



It's getting very tight at the top but, apart from lpswich Town, there is no side that is putting a run together. Three points was our target against Bristol Rovers on Sunday. One was what we got. A pity really for after Shaun Taylor had scored a very good goal, it looked odds-on us getting that elusive away win.

It was a tremendous goal for a centre-half but then Rovers grabbed a fortuitous equaliser that about summed up our fortunes away from home this season.

Firstly, I did not think it was a free kick against us but once the referee awarded it we had enough time to organise ourselves at the back. Mitch got a touch as he tried to intercept the cross. The ball flicked off the top of his head and literally hit Clark on his head and went in. He didn't know much about it at all.

We had created so many chances it was ridiculous. Yet like at Portsmouth we controlled most of the game without getting our just rewards. As was said afterwards, "they got out of jail." It was hard on the fans who gave us such vociferous encouragement. They were absolutely marvellous. A win would really have put us in the picture for the play-offs and now, though we are still not out of the frame, our prospects are much more difficult to achieve. We really need nine points from the next three games and with Wolves, Watford and Plymouth our opponents it will be no easy task. But neither is it impossible.

If we can achieve this we will be in with a shout for certain. Even seven points would not be a disaster and though it is asking a lot we know we can do it. It means that every game for us is going to be like a cup final. We need to win and the lads will be totally committed to this aim. There have been very few games this season in which we have not created more chances than our opponents. Now is the time we must tuck them away.

One performance that does not come into this category is the recent draw at Millwall. We played with a flat back-four that evening and didn't play well. Big Fraser pulled off a couple of great saves, and we have to hold our hands up and admit we didn't deserve the point we earned. We got away with it that time which is a change for us. If you look at our away record, ten draws looks highly respectable, yet it does not fairly represent our true form away from home. Eight of these games were comfortable draws for us matches we dominated and should have won. Just reflect. That is 16 points that have gone begging ... sixteen points which would have seen us comfortably tucked in behind Ipswich at the top of the table.

We didn't win them because of a number of factors. Poor individual defending errors; the failure to snap up opportunities; as well as in a couple of cases, being on the sharp end of poor refereeing decisions.

So now we have it all to do, starting today with Wolverhampton Wanderers. Wolves have blown hot and cold this season. On their day they can really play and any side that has strikers of the calibre of Andy Mutch and Steve Bull to call upon must be respected. They need to be watched very closely for 90 minutes.

We had to fight all the way in our last home game against Port Vale after a first half in which we produced some terrific football and opened them up well. But it proved a tough second half to sit through, that is for sure, and we shall be hoping to tame the Wolves a little earlier this afternoon. The mid-week home defeat of Middlesbrough by Bamsley emphasised just how tough life is at the top of the Second Division. It was a great result for us but we need another saver yet from 'Boro as well as three points this afternoon from Wolves.



lpswich Town look as though they have clinched promotion back to the First Division after an absence of seven years. Their dramatic 3-2 win over relegation candidates Newcastle United on Saturday leave The Blues 10 points clear of East Anglian rivals Cambridge United and star player Jason Dozzell, the youngest player ever to score in the First Division has high praise for manager John Lyall, "Everything that has happened at this club this year is a tribute to him and his methods. The team has been built on a solid defensive base and the present crop of players will perform with distinction once they reach the big league. I have always had faith in the manager. He brought his attacking ideas with him and I had few doubts that we were going to be a real force in the Second Division this season. The Cup run was also important because it brought us the attention of the nation. We do not see the TV cameras down at Portman Road much. With John Lyall in charge of this club maybe even Europe is possible."

Middlesbrough are in danger of failing to clinch promotion, and even to miss the play offs if they don't start to turn results around quickly. Although Boro' won 2-1 at Tranmere on Friday night, they remain outside the play off zone as their games in hand over the top clubs slip away. Former Everton and Nottingham Forest centre forward Paul Wilkinson who joined Boro' for £500,000 in the summer has scored eleven League goals this term is not confident "If we do not wake up now we won't even make the play offs. We have to bounce back in our games in hand otherwise we'll be in danger of missing out altogether."

One side who do look as though the play offs are now beyond them are Southend, although they won 2-0 at struggling Plymouth Argyle last week. Despite the resignation of manager Dave Webb from the summer and much discontent amongst the Shrimpers' fans chairman Vic Jobson continues to lay down the law "The shareholders

have the say here and I own 70 per cent of them. I don't want the club to move away from Southend and I didn't want Dave Webb to resign. Roots Hall is beginning to look more like a Second Division ground now but unfortunately that's where we will be next season."

Sunderland's defeat at home to Charlton Athletic on Saturday left the Cup finalists perilously close to the relegation zone, albeit with several games in hand of the other clubs towards the bottom of the table. Despite this success, caretaker boss Malcolm Crosby has not landed the Roker job on a permanent basis although he says this does not bother him "They can give me any title they want, even janitor as too much has been said about this job. It's the greatest day in my footballing life but we mustn't get carried away. We have got to go out and get the results in the League."

Sunderland, who this afternoon are playing their fourth game in a week to catch up on the back-log caused by their Cup success have managed to find time to record a new version of the McFadden and Whitehead hit record "Ain't No Stopping Us Now" to celebrate their F.A.Cup appearance at Wembley next month.

Whether or not the record joins the ranks of "Blue Is The Colour" recorded by Chelsea back in the seventies or The England World Cup squad's "Back Home" remains to be seen.

The Rokerites face another run of four games in a week from next Saturday to complete their run-up to Wembley - this includes the re-arranged game against Town on Monday 27th April.

🖢 SHILTS IN FINAL SHOWDOWN





Former England stalwart Peter Shilton plans to play until the end of this season and possibly longer which means he is set to make his second appearance of the season at the County Ground next Saturday.

Plymouth's player-manager of course played a major part in Derby County's 2-1 win here in October, making a crucial save to deny Duncan Shearer an equaliser in the second half.

Now Shilton's task is even harder as his struggling Plymouth Argyle charges fight desperately against the drop in Division Three. It has been a hard baptism in the managerial seat for one of England's greatest ever goalkeepers but he claims he is enjoying it.

When Argyle made the approach to Derby County Rams boss Arthur Cox made one stipulation: "Peter cannot play in two matches against Derby this season." The first was the following Saturday when Argyle earned a 1-1 draw at Home Park. The second ended in a 2-0 defeat at the Baseball Ground.

Since that draw with the Rams Plymouth have won two of their following seven games, one of which was drawn, conceding six goals. The draw 0-0 at Charlton, signalled Shilton's first appearance for the Devonshire side last Saturday week and with former Arsenal custodian Rhys Wilmot on the transfer list Shilts looks destined to play out the remainder of the season.

Plymouth, just two points clear of bottom club Port Vale, were at home to Southend United last Saturday and follow that with away trips to Middlesbrough, then us, and Sunderland; with Oxford and Blackburn to come at home. It suggests a dramatic and tense finale to the season and they will be hoping that 13 goal Dwight Marshall, who has netted just once in 13 games, soon recaptures his scoring touch, alongside new signing Kevin Nugent.

The Pilgrims will be happy there is not Duncan Shearer to threaten their cause - he scored all four gaols as Town romped to a 4-0 win at Plymouth last October - but they will find plenty of quality here in Glenn's new-shaped side and you can bet that the lads will want to bring the curtain down on this season with a flourish.

Don't miss the final home League game of the season when Swindon Town will be striving to put an end to Peter Shilton's Pilgrims progress!







Life begins at 25 for John Moncur, the midfielder signed from Tottenham Hostpur on the final strike of the transfer deadline. For after seven years at White Hart Lane the Eastender has still yet to establish himself as a player in senior football.

He says: "I have waited a long long time for a real opportunity to prove myself and hopefully I shall be able to respond with Swindon. At Spurs it is hard for any one to make an impression because of the players available. It is particularly difficult for midfielders to break through. From Glenn to Gazza there have always been quality players available in this position."

John, an outstanding schoolboy, who gained representative honours with Essex and London, had Arsenal, West Ham United and Orient in the queue to sign him when he left school but he has no regrets that he eventually chose Spurs. He insists: "They are a good club and always looked after me."

He arrived at White Hart Lane in the same group as Carl Hoddle - Glenn's younger brother who is now with Barnet - and Shaun Close, and stayed with the North London giants longer than any of his companions. Yet still he was unable to make that final positive step.

It was David Pleat who gave him his initial First Division baptism, at Goodison Park, in the final League game of the 1986-87 season. John pulled on Glenn's number ten shirt as six first teamers were rested prior to the FA Cup Final.

Actually, John's introduction to League football had come earlier in the season while on loan to Doncaster Rovers then Cambridge United. But the experience at Goodison was the real thing!

As a young player in the Spurs pool John reflects on the inspiration gained from players such as Glenn and Micky Hazard. He reflects: "Glenn was every midfielder's dream. We all wanted to aspire to his standards. But it is impossible of course. Everyone respected him. He was always someone you could seek help from with any problems.

"To just watch him play was an education and his influence at training sessions was also very infectious." Given the predicament Spurs have found themselves in

this season John admits that he had been very disappointed not to have been given a chance. He says: "Really I knew it would be like that because Peter Shreeves had made up his mind he didn't really fancy me. It is as simple as that.

"My best spell was under Terry Venables but even then I think the longest run I had was three or four games. But I was always next to go in if Gazza was injured.

"It is frustrating, of course it is, and I had several opportunities to leave. I turned them all down on financial grounds or because I didn't feel it was a right move career wise. Then when Glenn came along I had no second thoughts. I see the move to Swindon as a step in the right direction.

"Having been at Spurs for seven years it is obviously a big charge but it is better to feel wanted. Spurs looked after me, however I am now at the stage where I really have to establish myself in top class football.

"Glenn told me he thought I was suited to the Swindon style. I have had no specific instructions though if I don't perform well he won't play me. After so long in reserve football it will take a little time to find my sharpness. It is not so much a physical demand as a mental one. In League football you need to react instantly.

The playing staff here are good enough to make an impact. They are a good bunch of lads and helped me settle in well."

John will certainly remember his first full game for the Robins, for he was left nursing a headache after coming off with concussion at the Den. "It was a clash of heads." He recalls: "I carried on for ten-minutes but it got worse and I had double vision so had to come off."

Now he has set his sights firmly on making a success of his career with Swindon. A four handicap golfer he had to make the choice between football and golf when he left school and says: "I did consider golf but I have no regrets. I have always maintained that it is harder to make it as a golfer than as a footballer."

Now John, and wife Kerry, are looking for a home in one in the Wiltshire area as he prepares to swing into the big-time with Swindon Town.





Although Wolves entered last Saturday's League fixture in a midtable position they were just six points short of a play-off place and manager **Graham Turner** believes they are still in with a good chance of making the final showdown.

After two seasons of sensational success the Molineux club have not found it so easy to get lift-off from Division Two where a lack of consistency has been their biggest problem.

Money is short yet even so they have managed to hold onto their biggest asset, **Steve Bull**, the powerfully built England striker who has terrified defenders from Hartlepool to Plymouth. Bull is still very much the team's regular marksman and in recent weeks has only been helped on the goals front by fullback and skipper **Mark Venus** and **Andy Mutch**.

Venus's 30-yarder at Plymouth was his first goal for 27 months and was good enough to secure all three points. Andy Mutch, who has experienced a keen season in terms of goals, looked like he has won a well earned point at runaway leaders lpswich when he equalised five minutes from time. But the Suffolk club pinched the game with a controversial last-minute penalty.

Disappointing for the Midlanders but Mr Turner must have been heartened by the display of his team. For enterprising Wolves moved the ball well down both flanks and were willing to shoot on sight. With nothing to lose and all to gain we can anticipate another positive show here today as Steve Bull goes in search of his 200th goal in the Football League.

In recent weeks youngsters **Jim Kelly** and **Mark Rankine** have been given a chance in a side that is still to reach its full potential. Though Bull and Mutch monopolise the headlines Mr Turner has a wealth of experience to call upon. **Robbie Dennison**, the Northern Ireland International has been a regular on the left until recently and Coventry born striker **Tim Steele**, who joined Wolves from Shrewsbury in 1989 for £70,000 is currently on the bench.

There is also the possibility that **Andy Thompson**, another former Throstle, might be recalled to midfield after injury.




TURNER THE INFLUENCE

GRAHAM TURNER, who failed to come to terms with life at Villa Park, is the man responsible for restoring pride at Molineux. He took over in October 1986 and only just failed to win promotion to Division Three in that first season, losing in the play-off to Aldershot. Ayear later Wolves were Fourth Division Champions. Next came the Third Division title and the Sherpa Van Trophy. Born in Ellesmere Port on 5th October 1947, Graham, an England Youth international made 77 League appearances for Wrexham before moving to Chester in January 1968 where he added another 218 League games to his record.

It was January 1973 when Graham signed for Shrewsbury Town. In 11 years at Gay Meadow he clocked up 355 League games and finished as a highly successfully player-manager. Installed as boss of Aston Villa in July 1984 his firm style of management was not appreciated and shortly after his third

season in charge he was sacked.

KEVIN ASHLEY - Defender. Singed from Birmingham City at the start of last season for £500,000 he made 17 League appearances in that campaign before establishing himself this season. Served his apprenticeship with Birmingham City, making his League bow in a derby clash with West Brom on April 12th 1987. Born: Birmingham 31-12-68.

TOM BENNETT - Defender. Was on Aston Villa's books as a youngster and moved to Wolves in August 1988. Made 11 substitute appearances in season 1988-89 before starting a League game for the first time at Ipswich (16-9-89). Born: Falkirk 12-12-69.

PAUL BIRCH - Midfield. Another who emerged through the youth ranks at Villa Park. He was a member of Aston Villa's FA Youth Cup winning side in 1980. Made his League debut against Sunderland in January 1991 - scoring his first goal for the Wolves against West Ham on 2nd February 1991 in Division Two. Born: West Bromwich 6-11-62.

STEPHEN BULL - Striker. A member of England's successful World Cup squad in Italy in 1990; "Bully" has proved his scoring prowess at all levels of the game. Signed from West Brom for £35,000 in November 1986 - he had made his League debut for them at QPR (12-4-86) - he has emerged a tough bustling centre-forward of the traditional mould and set a Wolves scoring record, on Saturday March 21st, when he netted his 195th goal against Derby. Born: Tipton 28-3-65.

PAUL COOK - Midfield. Signed from Norwich City for £250,000 in October 1989 and introduced as a play-maker in midfield. Started his career with Wigan Athletic in 1984, making his debut in a Third Division game with Reading in May 1985. Joined Norwich City four years later but only made a handful of appearances for the Canaries. Born: Liverpool 22-2-67.

KEITH DOWNING - Defender. Arrived on a free-transfer from Notts County in 1987; County has given the former Oak Rovers star his chance against Leeds United (25-8-84). Yet in three years at Meadow Lane he made only 23 League appearances. Wolves introduced him in the opening game of the 1987-88 season against Scarborough. Born: Oldbury 23-7-65.

JIM KELLY - Midfield. Signed from Wrexham last February in a swap deal which saw striker John Paskin move in the opposite direction. The 19-year old asked for time to think over the move after discussing personal terms with Graham Turner. The youngster made two full and 13 sub

appearances in the Fourth Division last season. Was on the bench for Wrexham's historic FA Cup Third Round win over Arsenal. Born: Liverpool 14-2-73.

LAWRIE MADDEN - Central Defender. Much travelled professional who came into League football with Mansfield (debut v Stockport) in April 1975. Had previously been with Arsenal as an amateur and studied at Manchester University. Joined Charlton in 1977 and five years later moved to Millwall for a season. Sheffield Wednesday was his next stop and in the past year he has played for several clubs on loan before signing for Wolves on a free transfer last September. Born: London 28-9-55.

DEREK MOUNTFIELD - Central Defender. Another experienced campaigner he was signed from Aston Villa in February for £150,000 after a short loan spell. An apprentice with Tranmere he made his League bow at Peterborough in March 1981. Everton snapped him up for £30,000 in 1983 and he won League Cup, FA Cup and two Championship medals as well as a ECWC winners' trophy before switching to Villa in 1988 for £450,000. Capped by England at Under-21 and 'B' levels. Born: Liverpool 2-11-62.

ANDY MUTCH - Striker. Arrived at Molineux in February 1986 for a small fee from Multipart League side Southport. Made his League bow in a goalless draw with Rotherham in February 1986. Has forged a good understanding with Bull and was capped by England at 'B' level v Switzerland in May 1989. Born: Liverpool 28-12-63.

MARK RANKINE - Midfield/Defence. Was only 16 when he made his League debut for Doncaster Rovers. Transferred to Wolves in January 1992 for £70,000 and made his debut, in their colours, as a sub against Leicester City (1-2-92). Can operate in midfield or defence. Age: 22.

MIKE STOWELL - Goalkeeper. Spotted playing for Leyland Motors he was signed by Preston in 1984 but didn't make a League appearance though he attracted Everton. Joined them in 1985-86 season but made his League debut for Chester City v Aldershot while on loan in September 1987. Had further loan spells with York City, Manchester City and Wolves before eventually moving to Molineux for a substantial fee in July 1990. Born: Portsmouth 19-4-65.

MARK VENUS - Fullback. Started his career with hometown club Hartlepool, making his debut at Bury (1-4-85). Added only another two appearances before signing for Leicester City on a free in the summer of '85. Notched up 61 League games for the Filberts before joining Wolves in March 1988 for a big fee. Born: Hartlepool 6-4-67.

It's on the cards I can tell you for FIFA have just appointed New Zealander Linda Black onto their list of International Referees and Linespersons.

Linespersons? Is one of the last remaining bastions of male chauvinism to be truly shattered...? It gives a whole new meaning to the thoughts of the philosopher Nietzsche, who lamented the fate of the last man, destined to spend the future in a democratic Elysium. I was at Old Trafford the other evening for the Manchester derby between United and City. It was a good night for former Town prodigee Fitzroy Simpson who seems to be relishing in the challenge of First Division football.

Fitz is delighted with the way things are going for him at Maine Road where his energy and enthusiasm is keeping player-manager Peter Reid out of the team.

Another former Swindon star enjoying the limelight is striker David Bamber, now back with his original club Blackpool and leading them towards promotion to Division Three. He is the top shot in Division Four with 35 goals at the last count - two more than Duncan Shearer and three better than Gary Lineker . . . can't be bad.

continues to look back at previous encounters with today's visitors

There were 47 Football League places between the Town and Wolves when they met for a Second Round League Cup tie here nearly seventeen years ago - the first time the clubs had crossed paths for 67 years!

Neither club had yet managed a League win in 1975/76, Wolves having had six First Division attempts and Swindon four in the Third. Wolves had not won away from Molineux in almost a year. The Town sat just one place off the bottom of the table but they had, however, recorded victories in both legs of the First Round, having beaten Millwall 2-1 and 1-0 with a penalty deciding both issues.

Jim Barron, who had begun his League career with Wolves back in 1963, returned to the Swindon side in place of Jimmy Allan and defender Frank Burrows was back in the starting line-up after a three-game absence. The Town were without midfielder Terry Hubbard, injured three days earlier at Shrewsbury.

Peter Eastoe was facing the club he had begun his career with as an apprentice, before coming to the County Ground for a club record £88,000 in March 1974.

It was he who was instrumental in giving Swindon the lead in the tenth minute. He soared to head a Trevor Anderson cross down into the bottom corner. Goalkeeper Gary Pierce seemed certain to save, but then defender John McAlle made a timely intervention and deflected the ball over the line! The First Division side were in further trouble with seven first-half minutes remaining. They looked to have escaped when first Deal referee Michael Taylor ruled out an Anderson effort and then Pierce blocked a stunning David Moss drive. But Swindon got their reward for

persistence when John Trollope followed up to hit a well placed right-foot shot into the net. But the old adage 'a game of two halves' was never better illustrated.

After the break, the Town, minus the influential Hubbard, were completely overrun in midfield by Mike Bailey, Willie Carr and Kenny Hibbitt. It was virtually one-way traffic to the Swindon goal.


The Town failed to get a single effort on target, although John McLaughlin twice went close. It was no surprise when Alan Sunderland pulled a goal back with twenty minutes left and then, with just four minutes to go, John Richards equalised - the seventh successive League Cup tie in which he had found the net.

This was our final South East Counties League game of the season and was one of the better performances we have put in.

Planning for next season the side was made up from six U16's, six U17's and one unable to play at Youth level next year.

As in other games when fielding a younger team the performance was pleasing with excellent application and appreciation whether in possession or defending. The movement off the ball allowed us to play some good constructive football, but we worked hard when defending not allowing Brentford the time and space.

The first half was an even contest with neither side having too many clear chances but Gavin Pitts in goal had to make a point blank save to keep it scoreless at the interval.






Port Vale keeper covers against Dave Mitchell.




