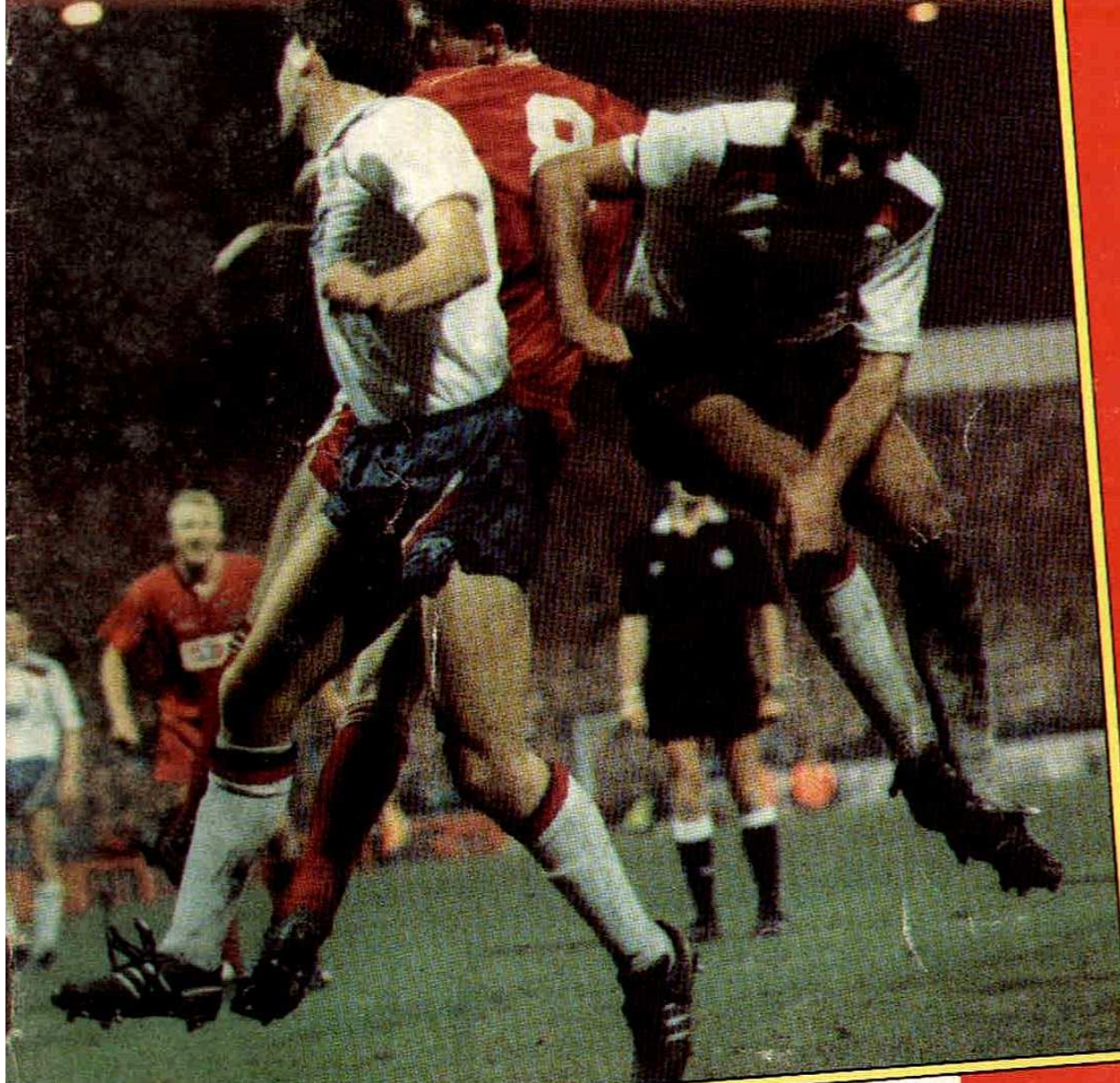

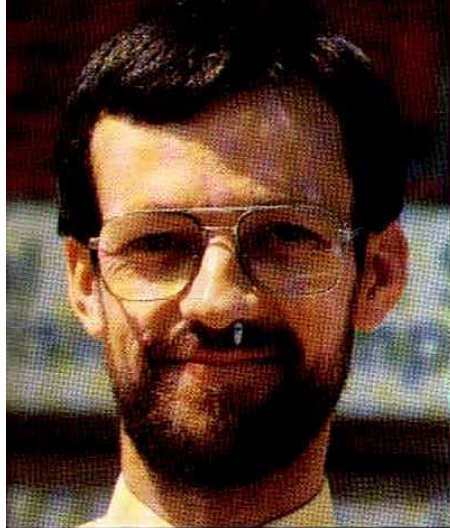

PAUL PLOWMAN LOOKS BACK AT SOME OTHER LONG-RUNNING SAGAS IN THE LEAGUE CUP

Tonight is Swindon Town's 109th game in the Football League Cup and the first time that the Club has been involved in a third replay. It is the Town's sixth game in the competition this season and only twice, in almost thirty years, have they played more than six League Cup matches in one season. Eleven were fought out in reaching the semi-finals of 1979/80 and the earlier Wembley victory went to twelve.

FOUR VENUES

Prior to this season, only five ties in the history of the competition have extended to four games. One, between West Ham United and Stoke City in 1971/72, was a semi-final and was the first League Cup tie to be staged at four different grounds. All square following the scheduled two legs, Hillsborough was the venue for a third meeting and Old

Trafford the fourth and last. Stoke went on to take the Cup.

The first League Cup tie to go to more than one replay was the First Round meeting in 1960/61 of the now defunct Newport County and Southampton – who are still waiting for the outcome of tonight's encounter. After two 2-2 draws the Saints triumphed 5-3 at The Dell. They went on to defeat Liverpool at Anfield and then met Leeds in a nine-goal Fourth Round thriller. Derek Reeves scored all five goals for Southampton that night, an individual scoring record that was unsurpassed in the competition until Frank Bunn claimed six for Oldham earlier this season.

DISDAIN

Many First Division Clubs treated the new competition with disdain in its early days and did not always enter. In 1961/62 this resulted in a curious situation whereby eleven Clubs went into the hat for the Fourth Round draw. Five of them received a bye into the Fifth!

The 1964/65 season was the first to pass without a single tie extending beyond two games. Coventry City might have been happy with just one replay in their Fifth Round tie with Leicester at Highfield Road. They lost 1-8! Workington, no longer eligible for the competition, had gone one better in the First Round with a 9-1 victory over another former Football League Club, Barrow.

The first Club to score ten goals in a Football League Cup tie was West Ham United, in their semi-final encounter with Cardiff City in 1965/66. The east Londoners triumphed 5-2 at Upton Park and 5-1 in South Wales, but lost out to West Bromwich Albion in the last

two-legged final. West Ham United faced Albion again the following season – at the semi-final stage – but the Midlanders again came out on top and prevented the Hammers from reaching Wembley.

The first League Cup tie to go to a fourth game was between Chester and Tranmere Rovers in 1968/69. Over 46,000 saw the Clubs battle it out before Tranmere triumphed 2-1 at Sealand Road, to earn themselves a lucrative Second Round trip under the Mersey to Goodison Park. Everton won 4-0. Tonight's visitors were even less fortunate, going down 7-2 at West Ham United.

Swindon Town went 'all the way', of course, despite having been forced into replays in the First, Second, Fourth and Fifth Rounds – and the semi-final. Don Rogers clinched the trophy with the third goal against Arsenal in the 1,170th minute of the Town's Cup campaign!

PENALTY SHOOT-OUT

The First Round of the competition went two-legged for 1975/76 and the idea of a fourth game at this stage was shelved in favour of a penalty shoot-out. Doncaster and Millwall were the first to profit from this practice in 1976/77. That season also saw the first Wembley League Cup Final to be unresolved. A further attempt was made to separate Aston Villa and Everton at Hillsborough but a third game was necessary. It took place at Old Trafford 32 days after the Final had started and again required extra-time before Villa came out on top.

From 1979/80, the Second Round was also contested over two legs, guaranteeing the smaller Clubs another home game – but a lesser chance of progressing in the competition.

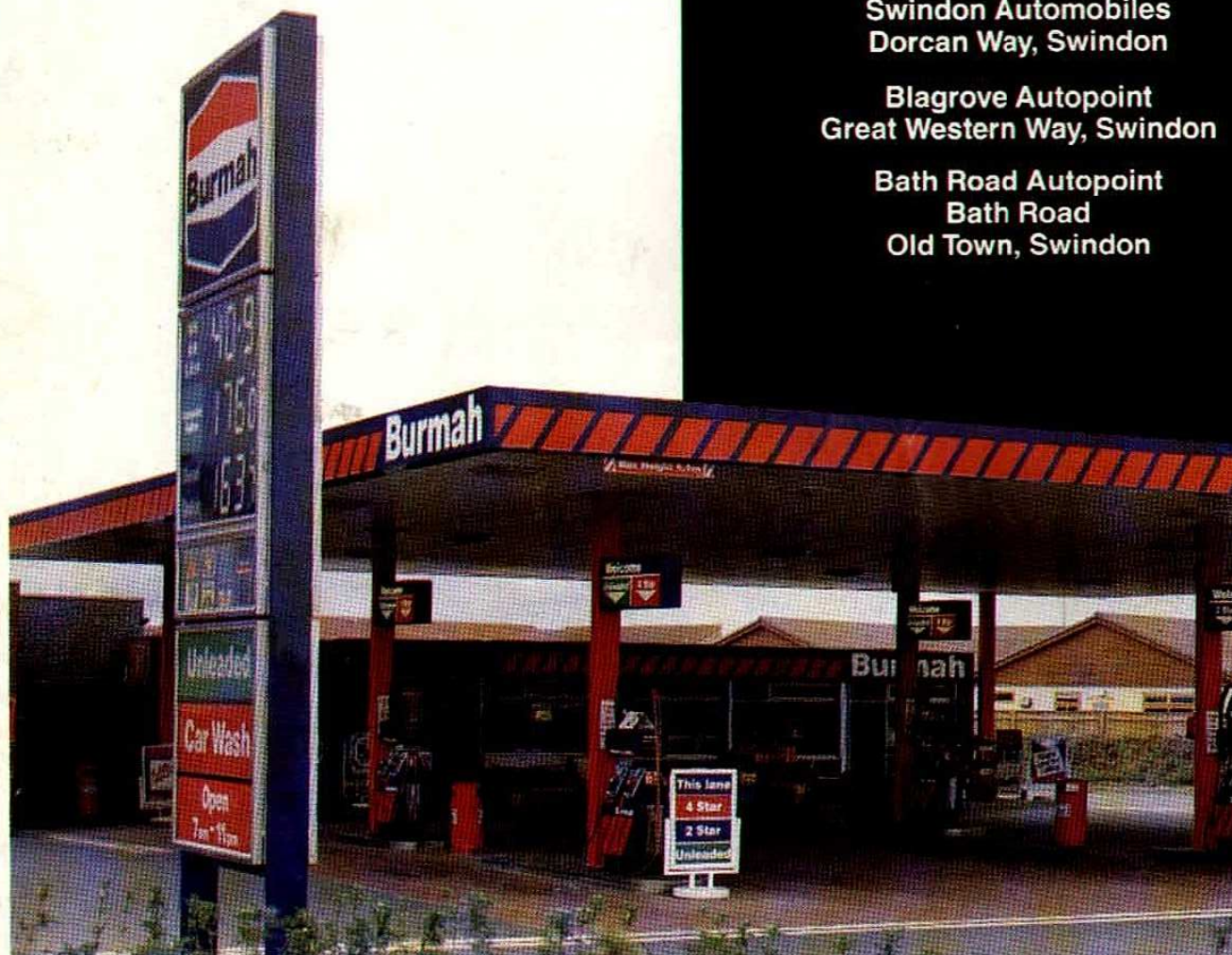

The sight of his half time shampoo and set will be sorely missed on the Shrivenham Road side as will his pacy attacking runs followed by his wheezy gallops back into position. The loss of King, despite being followed by David Hockaday's injury, can be overcome and investments made to provide some genuine depth in other areas. John Cornwell has already proved himself to be an able deputy for Hockaday and also emphasised his underuse by Lou Macari.

MONEY FOR FACILITIES?

The fantasy world inhabited by many football fans leads me to suggest that a small proportion of the cash could be wisely spent on the refurbishment of the toilet facilities throughout the ground and the creation of some authentic disabled amenities, but the conflict of providing entertainment on the pitch and humane conditions off it seems to be one that will never be resolved.

WHAT ABOUT A RETURN FOR CHRIS?

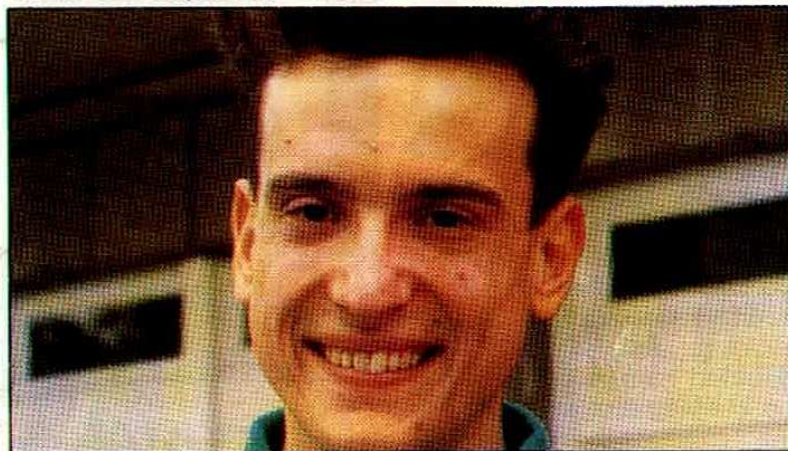
As unlikely as the provision of sanitation

A MAN WHO SERVED BOTH SWINDON
TOWN AND TONIGHT'S OPPONENTS

SAM ALLEN

Back in 1933, the board of Swindon Town decided that after thirty years of combining the duties of club secretary with those of looking after team affairs, 65-year-old Sam Allen would be relieved of some of his responsibilities and a full-time team manager would be appointed.

TED VIZARD

That appointment brought to Swindon Ted Vizard, who had a twenty-year playing career with Bolton Wanderers.

Born Edward Thomas Vizard, on June 7 1889, near Cardiff, Ted was spotted playing for Barry Town and invited the Burnden Park for a one-month trial in August 1910. He immediately impressed and made a Second Division debut against Gainsborough Trinity on November 5. Within another three months Ted had been called up for International duty. He partnered the former Swindon forward Grenville Morris on the left wing as Wales defeated Ireland 2-1 in Belfast.

At the age of just 30, Ted Vizard found himself temporarily in charge at Burnden Park, after the Great War had come to an end, in 1919.

FAMOUS WHITE HORSE

Four years later he was in the victorious Wanderers side in the first Wembley Cup Final, when West Ham were defeated 2-0. Ted, with a little assistance from a spectator, created the second goal for John Smith eight minutes after half-time. The story goes that the touch-line onlooker, one of several thousands who had over-spilled from the stands, used a subtle foot to keep the ball in play as Ted sped up the wing. But Bolton's victory on that day was really made possible by the efforts of P.C. George Scorey and his famous white horse Billy.

Ted collected a second winners' medal three years later when Manchester City were beaten by a single goal. Bolton lifted the Cup against after another three years, but by then most of the heroes of 1923 had either departed or, like Ted, spent their time predominantly in the reserves.

OVER 450 APPEARANCES

He made over 450 League appearances for the Club and then took charge of the Wanderers' junior side until his invitation to come to the County Ground - at a salary of £6 per week!

Mr. Vizard's first task was to initiate a major clear-out, following the Club's inability to finish above last place in the Third Division South. Of the entire professional squad, only three players

good fortune of four home F.A. Cup ties in 1934/35, which aggregated over £4,200 in gate receipts. No such luck came a year later, however, as the Town went tumbling out to non-League Southall in the First Round and then slumped to a final League position of nineteenth. Ted asked the board for his contract to be terminated, but he was eventually persuaded to stay on.

In November 1937, Ted was given the go-ahead to break the four-figure transfer barrier by signing Ben Morton from Torquay United.

ONE DEFEAT IN SEVEN

Following just one defeat in the opening seven games of 1938/39, Swindon sat proudly at the

were left to represent the Town under the new boss. Even the legendary Harry Morris departed. Only experienced goalkeeper Arthur Briggs and centre half Alec Lambie were retained along with young wing half Harry Cousins.

ALLOWED £200 TO SPEND

With a hefty bank overdraft the Manager was allowed just £200 to invest in the transfer market and with it he purchased Bolton's full back Tom Duckworth early in 1934. That summer Ted signed a three-year contract - and also signed another former Wanderer's man in Rollo Jack, an old playing colleague. Rollo's brother David had scored the other goal in that inaugural Wembley final.

OVERDRAFT DISAPPEARED

The overdraft disappeared as Swindon had the

top of the Third South but were unable to maintain that exalted position. Despite thrashing the then leaders, Newport County, 8-0 on Boxing Day, the Town had slipped to ninth place by the close of the season.

£1,000 A YEAR

It was to be Mr. Vizard's last at Swindon. He took the managerial seat at Queens Park Rangers, at a reported salary of £1,000 a year, in May 1939. After the War he succeeded Major Frank Buckley at Molineux but soon handed over to Stanley Cullis. Ted retired to business, running an hotel near Chester. He died just before Christmas in 1973, at the age of 84.

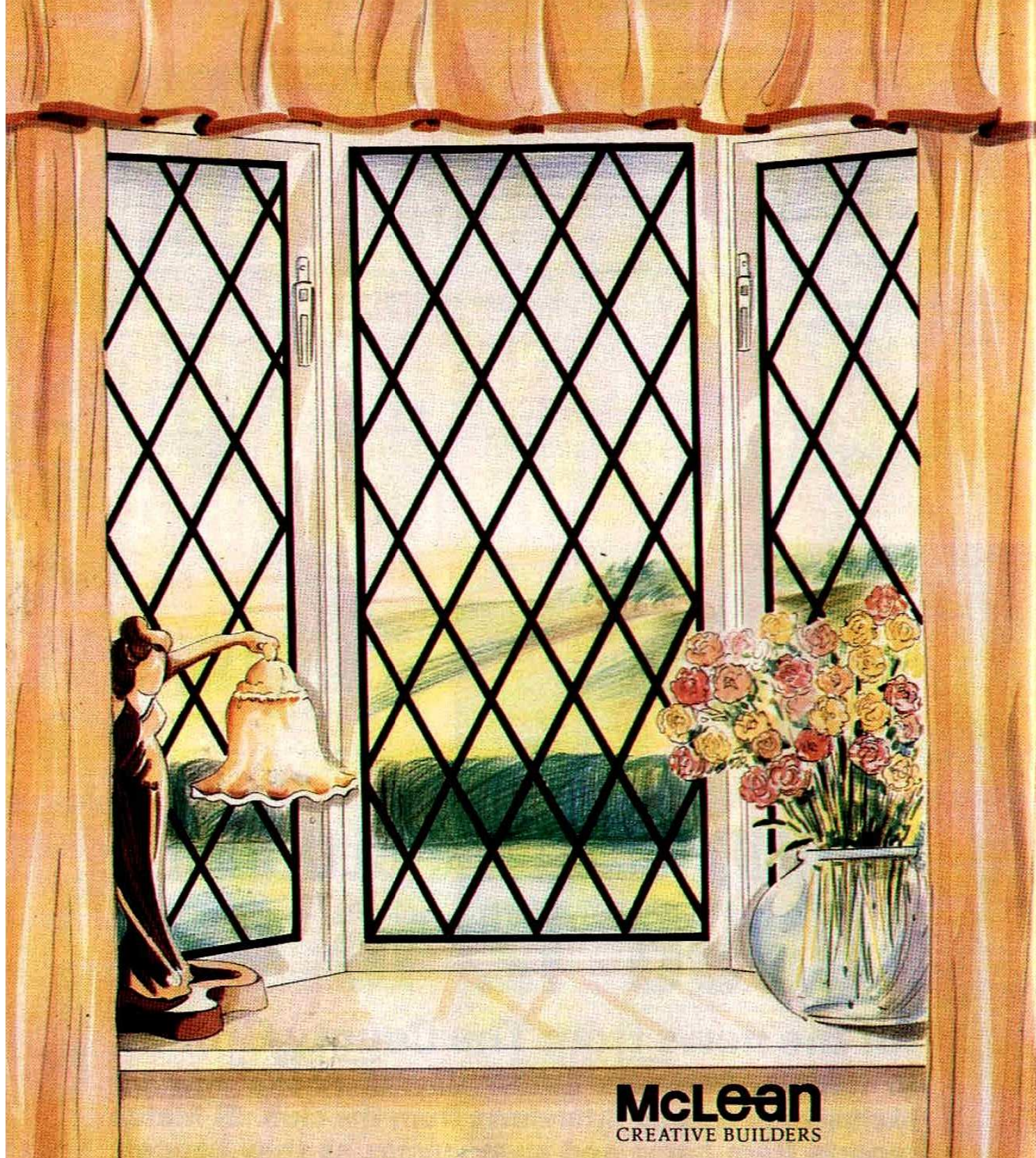

Bolton Wanderers escaped lightly in the **First Leg, First Round** match at **Rochdale**. If the home team had exploited the gaps in the Bolton defence they could well have upset the odds. **Bolton** took the lead in the **ninth minute** when **Steve Thompson** sent **Welch**, the Rochdale keeper, the wrong way from the penalty spot. **Michael Holmes** equalised for Rochdale in the **twenty-second minute** with a 33 yard lob which went in just under the crossbar. **Wayne Goodison** secured a win for the **Spotland Club** with a fierce drive from the edge of the penalty box to make the scoreline **2-1**.

A **5-1** victory for **Bolton Wanderers** in the **Second Leg** didn't do justice to Rochdale's contribution to an all-action Cup tie. However, Bolton's attack was in a menacing mood. **Tony Philliskirk** put Wanderers into a **second minute** lead with a glancing header from Robbie Savage's corner. A minute from half time **David Reeves** scored with a well placed header from Mark Winstanley's cross. In the **forty-ninth minute** a **Stuart Stoner** cross was headed home from close range by **Robbie Savage**. A surging run by full back **Barry Cowdrill**, who scored with a low left shot, put Bolton four goals clear on the night. **Julian Darby** made it **6-0** in the **eighty-ninth minute** with a right foot shot after Rochdale keeper Welch

had blocked **Steve Thompson's** fierce drive. **White Burns** reduced the arrears two minutes later with a curling right foot shot which beat Bolton keeper **David Filgate** from twenty-five yards. The **5-1** win gave Bolton Wanderers a **win 6-3** on aggregate.

Bolton Wanderers were good value for their **2-1** lead following the **First Leg** of their **Second Round** tie. They determined approach work and the finishing of **Tony Philliskirk** proved too hot for **Watford** to handle.

Tony Philliskirk put Wanderers into the lead in the **thirty-second minute** with a left foot shot after an impressive build up. **Iwan Roberts** equalised for the **Vicarage Road Club** in the **sixtieth minute** with a header from a deep cross by **Nigel Gibbs**.

Tony Philliskirk restored the home teams lead with a header at the back post after a superb cross by **Phil Brown** in the **eighty-third minute** to give Bolton Wanderers a vital lead.

In the **Second Leg** tie at **Vicarage Road**, **Watford** squandered chances before taking the lead in the **forty-ninth minute** through **Iwan Roberts**. A micheel following a corner allowed **Paul Comstive** to equalise in the **sixty-seventh minute**. Bolton held out comfortably to earn a trip to the County Ground this evening.

Midfield - Liverpool born **Robbie Savage**, (28), is an aggressive player. He failed to make an appearance with Liverpool. Robbie made his debut on loan to Wrexham. Spells at Stoke City, A.F.C. Bournemouth and Bradford City preceded his move to Burnden Park in September 1987 for **£35,000**. Leeds born **Gary Henshaw**, (24), was signed from Grimsby Town in the summer of 1987. Gary spent most of last season on the transfer list at his own request. Gary scored in the 3-3 draw here at the County Ground. Former Everton midfielder player **Stuart Stoner**, (22), joined Wanderers in January 1988 for **£25,000**. Stuart commenced his career with Mansfield Town, he then moved to Birmingham City before moving to Goodison Park in a part exchange deal. He also had a loan spell with Wigan Athletic while he was with Everton. Watford found Steve to be a problem in their Littlewoods Cup tie recently.

Steve Thompson, (25), is the Clubs longest serving professional who was recently placed on the transfer list at his own request. Steve has made 243 League appearances for the Club after progressing through the Youth ranks. Local born **Julian Darby**, (21), joined Wanderers from school and is the only Bolton born player in the first team squad. Julian had the pleasure of scoring at Wembley against Torquay United last May. One of four goals put past former Town keeper Kenny Allen. He has now made 121 League appearances for Wanderers. Former Blackburn Rovers, Wigan Athletic, Wrexham and Burnley player **Paul Comstive**, (28), made his debut for Wanderers in the 2-1 win against Leton Orient on September 23rd at Burnden Park. Essentially a left footed player, Paul, has played for Blackburn Rovers, Wigan Athletic and Burnley before his recent move to Burnden Park.

The record attendance for a match at Burnden Park is 69,912 versus Manchester City in an F.A. Cup 5th round match on February 18th 1933.

Forwards - Sunderland born **Tony Philliskirk**, (24), the Wanderers target man, began his career with Sheffield United where he scored twenty League goals in eighty appearances. After a loan spell at Rotherham United he moved to Oldham Athletic in July 1988. After only three appearances for the Millmoor Club he moved to Oldham Athletic in July 1988 for **£50,000**. Tony joined Wanderers for a similar fee in the summer. A mainly left footed striker who scored from the penalty spot in last week's 1-1 draw. Tony was also on the mark in the 3-3 draw at the County Ground. **David Reeves**, (21), who is the quicker of the two Bolton front runners, was playing First Division soccer for Sheffield Wednesday last season. David, who joined Wanderers in July, made his League debut for Scunthorpe United in 1986. David joined Burnley on loan in November 1987 and actually scored against Bolton Wanderers in one match! Liverpool born **Mike Jeffrey**, (18), signed professional forms for the Burnden Park Club while he was still on Y.T.S. forms for the Club. Mike made his League debut against Wolverhampton Wanderers on March 4th 1989. Malta born **Ian Stevens**, (23), joined Wanderers from Preston North End. Ian joined the Burnden Park Club in 1987. Celebrated his twenty-third birthday last Saturday.

Welcome to BOLTON WANDERERS

THE SQUAD

Goalkeepers - Manager **Phil Neal** has two experienced goalkeepers at his disposal. **David Felgate**, (29), began his career with Bolton but made his debut on loan to Rochdale. David was later sold to Lincoln City, making 198 appearances for the Sincil Bank club before moving to Grimsby Town. He returned to Burnden Park in February 1987. **Kevin Rose**, (28), was signed from Hereford United for **£20,000** in the close season. Kevin began his career with Ledbury Town before joining Lincoln City for **£10,000**. He failed to make a League appearance at Sincil Bank. He made 249 consecutive appearances for the Edgar Street Club.

Phil Neal is the thirteenth Bolton Wanderers Manager since the Second World War.

Defenders - Former Halifax Town full back **Phil Brown**, (30), a player with enthusiasm, was signed for the Burnden Park Club in a **£17,000** transfer deal from Halifax Town in June 1988. Phil has made 217 League appearances for Hartlepool before joining Halifax Town for whom he made 135 League appearances. Phil like to join in the attack. Scored a stunning goal in the first replay. Former West Bromwich Albion's **Barry Cowdrill**, (31), has made the left back position his own since joining the Wanderers in July 1988. Barry made 112 League

appearances in his eight year spell at the Hawthorns. **Paul Hughes**, (20), has made 11 League appearances for Bolton Wanderers. Last season was a virtual write off through injury for the home grown full back. **Dean Crombie**, (31), whose previous Clubs include Lincoln City and Grimsby Town, scored his first goal for the Club in the Sherpa Van Trophy final at Wembley against Torquay United. A veteran of 421 League matches. **Mark Winstanley**, (21), is the mainstay of the defence and joined Wanderers from Winsford United in 1984. Mark has made 80 League appearances and collected the Clubs Player of the Year award last season. Another former Winsford United player at Burnden Park is Exeter born **Mark Came**, (28). Mark has made 146 League appearances but missed most of last season with a broken leg sustained in a Littlewoods Cup tie at Chester. He made his first appearance for over twelve months against York City in a Pontins League match on September 13th. Mark's equalising goals on the 24th of October began this amazing saga.

Nat Lofthouse, who is the current Executive Club Manager at Burnden Park, was capped 33 times by England. Nat also scored the most League goals in total aggregate for Bolton - 225 between 1946 and 1961.

BUNN HIT 'EM FOR SIX

When Frankie Bunn took the field for Oldham Athletic against Scarborough Town, the most goals he had ever scored in a first class game were two.

By the end of the evening he had not only bagged a double hat-trick, but had taken a place in the record books - displacing five-goal men Derek Reeves, Alan Wilks, Bob Latchford and Cyrille Regis - with the highest tally ever recorded in a Littlewoods Cup clash.

"It was undoubtedly the highlight of my career so far," says Frank who led the line at Luton and Hull City before his transfer to Oldham in December 1987.

Scarborough had disposed of Chelsea in the previous round so no one can have predicted their seven-goal defeat and Frankie's record-breaking six goal performance, least of all the Oldham striker who trailed striking partner Andy Ritchie in the Club's list of goalscorers prior to the game.

"Playing alongside Andy makes you appreciate how good a player he is," says Frank.

"He's a great finisher, skill-wise he's second to none, and it's surprising that he hasn't made it in the First Division," he adds in tribute to the former Manchester United and Leeds United target man.

Oldham are just starting to put together the sort of results which brought them so close to promotion three seasons ago and Frank doesn't rule out a similar push for the top flight this term.

But what about the prospect of another First Division Club on the doorstep of big brothers Manchester United and City?

"I think there's the public to support another top Club here," he says. "Of course that would mean taking up the plastic!"

SERVES 'EM RIGHT

With the 'Hornets' stuck in traffic, Club officials offered fans who wanted to leave a voucher for free admission for the next home games.

Mark Ward went on the transfer list at West Ham and promptly promised to give his all during his remaining time with the Upton Park Club. He's rated at around £1 million.

SIDELINED

Leicester City striker Wayne Clarke has been sidelined after undergoing an operation on an Achilles tendon injury.

ALL CHANGE

All change at Hull City where Don Robinson quite as Chairman and his replacement, Richard Chetham, promptly sacked Manager Colin Appleton under whose guidance the Club had not won for 25 matches. At the same time John Smart quit as Chairman of rock-bottom Hartlepool.

BORO PULL OUT

Middlesbrough pulled out of a deal to sign Aston Villa winger Nigel Callaghan for £500,000.

Boro Manager Bruce Rioch has cash to spend from the £2.3 million sale of Gary Pallister and spoke to Callaghan yesterday.

This will come as a great disappointment to Callaghan who is unsettled at Villa following rows with his Manager Graham Taylor.

Rioch is in the market for a striker and a defender.

Boro's Alan Comfort faces a six week lay-off with injury.

Now Second Division Pompey face action from the Football Association.

Poor Portsmouth goalkeeper Alan Knight, beaten 17 times in 10 home games this season, said last night: "It's been difficult enough plugging the leaks without them making the goal bigger."

"It's a bit embarrassing for the Club, but it has probably worked against us rather than in our favour."

Alter the Bar Please

Dangaard can normally stand under the bar and brush the underside with his fingertips.

"Instead, I was able to place the flat of my hand on the face of the crossbar," he explained.

"I asked the Portsmouth officials to alter the height of the bar, which to their credit, they did."

"I didn't want to end up in the awkward position of having to explain that the bar was too low to the Czech team officials."

Portsmouth general manager Ray Stainton admitted last night: "The height of the bars had not been altered since the start of the season. If they were that far out, I'm sure someone would have noticed."

An F.A. spokesman said: "It is likely we will be writing to Portsmouth to ask them for their observations." The F.A.'s law 1 (vi) on pitch measurements states that the 'lower edge of the crossbar shall be eight feet from the ground'.

Delayed

Times are certainly troubled for south coast clubs called to international duty.

Brighton staged the England B match against Italy last Tuesday night and 2,000 angry fans were locked out.

The Goldstone Ground switchboard was besieged with angry caller demanding to know why only 16,125 fans were allowed in when the capacity was 18,493.

The kick-off was delayed for 10 minutes to allow for latecomers, but Sussex police decided to exclude the unhappy 2,000 because they feared for the safety of those inside.

Brighton told callers the decision was made by the police and had nothing to do with them.

Supt. Gordon Fung, on attachment from the Hong Kong police and in charge of the operation, said kick-off could not be delayed any more.

"If we had let in all those people there could have been a surge and that would have created problems on the over-crowded terraces," he said. "We had to order the gates to be closed."

'COBBLERS' NAIL THE TOWN!

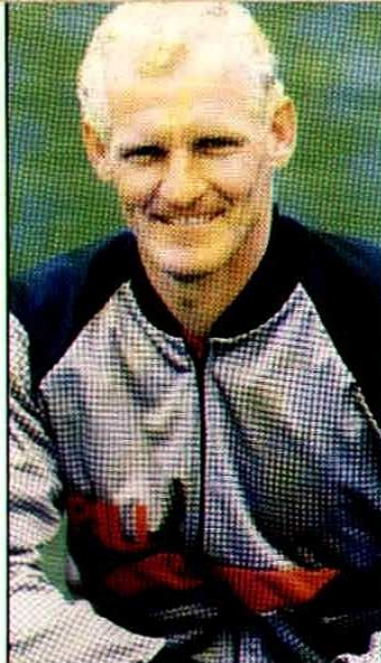
Our South East Counties Youth League team were defeated 3-2 by Northampton Town on Saturday November 4th at Lydiard Park.

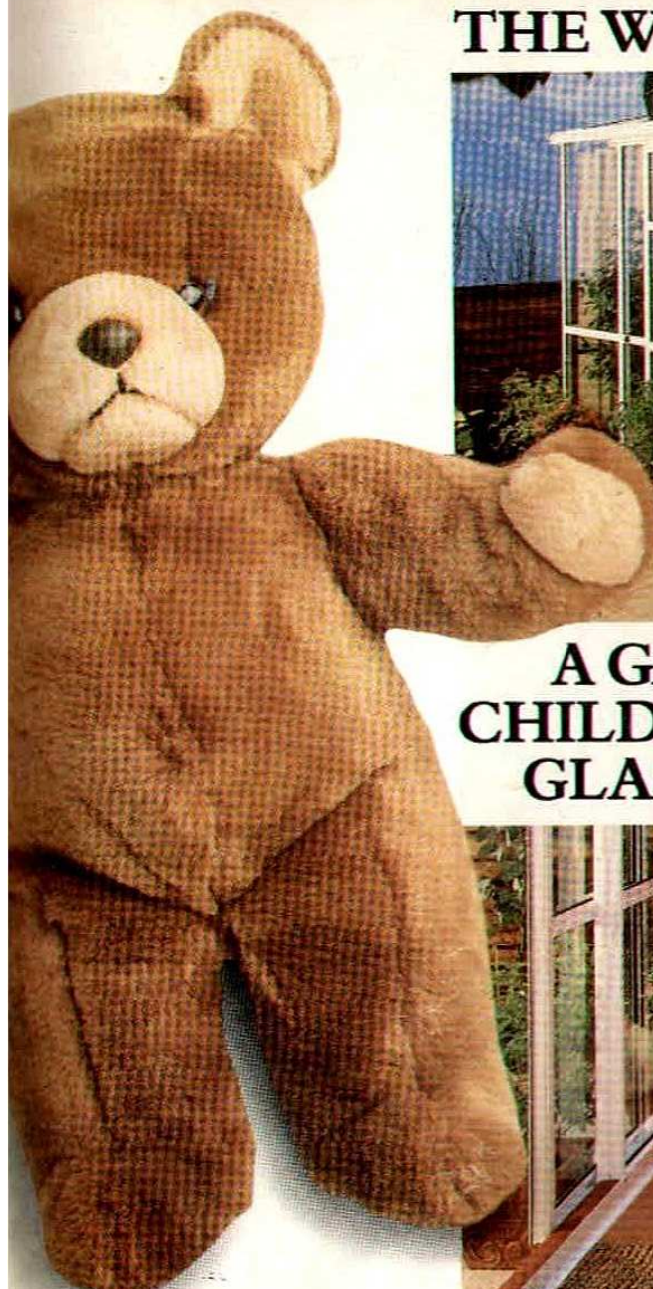
