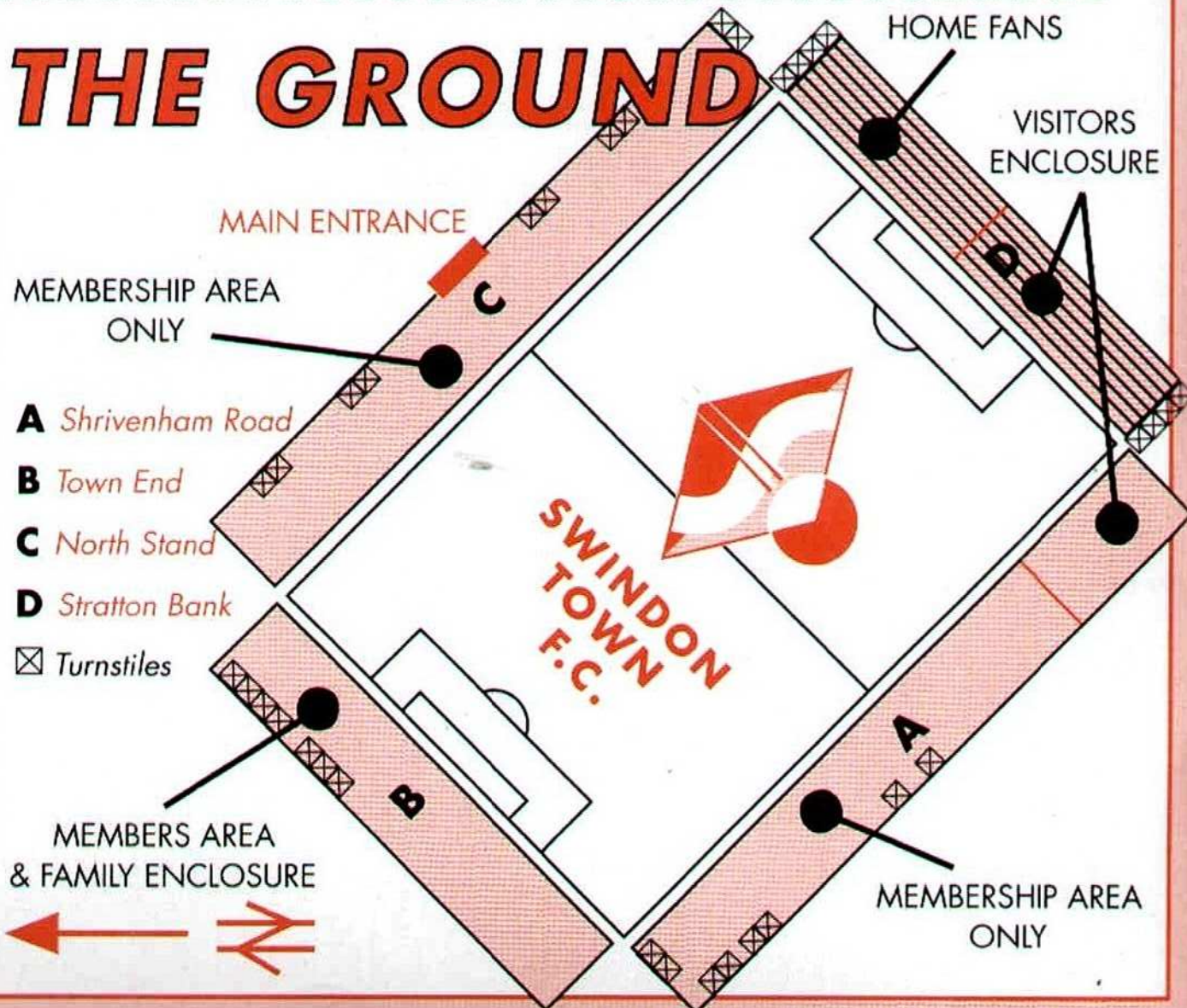

## YOUTHS

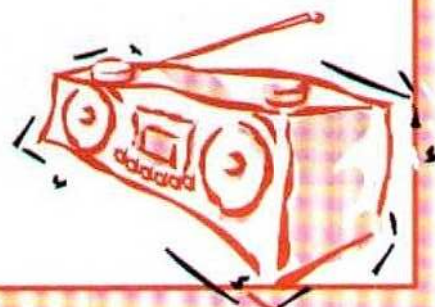

That win on Tuesday night has really lifted us following a frustrating series of games in which we were unable to make our football produce the dividends it deserved.

We changed things slightly against Tranmere, playing three in midfield which made us a little bit tighter. Having reflected on recent performances I felt that at this stage of a long hard season the midfield lads in particular are bound to feel a bit leggy.

As I said in my notes on Tuesday we needed to tighten up at the back and I think we got the balance about right.

Tranmere are the best footballing side we have played this season. They adopt the same style and moulds as us but do not have quite the penetration we are able to exert. It was a lovely game. They couldn't get the ball off us and we couldn't get it off them when in possession. It was very much like a Continental game, with a lot of skill and much thought put into the play.

Hopefully that win will be the springboard for us to get back in the hunt. We are still very much in the promotion frame and if any team is capable of stringing five or six wins together it is surely us. Duncan scored two great goals on Tuesday, the first a spectacular half-volley from a great ball by Micky Hazard. He has now scored 31 goals this season and we hope there are more to come.

At times this game can be the most frustrating experience you have ever had. My belief in the team is founded on the knowledge of its capability. I know that in recent weeks the black and white statistics show that we have been on a losing run. But in terms of football we have been better than most of our opponents.

Take last Saturday at Newcastle. On the play we should have hammered them. But the scoreline

at four fourty read Newcastle 3 Swindon Town 1. Kevin Keegan rang me to say he was a bit worried that he had rushed off and not had a chat with me after the game. He said that if it had been a boxing match it would have been all over in four rounds. Then he paid us a big compliment by saying the football we played at St James' Park "Is the sort of football our supporters deserve." We did play exceptionally well and Kevin says that his players now know the standard they have to achieve.

As far as we are concerned we now have to buckle down and make our football reap its rewards.

Today we meet Southend United who do not seem to be in particularly good form at the moment. But they are a totally committed side from one to eleven and will give us a hard battle. Tactically there is nothing complicated about Southend. Today it will be a matter of us trying to match their physical effort. If we do that and get the ball down and play to our strengths then we should get the result. It's up to us.

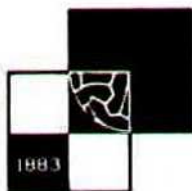
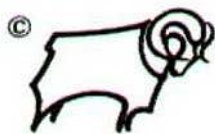

# NEWS

The team in the Second Division who are grabbing all the headlines are Jim Smith's Portsmouth who look forward to an F.A.Cup semi-final with Liverpool at Villa Park.

Smith however will be keen that his players do not miss out on the end of season play offs and it appears that they have this message following their 6-1 drubbing of Millwall last Saturday. Smith is keen to secure the services of on loan Southampton midfielder Alan McLoughlin who scored the all important goal against Forest in the quarter finals. "I will speak to my Chairman about him again. He would have bought him last week if I said yes but I thought it was better to have a longer look at him. The semi-finals guarantee a big sum of money and we might as well spend some of the profits on a player who is ideal for the way we play." McLoughlin cost Saints £1 million from Swindon last season but new boss Ian Branfoot has chosen not to select him this season. The transfer fee required is £350,000.

Newcastle United could be looking for a new manager at the end of the season following the reported unease of Kevin Keegan at St. James' Park. Despite a sharp turn around in results which has lifted the Club clear of the relegation zone Keegan requires cash to invest in new players. After beating Swindon 3-1 last Saturday, Keegan left the ground in a hurry and issued a post match statement to the press. "I am under contract to manage Newcastle United until the end of the season and this I will do. It is however essential to provide a frame work within which any manager can lead this great Club." The framework which Keegan requires is cash.

There appears to be no shortage of cash at the Baseball Ground with several players joining the Club in big money deals to boost the chances of a play off place. Amongst the new Rams are Paul Kitson who joins the Club in a £1.3 million

deal which takes Ian Ormondroyd and Phil Gee to Leicester City and Tommy Johnson, also for a £1 million plus fee yet to be agreed, following a one month loan spell. These signings follow the arrival of Marco Gabbiadini and Paul Simpson in recent months.

Marco Gabbiadini says he has no regrets over dropping a division to join Derby. "I enjoyed living in London and I wish things could have gone better for me down there but that just makes me all the more determined to succeed at Derby. My biggest problem was the thought of having to drop back to the Second Division. If Sunderland had stayed in the first I'd probably still be there. But Derby are very ambitious and seem to be going places with the backing of Lionel Pickering, a local business man who is Derby mad. He's a big fan who's prepared to put his wallet where his heart is."

Blackburn Rovers overcame their sticky patch which saw the red hot promotion favourites go five games without a win to beat Brighton 3-0 at the Goldstone Ground last week.

Despite his side's poor run of results manager Kenny Dalglish sees no reason to panic just yet. "We have to be realistic. As long as we continue to have the confidence in our own ability we'll start to pick up points again."

Roy Wegerlie hit his first goal for the Club during the game at Brighton, however ace striker David Speedie grabbed the headlines with his 20th goal of the season.

We have not enjoyed the best of luck in recent weeks and successive defeats by Middlesbrough, Oxford United, Charlton and Newcastle United certainly dented our promotion aspirations.

Down to tenth place after the game at St James' Park but certainly not out. For with 49 points from 35 games we are just six points short of a play-off place and the opportunity to clinch that third promotion spot.

Vale are also in the doldrums just now. Last week's 1-0 home defeat by Bristol Rovers dropped them to the foot of the Second Division table and left the fans baying for manager John Rudge's neck.

Rudge, of course, is the man who transformed a side, fifth from bottom of the Fourth Division, into a team that had until now held its own in the Second Division. Evidently, last Saturday Vale outplayed the Rovers only to be denied by Rovers' keeper Brian Parkin. That has left the Potteries side looking for their first win in 17 games.

Their experienced defender Neil Aspin believes they will turn the corner but we hope it will not be at Swindon in a fortnight's time. We fought out a thrilling 2-2 draw at Vale Park last September when Ross MacLaren and Steve White were our scorers and will be hoping to go one better this time out.

It could be an important fixture in our quest for a place in the play-offs. Don't miss **SWINDON TOWN v PORT VALE** at this stadium on Saturday 4th April... Kick-off 3.00pm.

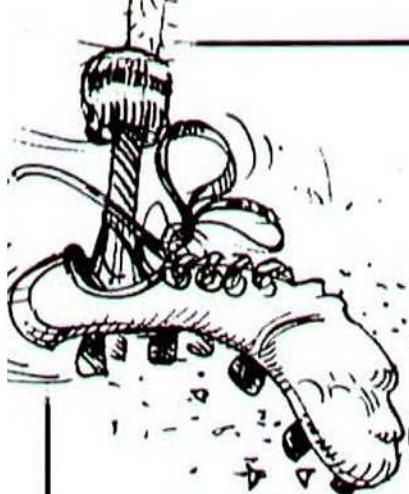

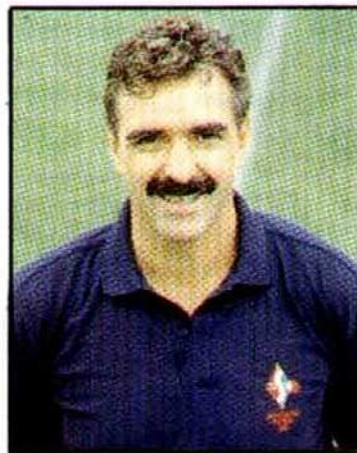

# STEVEN LANE



## THE KIWI LOOKING FOR SOME POLISH

You know if it was just down to guts and initiative, then young Steven Lane would already be a professional footballer. Countless boys dream of stardom as they play in the shadows of their local idols but few are prepared to sacrifice their families, the safety of their own domestic environment, to travel to the other side of the world to achieve their objective.

That is what Steven has done at the age of 16. Fired by that indefinable passion that grabs so many, he decided that he wanted to make his living playing football. That is not possible in his native New Zealand. So last December he jumped on a plane and headed for England.

At 16, Steven was a regular in the Forest Hill Hilford team that plays in the Second Division of the National League. They finished the season in mid-table but before he could come and test his ability over here, he represented his Country in the OCEANA Group of a FIFA Under-17 tournament. After drawing 0-0 with Australia and beating Fiji 3-1, the Kiwi's lost the play-off with the Aussies by 1-0. Steven arrived with a determined course in mind. The first stop was Leeds United where he spent three weeks. Next on the schedule was Swindon Town followed by Nottingham Forest, Southampton, and Plymouth Argyle.

He explains; "I wanted to get the feel of several clubs and learn what was expected. It went quite well at Leeds but then they closed down for Christmas - all the lads returning home. They asked me to return after the holiday but I came on to Swindon and liked it here so much that I decided to stay when offered a two-year contract as a trainee."

New Zealand might not be the hotbed of soccer but the game is very popular, particularly around Auckland, and Steven says he had been associated with his local club since the age of eight. An all-round athlete of some stature - he clocked 51 seconds for the 400 metres, an Auckland area record - he had to make his first serious choice at 14. Says Steven: "I had to choose between athletics and football and chose the ball game. I had a great

coach called Kevin Fallon, who taught me a lot and really it has all gone from there.

"I had success at youth and then senior levels in New Zealand and decided if I was to progress then I had to come to England. My father comes from Torquay though my mother is a New Zealander, and I have a British passport, so there was no problem.

"Rugby, of course, is a very big game back home, but where I lived, football was the most popular sport for youngsters to participate in. It is at senior level that the interest is turned to rugby.

"Of course, there is a vast difference between the game at home and here. English football is a lot quicker and much more physical and the standard of play far, far better. It is hard physically but I am slowly coming to terms with it."

Steven is already a six-footer and a target man of some promise. He says: "Hit me with the ball and I'll hold it up." He has scored some goals at youth and reserve levels and looks to have the makings of a fine player.

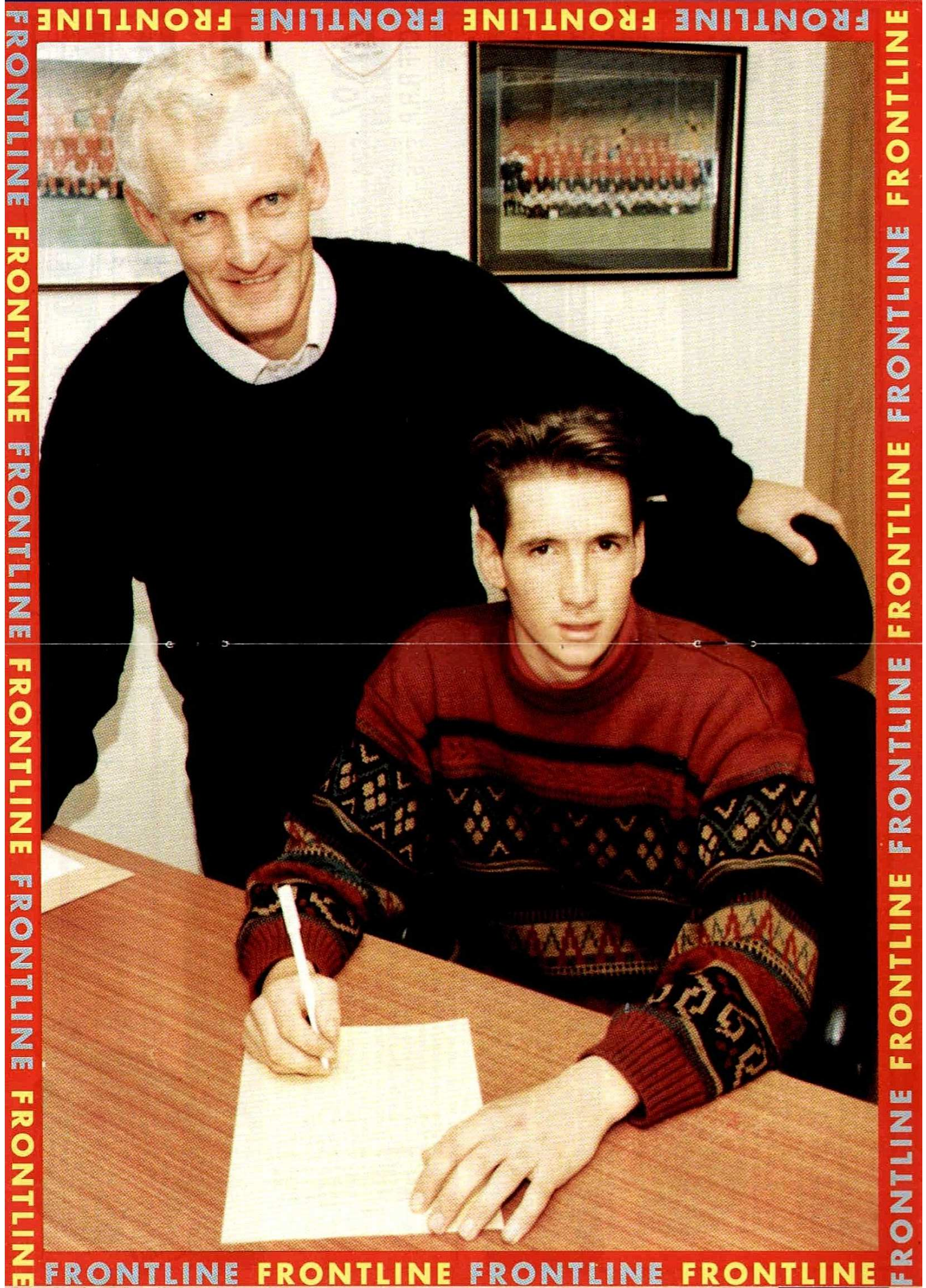
There are other strings to his bow also. He explains: "When I play for New Zealand, I play at fullback. They adopt a similar system to Swindon Town with the fullbacks pushing up in an attacking formation, I prefer it up front though. The striker's role provides a lot more glory."

Is he homesick? "I was to begin with but I'm slowly getting over it," he says. "When I get like that I ring home and that cheers me up. My main priority is to become a professional footballer and get into the first team. The New Zealand team is currently in camp training but I think it is more beneficial for me to be here."

Steven had always supported Southampton as a boy. "I don't know why. I think it was because when I was ten I liked their strip the best." But now, Swindon Town is the only team for him.

He has ambition, and the drive, to make his dreams come true, but before then, he reckons he is going to make a clean sweep on the rest of the lads as he puts his money on a Kiwi victory in the Cricket World Cup.

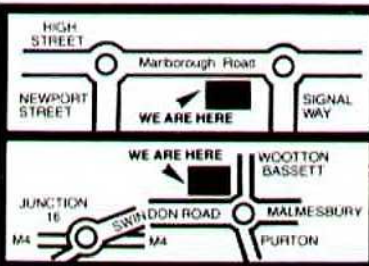

# TO SOUTHEND UNITED

## THE SHRIMPERS SURPRISED THE PUNDITS

Few expected Southend United to make the impact they have in this their first ever season in Division Two. But they seemed to take the step up in their stride and could make history by gaining promotion from the fourth to the top division in successive years.

Recent results have not gone their way and last Saturday's home defeat by Middlesbrough, when goalkeeper **Paul Sansome** was red-carded for a 'professional foul', knocked them back to eighth place. But they are still hovering above Town and well placed to make it to the play-offs.

After just failing to clinch the Third Division title last season - a home defeat by Brentford in the final match cost them the prize - manager **David Webb** strengthened his squad with four summer signings.

Veteran winger **Kevin O'Callaghan**, who enjoyed his best years with Millwall and Ipswich, was recruited from Cold Blow Lane. A vastly experienced player - this is his 13th year on the League circuit - he is still only 30 though he rarely plays a full 90 minutes these days.

**Andy Sussex** adds further experience to midfield while the two other signings, **Spencer Barham**, a right back from Charlton Athletic and **Mark Hall**, a striker from Spurs, are youngsters with the future in mind.

In October Mr Webb ventured into the transfer market again to sign **Keith Jones**, another midfield stalwart, to help maintain the supply line for leading striker **Brett Angell**, who terrifies defenders with his awesome finishing power. Just before the turn of the year Brett scored in seven consecutive Second Division games.

Also available are former England Youth captain **David Martin**, who plays at the back or in midfield. David actually also found a goal touch last season to add to his repertoire. Paul Smith, a strong determined youngster and **Steven Heffer**, son of former West Ham pivot Paul, are also in contention for midfield places.

## THE MAN IN CHARGE



**DAVID WEBB**, was a tough tackling no nonsense centre-half with Chelsea but it was his dramatic headed goal against Leeds United in the 1970 F.A.Cup replay at Old Trafford that won the Blues the Cup and Dave immortality in the history of that famous Club.

Born in Stratford 9-4-46, David was an amateur with West Ham United before joining Leyton Orient. His career took him to Southampton, then Chelsea in February 1968 in a part exchange worth £40,000 and Joe Kircup. Played in every shirt apart from 11 in his 299 appearances for Chelsea (33 goals). His emergency stint as goalkeeper v Ipswich demonstrated his talent. He kept a clean sheet.

In May 1974 he moved to QPR for £100,000 and played for Leicester, Derby and Bournemouth (player-manager) before continuing managerial career with Torquay and Southend.

**BRETT ANGELL** - Striker. Currently the third top scorer in Division Two with 22 goals, it took Brett sometime to establish himself after failing to make the grade with Portsmouth. Impressive performances with Cheltenham Town tempted Derby County to invest £40,000 for his services but again he failed to make the first team. In October 1988 he moved to Stockport County. He notched his first League goal against Hartlepool, in his second appearance, then in 1989-90 became the first County player for more than 25-years to score four in one game - ironically against Hartlepool! In the summer of 1990 Southend signed him and he topped the goal chart with 26. Born: Marlborough 20-8-68.

**ANDY ANSAH** - Midfield. Joined Crystal Palace from school but was released and allowed to join Brentford. Made his League debut, as a sub, against Fulham (24-3-89). Moved to Roots Hall in 1990 and scored nine goals in 42 Third Division appearances last season. Born: Lewisham 19-3-69.

**DEAN AUSTIN** - Defender. It was Bobby Moore who recommended Dean to the Southend management - his £14,000 transfer from St Albans being one of the bargains of all time. Missed only four games last season. Born: Hemel Hempstead 26-4-70.

**IAN BENJAMIN** - Striker. Scored the historic goal which earned the club promotion to Division Two for the first time in their history. Scored 17 goals last season and is equally at home in midfield or defence. An apprentice with Sheffield United he made his League debut for the Blades at Cardiff in April '79. Joined the Shrimpers from Exeter City in March 1990 after spells with WBA, Notts County, Peterborough Utd, Northampton and Cambridge United. Born: Nottingham 11-12-61.

**PETER BUTLER** - Midfield. Came into the game with hometown club Huddersfield Town v Oxford in August 1984. Had a short spell with Bury before signing for Cambridge United - joining Southend in 1987. Hard working ball-winner acclaimed 'Player of the Year' last season. Born: Halifax 27-8-66.

**JOHN CORNWELL** - Defender. No stranger to the County Ground he made six appearances for us in season 1988-89 before moving on to Roots Hall for £45,000. Served his apprenticeship with Orient, making 202 League appearances before signing for Newcastle in '87. Is 6' 4". Born: Bethnal Green 13-10-64.

**KEITH JONES** - Midfield. Cost a club record of £175,000 to sign from Brentford in October. A former Chelsea apprentice, he made his League debut for the Blues v Barnsley (26-3-83) but in six seasons added only another 51 League appearances. Transferred to Brentford in 1987. Born: Dulwich 14-10-65.

**ADAM LOCKE** - Midfield. Talented play-maker signed on a free from Crystal Palace. Made 30 League appearances last season - 12 as sub; but looks an outstanding prospect. Born: Croydon 20-8-70.

**CHRIS POWELL** - leftback. Established himself in the side last season when he appeared in all 46 League fixtures. Picked up from Crystal Palace who had taken him on the YTS. Given three outings with them, the first, against Barnsley, on November 5th 1988. Born: Lambeth 8-9-69.

**SPENCER PRIOR** - Central Defender. Local lad from Hockley he made 23 Third Division appearances last season. There was speculation he would move into the First Division last summer but the big clubs were thwarted when he resigned for the Shrimpers. Born: 22-4-71.

**PAUL SANSOME** - Goalkeeper. Former Millwall apprentice who made his League debut for the Lions in a goalless draw with Swindon at the Den in March 1982. Played 156 League games for Millwall before joining Southend in 1987-88 after a loan spell. One of only two ever-presents in the side last season. Born: North Addington 6-10-61.

**PATRICK SCULLY** - Central Defender. A Republic of Ireland Under-21 International he was brought from his native Dublin to England by Arsenal in 1986 as a trainee. Played Gaelic games at school but skippered the Eire schoolboy soccer team. Joined Southend in March 1991 after loan spells with Preston, Northampton and Southend. Born: 23-6-70.

**ANDY SUSSEX** - Forward. Cost £100,000 to sign from Crewe Alexandra, last summer. Andy served his apprenticeship with Orient, making his League bow v Sheffield Wednesday (7-11-81), while still only 16. Moved to Crewe in the summer of 1988. Born: Islington 23-11-64.

**STEVE TILSON** - Midfield. Classy midfielder with an eye for goal. Signed from Witham Town he netted 12 goals last season - eight in the League (38 appearances). Born: Wickford 27-7-66.

# BENNO'S BRIEF



As you know injuries and enforced transfers have decimated the side in recent weeks but this afternoon we could see a new face in the line-up with the arrival of Gary Waddock on loan from Queens Park Rangers. Glenn Hoddle tried many sources to try and recruit some temporary help but Arsenal boss George Graham said no when approached about England midfielder Paul Davis and response from several other clubs was similar.

Gary is a dynamic midfield dynamo. He joined the Loftus Road club as a teenager and made his debut as a substitute for Paul Goddard, in a League Cup tie against Bradford City in September 1979.

Although born in Kingsbury his father comes from Wexford and his mother from Limerick; and by the time he was 18 he was playing for the Republic of Ireland, winning his first full cap in a 2-0 win over Switzerland.

Gary was not long turned 20 when he played for Rangers against Glenn Hoddle's Spurs in the 1982 FA Cup Final.

A serious knee injury virtually ended his career but though he had received insurance he battled back, going abroad to make his comeback with Belgian side Charleroi. So successful was he that he returned to England and has spent the previous two seasons with Millwall before returning to Loftus Road.

Gary is a wholly committed player and we think you will like his style.

Even before the new Premier League takes shape to cream off the game's wealth the gulf between those who have and those who have not seems to be ever increasing.

Clubs are simply quoted monopoly money when attempting to sign players with figures of four to six million frequently quoted. Yet though the spending

spree continued last month the surprising reality is that the bulk of the money which exchanges hands was invested by clubs outside of the accepted super-league bracket.

Aston Villa topped the shopping list with an outlay of £1.7 million for Oldham Athletic's Earl Barrett but astonishingly, apart from Sheffield United, who paid Villa £150,000 for Kevin Gage, no other First Division club made an investment. The top spenders were indeed, Blackburn Rovers, Derby County, Dundee, Plymouth Argyle, Bolton Wanderers and Grimsby Town.

Even in this time of severe economic recession English clubs have invested £47 million already this season, an amazing increase of £30 million on the figures up to the end of February last season. And with the transfer deadline looming we can anticipate a flood of moves in the next few days.

All of which must seem gross to the fans of Aldershot who buckled under a winding-up order served by the Inland Revenue. Chairman Mike Davey's 11th hour rescue package failed to materialise and the Shots have missed the target.

It is always said when a club goes under. It is as if the very fabric of the game itself has been defaced. But football finances being what they are - and the game has been pleading poverty for as long as I can remember - it is somewhat remarkable that Aldershot are only the third club in the Football League history to quit because of financial embarrassment.

Wigan Borough resigned in October 1931 with debts of £20,000 and Accrington Stanley followed in 1962, owing £62,000 . . . Aldershot's headache was a little more severe at £1.2 million but in the context of the £47 million already spent this season was a drop in the ocean.

November 17th: Swindon Town 4 Southend United 1

Almost thirty years ago now, Southend came to the County Ground for a Third Division encounter. Town were in seventh place, with our visitors in sixth and the only side in the Football League not to have drawn a match. Swindon were fresh from a 4-3 win at the Den a week earlier, but were without winger Arnold Darcy who had not recovered from a knock in that victory. Bert Head decided to give his number 11 shirt to 17 years old Donald Rogers - for his League debut.

Town fans had seen 40 goals in the ten previous home games and they did not have to wait long for some more! After just six minutes, a long John Trollope punt found Jack Smith charging through the middle. The centre-forward clipped the ball over a defender and ran on to thump it past advancing goalkeeper Harry Threadgold.

Three minutes later, Smith was at it again. Young Rogers started a four man move with Cliff Jackson providing the centre for Smith to send a looping header just inside the far post.

Swindon had goalkeeper Mike Turner to thank for preserving their two-goal lead until half time. He pulled off a first class save to push over a cracking drive from Southend leader Mike Beesley.

Town went three goals clear in the 63rd minute, when Bobby Woodruff laid on a chance for Mike Summerbee and the winger shrugged off the attentions of two defenders to shoot home from close range.

Almost immediately, the 'Shrimpers' pulled a goal back. This time Beesley had more luck, chasing a loose Terry Wollen back-pass and slotting the ball past Turner. Swindon put the result beyond doubt with

two minutes remaining when Jackson - a hat-trick-hero in that win at Millwall - back-heeled a corner into the net. The Town had thus scored four goals for the third consecutive game and changed places with Southend in the table, which all helped in their bid to gain a first-ever promotion - a bid that was to be successful come the following May.

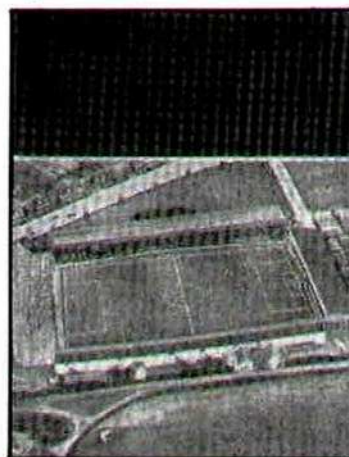
For Donald Rogers, it was the first of 400 League appearances before he left for the bright lights of London. His manager said of his first performance "as far as skill and the ability to push the ball about neatly was concerned, I thought he did a fine job. He was caught once or twice by the extra pace of Third Division football, but it was only his first game and that will come".

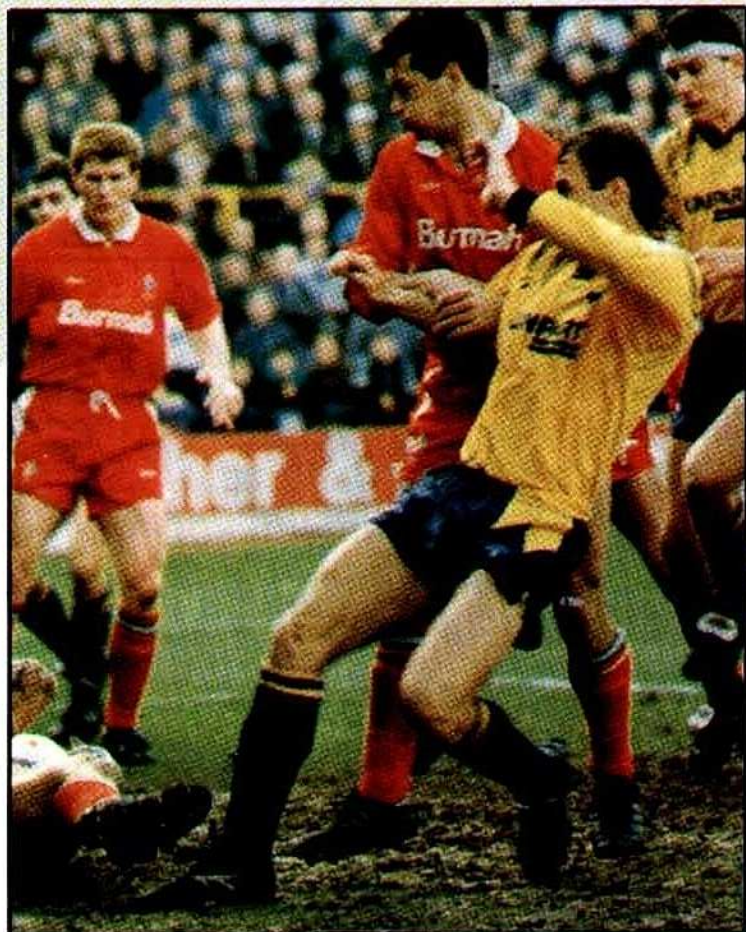

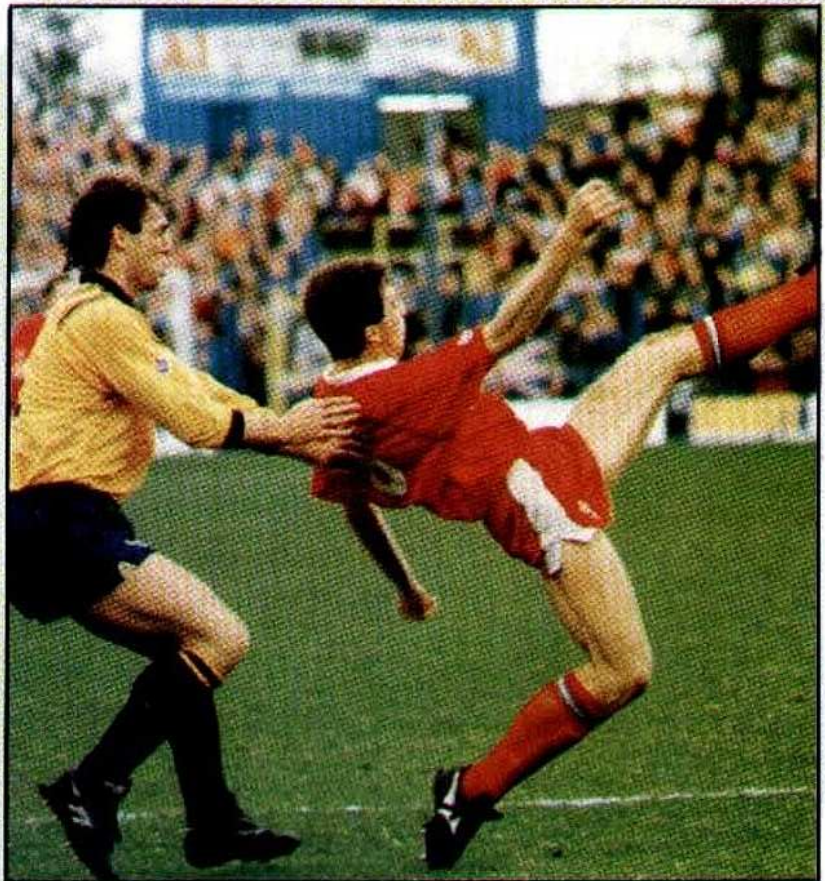
