of the season and were relegated back to the Southern League Second Division. But good times lay ahead as six years later they were admitted to the Football League.

CITY'S LAST WIN WAS FORTY YEARS AGO

City's last win at the County Ground was forty years ago, in a Third Round F.A. Cup tie in January 1949. George Mountford put Stoke City ahead ten minutes before half-time and Fred Steele added another five minutes later. Mountford put the game beyond the Town's reach with fifteen minutes to go. Maurice Owen hit a consolation goal eight minutes from time.



Don't hestitate to call them in when the weather is bad and we can't play!


CRUNCH DAY



FRUSTRATING

What a frustrating Saturday! The postponement of our match with A.F.C. Bournemouth left a void for everyone. It was unavoidable in the circumstances.

Those circumstances began to evolve on Friday afternoon when we received the weather forecast from the Bristol Weather Centre. The bulletin is always received twenty-four hours before each match. The mean wind was indicated at Storm Force 7 with gusts between 8 to 10 Storm Force. A telephone call to the weather centre indicated that the computer would be more precise twelve hours later. After consultation with Wiltshire County Council and the Football League we decided to wait for the 8 a.m. forecast on Saturday. At this stage the Football League determined that the postponement must be made by a Wiltshire County Council representative.


RISING WITH THE LARKS

For the administration staff of the Club it was a case of up bright and early the next morning. Amazingly, at 6 a.m. there was no wind and no clear indication of what was to follow.

The Bristol Weather Centre confirmed that they expected a mean wind of Force 8 and gusts of Force 10 on Saturday morning when they issued their 8 a.m. forecast. At this stage Superintendant G. M. Rogers, the Wiltshire County Council representative, was informed of this bulletin. He was loathe to postpone the match but, after checking with R.A.F. Lyneham, he concurred that there was no alternative but to postpone the match. The guidelines issued had to be adhered to in the interests of public safety.

PLEASE NOTE

My notes contained in the Wolverhampton Wanderers programme of September 3rd warned of this implementation. I can only repeat that no sporting event at the County Ground, whether it involves League soccer, reserve, youth team soccer, or an outside activity organised to take place here on behalf of other sporting bodies, will be allowed to proceed if a Storm Force 8 wind is forecast.





EASY TO BE WISE ON REFLECTION?

Those who have to implement this decision have NO alternative within the present guideline. On reflection, the South Stand withstood the most severe battering. In fairness, no conclusive figures have been produced to state that the South Stand would not withstand a Storm Force 8 wind. The decision is precautionary for public safety. It is always easy to be wise on reflection. However, it may be a worthwhile exercise to have a thorough study on the South Stand, particularly if there is no development of this area in the foreseeable future.

RE-ARRANGED AND IN ANTICIPATION?

The match with A.F.C. Bournemouth will now take place on Tuesday December 5th, kick-off at 7.45 p.m. The Dean Court Club readily agreed to the rearrangement and we are grateful for their co-operation.

Next Tuesday evening's Little-woods Cup-tie with Bolton Wanderers will kick-off at 7.30 p.m. If the scores are level at full time, extra time will be played. If the score remains level after the extra thirty minutes a coin will be tossed to decide the venue for a third match. That match will be played either at the County Ground or Burnden Park on Tuesday November 14th. The kick-off at the County Ground will be at 7.45 p.m. and 7.30 p.m. if staged at Burnden Park.

UNBEATEN FOR ALMOST A YEAR

If Bolton Wanderers remain unbeaten at home to Swansea City this afternoon they will retain an unbeaten record for almost a year at Burnden Park.

The last home defeat they incurred was on **December 17th**, 1988 when **Chester City** defeated them 1-0 due to a goal scored by Carl Dale.

PLEASE NOTE

Our next two home matches in the Football Combination will have evening kick-off times. On Tuesday next, we entertain Wimbledon and on Tuesday November 21st, we play Arsenal. Both matches here at the County Ground will have 7.30 p.m. kickoff times.

FAIRFORD TOWN

For those who take an interest in the non-League scene, the progression of Fairford Town in the Federated Homes League over the past three years will not have gone unnoticed. The Gloucestershire Club's Manager during that time has been former Stoke City and Swindon Town midfield player Paul Richardson.

Nottinghamshire-born, Paul was an apprentice with Forest at the time the Club finished runners-up in the First Division and semi-finalists in the F.A. Cup in 1967. En route, Third Division Swindon Town had taken Forest to two replays in the Fifth Round.

"IT WAS A BIT AWESOME"

Paul became a full professional in August of that year and played in just one full League game in 1967/68, in front of nearly forty thousand at Liverpool. "It was a bit awesome!", said Paul. Only eighteen then. Paul became a first-team regular from 1969/70 and stayed at the City Ground until October 1976, serving a number of Managers in Johnny Carey, Matt Gillies, Dave Mackay (the former Swindon boss). Allan Brown and the incomparable Brian Clough.

MISSED ONLY TWO GAMES!

Paul then spent eighteen months at Chester, but was soon back in the Second Division with Stoke City. In 1978/79 he missed just two games as they clinched promotion to the First Division Paul remembers the final game at Notts County well. On the same day promotion rivals Sunderland played at Wrexham. "Near the end, Alan Durban came running down to the touch-line and told us that Sunderland were winning," he recalled. "So we all pushed upfield and I got the winner with almost the last kick of the game!"

INJURY SETBACK

Midway through 1980/81, Paul suffered a knee injury that kept him on the sidelines for the remainder of the season. At the end of the following July Sheffield United stepped in with a better offer than Stoke City had made - and Paul moved on to Bramall Lane. He spent two

years there before coming to the County Ground on a free transfer in July 1983.


DISAPPOINTMENT

Our approach both in effort and appetite was much better and this was matched by players giving each other better instructions and help. A good, hardworking team performance




