

YOUTH TEAM



FANTASTIC. That was how I described our victory at Ipswich Town. To go to a club like that, who were in full stride and leading the Second Division table, and perform as we did was very satisfying.

It was a good game with a high standard of football and if there were any still harbouring doubts about our capability to contest the promotion race then surely they were dispelled that night.

We proved we can match and beat the best in the Division and do it in style.

In terms of football I felt we were even better last Saturday at Port Vale. Yet I spent the weekend reflecting on two points lost. Football wise we were excellent but we failed to put the chances away.

We could well have been three or four goals up at half-time. Port Vale must have thought it was their lucky day when they went in on level terms. Then after getting our noses in front with nine minutes to go we allowed our advantage to slip again.

If we don't do it this season and achieve promotion then it will be games like this one which we will reflect back on as the reason why. Nicky Hammond made some great saves early on and after that we dominated the play so I was very disappointed that we did not pick up all three points on offer.

On the positive side it is nice to see how well we are getting as a unit and how well we have coped with injuries. When Fraser Digby was ruled out of the game at Vale Park it meant we were without five first team members.

The result has been very encouraging because the lads who have come in have proved that the squad is as strong as we had hoped. This means that there is going to be a lot of competition for places which is a healthy situation to be in.

It has given me a lot more confidence in the potential of this squad and it has been interesting to see the different dimensions that are available. For example, Nicky Summerbee is an excellent fullback but when he was injured Adrian Viveash came in and offered us some other alternatives. Adrian does not have the pace of Nicky but he has a sweet left-foot and his height is very useful at set pieces. Each has different strengths that we can exploit within the system.

So this run of injuries has given me the opportunity to see what all the lads are capable of in match situations and I'm very happy with what I have seen.

This past week we have been able to take a breather, and re-charge the batteries, after a hectic schedule. But it is on with the show and two home games in four days.


So far we have turned on our best performances away from home but I'm hoping we can reproduce that standard for you this afternoon.



Middlesborough remain on top of the Division following three straight wins over Portsmouth, Oxford and Watford 2-1 last Saturday at Vicarage Road. The 2-1 victory at the Manor Ground over Oxford was Boro's first win away from Ayresome Park this season although they left it late with substitute Bernie Slaven scoring two goals in the last three minutes. Slaven who missed the opening games of the season through injury has also been a scoring substitute in the previous game against Pompey leaving new Boro' Manager Lennie Lawrence in a quandary "what am I going to do?. Slaven has waited his turn and grabbed his chance. Now I have a selection dilemma but I welcome it!" Slaven, who has six Republic of Ireland caps, has been top scorer at Ayresome Park for the last five seasons since joining the club from Scottish Second Division side Albion Rovers. The two goals for Boro' at Watford on Saturday were scored by Willie Falconer and Paul Wilkinson, both of whom had left Vicarage Road in the summer.

Leicester City attracted the divisions top crowd last Saturday of 17,815 for the visit of Bristol City to Filbert Street in a top of the table clash. Leicester, who won the game 2-1 have made a dream start for their new manger Brian Little being unbeaten in their opening five games and only conceding two goals in the process, the best defensive record in the Division, despite this first defeat Bristol City have made a fine start to the season and themselves attracted a crowd of over 20,000 to Ashton Gate for the derby match against neighbours Rovers. City won the game 1-0 with Wayne Allison scoring the all important goal although it took a fine save in injury time by City keeper Keith Welch, a summer signing from Rochdale, to deny a Rovers equaliser.

Ipswich Town beat Southend United 1-0 at Portman Road last Saturday with a 48th minute penalty after Gavin Johnson was brought down by keeper Paul Sansome who was fortunate to only receive a yellow card. Ipswich were beaten 4-1 by Swindon at Portman Road earlier in the week and this proved to be the last game for central defender Brian Gayle who has joined his former boss Dave Bassett at Sheffield United for a fee of £800,000. Of the departure. Town boss John Lyall was realistic "Brian has never really settled back in the south and the chance to play in the First Division meant that I had to let him go. We didn't really want to sell him but there are some offers, lam sure supporters will agree, are very hard to refuse. It's a good deal for Ipswich but this certainly does not mean that there are more big name departures from Portman Road."

Before the defeat at Ipswich, Southend had travelled to Cambridge and recorded a surprising 1-0 victory with ex Cambridge striker Ian Benjamin scoring a second half winner. The defeat ended a 21 match unbeaten home run for Cambridge and a disappointed John Beck did not hold back after the game "We were taught a lesson. They were much better than us. There was so much wrong with our game it's hard to pick out one major factor. Southend were

street wise, better in the air and better on the ground." Southend boss David Webb admitted changing his team's normal pattern to combat the Cambridge long ball style and he thought that exciting winger Andy Ansah was the match winner "We worked out a way of getting Andy in on them. He trightened them with his pace in the second half and I thought we ran the show after taking the lead." Cambridge bounced back after this set back with a 2-1 win at Millwall although Manager Beck is down to only 12 available players due to injuries and the suspension of star striker Dion Dublin for three games following his dismissal against Reading in the Rumbelows Cup.

The surprise sacking of Blackburn Rovers Manager Don Mackay has worked wonders for the clubs results. Rovers recorded their first win of the season with a 2-0 win at Derby County and gained a point at Roker Park last Saturday in a 1-1 draw with ex Liverpool striker David Speedie grabbing a goal in both games. Rovers Chairman Bill Fox said of Mackay's departure "I'm very sad that it has come to this however the club needs a change of direction" the media are linking Kenny Dalgleish with the vacant post which assistant manager Tony Parkes is temporarily filling. Mackay was understandably disappointed at the Boards decision "Rovers are my life and that has been taken away from me. It has been a blow to my pride although I am not bitter." Mackay did not leave Ewood Park empty handed with Rovers honouring the remaining two years of his contract and paid a further two years wages in respect to a roll on option that was available.

Tranmere Rovers remain with Leicester City as the only unbeaten sides in the Division following their 3-2 victory over Newcastle United at Prenton Park last Saturday despite top scorer John Aldridge missing a penalty, his second penalty miss of the season. There will however be no complaints of Aldridge's start on Birkenhead as the former Newport County, Oxford and Liverpool favourite has hit nine League and Cup goals in only seven games and is the top scorer in the Football League to date, two ahead of Barnet's Gary Bull, cousin of Wolves and England striker Steve Bull.

The hectic two-matches a week schedule continues with the visit of Bristol Rovers this coming Tuesday. The Rovers might have taken up residence at Twerton Park, Bath, but that does not detract from the excitement of a derby clash. They are sure to be well supported and in the great tradition of derby matches we can anticipate a tremendously competitive match. There is no doubt that the resignation of manager Gerry Francis, who quit to take over Queens Park Rangers, has been a severe blow and new boss Martin Dobson - recruited from Northwich Victoria - is still finding his feet.

On the playing front Ian Holloway's £230,000 transfer to Loftus Road obviously weakened the strength of the squad which has been supplemented by the signings of Richard Evans (Weymouth £30,000); David Wilson, a free from Manchester United, and Trevor Cadette from St Lucia Trinidad.

Rovers finished last season in mid-table but after a 1-0 defeat at Bristol City found themselves third from

bottom with just two points from four games in the current campaign.

They had kicked off the season with a rousing 3-3 home draw against Ipswich Town, having fought back a three goal deficit to level a thrilling game with two goals from White and one from Stewart. Alexander even missed a penalty!

A creditable 2-2 draw at Tranmere earned Rovers their second point. Today they play at Southend United.

But there is nothing like a derby game to draw out the best in a side. You can virtually throw away the form book when neighbour meets neighbour. Thus, Glenn and his lads will be looking for your vocal encouragement as they try to take another three points from the Rovers.

It will be all happening at this stadium on Tuesday night. Don't miss Swindon Town v Bristol Rovers. It will be much more than just a kick in the grass! The kick-off is 7.45pm.



The support we've had from you fans has been great and hopefully the gate for todays game against Sunderland will be a bumper one.



FRONT PROFILE

Soccer with a smile

As beads of sweat trickled from his brow there was no disguising the innermost satisfaction felt by Micky Hazard.

While the Ipswich Town team were locked in their dressing room Hazard and his colleagues were celebrating a marvellous victory over the League leaders on their own patch of Suffolk turf.

Orchestrated by the immaculate Glenn Hoddle, Micky had been one of the star soloists in an expression of fluid brilliance. The little man who in his formative days with Tottenham Hotspur found it hard to last 90 minutes was still making darting runs in time added on for injuries.

"The legs keep going," says Micky who laughs; "It's getting harder. We have had six games in eighteen days so obviously I'm feeling a little bit tired as most of the boys are. But you just keep going."

What's it like playing again with the 'old man' at the back?

"Well as you saw tonight there is nobody better on the ball. He gives us an extra dimension back there because you can ping a ball in at him at any stage when you are under pressure and he can calm it and slow it down and start things up again from the back. "We draw the opposition on to us, particularly when Glenn's got it, they push onto him and that leaves the gaps in behind."

He's given you a new lease of life has he?

There was a pause . . . "Well, I'll tell you at the end of the season. I need something after this hectic start I tell you."

Micky who through his outstanding career with Spurs and Chelsea was never a prolific scorer was on target at Portman Road.

He beams: "That's my third goal in six games. That's what I call a striker's average. One in two. Funnily enough from the moment Glenn arrived I played eight games at the end of the season and got five goals. So hopefully it will continue this way. In fact with a little bit of luck and a little more accuracy I could have had a second goal with my chip against Ipswich. I couldn't believe it went over. It was so easy for me but I just gave it a little bit too much."

The young man, who as a schoolboy played in the shadow of Roker Park, is obviously enjoying his football.

"I've always enjoyed my football," responds Micky. "Whenever I've been in the side I've tried to enjoy it at every club I've been to. Obviously you don't enjoy it when you play badly or you lose. But I have always tried to go out there and play football with a smile on my face. Play the game the way I feel it should be played and certainly the fans seem to appreciate this. So yes. I will always try to play with a smile on my face."

Reflecting on the team's success Micky reminds us: "We played some great stuff last season but didn't get the run of the ball. This season we seem to be getting the results to go with the football we are playing and it is very satisfactory."

Was the demolition of Ipswich the best performance of the season?


"In the League certainly," says Micky. "We didn't pass it as well as we can do but we battled and waited for the opportunities which we took. Probably the best football we have played was against West Brom in the Rumbelows League Cup. In both ties we played exceptionally well."

Hazard is too experienced a campaigner to get carried away on the form of a few games. The Second Division is a long long slog of marathon proportions and consistency rather than quality is perhaps the keystone to absolute success.

Micky has played in the white-hot heat of European competition. He has been hero and villain; super-star and the forgotten man. He has experienced all the emotions and yet his appetite for the game remains as ravenous as it did that day he packed his bags as a scrawny teenager in Sunderland and headed south for White Hart Lane.

There will always be a little of the North East in him and he admits to feeling a special tingle when he takes the field against Sunderland. The Roker roar perhaps is his footballing heritage, a legacy that will never desert him, it is the catalyst that spurs him to greater effort.

Always a great player of vision and perception he has over the years been victim more of his own inconsistency. But now at Swindon he has found a system that enhances all his natural instincts. This chapter of the Micky Hazard story could be his greatest and certainly his most rewarding.






DENIS SMITH played 14 years in the First Division for Stoke City, a tower of strength in the centre of their defence in over 400 games including the epic Football League Cup Final victory over Chelsea at Wembley in 1972.

He moved to York city as player-manager and became an instant success with a Fourth Division Championship success in 1984 though York's giant-killing act over Arsenal in the FA Cup earned them greater publicity.

When Sunderland appointed Denis as manager in December 1987 the club was at its lowest point in its history. He rekindled the flame by leading them to the Third Division title in 1988 followed, two years later, by promotion to Division One through the play-offs. The high life lasted but one brief season but Smith is confident he can retrace his steps to the top.

Completely immersed in the traditions of this great club he says: "You hear about this being the hotbed of soccer but until you have actually come and lived it there is no way you can really understand the intenseness... Everything in the town seems to centre on football."

THE ABC OF SUNDERLAND

GORDON ARMSTRONG - Midfield. Has clocked up over 200 appearances since his debut at West Brom in April 1985. Twice Sunderland's Young Player of the Year he is considered to be one of the best headers of the ball at the club. Born Newcastle 15-7-67.

BRIAN ATKINSON - Midfield. Made a sensational debut against Plymouth (4-4-89) and played in six First Division games last season when he was capped by England at Under-21 level. Appeared in the 1990 Play-Offs at Wembley. Born Darlington 19-1-71.

GARY BENNETT - Defender. Joined the apprentice ranks at Maine Road in 1979 but it was not until he had moved to Cardiff, on a free transfer, that he made his League debut v Wrexham (4-11-81). Was in the side which won promotion to Div 2 in 1983 and moved to Roker Park, for £65,000; in July 1984. Was in the Milk Cup Final team a year later and captained Sunderland to the Third Division title in 1988.

PAUL BRACEWELL - Midfield. Installed as the new skipper, Paul's career nosedived after injury kept him out of the Everton side for nearly two years. Had started his career with home-town Stoke City in 1979 and joined Sunderland in 1983 but after one season moved on to Everton for £425,000. Won League Championship and ECWC medals in 1985, as well as three England caps. Returned to Roker in 1989. Born Stoke 19-7-61.

PETER DAVENPORT - Forward. Another former England international he was with Everton as a youngster but Nottingham Forest spotted him with Cammell Laird. Ironically, made his debut at Anfield (1-5-82), and has scored 54 League goals when Manchester United paid £1 million for his transfer in 1986. Did not settle despite being top scorer in '87 and was sold to Middlesbrough for £750,000. Born Birkenhead 24-3-61.

MARCO GABBIADINI - Striker. Top scorer in each of his four seasons with the club he has played for England at Under-20, Under-21 and "B" levels. Started his career with York City, making his debut at 17 v Bolton (29-3-85) and Sunderland signed him for a bargain £80,000 in September '87. Won Third Division Championship medal - scoring 21 goals - and has proved an exceptional young player. Born Nottingham

20-1-68.

PAUL HARDYMAN - Leftback. A regular since his £130,000 signing from Portsmouth in June 1989. Played for Waterlooville while working as a carpenter; and was a leftwinger or midfielder until Bobby Campbell asked him to play leftback. Had made only 13 senior appearances when he was selected to play for the England Under-21 side v Eire in March 1985. Born Portsmouth 11-3-64.

THOMAS HAUSER - Striker. Rattled in 80 goals in his last four seasons in Swiss football where he played for F.C. Basle and Old Boys Basle. A strong physical attacker he moved to Roker Park in February 1989. Scored once in 10 first Division appearances last season. Born Schepfhaim 10-4-65.

TONY NORMAN - Goalkeeper. Welsh international who joined Sunderland for a club record fee involving a player exchange in December 1989. Was on Burnley's books for four years but did not make his League debut until February 1980 when he had joined Hull City and maintained a clean sheet against Millwall. Born Mancot 24-2-58.

RICHARD ORD - Central Defender. A product of the Roker youth scheme he made his debut in the 7-0 eclipse of Southend United (3-11-87); Sunderlands biggest victory in 31 years. An England Under-21 cap he played 14 First Division games last season. Born Easington 3-3-69.

GARY OWERS - Midfield. Has been a regular since his debut, at Brentford, 15-8-87, and can operate anywhere in midfield or in either fullback position. Born Newcastle 3-10-68.

COLIN PASCOE - Forward. Played in all four divisions of the League with Swansea after making his debut v Brighton in a Division One game in March 1983. Arrived at Roker in March 1988 and has represented Wales at youth, under-21 and full levels. Born Bridgend 9-4-65.

IAN SAMPSON - Central Defender. Signed from HFS Loans League side Goole Town after a trial period he made his debut, as a half-time substitute, at Millwall (24-8-91). Born Wakefield 14-11-68.


It is worth recording that Shack made an England comeback at 32, after five years without a cap - playing against Wales and, ironically, Germany who were the World Champions. England won 3-1, Shack scoring an inspirational goal. It was his last appearance.

'This was one of Swindon's greatest triumphs...' began R.C.E. in his Football Pink report of 28 years ago this month. For in the battle of the top two sides in Division Two, the Town had emerged victorious - and had equalled a 40-year old Football League record into the bargain, by remaining undefeated in nine games following promotion. In fact, this was their seventh win in those nine.

It was the first ever League meeting between the clubs and brought some big names to the County Ground. F.A. Secretary Denis Follows, League Vice-President Len Shipman and the England manager Alf Ramsey were amongst the guests. And the paying customers numbered 26,049 - another near capacity house.

There was a cautious start by both sides. Town manager, Bert Head, likened it to a boxing contest. "I thought we spent a lot of time sparring, trying to find their weaknesses", he said. "But we reached top form for a good 25 minutes in the second half, when we might have scored twice".

By then, the damage had been done as far as Sunderland were concerned. Left-winger Donald Rogers - still a month away from his 18th birthday - had laid on the only goal for Jack Smith in the 33rd minute.





Mark Lockyer broke away early in the second half to put us ahead with what proved to be the match winner.


A more positive and enthusiastic approach is required by some players before any individual or team performance will improve.


