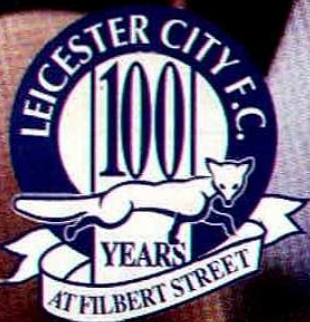

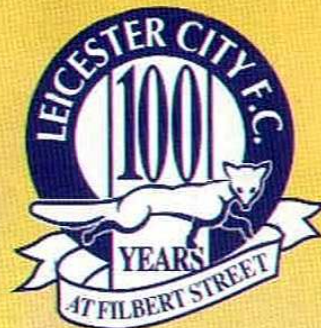
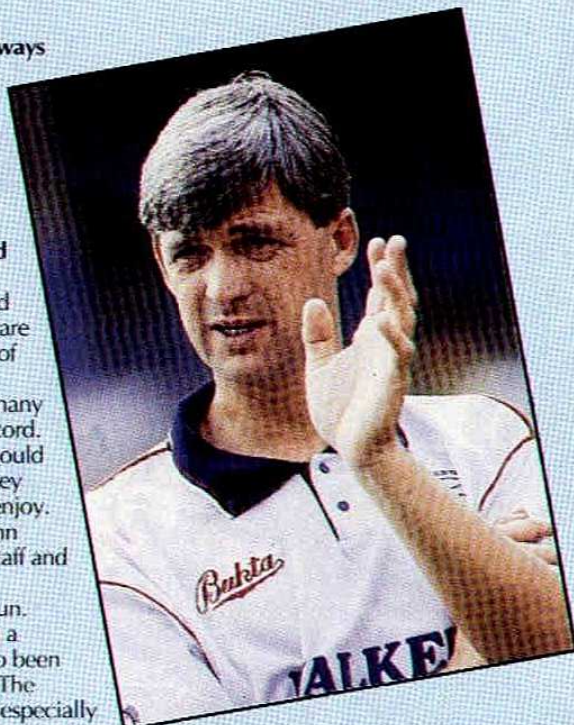
I would like to welcome Glenn Hoddle, the players, directors, staff and supporters of Swindon Town.

It's certainly been quite a week at Filbert Street!

With two all-ticket matches scheduled within four days of each other, - and the knowledge of two more away from home inside the next five days - the Ticket Office has hardly known what has hit it!

Large scale ticket sales are far more sophisticated than they used to be in my younger days - then tickets were a price whether or not you were a juvenile or adult, let alone Member or Guest! The tickets used to go on sale on the turnstiles with queues around the ground, yet the sale usually concluded in a relatively short time.

Now it's different - for example, a seat under our Membership Scheme can be sold at FIVE different prices - a practice made possible by the ticket computer and perfectly feasible on nearly every occasion.

The exception is, of course, a clash of matches such as we are experiencing at the moment. In these circumstances, and bearing in mind the priorities promised to various

classes of supporter, we try to devise a scheme of sales that will spread the number of purchasers over a longer period - both to give us time to sell the tickets as you require them and to save you being involved in never ending queues.

In fact, I think last Monday saw the great escape as far as we were all concerned. We couldn't sell the tickets any faster than we did, yet I know some supporters waited patiently for over an hour. Had our policy of spreading the demand not worked, then chaos would have reigned.

As it happens, with the redevelopment of the stadium and the requirement to go all-seater looming before us, Assistant Secretary Ian Silvester and I have, for some months, been investigating the latest ticket computer equipment, as it is clear that our present system could not handle the larger number of seats we will have in a few years time.

Now I think we must look at the system in the short term, as if the

Club is to continue to do well on the field the pressure off it will continue. I don't consider it acceptable for supporters to have to wait over an hour for tickets, and after all our computer programme is over ten years old - a lifetime in computer terms.

Just a word on the prices set for the Nottingham Forest match. While thousands have bought tickets, there have been some complaints, but I think it must be realised that the match is in effect the semi-final of a national competition, with Wembley awaiting the winners.

Prices for tickets at Cup matches have to be agreed by the clubs concerned after all, the proceeds are shared equally - and in fact, we have merely raised our prices to the range of Nottingham Forest and Notts County.

Maybe it's a reflection of Leicester City in recent years that we haven't been involved at this level - hopefully we shall figure more regularly in the future and the market prices won't be so much of a shock.

SCORING SUBS

Paul Fitzpatrick's superb extra-time strike at Meadow Lane ten days ago not only guaranteed the club a bumper attendance for the forthcoming ZDS clash with Nottingham Forest. It also created another 'full house' in the City record book. For Leicester substitutes have now made their mark on the scoresheet in all four senior competitions; and today we profile the 'supersubs' who notched the initial City goals in each of the League, the FA Cup and the League Cup.

Fitzpatrick was only six months old when Filbert Street first saw a home goal from a No.12. The 1965/6 season was the introductory campaign for the League's experiment with substitutes allowed in the case of injury only, and there remained distinct novelty to the

scheme when Tom Sweeney left the bench in April 1966 to join the fray against Blackburn Rovers. The game was still goalless when Mike Stringfellow collided with Rovers' 'keeper Fred Else and left the field with a serious facial injury, but Sweeney's left foot soon put City on the way to a 2-0 win.

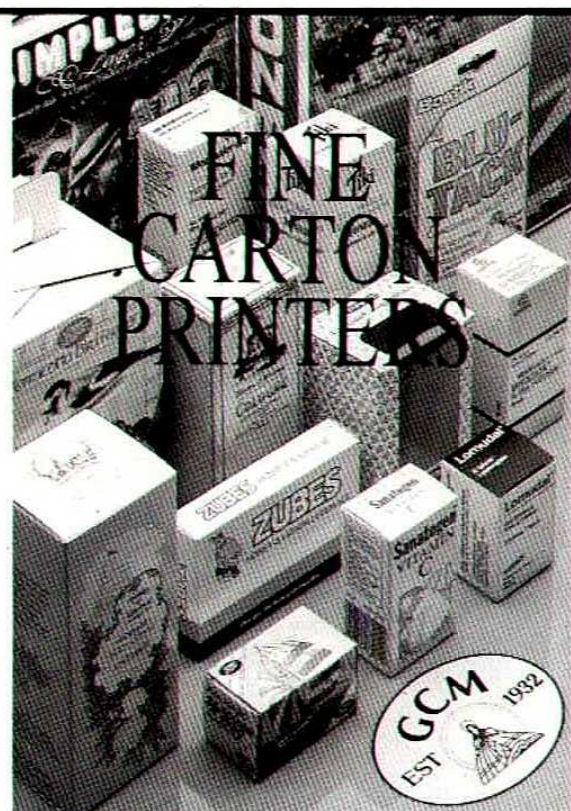
The young Scot had made his City bow as an 18-year old in 1963, in a League Cup tie against Gillingham, not long after joining the club from the Johnstone Burgh 'nursery' which also sent south Billy McDerment, Malcolm Clarke and Malcolm Manley in the same decade. Three days later, his League debut at Blackpool brought him a two-goal haul, and it was only manager Matt Gillies' desire not to rush the development of his new inside-forward that led to Tom's seemingly sporadic senior career thereafter.

Tom was a delighted member of the League Cup-winning side of 1964, and played in the Stamford Bridge leg of the following year's

Final; and his future as a classily confident deep-lying attacker looked well assured until he suffered a bad knee injury at Nottingham Forest in 1967, which effectively curtailed his career. Only two City come-back appearances accrued after that, and

even though Arsenal were willing to offer Tom a short-term contract when City sadly released him in 1968, his top-flight career was over at the age of 23. Indeed, after six games alongside Billy Hodgson at York City, so were his League days; though he completed one Southern Premier season under Ian King and Richie Norman at Burton Albion.

It was in 1980/81, in a home Third Round tie against Cardiff City, that Jim Melrose became the club's first scoring substitute in the FA Cup. Gary Lineker and David Buchanan had already set up a two-goal lead before the latter gave way to Melrose whose rasping volley completed the rout.

City's expensive pre-season signing had very belatedly - and very relievedly - got off the mark with two League goals at Birmingham only a month earlier, but was beginning to work his way into the hearts of the Leicester fans with his willing and skilful support play, and soon even managed to offer a silver lining to the relegation gloom enveloping Jock Wallace's young team by notching winning goals against each of Liverpool and Manchester United to lift himself to seasonal top scorer.

Great debate surrounded Wallace's propensity to leave Jim on the bench

for large stretches of the following season (including the Villa Park semi-final against Spurs, which City had reached substantially on the back of Jim's two-goal 'supersub' outing against Shrewsbury); but greater controversy followed when Gordon Milne swapped Jim for Coventry's Tommy English only five games into the 1982/3 campaign.

Even Tommy's contribution to the ensuing promotion campaign failed to endear him wholly to a critical City crowd. The striker who had once scored a Highfield Road hat-trick against City was now more of an attacking midfielder, but his confidence was somewhat affected by his reception, and his second Filbert Street season saw him as essentially a back-up squad player at First Division level. He was, however, on the bench as City travelled rather forlornly to Stamford Bridge for the second leg of their League Cup tie, already two goals down to Chelsea.

On a night when City rediscovered both pride and form, Tommy levelled the aggregate scores after replacing Ian Banks. He also tucked away his spot-kick in the shoot-out which followed an extra-time stalemate, but which saw City exit the competition after 'winning' for the only time in their jinxed green away strip.

THE ROBINS

SWINDON

Few clubs needed a happy New Year more desperately than Swindon Town who had seen their promotion chances dissolving as they ended the old year with a run of nine League games without a win. So it was a great relief to manager Glenn Hoddle when the Robins defeated Millwall 3-1 at The County Ground on New Year's Day.

Three days later they achieved a 3-2 home win over Watford in the third round of the F.A. Cup.

When they thought the tide had turned, Swindon lost 0-2 at home to Cambridge last weekend.

A flurry of three successive victories had taken the Robins into second place by the end of October and they were then being strongly fancied to win one of the two guaranteed promotion places. They now have some ground to make up if they are to achieve that objective.

There is little doubt that Swindon have been missing the influence of player-manager Glenn Hoddle, who, during the early weeks of the season, was playing with much of the old guile and enthusiasm that had made him a fixture in the England and Tottenham teams for so many years. But he was injured at the beginning of October and has since been forced to watch his team from the stand.

Swindon's lapse in form did not affect two of the Second Division's most prolific goalscorers, though. Duncan Shearer has now scored 24 times, whilst Steve White had netted 15 times before he was injured last month.

White's injury gave Dave Mitchell, the Australian international, the chance to enjoy a few first-team outings.

When Hoddle was injured Tom Jones reverted from right-back to resume his old position in midfield, but the versatile

Jones has recently been playing left-back, with Martin Ling filling the void in midfield.

The other midfield positions have been held by Micky Hazard, Ross MacLaren and Fitzroy Simpson.

Shaun Taylor, signed from Exeter last summer, has slotted in alongside Colin Calderwood in the middle of the defence with David Kerslake and Jones filling the full-back positions.

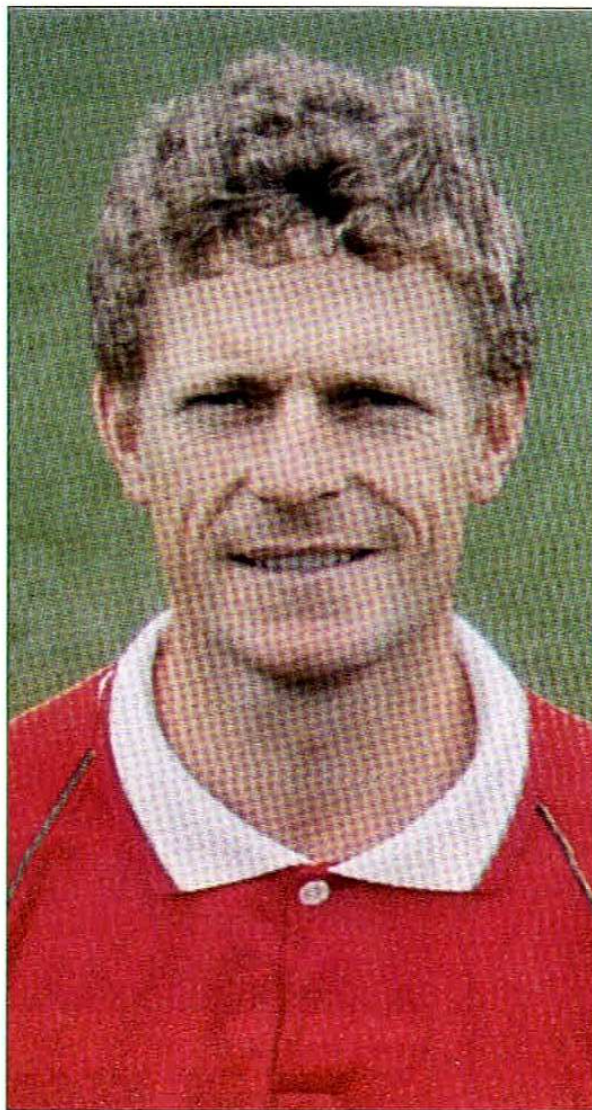
Nicky Summerbee, another full-back, has very often been nominated as substitute for the past few weeks.

Nicky Hammond has taken over from Fraser Digby in goal.

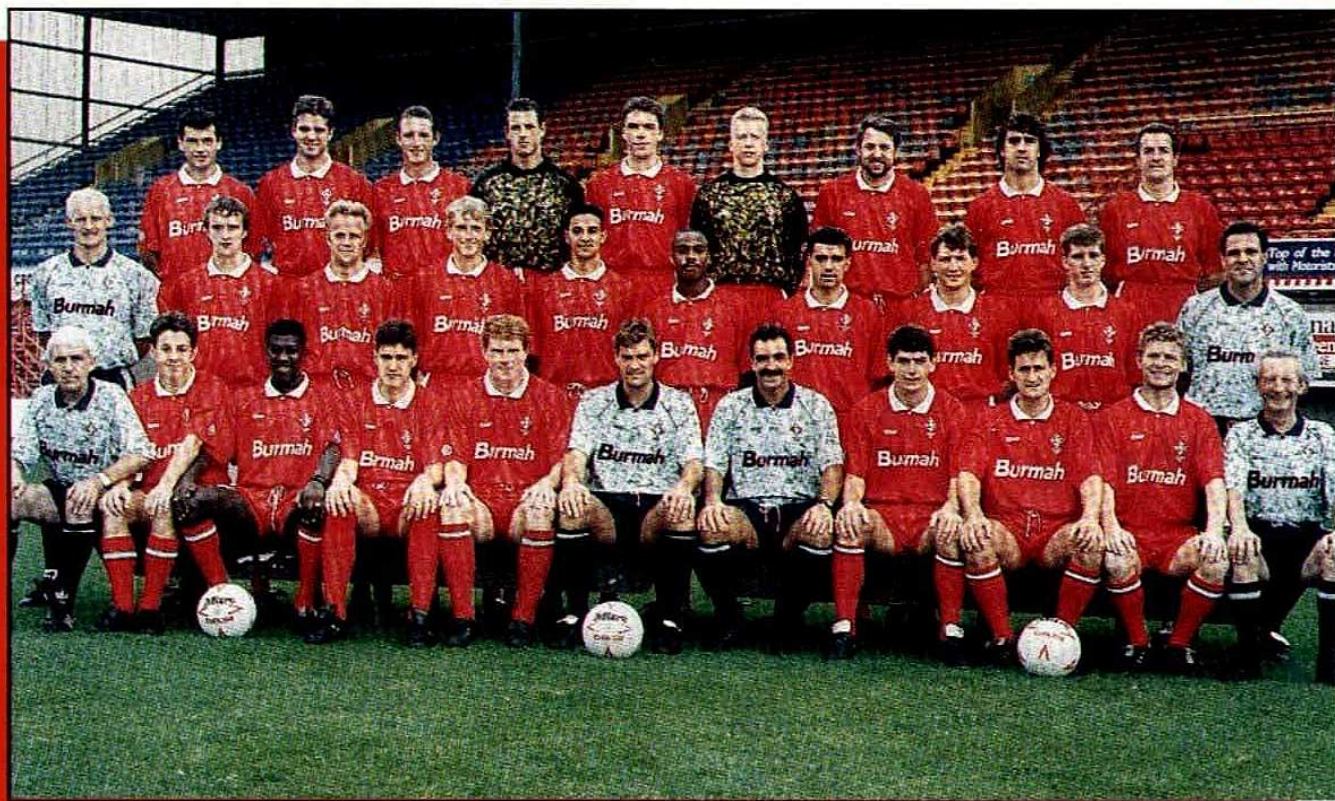
Swindon have won away games in the League at Ipswich (4-1), Plymouth (4-0) and Brighton (2-0).

They drew at Port Vale (2-2), Charlton (0-0), Tranmere (0-0), Middlesbrough (2-2), Bristol City (1-1) and Barnsley (1-1), but were beaten at Cambridge (2-3), Wolves (1-2), and Southend (2-3).

Swindon progressed to the fourth round of the Rumbelows Cup. After winning 2-0 at home to WBA they drew the return game 2-2 on the Third Division club's ground.

The Robins then drew away to Millwall (2-2) before ultimately winning that tie 5-3 on aggregate.

Swindon scored an outstanding victory at Huddersfield (4-1) in round three, before being beaten 0-1 at home by Crystal Palace at the next stage.

In the Zenith Data Systems Cup Swindon were held to 3-3 at home by Oxford, but they won the penalty shoot-out 4-3. They then went out at Chelsea (0-1).

Following their 3-2 home success over Watford, Swindon will be visiting the winners of the Cambridge v Coventry replay in the fourth round of the FA Cup.

HOT SPOTS

- **JOHN TROLLOPE** holds the all-time record for making the most League appearances for any one club. Trollope played 770 League games for Swindon between 1960 and 1980.
- **ROD THOMAS** won 30 of his 50 caps for Wales as a Swindon player. No other Swindon player has won as many international caps.
- Swindon are one of only two clubs to win a major Cup final at Wembley as a Third Division club. They defeated Arsenal 3-1 in the 1969 League cup final.
- **HARRY MORRIS** established a club record, never since challenged, when he scored 47 League goals in the Third Division (South) in 1926/27. He also scored one in the FA Cup that season.
- Morris also holds the record for scoring the highest aggregate number of goals for Swindon. He netted 216 League goals, plus

14 in the FA Cup, between 1926 and 1933.

- He twice scored five goals in a game for Swindon - against QPR in 1927 and Norwich in 1930.

- **KEITH EAST** also scored five, against Mansfield in 1965.

- **PAUL RIDEOUT**, now with Glasgow Rangers, made his League debut for Swindon against Hull in November 1980 at the age of 16 years and 107 days. He is the youngest player ever to appear in their senior team.

- **ALEX FERGUSON** was Swindon's oldest player. He was 43 years and 103 days of age when he played his final game against Bristol City in 1947.

- Swindon received their first £1-million transfer fee when Republic of Ireland international Alan McLoughlin joined Southampton last season.

Duncan Shearer is currently the most devastating striker in the Second Division. He netted six times in the four recent holiday games to take his tally for the season to 24.

He now seems certain to become Swindon's leading scorer for the fourth season in succession.

Since joining the club from Huddersfield for £250,000 in 1988, Duncan's annual tallies have been 16, 27 and 23 last term.

When he looks back now Duncan must be pleased that he was once surplus to Chelsea's requirements. Since leaving Stamford Bridge in 1986, he has become one of the game's most successful strikers.

Duncan scored on his league debut for Chelsea in February 1986, but he got only one more game in their league eleven. He moved on to Huddersfield a month later - and scored a hat-trick in his first full game for them.

In 1986/7 he was Huddersfield's top scorer with 25 goals - including four in one game against Bradford. He led the way with 16 at Huddersfield the following season and then moved on to Swindon.

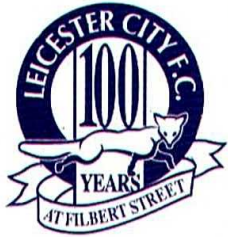

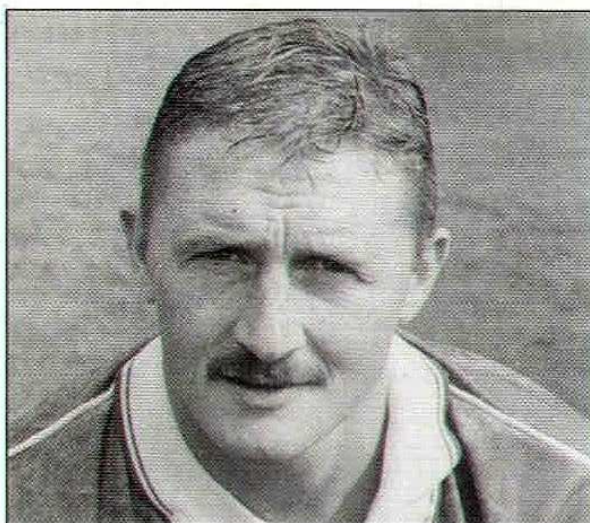

Ali Mauchlen had to wait until the 83rd minute of the home match with Blackburn Rovers at Filbert Street in late September for his first taste of the action this season.

But, apart from his recent knee injury, the former City captain has been an integral part of the marvellous season since then.

During that time he declared he wanted to leave Filbert Street, but turned down the chance to return to his old club Motherwell and was then taken off the transfer list at his own request.

In a Clubcall interview he said how pleased he was to be settled once again: "It's been a long time coming, but I've always felt I could give the gaffer a selection problem by doing what I do best - battling away in midfield."

"I have got back in and I am enjoying it, having done quite well," he said.

Ali's qualities in the centre of the field are always clear to see. He adds grit and fight, as well as experience he has accumulated in six-and-a-half years in English football.

He played his 250th full game for City against Bristol Rovers at Twerton Park on New Year's Day and who is to say he can't go on and top the 300 mark before very long.

'I'M STAYING HERE'

Ali said: "I have always enjoyed my stay at Leicester and I am still enjoying it.

"I don't want to go anywhere; I want to finish my career here. But that's something I have to sort out with the Manager and the Chairman, possibly at the end of the season," he said.

He is certainly confident that he has what it takes to continue: "I feel fit enough and I definitely feel good enough to play for at least another two years.

"I have been here six years and I'm into seventh season, so who knows how long I can go on?"

STICK TOGETHER

Perhaps one of the keys to the success this season has been the team spirit and the ability to pull together and come from behind when necessary. The recent results at Notts County and Plymouth illustrate that point perfectly.

Ali coming off the transfer list and Paul Reid signing a new contract, show that both players realise something special is happening and want to be a part of it.

Ali agrees: "We need everybody available because we have picked up serious injuries, with players sidelined until the end of the season.

"We have been dealt a blow by losing Tony James and Colin Gibson. So we need all hands on deck. Paul Reid has sorted out his differences with the gaffer and I have come off the list, so encouraging signs hopefully," he said.

CITY BACK

One of the great features of Ali's time at Filbert Street has been his marvellous relationship with the Blue Army fans.

"I have always had a good rapport with the fans. There were a couple of supporters discontented when I put in my transfer request, but you cannot please everybody."

Always looking on the bright side Ali talked about the future: "I have sorted out my differences and hopefully I can help Leicester City get back into the First Division."

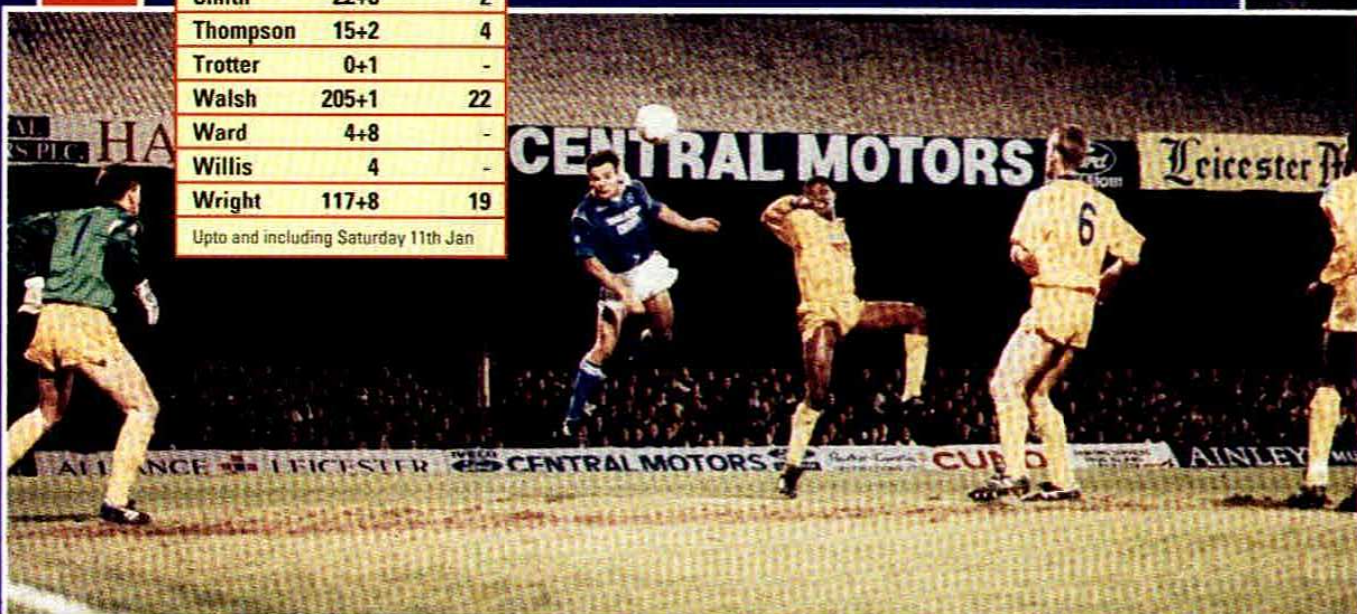

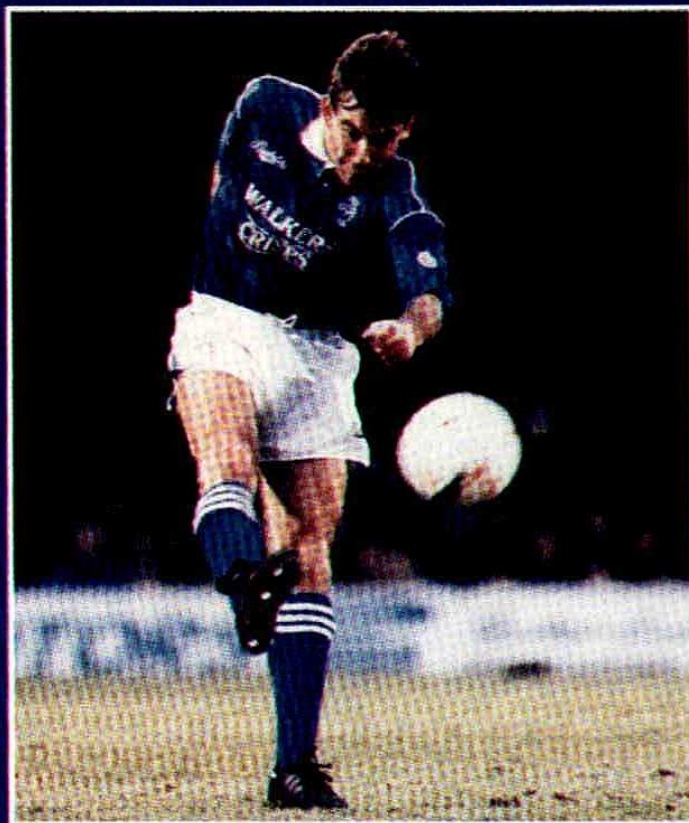
Top Left: Southend goalkeeper Paul Sansome came right outside his penalty area, but couldn't prevent David Oldfield calmly planting the ball in the net.

• The Robins remained at that level until 1963, when they gained promotion for the first time. In fact, only Brighton, Northampton and Southend notched up more points during the history of the old Third Division (South).

• It was during Swindon's second spell in Division Two that today's rivals first crossed swords, in September 1969.

• To date, City have met Swindon only 13 times previously, always in the Second Division, with 9 of those clashes occurring during the Foxes' current spell at this level.

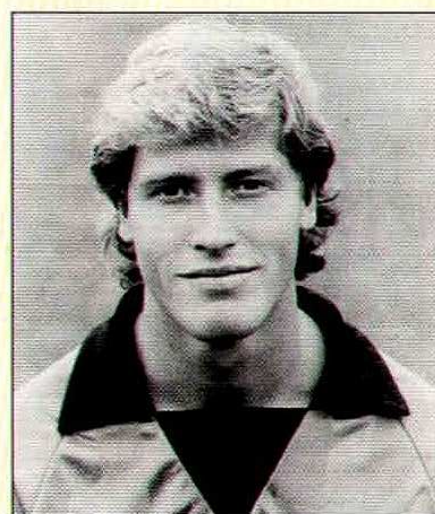
• City's biggest win over Swindon is only by 3-1. That was the scoreline in the Filbert Street fixture in November 1970, and it was achieved courtesy of two own goals, from goalkeeper Roy Jones and skipper Stan Harland. Ally Brown netted City's other strike with Peter Noble scoring for the Robins.

• That fixture also produced the highest attendance to date for a match between the clubs. 26,063 was the size of the crowd to see top-of-the-table City take on twelfth-placed Swindon.

• The Robins' biggest win came as recently as last April, Steve Foley led the way with a hat-trick as the Foxes were demolished 5-2. Mike Hazard also scored from the penalty spot, whilst the other goal was an unfortunate own-goal from Tony James. James also got on the scoresheet at the right end with Tommy Wright collecting City's other strike.

• The lowest attendance for a fixture between the clubs was registered at the County Ground in February 1989. Only 7,456 turned up on a cold Tuesday evening to witness a 2-1 home victory, thanks to efforts by Duncan Shearer and a penalty from Tommy Jones, after Mike Newell had given the visitors a first half lead.

• In recent seasons the Robins just hold the edge. Indeed, City have only won one of the last eight meetings.

• Nearly 20 players have been connected with both of today's rivals. Prominent among these are Ian Andrews, Sep Atterbury, Arthur Boadsworth, Peter Eastoe, Colin Gordon, Jimmy Johnston, Ken Keyworth, Frank Large, Archie Ling, Joe Norton, Sam Peers, Jimmy Quinn, Sam Simms and David Skea.

• Of these, Ian Andrews actually made his league debut during a loan spell for the Robins. Peter Eastoe had two separate loan periods at Filbert Street after making his early mark in Swindon's colours. Frank Large spent only six months at each club during a career that saw him turning out for 9 different league outfits, whilst Sam Simms' Filbert Street spell was sandwiched in between two stints at the County Ground.

• Jimmy Quinn netted three times for Swindon against City, but just failed to return the compliment with a late chance at Filbert Street in October 1988, after City had recovered from a 0-3 deficit to level the scores.

IT HAPPENED THIS WEEK

1913: Fosse's first experience of an abandoned FA Cup tie proper. The First Round clash with Southern League Norwich City was called off after 65 minutes due to heavy snow, with the game still scoreless. The following Thursday the Canaries caused a major shock when they triumphed in the rearranged fixture by 4-1. Previously, Fosse had seen two FA Cup ties abandoned during extra-time through bad light, but in each case the score was allowed to stand.

1926: City paid out a hefty £3,000 fee for Barnsley's Ernie Hine. He made

his debut at Filbert Street against Burnley and immediately began to repay the fee with a brace in a 3-2 victory. Ernie was an integral part of City's prolific front line during the club's heyday of the late twenties, eventually rattling up 156 goals in only 259 outings for the club. He also collected 6 England caps and another 4 goals before a move to Huddersfield Town in 1932 for a club record fee received of £4,000.

* City had their only taste of playing a first class match behind closed doors.

Their FA Cup Third Round tie with non-league Burton Albion was completed in an eerie atmosphere at Coventry's Highfield Road stadium and was settled by Paul Ramsey's lone strike on a bitterly cold afternoon. The tie was ordered to be replayed behind closed doors by the FA after crowd trouble had marred the original tie at Derby's Baseball Ground, which City had won by 6-1. An object was thrown from the terraces, hitting Burton's keeper on the head, when the score was only 1-1, thus prompting the FA's decision.

From then on the Rams piled on the pressure. But they had to wait until the 70th minute before they levelled the score.

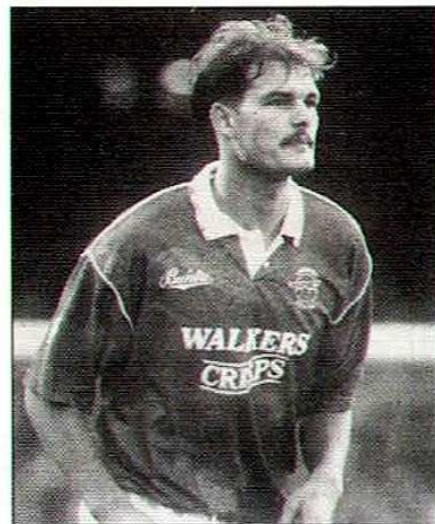
A low left footed drive from inside the penalty box beat Russell Hoult, who returned from his loan with Cheltenham Town for the game.

"We weren't the team we were before Christmas," he said.

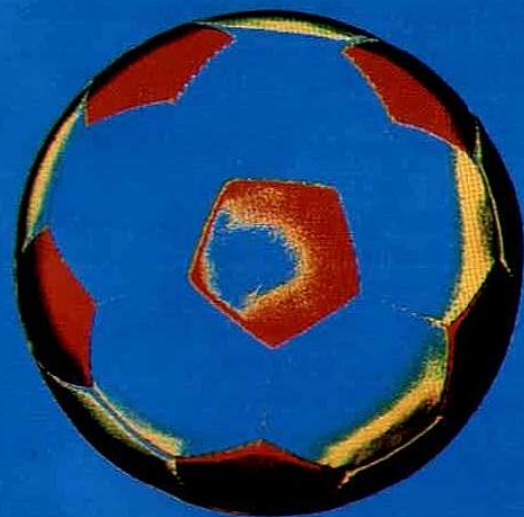
