




YOUTH TEAM


NO PARKING

Last week the ZDS Cup, this week the Rumbelows League Cup, and a tie which is interestingly balanced after our 2-2 draw at Millwall. As you know I felt that was a game we should have won and I'm sure that had we not been reduced to ten-men we might well have hung on to our two goal lead.

But all credit to Millwall they fought back gallantly and at one stage Nicky Hammond kept us in the game. He will not be fit to play tonight though his injury - torn stomach muscles - is not as bad as we first thought. In fact he hopes to be doing a bit of goalkeeping this week.

No one, including Nicky, is sure how he did the mischief to himself during the game with Watford which proved quite a lively match. There was a lot of wind and rain which made the conditions difficult but it seems Watford produced their best performance of the season. They had a lot of the ball but I felt the difference was that we showed more quality in our possession. In the end it could have been 5-1 to us had we made the best of all our chances. I think that maybe a lot of sides will produce their best performances against us. The system we operate means that we drop deep to make space and of course this is space that the opposition can use as well as us.

But I doubt whether there are any sides in the Second Division that have the passing quality we possess. It is a skill which runs throughout the team and it has been working very well for us.

Last week against Oxford United I started on the bench, which gave me the opportunity to watch the team from the sidelines, and I was impressed. We kept to our adopted pattern of play and I thought that Ross MacLaren looked very good in the middle. The fitness level of David Kerslake was extraordinary for someone who has been out with injury. He lasted right through extra-time and you could see why many sides in the Second Division are frightened of him.

Casting a professional eye over proceedings one could pick the Oxford game to bits but the entertainment and excitement value was tremendous. It was a bit like the old days in the sixties when the game was open and adventurous. I must say I would rather play in matches like this than indoor tactical chess games. I'm sure you would rather see football this way also.





Newcastle continue their poor start to the season which has seen the club win only one of their opening ten games. It took two late goals from Andy Hunt and Micky Quinn to earn a 2-2 draw at home with Derby, watched by former Geordie favourite Paul Gascoigne. Manager Ossie Ardiles is unable to sort his side's problems out by investing in new talent due to the club's debts, "It does not make my job any easier. I have to work with the players I have got. I do what I believe in and I believe it will be successful. The players have to keep believing too. We are playing some good football but not quality football. If we were we would be winning. But there is no crisis and the supporters, who are superb accept that, they are getting the message that it will take time."

It looks as though it may be another difficult season at Vicarage Road. Beaten 3-1 at Swindon recently, Watford have lost three of their opening four home games although manager Steve Perryman remains optimistic. "We managed to stave off relegation last season and the club wasn't in that state through bad luck - there were reasons for it. I had the opportunity during the summer to try and put some of those problems right. As yet there is a bit more work to be done although I am reasonably happy with the start time we have had. I think things are taking shape and there is a very good spirit amongst the players. It is a terrific club to work for and we just need to get a run of results and good performances to get people back to Vicarage Road and hopefully we can emulate some of the past glories of the Taylor era."

Southend United are creating a record that they could well do without. The penalty missed at Roots Halls last Saturday was the seventh consecutive penalty from which they have failed to find the net. Dean Austin was the player who missed, although Southend manager David Webb thought his side should have secured the game well before, "We had created some very good chances, in some cases easy tap-ins but we didn't take them - including the

penalty miss. We could rule the day but lets hope that we keep learning from these sort of games." Oxford United have found some form after losing their opening five games. Following their recent 2-1 defeat of Derby County at The Manor, United recorded their second win of the season beating a struggling Plymouth side 3-2. The Pilgrims were leading 2-1 with only three minutes remaining. However, two late slips by standin goalkeeper Dave Walter presented easy scoring opportunities for Paul Simpson and Dave Penny. Argyle boss Dave Kemp stood by his goalkeeper and could not believe the result. "I am not going to criticise him as he has done ever so well for us since coming into the side. You can criticise us for lack of quality but you cannot criticise us for lack of effort, team spirit and team play. We have given away three soft goals. They only had three shots and got three goals."

Oxford boss Brian Horton has cancelled the contract of 19 year old Republic of Ireland youth international Paul Byrne because of "persistent misconduct." Byrne, a former trainee at The Manor Ground played only five senior games for the club.

Middlesborough attracted their best gate of the season, 19,424 to Ayresome Park last weekend for the visit of neighbours Sunderland. Boro won 2-1 with Bernie Slaven and Paul Wilkinson both finding the net again to give Boro a four point lead over Ipswich at the top of the table. The average attendance in the division of 10,040 is down on last seasons average of 11,381 and has no doubt been affected by the promotion of crowd pullers Sheffield Wednesday and West Ham United.

CAN SHILT'S HALT THE ROBINS

They say there is no more dangerous beast than a wounded one and the Rams have certainly had their pride ripped to shreads this season.

This time last year Derby County were mixing it with the elite of Liverpool, Arsenal and Manchester United. Today they are struggling to maintain the pace in Division Two.

With Welsh striker Dean Saunders and England pivot Mark Wright sold to Liverpool for big bucks, and former England number nine Mick Harford returned to Luton, manager Arthur Cox is desperately trying to recruit replacements after winning just three of their opening nine fixtures in the League.

Beanpole striker Ian Ormondroyd, on loan from Aston Villa, and Bobby Davison - on loan from Leeds United - seem likely replacements after heroic performances fired Derby to a 3-1 win over Brighton. Davison, who had previously been at the Baseball Ground before his stay at Elland Road, registering his 99th goal for the Rams.

Both strikers seem to have thrived on the thrustful sorties and crosses of the flying Scot, Ted McMinn, as Cox reshapes his side following an encouraging start,

which produced seven points from the opening four fixtures; including a 2-0 win over Charlton Athletic at Upton Park - the Rams first away win for nine months, but then lapsed into confusion following successive home defeats by Southend United and Blackburn Rovers

A goalless draw at Cambridge United none the less emphasised Derby's defensive capabilities and with one of the greatest names in goalkeeping history, Peter Shilton, between the posts they will be a hard nut to crack.

'Shilts' who retired from the England side following the World Cup semi-final defeat by West Germany in 1990 is still a much respected figure. Now 42 he has played over 100 more games in the League than any other player in League history and what is more he is still producing the goods being named Man of the Match in Derby's 1-1 draw with Barnsley.

So it is the Robins attack against the Rams defence. Can Steve White and Duncan Shearer get the better of Shilts? To find out don't miss Swindon Town v Derby County at this stadium on Saturday 12th October at 3.00 pm. Sporting entertainment at its very best!




BURMAH 'MAN OF THE MATCH' AWARDS.

TOM JONES



Not Looking For Excuses

There are few more genuine guys in the game than Tom Jones. No doubt his failure to make the full professional ranks with his first club, Chelsea, and the three years he spent scratching a living as a tea and coffee vending machine service engineer has helped him appreciate the wonderful advantages of being a professional footballer.

"I used to spend hours driving from one job to the next longing to be back on the training field," recalls Tom, who was recommended to Chelsea when he was playing for the Aldershot Schools District side, by Tony Gibbs.

That was 13 years ago and after joining the Blues on Schoolboy forms then completing two years as an apprentice the young Jones was ready to make the big step up to the professional ranks.

Alas, unlike many of his supportive runs down the flank, his timing was out. Though Ian McNeil - now the assistant manager at Millwall - recommended he be offered a professional contract Ken Bates, who had just taken control at Stamford Bridge, ordered that no new signings should be made until he could assess the overall picture.

Tom was offered "silly money" to stay on until a decision could be made. He concluded that as he would be out of pocket he would quit the game, at this level, seek employment and play part-time.

So the vending machine job and a couple of years in the Isthmian League with Farnborough Town where he proved a successful winger. After a very brief sojourn with Woking Tom returned to Farnborough on condition that he would be allowed to play in midfield.

The current Gloucester manager, Brian Godfrey, enticed Tom to join him at Weymouth to fill the vacancy left by the sale of Andy Townsend to Southampton. Godfrey told him that if he produced the goods it would not be long before the big clubs were chasing Toms's signature too.

Reflects Tom: "There was a lot of travelling involved playing for Weymouth but Brian was as good as his word. I gained a cap in the England non-League side against Wales and was in the squad for a four-nation tournament but had to withdraw."

The reason for this was the interest of Aberdeen and Weymouth's unprecedented agreement to let Tom go to them for a week's trial. Ian Porterfield was duly impressed with what he saw and Weymouth benefitted to the tune of £30,000!

Tom made his Scottish League debut, as a substitute, in a goalless draw with Dundee in October 1987 and played his first full game in a 1-0 victory over Rangers at Ibrox Park.

Says Tom: "I played twice at Ibrox that season and we won both times. The team was packed with internationals, people like Jim Leighton; Jim Bett, Charlie Nicholas and Peter Nicholas, so I felt a bit out of place. But it was very enjoyable.

"I didn't get a game in Europe though I travelled twice with the squad for the games with Bohemians and Feyenoord where a certain David Mitchell knocked us out . . . the so and so.

"No Mitch was great. So good in fact that despite injuries they had him trussed up like a mummy to get him out on the field for the second leg."

When Ian Porterfield left Pittodrie Tom found himself out of favour, but not out of mind. Lou Macari had his name pencilled in and in September 1988 shelled out £80,000 to bring him to Wiltshire.

"I came as a midfielder and will always consider myself as one," says Tom. "It was Ossie who asked me to play at fullback but he wanted me to hold I don't mind playing there for Glenn as he gives everyone a licence to get forward and the way we play now I am more or less a winger.

"The goal I scored against Bristol Rovers was a feat in itself," laughs Tom who believes he should improve his scoring record - that being his first goal since September 1989. He says: "I always used to be a goalscorer from midfield . . . That's what got me into the Aberdeen side."

Tom believes this could be Swindon's year to make the big time but he does not subscribe to the theory that we should concentrate all our efforts into the push for the Premier League.

He says: "Those who suggest cup runs clutter up the programme and make it harder to gain promotion are simply making excuses. I want us to have a nice cup run. All the time you are playing and winning you are building up confidence. You begin to believe no one can beat you. You can only slip up on your own back. "I think we have a good chance against Millwall tonight. I felt the sending-off was significant in the draw there. Millwall are a good side but at home the gaffer tends not to worry about the opponents. He is more interested in what we do."

It's not unusual - surely - is it Tom?



A VERY WARM TO RTING A VERY WARM TO MILLWALL

THE LIONS ARE STARTING TO ROAR

Millwall were one of the sides fancied to be challenging at the top of the table rather than the bottom yet surprise at their early season inconsistency seems a little miscuided.

Following the sale of top scorer Teddy Sheringham to Nottingham Forest in the summer manager Bruce Rioch has invested much of the £2 m fee on new recruits. There were no less than six new faces in the starting line on the opening day of the season, when Millwall lost 1-0 at Middlesbrough, so it is not surprising that the team has taken time to settle.

Lately, however, there have been positive signs of improvement. The recovery from a two-goal deficit against us in the first-leg of this cup tie was heartening as was the follow-up. A 2-0 victory at Barnsley where Alex Rose scored either side of half-tine to clinch the Lions first away win of the season. Mr Rioch has been experimenting to find the best blend. Prior to our cup tie at the Denleft winger Phil Barber, a £100,000 signing from Crystal Palace, who had scored twice on his home debut against Sunderland, was dropped in tayour of Paul Stephenson while Ian Bogie got his chance when the impressive John McGlashan - a summer signing from Montrose - broke his ankle against Brighton early in September.

When David Thompson had to drop out after the opening five games the fit again Mick McCarthy was on hand to fill the breach in the centre of the defence and it is significant that up till last weekend at least, Millwall remained unbeaten since his first return to the defence.

Millwall come to the County Ground determined to end the cup jinx that has seen Swindon win all four of the previous cup encounters before this particular tie. Indeed, the 2-2 draw at the Den two weeks ago ended the Robins one-hundred per cent record over the Lions and there is a feeling at Cold Blow Lane that Town could be feeling the icy blast of defeat come the end of proceedings this evening.

Obviously Glenn Hoddle and his players will have other ideas in this our second joust with Millwall in the League Cup.

It was in round one in August 1975, that goals from Ken Stroud and John Trollope (penalty), gave us a 2-1 lead to take to the Den. Phil Summerill had given the Lions hope with his score but it was to be their only goal.

At the Den another penalty, converted by David Moss, gave us a 1-0 lead and

the tie by a 3-1 aggregate.

It was Millwall who took the lead from the penalty spot, when Steve Lovell shot home in the 22nd minute, of an FA Cup second round tie at the Den in December 1983. But Jimmy Quinn equalised and though David Martin restored the Londoners' lead Paul Batty levelled the scoreline and Quinn popped in the winner in the 75th minute.

Our only other cup confrontation was in the Zenith Data Systems Cup, here in 1989. Steve White set Town on the road to victory in the 31st minute and the unfortunate David Thompson made it 2-0 with an own-goal two minutes into the second-half. Gary Waddock pulled one back with 19 minutes to go but Swindon held on.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



BRUCE RIOCH was born in Aldershot, the son of a regimental sergeant major. He was to develop into an outstanding wing-half with Luton Town and furthered his career with Aston Villa, Derby County, Everton, Birmingham City, Sheffield United, Seattle Sounders and Torquay United where he became player-manager. He made some 544 League appearances and was capped 24 times by Scotland, being a member of the 1978 World Cup Finals squad.

Appointed manager of Middlesbrough in February 1985, he overcame a financial crisis to lead 'Boro from Division Three to Division One in successive years.

In March 1990, just two weeks before 'Boro were to play their first ever Wembley Final - in the ZDS Cup - Bruce was axed. But within a couple of months he was installed as Millwall's new boss, and last season led the Lions to the play-offs.

THE ABC OF MILLWALL

CHRIS ARMSTRONG - Striker. Signed in the summer from Fourth Division Wrexham for £75,000. Scored his first goal for the Lions against Swindon in the Rumbelows League Cup a fortnight ago. Born Newcastle 19-6-71.

IAN BOGIE - Midfield. Another summer signing. Ian was in the same Newcastle youth team as Paul Gascoigne and made the first of his 40 odd games for the Magpies at Luton (30-8-86). Moved on to Preston and was out of contract when Bruce Rioch moved in. Born Newcastle 6-12-67.

JOHN COLQUHOUN - Striker. Another close-season signing John came south from Heart of Midlothian for £300,000. In six years at Tynecastle Park John made 284 appearances (40 goals) including 17 games in Europe. Capped by Scotland he started his career with Stirling Albion and was with Celtic for a while.Born Stirling 14-7-63.

COLIN COOPER - Fullback. Transferred from Middlesbrough for £300,000 in the summer the former England Under-21 international has been installed as skipper. Made 191 appearances for 'Boro (6 goals) having made his debut at Crystal Palace (8-3-86) Born Durham 28-2-67.

AIDAN DAVISON - Goalkeeper. Released by hard-up Bury at the end of last season Aidan cashed in on injuries to Branagan and Horne to make his debut on the opening day of the season at Middlesbrough. Notts County signed him in 1987 from Billingham Synth., and he made his League bow in a 3-0 defeat at Preston (15-4-89). Born Sedgefield 11-5-66.

IAN DAWES - Fullback. Started his career with QPR, making the first of his 229 League appearances at Rotherham (27-3-82). Joined Millwall for £150,000 in 1988 and has now clocked up over 100 games for the Lions. Born Croydon 22-2-63.

MARK FALCO - Striker. Top scorer for Spurs in his last three seasons at White Hart Lane - he joined Watford for £350,000 in October 1986 after a short loan spell with Chelsea. Scored on his Spurs debut, at

Bolton (May 1979), and became the first Watford player to net a hat-trick on his home debut (v Aston Villa). Moved to QPR in 1987, then Glasgow Rangers. Returned to Loftus Road, scoring 5 goals in 20 First Division games last season. Signed for £175,000 in August. Born Hackney 22-10-60.

PAUL KERR - Midfield. Hard working dynamo. Came into League football at Leicester (14-4-84) when he made the first of his 24 appearances for Aston Villa. Joined Middlesbrough in 1986-87 and signed for Millwall last March. Born Portsmouth 9-6-64.

MICK McCARTHY - Central Defender. An inspirational defender, he captained the Republic of Ireland in the World Cup Finals 1990. Born and bred in Barnsley he had made 430 appearances for Barnsley, Manchester City, Celtic, Lyon and Millwall before the commencement of this season. Born 7-2-59.

ALEX RAE - Midfield. Scored 12 goals and earned the manager's Young Player of the Year award in his first season in League football. Signed from Falkirk for £100,000 in 1990.Born Glasgow 30-6-69.

PAUL STEPHENSON - Winger. Loves to hug the line. A good crosser of the ball he started his career with Newcastle United making his debut v Southampton (14-12-85). Made a scoring debut from Millwall at Liverpool in November 1988. Born Wallsend 2-1-68.

KEITH STEVENS - Defender. Worked his way through the ranks making his debut at Oxford (29-4-81). Had clocked up 288 games by the commencement of this season and is now the longest serving player on the books. Born Merton 21-6-64.

STEVE WOOD - Central Defender. Has been at the heart of the Lions defence since his signing from Reading four seasons ago. Served his apprenticeship at Elm Park where he played for eight seasons. Born Bracknell 2-2-63.

Says Mark: "I had no reservations at all about moving about from a First Division club to Millwall because they are a very good team. You have not seen the best of us yet."



1975

August 19: Swindon Town 2 Millwall 1

Millwall and Swindon last met in the League Cup when two legged ties were first introduced for 1975/76. The Lions had just been relegated from the Second Division and had six new signings on show for this First Round First Leg encounter at the County Ground. Conversely, there were no new faces in the Town ranks and they were unchanged following an opening day home defeat by Chesterfield three days before. The Londoners began brightly but Swindon were first to strike, in the 24th minute. David Moss sent over a corner-kick, Colin Prophett flicked it on and Kenny Stroud drove the ball home right-footed from a few yards out. Millwall then stepped up a gear and it was no surprise when, after seeing a header come back off a post, Phil Summerill forced an equaliser five minutes before half-time. Jim Barron might have done better when the ex-Birmingham striker sent in a probing 30-yard shot, but he allowed the ball to elude his grasp on a wet surface and it squeezed into the far corner of the net. But the keeper then atoned for his error with two crucial saves to allow Swindon to go in all-square at the interval.

Former Spurs star Frank Saul continued to dictate matters in midfield after the break, but Millwall allowed the Town to pull themselves back into the game and Saul became the villain with three minutes left to play. He handled a goal-bound Joe Butler effort and Swindon were awarded a penalty. With Moss having missed from the spot in the Chesterfield defeat, John Trollope stepped up to send the ball crashing into the net. Trevor Anderson

went close in the dying moments, but a 2-1 advantage to take to The Den was more than the Town deserved on the night.


However, it was a different story in the Second Leg. Stroud kept a tight rein on Summerill and the Lions were restricted to only two clear-cut chances. Anderson hit a post and mid-way through the second-half, Swindon were awarded their second penalty of the tie. John Trollope again took the kick, but saw it saved by Ray Goddard.


The referee ruled that the keeper had moved and ordered a retake and this time Moss blasted the ball home for a 1-0 victory for the Town.



Fitzroy Simpson wins a 'fifty, fifty' ball from United.






Duncan Shearer opens the scoring against Watford.
