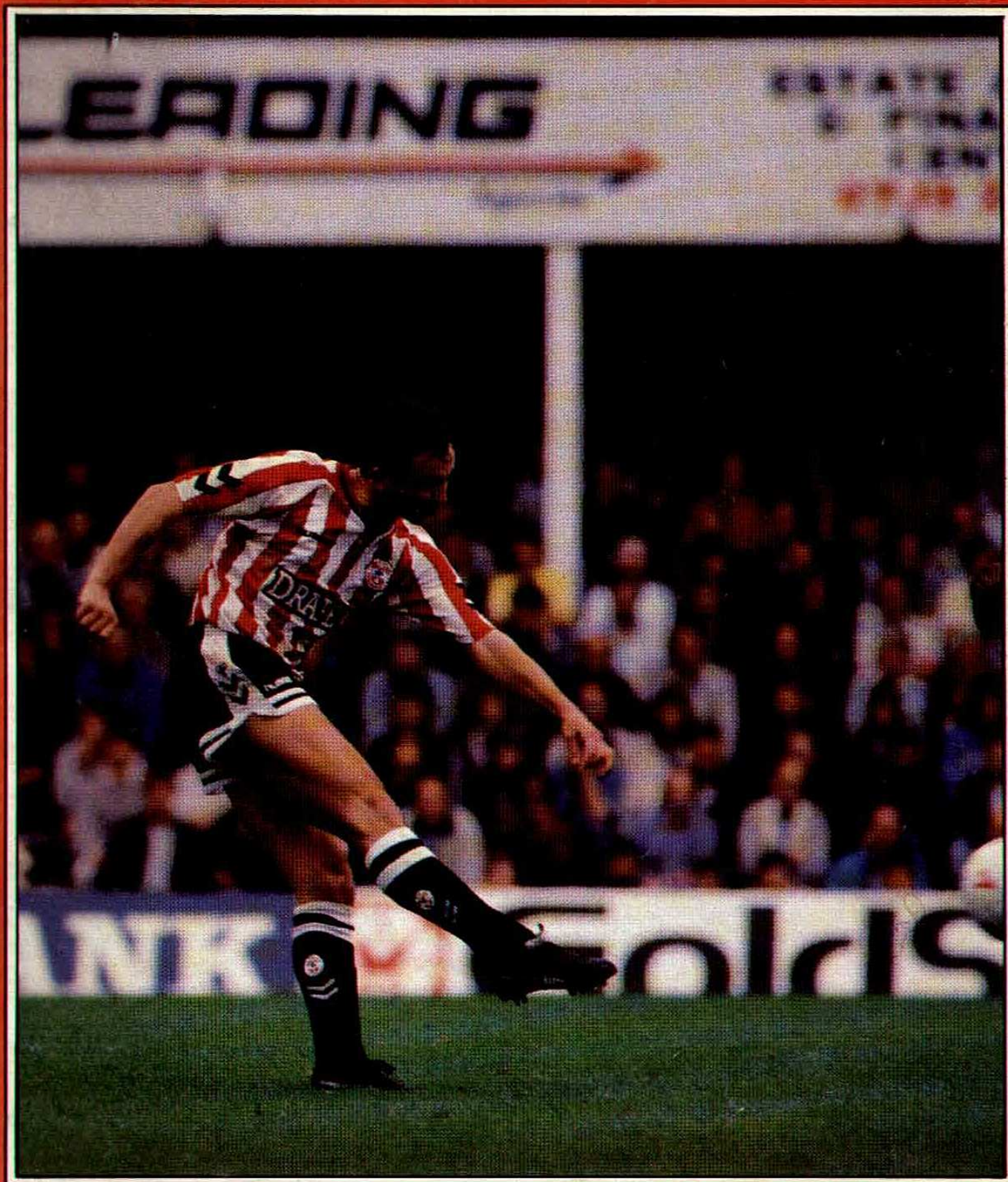

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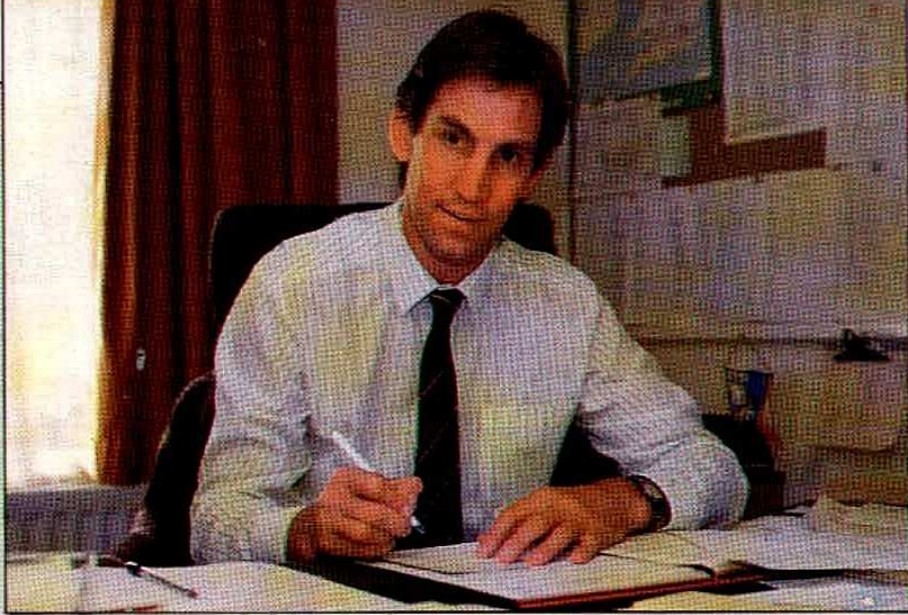

Swindon Town have created such a great tradition in Cup football that they have by no means given up hope of making further progress in this season's Littlewoods Cup — even though they were held to a goalless draw by the Saints in the first meeting of this fourth round tie at the County Ground.

The club is now among the leading sides in the Second Division but their Cup battling exploits go back to their old Southern League days — they twice appeared in the F.A. Cup semi-finals as a non-League club — and reached their peak in 1969 when, as a Third Division club, they defeated Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley in the final of this Littlewoods Cup competition. In those days it was known as the League Cup.

There have been many other nights of Cup glory since then for Swindon so no one takes anything for granted when playing them, particularly at such an advanced stage of a competition.

But it is not only in Cup football that Swindon have ambitions. They have made the First Division their goal — and they so nearly made it in May this year when they qualified for the play-offs, only to lose in the semi-final.

Yet it's little more than three years since Swindon were playing in the Fourth Division. They won the Championship of that section in 1986 with a League record number of 102 points. Twelve months later they won the Third Division promotion play-offs to move into Division Two, then last May they nearly made it to the top.

Lou Macari, the manager who brought about that remarkable recovery, moved on to a new challenge at West Ham in the summer and he has been succeeded by Ossie Ardiles, the Argentinian international who enjoyed ten great seasons with Spurs.

TONIGHT'S VISITORS AT THE DELL

SWINDON TOWN

Swindon's Littlewoods Cup challenge this season has developed into a marathon affair. A first-leg victory at Shrewsbury (3-0) set the way for a 6-1 aggregate victory in the second round but they were then involved in four tough games with Third Division Bolton in round three before finally winning 2-1 after extra-time at the County Ground.

Their 0-0 draw with the Saints has involved them in yet another replay so this will be their eighth game in this season's tournament.

The Swindon side will probably be selected from:

FRASER DIGBY

(Goalkeeper) Fraser played for the England youth side during his apprenticeship days with Manchester United. He did not play in United's first-team but made his debut soon after moving to Swindon in 1986. Fraser won his fifth England under-21 cap against Poland in October.

DAVID HOCKADAY

(Defender/Midfield) David emerged as a League footballer with Blackpool in 1977. He played more than 150 senior games for the Tangerines before transferring to Swindon in 1983. He celebrated his 200th League game for Swindon last season.

COLIN CALDERWOOD

(Midfield/Defender) Versatile Colin has played in several positions. He started as a defender in his Mansfield days but, since his transfer to Swindon in 1985, he has often filled a midfield role.

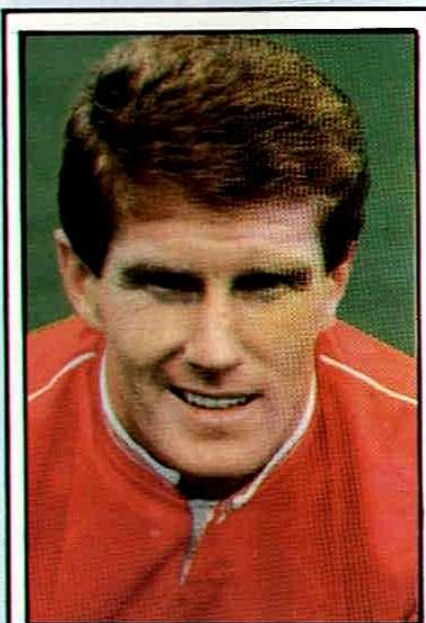
JON GITTENS

(Defender) Jon was given his break in top-class football by the Saints. We spotted him playing for Paget Rangers and he made his First Division debut for the

Saints in 1986. Swindon signed him for £40,000 in 1987.

PAUL BODIN

(Midfield/Defender) Paul didn't initially make the League teams with his first two clubs, Chelsea and Newport, but got his chance in 1982 after linking with Cardiff. He spent three seasons at Ninian Park, then went non-League with Bath City. He returned to Newport in 1987 but, after a few weeks, he was transferred to Swindon.



DUNCAN SHEARER

(Forward) Duncan scored in each of Swindon's opening four games in this season's Littlewoods Cup and is joint-top scorer with four goals in this tournament. He was signed from Huddersfield for £250,000 in 1988 and last season he was Swindon's leading scorer with 16 goals. He began his career with Chelsea, where first-team opportunities were rare, but after transferring to Huddersfield in 1986 he quickly established himself as a goalscorer, leading the club's list in his two seasons with 25 and 16.

STEVE FOLEY

(Midfield) Steve completed his apprenticeship with Liverpool but did not play in their first-team. He made his League debut whilst on loan to Fulham during 1983/84 and was transferred to Grimsby at the end of that campaign. Sheffield United signed him in 1985 and he moved on to Swindon in the summer of 1987.



ALAN McLOUGHLIN

(Midfield) apprentice with Manchester United but it was after he had moved on to Swindon in 1986 that he made his debut in League football. He also spent a loan period with Torquay before earning himself a regular place in the Swindon side.

ROSS MacLAREN

(Midfield) Ross was a reserve player with Glasgow Rangers but he established himself in League soccer after joining Shrewsbury in 1980. Derby signed him for £67,500 in 1985 and Swindon paid £150,000 for him three years later.

TOM JONES (Midfield)

Tom joined Swindon from Aberdeen last season. He was previously in non-League soccer with Weymouth, moving to Aberdeen in 1987.

FITZROY SIMPSON

(Midfield) Fitzroy joined Swindon as a trainee and he got his chance in their League team last season.

JOHN CORNWELL

(Midfield) John developed in the junior sides at Leyton Orient, graduating to first-team duty in 1982. He made well over 200 senior appearances for the Os before joining Newcastle for £50,000 in 1987. Swindon signed him last season.

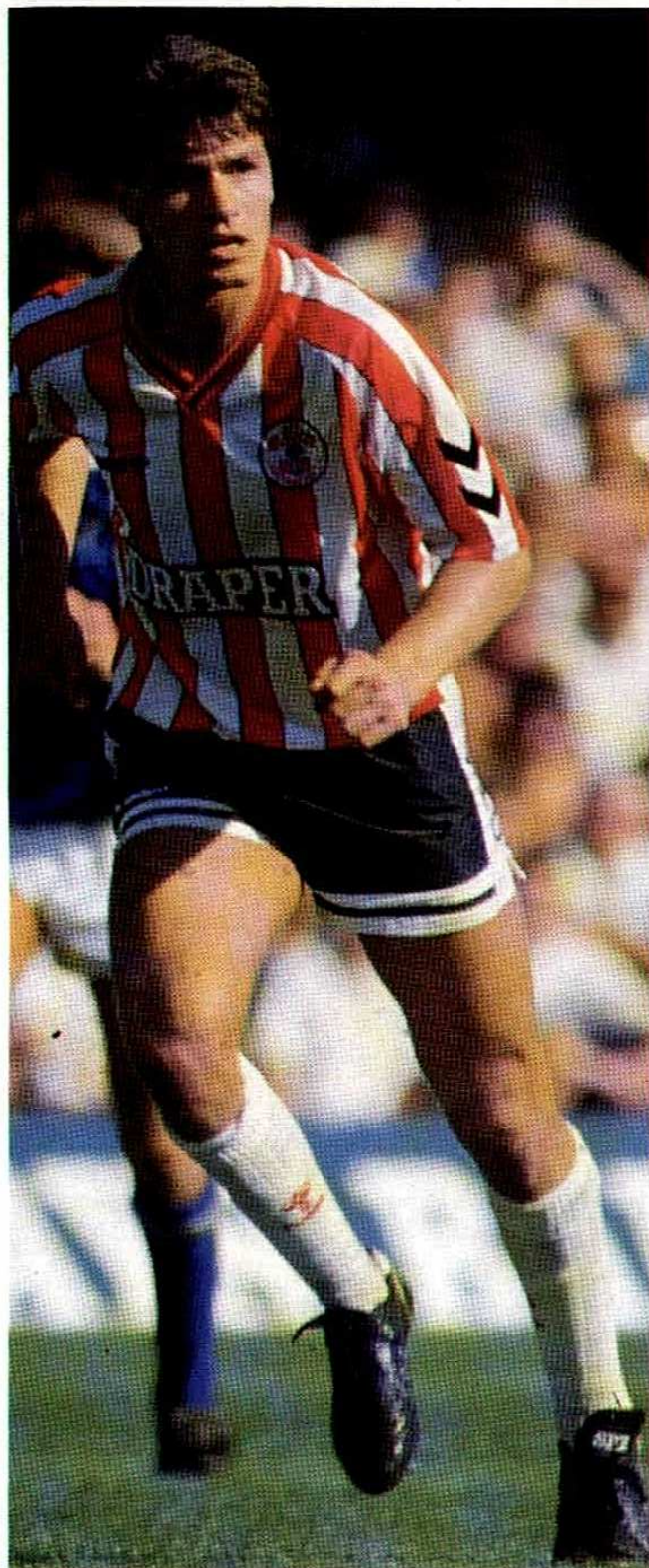
STEVE WHITE

(Forward) Steve also has four Littlewoods Cup goals to his credit. Steve made his name as a goalscorer with Bristol Rovers and Luton paid £175,000 for him in 1979. He moved on to Charlton three years later but returned to Bristol Rovers in 1983. Since joining Swindon in 1986, Steve's annual goals tally has been 21, 14 and 14.

SHAUN CLOSE

(Forward) Shaun was signed from Bournemouth in September. He opened his professional career with Tottenham but found first-team opportunities rare at White Hart Lane. Bournemouth signed him two seasons ago and it was at Dean Court that he established himself in League soccer.

Ask Paul Rideout, Glenn Cockerill and Tim Flowers who they want to win this evening's replay and they will leave you in no doubt that it must be the Saints!

All three are former Swindon players whilst the Swindon line-up will probably include Jon Gittens who started his professional career with the Saints.

Paul, in particular, has a special attachment for Swindon as it was the Wiltshire club that gave him his big break in football.

"But, when it comes to a match like tonight's, every professional gives 100 per cent, and more, to his current club," says Paul. "Of course, we follow the results of our old clubs with interest but there will never be any question of mixed loyalties when we go out to the job this evening."

That's the attitude of all professional footballers, of course. So, though Paul was on two occasions Swindon's top scorer, and scored 31 goals for them in just over two years as a first-teamer, he will be desperately keen to add to his Saints' tally this evening.

After making a big impression with Swindon, Paul had the chance to join Liverpool. But he weighed up the situation carefully and realised that he would have found himself in competition with Ian Rush and Kenny Dalglish at Anfield.

Aston Villa had also shown an interest in him so he felt he would have a better chance of making a First Division career with them. His £200,000 transfer was completed during the 1983 close-season.

Paul became a top scorer with Villa, too, and also played for the England under-21s on six occasions before going to Italy to join Bari in 1985.

Paul joined the Saints during the 1988 close-season.

GLENN DIDN'T SETTLE

Glenn made his name as a goalscoring midfield player with Lincoln City and Swindon paid £110,000 for him in 1979. But he didn't really settle at the County Ground. Over 18 months he made only 26 League appearances so he decided to return to Lincoln.

In 1984 he was transferred to Sheffield United but he has enjoyed the most successful period of his career since coming to The Dell in 1985.

TIM ANSWERS A CRISIS

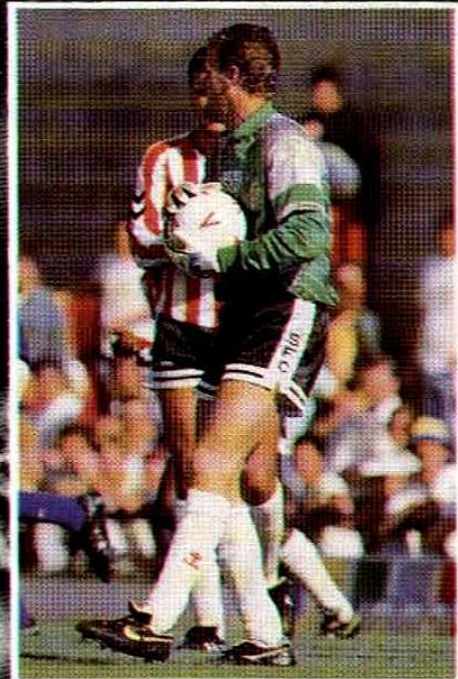
Tim was not a Swindon player in the fullest sense. "I went to Swindon on loan in March 1987 when they had a goalkeeping crisis," said Tim. "They had no fit goalkeeper of experience and I only played two games for them."

Tim enjoyed two seasons in the Wolves' side before coming to The Dell in 1986 and it was during the period when he was in our reserve team that he made his brief appearances for Swindon.

JON SPOTTED BY SAINTS

Jon Gittens was spotted by a Saints' scout when he was playing for Paget Rovers and he made his League debut for the Saints at Birmingham in April 1986. He played three more games that season and enjoyed a longer run the following season.

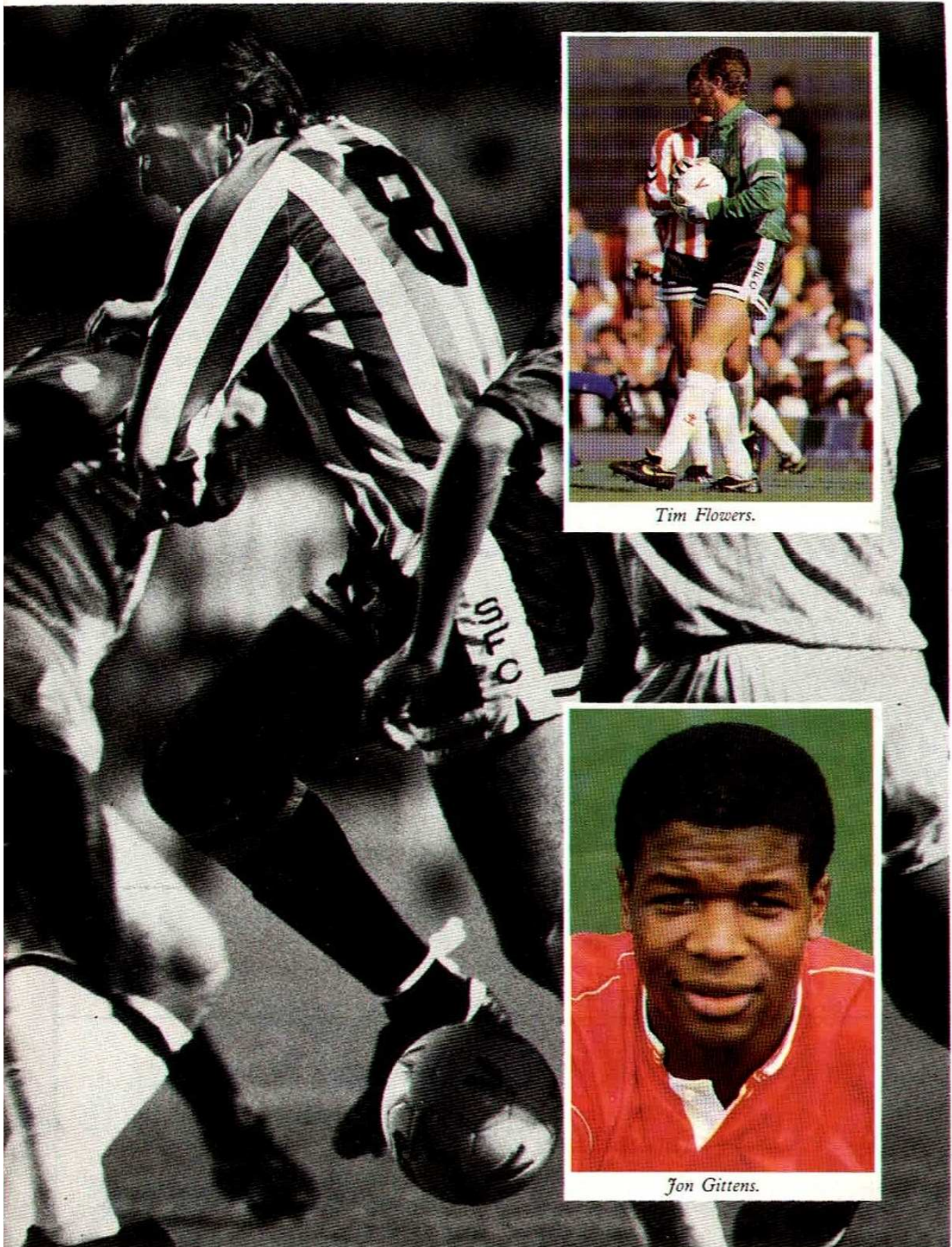
He was transferred to Swindon during the summer of 1987 and has since been holding a place in their first-team.

NOW IT'S ANYONE'S CUP!

Arsenal are out. Liverpool have gone. Everton, Aston Villa and Norwich have all been beaten. And with another of the favourites due to bite the dust in the next round, when Nottingham Forest face Spurs, all the survivors in this season's Littlewoods Cup must stand a chance of winning it.

When Arsenal defeated Liverpool 1-0 at Highbury in the third round they automatically took on the mantle of favourites. But they had the misfortune to be drawn away to Oldham on their plastic pitch. The Gunners were well beaten by 3-1.

It has been an extraordinary season for Second Division Oldham. They are well up among the promotion chasers in Division Two and, in the second round of the Littlewoods Cup, they won both legs against high flying Leeds by 2-1.

Next came that extraordinary 7-0 victory over a Scarborough side that had eliminated Chelsea in the previous round. It was in that match that the competition record, originally established by the Saints' Derek Reeves in 1960, was finally smashed.

Derek scored all the goals in our 5-4 victory over Leeds in the League Cup, as it was then known, in 1960. Alan Wilkes (Q.P.R.), Bob Latchford (Everton) and Cyrille Regis (Coventry) later equalled that achievement but Oldham's Frankie Bunn scored five times against Scarborough in the first-half!

It was not until the closing moments that he grabbed his record breaking sixth goal. "I had no idea I was about to achieve a record," he admitted at the end. "But this is something I shall certainly never forget."

The winners of tonight's replay at The Dell will be at home to Oldham in the next round. The big relief is that whoever wins will have ground advantage. No one fancies meeting Oldham on their artificial pitch where, until early December, they were still unbeaten.

There was no doubting Oldham's superiority against Arsenal. Andy Ritchie, who has scored in each of the Latics' four Littlewoods Cup games to date, got two against the Gunners. Nick Henry got their other goal.

Derby County and Coventry are two of the dark horses still in the tournament. Derby had an early

shot, when losing away to Fourth Division Cambridge, but in the end they won that by 6-2 on aggregate. They then eliminated Sheffield Wednesday 2-1 at the Baseball Ground. In the last round the Rams ousted Second Division W.B.A. by 2-0.

Now they have to travel to West Ham where they were hammered 0-5 in the same competition last season. But England and former Saints' keeper Peter Shilton is unlikely to be caught out like that a second time. Since the sides met last season, West Ham have been relegated to the Second Division and, even though Derby have to travel, they will be fancied to go into the semi-finals.

Yet West Ham may not be easy to eliminate. The Hammers have a wonderful tradition in Cup football and only last season they knocked out Derby (5-0), Liverpool (4-1) and Aston Villa (2-1) before being well beaten 0-5 on aggregate by Luton in the semi-finals.

This season the Hammers have beaten Birmingham (3-2 on aggregate), Aston Villa (1-0) and Wimbledon (1-0).

TONY PULLEIN

Coventry was another side that so nearly suffered an early humiliation. They were beaten 1-3 away to Fourth Division Grimsby in their opening tie but they recovered to win the return 3-0. Since then the Sky Blues have recorded impressive away wins at Q.P.R. (2-1) and Manchester City (1-0).

Now Coventry have to travel yet again but they should overcome either Exeter or Sunderland and move into the last four.

Tottenham have shown winning qualities in earlier rounds after almost falling to Fourth Division Southend at the first hurdle. In the end Spurs lost the away leg but won the tie on the away-goals-double rule.

In direct contrast, they strolled to an amazing 3-0 victory at Manchester United in the next round. Then came another scare, as they were held away to Tranmere (2-2), before they won that replay 4-0.

Terry Venables' side has a tough task away to Nottingham Forest, the trophy holders. Brian Clough's team has been, frankly, disappointing in the First Division and they, too, had a few problems at the first stage against Third Division Huddersfield.

They drew 4-4 on aggregate, the away-goals-double rule coming to their aid on that occasion. After being held to a goalless draw at Crystal Palace, they won the home replay 5-0 and then eliminated Everton with a late goal from Lee Chapman in the last round.

There were one or two surprises in earlier rounds. Scarborough, who gave the Saints a few thoughtful moments in the third round of last season's competition, produced one of the shock results of this season's two-legged second round ties.

After drawing 1-1 with Chelsea at Stamford Bridge, Scarborough found themselves 0-2 down in the return game with only half-an-hour to play. Tommy Graham then scored to give them hope and David Robinson grabbed another to make the aggre-

gate score 3-3. If the score had remained like that, Chelsea would still have won on the away-goals-double rule. But, before that rule could be applied, record signing Martin Russell scored Scarborough's winner. Russell was signed from Leicester for £100,000 last season.

Fourth Division Exeter City ousted Blackburn Rovers, one of the Second Division's most successful clubs — but their success was really down to an injury to former Saints' goalkeeper Terry Gennoe.

Terry was a member of the Saints' team which lost to Nottingham Forest in the 1979 final at Wembley but he was injured and went off after only ten minutes of the first-leg at Exeter. The Fourth Division side took full advantage to open out a 3-0 lead. Though Blackburn won their home game 2-1 it was not quite good enough so it was Exeter who went through to a home third round tie against Third Division Blackpool, which they won 3-0.

Exeter seemed certain to have pulled off another surprise when they led Sunderland by 2-0 with only a quarter-of-an-hour to play in round

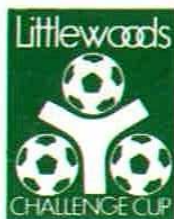


Alan Shearer scorer of our two goals at home to York.

four. But they then lost their concentration, enabling Sunderland to score two late goals and snatch a replay.

Tranmere Rovers, who won promotion from the Fourth Division last season and who are now one of the

pacemakers in Division Three, won both legs against fancied Second Division Ipswich Town. Tranmere then defeated First Division Millwall 3-2 and, at one time, led Spurs by 2-1 in the fourth round.

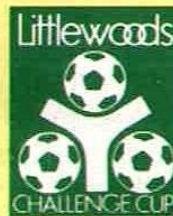

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SAINTS' FINE CUP RECORD AGAINST SWINDON

Swindon have yet to score a goal against the Saints in Cup football. Our recent goalless draw at the County Ground in the Littlewoods Cup was our fourth meeting in Cup soccer.

We were first drawn together in the fifth round of the F.A. Cup in February 1948. Goals from Charlie Wayman and George Curtis, plus an own-goal by a Swindon defender, gave us a 3-0 success at The Dell.

The two clubs then avoided each other in knockout football until we came face to face at The Dell in the second round of the Littlewoods Cup in September 1986. This was a two-legged tie and two goals from George Lawrence, plus another from Joe Jordan, built a 3-0 advantage to take to the County Ground.

The Saints took a real battering in the return game that evening and, if it had not been for a superb display by Peter Shilton, Swindon might well have pulled back the three goals. As it was we held out to keep another clean sheet.

Swindon have won only once at The Dell in League and Cup soccer. That was in October 1957 when they won 3-1 here in the Third Division (South).

Our best performances against them were 5-1 victories here at The Dell. Derek Reeves scored four times, Terry Paine getting the other, as the Saints ran up a 5-1 success here in October 1959. The Saints won the Third Division Championship that season and it was not until 1963/64 that we came into contact for the first time at Second Division level.

The Saints were in frivolous mood when Swindon came to The Dell in April 1964. We had recently thrashed Derby 6-4 here and, in our previous two games, we had won away to Cardiff 4-2 and Bury 5-1.

Martin Chivers completed a hat-trick against Swindon that day. George O'Brien and Terry Paine also scored in another 5-1 victory.

Going back down the years, the two clubs met on many occasions in the Southern League before both became founder members of the Football League's Third Division (South) in 1920. Swindon provided the opposition for our second Football League match — the first ever to be staged at The Dell.

We celebrated in style with goals from Arthur Dominey (2), Josiah Barratt and Gill Rawlings in a 4-0 win.

The first time we met in competitive football was in the Southern League in February 1895. We won 3-2 at the Swindon and a month later we ran up a 7-1 win at The Dell.

OSSIE ARDILES CHANGES THE STYLE AT SWINDON

Ossie Ardiles is currently experiencing his first taste of soccer management, following an apprenticeship period as coach to Q.P.R. last season. In the summer he succeeded Lou Macari as manager of Swindon Town.



English fans will always remember him as the player who brought a new dimension to English football following his transfer to Tottenham in 1978. Ossie had just helped Argentina to win the World Cup final and Spurs' manager Keith Burkinshaw pulled off a real coup when he persuaded him, and his colleague Ricky Villa, to sign for Spurs.

Ossie's ten-year spell with Spurs was broken only by a brief loan spell with Paris St Germain in 1982.

He was instrumental in helping Spurs to win the F.A. Cup in 1981 and the UEFA Cup three years later. His magical ball skills, and precision passing, became hallmarks of his game.

And who will ever forget those delightful radio interviews with Ossie bubbling away in his fractured English at such speed that ensured no one could ever understand a word he was saying!

Towards the end of his decade at White Hart Lane, Ossie spent a loan period with Blackburn Rovers.

In 1988 he was transferred to Q.P.R. where he played occasionally but where he was considered of greater value passing on his extensive knowledge to the young players. That experience prepared him for the time when he would become a manager in his own right.

That happened in the summer when Swindon invited him to join them.

He was officially appointed player-manager but, after appearing as substitute in their opening two matches of this season, he has generally concentrated purely upon the managerial side of his job. He quickly realised that he needed to change Swindon's style and he could best do this by taking a long look at his team from the sidelines.

In recent years, Swindon had been renowned for their long-ball game but Ossie Ardiles, a purist in his playing days, has quietly changed their style of play. This evening we are likely to see Ossie Ardiles' team working the ball around a bit, creating chances for their strikers Duncan Shearer and Steve White who are now two of the leading scorers in this season's Littlewoods Cup competition.

GOAL POWER IN THE LITTLEWOODS CUP

Swindon tend to lull their Cup opponents into a false sense of security and then pounce strongly shortly before the interval. Most of their Littlewoods Cup goals have come during this period, though they also score well during the second-half.

DID YOU KNOW...

Swindon's most-capped footballer was Rod Thomas who collected 30 of his 50 Wales' caps as a Swindon player.

The last Swindon player to score a hat-trick was Jimmy Quinn who hit three against both Bristol City and Portsmouth in the Littlewoods Cup two seasons ago.

The last Swindon man to get three in a League game was Steve White who scored all the goals in a 3-0 win over Mansfield in April 1987.

Harry Morris scored five goals in a League game on two occasions for Swindon, against Q.P.R. in 1927 and Norwich in 1930.

Keith East equalled that club record when he scored five times against Mansfield in 1965.

Harry Morris also holds the club record for most goals in a season. He netted 47 in the League and one in the F.A. Cup in 1926-27.

A third club scoring record belonging to Morris is the aggregate of 230 in League and Cup between 1926 and 1933.

John Trollope created a League record by appearing in 756 League games for Swindon. No other player has made as many appearances for one club.

Trollope was also the oldest player to appear in the Swindon first-team, being 37 years and 119 days old when he made his final appearance in 1980.

Swindon's biggest League win was by 9-1 against Luton in the Third Division (South) in 1921.

Their club record win was by 10-1 against Farnham United in the F.A. Cup in 1925.

Swindon have only on one occasion conceded 10 goals in a game, when losing 1-10 to Manchester City in the F.A. Cup in 1930.

That club record was equalled when they went down 0-9 to Torquay in a Third Division (South) game in 1952.

Swindon were elected to the League in 1920 when they became a founder member of the Third Division (South).



Paul Rideout was Swindon's youngest player. He was 16 years and 107 days of age when he made his debut in 1980.

Their best achievement in League soccer was in finishing fifth in Division Two in 1970.

Swindon achieved an all-time League record when they collected 102 points in the Fourth Division in 1985/86.

The record attendance at the County Ground was 32,000 for an F.A. Cup tie against Arsenal in 1972.

Their best crowd last season was 18,677 for the visit of West Ham in the fourth round of the F.A. Cup.

Swindon were one of only two Third Division clubs to win the League Cup (now the Littlewoods Cup). They defeated Arsenal 3-1 in the 1969 final.
