



## **DEADLINE DEALS**





For most, a draw at Portsmouth would be seen as a great result but the subdued atmosphere in our dressing room after the game said it all. We felt we had been robbed of a win we thoroughly deserved on the day.

So many times this season we have played exceptionally well without getting our just rewards, and this was just another example. We expected more pressure from Portsmouth than we had to withstand and went ahead with a terrific goal from Tom Jones.

At that stage, we were looking good for a second goal and had what I thought was a genuine penalty claim turned down. Minutes later, the referee gave an incredible penalty award to Portsmouth which left us feeling very flat indeed.

There was a great sense of annoyance in the dressing room and it rather took the gloss off our performance. The statistics do not give a true reflection of our away form this season. If you look at the figures you will see that we have won just three away games in the Second Division, yet I believe our performances as a football side have been better away from home than here.

Unfortunately we have let too many points slip away leaving us with a real fight on our hands to make the play-offs. It was a good point, a very good point, at Fratton Park but it would have been much more exciting had it been all three.

Prior to that we achieved a very encouraging win over Southend United. We introduced Gary Waddock in this game and he gave us what I feel we were missing, and needing, in midfield. He can sit in there and orchestrate the movement. He wins the ball well and can use it. But most of all his enthusiasm is infectious. The crowd took to him very quickly.

The 3-1 scoreline was a fine result and a very good professional performance.

Perhaps one of the clearest indications of the quality of our side was the inclusion of four of our players in the PFA Divisional Awards. Personally, I felt that one or two more of our staff would have gained recognition but to have four is an outstanding achievement because this is the judgement of their fellow professionals.

Before the kick-off today, Tony Eves, Barclays Business Centre Manager in Swindon, will present David Kerslake, Colin Calderwood and Micky Hazard with their awards, which will give you the opportunity to show your appreciation.

The fourth player is of course Duncan Shearer, who is now with Blackburn Rovers. Many of you have voiced your resentment at his transfer and I know how you feel but, unfortunately, due to the economic climate, it was business that had to be done.

The last thing we want to do is let our quality players go but this was unavoidable, I'm afraid. I have to live with it and can only wish Duncan the best. It was a good move for him. It is, we know, going to be very difficult to find someone who will score 32 goals in a season and I share your frustration. But there are two ways we can deal with it. We can mope around and bemoan our luck or pick ourselves up and get on with it.

The latter is the only positive reaction and to this end I have brought in Terry Gibson on loan. It gives us the chance to have a good look at him and on his first showing at Portsmouth, he made a good impression. Terry has virtually been reduced to reserve team football at Wimbledon this season, so we have to shake the rust off him and see how he goes. I think David Mitchell could reap the benefits of his style of play.


The third new face is that of John Moncur, a midfield player who I have always rated. John was not in the reckoning at Portsmouth because he was not fully fit but we have watched him for sometime and he's our sort of player. Afootballer.

John had a spell on loan at Ipswich and I knew they wanted to sign him but could not raise the cash. We have, and I think he will be really able to find himself at Swindon.

So, to this afternoon and a tricky game against Port Vale. They are not so bad a side as their position suggests and I think you will be surprised by their football. But we are at home and must remain nice and positive.

Although with a chance of still making the end of season play-offs, Southend United are a Club in crisis. Chairman Vic Jobson is keen for the Shrimpers to leave Roots Hall and play in neighbouring Basildon. However, fans are opposed to this move. Even worse, Manager Dave Webb, who has taken the Club from the Fourth to the Second Division in just two seasons, has resigned with effect from the end of the season. Webb, who has been reluctant to discuss his decision, has finally given his reasons for deciding to quit. "I do not feel that I have had, or that I now have, the freedom to deal with players' contracts in order to ensure they remain at the Club. I believe that there has been interference with my role as Manager." The attendance at Roots Hall last Saturday to see United beat Grimsby 3-1 was a disappointing 4,591.

Just ahead of Southend and currently occupying a play-off spot are Charlton Athletic, who held promotion favourites Middlesbrough to a 0-0 draw at Upton Park last week. Steve Grit, who shares management responsibilities with Alan Curbishley, says he is pleased with his side this season. "We have tried to make the players a little more disciplined and perhaps a little more adventurous in going forward. That has helped, particularly with Carl Leaburn, as we are getting more balls into the box a little bit earlier. It's amazing when you look at Derby, as their forward line has cost over £4 million and, of course, Blackburn. We would like, obviously, to have some money to spend but I think one of the reasons we were offered the job in the first place was because we knew the situation. We have kept a very low profile all season but we feel that the season is not over yet and we just don't want to tail off."

Caretaker boss at Roker Park, Malcolm Crosby, has not been impressed with the attitude of 20 year old Kieran Brady, who is highly rated by many onlookers. Crosby has put the young star on the transfer list and has made it clear to the player that he does not feature in his future plans. "I'm only interested in

players who are prepared to give 100 per cent at every level. Ultimately, he does not want to play for Sunderland so there is no point in keeping him. I will just wait to see how much any club is prepared to offer."

Plymouth Argyle's new management team, Peter Shilton and John McGovern, have brought in three new players to assist in the battle against relegation. £200,000 was spent on Leyton Orient forward Paul Nugent, a nominal fee on Sheffield Wednesday's Steve McCall and a loan signing on Chelsea's six foot three defender David Lee. Shilton however has not yet made his debut for the Pilgrims. "If results are encouraging, I don't mind staying out of the team. There certainly will come a time, however, when I am playing and I'm looking forward to that. I hope that the Argyle fans are too.

The transfer deadline passed last week with several Second Division clubs spending on new players. Not surprisingly it was Blackburn Rovers who spent the most, with Town's Duncan Shearer joining Dalglish for £700,000. Although Shearer scored on his debut at Barnsley, Rovers went down 2-1 and look in real danger of having to settle for a place in the play-offs. Bristol City signed Everton's Ray Atteveld for £250,000 - the same fee Leicester paid Leeds United for midfielder Mike Whitlow. Town paid Spurs £80,000 for midfielder John Moncur and Cambridge swapped John Taylor for Bristol Rovers' Devon White, with the West Country club also receiving £100,000 in a deal valued at £400,000.

## **BULLY THE HIT MAN**





Steve Bull will lead the Wolves charge when we entertain the Midlanders here in a fortnight's time. Bull, an England International, became Wanderers top scorer of all time when he beat John Richards' Club record with his 195th goal - the winner - in a 2-1 victory at Derby County last month.

The days when Billy Wright and Stan Cullis inspired Wolves to three successive First Division titles are long gone. There is not so much bite about the pack from Molineux these days but in Bull they have a hard hitting centre-forward in the traditional mould who always commands respect from defenders.

Shaun Taylor and Colin Calderwood will most certainly have a busy afternoon but before this dramatic encounter there are a couple of tricky away fixtures to negotiate. On Wednesday we travel to Millwall where the Lions have begun to show their claws under their new ringmaster Mick McCarthy. He launched his managerial career with a 1-0 home win over Port Vale a fortnight ago and seems to be attaching much emphasis to defence.

Agoalless draw at Molineux last week emphasised this

priority and they will be putting their strategy to the test again this afternoon at Cambridge United. It seems the task that faces the Robins will be much tougher than on our last visit to The Den, in September, when Steve White scored twice in a 2-2 draw in the Rumbelows League Cup.

From The Den to Twerton Park and all that a local derby entails. Bristol Rovers crashed to their 15th Legia defeat of the season at Watford last Saturday and are without striker Devon White, transferred to Cambridge United just before the deadline. But they have taken John Taylor in part-exchange and he will be bursting to make an impression.

Rovers have won but eight of their 19 home games and though they have netted 33 goals in this sequence, they have also conceded 26.

Many of you no doubt will be there to cheer us on and those who can't make the trip will be able to catch up with events at the Wolves game...It promises to be a ding dong affair, so don't miss SWINDON TOWN v WOLVERHAMPTON WANDERERS at this Stadium on Saturday 18th April at 3.00pm.





When Gary Waddock was offered the opportunity to play first team football with Swindon Town, he jumped at the chance. You see, at 30 years of age, the Republic of Ireland international - he qualifies through his parentage - found his career had somewhat stagnated in the 'stiffs' at Loftus Road.

You might say that Gary's career has not been blessed with too much fortune over the years. He has enjoyed success of course with Queens Park Rangers and Eire but, despite his flame thatch and the fact that he was born on St Patrick's Day 1962, Gary has not always enjoyed the rub of the green.

Born and raised in Kingsbury, London, Gary joined Queens Park Rangers from school in June 1979 and was a well established cog in the Loftus Road machine when he went in for a tackle in a First Division game with Sheffield Wednesday... As the ball broke clear, Gary was left writhing in agony, the medial ligament ruptured beyond repair, so the medical verdict was to reveal.

That was four-and-a-half years ago. Gary is not one to quit and he refused to accept that his career was over. Nine months later he struggled back into the Rangers team, only to make five more appearances before breaking down again. They told him to quit. He simply refused.

Battling long and relentlessly against the odds, Gary took flight to Belgium where he signed up with First Division Charleroi. He says: "I spent two years with them. It was absolutely brilliant. I loved every minute -both in a football sense and for the way of life. It was a complete change and just what I needed.

"Career wise, it was good experience playing against the likes of Anderlecht, FC Brugge, Standard Liege and Antwerp. The club treated me well and the players were great. Adifferent language but we still played the same game - very similar in fact to the way Glenn has got Swindon playing, I thoroughly enjoyed it.

It was Millwall who brought the midfield dynamo back to the English game and though the system at The Den might not have been so compatible to the Waddock style, he certainly acquitted himself well.

Back in the Republic of Ireland side, life was good again until, on a flight from Turkey to Malta, his world was to be shattered yet again.

Gary had just played for Eire against the Turks and was

already named in Jack Charlton's squad for the World Cup Finals in Italy. Says Gary: I still don't really know what happened but on the plane to Malta for our next warm-up game, my name was struck off and replaced by Alan McLoughlin's.

"I was absolutely gutted. Jack Charlton tried to give me an explanation but it just didn't stand up...He invited me to stay with the squad and do everything with them and so on but I couldn't. It wasn't for me to pretend I was part of it.

"I came back home and went on holiday with my wife but there was no escaping the World Cup. It was on TV in the bars and splashed all over the papers. It was a terrible time for me. But you have to get over these things and it is all over now.

"There is no bitterness towards Jack. He had to make a decision that he thought was right for the squad at the time...I've been in the squad since then and hope to be there again. They rang me up to ask if I was going to turn up the first time. I told them of course I was.

"There have been plenty of good times too and I hope some more to come. I played in the Cup Final against Spurs when I was detailed to mark Glenn. He is extremely difficult to pin down but I enjoyed the occasion and would love to do it again."


Gary rejoined Rangers last Christmas when Gerry Francis offered him an eighteen-month contract but he has not had the opportunity to show his form in the first team and has come here to try his luck.. But how committed to the Swindon cause can a player on loan be?

"I'm a winner," raps Gary. "At the moment, Swindon is my club and I'll do anything to help them win out there. It is the only way I know how to play and I have come here to enjoy it and be part of what I hope will be a promotion push.

"The fans were very kind to me on my debut against Southend and I hope I can repay them. I just sit in there and let everyone else get on with it... It is just so enjoyable being back in a side that plays football."

What of the future? Is there the possibility of a long-term move?

"That is not in my hands," says the only Irishman who has certainly not kissed the blarney stone.



SECOND DIVISION LIVES.

It was a great Saturday last week for Port Vale fans. Vale won and Stoke City were stuffed. Unfortunately for the Valliants this has become somewhat a rare experience as they battle for their very existence in the shadow of their Potteries neighbours who are being guided towards Division Two by former Swindon chief Lou Macari. It would be the greatest ignominy if Vale were to pass Stoke going the other way but until last Saturday's 1-0 home win over Plymouth Argyle most had given up flope for their beleaguered favourites anchored at the foot of the Second Division table.

Even now- prior to the midweek fixtures - Port Vale are five points short of salvation but Saturday's win has breathed a new defiance. For it ended a run of 18 games without a win which stretches back to November 30th when Vale beat Watford; and equalls their worst ever record set in season 1983-84 when they were eventually demoted to the Fourth Division.

Last week's victory came courtesy of Ray Walker's 33rd minute penalty; another pointer which suggests to the committed that the wheel of fortune is at last turning their way. It being the first penalty awarded to them at Vale in over a year.

The win didn't come in time to save Mike Pejic's job however, Bobby Downes had been upgraded to the senior coach's role the week prior. But despite the gloom the optimists can turn to the side's early season form and indeed, their three years in the Second Division, when they have surprised many with the quality of their play.

The summer sales of Darren Beckford and Robbie Earle undoubtedly weakened the strength of John Rudge's team but on gates of 7,000 such dealings have to be made to help balance the books.

With Mark Grew in goal and Nell Aspin and Darren Hughes the regular backs alongside central defenders Ray Walker and Dean Glover the defence has remained basically stable.

In midfield, David Lowe - on loan from Ipswich - has caught the eye on the right with Ray Walker and Robin van der Laan in the middle and Kevin Kent on the left.

Record signing Martin Foyle leads the attack alongside Nicky Cross, who has made only three or four appearances this season following injury troubles. His return is timely with John Allon now returned to Chelsea after a loan spell.

Foyle, who cost £375,000 last summer, has scored 15 goals this season but only two in the last 19 appearances.

Others to be utilised this season have included midfielder Andy Porter, who came through on the YTS to make his debut against Blackpool in February 1987 and John Jeffers, a £30,000 recruit from Liverpool who has now just completed three years at Burslam.

As a player John turned out for Huddersfield Town, Carlisle United, Bristol Rovers, Torquay United and Bournemouth.



NEIL ASPIN - Defender. Signed in the summer of 1989 from Leeds United for a Club record £200,000, Neil can play at fullback or in the centre of the defence. Was two months short of his 17th birthday when he made his League debut for Leeds United v Ipswich (20.2.82). That was the first and only game he played in the First Division, the remainder of his 206 League appearances for Leeds being played in Division Two. Born: Gateshead 12.4.65.

NICKY CROSS - Forward. Joined Vale from Leicester in the summer of 1989 for a fee of £125,000. Started as an apprentice at The Hawthorns and made his League bow for WBA at Old Trafford (18.4.81). In all made 105 League appearances (15 goals) before joining Walsall for £48,000 in August 85. Rattled in 21 goals in 44 League games that first season and added a further 16 in 1986-87. In January 1988 Leicester paid £65,000 for his transfer and Nicky scored 14 goals in 58 League games over two seasons at Filbert Street. Born: Birmingham 7.2.61.

MARTIN FOYLE - Forward. Signed from Oxford United last summer, Martin started his career with Southampton making 12 League appearances for the Saints before moving to Aldershot. A record of 35 goals in 98 League outings with the Shots tempted Oxford to seek his services in March 1987. The price - £140,000. Born: Salisbury 2.5.63.

DEAN GLOVER - Defender. Manager John Rudge set a new Vale record when he shelled out £200,000 to Middlesbrough in February '89. Dean, who had helped 'Boro to play-off success the previous year, sparked a 10-game unbeaten run which saw Vale win through to the play-offs and promotion. Joined Aston Villa as an apprentice in 1981 and made his League debut at Coventry (19.1.85). Played 28 League games for Villa and 5 on loan to Sheffield United before his move to Ayresome Park in June '87. Born: West Bromwich 29.12.63.

MARK GREW - Goalkeeper. Was a free transfer capture from Ipswich Town in June 1986. Started as an amateur with WBA in 1976 but made his League bow on loan to Wigan at Halifax (16.12.78). Made an FA Cup semi-final appearance for Albion in 1982 and the following year joined Leicester (£25,000). A loan run with Oldham was followed by a transfer to Ipswich in March '84 (£60,000). Made only six League appearances for Town and had further loan spells with Fulham, WBA and Derby, before finding his niche at Vale Park. Born: Bilston 15.2.58.

DARREN HUGHES - Defender. An Everton apprentice, he was in their 1984 FA Youth Cup Final side which beat Stoke City 4-2. Was introduced to League football at Wolves (27.12.83) but made only two further appearances in the First Division. Shrewsbury Town took him on a free in June '85 and received £35,000 from Brighton for his signature in September '86. Was

on loan at Vale until a £10,000 deal was cleared in September 1987. Born: Prescot 6.10.65.

KEVIN KENT - Forward. Had scored four goals in 27 League games for Mansfield Town when Vale signed him to boost their attack last season and he went on to make 11 Second Division appearances with them in the final run-in. Served his apprenticeship with WBA, making his League debut v Everton in February 1984. Played just one further First Division game before moving to Newport County in 1984, transferring to Mansfield a year later. Born: Stoke 19.3.65.

DAVID LOWE - Forward. Currently on loan from Ipswich Town, David was top scorer in his first season at Portman Road following his £100,000 transfer from Wigan in June 1987. Gained England Under-21 recognition to add to his Youth caps but lost his place in the Ipswich side due to a knee injury. Has made 19 senior appearances for the Suffolk side this season. Born: Liverpool 30.8.65.

TIM PARKIN - Defender. Signed from Swindon for £65,000 in December '89, Tim is a former Blackburn Rovers apprentice. Made his League debut for them at Bristol Rovers (8.3.77) in the Second Division but only played a dozen more games before moving to Malmo in 1980. Almondsbury Greenway was his next club and they received £15,000 for his transfer to Bristol Rovers in 1981. Established himself as a regular until Swindon paid £27,500, in July 1986, for his services. Made over 100 appearances for us. Born: Penrith 31.12.57.

PETER SWAN - Forward/Defender. A £300,000 signing from Hull City, Peter was introduced to League football by Leeds United, his home town club, in a Second Division game with Oldham Athletic on New Year's Day 1986. Spent four years at Elland Road before joining Hull City where he operated effectively as a striker or central defender. Born: Leeds 28.9.66.

ROBIN van der LAAN - Forward. Signed towards the end of last season from Wageningen for £80,000 as a striker. A stylish player who cost Vale a mere £12,000 to sign from Aston Villa in July 1986 following a loan spell

## BENNO'S BRIEF



What a fortnight it has been...Last week we had managers tripping over themselves as they charged up and down the motorways to make those vital signings prior to Thursday's 5pm deadline. And, yes, Glenn Hoddle was one of them, investing £80,000 with his former club Spurs for the transfer of the highly rated John Moncur.

Born in Mile End Hospital, John represented Essex and London as a schoolboy and though he is the son of the Youth Development Officer at White Hart Lane, his association with Spurs was not a foregone conclusion. Indeed, John trained with Arsenal, West Ham United and Orient before signing apprentice forms with Tottenham in 1983.

John played for the England Under-16 team in the European Championships but made his League debut, not for Spurs but for Doncaster Rovers, while on loan to Rovers in a 3-1 home win over York City in September 1986.

John also had a spell with Cambridge United on loan that season in which he also made one First Division appearance for Spurs, ironically in Glenn's number 10 shirt, at Everton. John was one of several youngsters drafted in for that final League game of the season as Tottenham rested their star men prior to the FA Cup Final.

In all, John made 21 League appearances for Spurs - his only first team game this season being in a Rumbelows League Cup tie at Swansea - but he spent a month on loan with Nottingham Forest prior to his arrival here and in the past two seasons has also made League appearances with Portsmouth (7) and Brentford (6) on loan.

At 25, John is hoping he can establish himself in the Swindon midfield.

A man with far more experience is Terry Gibson, who made his Swindon debut at Portsmouth last Saturday.

Terry is another product from the Tottenham school of football, joining their apprentice ranks in 1979. He made his League bow against Stoke City in a First Division fixture in December 1979, alongside Glenn Hoddle, Ossie Ardiles and Steve Perryman. Was loaned out to the GAIS club of Gothenburg in 1982 to gain experience and, on his return, netted four goals in 16 League games for Spurs.

In the summer of 1983 Terry transferred to Coventry City where he scored 43 League goals in 98 First Division appearances before being snapped up by Manchester United in 1986. Didn't really settle at Old Trafford where he scored once in 23 League outings and in the summer of 1987 he joined Wimbledon.

A former England Youth international, Terry is still only 29, yet with a wealth of experience, including a memorable FA Cup winning performance with the Dons against Liverpool in 1988.

Two new faces then to freshen up our final assault on the promotion challenge. Prior to this week's vital midweek fixtures, we were just four points adrift of the play-off places, so we really have something to aim for.

With six games to play after today, it is not going to be easy, as only two, against Wolves and Plymouth Argyle, are at home. Of the four sides in the play-off positions, Cambridge United, Middlesbrough, Leicester City and Charlton Athletic, the latter would seem to have the more difficult run-in, with Sunderland, Watford, Leicester and Tranmere to face, as well as Port Vale and Bristol Rovers away.

Bristol Rovers indeed could have a big say in determining the final positions for they also face us and Middlesbrough.

Whatever transpires, we shall need a good result today and something to show from next week's trips to Millwall and Rovers to keep in touch.



another save from Grew in the 20th minute, but six minutes later, the keeper was powerless to prevent his side from going two goals down. ATom Jones lob from wide on the right deceived Aspin and Steve White nipped between him and the unfortunate Grew to head home. The punishment intensified with four minutes of the first half remaining.






