





Much as they did last year, Swindon have surprised many onlookers by selling prominent players at a crucial time. Last year Paul Bodin, Jon Gittens and Alan McLoughlin departed, although in Bodin's case not for long since his spell at Palace lasted only 10 months. This time Fitzroy Simpson moved to Manchester City at the beginning of March and most surprisingly top scorer Duncan Shearer joined promotion rivals Blackburn on transfer deadline day.

Promotion must still be a possibility but the only chance remaining must be via the play-off system which has served the club so well in the past. A third of the way into the season they headed the table and were displaying such a flowing blend of football that few would have bet against an automatic promotion spot. Unfortunately 9 games without a win blew a hole in their expectations and since the New Year they have just managed to keep within sight of the leading group. Perhaps recent signings will provide the boost that will be needed to climb into the top six.

Certainly Terry Gibson has the credentials to suggest that he will contribute goals if he can aspire to the levels of performance he achieved at Coventry and in his early days at Plough Lane. In his first season in South London he won an FA Cup Winners medal but last year he managed only 5 goals in 22 first team appearances. If he is seen as the replacement for Shearer he has a hard act to follow. Duncan equalled a post-war scoring record for the club when he scored his 32nd of the campaign in his final outing at the County Ground against Southend.

Eire International Gary Weddock made his Robins debut in the same match and will bring his experience of over 250 league appearances to the squad. In contrast Stepney born mid-fielder John Moncur will be looking to finally land a regular first team place after waiting in the wings for 7 years at White Hart Lane and gaining more league experience during several loan spells than he could with his own club. Mick Hazard will sympathise with the

THE PLAYER MANAGER

A year ago, on April 4th, Swindon appointed Glenn Hoddle in succession to Ossie Ardiles who had taken the managerial job at Newcastle United five days earlier, the appointment was seen as a declaration of intent to continue the style of passing football established during the Argentinian's reign and so it was proved.

Glenn was born at Hayes, Middlesex in October, 1957 and joined Tottenham Hotspur where his midfield skills created a legend. He graced 5 FA Cup Finals, including two replays, but gained a winners medal only once. Following the replay defeat at the hands of Manchester City in 1981 it was Glenn the goalscorer who earned victory in the next year again after a replay. In the first match against Queens Park Rangers Hoddle's goal set up a 1-1 draw. His penalty in the second game was the only goal. (Incidentally Mick Hazard played for Spurs and Gary Waddock for Rangers in both matches.)

He moved to Monaco in 1987 and it was while at the French club that he gained the last of his 53 full England caps scoring eight times. Swindon is his first experience of management.

new recruit since he clocked up only 73 full league appearances during seven years at Spurs. In his second season at Swindon he is close to overhauling that total already as he has established himself as the cornerstone of the side.

In addition to Mick, David Kerslake, central defenders Colin Calderwood and Shaun Taylor and Tom Jones, scorer of the only goal in our visit to Swindon in September, provide the regulars in the team. Otherwise there have been several playing changes during the campaign some inforced by injury. Notably, Glenn Hoddle missed 22 games but has been back in action since the beginning of March at the expense of Ross MacLaren. Steve White lost his place to Australian International David Mitchell on New Year's day and the antipodean has held onto the striker's spot scoring four times during the month of March.

It is "between the posts" that the greatest competition for first team selection has taken place. Fraser Digby who missed only 5 games last season has had to share the duties with Nicky Hammond. If Nicky gets the jersey this morning he will return to the ground where he played for Rovers in 1986 while on loan from Arsenal.

GETTING VERY CLOSE

Having clinched promotion through the play-off system in 1987 the last four seasons have been spent in Division Two - but only just! The play-offs in 1989 saw Crystal Palace deny the Robins and fellow hopefuls Blackburn and Watford. Twelve months later Alan McLoughlin's goal at Wembley seemed to have secured First Division status for the first time. However, the much publicised judgements over previous financial irregularities almost dumped them into the Third but an appeal settled for a further spell in the Second.

Perhaps due to that disappointment, but also with early season injuries the results on the field almost brought about the relegation that the appeal had prevented.



IS GOD ON OUR SIDE?

I contacted Stuart Weir of Christians in Sport for more information on the role of football club chaplains, and he kindly sent me an extremely useful pack of information and put me in touch with Derek Cleave and Nigel Sands, chaplains at Bristol City and Crystal Palace, respectively.

Copies of the Christians in Sport Quarterly magazine were very interesting to read and one featured an article on Denis Bailey, now at QPR, of course, and scorer of a televised hat trick against Manchester United. Other players receiving a mention included Gavin Peacock (Newcastle), Phil Starbuck

(Huddersfield), Cyrille Regis (Aston Villa), Brian Irvine (Aberdeen) and John Salako (Crystal Palace). Bob Hamer, one of our local referees, was also featured taking an active part in the Second Annual Conference of Football Club Chaplains in 1990.

Nigel Sands at Crystal Palace explains that football's association with the church is not so unusual when you consider that many clubs began life as church teams. Swindon Town and Barnsley were formed by clergymen, Everton began life as a Weslyan Sunday School side, Blackpool as Blackpool St John's and Queens Park Rangers as St Jude's FC.

Nigel is a Crystal Palace fan, as well as the club chaplain. He is a regular contributor to the club programme and club historian, an association which began in 1974, when he began contributing historical articles on the club. He is also a member of the

'92 club, having been to every League ground in the country. (I assume he has now made that 93, with a visit to Barnet, but I forgot to ask him!).

He places great emphasis on the pastoral role of the club chaplain, with a great deal of his work being carried out behind the scenes and with the minimum of fuss. It can involve a variety of tasks. For example, visiting injured players, either at the club or in hospital, and talking to close relatives of the players. Counselling and establishing friendships with players is also important, especially as the life of a professional footballer can be so insecure with loss of form, transfers, family problems and, for the younger players, the fact that many will be told that they do not have what it takes to make it as a professional.

Bereavement is another area where a friendly word can help. It applies to us all – how many of us welcome the comforting words of our vicar when we lose a loved one? I suspect it applies to the majority of us. Nigel was able to help Andy Gray who recently lost his mother, while Derek Cleave at Bristol City has, I am sure, been of tremendous help to friends and families of the City personnel who have been touched by bereavement in tragic circumstances in recent years.

Derek is a keen City supporter and has been club chaplain since 1982, and attends all home matches. He also cites the pastoral role as being very important and makes a point of being at the club at least twice a week, just to talk to and listen to everyone, players and staff alike.

Now here, at Bristol Rovers, we don't have a chaplain. Is it because Pirates were regarded as heathens? Who knows, but I reckon it's about time we took some positive steps to remedy the situation. As someone who thought that Gerry Francis walked on water and feels that Dennis Rofe has performed a few miracles, I still reckon we could do with a little divine intervention on a permanent basis, starting this very Sunday morning!!

My sources tell me that Gordon Wilson, who was chaplain to Sheffield Wednesday at the time of the Hillsborough disaster, is now a very much respected figure in local Methodist circles. I'm sure that if the club contacted him, or Christians in Sport, we could find ourselves a football fanatic who might just fancy being club chaplain at Twerton Park!

following day Newcastle improved their position after a David Kelly goal in front of the section's largest gathering of the season 30,306 gave them victory

over Sunderland. In other games Rovers lost 1-0 despite the defeat of John Taylor at Watford. Millwall had Alex Rae sent off in a goalless draw at Wolves.

Tuesday 31st March Ipswich extend their

lead at the top of the section to four points as Chris Kiwomya scores twice in their 2-0 victory over Barnsley who have now lost on their last seven league visits to Portman Road. Charlton enhance their promotion prospects with a 2-1 win at Portsmouth. Blackburn remain in second place despite going down 2.0 at bottom club Port Vale, who are now a point worse off than Plymouth, who conceded their 4,000 league goal in a 2-1 defeat by Grimsby. Town recorded their first success at Home Park since August 1948. Andy Mutch nets a hat trick in Wolves 6-2 win over Newcastle while Brighton 1-0 winners at Watford Bristol City who conceded their 4,700th league goal in sharing four goals at Tranmere both improve their chances of avoiding the drop.







JUST BOWLING ALONG

Discovering the precise move date to a new stadium for Rovers seems to be about as clusive as the precise whereabouts of Lord Lucan! I realise that there may be reasons for the delay but it is of some concern to many fans that even clubs such as Walsall, Scunthorpe United, Chester City, Yeovil Town and Wycombe Wanderers have not only planned but built new stadiums in less than the time we have now spent here at Twerton Park.

Any new stadium will obviously need to include other uses just to be economic, and perhaps we should pay tribute to the foresight of the late Harry Dolman (Chairman of Bristol City) when he planned a Grandstand at Ashton Gate to include a home for the "Bristol Indoor Bowling Club."

That club is open **SEVEN** days each week between 10.00 and 22.30. They are in fact tenants of the football club and contribute the not inconsiderable sum of around £38,000 annually, equivalent to the revenue from an extra "home" game.

The club has two pairs of 3 rinks back to back, which allows up to 48 players to play simultaneously. Play is divided into 2 hour sessions throughout the day. Needless to say there is a social side to the game and the self contained bars can accommodate up to 350 at any one time, meaning that even during a "home" game at least 400 could be enjoying themselves irrespective of the state of play.

To ensure continuous use there are different leagues for each day. At weekends Club League games are played in 3 hour sessions over 21 ends which last between 14.00 and 17.30. There are Cup competitions such as the Haven C.U. Cup as well as local club competitions played either early or late on Saturdays or Sundays.

To join the Club it is £19 per person for the season which runs between September and April. They like their landlords have a five month close season, but their players then transfer to the outdoor greens.

The complete grandstand £235,000 in 1970 and was partly financed by the sale of 16 club houses. Whilst it may seem a small income at todays prices at least it is a guaranteed regular income for the club. The foresight of the chairman, the late Harry Dolman, was perhaps not appreciated at the time of building but time has shown he was definitely well ahead of the future needs of the game. We can only hope that any "new" home for Rovers provides an income rather than a millstone for the club. I am afraid I may not be around 22

years after our "new' ground is built, to be able to judge the final long term benefit.

You could be forgiven for thinking this is a new football club called Burmah especially from

the front cover. The colour photo changes each match. It is not a bad programme with a fair bit to read but without any innovations or omissions. However, it is a bit of a dry read. Four pages feature the visitors, including a page feature on a previous meeting, but there is also a division two feature. "Frontline" is one of the best aspects of the magazine which incorporates a centre spread photo of a player and a page article about him. Swindon's programme is not amongst the best in the second division but it is more than adequate.

This was a two part programme the home produced pages wrapped around an unnamed syndicated insert of general football articles. This insert is largely coloured photographs and pages with plenty to read. The Swindon produced pages

are unusually in the mix of Blue and Red print and shows how Swindon's programme has developed since then. Photos seem strange in Blue and White. It starts with an article by the Chairman followed by a page by the Manager John Trollope. two pages of Pen-Pics on Bristol Rovers and a page of statistics bring us to the start of the inserted pages. The second half of the programme features a previous meeting between Swindon and Bristol Rovers, team squad photo on another page and an article on a Swindon Player, Kevin Baddeley who had Bristol connections. The programme finishes with two pages of Blue action photos and a feature on Paul Randall. The main innovation here seems to be the use of Blue print for some text and photos and Red on other pages for text. Without the insert the Swindon programme is a fair read and the Division 3 table as printed has more facts and figures than we normally get in a league table.

Programmes of this age are still relatively common and in good to mint condition fetch approximately 50p each as a Rovers away. Second-hand copies of course can still be found for 20p-30p each.







Today's visit of our friends Swindon Town gives us the opportunity to see the Bob Bennett cartoon produced in the Bristol Evening Post' on Monday 7th November 1932, this following the game at 'Stapleton Road' on the previous Saturday, watched by 11,000 spectators.

The game resulted in an excellent win for Rovers, who were reduced to ten players for the second-half when Johnny Townrow was taken to the Homoepathic Hospital following an injury received after 30 minutes. Townrow was displaying brilliant form until his injury, and he displayed great pluck in returning and playing on until the interval. The Rovers obtained the only score of the game in the sixtieth minute when McNestry put the ball in the net after the Swindon custodian, Leslie Berry, had dropped it following a centre from Vivian Gibbins.

The end of the campaign saw Swindon bottom of the Third Division (South), and the Rovers in tenth place, thereby finishing in the top half of the table for only the fourth time since joining the Football League.



There is sure to be a large contingent of Rovers fans making the short trip to Oxford on Easter Saturday. However, over the years the Manor Ground has not been a happy hunting ground. In 9 visits "The Pirates" have only won once and that was in the the 1967-68 season, which ironically was the season Oxford won the Third Division Championship after just six seasons in the Football League. Rovers have lost 7 of the

other 8 games, the only draw took place in 1981-82 with Paul Randall scoring in a 1-1 draw. Incidentally this was Rovers' first game after Terry Cooper's departure as Rovers manager.

In the corresponding fixture last season The Pirates were well-beaten, 3-1. All the goals

came in the first 27 minutes and included a spectacular own gaol from Vaughan Jones. Rovers beat Oxford 2-1 back in September. This proved to be Martin Dobson's only victory as

manager. Unfortunately it was also the match in which Vaughan Jones fractured his leg after just 8 seconds.

Rovers will face a United side desperate for points to stay in the Second Division. After their 1-0 home defeat by Southend on Boxing Day, Oxford found themselves firmly anchored at the foot of the table repeating their league placing of last season. But there the similarity ends. Last season saw a tremendous revival which included a club record 15 game unbeaten run from February to April which saw the 'U's' finish in a very creditable 10th

position. Such was their form that they were seen by many as potential play-off contenders. However, this season there has been no such revival. Although their form has improved since Christmas, especially at home where they are unbeaten in 8 matches they have remained firmly entrenched in the bottom three. Given Rovers' poor away form this season, their dismal record at the Manor Ground and Oxford's crucial bid to stay up, I'd settle for a draw.

Our next visitors to **Twerton Park** on **Easter Monday** will be **Brighton** another club anxious for points as they battle to stay in the Second Division. Yet after reaching the play-off finals last season (where they lost to Notts County), 'The Seagulls' must surely have hoped for something better this time round!

The Pirates have played more league matches against Brighton than any other club, and have conceded more goals than against any other club; Over 50 goals at home and over 100 away. Indeed Rovers' 3-1 defeat at the Goldstone Ground back in September was true to form!

Brighton did not enjoy their visits at Eastville between 1947 and 1952. They lost five times by a combined margin of 22-3! However, Rovers have not been nearly so successful since.

In 17 games at home against the Seagulls, The Pirates have only won three times and not at all in the last 9. The last victory was back in 1968, Rovers winning 3-1 with goals from Stuart Taylor, Richard Plumb and Bobby Williams. Let's hope the Easter holiday ends with Rovers recording a long overdue victory!

JOHN TAYLOR



John Taylor joined us on transfer deadline day from Cambridge United with Devon White travelling in the opposite direction with a £100,000 cash adjustment in our favour. John who made his debut in the blue and white quarters a fortnight ago in our 1-0 defeat at Watford was born in Norwich on the 24th of October 1964.

John, whilst playing parks football, was brought into the professional game by Colchester United but was released without making the league side. John then went back to playing non league football with Sudbury Town, then in the Eastern League, coming to the attention of Chris Turner then manager of Cambridge who offered him a second chance of league football in the summer of 1988. John quickly forced himself into the league side coming in for the second game of the coming season a 4-2 defeat at Hereford on the 3rd September. In his first full season of league football, John proved a shrewd investment for the £2,000 paid to the Suffolk club scoring 12 times in his 40 league appearances in helping the Abbey Stadium club to a creditable 8th position in the Fourth Division.

The following season, the 1989-90 campaign, John found the net on 15 occasions in 45 outings in helping Cambridge, then under the stewardship of John Beck, into the Third Division via the play off system. As Cambridge last tern won the Third Division championship, returning to the Second, a division that they last left in 1984, John's goal scoring exploit continued with 14 in 40 league outings. John has not been a regular in United's starting line up this term appearing in 28 league games scoring 5 times including one at Twerton in November. In all John scored 48 times in 153 league outings for his former club. His last goal coming for the U's against Rovers in the 6-1 defeat at the Abbey Stadium on 28th February.

A popular player at Cambridge he was nicknamed Shaggy by their fans. You will have to ask him how he acquired the name! John's home debut for Rovers was remarkable as he assisted a Justin Skinner shot into the Southend net and scored from a far post header. Everyone at Rovers wishes him well in his career at Twerton.

JOHN HAMILTON v Newport County (A) 29/30 Div 3 (South) Saturday 8th February 1930 Newport 3 Rovers 2

Wing-half John Hamilton played in two seasons for Rovers (29/30, 30/1), scoring 2 goals in 63 league appearances. His son, Ian, was to score 60 league goals for Rovers between 1958 and 1968.



Vic Lambden

VIC LAMBDEN v Brighton (A)
Div 3 (South)
Saturday 5th April 1952:
Brighton 1 Rovers 1

Rovers' team included ex-Brighton winger Geoff Taylor. It was to be Taylor's third, and last, appearance for Rovers. In the open-

ing minute Rovers took the lead when Brighton keeper John Ball and centre half Wilf McCoy collided trying to collect a Geoff Bradford pass, the ball rebounding to Vic Lambden to score with a slow bounding shot.

Thirty minutes later Lamden was to score in the wrong net when he deflected a Jack Mansell indirect free-kick past Howard Radford. The 51/2 season saw Lambden (29) and Bradford (26) score 55 of Rovers' 89 League goals. The next highest scorer was Bill Roost (7).

TIM PARKIN v Swindon (A) 81/2 Div 3 Saturday 6th March 1982: Swindon 5 Rovers 2

Non-playing substitute for Swindon was Gary Emmanuel who had swapped clubs at the start of the season with Rovers' Brian Williams. Certainly two different

types of player! Tim Parkin was to join Swindon in 1986 and gave tremendous service to both clubs.

Rovers entered March on the fringes of the promotion race but still looking for our first away win under Manager Bobby Gould who had replaced Terry Cooper after our +1 defeat at Eastville against Swindon in October. Swindon were now fifth from bottom.

In wet and windy conditions, Tim Parkin gave Rovers the

lead after 30 minutes with a diving header from a left-wing cross from Mike Barrett. However within a minute Parkin deflected a centre from Howard Pritchard past Phil Kite for the Swindon equaliser. The second half saw the following 4 goals in 13 minutes.

54 mins: Swindon 2 Rovers 1: 17 year old Paul Rideout heads in a Roy Carter cross.

60 mins: Swindon 3 Rovers 1: Steve Bailey back-pass intercepted by Kevin Baddely who is brought down by Brian Williams. Roy Carter scores from penalty

62 mins: Swindon 3 Rovers 2: A Swindon back-pass sticks in the mud enabling Archie Stevens to score.

67 mins: Swindon 4 Rovers 2: Another Rideout header.

The match had an explosive finish when after 84 minutes Brian Williams was sent-off against his old Club for retaliation. After 88 minutes Rovers' miscry was complete when Charlie Henry broke away to make the score 5-2.

At the end of the season Rovers finished 15th whilst Swindon along with Bristol City, were relegated to the Fourth Division for the first time in their history.

GEOFF TWENTYMAN v Notts County (H)

87/8 Div 3 Wednesday 2nd March 1988: Rovers 1 Notts County 1

Rovers entered the match, in Gerry Francis' first season as Manager, in 20th position whilst County were second. Rovers took the lead after 46 minutes when

Devon White headed down a Gary Penrice cross for Geoff to "crack home" from 8 yards. This was his first goal in 64 League appearances for Rovers.

County equalised after 67 minutes when Adrian Thorpes "powder puff" miskick was deflected past Nigel Martyn by Twentyman who commented "the ball hit me on the shinpad. It didn't have any power and I was amazed that it reached the goal, let alone went in."

After a remarkable run of results Rovers finished the season 8th whilst County lost in the promotion play-offs.



Steve White Swindon Town 1985–1992

STEVE WHITE

Steve White started his career with Mangotsfield United after gaining England Schoolboy honours. He joined Rovers in July 1977 as a professional. Born in Chipping Sodbury on 2 January 1959 "Chalky" as he was nicknamed at Eastville made his league debut for The Pirates at Southampton on 27 March 1978. Steve scored his first goal in his second game against Millwall at Fratton Park. The competition for strikers in Rovers' first team at the time was fierce with Bobby Gould, Paul Randall and Dave Staniforth in the squad. Nevertheless, Steve gained a regular place scoring consistently.

However, on 21 December 1979 Luton Town offered Rovers £200,000 for White. This exceeded the previous record transfer fee received for Paul Randall who moved 12 months earlier for £175,000. Steve enjoyed success at Luton in his 18 month career there including being ever present in their Division 2 Championship team. Unfortunately, before he could make his Division One debut White was involved in a transfer swap involving Charlton's Paul Walsh who moved to Luton with Steve going to the South London club. Steve scored 12 times for Charlton in 29 games before he jumped at the chance to return 'home' to Rovers for a bargain fee of £35,000. After a further 101 appearances and 24 goals for 'The Pirates', Steve became the subject of Rovers' financial plight and was released on a free transfer to West Country rivals Swindon Town in August 1985. It proved to be an inspired signing many pundits describing it as "The Robins" best ever free signing. In his first season Steve was top goalscorer and scored 2 goals in the play off final to secure promotion to Division 2. In season 88/89 the First Division play offs were reached but disappointment followed. The following season promotion was achieved to the First Division, via the play offs again only to be dashed by "financial irregularities" within his club. That was a great pity for the skilful, wholehearted professional who has never failed to give 100% in every game he plays.
