



YOUTHS


This Saturday morning the Youth Team meet Bristol Rovers in the South East Counties League at Wanborough kicking off at 11.00am.



First and foremost, a Happy New Year to all...now this is the day, of course, when tradition has it we should make our resolutions and set our sights on the coming year. Personally, I have never been one to subscribe to this routine - it is just another date on the calendar as far as I'm concerned. More to the point, a date with Millwall. A game to be won.

Any resolutions we made should have been done last August when we set out in quest of promotion. Hopefully, by the time this game is over, we shall find ourselves nicely placed in the promotion race.

As a player, I was used to facing either West Ham or Arsenal on New Year's Day, but in France, we had a break during this period. A mid-winter break is something I would advocate. We could not close down over Christmas and the New Year of course because these are times when football enjoys bumper gates. But I do think that a two-week rest in January would be good, not only for the players, but for the fans as well.

It not only recharges the batteries of the players but whets the appetites of the spectators too. It works quite well in France and I see no reason why it should not work here.

The first season I played in France, the Christmas break lasted a month. This was far too long. After a couple of weeks off we were back into another pre-season routine and finished playing five more games than we would have fulfilled had there been no stoppage.

The lesson was learned and the following year it was cut to two weeks, like the Germans have, and this proved very successful to all concerned. Perhaps it will happen here eventually.

Whether it does or doesn't makes no difference to the holiday schedule, and there is no doubt that Christmas and the Easter

period are crucial times for us. When you have so many games in a short spell of time, it can sometimes make or break a promotion challenge.

Silly little things like playing in the morning can put players off track, and tired players also become more prone to injury, so the balance is sometimes distorted. This is a time when the depth of your squad is really put to the test.

We kick off the New Year with hopes high, but Millwall are not a side to be underestimated. They have enough ability in the club to turn any side in Division Two over. You are never sure how they are going to perform. But they are a team to be respected. I feel sorry for them sometimes because their home crowd put them under a lot of pressure at times. They expect a lot from their team and are not slow to show their displeasure when things go wrong. It is a lesson for every supporter really. There is nothing like the cheers of encouragement to inspire your favourites. We are lucky in this respect. Our supporters have been tremendous this season.

After slipping out of the Rumbelows League Cup as we did, we needed a boost in the League...The way we gifted Palace the goal was so upsetting. I didn't fancy them scoring apart from then. And, in the second half, we proved to be a far superior footballing side. But again, we didn't take our chances and that stretched us to seven games without a win; a situation we could not tolerate. It meant changes against Ipswich, a match in which I was planning to return. But in a hastily arranged friendly reserve game at Bristol City the day before, I felt all was not right and decided to postpone the comeback. Maybe I will be back today. Whatever develops, I'm happy that we have a squad here that you will be proud of during the coming year.

Sunderland's new £900,000 striker Don Goodman made a favourable impression in his Roker debut, scoring in the last minute to give his side a 1-0 win over Leicester City. Goodman, who scored 60 goals in 157 appearances for West Bromwich, is hoping to steer the Rokermen into the Premier League. "I have signed a three year contract and I would not have joined if I didn't think Sunderland had a chance of returning to the First Division before that expires. The fee does not bother me and I just hope that I can justify the faith Denis Smith has placed in me by scoring the goals that will get the Club out of the Second Division."

North East neighbours, Newcastle United, have found yet another young star in Lee Clark who, at only 19, has been earmarked for a bright future in the game. However, unlike past Geordie proteges, Clark has no immediate intention to seek his fortune elsewhere. "I'm ambitious, but I want to succeed with Newcastle as I'm happy here and don't want to leave. My family live in Newcastle and my friends are here and, anyway, you couldn't find better fans to play for. So I have no intentions of leaving. I recently signed a three year contract which will keep me at St. James' until 1994 and, as far as I'm concerned, I'll sign another one after that."

The third North East side in the Second Division is Middlesbrough, where Manager Lennie Lawrence has spent £1.84 million rebuilding his side. I have whatever I can justify to spend but I'm not going to fill the place up with old players. I'm building a young team and expectations for promotion are high. We've got to have a chance of promotion but we must play better for long spells and get more consistency. The players have got the skill but sometimes they think that skill is everything - and it isn't. It must be allied to

other qualities." 'Boro are also involved in both the Rumbelows League Cup and the FA Cup, with ties against Peterborough and Manchester City respectively.

Promotion hopefuls, Cambridge, have received a telling-off after employing the services of the ballboys to assist in taking throw-ins, a set piece from which they score a high percentage of goals. Referee John Key confiscated a towel from one of the ballboys and said after the game, "Cambridge employ the tactic of wiping the ball with a towel for their players before they take long throw ins. It is ungentlemanly conduct and totally against the instructions from the League. We'll have to wait and see whether the matter goes any further."

Following Southend boss David Webb winning the November Second Division 'Manager of the Month' award, fellow boss, Jim Smith of Portsmouth, was keen to sing the praises of the Shrimpers who have leapt from the Fourth to the verge of the First Division in two years. "They are streets ahead of Cambridge. They are one of the most impressive sides I've seen at Fratton Park this season. I was relieved to have gained a point from them."

The Plymouth Manager, who has spent nearly half a million pounds in the past month, is still on the look out for new talent. "Our problem is that we are not scoring the goals that our play deserves. We are still in the market for any player who would improve the playing staff. We have been watching several players and, if a quality player becomes available, then we are interested."



FOOTBALL'S PETER PANS'

If youth only knew', say the French, 'If age only could.'

The trouble with experience is it comes with age and in top class football age is a killer.

You know what they say. Skill and technique - like riding a bike - is never forgotten. The problem is persuading these tired and abused muscles to respond to yet more physical stress.

In the fifties, early sixties, it was common for top line footballers to be of the mature variety. The inclusion of teenagers in a League first team was headline news, the majority of participants being in their early or mid-thirties.

Then came the teenage revolution led by Tommy Docherty's Chelsea. The emphasis was on youth, speed, fitness and strength. The game suddenly became a younger mens sport.

Players were thrown in at 18, burned out by 30 and in the clamour to speed up the game some of the mere subtle aspects were swept aside. It was the era of power, pace and probability, an era that was to almost stifle the game with its predictability.

A climate that the super skilled were to emerge although the passage of skilled such as Glenn Hoddle were to be more bumpy than had they been born a decade or so later.

But even in this environment class showed though it was harder for the likes of Glenn Hoddle and company to display their gifts. Consequently many did not last the course; the prospects of a top-line player appearing in a Football League fixture at the age of 50, as did the magical Stanley Matthews, is not even contemplated these days. In the modern age the likes of Billy Bonds and John Hollins - one of Docherty's Chelsea babes - have transcended time to perform at the level at 37. As have former Stoke and England centre-back Dave Watson, baby faced Steve Perryman; Martin Buchan and Graham Turner. Swindon can currently boast three potential Peter Pans with 33-year-old Glen Hoddle revelling in his role as a sweeper and producing the sort of form that has suggested he might not be over the hill in the international arena as well.

Glenn, like the majority of veterans has withdrawn to a more defensive role where pace, or rather the lack of it, will not be so exposed. But for the likes of Micky Hazard and Steve White there has

been no such relief. They are taking on the youngsters and more than holding their own in two of the most competitive areas of the game.

Micky has rolled back the years to establish himself as one of the most accomplished midfield orchestrators in the Second Division. As a youngster with Spurs his stamina was often questioned yet at 31 he has seldom looked hungrier. He knows that should he be able to help master-mind Town's promotion to the Premier League then he will be on the threshold of the most exciting chapter of his career.

For front-runners perhaps the age-gap is the most difficult to overcome. In packed penalty areas where quickness of thought, instincts and reflexes must be razor sharp, there is no reprieve for those who fail. Steve White has already proved he can still outwit the best defences and at 32 continues to enhance his reputation as a prolific scorer.

Steve possesses the same sort of infectious enthusiasm that helped former England star Mick Channon and Bryan 'Pop' Robson to continue their striking roles into their late thirties. There is no reason why Steve can't husband his energies to extend his reign too.

Like the world of pantomime there is an aura of mystique around the long-distance journey men. No one wants to see Glenn, Micky or Steve, eventually call it a day. We all know it will happen eventually but at the moment it seems a long way off. May it continue to do so. For who knows maybe the proposed Premier League will be in Never Never Land!









A VERY WARM *Welcome* TO MILLWALL

There is no doubt that 1991 will be written off by the Lions, who really did not enjoy the best of fortune. It is strange how quickly situations change in this game. Last May hopes were high as Millwall finished fifth in the League chart and justly earned themselves a joust at Division One through the play-offs.

Then it all went sadly wrong. In the first leg of their semi-final with Brighton, they were soundly thrashed 4-1 at the Goldstone Ground. It was a set-back they were unable to retrieve.

The summer sale of 38-goal Teddy Sheringham to Nottingham Forest further damaged this season's promotion challenge, although optimism in some quarters was probably a little mis-founded, given that there were six new players on view for the opening game of the campaign at Middlesbrough.

It takes time for a team to bed down and we probably will not see the best of this Millwall side until next season, although Manager Bruce Rioch is anticipating a notable improvement over the next four months.

Mr Rioch is a great admirer of skilful football and has claimed that he is worried that the English game is falling behind Europe in this respect. He says, "Clearly, every manager's top priority has got to be his own side's results, but we have also got a broader responsibility to the game as a whole.

"I certainly don't want a team of robots. I like players who have the skill and the confidence to try something a bit different. I want players who can do the unexpected - players who can adapt to the very different situations which each match throws up."

Individuality is the key word and that is what Mr Rioch invested £100,000 in when he signed Dutch midfielder Etienne Verveer last month. He hopes the Dutchman's flair can be harnessed for the good of the team and inspire a concerted charge up the Second Division ladder.

There is certainly no shortage of quality in the Lions squad, with Republic of Ireland skipper, Mick McCarthy, an inspirational leader. In goal, Keith Branagan has covered

well for Aidan Davison, whose 13th League appearance proved unlucky when he damaged a lung against Derby County.

The impressive John McGlashan - signed from Montrose in 1990 - has been another casualty ruled out since the beginning of September. But John McGinlay made a welcome return in November, following knee ligament trouble, and his form was good enough to edge out Mark Falco, a former Tottenham colleague of Glenn Hoddle, who has also seen service with Chelsea (loan), Watford, Rangers and QPR.

THE MAN IN CHARGE

Bruce Rioch took charge of Millwall in May 1990 after being axed by Middlesbrough just two weeks before the Ayresome Park club were to participate in their first Wembley Final... That ZDS success was just one of many achievements on Teesside. Having taken over Boro' in February 1985 Bruce overcame a financial crisis, which saw them locked out of their own ground, to lead the club from Division Three to the First Division in successive years.

The son of a regimental sergeant major, Bruce has always been a strong disciplinarian. As a player he was an outstanding wing-half serving Luton Town, Aston Villa, Derby County, Everton, Birmingham City, Sheffield United, Seattle Sounders and Torquay United. Capped 24 times by Scotland he played in the 1978 World Cup.

THE ABC OF MILLWALL

CHRIS ARMSTRONG - Striker. Jet-paced front-runner signed from Wrexham last summer for £75,000. Made his Lions debut, as a sub, on the opening day of the season at Middlesbrough, and scored his first goal against us in the RLC tie at Cold Blow Lane on September 25. Born: Newcastle 19.6.71.

PHIL BARBER - Left wing. Another summer recruit, Phil cost £100,000 to transfer from Crystal Palace. Started his career with Aylesbury and made his debut for Palace in February '84 against Grimsby. Made a sensational home bow with the Lions, scoring twice in a 4-1 win over Sunderland. Born: Tring 10.6.65.

IAN BOGIE - Midfield. Played in the same Newcastle youth team as Paul Gascoigne and made the first of his 40-odd appearances for the Magpies at Luton (30.8.86). Scored 8 goals in 30 League games for Preston last season and joined Millwall in the summer. Born: Newcastle 6.12.67.

KEITH BRANAGAN - Goalkeeper. Was unable to start the season after knee ligament surgery. Made his first appearance of the season at the end of October and kept a clean sheet at Watford. Made his 150th League appearance, in a career that started with Cambridge United at Port Vale on November 9. Born: Fulham 10.1.66.

JOHN COLQUHOUN - Striker. Another newcomer this season, he joined the Lions from Hearts for £300,000. Played in Europe with the Scottish club, making 284 appearances in his six year career there. Started out with Stirling and had a spell with Celtic and has been capped by Scotland. Born: Stirling 14.7.63.

COLIN COOPER - Fullback. Signed in the summer from Middlesbrough for £300,000, he was installed as Captain. A former England U-21 cap, he made his League debut at Crystal Palace in March '86. Born: Durham 28.2.67.

IAN DAWES - Fullback. A consistent performer, he signed from QPR for £150,000 in 1988 and quickly endeared himself to the fans. Now close to his 350th League game. Is a good striker of the ball. Born: Croydon 22.2.63.

PAUL KERR - Midfield. Another former 'Boro star, Paul is a midfield dynamo who

supports the ball well. Served his apprenticeship with Aston Villa, making his debut at Leicester (14.4.84) and had made 24 League appearances when he signed for 'Boro in 1987. Arrived at Millwall in March 1991. Born: Portsmouth 9.6.64.

MICK McCARTHY - Central Defender. The Yorkshireman who captains Eire, he started his career with home-town Barnsley against Rochdale in August '77. Seven years later he played for Manchester City and in 1987 joined Celtic. A spell in France with Lyon preceded his return to English football with Millwall. Born: 7.2.59.

ALAN McLEARY - Central Defender. Developed through the Millwall ranks to become a stylish pivot. Made his debut v Lincoln in December 1982. Made his 280th League appearance at Watford (29.10.91). Born: Lambeth: 6.10.64.

ALEX RAE - Midfield. A Glaswegian recruited from Falkirk for £100,000 in 1990, he netted 12 goals in his first League season. Took Bruce Rioch's 'Young Player of the Year' award. Made his 50th League appearance at Ipswich (19.10.91). Age: 22.

PAUL STEPHENSON - Winger. A Newcastle United apprentice, he came into League football v Southampton (14.12.85). Joined Millwall in November 1988 and made a scoring debut at Liverpool (12.11.88). Born: Wallsend 2.1.68.

KEITH STEVENS - Defender. Was in line to make his 300th League appearance last week. The Lions longest serving player, he made his League bow at Oxford in April 1981. Born: Merton 21.6.64.

DAVID THOMPSON - Central Defender. Another one-club man, David is enjoying his best season. Was blooded at Barnsley (19.12.87) but didn't establish himself until the closing weeks of last season. Born: Ashington 20.11.68.

ETIENNE VERVEER - Midfielder. Signed 12 December 1991 from Swiss second division club, FC Chur. Dutchman Etienne cost £100,000. Formerly with Ajax, he had trial periods with St Etienne and Nancy earlier this season and made three reserve appearances for Millwall before signing. He made his League debut at Brighton 21.12.91. BENNO'S BRIEF



HAPPY NEW YEAR to all our readers as we look forward to 1992 - the year we hope will see Swindon arrive in the Top Division for the first time in it's history.

Town's brief spell on the top of the Second Division was hardly enough to give us vertigo but it came at a time when the side were going through a lean spell which suggests that when it finds its sparkle it could really take Division Two by storm.

Blackburn Rovers have caught the media because of Kenny Dalglish and his seemingly bottomless purse. There is no doubt that every other manager in the Division has cast longing eyes in that direction for all would back themselves to win promotion given such capital resources. "Kenny has got a lot of money to spend," says Glenn Hoddle, "and their arrival at the top is repayment for these benefiits. But I'm still very pleased with our own squad. Their performances haven't been bad.

Middlesbrough chief Lenny Lawrence has already conceded one promotion place to big spending Rovers claiming that he can't compete with Dalglish's spending power. Yet history has proven time and time again that money will not automatically buy you success in football. Lawrence's pessimism is ill founded.

Certainly his reaction has not been the response here at the County Ground. Glenn has great faith in the skill of his players and insists that "We must keep believing in our own ability."

The sceptics have rather scornfully dismissed the Second Division this season implying that the standard at this level has dropped. It is an accusation, I for one, strongly refute. The yardstick used by many in Fleet Street seems to be the runaway success last season of Oldham, West Ham

United and Sheffield Wednesday.

This I suggest, along with the dominance of Leeds United and Sheffield United, the season prior, suggests that these two campaigns were far from vintage. But because the front-runners were big-name clubs the establishment were happy.

In contrast this season there are a bevy of serious contenders for promotion. The overall standard of sides such as Ipswich, Blackburn, Derby, Southend, Leicester, Portsmouth and Millwall confirm that this is one of the best open championship chases of modern time with all these sides displaying a high degree of technical excellence.

They are certainly playing better football than Leeds United displayed in their promotion year when they literally powered their way to Division One. Vinny Jones spearheaded and the physical intimidation ably supported by Noel Blake and former Town hard-man Chris Kamara... All three were cast adrift once the job was completed and Howard Wilkinson refined his approach for Division One.

This Second Division is much richer in class with the emphasis strongly bent in favour of passing and team work. In this respect Town have some of the best exponents in the business with Glenn Hoddle undoubtedly the best creative player still in the game; and Micky Hazard seemingly improving with age.

There is the excitement of youth too with Fitzroy Simpson's Barclays Young Eagle of the month award confirming the promise he has shown all season. There is Nicky Summerbee and Nicky Hammond adding their youth and promise to what could be the most exciting in Swindon Town's history... *Here's to a successful 1992!*

This Third Division clash of almost 26 years ago was originally scheduled to be played a week before Christmas but, like Swindon's recently planned visit to The Den, it fell victim to the weather. Over sixteen thousand packed into The County Ground to see fourth-placed Town take on Millwall, second in the table, but some fourteen points ahead.

Manager Danny Williams made two changes to his line-up, giving a recall to his two mid-season purchases Tommy Henderson, from Bury, and Brian Richardson, from Sheffield United. Eric Weaver and Wilf Shergold, both local products, made way for them. The first half was somewhat scrappy, with Swindon's quick tackling annulling Millwall's more methodical attacking ideas. Dennis Brown came nearest to registering the opening goal. Known as 'Bullets', he lived up to his name when he let fly with a blistering drive that went narrowly over the bar. Then, as the half petered out, Don Rogers livened up the proceedings by taking on - and beating - three defenders, but saw his shot go wide. However, the flying winger was soon in the action once more, setting up the only goal of the game just four minutes after the interval. He skipped past two defenders down the left and squared the ball to Roger Smart who, in turn, found the diminutive Henderson. Expecting the Town's number seven to cross the ball, the visiting defence was caught out when he opted to try his luck and lashed it over Alex Stepney's head high into the net. The keeper then pulled off two miraculous saves to keep Millwall in the game. Firstly, he denied Rogers, pushing a full-blooded

drive over the bar and then, with the assistance of his crossbar, he kept out a close-range effort from Swindon's leading scorer, 19-goal Keith East.


The Londoners provided the better quality of football on the night, but stout defending by the Town - with Owen Dawson a commanding figure - saw them through in the end.

A good defensive record in the second half of 1965/66, when only once did they concede more than two goals, enabled Swindon to finish seventh. Millwall retained their promotion slot, eight points clear of their nearest rivals and the only side in the Third Division to concede fewer goals than the Town.

In the last few weeks, the signs have been pleasing, with better performances as our results show - one usually coming with the other. We must now look to carry on with this progress, gaining the necessary experience to go on and cope with the next standard.
