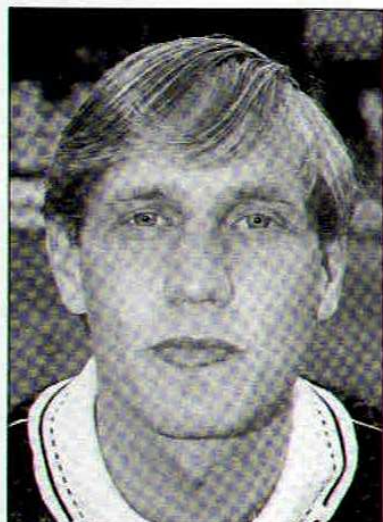

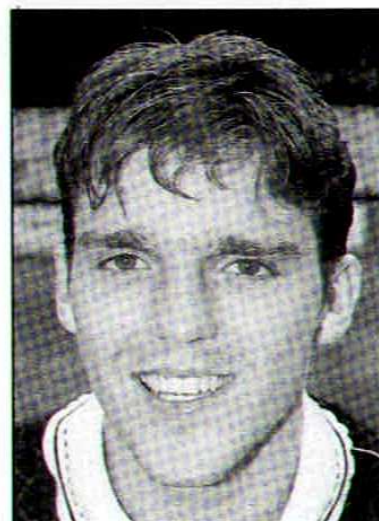

"I've been winding him up to get more tackles in, and when he does just that he ends up getting sent off," mused the Lions boss.

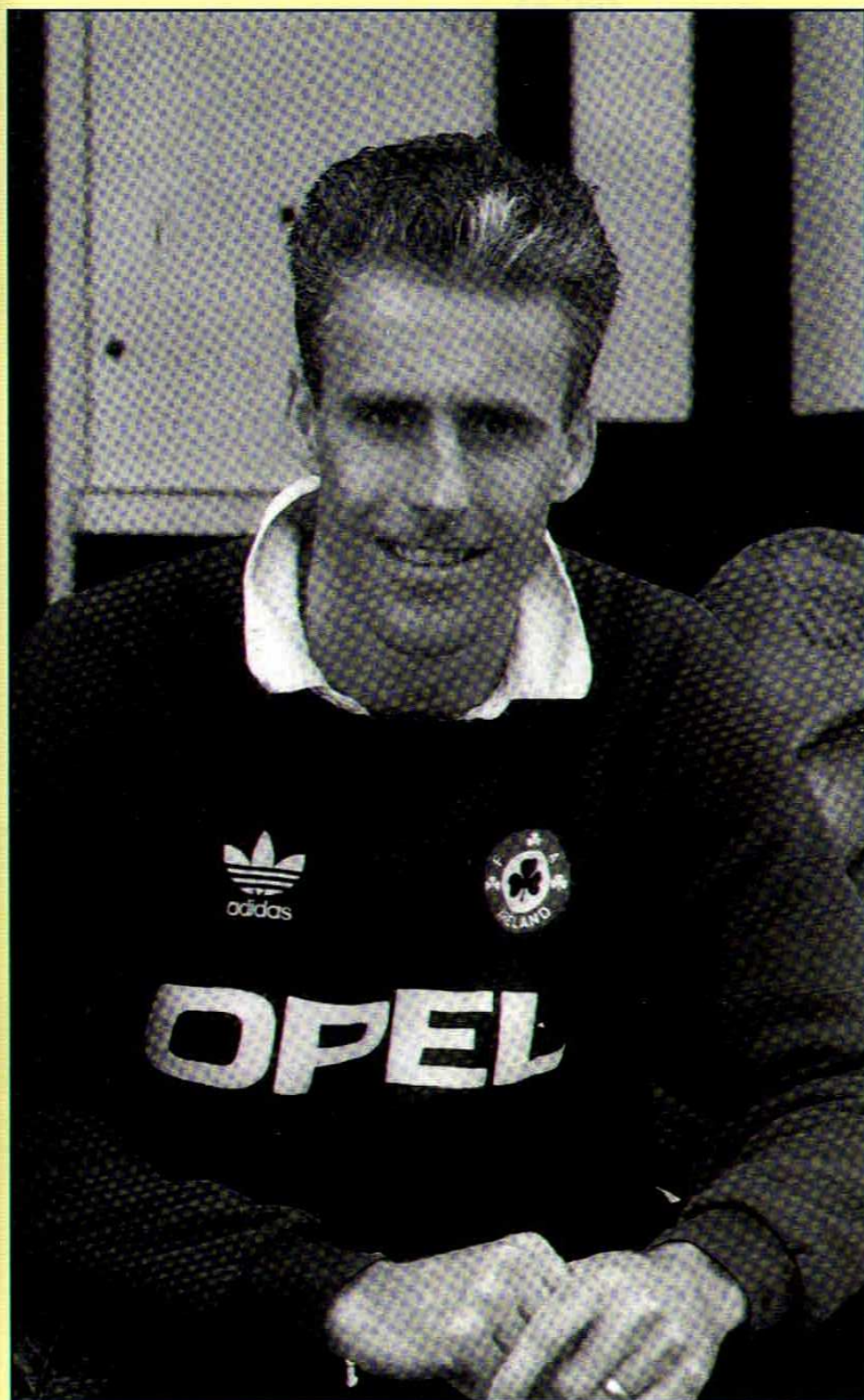

## FLASHBACK

### FIVE YEARS AGO.

This week in 1987 we were playing out time until the end of the season, a respectable mid-table position the most likely outcome since the turn of the year. Our desultory performances that spring were typified by a run of seven Second Division games in which we scored in just two of them. It was hardly surprising that fewer than 4,000 turned up at the Den to see a second half Sheringham goal beat a poor Grimsby side in the middle of a wretched run which saw them plunge from eighth in the middle of March to one of the two relegation places by season's end, just ten games later.

Life was more exciting at the County Ground as they were battling for a second promotion in 12 months. A thrilling 4-3 win at neighbours Bristol Rovers strengthened Swindon's claim to a Second Division place. After 23 minutes, the Robins trailed to goals by Penrice and Turner, but equalised through White and Quinn. A Purnell penalty put the Pirates ahead again, but two goals in a minute, from Bamber and Quinn, earned Swindon the points and took them a step nearer promotion.

### TEN YEARS AGO.

At the beginning of April 1982, any lingering hopes we had of promotion from Division Three evaporated. We followed a 1-3 home defeat by Huddersfield three days later with a 1-4 drubbing from London neighbours Brentford at Griffin Park. Against the Bees, player-manager Peter Anderson recalled himself for the first time since October, and at half time, there was no score. After the interval, however, Brentford struck through Johnson, Booker, McNichol and Roberts, to which we could only offer an Alan West goal in reply.

Swindon were heading for relegation from the Third Division in April 1982, their plight worsened by a 0-5 hammering by Oxford at the Manor Ground. The Robins were swamped by goals from Fogg, Thomas, Shotton, Lawrence and Foley. Manager John Trollope gave a League debut to defender Colin Bailie against Oxford and a full debut to striker Jimmy Quinn. Both players added substantially to their appearances total, Bailie with Swindon, Reading and Cambridge and Quinn with Swindon, Blackburn, Leicester and Bradford City.

### FIFTEEN YEARS AGO.

On this day in 1977, Good Friday, two Terry Brisley goals were not enough to save us from defeat against Charlton at the Valley. Flanagan, Peacock and McAuley scored for the Valiants in front of a 16,612 crowd. This was our third defeat on the trot and put paid to any Second Division promotion hopes.

Swindon kicked off their holiday programme with a 0-0 draw at Oxford, a Third Division fixture between two mid-table teams. Micky French, a striker, made his Swindon debut after signing from Brentford, the first of only ten outings for the Robins.

Former Millwall midfielder Gary Waddock is one of the players chosen by Swindon player-manager Glenn Hoddle to fill the voids left by the departure of two key figures. Swindon sold their prolific goalscorer Duncan Shearer to Blackburn for £750,000 shortly before last month's deadline. Earlier they had sold star midfielder Fitzroy Simpson to Manchester City for £500,000.

Gary was signed on loan from Q.P.R. to slot into Simpson's place. Striker Terry Gibson, who is on loan from Wimbledon, has stepped into Shearer's boots.

And that must be one of the most difficult tasks in football at the moment. Shearer had

been top scorer every season since joining the club from Huddersfield in 1988. Following his 16-goal hit in 1988/89, he scored 27 and 23 over the next two seasons and had 32 goals to his credit when he left last month.

## IN THE HOT SEAT

When it seemed his playing days had been ended by injury, Glenn Hoddle took over as Swindon's manager last March but he has made such a successful come back as a player this season that, until he was injured in October, some were suggesting he was good

enough to play for England again.

During his great days at Tottenham in the 'seventies and 'eighties, Glenn played for England on 53 occasions. He left White Hart Lane in 1987 when Monaco signed him for £800,000.

Gibson made his Swindon

debut at Portsmouth 10 days ago, lining up alongside Dave Mitchell, the Australian international. Shaun Close, another forward, has recently been included as substitute.

Steve White is second-highest scorer (15 goals) but

he was injured in December and has since played only once as substitute.

With Mr Hoddle having regained match fitness, he has resumed his place in

Micky started his career with Tottenham and, strangely, his most successful campaign as a goalscorer was his first full season in the side. He scored 10 times during 1981/82. But, of course, his main function was to set up attacks, rather than

round them off.

He won an F.A. Cup winners' medal and an UEFA Cup winners' medal before joining Chelsea for £300,000 in 1985. Portsmouth signed him in January 1990 and he moved on to Swindon during the early weeks of last season.

All Lions' fans will be hoping that we can improve still further our marvellous recent record against Swindon. We have been beaten only twice in our last 20 home and away League games against the Wiltshire club.

The most recent of those reverses was suffered on New Year's Day at The County Ground where we went three goals down by half-time. Duncan Shearer got two of the goals with Martin Ling grabbing the other. Though John McGinlay pulled back a goal soon after the break, we were beaten 1-3.

We are unbeaten in our last 12 League games at the Den, a 68th minute goal from Kevin O'Callaghan earning us a 1-0 victory when we last played here in the League in March last season. The three points enabled us to maintain our challenge for a place in the promotion play-offs.

Our previous win at the Den was achieved in October 1980 when Nick Chatterton, Tony Kinsella and Chris Dible all found the target in a 3-1 success. Alan Mayes got the Swindon goal.

One of the most critical games between the sides took place in April 1976. We travelled to the County Ground for our last match of the season, needing to win to maintain a serious chance of winning promotion to the Second Division.

Second-half goals from John Seasman and Phil Summerill gave us the 2-0 win we needed and that put us into second place. But Cardiff, with one game left, and Crystal Palace, with two to play, could both have overtaken us had they collected maximum points. We had to wait eight days, until Palace dropped a point in a goalless home game with Chesterfield, before we could start our promotion celebrations.

One of the most memorable of our recent games here was in March 1980 when Bobby Shinton and John Lyons both scored twice, with Tony Tagg and Tony Turner also contributing to a 6-2 victory. We even scored one of Swindon's goals, John Sinton conceding an own-goal. Andy Rowland claimed Swindon's other goal.

We have to go back to November 1962 to trace Swindon's last League victory at The Den - and that was certainly an exciting match. Goals from Eddie Towers and Joe Broadfoot had given the Lions a 2-1 interval advantage. But Cliff Jackson completed a hat-trick for Swindon after the break and with John Smith also slipping one in for the visitors, Swindon won 4-3. Broadfoot netted our third goal.

midfield where he has been partnered by Waddock, Micky Hazard and Tom Jones.

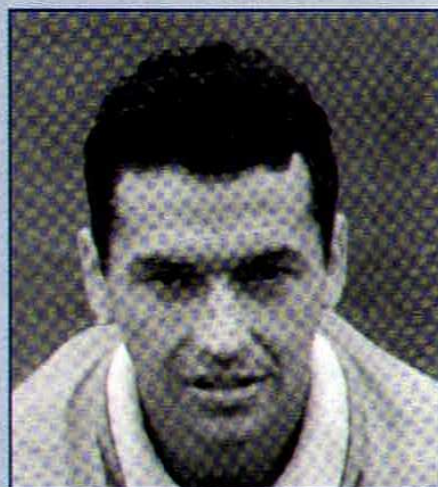
Shaun Taylor, signed from Exeter last summer, has slotted in with David Kerslake and Paul Bodin filling the full-back positions. Nick Summerbee, who has played at full-back and in midfield, is often nominated as substitute.

Frazer Digby recently resumed his place in goal.

Prior to their trip to Sunderland last week, Swindon had won only three away League matches - at Ipswich (4-1), Plymouth (4-0) and Brighton (2-0).

They drew at Port Vale (2-2), Charlton (0-0), Tranmere (0-0), Middlesbrough (2-2), Bristol City (1-1), Barnsley (1-1), Grimsby (0-0) and Portsmouth (1-1) but were beaten at Cambridge (2-3), Wolves (1-2), Southend (2-3), Leicester (1-3), Blackburn (1-2), Oxford (3-5) and Newcastle (1-3).

The Robins enjoyed a good run in the F.A. Cup. Following a home win over Watford (3-2), they ran up a fine 3-0 victory at Cambridge in round four. But they went out at the next

stage when they were beaten at home by Aston Villa (1-2).

Swindon progressed to the fourth round of the Rumbelows League Cup. After winning at 2-0 home to W.B.A. they drew the return game 2-2 on the Third Division club's ground. The Robins then drew away to Millwall (2-2) before ultimately winning that tie 5-3 on aggregate.

Swindon scored an outstanding victory at Huddersfield (4-1) in round three before being beaten 0-1 at home by Crystal Palace at the next stage.

In the Zenith Data Systems Cup Swindon were held to 3-3 at home by Oxford but they won the penalty shoot-out 4-3. They then went out at Chelsea (0-1).

## RECENT FORM

Swindon's once-bright promotion hopes have faded over the past few weeks as the team has struggled to find any sort of consistency. The Robins still have a chance of making the play-offs but, until February, they were in with a

chance of clinching one of the two guaranteed promotion places.

They then went into a run of five games without a win, collecting just one point in the process.

Though that run was halted

with successive recent home wins, Swindon now have ground to make up.

For our penultimate Saturday home game of 1991-92 we welcome Bristol City, who after a promising start to the season, have slipped into the relegation dog fight at the foot of the table. With just six points covering the eight clubs at the bottom at the time of writing, including the Robins in 20th place, our meeting will be no end-of-season encounter with nothing at stake.

City will be fighting to preserve the Second Division status they won just two years ago. Last year they finished a very respectable ninth, and three of their points came in this corresponding fixture, played in October 1990. The Robins trailed to a Gary Waddock goal at half time, but came back to win through a Brian Horne own goal and a Mark Aizlewood effort. At Ashton Gate, however, we got ample revenge, a Sheringham hat-trick helping us to a 4-1 win.

This season, life has been harder, and the club has seen a few changes. Joe Jordan, manager during the promotion success, departed for Scottish club Hearts, and his number two, Jimmy Lumsden, a Scot who played for Leeds and Southend, took over in October 1990. A poor run in the League from December onwards, led to him leave the club in February, despite a Cup run which saw City claim the scalps of Leicester and Wimbledon before falling to Nottingham Forest.

New manager, Denis Smith arrived at Ashton Gate in March after losing his job at Sunderland just before Christmas. As a player, Smith was an uncompromising defender with Stoke before going into management with York. He steered the Minster Men to the Fourth Division title in 1983-84, and then tried his luck at Roker Park. Smith rescued the Wearsideers from Third Division obscurity in 1987-88, and in 1990 they returned to Division One when Swindon were 'demoted' because of financial irregularities.

Clearly, Smith has an impressive management

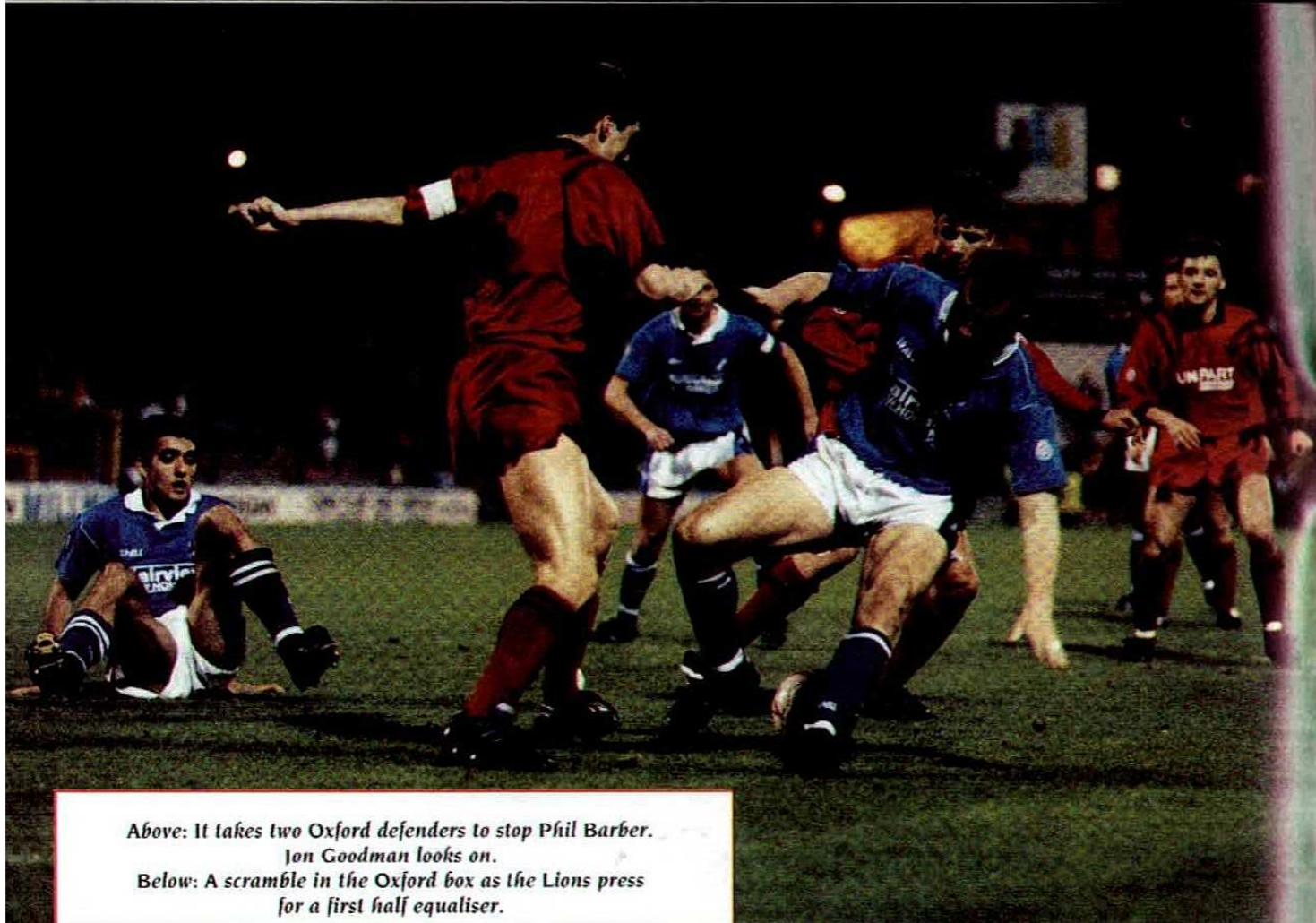
pedigree and he has already started to rebuild the side. He inherited a squad with a lot of experience, including Russell Osman, once of Ipswich, Leicester, Southampton and England, Mark Aizlewood, a Welsh international who has been with Luton, Charlton, Leeds and Bradford City and Gary Shelton, who made his name with Sheffield Wednesday but was also at Aston Villa and Oxford. These three acted as a triumvirate between Lumsden's going and Smith's arrival. The elusive winger Mark Gavin rejoined the Robins from Watford during the season and linked up with £300,000 signing from Watford, Wayne Allison and the impressive 'Jackie' Dziekanowski, a Polish international who was with Celtic.

It is up front that City have been found wanting, particularly since the departures of Rob Newman to Norwich and Bob Taylor to West Brom. Smith has strengthened his strike force with Arsenal's on-loan Andrew Cole and Leroy

Rosenior, once of Fulham and QPR but signed on a free transfer from West Ham. He has also bought Dutchman Ray Atteveld from Everton, but let the curiously named Junior Bent go on loan to Stoke.

Since his arrival, Smith's side has stopped leaking goals, but has still found the going tough. His one victory to date must have been particularly sweet, a 3-1 triumph at his former club Sunderland. The Robins need, however, to recapture the sort of form they were in when we met at Ashton Gate earlier in the season to ensure their survival. With wins against Brighton, Blackburn and Bristol Rovers under their belts, together with three draws, they were in fifth place when we fought out a 2-2 draw. Today, both clubs have new men at the helm, each with something to prove, and any thoughts of the coming summer break will be quickly banished as City and ourselves go all out for the three points.

Keegan's arrival changed that with a run of four wins and a draw putting a glimmer of daylight between Newcastle and the relegation zone.

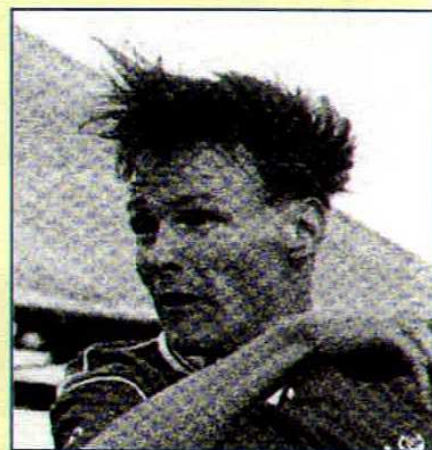
At the time of writing the Geordies

The leadership of the Second Division changed hands for the first time since before Christmas following Blackburn's recent poor run of results. Despite his spending spree just prior to the transfer deadline, Kenny Dalglish has failed to halt the 'slide'. After losing to Barnsley 1-2 at Oakwell, they crashed 0-2 at bottom club Port Vale, to make it three defeats on the trot and just one win in eight outings. The only positive sign Dalglish could detect about the visit to Vale Park was that it only lasted 90 minutes.

For struggling Port Vale, the points give them a glimmer of hope, and it was the first time this season that they have won two consecutive games. The previous Saturday they ended a run of five straight defeats, and recorded their first win in 18 matches when a Walker penalty earned three points against Plymouth.

Ipswich took advantage of Blackburn's lapses to go on top following victories at home to Derby (2-1) and Barnsley (2-0). With crowds at both games of 14,000 and the high scoring duo of Dozzell and Kiwomya sharing the goals the good times have returned to Portman Road. John Lyall's record at Suffolk has probably not gone unnoticed at Upton Park. Cambridge, Middlesbrough and Leicester continue their pursuit of the two leaders, but Charlton have made a late claim. After winning at Blackburn, they earned a creditable draw with Boro and then in midweek did what only Derby have done this season, won at Fratton Park. A few days before they faced Liverpool in the Cup semi-final, Portsmouth's own promotion hopes were dented when Leaburn and Whyte, on loan from Palace, brought Charlton back from behind to score an important win for the Valiants.

At the bottom, the relegation battle is turning into a real dog fight. Like their manager Newcastle have shown a tendency to live at the edge of life's emotional range. At home before the Second Division's biggest crowd of the season, of over 30,000, the Magpies beat neighbours Sunderland with a David Kelly goal, his seventh in nine games since Kevin Keegan's arrival. At Wolves in midweek, the Tyners scored twice, but conceded six, and are not safe yet. Brighton ended Watford's run of four straight wins with a 1-0 victory at Vicarage Road to complicate life for Peter Shilton at Plymouth. The defeat at Port Vale was followed by a 1-2 home reverse at the hands of fellow strugglers Grimsby, and the Pilgrims are now just one point off the bottom. Next Saturday's visitors to the Den, Bristol City, continue to live dangerously. They could only manage a draw at home to Oxford, but days later, came back from 0-2 at Tranmere to snatch a point. New manager Denis Smith had the pleasure of seeing his new strikers, on-loan Andrew Cole from Arsenal and Leroy Rosenior, hit the target. It makes next Saturday's game all the more important for the Robins.

## Dawsey shines as Lions sink Oxford crew

Many observers rated our performance against Oxford here last Wednesday as one of the best examples of all round team play seen at The Den all season. It was difficult to single out any one individual for particular praise on the night, as so many made vital contributions to the Lions' fight back after conceding that early goal. The gentlemen from Capital Plant, our match sponsors that evening, ultimately decided to present their Man of the Match award to Ian Dawes, and on reflection few would argue with their choice.

It is sometimes easy to take a player like Ian for granted. As a full back he does not capture the attention of headline writers for his spectacular exploits. But on numerous occasions, supporters evaluating their team's efforts after a match will be heard to comment, "Dawsey didn't have a bad game", testimony to the consistency of performance he produces.

He acknowledges what a frustrating season it has been for the faithful who have witnessed so many home defeats and is looking to give them cause for optimism that there will be no repeat next season.

# WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

## PAT TERRY

Pat Terry was born locally in Lambeth on the 2nd October, 1933. As a schoolboy his hero was Tommy Lawton and as he set out on his footballing career he tried to emulate him. Following a much travelled career when he played for Charlton Athletic, Newport County, Swansea City, Gillingham and Northampton, he arrived at Millwall on the 1st February, 1962. Pat made his debut two days later scoring a goal in a 3-2 victory at Chesterfield.

He was more than pleased to sign for Millwall since he had supported them as a youngster, as did most of his family and friends. He formed a formidable partnership with Peter Burridge and David Jones and the 13 goals he scored from 17 League appearances were enough for Millwall to win the Fourth Division Championship in the 1961/62 season, a great moment in his career.

After just 2½ years Pat left Millwall in August, 1964. He did not want to leave the club and would have been happy to finish his career there, an opinion shared by most of the Directors, but the Manager had the final say. He moved on to Reading, Swindon Town and Brentford before hanging up his boots in 1970. In a career spanning 15 years Pat made 494 League appearances scoring on 227 occasions, an excellent goals ratio for a centre forward.

He recalls the worst moment of his career, "being sent off by those little men in black with whistles." When he retired he chose not to follow a career in football. Whilst with Millwall, he became a taxi driver along with Joe Broadfoot and Gary Townend.

Pat is married to Marilyn and they have four children, Deborah, Maria, Patrick and



Sean. He continues to keep in touch with Dave Harper and they play the odd round of golf together. He also plays snooker when he has the time.

## LEGENDARY LIONS

**Born: Liverpool 1875**

Hulse started as a professional in the Football League with Blackburn Rovers in 1897 and in three seasons he had played over 100 First Division games. In the summer of 1900 he signed for New Brighton Tower, who were to last only the 1900-01 season before folding. Millwall succeeded in bringing Ben Hulse to London, despite fierce competition from other clubs vying for his goalscoring talents. He was a tall, lean centre-forward who could dribble round defenders or simply use his strength. He was also adept at setting up scoring chances for his colleagues. Hulse scored in Millwall's first game at the new 'North Greenwich' ground in a 2-0 win over Aston Villa on 18th Sept. 1901. In January 1902, he suffered a dislocated collarbone, and in his comeback, against Spurs, he fell heavily on the shoulder and had to leave the field. He had recovered fully by the start of the 1902-03 season, and led Millwall to the FA Cup Semi-final. Two weeks later he netted four goals in the 7-1 win over West Ham Utd in the Southern Charity Cup semi-final, but never played in the final against Portsmouth, (0-2). That year he was leading scorer with 31 goals in all games. In 1903-04 he scored two goals against Spurs in the above cup as Millwall again reached the final, winning 2-1 against Arsenal. Ben played 111 games and scored 66 goals for Millwall, before moving to Brighton where he played for one season.

Southern league debut for Millwall v Wellingborough 14th September 1901.

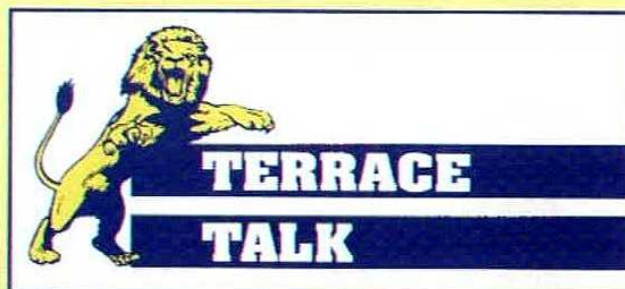
## LIONS SIGN PETER TERRY A man with a Millwall connection

Last Thursday, seven days after the transfer deadline, Millwall signed 19 year old midfielder Peter Terry on a non-contract basis from Aldershot. After Aldershot had gone out of business, the other 92 League Clubs were given a week's extension on the transfer deadline if they wanted to take on a former Shots player. Mick McCarthy explains how Terry came to join the Lions.

"I was talking to a friend of mine at the P.F.A. dinner, and his son Mark Ogley was an Aldershot player. He told me of the plight of the Aldershot lads who hadn't been paid for 14 weeks and weren't likely to get anything for another 18. He was looking for clubs to take one player out of the ten or eleven left, so I asked Mr Burr if he would take one on, and he kindly agreed to take Peter on a trial basis until the end of May.

"I hope Peter will play in all our Combination games between now and the end of the season, and whether we take him on after that or somebody else does, I want to give him a chance. People are saying it's nice for the lad, but it might turn out to be nice for us too. We may discover that we've got ourselves a good player on the cheap."

Peter himself was particularly pleased to get his chance to carry on a family tradition at Millwall. Many fans will remember his uncle Pat making 104 first team appearances and scoring 45 goals for the Lions between 1961-64. The youngster has got some way to go to equal Pat's record, but with 13 League games already under his belt at the Recreation Ground, he already has something to build on.

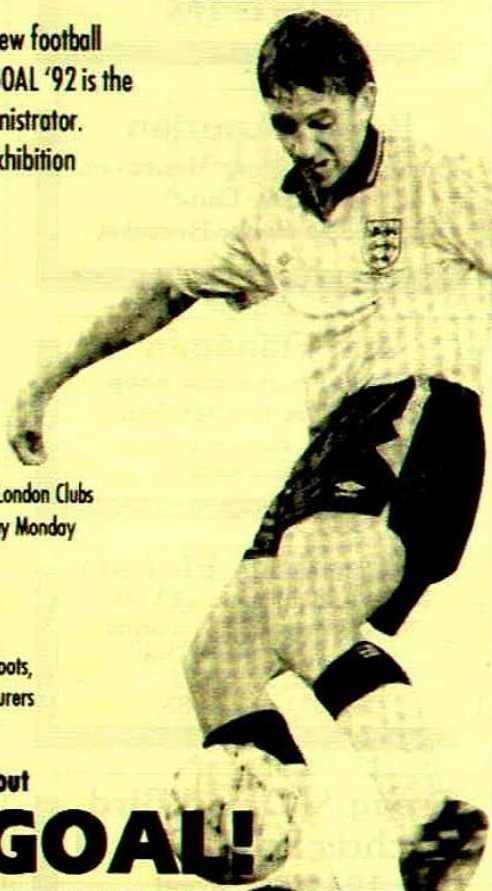

# SEASON *by* SEASON

To strengthen his squad manager GRAHAM obtained the services of LES BRILEY, a tenacious midfielder who had previously been with CHELSEA, HEREFORD, WIMBLEDON and ALDERSHOT.

BILL ROFFEY, a defender, came to the Den from the ORIENT. LINDSAY SMITH, another defender from CAMBRIDGE UTD renewed his acquaintance with the Lions having had a loan spell at the Den in 1977. Later in the season JOHN FASHANU, a tall striker came to the club via LINCOLN CITY for a fee of £55,000, and experienced defender PAUL HINSHELWOOD joined the playing staff, signing from OXFORD UTD for £10,000.

MILLWALL's opening match of the season was against SWANSEA CITY at the Den. This was the first meeting between the clubs since 1966. BRENNER put the Lions ahead after five minutes, and debut man ROFFEY scored with a fierce drive from thirty five yards out a minute before the interval. Result: 2-0 to the Lions ALL 4,650.

The Lions then lost 0-1 at CAMBRIDGE UTD. Next was a London Derby against the ORIENT at the Den. The home side won 1-0, scorer DEAN NEAL.

A point was earned away to WALSALL (3-3) then MILLWALL gained their first away victory, winning 1-0 at DONCASTER ROVERS. BRENNER scored a brace in the 4-1 home win over WIGAN ATH.

The team's second defeat came away to NEWPORT Co. 2-3.

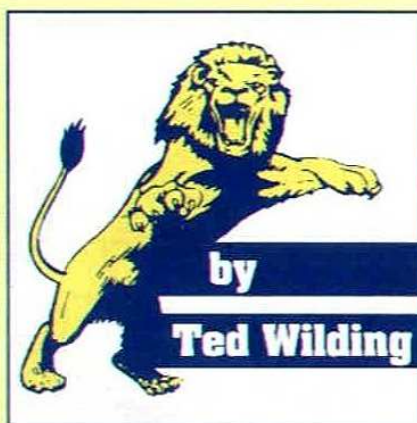
MILLWALL kept their 100% home record, but only just. LOVELL scored an injury time winner from the penalty spot in the 2-1 win over DERBY Co.

A great 4-1 win at GILLINGHAM and then a 2-0 home win against BRENTFORD put the Lions in second place in the Division, a point behind leaders BRISTOL ROVERS.

The points were shared at Bootham Crescent (1-1) against third placed York City.

Two goals from LOVELL against LINCOLN CITY (2-0) saw MILLWALL perched at the top of Division III.

were the first side to steal a point from the Den in a 1-1 draw.

PRESTON N.E. were defeated 2-0 at home and a point won at BRISTOL ROVERS before MILLWALL suffered their third loss of the season, away to BRADFORD C. (1-3). MILLWALL had gone eight matches without defeat at the time, and striker LOVELL had scored in ten consecutive games.

A little inconsistency crept into the Lions play, only eight points were secured from

eight matches between DEC 1st and JAN 29th. During November Graham had signed FASHANU to bolster the attack and "Fash" made his debut for the Lions in the 0-2 defeat at BOLTON on Dec. 15th.

After twenty four matches the Lions had slipped to sixth place, thirteen points behind leaders BRADFORD CITY. The beginning of February 1985 saw the turning point of MILLWALL's fortunes, the team recorded six straight wins in an unbeaten eleven match run, seven successive clean sheets, and a goals tally of 16-2, which put the club back up amongst the promotion candidates. Defeat came at Boothferry Park against HULL CITY (1-2).

MILLWALL were to lose just one more game in the final run up the end of the season, which was away to PRESTON (1-2), of the remaining eight matches, six were won and two drawn.

The last home game drew a crowd of 13,460, the largest League gate at the Den since the game against SPURS in Dec. 1977.

MILLWALL'S 2-0 victory, over the visitors PLYMOUTH was their eighteenth of the season, and they remained unbeaten at home for the first time since season 1971/72.

The record:

P23 W18 D5 L0 F44 A12 PTS 59.

This win assured MILLWALL runners-up position in the League behind Champions BRADFORD CITY and promotion to the Second Division.

STEVE LOVELL finished top League scorer with 21 goals to his credit. Average home attendances had risen by over 2,000 to 6,449.

Since the arrival of GEORGE GRAHAM as manager, the Club had been saved from relegation to the Fourth Division in 1982/83, consolidated their position when finishing ninth in 1983/84 and he guided the club to promotion to Division II this term, during the Club's Centenary year.

The home win over BOLTON W. on April 30th 1985 was MILLWALL'S 1000th League victory since joining the Third Division in season 1920/21.

## Run ends at Portman Road

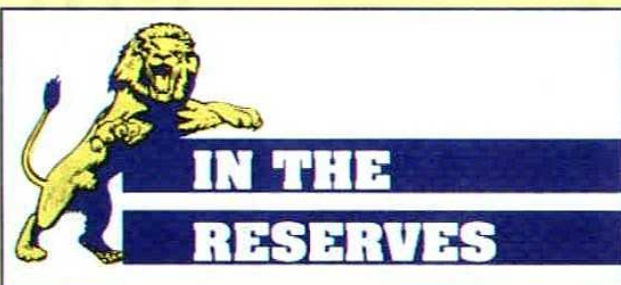

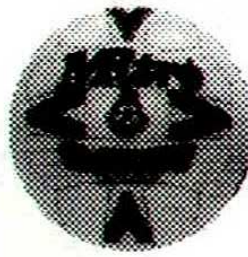
