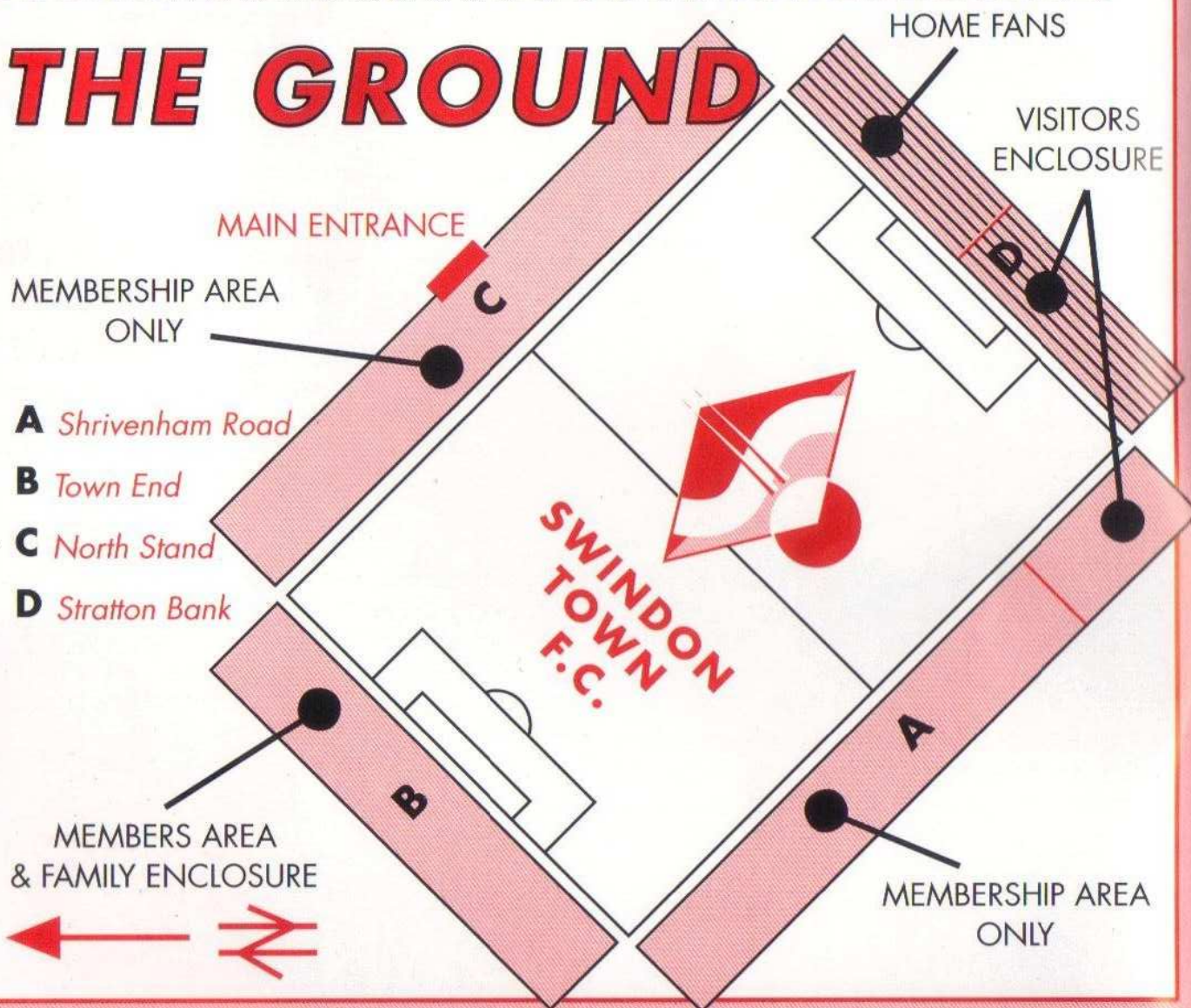


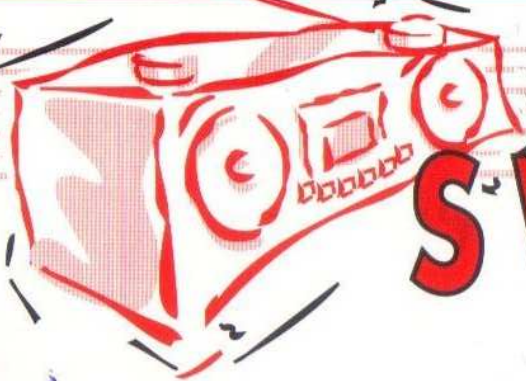

QUICK RETURN This afternoon we welcome back to The County Ground the players, officials and supporters of Leicester City Football Club for our first Barclays League game of the new season. It was back in April when we last met, with both teams struggling for second division survival - fortunately we both did, and here we are today!

BARCLAYS LEAGUE Next Saturday we make our first ever visit to Cambridge United's Abbey Stadium in the Barclays League where the kick off is at 3.00pm. Our next home League game is in two weeks time when we entertain Mel Machin's Barnsley, another team we met at the end of last season. Tickets for this game are on sale now from the Advance Ticket Office in the North Stand.

RUMBELOWS This coming Tuesday evening West Bromwich Albion are at The County Ground in the first round first leg of the Rumbelows League Cup Competition, kicking off at 7.45pm. The second leg is to be played at The Hawthorns on Wednesday 28 August 1991, kicking off at 7.30pm.

RESERVES Our Reserves kick off their new season on Wednesday 21 August here at The County Ground when they meet Reading in the Neville Ovenden Papers Football Combination kicking off at 2.00pm.

YOUTHS This morning the Youth Team met their counterparts from Brighton & Hove Albion in the South East Counties League. This season, all of our Youth Team games are being played at the excellent Allied Dunbar Training Centre which is located at King Edward Place in Wanborough. Next Saturday they travel to renew their local rivalry with Bristol Rovers.

TICKET SALES Ticket sale arrangements this season are similar to last, in so much as postal applications will be entertained four weeks prior to each game provided a stamped addressed envelope accompanies the remittance. However, postal applicants must

have their membership details listed. Telephone bookings, quoting either Visa, MasterCard or American Express details, will be entertained three weeks before each game but not in the 72 hours before kick off. Personal applications are welcomed two weeks in advance. Only Club Members will be permitted to buy seats. This is a ruling which will be strictly enforced this season. On matchday, ticket sales for the current day's game will be transferred to the Matchday Ticket Office near the County Road entrance. Casual ticket prices (juveniles/senior citizens) are: North Stand £8 (£4.50); £9 (£5); £10. Jewsons Town End Family Enclosure £7 (£3.50).

BENEFIT Nicky Coleman, who was with Swindon Town on loan in season 1985/86, has been forced to give up the game through injury and is having a benefit game this Tuesday evening, when Millwall take on Crystal Palace at The Den, kicking off at 7.45pm. Programmes at £1.50 (inc p&p) are available from Millwall FC.

There is always a buzz at this time of the year. No matter how long you have been in the game you can't help but be excited at the start of a new season.

All clubs will kick-off this afternoon with the same hopes and aspirations. Some will realise their dreams the majority will not.

As we all know nothing in this game is certain all we can do is our best. But although we cannot dictate the actual results of our games we can influence the outcome by the way we play and over this we do have some degree of control.

Football, as we know, is a team game and the team is not confined to the eleven men on the field wearing the Swindon shirt but includes you as well. We shall be looking to you for vocal backing and there will be no time we need it more than when we are behind.

This season you will see a Swindon team playing a passing game and we are taking this even one-step further than we used to play at Tottenham so you should be in for a few treats. It will be interesting to see how we adapt and if it works at this level. I'm sure it is the right approach for the strength of the team we have is it's passing ability. But it is going to be a new experience for our fans for you are going to have to be patient.

It is easy to applaud this style of football when the team are two-up but will you appreciate it when we are one-down? I hope so. For any anxiety felt by you on the terraces, and in the stands, will get through to the players on the field. They will then become tense and will stop doing what they have been asked to do.

There is a time and a place for the big boot in any game of course but our general approach is going to be based on a more precise pattern of play which I am sure you will enjoy in the long run.

It has been said that you can't get out of the Second Division playing football but that was not my experience with Spurs and last season's three promoted sides were all footballing teams. If our

technique is good enough it should overcome all styles of play. That is why I deliberately chose pre-season fixtures against opponents such as Leyton Orient, Reading, Cardiff and Aldershot; first division Dutch sides and Real Sociedad. It provided us with the full spectrum and what was pleasing was that against them all, the direct and the very technical, we kept our pattern both defensively and offensively.

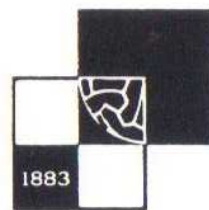
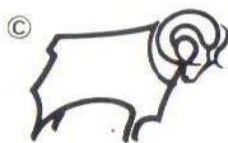
Over 7,000 of you turned out for the game against Real and we thank you for your support. It has been very encouraging and shows just what we can expect if we are successful.

It is somewhat ironic that we should commence the serious business against Leicester City for when we met them here April it was a real crunch match, a double header, in the battle to stay in Division Two. 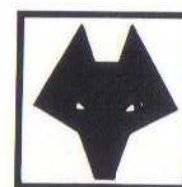

NEWS

During the close season it has been a somewhat turbulent time for Blackburn Rovers with rejected £2M bids for England striker Gary Lineker and Nottingham Forest new boy Teddy Sherringham who scored a remarkable 38 league and cup goals for Millwall last season. Rovers have however been successful in capturing Glasgow Rangers defender Stuart Munrow for £350,000 and former Barnsley striker Steve Agnew for a club record of £750,000 and although it appears that Director Jack Walker has limitless amounts of cash for the Ewood Park Club to spend it may prove difficult to attract top players to Lancashire.

In addition to the departure of Agnew, Barnsley who missed out on a play off place last season on goal difference to Middlesboro', have sold twenty one year old defender Carl Tiler to Nottingham Forest for £1.5M. Part of this money has been invested in former Leeds United forward John Pearson for a Tribunal set fee of £135,000 and Aston Villa reserve goalkeeper Lee Butler for £165,000. Colin Todd has stepped down from his managerial role at Middlesboro'. Of his departure Boro' Chairman Colin Henderson stated "Colin wanted to take all the decisions with no involvement from the board. Some of the buying in the past has been a disaster". It seems that the final straw was the wish from Todd to appoint former Northern Ireland and Plymouth Argyle coach Martin Harvey as youth team coach. The arrival of new boss Lennie Lawrence on Teesside has sparked a period of frantic transfer activity at Ayresome Park with Ian Baird joining Scottish Premier League side Hearts for £350,000 and defender Colin Cooper teaming up with former Boro' manager Bruce Rioch at Millwall for £300,000. Lawrence has however persuaded Republic of Ireland International Bernie Slaven and highly rated Alan Kernaghan to come off the transfer list and has brought Ian Ironside for £80,000 from Scarborough, full back Curtis Fleming from Irish League side St Patrick's Athletic for £50,000 to the club. Lawrence is also hopeful of attracting former Everton and Nottingham Forest striker Paul Wilkinson to Boro' from Watford although the £750,000 price tag quoted by Watford may prove to be a stumbling block. Following the shock departure of Lawrence from Charlton where he had been Manager for nine years, the South London Club have appointed Alan Curbishley and Steve Gritt to take charge of team matters in a continental style approach. A return to the Valley has however been temporarily delayed until the completion of refurbishment work and it is now anticipated that the first game back at the

Valley will be on September 14th against Portsmouth. Until then Charlton have arranged to play their home games at Upton Park.

New Manager at Leicester City, Brian Little, who steered Darlington from the Vauxhall Conference to the Third Division in successive seasons has a clear picture of his task. At Filbert Street saying "A lot of people still associate the club with being a First Division Football Club and yet they stayed in the Second Division last season by the skin of their teeth. My priority must be for us to become a side that Second Division teams have respect for." Little has been busy in the transfer market attracting Nicky Platnauer on a free transfer from Notts County, Ashley Ward from Man City for £80,000 and Kevin Poole from Middlesboro' for £100,000. Also joining the club is Paul Fitzpatrick from Carlisle for £40,000.

Third Division champions Cambridge United have snapped up a bargain free transfer in Gus Caesar from league champions Arsenal. A defender, Caesar made 44 League appearances at Highbury but has had to settle for a place in the Combination side in recent years. Southend United who were also promoted last season have signed Andy Sussex from Crewe Alexandra for a fee of £100,000 and have also signed former Ipswich, Portsmouth and Millwall winger Kevin O'Callaghan on a free transfer. Plymouth boss Dave Kemp, operating on a tight budget has signed the experienced defender Tony Spearing on a free from Leicester City and also Mark Quamina from Wimbledon again on a free transfer. Kemp has however paid an undisclosed five figure fee for Vauxhall League side Grays Athletic player Dwite Marshall.

Port Vale have spent part of the £1.5M income received from the sale of Robbie Earle and Darren Beckford on Martin Foyle from Oxford United for £375,000 and his midfielder Keith Houchen for £100,000. Another club to receive substantial transfer income this summer, Millwall have invested in Hearts and Scotland striker John Coquhourn, aged 27 for £400,000.

ALBION HERE ON TUESDAY

The season has no sooner started than we are into cup action with the visit of West Bromwich Albion on Tuesday night, kick-off 7.45 p.m., in the Rumbelows League Cup.

The Albion, demoted to the Third Division for the first time in their history on the final day of last season, are still smarting and looking to make a big impression on the new campaign.

A 1-1 draw at Bristol Rovers - their fifth successive 1-1 score - lost them their Second Division status. It was a match they had to win by a greater score than Leicester achieved over Oxford United.

But manager Bobby Gould is not one to let the grass grow under his feet and though the Baggies have only made one summer signing, that of Arsenal's Kwame Ampadu for £50,000, they have a lot of quality to call upon as they strive to regain their lost position.

Former England, and Spurs hero, Graham Roberts, epitomises the fighting spirit, that Gould will expect

his side to demonstrate here on Tuesday night; and his midfield battle with former White Hart Lane colleagues Glenn Hoddle and Micky Hazard should provide the highlight of the evening.

With Gary Robson, the younger brother of England skipper Bryan Robson, also in midfield Albion are certainly well equipped in this area. Up front they have the powered aggression of former Sunderland striker Colin West, who is looking for his 100th goal; and the thrustful pace of Tony Ford on the wing.

Like us West Brom have won the League Cup, their success coming in season 1965-6 when they beat West Ham United over two legs, and they see this season's competition as an opportunity to rebuild their tarnished reputation.

It promises to be a great night of football. Swindon Town v West Bromwich Albion . . . Glenn Hoddle v Graham Roberts! Don't miss it. This coming Tuesday in this stadium.

There were so many funny moments

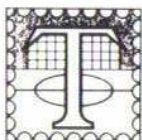

For those of you who assume football clubs go into hibernation during the summer months there is a shock. For behind the scenes it is one of the busiest times of the year.

This past summer has been no exception for the Club either with three new directors appointed to the board, three new players signed, and a host of alterations to the ground.

We welcome to the Board Sir Seton Wills Bt, who was educated at Eton College and the Royal Agriculture College in Cirencester. He manages the Eastridge Farms and Estate in Marlborough as well as the Glenavon Estate Banffshire.

Like, Mike Spearman and Cliff Puffett, the other two new directors, Sir Seton is a former member of the now disbanded Swindon Town Vice Presidents Club.

Behind the scenes we have also appointed Adrian Riddiford, who is well known in local schools football, as our Youth Development Officer, and will shortly appoint a Football in the Community Officer as well.

Swindon Town also have a new Marketing Manager, as we are sure you know, Mike Sullivan, who was previously with Watford, also had a spell with Tottenham (then who hasn't at the County Ground these days) and is a former circulation Manager with the Hendon Times.

On the playing side it took just £30,000 to bring Australian striker David Mitchell from Chelsea, and only £15,000 to secure midfielder Martin Ling from Southend United. While defender Shaun Taylor was signed from Exeter City for £200,000 . . . All three have shown good form in the pre-season matches.

Indeed, Dave Mitchell was a real hit in the Nieuwdorp Tournament, when he won a special trophy as the top scorer.

Having warmed up against VV Groede with a 13-0 victory, when Fraser Digby went in goal for the opposition - when the score was 11-0 he insists we point out we beat FC Goes 4-1 with two goals from Mitchell and two from White.

Mitchell was on target again in a 1-0 win over the

favourites FC Groningen, before

Vitesse, the holders, were beaten by a late Steve Foley goal in the final.

The summer has also seen significant alterations made to the County Ground with the old Rendezvous Club, the VP Club and Board Room, all replaced by superb lounges which are available for hire.

There have also been improvements made to the foyer and to the catering facilities situated throughout the stadium.

This afternoon also sees the opening of the new Jewson Family Enclosure which is already a huge hit with our supporters. This will provide the base for the Junior Robins Club.

Work has also commenced on the Shrivenham Road Stand which we are making safer. We have been waiting for the feasibility study before embarking on a major development in this area which will probably be undertaken next summer. The resurfacing of the Car Park is also in hand and this should be completed within a month so the County Ground is beginning to take on a fresher look ...

Finally how about the new strip? Smart eh! Replicas will be on sale from the end of next month.

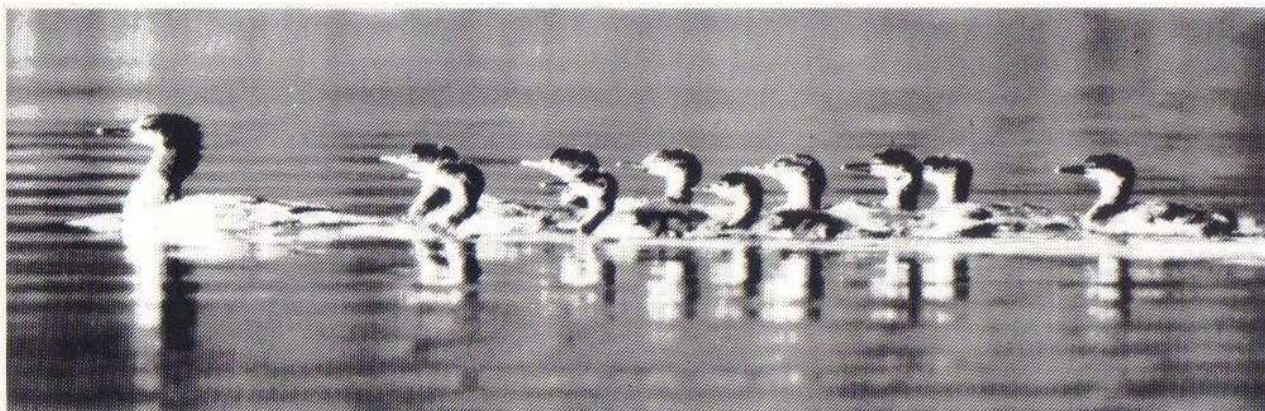

THE ABC OF LEICESTER CITY

PAUL FITZGERALD - *Central Defender.* Brian Little's first signing for the Club, he cost £40,000 from Carlisle in June 1991. The 25-year-old Liverpoolian is expected to operate as a sweeper. Previously with Bolton, Bristol City - played in the 1987 Freight Rover Final - and Preston.

COLIN GIBSON - *Fullback.* Experienced campaigner with an England 'B' pedigree. Made his League debut for Aston Villa v Bristol City (18-11-78), and made 185 League appearances before signing for Manchester United in 1986. Leicester snapped him up for £100,000 in December 1990.

COLIN GORDON - *Forward.* Needs little introduction having made a scoring debut for Swindon at Rochdale in November 1984. Netted 34 goals in 72 League appearances for us before moving to Wimbledon in 1986. A 28-year-old from Stourbridge, he is set to make his Leicester debut this afternoon - Leicester being his 11th League club.

TONY JAMES - *Central Defender.* Leicester's 'Player of the Year', he scored the goal that kept them in Division Two last May. Formerly with Lincoln City he is set to make his 75th pto.

THE MAN IN CHARGE

Brian Little arrived by helicopter at Filbert Street to take up his position as Leicester City manager at the end of May, and thus end months of speculation about who would succeed David Pleat.

Mr Little, 37, had guided Darlington from the GM Vauxhall Conference to the Third Division of the Football League in two seasons. As he signed a £50,000-a-year, three-year contract his former club demanded compensation.

The former Aston Villa striker - he scored 60 goals in 247 League appearances before injury forced his retirement in 1982 - played his last game at Old Trafford on 23rd April 1980. His final goal being the winner in a 2-1 result at West Brom the previous February.

Capped once by England Brian came on as a substitute against Wales in 1975. He won League Cup Winners' medals in 1975 and 1976, against Norwich City and Everton when he scored twice in Villa's 3-2 victory in the second replay at Old Trafford.





DES LINTON - Defender. Another Brummie, he is a product of the City youth scheme. Made his debut in April 1990 and added another handful of appearances last season. Will not be 20 until September.

GARY MILLS - Midfield. Former England Under-21 international, Gary won a European Cup winners' medal with Nottingham Forest, having made his debut against Arsenal in September 1978. Following a spell in the USA he joined Derby and then Notts County. City paid £275,000 for him in March 1989. Age: 29.

DAVID OLDFIELD - Striker. Hails from Perth, Australia, but served an apprenticeship with Luton making his League debut at Newcastle (2-4-88). Continued his career with Manchester City and arrived at Leicester in January 1990 in the deal that took Wayne Clarke to Maine Road. Age: 23. Has scored 12 goals for City.

KEVIN POOLE - Goalkeeper. Signed from Middlesbrough in July, he makes his debut in place of the suspended Carl Muggleton. Served his apprenticeship with Aston Villa and made his debut at Spurs (30-3-85). Had a spell on loan with Northampton in 84-85 and last year played some games for Hartlepool. Age: 28.

PAUL REID - Midfield. Looking for his 150th start for Leicester today, he has also made 21 substitute appearances. Paul was first introduced to the City side at Southampton in March 1987.

KEVIN RUSSELL - Forward. Made the grade with

Portsmouth - making his debut v Bradford City (3-5-86) - and established his scoring reputation with Wrexham. City invested £175,000 for his services in June '89 but an abdominal injury interrupted his progress. Had spells on loan with Peterborough and Cardiff as part of his recuperation and was granted almost 'cult' status by City fans when he returned to the side.

STEVE WALSH - Central Defender. Now in his sixth season at Filbert Street, having cost Leicester £100,000 to sign from Wigan. Made his League debut v Newport County in October 1982 and picked up a winners' medal in the Freight Rover Trophy in 1985. Age: 26. Steve has contributed 16 goals in 172 appearances for City.

ASHLEY WARD - Forward. Played in the 1989 FA Youth Cup Final for Manchester City and looked set for a bright future when he made three sub appearances for the first team in 1989-90. Tragedy struck in January 1990 when he damaged ankle and knee ligaments. Scored twice on a loan debut for Wrexham in his comeback and signed for Leicester in July for £80,000. Age: 20.

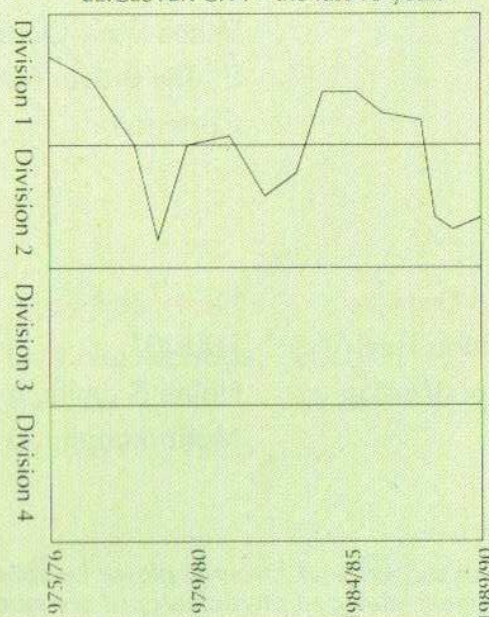
TOMMY WRIGHT - Midfield. A Scot from Dunfermline, Tommy was an apprentice at Elland Road making his debut for Leeds v Fulham (16-4-83). Joined Oldham in 1986 where he played an orthodox striking role and in August 1989 moved to Leicester for £300,000. A former Under-21 cap, he has revelled in a role as a left winger and hopes to make his 94th appearance for Leicester today.

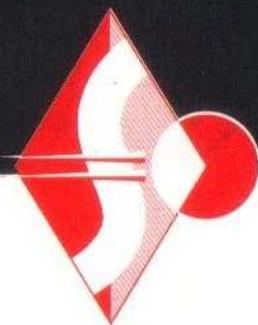

But Leicester went in at half-time on equal terms when Russell Osman capitalised on some sloppy Town defending, following a 37th minute corner on the left.

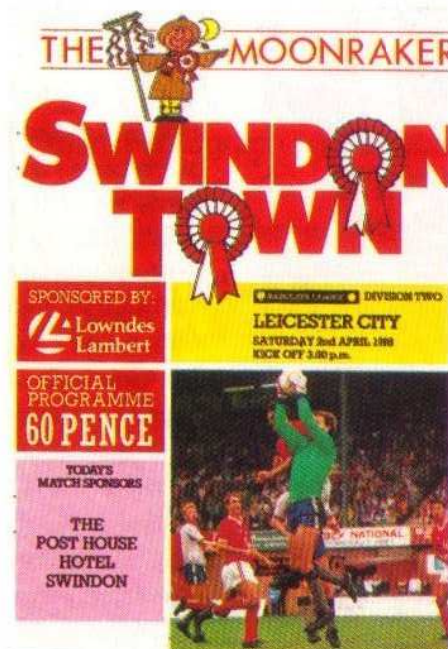

Gary McAllister pulled a goal back with three minutes remaining, but his side were unable to repeat the 'late show' that they had put on earlier in the season. Jimmy Quinn went close to completing a third hat-trick of the season in the dying seconds when Ali Mauchlen cleared a shot off the line. Quinn joined City on June 8 for a tribunal-decided £210,000.

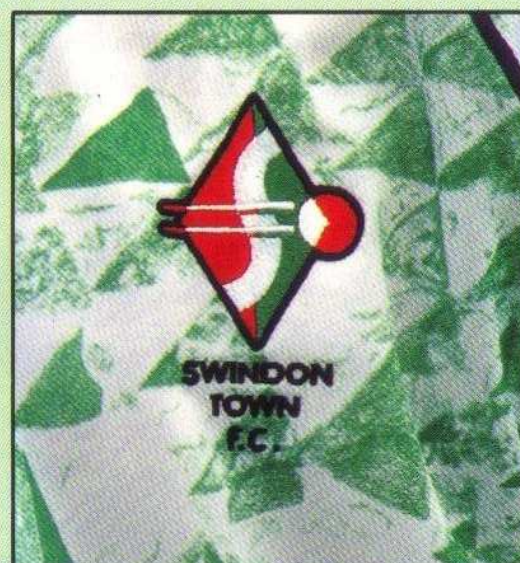

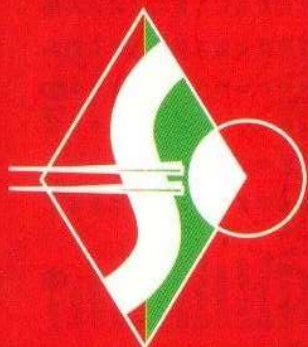
