


I am taking the opportunity to discuss what I feel is an unfair arrangement in League soccer at the moment. With the eagle eye of the referee searching for the cynical challenge to stop a player en route to goal, some clubs are suffering unfairly. For example, when Swindon's goalkeeper Hammond conceded a penalty by pulling down a Bristol Rovers forward, Joe Worall, a lenient referee, decided that the penalty was enough punishment and Hammond stayed on the field and more importantly escaped a three-match ban. We suffered no such fortune when Walsh stumbled along with Mustoe at Middlesbrough. We have been punished for that challenge four times.



Enjoy the game.







Last week saw the good and bad of British football - fine results for all of our teams in the European Championships on the Wednesday marred by the reported trouble on the field at Old Trafford on Saturday which, I understand, was covered live on television as part of normal match coverage throughout many countries.

The latter is a matter to which the Football Association will no doubt be putting their minds, and even apart from the fact that I know nothing of the incident apart from what I have read, it would be very wrong to make any comment while the matter is before the F.A., except to say that obviously, whatever happened is something we do not wish to see in

Turning to the brighter side, four wins and a draw out of five matches is a record any Manager would drool over, and that was the return from the European Championship matches played by the five countries from the British Isles last week.

True, they were all at home, but even so figures to be proud of.

WALES ON TOP

Pride of place, I feel, must go to Wales for their 3-1 win over Belgium, never an easy side to beat.

Of the "Famous Five", Wales have missed the limelight compared to the rest of our countries, and quite frankly I cannot remember them qualifying for the finals of either the World Cup or the European Championships since the Sweden World Cup Finals of 1958.

If I'm right, that's an awful long time to wait, and if you consider some of the fine players who have worn the red shirt rather surprising, and from the point of view of those players, rather tragic.

ALAN BENNETT ...

Right now they boast stars of the calibre of Neville Southall, Kevin Ratcliffe, Ian Rush, Mark Hughes and Dean Saunders - names that would grace the finals of any competition, and we can only hope that last week's win will set them off to win their group this time.

I think those names also highlight the fact that while you probably do need great players to win a tournament, unless you have a solid team you probably won't even qualify for the finals!

That's where the two Ireland's have benefited recently - Northern Ireland in the early Eighties, and the Republic since they have been able to field solid squads that have seen them through to three World Cup and one European final during the last ten

UP TO ENGLAND

This time it will be up to England to prevent the Republic making it a hattrick of qualifications, and while the Irish certainly impressed in their five goal demolition of Turkey I must, as a loyal Englishman, take Graham Taylor's team to edge out the Dublin boys over the two games between the countries.

As Graham said, goal difference only becomes a factor if sides are level on points, and it's points that

win groups in the end.

Finally, I haven't forgotten the Northern Irish, with their hard won draw with Denmark - a good result but probably not good enough in qualification terms - or Scotland, off yet again to a real flier with two wins out of two in their group.

The Scots seem to make a habit of getting nearly enough points to qualify early on and then keeping everyone on tenterhooks until the last minutes of the last match to snatch the vital one to book their place! Maybe this time they intend to put us all out of our misery early on, and there's no doubt that wins over Romania and Switzerland have put them in command.

Let's hope the five - or four at least bearing in mind England and the Republic in the same group - will keep it up, as I'm sure success as that level rubs off onto the Club game with better and more confident players and in turn better and wellsupported matches.

TV PROBLEM

Talking of support, we shall be watching the attendance tonight with special interest following the late decision approved by the Football League to allow live television of Aston Villa's U.E.F.A. Cup match with Inter Milan.

Of course, live coverage means a lot of money to Villa - reports range between two and three hundred thousand pounds - and we certainly would be the last to grudge them that extra income.

Regulation 24 of the League Regulations provide that matches involving League Clubs authorised by the League, which we would consider includes European matches, must not be televised without the consent of the Management Committee. We have pointed out to the League that nine League matches, including six in the Second Division, are scheduled to be played tonight, and hopefully permission was not given to Villa for live coverage without compensation being provided for those of us tonight who may lose out at our turnstiles.

When we learnt of the live Villa coverage, it was already too late to re-arrange tonight's game to vesterday.

Police arrangements had already been completed, many of you had bought tickets for tonight, the match had been contracted for sponsorship to Kirby and West and the Belvoir Suite had been contracted last night.

Of course, it is always hard to say what a crowd would be, but we feel that our game tonight compares very closely with the one earlier this month, again on a Wednesday evening, against Bristol City. That drew an attendance of just under ten thousand, so anything less tonight will, in our view, be to the debit of the live Villa coverage. At an average of over a fiver a head, that could be money we shouldn't have to lose.





* Congratulations to old City boys Gary Lineker and Gary McAllister, who both scored for their countries in last week's European Championship qualifiers.



PARTNERS IN DEFENCE

It is ironic that just as Tony James and Steve Walsh were proving they could make an effective central defensive partnership, Steve was forced out of the side through suspension.

For 76 minutes at Elland Road in the Rumbelows Cup, they both coped superbly with the aerial bombardment thrown at them by Leeds United, in front of their hostile fans.

As the team coach left Yorkshire after that game there was the

sudden realisation that not only were City out of the cup, but Steve would be missing for the next three games.

Marc North played in the first half at Selhurst Park against Charlton, but had to go off because of breathing problems. Tony James proved he is a strong defender, growing in confidence.

He and Alan Paris, along with a bit of luck and the skill of Mike Hooper, helped City hold on to win 2-1 for the vital first away points of the season.

· SENT OFF ·

Steve Walsh was suspended, of course, as punishment for his controversial sending-off at Middlesbrough.

"It was disappointing for me to get sent off like that. It was my eighth sending off and it should never have been.

"I have just to come back and be careful next time," he said.

"I will serve my ban, keep fit, do extra training and carry on where I left off," said Steve.

CHALLENGE

His partner in defence Tony James has risen to the challenge of reversing City's disastrous start and is maturing into an agile defender, who can win everything in the air and make timely interventions.

"I'm in my second season here and I feel I'm making real progress now and hope to be a part of a City promotion challenge," said Tony.

"I scored the best goal of my life against Charlton and enjoyed the challenge of playing a side also desperate for points," he said.


"I felt Steve and I coped very well at Leeds and I am looking forward to resuming our partnership for the Ipswich match."

Tony's aerial power has also proved a useful weapon in the opposing penalty areas, where he has scored vital goals, at Charlton, as he said, and against Bristol City in the first minute.

If this central defensive partnership does flourish as it has showed signs of doing, it may be the answer to many of City's defensive frailties.

When Simon Morgan left Filbert Street to join Third Division Fulham two weeks ago, City lost one of their most popular players.

Simon was a model professional, always willing to give his time to the public and press.

He was also a loyal servant of the City defensive line after he was taken on as a professional in 1984, from the YTS books.

The former England Under-21 international played 168 full games for City and scored four goals, after making his debut in 1985 against Coventry City in the First Division.

So for a 24-year-old he does have considerable experience and will be a valued addition to the Fulham defence.

Unfortunately in his first game for his new club they lost 2-1 to Stoke City. But Simon was quick to add that Fulham hit the bar twice and should have won the match.

"I have settled well in well and the club have made me welcome," he said.

"They have a good set of players capable of taking the team away from the basement of the Third Division.

"I was a bit sad to leave Leicester after eight years, especially after fighting back from a knee injury," he said.

Simon had missed most of last season with a serious knee injury and had just recovered from a fractured cheekbone, when the deal was struck.

"It all happened so quickly, I just hope I have made the right move.

"The fans at Leicester have been great to me and have supported me well. City is a lovely, friendly club," he said.

"But this is a challenge and I must look ahead," said Simon.

He will still be looking for the City results with interest.

"I saw City beat Charlton and was chuffed," he said.


Simon is pictured scoring against Tottenham Hotspur at Filbert Street in September 1986, during City's last season in Division One.



Remembers

City lost 6-0 Middlesbrough, David Pleat decided to take his players away from it all for a few days.

It proved to be a masterstroke, as the team came back and beat early highfliers Bristol City 3-0 to end a run of seven League defeats.

With the tension running high at Filbert Street before that match three weeks ago, Tony James' first minute goal proved to be a real watershed.

As soon as the referee blew his whistle to begin that vital game, it was obvious City were desperate to win. David Oldfield made a determined run down the left wing to force a corner. When it was cleared Tommy Wright's pinpoint cross was met by Tony, who beat Bristol keeper Ronnie Sinclair to the ball and scored with a fine header.

"We couldn't have got a better start, especially from my point of view," said Tony.

"It was just such a relief to have got a good start and the lads built on it.

I really enjoyed the break we had in the days before the game. It was just so relaxing and did the world of good to team spirit.

"We became more of a team and certainly learnt more about each other," said the 23-year-old defender.

Tony has really matured into a commanding centre half this season and has proved himself as an invaluable asset in the City defence.

But his presence in the opposing penalty area has also been a potent weapon for City.

The first away points of the season were earned at Selhurst Park against Charlton Athletic and Tony grabbed the winner.

Tommy Wright sent over another of his dangerous corners and Tony beat a challenge to head accurately over Valiants' keeper Mike Salmon.

"That was the best goal I have ever scored and also one of the most important, of course.

"I was pleased to have played well and delighted to score the winning goal," he said.

FANTASTIC

Tony's goalscoring career began in March last season when City travelled to Sunderland.

'There was a free-kick on the right hand side and I just managed to glance it into the bottom corner of the net.

"It was my first ever League goal and it was fantastic, a brilliant feeling.

"I had waited a long time for it and I was just delighted when it came," he said.

It certainly was a useful goal, coming in the last minute to earn City a 2-2 draw at Roker Park, in a season when Sunderland were destined to gain promotion.

HOME GOAL

Once Tony had tasted success as a scorer, he wasted no time in getting his second goal.

Only a month after getting on the scoresheet at Roker Park, he netted at Filbert Street against Portsmouth.

"A corner came over from the lefthand side and I managed to nod it in.

"That was a bit special, to score in front of the home fans," he said.

Again Tony's strike helped City earn a draw, this time 1-1.

NERVOUS

Since signing for Northern Premier League side Gainsborough, Tony has made a meteroic rise up the ladder to join a big club like City.

He spent only four weeks at Gainsborough before Colin Murphy (who is now City's Youth Team coach) snapped him up and took him to Lincoln City. Tony quickly repaid Colin with some fine performances in the Fourth Division and was voted Playerof-the-Year in his first season.

"There were no particular moments to describe as special that year, the whole season was special," he said.

Then, of course, David Pleat moved in for the big defender from Sheffield, and brought him to Filbert Street.

"I was delighted to join City-it only took me one-and-a-half hours to decide," he said.


Tony made his debut at Watford, coming on as substitute for Alan Paris.

"I didn't expect to play at all and the gaffer (David Pleat) told me on the bus as we travelled down.

I was a bit nervous at first, but I quickly grew in confidence," he said.

This season Tony has grown in stature and is certainly a vital member of the City defensive line.

Tony launches yet another of those enormous throw-in's.





GRANDSTAND FINISH RATTLES ROBINS

Swindon made guite a promising start to the 1987/88 campaign with a string of early victories lifting them to the fringe of the promotion battle. City on the other hand had lost five of their opening six fixtures and were struggling to find any consistency in the lower reaches of Division Two.

SURPRISE

The little South American has maintained the good work of his predecessor Lou Macari and Swindon are a refreshing change to the many kick and run teams in the Second Division.

When a Football League inquiry into financial irregularities at the Wiltshire club, resulted in demotion back to Division Two, Ossie said he would stay and try to gain promotion

He managed to hold onto his key players and added experience to his squad with former team mate Micky Hazard signing from Portsmouth and, of course, Lorenzo, who played in the World Cup Final for Argentina, being taken on loan from Italian side Bari, until the end of the season.

The appointment of Ardiles was one of the most positive moves the Swindon board could have made and with limited resources, Ossie has moulded a side in his style. Short passing movements and lots of attractive flowing football, have become the Robins' hallmark.

The side that taught Sunderland a lesson in the play-off final at Wembley in May, is capable of doing it all over again and despite a

stuttering start, should still feature in the promotion frame next May.

At the same time last season City beat Town 2-1 at Filbert Street with two goals from Paul Reid, and managed to grab a point at the County Ground with a strike from David Kelly. Experienced winger Dave Bennett was recently signed from Sheffield Wednesday, but played only one game and broke his leg in two places. He joins club captain Colin Calderwood, who has torn knee ligaments, on the list of the long-term injured at the County Ground.

Here are some of the other stars in the Swindon squad:

NICKY HAMMOND (23) made his first senior appearance for Swindon in two-and-half-years in the Rumbelows Cup match against Darlington. The goalkeeper had two broken leg injuries during that time, after signing for the Robins on a free transfer from Arsenal in 1987.

FRASER DIGBY (23) missed just one game in the Swindon goal last season and that was the first time he had been absent in over two years. The former Manchester United apprentice, who also spent a loan period with Oldham Athletic, made

his League debut for Swindon in September 1986.

PAUL BODIN (26) has replaced Phil King, who went to Sheffield Wednesday, at left back. Paul has taken his chance, won his first cap for Wales against Costa Rica and also played in the superb Welsh victory over Belgium last week. So he has proved to be a bargain-buy from Newport County, especially as he can also score goals.

SHAUNCLOSE (24) scored his first senior goal for Town against Darlington in over 13 months. He has found it hard to make a breakthrough after joining Swindon from Bournemouth, with both Duncan Shearer and Steve White scoring lots of goals.



Ipswich Town have made a stuttering start to their campaign this season, but victory over Newcastle United last Saturday has left them well placed to make a bid for a promotion place.

The appointment of John Lyall as manager at the end of last season caught the imagination of many Town fans. At West Ham Lyall was renowned for building creative attacking sides, with great players fostered in the 'Academy' of football.

Despite defensive weakness letting the Hammers down on many occasions, Lyall still had an impressive career as boss at Upton Park. FA Cup success and a third spot in Division One, were two of his achievements. But what most interests the soccer folk in Suffolk, is the Second Division Championship he won with the Hammers.

Since Bobby Robson left to become England manager in 1982, Ipswich have never regained the form which saw them finish First Division runners-up twice in the early 80s. Relegation to Division Two was a blow the club has failed to recover from.

Now in their fifth season in the League's toughest division, Ipswich have only once made the play-offs and as a result manager John Duncan was sacked at the end of last season.

In Romeo Zondervan and Brian Gayle Town have two experienced players, who have played at the highest level. Craig Forrest has established himself as a capable keeper. Chris Kiwomya and Simon Milton are scoring goals to help push lpswich up the table.

But five goals conceded against Barnsley have kept Town on their toes and patchy away form has hindered the team's progress.

With both teams letting in goals, but scoring their fair share as well, this could be a high-scoring encounter.

City only took one point off Ipswich at last year and that was earned with a 2-2 draw at Portman Road.

I still felt they weren't a confident side and looked like a team, which was near the bottom of the Second Division. But in fairness to them, of course, they went on to win the game.


If you look at corners for, pressure and saves made, their goalkeeper was pulling them out of the sky and making reflex saves from ricochets.




Our first Junior Fox training session on October 7 was a fantastic success with about 150 youngsters enjoying a great morning with Jack, Joanna and the players.


