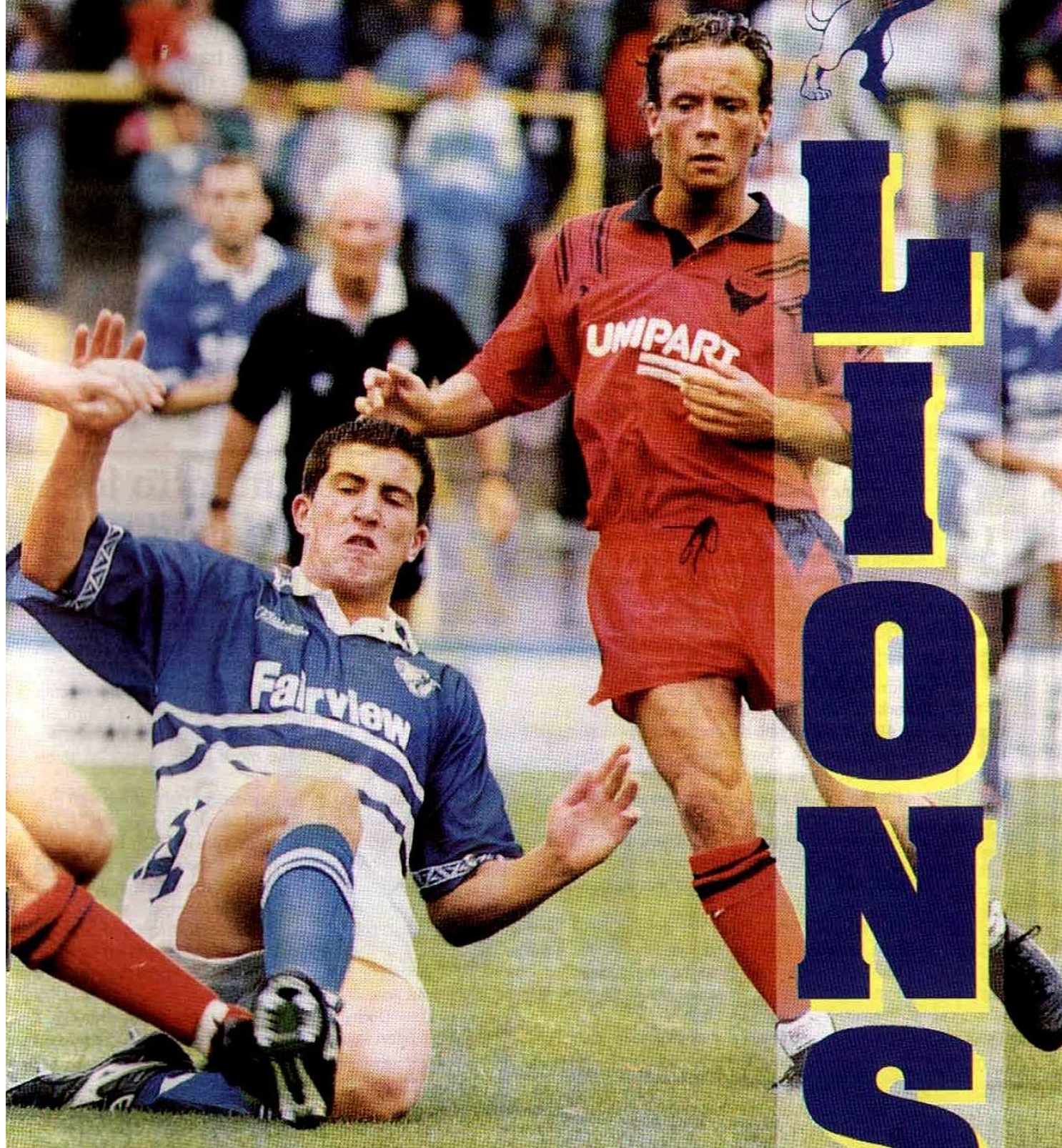

I am more than willing to listen to any constructive comments verbally or in writing about how we might improve policing which is dear to my heart, not only as my job, but being a football supporter since I was eight.

At this point, I have to admit to being a life-long Preston North End supporter (that may make you doubt my ability to recognise good football but, I hope, prove to you I have a sense of humour!) Millwall, however, have become a close second love.

I shall write from time to time in the programme but in the meantime, let's hope for some good results on and off the field.

## MICKS MESSAGE

Let me begin by explaining briefly how the Chris Armstrong transfer came about. After a Reserve game last week, I spoke to someone in my office about players who might be available and Chris's name came up. I told him that I didn't want to sell Chris, but he kept pressing me for a figure so to put an end to it I said I wouldn't be prepared to let him go for less than a million quid. I was stunned to go into my office last Thursday and find a bid of that order on my desk.

I still said I didn't want to do it, and the chairman didn't want to do it, but I think we both knew in the back of our minds that we were in an impossible position. There was no-one more disappointed than myself and Mr. Burr when Chris eventually left the Club, but we've had to face up to reality and get on with the job. At least we know we've got a good deal, and as I remarked a little bit tongue in cheek to the press on Wednesday night, if you pay £75,000 for a house and a year later someone offers you £1 million for it, you accept the offer no matter how much you enjoy living in it.

I'll tell you one thing, I'm delighted to have got Jamie Moralee. I've played against him, Taff's worked with him in the past and having spoken to other people in the game over the past few days, they're quite surprised we've got him.

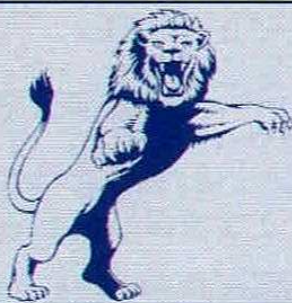
Looking back briefly at our last two games, I think

there will be a few occasions like last Saturday at Barnsley where we've not played as well as we can but come away with a 0-0 or a 1-1 draw. Barnsley didn't let us play football, and we didn't win the scrap to enable us to do so. I was more pleased with our second half showing and other than the penalty, we increasingly looked the more likely to nick all three points.

On Wednesday, getting caught right at the end of a game we had dominated really annoys me. I can imagine some of you were thinking, 'Oh here we go again back to last year's syndrome of playing well and getting beat.' But I totally disagree with that. Last year we seemed to get steamrollered a bit, but Wednesday was about bad defending by the whole team at a corner, and a lack of concentration after we had been on top for so long. It was uncharacteristic for us this year.

Tony Dolby did very well on his debut didn't he? He's been injured for a long time and would certainly

## PREMIER LEAGUE HORNEY

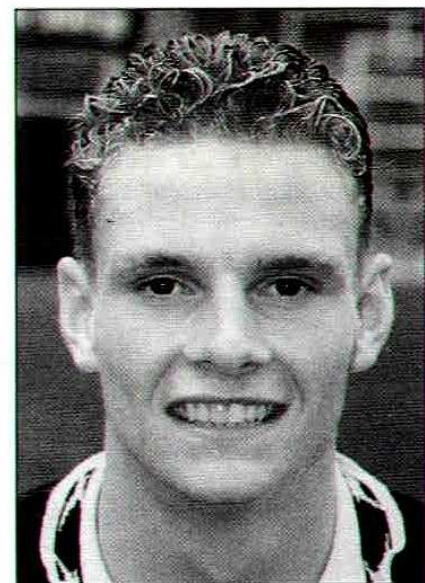

# LIONS DIARY

The presence of Ron Noades and Alan Smith in the stand at our Leyton Orient game gave early notice that Millwall's exciting football was attracting attention from the big boys. By the following day, rumours were emanating from Selhurst Park that Palace were about to make a bid for Chris Armstrong. No further developments were forthcoming over the next 48 hours and big Chris duly took his place in the line-up at Oakwell.

On this occasion Kasey Keller was the star of the show, making three outstanding saves to enable the Lions to escape with a point which Mick McCarthy admitted they probably didn't deserve. In spite of the Bank Holiday, events were moving on the transfer front as chairman Reg Burr kept in touch with developments by phone from Italy. By Monday afternoon the details were falling into place and Chris Armstrong was to all intents and purposes a Palace player.

At the same time, Jamie Moralee was having talks with Mick McCarthy following Ian Evans' recommendation of the young striker as a very promising prospect. Jamie duly appeared with boots at the Eltham training ground on Tuesday morning ready for his first session. In fact an accident in a Reserve game against Chelsea 3 weeks previously, meant that Jamie hadn't trained during that period and consequently would be struggling for the mid-week cup-tie with Charlton.

The absence of senior players from Monday's Reserve game at Chelsea indicated that Mick was keeping his options open for the Charlton game. Andy May's muscle strain, E.T.'s knee problem and the suspension of Malcolm Allen meant that the Lions boss needed all the reserves at his disposal as Millwall continued a labour-intensive start to the new campaign.

# Mally's full of confidence

LIONS striker Malcolm Allen is convinced that Millwall have got the skill, the spirt and the experience to make a big impact in the First Division this season.

The bookies may not fancy Millwall's chances of grabbing one of those three, priceless promotion places but down at The Den there's a growing feeling that The Lions could surprise a few people.

"The way we are playing at the moment who knows where we'll end up?", stressed the popular Lions ace.

"The spirit amongst the players is superb, the best I've known, and we've already proved that we are capable of producing some excellent stuff.

"We played well at times last season, but there wasn't the same spirit and determination that we've shown during our first few games.

"Mick has got everybody buzzing. The atmosphere is very relaxed but

he expects 110 per cent out of everyone - and they're giving it.

"The new midfield system which he introduced has worked really well and if we keep working hard for each other I think we'll develop into a very difficult side to beat.

"I've heard people say that both Oxford and Orient weren't up to much, but the fact is that if we'd given them the time and space both would have caused us plenty of problems.

"It's worth remembering that last season we got done by a lot of very ordinary sides - particularly at The Den."

Allen will be a frustrated spectator this afternoon as he completes the three match ban he picked up after being sent off at Watford on the opening day of the season.

"I kicked out at David Holdsworth and although what I did wouldn't have knocked a baby over it was still stupid," he admitted.

"It was the first time in my career that I'd been sent off, and I've been mad with myself about it ever since.

"It was nice to sign off with a couple of goals against Orient, but with the side playing so well and the spirit so good, being out of the side has been very hard."

Allen is hoping that he'll be able to reclaim a place in the side in time for next Saturday's clash with First Division new boys Birmingham.

And Lions manager Mick McCarthy is quick to acknowledge the key role 'Mally' plays.

"He's a very good player," stressed the Lions boss. "He's had a lot of trouble with injuries but since I've been in charge he's knuckled down and now he's looking very sharp indeed.

"He's got a lot of experience and he's adapted well to the new role we've given him."

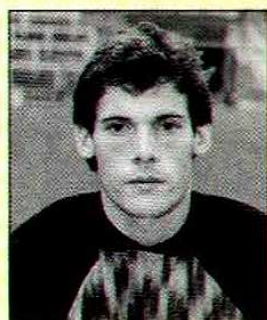

In between they had drawn 0-0 at Exeter in the first leg of their 'Coca Cola' Cup tie and the stage looked set for them to clinch a place in the next round.

## Posh start the season in style

When Peterborough clinched promotion at Wembley last May, their manager Chris Turner vowed that they'd surprise a few people in the First Division.

When the Football League's fixture computer handed Peterborough an opening day clash with big-spending Derby at London Road, it was the perfect opportunity for Turner's players to prove him right.

Few people gave the First Division new boys a hope in hell against a Derby side bristling with big money signings – but Peterborough won 1-0 and haven't looked back.

It means Millwall are guaranteed quite a battle at London Road on Tuesday September 15th when the two teams meet for the first time in a competitive match since 1975.

"I was always confident that we'd give a good account of ourselves in the higher flight," stressed Turner. "So far we've worked hard and picked up some encouraging results."

Part of the credit for that must go to last season's top scorer Ken Charlery, whom south London fans may remember had a spell with Fisher.

He left Salter Road to join Maidstone and then moved on to Peterborough where his steady supply of goals have made him a firm favourite with the London Road fans.

It was Charlery who grabbed Peterborough's last-minute winner against Stockport in a dramatic

play-off final and that left him with 26 League and Cup goals.

Charlery has already scored three times this season – including the goal that beat Derby – and he's partnered up front by the experienced Tony Adcock.

When the two sides last met back in 1975 a goal from Trevor Lee earned us a 1-1 draw, but our results at London Road have been mixed.

We've won two, lost two and drawn one, but those defeats were pretty awful, 4-2 back in 1960-61 and 6-0 in 1962-63.

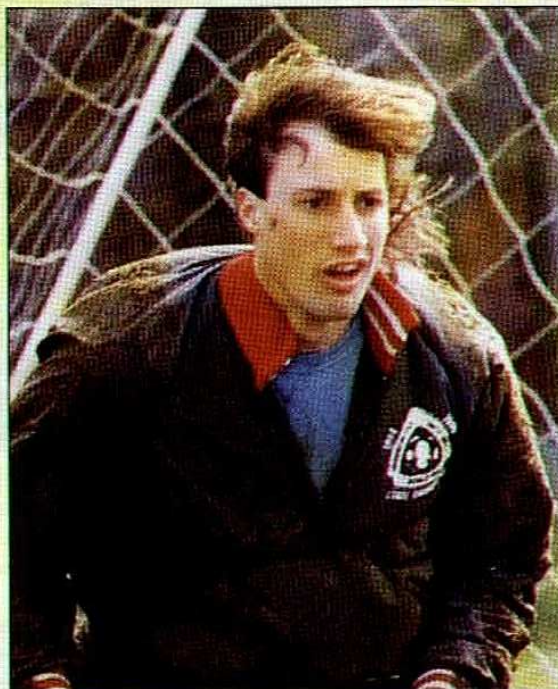

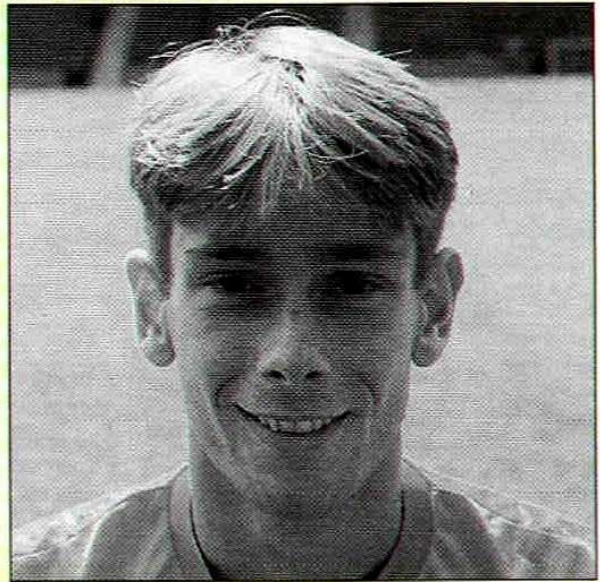

## JAMES "JR" SMITH

James Smith, who was affectionately known as "JR" by all who knew him, was born in Battersea on the 20th January, 1920. He played as an amateur for Hitchin Town and appearances for Tottenham Hotspur and Crystal Palace followed. In August, 1935, he was offered the opportunity to sign professional for Millwall and he jumped at the chance. JR made his debut the following month for the Lions on the 9th September at Highfield Road in a 5-0 defeat by Coventry City. JR was a great favourite with the Millwall fans, a left winger with outstanding ability to turn his full back inside out.

JR put his skills to good use helping Millwall win the Third Division Championship and the London Challenge Cup in season 1937-38. On the 9th November, 1938, JR was rewarded with the first of his two England Caps, the opponents were Norway, the venue St. James Park, Newcastle. England won 4-0 and JR scored twice, a memory that will stay with him the rest of his life. His England colleagues included such stars as Stanley Matthews, Tommy Lawton and Stan Cullis.

During his time at the Den he made 138 League and Cup appearances, scoring on 26 occasions. He also played for the Lions during World War II and represented his country in four War Time Internationals. JR also guested for Partick Thistle and Dundee before moving North of the border permanently when he signed for Dundee in March 1946. He later became manager of Falkirk and steered them to victory in the 1957 Scottish Cup against Kilmarnock 2-1 in a replay.

In July, 1959 JR returned to Millwall as Manager, taking over from Jimmy Seed. The club enjoyed a great start to the 1959-60 season playing the first 19 matches without defeat and finally finishing a creditable fifth. One of his best signings for The Lions was that of Peter Burridge from Leyton Orient, an unknown who was to rewrite the Millwall record books scoring a record 35 League goals in season 1961-62. JR did suffer two disappointments during his time with Millwall both associated with the F.A. Cup. The first was losing to Sunderland in the semi-final 2-1 in 1937 and, whilst being available not being selected for their Cup Final side that lost to Chelsea 2-0 in 1945.

When JR left Millwall in January, 1961, he went to South Africa to manage Addington and then Cape Town City before becoming a maintenance manager for Singer Business Machines until he retired. He



continues to keep in touch with Scottish International Alf Boyd who he met during his time at Dundee. Alf now lives in South Africa and JR and his wife Winifred spend their holidays with him. During his last visit there Stanley Matthews invited Alf and JR to dinner and it gave them the opportunity to reminisce about the good times.

JR and Winifred have three children, Marilyn, Reginald and Mary. He was very pleased to be asked back to the Den this afternoon before we move into our new surroundings at Senegal Fields.

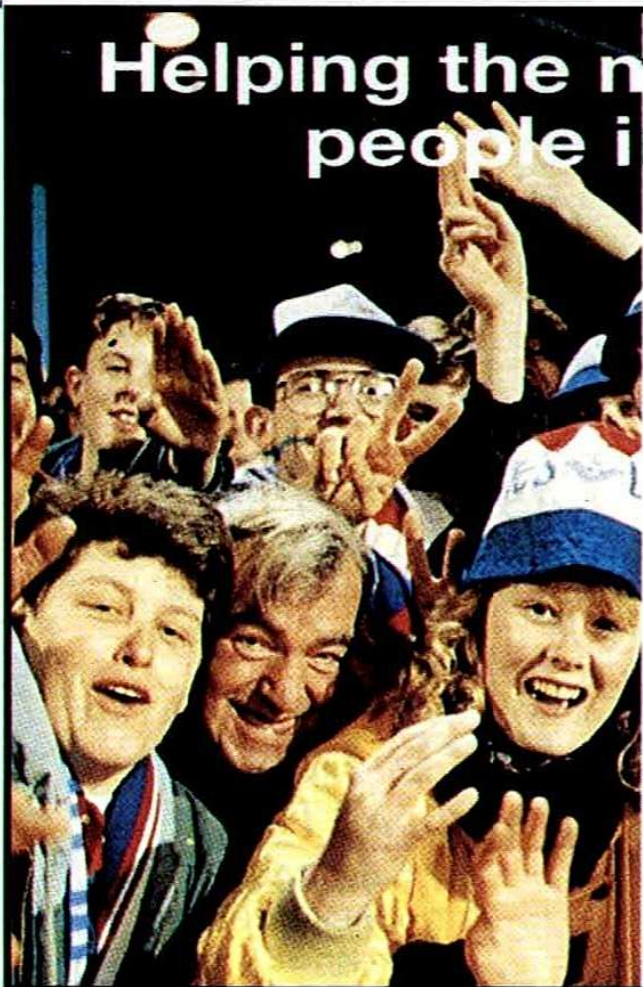

## SAM LAMB

Outside-Left

Born: Alfreton, Derbyshire c1880

Sam started his football League career with Derby County and subsequently played for Plymouth Argyle and Swindon Town, with whom he won a Southern League Championship medal in 1910/11. While at Swindon Sam played for the Southern League against the Football League and Scottish League. He joined Millwall in 1913 at 27 years of age, and being a clever outside left The Lions saw him as an ideal replacement for the retiring Bert Lipsham, and allowed Fred Vincent to return to his best position of inside forward. Sam played 51 games and scored 3 goals in the two seasons up to the war time interruption, winning a Kent Senior Shield medal 1913/14, and London Challenge Cup medal 1914/15. In the first three wartime seasons Sam missed only six competitive games and his goalscoring abilities were excellent for a winger since he claimed 29 goals.

He joined Rotherham in the summer of 1919.

His first shot was blocked but the ball luckily came back to him to blast into the net. Millwall dominated most of the match without turning this superiority into goals. Villa equalised through Steve Hodge who robbed Otulakowski, avoided a challenge and scored with a low shot.

The replay at New Cross was postponed for a day because of a frosty bone-hard pitch, it wasn't much better on the Wednesday but Millwall played as if the pitch was in its normal good condition. They continued with their dominating form from the Saturday but missed some good chances, both John Fashanu and Anton Otulakowski striking the crossbar. Fashanu hit the underside of the

## THE NEW DEN ON SCHEDULE

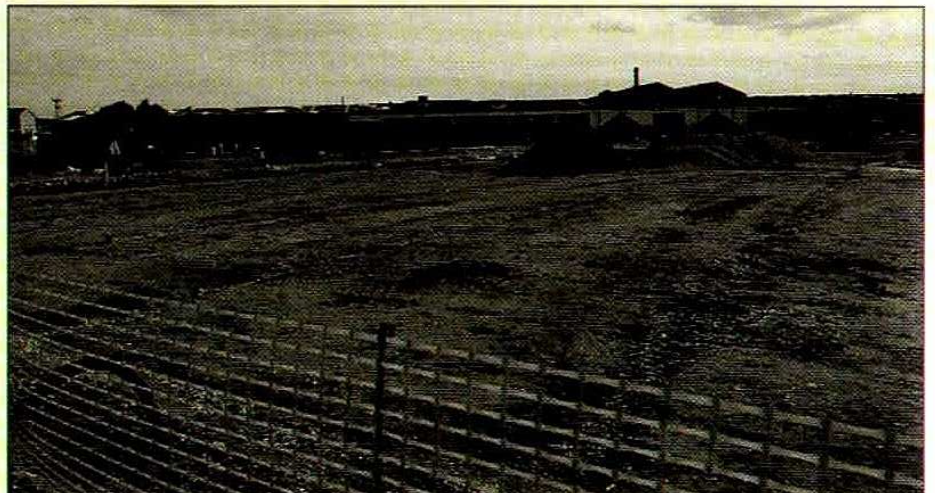
On the Friday before August Bank Holiday we went round to the site of our new home to check progress.

Keith Steuart of Tilbury Douglas is the Project Manager and is pleased with work so far. "The site itself is unusual because many years ago this area was all marsh. The subsoil is peat, which can retain water, but that's just a matter of putting in good drainage.

ahead about using the ground for concerts.

The only awkward part of it is that because the stands are so close to the pitch we have to put the roof on before we can put in the seats at the front of the stand."

**COMING NEXT**

"Most of the foundation work is finished and the first steelwork arrives on Tuesday, so then you will start to see something above ground. The first units for seats arrive three weeks after that and the first roof should be on around the middle of October.

The pitch drainage is in and I understand that the grass seed is being planted in October, so the pitch can settle in over the winter, then grow over Spring and Summer to be ready for the first game."

**THE COST**

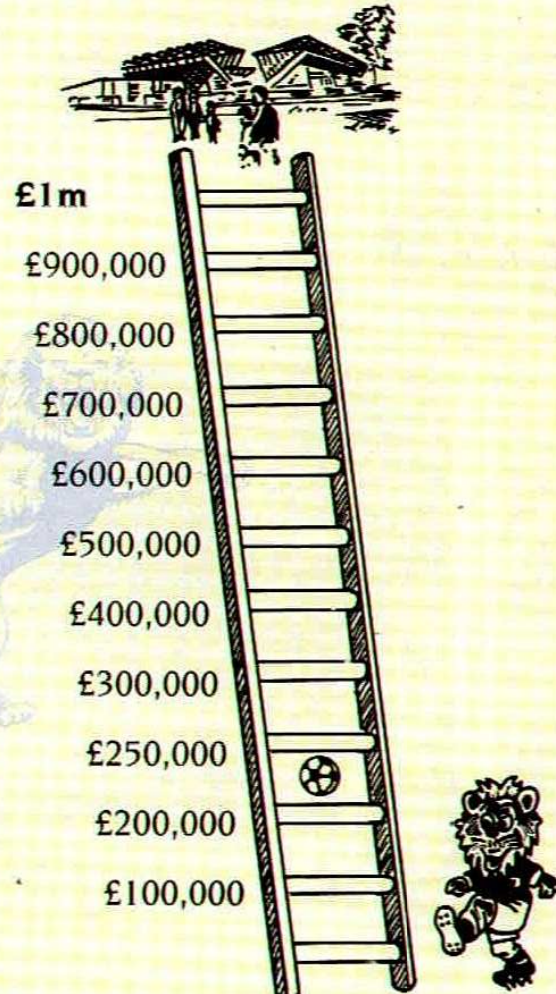
Keith believes that Millwall have picked the right time to build. "This is the ideal time. They'll never, ever get it cheaper. A cantilever stand means there are no posts to obstruct the view. That structure is very expensive - but they have to be the best.

The club want to move into their new offices in May, so the deadline is tighter than you might realise. Its a very tight programme, but we're doing well and looking forward to relaxing at last and watching the first Millwall game."

(Note: By all means have a look at progress yourself, but please do not get too close to the site as the roads around it are full of heavy lorries and cement mixers. Above all don't walk on the site because it is a VERY dangerous place!

The best and safest view is from the path at the end of the footbridge over Surrey Canal Road.)

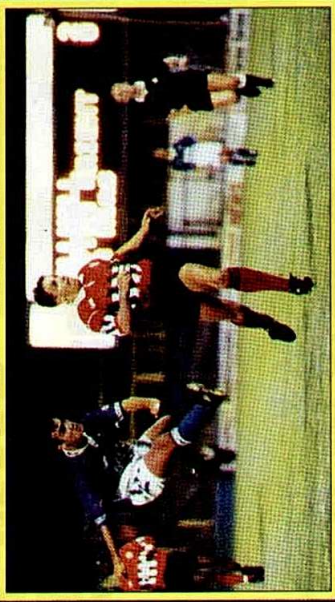

I can imagine the reaction of most Millwall Fans on Tuesday morning when they picked up their newspapers and read that Chris would be moving to Crystal Palace. After a promising start to the season in which Chris had been prominent, many would be forgiven for feeling a great sense of disappointment and concern that this might adversely affect our chances of promotion.

But the deal is a good one for the Club and one which had to be done.

## THE DEAL

THE DETAILS ARE:

- We receive £1,000,000 in cash.
- Depending on how many games Chris plays and if he is capped by England, we could receive up to £500,000.
- Palace have paid Wrexham money they were due as their share of the transfer fee.
- Last but far from least, we have taken a young striker, Jamie Moralee. We were offered other players but Ian Evans, who knew the Palace squad well, told us to insist on Jamie. Jamie had First Division experience and you can read more about him in an interview elsewhere in this programme.

So you can see the terms of the deal are excellent.

## WHY IT HAD TO BE DONE

The fact is that our football club loses money every season, because our revenue at the turnstile is far less than our expenses. Our expenses are high because we are an ambitious club with good players and a large squad. We need good players to win promotion and enough of them to cover suspensions and injury, which we have already suffered.

We could cut our bills by selling players but eventually we would be unable to

compete on the field and go back to the Second or even Third Division; is that the future you want?

We sold Chris because we have ambition not because we lack it.



## WHERE THE MONEY GOES

The money from the sale of Chris goes towards our overdraft to prevent us paying heavy interest on our debts. We still need your help in fund-raising for our new ground. Charlton have raised over a million pounds to move back to a ground with a capacity of 6,000. We need less money than that - to help build a stadium which will hold 20,000. Is Millwall Football Club REALLY asking too much of you?

## THANKS, MICK

Mick McCarthy and I have agreed to this deal very reluctantly and if we could have refused it, we would have.

My thanks to Mick for his help and for inspiring our players to show their true potential against Oxford and Orient. I feel bad that I haven't been able to support Mick as much as I would have liked, particularly since in the past I have supported people who I don't think hold a candle to him in terms of integrity, honesty and basic decency.

Selling Chris has helped us balance our books off the pitch. Mick and his players are doing a great job on it. Please continue to support us from the terracing and stands and together we can achieve our ambitions.

# HODDLE SETS SIGHTS ON THE BIG-TIME



### THE BOSS

IF Glenn Hoddle's managerial career is anywhere near as successful as his playing one, he'll become one of the games most respected bosses.

During his first season in charge at the County Ground the former Spurs star established Swindon as one of the best footballing sides in the Second Division.

He also made such a successful comeback as a player that a lot of people felt he should have been recalled to the England side as sweeper.

Hoddle picked up 53 England caps during his glory years with Spurs in the 1970s and 80s before moving on to Monaco in 1987.

A serious injury seemed to have ended his playing career, but after leaping at the chance of taking over Swindon he pulled his boots back on again and is now leading by his own example.

GLENN Hoddle's stylish Swindon side look certain to provide the Lions with a tough test this afternoon.

Hoddle's men have started the season well and they are determined to improve on last season when they narrowly missed a place in the Second Division promotion play-offs.

Whether or not Swindon manage to establish themselves as promotion candidates could depend on whether summer signing Craig Maskell hits form up front.

Maskell, who moved to the County Ground from Reading for £230,000, faces the daunting task of trying to replace Swindon favourite Duncan Shearer.

He was sold off to free-spending Blackburn Rovers shortly before last season's transfer deadline and has now moved on to Scottish Premier Division, Aberdeen.

Maskell kicked off his career at Southampton, but started to make a name for himself as a goalscorer after

moving to Huddersfield where he grabbed 43 in 87 games - an impressive strike rate by anyone's standards.

That rate dropped slightly during his two seasons at Reading, but he still managed 26 goals in 67 League games, and Hoddle is confident that he can spearhead Swindon's promotion drive.

"He's still only 24-years-old, but he's played over 150 games and he's always been a consistent scorer," explained Hoddle, after the transfer had gone through.

Maskell will be partnered up front this afternoon by either David Mitchell or the experienced Steve White.

The former Exeter youngster has already got two this season and his presence at set pieces could cause the Lions a few problems.

And then of course there's Huddle himself! Anyone who saw last season's Rumblovs Cup clash here at The Den will know just how devastatingly effective the former England and Spurs ace can be.

His stunning 35-yard pass out of defence set Shearer up for Swindon's first goal, and Millwall spent most of the night trying to combat his radar-guided distribution.

Plagued by injury problems for long spells last season, it's no coincidence that when Huddle returned to the side, Swindon embarked on a storming late run which nearly carried them into the play-offs.

They were beaten on the final day of the season, but prior to that they had strung together an impressive 10 match unbeaten run.

Huddle started this season in sensational fashion, blasting home the 25-yarder which earned his side an opening day victory over Sunderland.

And the signs are that if he can steer clear of the treatment room, Swindon could quickly establish themselves as firm favourites for one of the First Division's three priceless promotion spots.



# Memorable games against The Robins

## Millwall v Swindon Town

Over the years there have been many memorable games against SWINDON TOWN. The clubs first met in the Southern League in 1894.

MILLWALL won the first game at home (North Greenwich) 9-0, and won the away fixture 5-1.

The following season MILLWALL scored another nine against the Railwaymen. MILLWALL won all but one of the ten meetings (one drawn) before SWINDON recorded their first victory in 1899.

### FIRST MATCH AT THE DEN

November 11th 1910  
SOUTHERN LEAGUE,  
Att. 14,000.

This was MILLWALL's second game at their new home.

SWINDON came to The Den

with an unbeaten record.

Undeterred by these statistics, The Lions made a sensational start when in the first minute MILLWALL centre forward JOHN MARTIN received a pass from FROST, dashed between the backs and beat the SWINDON custodian with a fierce high drive.

The visitors fought back strongly, with some entertaining football, much to the pleasure of the crowd, but were unable to score.

After some thirty minutes play The Lions increased their lead when MARTIN latched on to a pass from WILSON about forty yards from the SWINDON goal, swept aside all efforts from the opposing defence to

stop him, and placed the ball into the net.

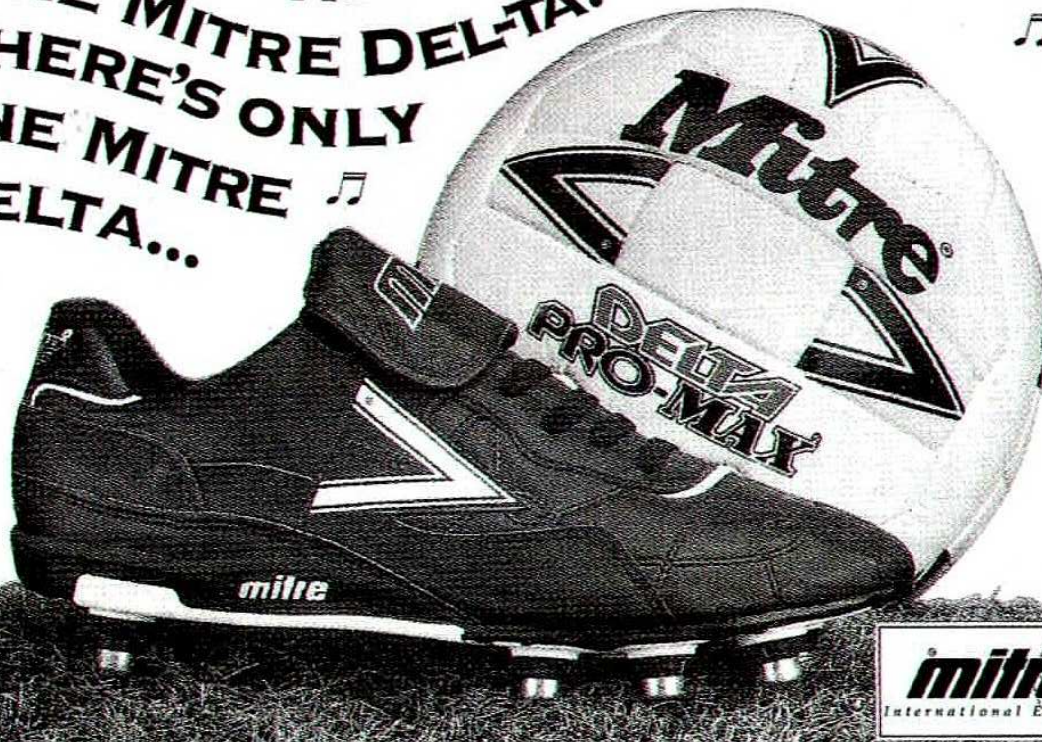
Shortly afterwards SWINDON had a chance to reduce the arrears through a penalty, but the spot kick from TOUT was easily saved by CARMICHAEL.

SWINDON had much the better of the second half, but were thwarted by some fine defensive work by the MILLWALL backs. The Lions finally won 2-0.

The largest crowd ever to watch one of these encounters was the 38,373 at The Den in DIV 3 (South) in 1937-38, which promotion chasing MILLWALL lost 0-2.

In 1953-54 MILLWALL recorded their biggest league victory against the West Country side, winning 6-1 at The Den in DIV 3 (S). GEORGE

STOBBART scored three of the goals. Another six were put past them in a DIV 3 match in 1979-80.

Heaviest loss was the 0-5 at the County Ground in 1936-37 in DIV 3 (S).

Overall the Lions have completed ten "doubles" over SWINDON since 1894. SWINDON have recorded five.

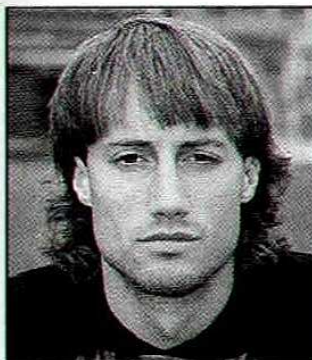

After the goal spree on the opening day of the season, the strikers in Division One had a bit of a rest last weekend. In 12 matches spread across three days, half the sides failed to score, and five games finished goalless. The First League table has a strange look to it since, even at this stage, some Clubs have played two more games than others, and the two Clubs with the best records are not at the top.

Anyone who recalls last season's Second Division will think there is something of an upside down feel to the table. Propping up the Division are Cambridge United, who after four outings, are still without a point. Relegated Luton and West Ham are finding that life in this Division is no easier. The Hatters have just one point out of a possible nine, earned in a goalless draw against Charlton at Upton Park. This spoils Charlton's 100% record, but they still top the table after winning their previous four matches. West Ham travelled to Newcastle and went down to two goals scored two minutes before half time, by Howey and Kelly. To compound Billy Bonds' misery, skipper Julian Dicks was sent off after clashing with Frank Carr. Down amongst the dead men for most of last season, Kevin Keegan's team now have maximum points from three games, a record they share with newly promoted Birmingham. The Blues bounced back from their ignominious Coca Cola Cup defeat by Exeter, to beat Grimsby 2-1 at St. Andrews, thanks to a Rowbotham goal two minutes from time.

Congratulations to Newcastle who again had the biggest crowd of the day anywhere in England. The 29,855 at St. James's topped even the attendance at Elland Road for Leeds v Liverpool Premier League clash.
