



Glenn Hoddle



Successive defeats in the League by Cambridge United and Leicester City has not left us as despondent as many would think.

The Cambridge defeat was a very difficult one to take on the chin because of our conflict in styles. We would really have liked to have taken them apart for football's sake as much as anything. But it wasn't to be.

I was very interested by the crowd reaction to their game none the less. It was interesting to note how hostile you were to the Cambridge tactics. It maybe helps you appreciate that even when we are not playing too well we do strive to produce quality football.

For most of that game I was pleased with the way we defended and was settling for a draw when we suffered a couple of lapses of concentration and let them in.

At Leicester I was pleased with a lot of aspects of our game, yet once more we gave our opponents the points on a plate through silly defensive blunders. But on another day that performance would have been good enough to secure us a win.

We had a long chat in the dressing room after the game at Filbert Street and aired our views. There was no way I could give the lads a roasting after playing the way they did - even Leicester boss Brian Little praised our game. The point I was anxious to get over to the players was that because we are not winning regularly at the moment there was bound to be pressure from the media.

This is when we have to stand together. I urged the lads to keep believing in themselves. You know our current performances are not much different to those earlier in the season when the ball was flying in the net and we were winning.

Optimism is still the key word. My goal this season is still to win promotion to the Premier League and I believe we have the ability to

achieve this aim together. If we keep playing the way we are things will change to our favour and it only needs three or four wins to shoot you right up the Second Division ladder.

At the moment we are paying dearly for some silly defensive errors but we will learn from our mistakes. At the other end we are still looking good even though we are not snapping up the chances we are creating; while in midfield our passing is still as good as any in the division.

We introduced Paul Bodin at Leicester - for his second Swindon debut - and very impressive he was too. He should give us a lot of quality at the back and I was impressed how well he came straight in at set-pieces and understood what we wanted. It was from one such dead-ball kick that he hammered in our goal.

Paul has gone through hell in recent months so he must see returning to Swindon as a welcome release. I watched him several times before deciding he was the man we wanted and I don't think he will let us down.

We did not risk him against Cambridge because of his lack of first-team play. But after a hard week's training he slotted in and looked as if he hadn't missed a game all season.

This evening we welcome an old friend of mine, Brian Horton, who is experiencing more than his fair share of problems at the moment. I hope he steers Oxford away from the relegation zone because I like to see footballing sides avoid setbacks like that.

We will take no notice at all of their position in the table. Oxford are a good footballing side as their recent performances have shown. They were two-up at Charlton before throwing it away.

So we know what has to be done tonight. Enjoy the game.

We know it's teamwork that counts, so come down to see our squad for the back-up your business needs.

Despite continued form away from Ayresome Park being poor Middlesbrough are still in with a shout for the three domestic competitions. Undefeated at home 'Boro are only three points behind big spending Blackburn and last season's top scorer Bernie Slaven has already hit 12 League goals this season. Paul Wilkinson has no doubts as to where the clubs priorities should be. "We've had a few injuries, but I'm not making excuses and I'm the first to admit that we've been disappointing in some games and haven't done ourselves justice. But then you look at what we've achieved so far in the Rumbelows Cup and our position in the League and then things don't look so bad. Inconsistency has been our problem. At times we're brilliant and then we'll go to pieces but I'm scoring goals. We've shown how good we can be by knocking Manchester City out of the FA Cup and reaching the quarter finals of the Rumbelows Cup. Reaching the Premier League has to be our priority. A club the size of Middlesbrough deserves to be at the top and that's where we hope we are heading."

We ourselves are another side who are proving inconsistent at the moment although player manager Glenn Hoddle is very pleased with the performances of forward Martin Ling who signed from Southend in the summer for £15,000 after a brief loan spell at the County Ground last season. Ling is in his second spell at the club and is proving popular with Hoddle, still sidelined through injury, "I'm delighted with him. He was a real bargain at £15,000. He is no longer a squad player, he is now first choice in a Second Division side and it is up to him how far he goes. We do silly things when we are younger but what matters to me is that Martin builds on this." Hoddle was referring to Ling's bust up with Southend boss Dave Webb. However Ling has put that in his past saying "I've no hard feelings against Southend. I spent the worst year of my life there after the wages dispute, but I feel I've made the breakthrough



now. I'd like to think we could both get promotion."

Following their 5-0 thrashing at Bristol Rovers in the FA Cup, Plymouth boss Dave Kemp was the centre of speculation over his job. The Pilgrims bounced back well with their first away success of the season with a Dwight Marshall hat trick earning all three points ina 3-1 win at Barnsley and chairman Dan McCauley has confirmed his faith in Kemp, "I'm still giving Dave Kemp 100 per cent support. I think that any change of policy would be a disaster. It would create far more problems than it may solve and in my view this is completely the wrong time to make decisions as far reaching as that." Marshall has now hit eleven goals in his first season in the Football League.

Charlton Athletic continue to strive for a place in the Premier League under the guidance of joint managers Alan Curbishley and Steve Gritt. Alan Curbishley believes that it was a good decision by the Valiants Board to appoint two men to replace Lennie Lawrence, "There are so many things to do at this club I think that it does need both of us. Whereas most clubs can afford to go out and buy a couple of players to boost their chances of promotion, we aren't in a position to do that. So I think that any inspiration will need to come from a return to the Valley." As for Athletic's change in fortunes this season, Curbishley says "I think it's mainly down to our back five. This season we're not letting in too many. In fact, I think I'm right in saying that only Middlesbrough and Swindon have let in less."

Bristol are hovering in mid-table at the moment but the side is being re-shaped and the latest addition to the squad, Jacki Dziekanowski, is a real crowd pleaser.

The Polish hot-shot scored on his debut, against Southend United, earlier this month and could well be a bargain at just £250,000. If you are not sure of the name, come and find out for yourselves. He is well worth a look.

You will probably recall his performances for Celtic last season in Europe. 

Swindon Town v Fulham & Southampton

Our last two Combination fixtures resulted in a much deserved home victory over Fulham (2-1) and a really good team performance in the 1-0 defeat away to top of the table Southampton.

In the home game with Fulham we dominated from the start with the visitors only occasionally catching us on the break. We could easily have gone in three up at half time, yet our finishing let us down and our final pass too often went astray. We had taken the lead in the 20th minute when debutant Paul Bodin's long free kick was taken down the line by Nick Summerbee whose cross was met firmly by Nestor Lorenzo. To their credit Fulham had come to try and play some football and a neat move down the right resulted in Hails heading the equaliser at the back post. The second half was again all Swindon with Fraser Digby having little to do so it was no surprise when Paul Hunt restored our lead after sixty-five minutes chipping the ball over the Fulham keeper from twelve yards. Although more chances came and went, the scoreline remained the same to give us a well earned three points.

From a footballing point of view the game at Southampton was very pleasing and although the players came off disappointed at being beaten, the football they had played was of a high standard. The Southampton Combination Team had lost only twice in twenty-five games so it was always going to be hard to break them down. Their no-nonsense style of play and uncompromising defending was not pretty to watch, but re-stricted our goal-scoring chances to a minimum. The only goal of the game came midway through the first half with a shot from the corner of the box by striker Moody, that would either fly into the net or hit the corner flag. Unfortunately for us it was the former. To our credit we kept playing our football and for long periods Southampton were on the defensive. Our best chances came from a couple

of Marcus Phillips efforts that keeper Andrews handled well and Nestor Lorenzo was unlucky not to get a head to a Paul Hunt cross. We also had claims for a penalty turned down but at the end of the day could not manage the equaliser.

Our next Combination game is tomorrow at home to tonight's opponents Oxford so lets hope we can get back to winning ways.



PAUL IS JUST GLAD TO BE PLAYING. By Colin Benson

Those of you who travelled to Filbert Street last Saturday week will confirm that Paul Bodin has lost none of his edge during his traumatic sojourn at Selhurst Park. Of course Swindon fans knew full well the capabilities of this cultured Welsh international - Glenn Hoddle's latest recruit to his talented squad.

"It's marvellous to be back," beamed Paul, " and specially to get away from the unfortunate circumstances I found myself in at Crystal Palace."

It is less than a year since Paul left the West Country to seek fame and fortune on the playing fields of London. Alas, after paying big money for the left-back, Steve Coppell lost faith in him and virtually discarded him from his plans.

One can imagine the frustrations of a player good enough to star for Wales but left to train with the reserves and youth players at Palace. It was obvious he had to get away if he was to further his career but did Paul have any reservations about returning to his old haunts?

"Not in this case," he says. "I think because I have only been away for ten-months there is no real problem. There have not been so many changes here to make things too different and the changes I have noticed, in the playing staff, management, and in the stadium itself, have all been improvements.

"I never settled in London. I didn't really enjoy the football. Before I signed for Palace my name was linked with many clubs but when the move came it was all very sudden. Aphone call in the morning and signed in the afternoon.

"We had just had a great season here at Swindon and I was looking forward to playing First Division football but what a great disappointment it was. They were third in the League and in the final of the Zenith Cup but when I turned up for training and realised the style of their game my heart sank.

"They played the long ball. Now that isn't my game but I thought I could adapt. However, it is much harder to play than people imagine, especially if it is not your instinctive game. Even so I thought I played well enough in the nine games I did get. Unfortunately

the manager didn't agree. Coppell said it was a financial thing that prevented him playing me but that was an excuse. It was just a clash of styles. There was nothing personal in it at all."

Now Paul is back in the fold, how does he compare the current Swindon squad with the one he left?

"It is stronger," is his instant retort. "Shaun Taylor is a tower of strength at the back. Ling is a busy and creative midfielder and David Mitchell is so mobile up front. And looking into the reserve strength I would say this is a far stronger squad and a much better team ... they are playing such good football. It is a joy to be part of it.

"I am ambitious and want to play at the highest level and from what I see I think we have the makings of a successful side. Coming back should also enhance my international ambitions. Let's face it, just playing regular football is good and actually Swindon play the same shape as do Wales, which is absolutely terrific for me.

"Make no mistake I don't see myself as a failure. I have come back here to play Premier League football and if we get a run of four or five games together just watch us go.

"Before Christmas the papers would mention that Swindon were unbeaten in so many games. The facts are not much different now except they point out the side has now 'not won' in so many games. It will change - the spirit is good, the confidence high. "Take Colin Calderwood. He looks very good and has obviously done an enormous amount of work since his injury. But at Leicester I saw him bend a 35-yard pass with the outside of his feet. We were three down at the time and I thought 'is that really Colin Calderwood?' It is great. Brilliant. Hove to see it. He wouldn't have dreamed of doing that when I was last here. It is confidence you see and the encouragement the lads are given by Glenn and John to express themselves.

"When this team gets on a roll, there will be no stopping it."



OXFORD AT ROCK BOTTOM

OXFORD UNITED where excitingly embroiled in the FA Cup with Sunderland on Saturday, a welcome relief from their League predicament which sees them six points adrift at the foot of the Second Division table.

Shattered by the fall-out from the Maxwell scandal, Oxford United have been forced to make all their players available for transfer in order to stave off the financial collapse of the company. Lee Nogan, was the first to go, moving to Watford, and such as Simpson, Magilton and Melville have all attracted attention.

Such are the difficult circumstances under which manager *Brian Horton* is working and with just six wins and five draws achieved out of their opening 27 League games this season he is badly in need of a change of fortune if relegation is to be averted.

The old year ended on a high note for Oxford with a convincing 3-0 victory over Sunderland and when Tranmere were knocked out of the FA Cup 3-1 in their


first game of 1992 it seemed that maybe the corner had been turned.

Optimism was further fueled by an impressive show at Charlton where goals from Durin and Beauchamp gave Oxford a two-goal lead. The Londerers managed to peg them back to 2-2 in the end but the U's potential had been expressly demonstrated.

A single goal defeat at Grimsby was the only blot on the New Year programme for last week's 2-2 draw at Port Vale the encouraging statistics of just one defeat in their last five games.

There is still a lot of leeway to make up but as they say every cloud has a silver lining and the silver thread for Oxford has been the emergence of local lad Joey Beauchamp, the first of the youngsters to be given a chance.

Beauchamp had scored in four of his five appearances prior to last Saturday's cup game with Sunderland, to provide a gloss finish to his industrious work in midfield.

TREVOR AYLOTT - Striker. Much travelled pro - Oxford is hisninth club - signed in September from Birmingham City. Made his bedut for Chelsea at Newcastle (20.10.77). His loan spell with Q.P.R. before joining Barnsley in 1980. Later saw service with Millwall, Luton Town, Crystal Palace, Barnsley again (on loan), A.F.C. Bournemouth and Birmingham City. Failed to score in 29 Third Division games for the Blues last season but netted twice in his opening two games for Oxford. Born: 26.11.57.

JOEY BEAUCHAMP - Midfield. After two years on the YTS he was given a professional contract in 1989. Made his debut, as a sub, against Watford in the last game of the 1989-90 season and had made nine appearances by the start of this season. Scored his first League goal v Sunderland prior to last Saturday. Age: 20. Born: Oxford.

ANDREW MELVILLE: Central Defender. Big money signing from Swansea City (£275,000) in the summer of 1990. Had by then established himself in the Welsh team. Made his L;eague debut for Swansea v Bristol City (23.11.85). Born: Swansea 29.11.68

LES PHILLIPS - Midfield. Made his League debut for Birmingham City at West Ham in February 1982. Made 44 League appearances in four years and in March 1984. Oxford snapped him up for £12,000. Now the longest serving player. Born: Lambeth 7.1.63.

BENNO'S BRIEF



Town's appearance at the top of the Second Division table might have been short lived but if past records are a true indication of what is to come then we can look forward to a very exciting second half of the season.

It has been muted in many quarters - rather scornfully too - there are no outstanding teams in the Second Division this season; the statement implying that the general standard at this level has dropped.

It is an accusation I for one would strongly refute and furthermore would suggest that contrary to that assumption the overall quality of Second Division football is much improved. Such damning criticism usually materialises from some hack's typewriter when a glance at the League table suggest no clear-cut favourites; a revelation that exposes the Division in general.

In season 1989-90 Leeds United and Sheffield United led the pack for most of the distance and with big-name clubs such as Newcastle United and Sunderland in hot pursuit the establishment was satisfied that all was in order. The likes of Swindon, Ipswich, Middlesbrough and Leicester were all lagging behind the more famous and glamorous clubs in their rightful places in the pecking order.

Then last season West Ham United, Sheffield Wednesday and Oldham Athletic confirmed the pre-season odds by grasping a stranglehold on the Second Division from the opening weeks. The three promotion spots were never in doubt, it was just the order in which they would finish that was unsure.

But does the dominance of such clubs suggest that the standard in the Division is high. I think not. Two seasons ago for instance Leeds United more or less hacked their way to promotion with Vinny Jones leading the strong-arm tactics ably supported by Noel Blake and former Town hard-man Chris Kamara. All three were cast aside once the job was completed and Howard Wilkinson refined his tactics for the First Division.

Last season of course the Latics, Hammers and Owls rather had it all their own way. Yet I doubt if the quality of West Ham's play was any better than that produced by Swindon Town this season. Town have certainly scored more goals up to the beginning of January with 44 in 24 games as against The Hammers 37 from 26 matches at the same period. At this stage last year West Ham led the Second Division by 5 points (57) and were already sixteen points clear of fifth placed Middlesbrough. This season Blackburn Rovers were equal on points with Ipswich Town (44) having played two games less (24) with Charlton Athletic down in 10th place just 8 points behind the leaders.

The promotion stakes are wide open and what is more the likes of Portsmouth, Derby County, Ipswich, Leicester, and Swindon Town have achieved their positions by playing good quality football... No the standard of Division Two has not diminished. In fact it is healthier than it has been for a long long time.

It was the Town's final home game of the 1966/67 season, but conditions were far from ideal with a And Don Rogers put the seal on victory hard bumpy surface and high winds. Swindon made just one change from the side which had drawn 1-1 with DivisionThree leaders Queens Park Rangers in midweek, with left-winger Bruce Walker being recalled to the exclusion of ex-Bristol Rover Bobby Jones. Oxford were without burly Ron Atkinson who was suffering from a groin strain, but included former Swindon youngster John Lloyd at left-back. Town's 12th man, Ken Skeen, was to join the Manor Ground staff two months later.

Swindon, unbeaten at home since the February, took the lead in the 28th minute. A long clearance from Stan Harland fell to Roger Smart, who found Walker in space on the left flank. The winger's measured cross was headed in off the foot of a post by Pat Terry. Tony Jones twice went close for Oxford, with one header being well kept out by Peter Downsborough and another headed off the line by Mel Nurse with the keeper beaten.

What Evening Advertiser reporter Clive King described as a 'typical end-ofseason encounter' eventually came to lie in the final twenty minutes.

In the 73rd, Walker forced his way into the area. He rode two challenges, lost possession, but then saw the ball reach Smart who drove it past keeper Brian Sherratt.

down the right before scoring from an acute angle. It was his 32nd and final goal of a season which he ended as fourth highest goalscorer in the Football League.




David Kerslake plays the ball down the line.




David Kerslake takes the game to Cambridge.


