

We played some super football but we still found some difficulty scoring the goals our play deserved. I think confidence has a lot to do with it.



## FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The decision of a High Court judge to award damages of over £260,000 against Reading, sent shock waves throughout football.

And it provoked many expressions of concern about its implication from officials during the following hours.

It was the first case of its type brought by injured police officers against a League club.

Mr Justice Drake ruled that Reading were negligent in failing to carry out repairs to ensure that their Elm Park groung was safe.

The incident took place in April 1984, in a match against Bristol City. Reading won 2-0 but the game had to be halted for 13 minutes.

The bulk of the damages went to a former sergeant David Cunningham (35) who was hit on the back of his neck by a piece of concrete thrown from the terraces.

Nottingham Forest manager Brian Clough conceded that he needs a new injection of players.

But he admitted that money was not the worry. "We have got a few bob in the bank and the chairman has been telling me to go out and get a couple of players for the last two years," he said.

West Ham, pushing hard for Division 1, have signed lain Dowie, the Luton and Northern Ireland striker for £480,000 and in doing so, hope they have solved a long-standing problem, lack of weight in attack.

It was the Hammers' second purchase this season from the Hatters, following their £600,000 acquisition of defender Tim Breacker last October.

And to think that only two years ago, Dowie (26) was a non-league player with Hendon.

On the financial front, the buys didn't prevent Luton from losing more that £1 million last season. They now have a bank overdraft of £1.2 million.

Sheffield Wednesday boss Ron Atkinson was quick to deny reports in a Spanish newspaper that he is in line to take charge of Sporting Gijon next season.

Former England and Ipswich midfielder Kevin Beattie, now 37, was on the danger list when he was taken to hospital with pancreatitis. But after an operation, his condition was said to be stable.

Frank McAvennie's sending-off against Bristol City along with City's Andy Llewellyn, proved very costly. The FA confirmed later that he would miss tomorrow's FA Cup semi-final against Forest at Villa Park.

Kenny Sansom joined his fifth League club when he moved from QPR to Coventry city for £95,000. It followed Rangers' signing of Rufus Brevett from Doncaster Rovers for £250,000.



Lou Macari the former Glasgow Celtic and Manchester United International moved to the County Ground, and masterminded the phenomenal rise of the Wiltshire Club with promotion in two consecutive seasons. In 1985/6 the club produced a Football League record when winning the Fourth Division Championship with 102 points finishing eighteen points clear of second placed Chester City.

The following season they finished in a play off position, and after hard fought games against Gillingham and Wigan Athletic, they met Crystal Palace at Selhurst Park in the deciding game, and clinched promotion with a 2-0 victory both goals being scored by Steve White.

They returned to the 2nd Division after an absence of twelve seasons, and the following two seasons were spent consolidating their position. At this stage Lou Macari moved to West Ham United to take over the managers chair vacated by the release of John Lyall, but was followed by Ossie Ardiles who had become well known in English Football circles as the little Argentinian who came to this country with his fellow countryman Richy Villa to join Tottenham Hotspur. Both provided some sparkling displays for Tottenham, winning Cup Final and U.E.F.A. Cup winners medals.

The club under the guidance of Ardiles made a slow start, but soon began to produce a quality brand of football admired by many spectators. At the conclusion of the 1989/90 season the club finished in a play off position, and after two very fine victories over Blackburn Rovers, they faced Sunderland at Wembley in the final. Over 70,000 spectators witnessed the game with Swindon emerging victors by 1-0.

The jubilation amongst the Swindon Town supporters and players on their promotion to Division 1 was cut short in June when the Football League decided to relegate the club to Division 3 for certain irregularities that had gone on inside the club. On appeal this decision was revoked, but Swindon Town were forced to say in Division 2.

This season the results have been disappointing, and some of the clubs best players have been transferred, and with the recent departure of manager Ossie Ardiles to Newcastle United, and star defender Jon Gittens to Southampton, the club will have to make a fresh start with a new manager, and look to re-build their tarnished reputation.

Plymouth Argyle F.C. would like to welcome all visiting supporters to Home Park this afternoon, and hope you enjoy the game.

#### **SWINDON TOWN**

Glen Hoddle (Manager). Born Hayes. November 27th 1957. Glen Hoddle and John Gorman, his assistant swept into the County Ground recently as the new management team at Swindon. Their first task will be to try and banish the relegation fears at present looming over the club, now finding themselves hovering dangerously near the foot of Division 2. On his arrival Hoddle declared he wanted to get the club out of the relegation zone as quickly as possible, and no doubt will be looking to rebuild the clubs future image. Began his career at White Hart Lane as an apprentice, signing professional in April 1975. Overcame a serious knee injury in his early teens, and went on to complete 371 league appearances for Spurs, and winning two F.A. Cup winners medals. Was a regular member of the England International side, but in 1987 he joined the French League Club A.C. Monaco, and was later dropped from the International squad. A bad knee injury has forced him out of football for the past eighteen months, and on his return to England has recently accepted a three year managerial position

Fraser Digby (Goalkeeper). Born Sheffield. April 23rd 1967. Height 6'1". This former Manchester United apprentice spent two loan periods at the County Ground before eventually joining the club for £25,000 in December 1986. Has made good progress, and has attracted attention from bigger clubs. A highly rated goalkeeper who has played for England Under 21.

Tony Finnegan (Defender). Born Wimbledon. October 17th 1962. Height 5'10". Began his career with Crystal Palace as an apprentice before moving to Fulham. During his four seasons at Craven Cottage he failed to make a first team league appearance, and in 1984/5 season he returned to Selhurst Park. Made over 100 appearances for Crystal Palace, and in 1988 moved to Blackburn Rovers, later joining Hull City. Recently moved to the County Ground.


Nestor Lorenzo (Midfield). A recent signing from the Italian club Bari who has given some impressive performances since his arrival

Fitzroy Simpson (Midfield). Born Trowbridge. February 26th 1970. Height 5'8". Joined the club as a trainee, and has worked his way through the junior and reserve sides. Made his full debut for the club during the 1988/9 season against Sunderland, after previously making two susbstitute appearances.

Mike Hazard (Midfield). Born Sunderland. February 5th 1960. Height 5'7". A very experienced player who has previously played 1st Division football with Tottenham and Chelsea, later joining Portsmouth. Failed to produce his previous form at Fratton Park, joining Swindon during the present season.

Colin Calderwood (Defender). Born Stranraer. January 20th 1965. Height 6'0". Made over 100 appearances for Mansfield Town before moving to the County Ground in July 1985. Has been a regular first team choice for the Robins having made over 200 appearances. Captained Swindon Town to promotion in consecutive seasons.

Tom Jones (Forward), Born Aldershot. October 7th 1964. Height 5'10". Moved to Aberdeen in 1987 from Weymouth making 28 appearances in his first season. Joined Swindon Town during the close season of 1987/8, and has made 83 league appearances for the club to the start of the present season.

Duncan Shearer (Forward). Born Fort William. August 28th 1962. Height 5'10". Joined Chelsea from non-league football, but after making two senior appearances he joined Huddersfield Town, and became quite a prolific goalscorer. When transferred to Swindon he was the subject of a quarter million pound transfer deal which was a record fro both Huddersfield and Swindon. Has been the clubs leading goalscorer for the past

Steve White (Foward). Born Chipping Sodbury. Janaury 2nd 1959. Height 5'11". Was signed by Bristol Rovers from local club Mangotsfield, and later a £200,000 fee saw him join Luton Town. Never settled at Kenilworth Road, and later joined Charlton Athletic. After a short stay he returned to Bristol Rovers but failed to maky any impact, and was allowed to join Swindon on a free transfer which must be one of the best transfer

bargains completed by the club.

Ross MacLaren (Midfield). Born Edinburgh. April 14th 1962. Height 5'10". After a free transfer from Glasgow Rangers he spent four seasons with Shrewsbury, Joined Derby County in July 1985 for a tribunal fee of £67,500 and helped the Rams in their promotion from Division 3 to Division 1. Cost £140,000 when moving to the County Ground in August 1988, and has now completed over 100 appearances for the club.

Steve Foley (Midfield). Born Liverpool. October 4th 1962. Height 5'8". This Liverpool born player began his career as an apprentice with the Anfield club. Made his league debut while on loan with Fulham. Given a free transfer in 1984 by Liverpool he joined Grimsby Town, but the following season moved to Sheffield United on a free transfer. Was signed by Swindon in July 1987, and has now played in over 100 league games for the Robins.

Paul Rideout (Forward) Born Bournemouth. August 14th 1964. Height 5'11". Began his career with Swindon as an apprentice, playing for England Youth and Under 21. Joined Aston Villa in 1983/4 where he attracted the attention of Bari an Italian League Club. Moved to Italy in 1985 where he spent three seasons, joining Southampton on his return. Has been unable to command a regular first team place at the Dell this season, and recently figured in a transfer deal that saw Jon Gittens rejoin Southampton and Paul returing to the County Ground on loan until the end of the season.

David Kerslake (Midfield). Born London. June 19th 1966. Height 5'8". Spent all his footballing career at Loftus Road, joining Queens Park Rangers as an apprentice in 1983. Played for England at Youth and Under 21 level, joining Swindon in November 1989 for £110,000 and becoming a regular first team member.

Adrian Viveash (Defender). Born Swindon. September 30th 1969. Height 6'1". This local born well built defender has recently made the breakthrough into first team football. Joined the club as a trainee, he has graduated through the junior and reserve sides, and when called upon for first team duty this season has made a very favourable impression. Could figure in todays line-up.

## PLAYER Profile

#### Darren Garner Born Plymouth December 10th 1971

Was a pupil at Devonport High School where soccer became his top priority, being selected to play for the Plymouth and Devon Schools. Was later recommended by his Sports Master Graham Hayman and Chris Walters to the Plymouth Argyle School of Excellence then being run under the watchful eyes of Richard Davis and David Babb.

After spending four years with the School of Excellence, during which he received very good and sound advice from those in charge, he was then signed by Argyle as an Associate Schoolboy. In 1988 he was offered an apprenticeship with the club, and after six months during which he



had been a regular, playing in the reserve side, he was given professional terms by Manager Ken Brown. Made his Second Division debut against Oxford United in the last game of the 1988/9 Season at Home Park, and last season made a substitute appearance at Dean Court, Bournemouth.

His first appearance this season was in February

against Millwall, when he scored his first goal in the Football League. Gave an outstanding performance in this game but unfortunately sustained an injury, which prevent him having a longer first team run.

Was selected to represent the England Under 18 squad to play in Moscow under the guidance of Lawrie McMenemy and Alan Ball, winning the game by 2-1.

Has always received full backing of his parents and grandparents in his ambition to reach the top as a professional footballer, and is now regarded as one of the many young players on the staff at Home Park who will form the nucleus of the Plymouth Argyle team in the future.

His other favourite pastimes are snooker and golf.





The spotlight has swung firmly away from Liverpool in recent weeks to their Lancashire rivals Manchester United particularly because of the Reds' success in Europe.

But before getting around to that, I cannot resist a comment about one headline which caught my eye and caused the very slightest of boggles in the

It read simply: "Ferguson gets £1,000 a week rise."

In times when any news about a reduction of a few pounds in the Poll tax is a blessing to the average wage-earner, it did underline again what a crazy world we live in.

Now I have always believed that if employers think a man is worth a huge salary, he certainly should not be denied it.

The facts are that Alex Ferguson's salary in December 1989 was £95,000 per year and that it has been boosted by 75 per cent in the last 15 months. It poses the question: is any man worth this amount of money?

Did you realise also that Manchester City took on Howard Kendall at almost double that £95,000, stressing the rivalry in the city?

I suppose if Ferguson inspires success on the field which earns United millions when the balance sheets come out, you could argue he is more than worth it. I leave you to judge.

What I am sure about is that my colleagues in

the media generally went OTT when United overcame a very average-looking Montpellier in the Cup Winners Cup.

Phrases like "superb" and "marvellous" from dear old Greavesy were repeated all over the place by more respected observers.

I would have thought words like "superb" ought to be kept in cold storage for away wins over the likes of AC Milan or Barcelona.

While United did a thorough job after making a real hash of the first leg, I turn my mind back to the United of the sixties and early seventies.

Men like George Best, Bobby Charlton, Denis Law and Pat Crerand were a sight to behold. The current United team is emphatically not in the same street, indeed it includes some workhorses who would have been hard put to get a place in United's reserve side at that time.

Keeping a sense of proportion is not always easy in the hour of triumph on the Continent.

But our top observers are paid (though not as well as Ferguson!) to give us balanced judgments, and by and large we didn't get them that night in Montpellier.

You can't blame United of course. But I heard several fans express the same view as myself on the following day after watching T.V. Thank goodness the majority are intelligent enough to make up their own minds about such matters.

## IN MY OPINION

During the course of a football season, I visit many Football League and non-League football grounds, and it is surprising not only what you see, but also whom you see! The other week for instance at a Midlands non-League ground, I found myself standing on the terraces alongside one of Argyle's prodigal sons -John Newman, who is incidentally scouting for Mansfield these days, and still living in Derby. John had an illustrious playing career with Argyle in the 60's, before leaving at the twilight of his playing career, moving down the road to near neighbours Exeter City, and with whom he commenced his role on the Managerial merry go round, from Exeter City to Grimsby, on to Derby County, across to Hereford then on to Notts County, and despite all this he does not appear to have aged a year, and still as honest as they come.

One of the non League grounds that has impressed me this season is the new stadium used by Dorchester Town, who sold their previous ground to a supermarket chain. Their new stadium is adjacent to the former site and apparently received the seal of approval of Prince Charles. Whilst we all know His Royal Highness can get away with calling certain structures "carbuncles on the landscape", this certainly could not apply to the stadium occupied by Dorchester Town. One criticism I had, was that there was not a Supporters Club bar on the premises, for fans to met prior to and after the game for a bit of friendly banter over a pint! Anyway Prince Charles has probably never seen me in a bar, come to think of it I have never seen him at a football match - 'nuff

Another ground that caught my eye, was at Bashley, a little village in the middle of the New Forest, consisting of a village shop and a petrol station with two pumps. They play in the Beazer Homes Premier Division (Southern League), boast gates in excess of the village population, are heavily sponsored, have 20' boards sited

around all four sides of the ground, and new ones going up on a second level at £500 a time, and they even have a Stand on wheels!

These grounds certainly bring a breath of fresh air, compared to some of the Northern Fourth Division League grounds, which do leave a lot to be desired, not to mention their toilet facilities, that have probably been sited and unchanged since before the first World War!

Incidentally during my trips around the Country, I did visit Filbert Street, Leicester in February, when the snow was around, and took in the game Leicester City v Argyle, the result disappointing, the performance encouraging, but on that cold wintry evening any luck going never went Argyle's way, with City's first goal looking a blatant offside, unnoticed by the Man in Charge, in fact that just about sums up Argyle's luck on that cold wintry evening.



The police can then record what occurs on colour video and on hard copy prints. Individuals can be picked out by facial appearance and the colour of their clothing. The evidential effect of such a video recording has proved formidable. It has persuaded hooligans, who would previously have sought to challenge oral evidence of identification, to plead guilty. Hooligans know cameras are keeping a roving watch and their activities in the ground are inhibited by that knowledge."

The advantage of this table is that it reveals current form. If all clubs continue to function at the same level for the remainder of the season. Argyle will avoid relegation by three points.

Some surprising names appear among the leaders. Oxford United, for instance, were performing better than any other club in the Second Division. On this form, Oxford would finish in sixth place and qualify for the promotion play-offs.

On current form, Sheffield Wednesday will miss the three automatic promotion places. These would go to Oldham, West Ham and either of Brighton or Millwall who, on current form, would both finish with 80 points.

The four play-off places would be won by the loser of the Millwall-Brighton challenge plus Sheffield Wednesday, Oxford and Barnsley.

The important thing to remember is that the chart is based upon current form. So, if Argyle were to drop below present form, the club could well be relegated.

At this time of the season we tend to see clubs in danger lifting their game in a determined bid to escape the drop. At the same time, some of the leading clubs start to get the jitters. The table illustrates these points perfectly.

Watford, who have been in the bottom two for almost the entire season, have hit form at the right time and now look set to avoid the drop, at the expense of West Bromwich Albion.

Today's visitors Swindon Town have been hit by a number of body blows over the past year, the most recent being the loss of manager Ossie Ardiles and his assistant Tony Galvin.

Swindon have been out of form in recent weeks but the good news is that, even if their present poor run continues, they will finish level with Argyle and miss relegation to Division Three by three points.




