PHIL FINALLY JOINS THE 'OWLS'

Phil King was an interested spectator at our recent home match with Portsmouth and anxious that his transfer to Sheffield Wednesday would be complete within the following days.

Phil, who joined the Hillsborough Club on a months loan initially, was nearing the completion of his loan period at that time.

The deal was completed two days following the Portsmouth match and the £400,000 deal saw the Town transfer a player that originally cost just £17,500. Of course, with Torquay United able to claim a third of the fee due to an insertion in the original contract between the Town and Torquay United, the fee was less.

There are safeguards in the transfer deal between the Town and the Yorkshire Club which will see Swindon Town collect a further £50,000 if, and when, Bristol born, Phil, makes 50 first team appearances and a further clause which will net the Town £100,000 if the popular full back is capped by England.

Phil was waxing lyrical about the 'Owls' on his return to the Club. "Everything is so much bigger, we play mostly five-a-sides in training and the pitch is like a bowling green. Overall it was a perfect move." Phil and his family are in the process of vacating their Swindon home at Freshbrook and moving to Sheffield.





OUR HISTORIAN LOOKS BACK AT SOME PREVIOUS MEETINGS BETWEEN SWINDON TOWN AND TODAY'S OPPONENTS

Today is the 12th Football League encounter between Swindon Town and Sheffield United and one which gives the Town the opportunity not only to redress the balance following the September defeat at Bramall Lane, but to maintain their 100% home League record against the 'Blades'.

The 2-0 setback, when Bob Booker and Brian Deane scored second-half goals, was the fifth successive reverse in six trips to the Sheffield ground. The one victory achieved there came from the first visit, back in 1969/ 70.

DISPUTED

On a wet Monday night in February most of the 22,711 were stunned into silence when Swindon's left back, John Trollope, gave the visitors the lead a goal that United keeper Alan Hogkinson bitterly disputed.

claiming the ball had gone in through the side netting. Home full back Len Badger also got into the scoring act but the Town's leading marksman, Arthur Horsfield, hit his 17th goal of the season to bring two valuable points back to Wiltshire.

The County Ground clash, in the October, had also brought a win for Swindon, Peter Noble was successful after 'twenty minutes and Don Rogers added another twenty minutes from the end. Alan Woodward, like Rogers a winger of exceptional pace, pulled a goal back for United on full time.

TEN MAN TOWN

The 'Blades' next visit to Swindon, on the Saturday before Christmas 1970, saw them arrive as the Second Division's top scoring side -Gil Reece quickly showed only four minutes. Unfortunately for United, he beat his own keeper! The Town then lost little midfielder Tony Gough with only fifteen minutes gone and, on the halfhour, battling centre half Frank Burrows limped off. With only one substitute in those days, Swindon were thus down to ten men with an hour still to play.

A Rogers penalty on 68 minutes and a third goal from Horsfield, with three minutes left, saw the Town home safely - to a third 3-0 win in four games. United could take comfort in the fact that one of those victories was against Brian Williams put the Town in their closest rivals, Wednesday, and that they would survive to finish runners-up to Rowland struck twice again to Leicester City and go on to a complete his hat-trick. Tony five-year stint in the First Kenworth also succeeded with Division.

United faced their first-ever Bob Hatton was the other scorer game in Division Three, at as Swindon finished 5-2 winners.

Bramall Lane on August 18 1979. Swindon took a first half lead through Alan Mayes, but United equalised when Ian Benjamin, in his third League appearance, scored his third goal - and third penalty! Dougie Brown gave the 'Blades' a 2-1 verdict.


LEADERS TOPPLED

Following a run of nine wins in eleven games, United came to the County Ground as League leadets in the first week of November, but they found themselves two goals down by the interval. Centre half Billy Tucker made the first goal for Andy Rowland, following a corner, and then notched the second himself, also from a flag kick. The men from Sheffield hit back with goals from Mick Speight and John MacPhail but a second from Rowland proved why when he netted after a winner. United were toppled from top spot and Swindon moved up to fourth place.

> The Town's televised visit to Bramall Lane on September 6 1980 highlighted their abysmal start to the season. It was certainly no 'Match of the Day' as Swindon stumbled to a fifth successive League defeat from five starts.

By the time the two sides met again, in February, the Town had won nine out of 30 League games, but saved their best win of the season for the 'Blades' visits. Ian Miller put Swindon ahead in the 22nd minute and Andy Rowland grabbed a second within three minutes. a commanding 3-0 win with a penalty just before the break a spot-kick - as he had done in The Clubs met again when the September encounter - and




Reflecting back to cup matches, how easy it is to be satisfied with a draw in these competitions. In comparison, a League match would mean that we have lost two points!



PAUL PLOWMAN LOOKS BACK AT THE CAREERS OF SOME OF THOSE WHO HAVE SERVED BOTH SWINDON TOWN AND TODAY'S OPPONENTS

In the 1920's, Herbert Chapman was a Manager without parallel. But as a player, his career had encompassed a rapid succession of Clubs in ten years of mediocrity. Swindon and Sheffield United were just two of those Clubs.

In more recent times, the first signing from United after the War came in January 1957, in the shape of winghalf Jack Fountain. In seven years at Bramall Lane, Jack made only 13 League appearances. He stayed at the County Ground until 1960 before returning north to York City Sadly, he was caught up in the 'bribes' case of 1965

In January 1966, Swindon signed Brian Richardson, also a wing-half Brian had completed 300 League appearances for the Blades since making his debut at Christmas 1955. He was to stay just six months before a final season at Rochdale

David Munks came to the County Ground via Portsmouth Sheffieldborn, David was an apprentice at Bramall Lane and signed professional forms in August 1964. He left for Fratton Park in May 1969, and stayed there until the Town signed him in December 1973. David made just 21 League appearances in twelve months at Swindon, before joining Exeter on loan. His transfer to the Devonshire Club was completed in March 1975.

BROTHERS AT NEWCASTLE

Geordie Chris Guthrie, who cost United £100,000 from Southend in May 1975, came to the County Ground for a quarter of that fee two years later. Chris had begun his career with his home-town team, where his brother 'was a full back, but had departed with only three League appearances to his name. With South end he found his scoring boots but was soon tempted away by the kind of offer that a Third Division side cannot refuse

Chris hit 14 League and Cup goals for Swindon in 1977/78, but after a change in management found himself 'out in the cold' after just six games in the following autumn. He had spells in London with Fulham and Millwall before injury put paid to his League career. Chris went to Holland but is now back at Newcastle. on the 'backroom' staff.


Ulsterman Peter Dornan had a somewhat shorter stay in League football In December 1976, during Chris another. Glenn's move to Bramall stitute before going home again on New Year's Eve. Peter made a secondattempt in February 1979, when he came to Swindon. But it was not to be and following one appearance as twelfth man, at Peterborough on April 24, he returned to Linfield once

Another ex-Blade to make just a single appearance for the Town was goalkeeper Tom McAlister Tom, who completed his apprenticeship at Bramall Lane in May 1970, was everpresent for United in the First Division in the Second, prompting Lou Macari in 1972/73 and eventually signed for to bring him to Swindon in June 1987.

Guthrie's stay at Bramall Lane, Peter Lane in March 1984 was the second came over from Linfield. Swindon Town took him from Sincil Bank in December 1979, but his stay at the County Ground lasted only eighteen months. 





It's Sunday soccer at the County Ground in Swindon It was 2-2 exactly a fortnight ago against Portsmouth.

Over the same weekend top-ofthe-table Sheffield United, the only unbeaten Club of 1989 away from home, lost that record two-nil at Newcastle. The lowest attended game of the day, 5,715, saw Barnsley come from behind to beat Hull 2-1, thanks to two goals in eight minutes. The home side still hasn't won on their own patch during the current campaign.

Frank Yallop's own goal put Oldham Athletic in front at Ipswich Town. The Suffolk side equalised within five minutes. Final score 1-1.

Bernie Slaven took his personal tally for the season to 13 with the only goal at Ayresome Park, where Middlesbrough overcame Oxford United.

Marco Cabbiadini has also scored an unlucky number for some. He was on target again in Sunderland's 2-1 away win at Brighton and Hove Albion.

Robbie Earle netted two goals in Port Vale's 3-2 home win over Bradford City.

Paul Cook scored his first-ever for Wolverhampton Wanderers as they avenged their opening-day beating by Middlesbrough in the 2-0 triumph at Molineux. Watford recorded their first away success of the current campaign at Portsmouth, 2-1.


