

OUR HISTORIAN LOOKS BACK AT THE PREVIOUS MEETINGS BETWEEN SWINDON TOWN AND TODAY'S OPPONENTS

Today is only the eighth League meeting between Swindon Town and West Bromwich Albion.

Don't be surprised if one of the side finishes a man short at twenty minutes to five, as in three of the seven previous encounters a player has been dismissed!

EARLY BATH

The first candidate for the early bath was Albion's Scottish International winger Willie Johnston, following a clash with Swindon's Republic of Ireland International Ray Treacy (see separate feature) in the opening meeting at the County Ground on September 8th 1973.

Johnston's teammate David Shaw provided the Town with the match winner that afternoon when, under no pressure, he sent a glorious header from a

left-wing corner into the roof of within a minute of coming on, his own net!

That win gave Swindon five points out of six and second place in the table - but a disastrous period followed and only two more victories had been gained by the time the clubs met again on December

That day ended with another reverse for the Town as the Albion triumphed by two goals to nil, one in each half. Alan Merrick scored his first League goal for the club, on his 101st appearance and Johnston must have gained some satisfaction from adding the second.

The new year of 1974 proved no better for struggling Swindon. with only three wins in eighteen games, culminating in relegation. It was to be fourteen years before the clubs would meet again.

KELLY AND KELLY

Another Albion man, Tony Kelly, was the next to incur the wrath of the referee, in August 1987. Only 24 minutes had elapsed when he departed. His namesake, John, opened the scoring for the visitors with only three minutes left to the interval. Martyn Bennett pulled a goal back a minute later, but the issue was settled mid-way through the second period when limmy Ouinn grabbed a second for Swindon

The third man to be sent off in Swindon v Albion encounters was a dissenting Bobby Barnes. who talked himself off the field at the County Ground on New Year's Day 1988.

With the game still goalless with seven minutes to go. Town strikers Quinn and Dave Bamber And it was the latter who struck of the F.A. Cup.

and again a minute from time, to steal the points.

White was on target again, at The Hawthorns, early last season. His 7th-minute goal cancelled out one from big defender Paul Dyson a minute earlier. But two more Albion goals in the seven minutes prior to the interval ensured a 3-1 home victory.

There were 12,240 present when seventh-placed Swindon entertained third-placed Albion in March of last year, but no goals - the only goalless encounter so far.

Duncan Shearer ensured that there would be no repeat performance just before Christmas. He gave the Town the lead inside four minutes and White added a second on the hour. Then Welsh referee Frangcom Roberts, who officiated at the County Ground last Saturday, awarded the Albion three penalties within seven minutes - for alleged fouls against Colin Calderwood and Jon Gittens and a handling offence by Shearer.

THIRD TIME LUCKY

Fraser Digby denied Bernard McNally from the first spot kick and then Graham Harbey blasted the second over the bar. Don Goodman made it third time lucky for his side, but Swindon held on to the three points.

The clubs have also met once in the League Cup and once in the F.A. Cup. On both occasions. the Town suffered a 0-2 defeat. In October 1966 at the County Ground, two goals in the final seven minutes from leff Astle and Clive Clark, put paid to their League Cup hopes for that season. And in February 1973 two first half goals, from Tony were withdrawn in favour of Brown and Len Cantello, did Charlie Henry and Steve White. the damage in the Fourth Round



THE BEST IN THE DIVISION

The best footballing side in the Second Division by far' was the way Watford caretaker manager Colin Lee described us after we had beaten them 2-0. And that on a day when the team failed to produce anything like the quality of football which has become their hallmark this season.

How ironic it is, then, that while Ossie and his players continue to attract compliments from all quarters, rumours are rife that the club faces points deduction, relegation or even expulsion from the League for offthe-field offences. For years people within the game have been crying out for quality football. In half a season Ossie had his team playing the kind of football this country has always admired in foreign teams. Even though the F.A. did not see that Ossie was even worthy of a coaching badge, the rest of football have taken notice. PAUL PLOWMAN LOOKS BACK AT THE CAREER OF A PLAYER WHO SERVED BOTH SWINDON TOWN AND TODAY'S OPPONENTS

The giant strides made by the Republic of Ireland in world football in recent years will have come as no surprise to its loyal followersand as a bonus to those like Alan McLoughlin, who stand on the threshold of possibly greater achievement in the coming months.

BONUS

It will also have come as a bonus to those who organise transportation for the thousands on their journeys away from the Emerald Isle. One such company, based in Dublin, is Ray Treacy Travel, run by the former West Bromwich Albion, Swindon Town and Eire striker.

Ray, who was also a capable gaelic player, left his native Dublin to take up an apprenticeship at The Hawthorns in 1961, signing professional forms on his 18th birthday in June 1964. He scored on his First Division debut at Sunderland in October 1966, but made only one more full League appearance before signing for Charlton for £17,500 in February 1968.

At The Valley, Ray struck nine goals in what remained of that season and found the net with great consistency in four further years in south-east London Despite not reaching double figures, he was leading goalscorer in both 1969/70 and 1970/71. Ray topped the list again in 1971/72 with 19 League and Cup goals, 16 of which had . come by mid-November. As the goals dried up, Charlton's fortunes turned and, after failing to win any of the ten games following a 3-1 win

over Swindon in March, they were relegated.

EARLY GLIMPSE

Ray remained a Second Division player by signing for the Town on June 9, for a then club record fee of £35,000, with Arthur Horsfield going in the opposite direction. Fans had an early glimpse of the new capture in a pre-season friendly with Southampton. Not a big man, Ray was a great header of the ball and had good skills on the ground

fixtures of the following season but, on October 10th, found himself left out of the starting line-up for a League Cup tie at Chesterfield, Micky Colins taking his place. And when Peter Eastoe was signed on loan early in November, Ray knew that his days at the County Ground were numbered.

In 1973, on December 8th, Ray joined fellow Division Two strugglers Preston, managed by Bobby Charlton. It was not a happy start at Deepdale as the Lilywhites won only three of the twenty games that He was ruled out of the first two Ray took part in and they accom-League games due to suspension panied Swindon down to the Third.

but made his debut at Carlisle, in a 0-3 defeat, on August 19 and was ever-present for the remainder of the season.

Ray's first goal for Swindon came eight minutes from the end of a dreary contest with Sheffield Wednesday two games later. But it was worth two points.

Another vital strike came at Luton on November 4. The Town had just lost both their manager, Dave Mackay, and their long-serving winger Don Rogers. Again, Ray's goal decided the destiny of the points. He was leading scorer for his club for the fourth season in succession with 13 League goals for Swindon in 1972/73.

Ray made only a handful of appearances in 1974/75 before spending a month on loan to Oldham. But he bounced back to form in the following season with 13 goals and was soon on his way back to The Hawthorns.

Albion re-signed him in August 1976. At thirty, Ray Treacy was back in the First Division after an absence of almost ten years - and he celebrated by scoring both goals in a 2-2 draw at Derby.

In the following spring Ray returned to Ireland, signing for Shamrock Rovers. He went to America in the summer of 1978. assisting Toronto Metro. In 1980 Ray took over at Drogheda United, before eventually devoting more Ray scored in the opening two time to his thriving travel business.

WEST BROMWICH ALBION

BRIAN TALBOT (Manager). An experienced mifielder, who, when signed by Albion in January 1988 for £15,000 from Stoke City, had chalked up over 650 League appearances with Ipswich, Arsenal, Watford and Stoke City. Capped by England at full. B' team and Under-21 level, he won F.A. Cup winners medals with Ipswich in 1978 and Arsenal the following year. Named caretaker/manager of Oldham in October 1988, following the departure of Ron Atkinson to Spain. Soon, made player/manager and in May 1988 signed a three year contract. Recently hung up his boots.

DARREN BRADLEY (Middled). An apprentice with Aston Villa, he went on to make 20 League appearances before moving to the Albion in March 1986, in a £90,000 deal involving Seve Hunt. Guested for Capetown Spurs (South Africa) in the summer of 1988. A former England Youth International captain. The 24 year old is nearing 100 League appearances for Albion.

NEIL CARTWRIGHT (Striker). Born in Stourbridge and turned professional in July 1988. Voted Albions Young Player of the Year in 1989. Made his League debut as a substitute against Leicester City, at home, on January 21 1989.

TONY FORD (Midfield). Made 407 appearances for Grimsby Town (60 goals), and was the youngest League debutant for the Mariners, being 16 years and 4 months old when he lined up against Walsall in October 1978. Twice

helped the Mariners win promotion – from Division Four in 1978-79 (when he was topscorer) and from Division Three in 1979-80. Went on tour with the England B side (with Stuart Naylor, in summer of 1989). Debut v Swindon (away) on March 25 1989.

DON GOODMAN (Striker). Played for Leeds schools, but became an apprentice with Bradford City in July 1984 and signed professional forms the following summer. He left the Yorkshire club to sign for Albion on the transfer deadline for a fee of £70,000 in March 1987. His presence in the side went a long way in helping the team avoid the relegation play-offs at the end of that season. Top scorer for Albion in 1988-89. He gained a Third Division Championship medal with Bradford in 1984-85. Began playing football (aged 10) as a goalkeeper.

SIMEON HODSON (Defender). Born Lincoln, February 1966. Utility defender, quick in recovery, who can also adopt a midfield role. Made 30 appearances for Notts County, five for Charlton, 66 for Lincoln and 42 for Newport, before joining Albion on the transfer deadline in 1988 for a modest £5,000 fee. Suffered with injury during the 1988-89 campaign.

BERNARD McNALLY (Midfield). Born in Shrewsbury, February 1963. Played for the local schools sides before joining his home-town club as an apprentice in June 1979. Signed professional forms in February 1981, and went on to make over 350 appearances for Shrews-

bury. An Irish International, he moved to Albion for a fee of £325,000 – fixed by a tribunal – in July 1989. He gained a Welsh Cup Winners medal in 1984.

GARY HACKETT (Forward). Signed from Stoke City for a fee of £70,000 in March of this year. Has made nine full appearances for Albion and scored two goals. The 27 year old made 150 appearances for Shrewsbury and 15 for Aberdeen before moving to Stoke.

GRAHAM HARBEY (Defender). Purchased from Ipswich for a fee of £80,000 in December 1989. The left back has been ever-present since joining Albion, but has yet to score. Made debut in 7-0 victory over Barnsley. Began his career with Derby County before moving to East Anotia.

CRAIG SHAKESPEARE (Midfield). Born in Birmingham, he began as an apprentice with Walsall and made his League debut in September 1982. Virtually an ever-present from the following season until end of 1988-89 season. During last summer he moved from Walsall, bottom of Second Division, to First Division Sheffield Wednesday for £300,000. However, hit by injuries and not able to re-gain a place in the first team, he went from Wednesday to Albion, on loan, in February 1990. A few weeks later he made the move permanent form £257,000 fee.

GARY BANNISTER (Forward). Another recent expensive signing. Joined Albion from Coventry for a transfer fee of £250,000 in March 1990. Has only scored once in 11 appearances for Albion. Limped off on Monday with hamstring problems and could be doubtful for today. The 29 year old striker has also seen service with Coventry, Sheffield Wednesday, Queens Park Rangers and Coventry again.

STACEY NORTH (Defender). Born in Luton, the 25 year old defender turned professional with his home town club in 1982. Failed to gain a regular first team place with Steve Foster and Mel Donaghy the favoured central defenders. Made three loan appearances for Wolverhampton during 1985-86 season. Joined Albion in December 1987 for a £120,000 fee and had made 70 appearances to the beginning of this campaign.

STUART NAYLOR (Goalkeeper). Born Leeds but joined Lincoln City as a professional in June 1980. Spent loan spells with both Peterborough and Crewe before signing for Albion for £110,000 in Pebruary 1986. Ron Saunders' first signing, he had languished in the lower reaches of the Football League for seven years before he was given a chance by Albion. He won England Youth International honours as a lad (1980-81) and actually played at centre-forward for Lincoln (v Newport County in October 1982) as a late replacement. In 1989 he was capped be England 'B'. Made 65 appearances for Lincoln, 8 for Peterborough and 65 for Crewe, and for Albion nearing the 200 mark.

PAUL RAVEN (Defender). Gained England Schoolboy honours in 1985, and a Youth cap in 1988. Strong determined defender who can occupy either the right-back or centre-half berths. He made over 600 appearances for Doncaster, his debut coming while still at school, and gained Youth Cup runners-up medal v Arsenal 1988. Joined Albion in March 1989 for £150,000.

CHRIS WHYTE (Defender). Stylish centre-back, who made 106 appearances for Arsenal and 17 for Palace before quitting the English scene for the NASL. Gained four England Under-21 caps while with the Gunners, for whom he played in the 1983 F.A. Cup semi-final Made his debut for Arsenal v Panathiniakos in the UEFA Cup, September 1981. Was voted Albion's Player of the Year' in 1989, after signing on a free transfer the previous summer.

DARYL BURGESS (Defender). A YTS apprentice, who signed professional forms for Albion in 1989. The 19 year old made his League debut, away at Port Vale, on August 26 1989.

ADRIAN FOSTER (Forward). A former YTS player, the teenager has made six full first team appearances to date and been substitute on numerous occasions this season.
