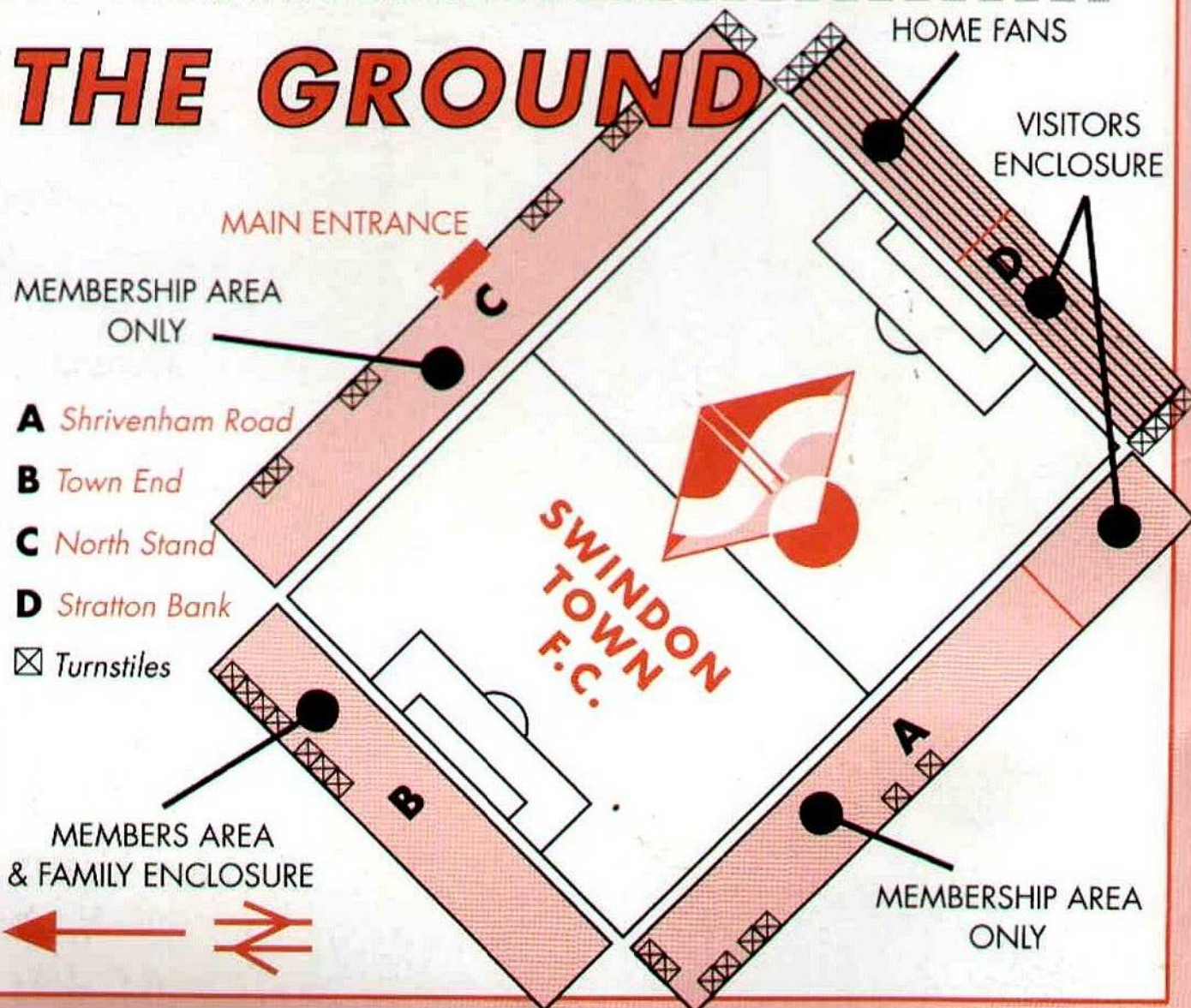

YOUTH TEAM

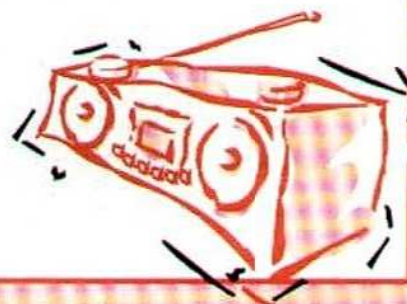

We were more than a little unlucky not to secure a win at Tranmere last week. The lads played exceptionally well and when I tell you that we created ten chances to Rovers three you have an indication of just how impressive we were.

Yet it resulted in two more lost points giving us statistics of two defeats and two draws in the last four games. Hardly the stuff of champions. However, in each case our performance has warranted greater dividends.

Our fortune will turn I am sure. All we can do is keep playing and believing in our system. Every team has an off-patch during a season and the encouraging thing from our point of view is that despite dropping points we are still fourth in the League table.

Our last home result against Portsmouth was a set-back. Having got ourselves into a winning position we let it slip in the latter stages of the game. had a good full week so I will be looking to get a game in the reserves next week. Two players who have made successful comebacks at this level are David Mitchell and Martin Ling who played in our reserve games on Monday and Wednesday.

It is important at this stage of the season that we get a fit and strong squad together. We have a heavy schedule coming up to Christmas with three games in six days - two of them away at Bristol City and Barnsley.

It was a little frustrating that Crystal Palace and Birmingham City were not able to sort their Rumbelows League Cup tie out in the replay. A third game has meant the postponement of our tie against the winners and this could give us a back log of fixtures which is something we wish to avoid if possible.

Still it could be worse. It could be us involved in the replays!

Still the cup is something to look forward to. In the meantime it is down to Second Division business. It is important that we get a good result this afternoon against Grimsby - a team I have not seen although I have some reports on their form.

What we do know is that there are no easy games at this level and we shall be looking to you for your vocal encouragement throughout the match. Keep cheering and supporting but above all enjoy your afternoon with us.

NEWS

Derby County have shown their promotion credentials with a fine run of results, which was continued at Bristol Rovers last Saturday with Bobby Davidson snatching a 3-2 win for the Rams in the last minute. Ted McMinn is looking forward to playing in the top flight again. "When Saunders and Wright left the Club we were all disappointed because they are great players. That was made worse when Mick Harford left for Luton. For the first six games we struggled and, at times, it was pointless crossing the ball because we didn't have anyone who would get on the end to score. But the boss has brought Bobby Davidson and Ian Ormondroyd in on loan and we have gone from not having a target man to someone who's impossible to miss. We've still got players good enough for the Premier League and we'll be disappointed if we don't get promoted at the first attempt."

The anticipated move for Franz Carr from Newcastle to Crystal Palace has been put on ice for the time being. The former Nottingham Forest winger had agreed a move to Selhurst Park in exchange for full back Paul Bodin and an amount of cash, but injury has caused a problem. Newcastle Manager, Ossie Ardiles, said of the hold up, "The deal with Palace is dead for the time being. Carr's knee injury is giving cause for concern".

Middlesbrough's new signing, £750,000 Andy Payton, took only four minutes to get off the mark in Boro's 3-1 win over Bristol City at Ayresome Park last Saturday. Payton scored 55 goals in 160 appearances for the Tigers and, at the age of 25, looks to have a fine future.

Following the sale of Tony Mowbray to Celtic last week for £1m, Middlesboro' boss, Lennie Lawrence, is experiencing a new feeling. "I've never had so much money to spend. If I said I wanted to buy three players and it would cost two million pounds, I'd be given the money.

At Charlton I had to keep selling players simply to try to balance the books. I'm sure that if I'd stayed at Charlton I would have ended up as General Manager - and I'm too young for that." Lawrence is also finding a different type of supporter up on Teesside. "The passion and intensity of support is amazing. In London there are so many alternatives to

soccer - the game means a lot more to people in Middlesboro'."

Bristol Rovers' striker, Devon White, feels his talents could be displayed in the First Division and is keen to be given the opportunity. "I know that a few clubs have been taking an interest in me and after five years at Rovers, I want to play at a higher level. I think I could adapt as I feed off others and pick up the bits and pieces. The style that a lot of teams play nowadays would suit me." White has netted 50 times in only 180 games for Rovers, including 7 already this season.

The debate over differing styles of football continues, with Cambridge remaining at the top of the Second Division - the envy of many managers who have spent fortunes to gain the same success without any joy. Ipswich Town are such a side, although Town boss, John Lyall, with a long reputation for 'good' footballing sides, takes a refreshingly balanced view of neighbours Cambridge. "There will always be debates and quite right too, but I always like to think that one of the great fascinations of the English game is the different styles that are mixed together. John Beck has been successful at Cambridge because he has looked at the players available and decided that they are right to play this sort of football. Whichever way you play, it is up to you to impose your style on the opposition."

Bristol City boss, Jimmy Lumsden, is determined to hold on to his top striker Wayne Allison, who has hit seven League goals already this season. Lumsden thinks highly of his striker, signed from Watford two years ago. "Wayne deserves any luck that comes his way because he gives 150% for City. He's a difficult player to play against because of his strength and pace. He knows what aspects of his game he has got to work on and he can only become a better player."

The Oxford Challenge

As the season grinds on so the race for points gets hotter as Town maintain their challenge for a place in the Premier Division next year.

The Second Division Championship has not been as open as this for years, the leadership changing almost weekly, as the battle ranges from Ayresome Park to the County Ground.

There are at least thirteen clubs still in serious contention for promotion so there can be no let-up as the marathon gains momentum, and our lads face one of their sternest tests, thus far, when they travel to second placed Middlesbrough for the match of the day, next Saturday.

'Boro give little away on their own plot, having won nine and drawn two of their 11 home games. They share with Portsmouth the reputation of having the meanest defence having conceded just three goals in front of their home fans.

Following the long haul to the north east it is back to the County Ground for our second meeting here with Oxford United.

Those of you who came to watch our Zenith Data Systems Cup tie with the U's will recall a fiercely entertaining encounter with Oxford levelling at 3-3 in the final minute of extra-time.

We won the match on the penalty shoot-out but there will be no such reprieve available on Saturday week when nothing short of three points will be seen as a success.

Oxford are having a sticky run in the Second Division, despite last week's convincing 3-1 victory over Brighton they remained rooted on the bottom rung of the ladder. Yet they have scored 27 goals - just one short of Middlesbrough's tally.

Their problem has been a leaky defence that has shipped 36 goals but this aspect of their play is being tightened up and with midfield wizard Jimmy Magilton - who turned his back on a career at Anfield - in sparkling form they will make it another keen contest.

Six goals netted last time we met how many will it be this time? To find out make a date with us on Saturday 14th December at three o'clock. It is **Swindon Town v Oxford United** and with any luck it could see the return of that master craftsman Glenn Hoddle... *Could be a game to remember so don't miss out and remember its all ticket.*

NICKY SUMMERBEE



A CHIP OFF THE OLD BLOCK.

The name of Summerbee will be forever synonymous with success at Swindon Town. Those older fans still remember well the gritty determination and no small amount of flair of Mike Summerbee in the early sixties. Now a new generation, from the same family, has taken the stage, and Manager, Glenn Hoddle, believes that son Nicky could become a real favourite with Town fans.

After trials with Norwich City and Leicester City, Nicky chose to join Swindon some four years ago.

He came here as a centre-forward and has only really converted to fullback this season under the guidance of the boss.

"I like it very much at the back," smiles Nicky. "I was originally a centre-forward and found it a very difficult position. You tend to have your back to goal so often, with a defender right in your shadow. And you are not only expected to control the ball when it comes to you but hold it up, play other people in, and score goals as well!"

"Where I am now, the whole game is in front of me. It is much easier. The way we are playing now it is more of a left-wing role anyway, so I am given the freedom to attack. I have the whole of the left side to myself at times."

Defending is not a natural tendency for Nicky but he has worked hard at this aspect of his game and despite the fact that he is right-footed has not had the slightest problem adjusting to his given role.

"I'm not a natural left-footer but I am getting by," says Nicky with an air of confidence in his voice. But what about the traditions of the Summerbee legend?

"That makes no difference to me," he grins contentedly. "I was very young when I saw my dad play for Manchester City. He looked like he could play a bit. But I never felt anything for City. I was a United fan at heart."

Unlike most youngsters who made the grade Nicky played very little schoolboy football. He was educated at a private school that gave little

importance to sport. Yet he knew what he wanted to become.

"I wasn't pushed at all by my parents," he says: "They took the view that I either made a footballer or I didn't. It was up to me."

"They gave me help in the early days here when I had some bad times. It seemed a long long way from home."

Where does Nicky consider his roots are set? "Stockport. But Swindon is a great place to be at the moment. The whole club is bubbling and it is great to be part of it."

The youngster's performances so far have provided an important contribution to the team's success but there is one night he wants to forget at Millwall.

Town were two-goals up in the Rumbelows League Cup tie at the Den when Nicky was shown the red card. His colleagues battled on to earn a 2-2 draw but when the Lions took the lead in the return tie at the County Ground his heart was in his mouth.

"I felt bad at Millwall," he admits. "I had let the other lads down because I got carried away. But Glenn and the boys were brilliant about it. The manager simply told me to learn from my mistake."

"I have to keep calm and this is in the back of my mind every time I take the field now. I'm learning about this game all the while and there is so much to take in."

A player of style he has that same single mindedness that was the hallmark of his father. Nicky, like dad, has designs on playing in the Premier League one day and believes that he could realise his ambition with this Swindon side.

He says: "It is a joy to play in this team. Glenn has given so much to our game I think we could do well in the higher grade."

If young Nicky develops in the same ways as his father here I have no doubt he will command a larger valuation than the modest £32,000 the Maine Road club paid us in August 1965 for his father.

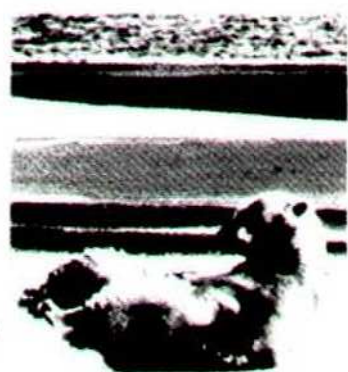

When Grimsby Town earned promotion from Division Three last May, their immediate objective was to establish themselves once again as a Second Division force.

The early indications were encouraging - a 3-4 defeat at home to Cambridge United on the opening day of this season could well have swung in their favour and victories over Oxford, Bristol Rovers, Plymouth and Sunderland, as well as Rotherham in the Rumbelows League Cup, augured well.

Confidence was further boosted when they eliminated Aston Villa from the League Cup. But then results began to turn against them, and last Tuesday's 2-1 defeat at Molineux was their ninth in Division Two in a run which has seen them eliminated from the F.A. Cup by Blackpool (the Seasiders' winner coming from former Town star David Bamber), ousted from the Rumbelows League Cup by Spurs, as they claimed just two wins from their last League and Cup games.

THE MAN IN CHARGE

Since the arrival of *ALAN BUCKLEY* in June 1988, the Mariners' fortunes have been transformed. He has taken the Club to two successive promotions and to the 5th Round of the FA Cup.

Alan began his playing career with Nottingham Forest but it was at Walsall where he really came to prominence, scoring 174 goals in 423 games. He took over the Sadlers and led them to a Milk Cup semi-final and had a short time with Birmingham City before returning to Walsall. Then had a spell in charge of Kettering Town before his arrival in Cleethorpes.

BENNO'S BRIEF



The consistency of Cambridge United, who are now leading the Second Division charge towards the Premier League, has certainly made people sit up.

If you believe football "is the beautiful game", as indeed it is when played by Swindon Town, then the unhealthy diet served up by Cambridge United only serves to destroy the belief. You begin to wonder if the classic approach is nothing short of an illusion.

John Beck, the Cambridge manager, is irritated by the criticism levelled at his team. He claims, "We're just trying to score as many goals as possible."

It is true that Beck's side have got the big-hoof game down to a fine art and he can rightly claim that his system is successful. Just look at the facts. When he took charge 22 months ago Cambridge were 15th in the Fourth Division. Since then they have won promotion in two successive seasons, the last as Third Division Champions, and now sit on top of Division Two.

But is this really the way to set about developing a Club? It seems to me that this 'win at all costs' attitude is rather soulless. There is surely more to the game than just collecting results.

I pointed out to Cambridge fullback Andy Fensome that he did not learn to play football that way when he was a youngster with Norwich City. He agreed and said he didn't enjoy it. But that it has brought him individual honours in the way of championship medals and an appearance at Wembley. The end justified the means.

The frightening aspect from the purist point of view is that footballing sides find the Cambridge diet very hard to master. As Micky Hazard says: "You can't get hold of the ball because it is continually in the air. They just make it so hard to do anything constructive."

One can only hope, for the sake of the game, that Cambridge don't attract too many imitators. In the meantime few will be sorry to see them toppled from their current position.

The 1994 World Cup competition is going to be the biggest yet with a record 140 Associations taking part for a place in the finals in the USA.

Swindon had three days earlier returned from a League Cup encounter with First Division Stoke City in the Potteries, having forced a draw.

The Town fielded an unchanged line-up, but Chic Bates took over from Chris Kamara on the bench, with the midfielder being selected for a Combination outing.

Grimsby had the better of the early exchanges, with little Joe Waters - the Republic of Ireland midfielder - prominent. But it was Swindon who took the lead in the 28th minute. Billy Tucker challenged for an Andy Rowland cross, but visiting centre-half Clive Wigginton was adjudged by stand-in referee Alan Seville to have handled. Up stepped Ray McHale to send keeper Nigel Batch the wrong way from the spot, his second successful penalty in successive League games.

Swindon made a brighter start to the second half and added a second goal in the 58th minute.

A Brian Williams effort was blocked but a quick-thinking Roy Carter netted the rebound through a gap between covering defenders on the post.

And it was all over for Grimsby three minutes later when the Town struck again. An Ian Miller

corner was flicked on by Tucker to the Third Division's leading goalscorer, Alan Mayes, who headed home for his tenth of the season. Mayes, Rowland, Carter and McHale all went close in the final half-hour, but all were denied by Batch. The result thus ended the same as the previous five encounters between the clubs at the County Ground - a home win.

The victory took Swindon up to fourth place in the table and dumped Grimsby into 17th. But the defeat did the Mariners little long term damage, as they soon recovered to win the Championship of the Division by three points in the following spring. Alas, Swindon finished tenth, with fifteen away defeats telling an all too familiar tale.

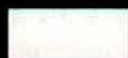
