From the Boardroom

It is now many years since I started watching Swindon Town play and then at no time did I know the actual costs in running a full time professional outfit.

All of my working life I have been involved in finance and finance was the last thing on my mind when watching a game. Now as a Director of the Club it is the first thing that hits you.

With our financial year ending on 31st May 1992, I feel that you should be able to have a little insight to some of the expenditure a Football Club faces. Apart from wages one of our biggest bills every week is that for Policing. Our total bill last season was almost £200,000. However, we had the foresight at the start of last season to become one of the first Clubs in the Country to employ a professional stewarding company. To this end the Police have been able to reduce their manpower accordingly and we should notice a significant decrease in costs over this season.

Events People, the company who provide our matchday stewards, are a division of Wembley plc., and we are complimented on numerous occasions by our guests as to their efficiency, politeness and service. So much so in fact that Bristol Rovers, have now taken them on board. Both the Police and stewards face little trouble at games here at The County Ground because of the fans exemplorary behaviour. Indeed elsewhere in today's programme there is a letter from the Metropolitan Police congratulating fans on their behaviour at Millwall recently.

I myself look forward to the day when the Police will be allowed to step back and allow us to use the money in other directions. I was present at Hampshire's Benson & Hedges Cup semi-final at Southampton when there was a capacity crowd and just one Policeman was on duty.

Another great expenditure is for Medical bills. Obviously we have to take out insurance for the players because the cost of hospital treatment can run into several thousands of pounds if a player is laid up for some time after an operation.

Travelling to away fixtures is a further expense we face. Because of our location we have to have a large number of overnight stops. With four teams travelling the length and breadth of the Country we are grateful for the sponsorship from Cowies (formerly Walker Jackson) in the provision of a mini-bus for the two Youth Teams' use.

Naturally maintenance of the Stadium is something which hits our budget. A lot of the work results from the Taylor Report but natural wear and tear takes its toll as well.

Legal fees set us back last year some £200,000, most of which was in respect of the Inland Revenue enquiry. At this point I must mention that in addition the Club paid £100,000 to the Revenue on account of unpaid taxes and we have reserved a similar sum to meet any further demands now that the Court case is over. Like everybody else, your Directors are pleased that this saga is now behind us.


These are but a few of our costs. Of course the players' wages is our greatest expenditure but they are also our biggest asset. There are only two clubs in Great Britain, Heart of Midlothian and Tottenham Hotspur who include players on their balance sheet. To this end I commend a recent article by a leading linancial institution in their recent review puts up a good case for allowing Football Clubs to use their greatest assets on the balance sheets.

When our accounts are published later this year you must add between £3-4M on the asset side (yes, that is what your team is worth).

Not only will it make the Bank Manager smile but it will give a true and honest position of the strength of the Club.




We played some beautiful football

If the delivery of the ball is correct and Shaun's run and timing is correct you simply can't defend against him.

Going into last Saturday's game we were sixth in the table which is a better start than we had last year. I'm happy with the way we are playing my only concern is that in some cases we have been the better side yet have not won. Promotion teams are the ones who win when they don't play well.

Finally it was good to see Gazza back on the field. That will have thrilled all soccer fans wherever they are.

Two goals apiece for Clive Allen and Trevor Morley and one for Mark Robson, a summer signing from Spurs gave the Hammers victory and lifted them to fifth in the table. The Hammers have certainly found their form after a shakey start having won 3-1 at Peterborough the previous Saturday. Star performer in both games has been Mark Robson who says he was desperate to leave White Hart Lane "I was getting so frustrated I even thought about giving up football. I could have played a blinder week in week-out for the reserves and still never get a chance at Spurs. If the manager doesn't like you there's not a lot you can do about it."


One former Hammer who is enjoying life in the West Country with Bristol City is Leroy Rosenior who has set up a fine striking partnership with former Arsenal forward Andy Cole. Rosenior is hopeful for City's prospects for the rest of the season "We've had some great results already this season and it's just a question of maintaining this form now. There are a lot of good sides in the Division and

everybody knew before the season began how tough it would be to win promotion. The sweeper system that we play is working so well at the moment the lads are all bubbling with confidence. Teams are prepared to spend ninety minutes at Ashton Gate defending because they know we're capable of scoring goals." Both Rosenior and Coles are now out to get match-fit after injuries received in the Anglo Italian Cup.

Southend United's flying winger Andy Ansah has placed himself on the transfer list in a bid to play in the Premier League, Ansah, who began his career at Crystal Palace before making his debut for Brentford, has played nearly one hundred games for the Shrimpers scoring twenty goals and is keen for a move "I've gone on the list as I want to try my skills with a top Club. Southend only offered me a new contract two days before the of last season. Admittedly the Club was in a lot of turmoil but I thought I'd done enough to deserve more than that. I've been approached by other First Divison Clubs but I really want to play in the Premier League. I'm on a weekly basis and if no one comes in I'll have to stay."

There was a shock debut for 19 year old youth team goalie Russell Hoult at Leicester following an injury in the pre match warm up to first choice Carl Muggleton. Hoult explains "I was sitting in the stand eating a hot dog when the boss told me I was playing. I didn't really have time for any nerves. It was a great experience but in the end facing Steve Bull and Andy Mutch didn't cause me too many problems." Wolves managed to earn a scoreless draw despite Leicester hitting the woodwork three times.

Following Swindon's 2-2 draw with Bristol Rovers, Robins boss Glenn Hoddle has been raving about the talents of Rovers' 19 year old Marcus Stewart who plays alongside John Taylor in the Pirates' attack "He first caught my eye when he got into the Rovers side early on last season. He has got the right temperament, a nice touch and looks to have a bright future ahead of him."

A 2-1 defeat at Loftus Road by Premier League high-flyers Queens Park Rangers last week hardly did Grimsby Town justice. For the pace, precision and quality, of the Mariners play deserved better reward.

Yet at 1-2 and the home leg to come Grimsby are still very much involved in the Coca-Cola Cup as their season gains momentum. With just two defeats in their opening six League games Grimsby also look well set to improve on last season's 19th place in the Second Division table.

Mind you manager Alan Buckley has jused 20 players already this season. Of the team that line up on the opening day which was: Wilmot, McDermott, Jobling, Barraclough, Rodger, Dobbin, Watson, Gilbert, Rees, Mendonca, Woods, only Wilmot, Rodger, Dobbin, Watson, Gilbert and Woods have been ever present.

The Mariners were three goals down at Charlton when Jim Dobbin netted with four minutes to go. By then both teams were down to ten men, David Gilbert having been sent off with Darren Pitcher after a clash that hardly warranted a red card.


Former Leicester fullback lan Barraclough was replaced by Paul Agnew for the home game with Watford which proved quite a thriller with the visitors coming back twice to equalise before Graham Rodger slammed in the Grimsby winner.

At St Andrews it took Clive Mendonca just three minutes to shoot the Mariners ahead but Birmingham City stole the points with a 2-1 win which hardly reflected Grimsby's domination of the ball and further points were dropped in a 1-1 home draw with Oxford United.

Peter Handyside, just 18 and sixfoot tall, came in for his full League debut at the centre of the defence in that game at Birmingham and kept his place for the 1-1 draws against Oxford and at Tranmere Rovers.

There were more changes at Twerton Park where Grimsby claimed a 3-0 win. The experienced Paul Futcher, who amongst his many clubs includes Luton Town, Manchester City and Barnsley, came into the back line. The big defender, who joined the Mariners from Halifax for £10,000 in January 1991, was the 'Player of the Year' last season and celebrated his 36th birthday last Saturday.

Also on view again in a Grimsby Town shirt was **Andy Tillson**, who the Mariners sold to QPR for



£500,000 in December 1990. Andy is on a month's loan from Loftus Road and though the Londoners would not allow him to play against them in the Coca-Cola Cup he is expected to feature this evening.

Add to that the names of local lad Tony Ford, now in his second stint at Blundell Park after making 289 appearances in his first spell, Gary Childs and Mark Smith and you have the run down on all the Grimsby competitors.

Tony Ford is a real favourite having made his debut as a 16 year old in 1975. He went on to play for Stoke City and West Bromwich Albion before returning to his roots in November 1991 for a fee of £25,000.

Mark Smith is a forward but he has performed well at fullback. After six years in non-League circles he has seen service with Rochdale and Huddersfield Town.

Finally, midfielder Gary Childs, who came on as a substitute at Twerton Park, was with Alan Buckley at Walsall and joined Grimsby from Birmingham City on a free-transfer in 1989.

Paul Agnew - Defender. Grimsby's longest serving player, Paul made his League debut for them at Oldham in May 1984. A recognised leftback he can also operate in the centre of the defence. Started his career with Cliftonville, and has been capped by Eire at Under-21 level. Born: Lisburn 15-8-65.

Gary Croft - Defender. A product of the youth scheme Gary made his League debut in the number two Tranmere Rovers shirt at played (12-9-92)and in number three shirt Rovers Bristol the at following week. Had made a brief substitute appearance at Wigan in January 1991. Born: 17-2-74.

Dobbin Midfield. experienced competitor An who in 1980 was picked Celtic from by Whit-burn Boys Club. Made his Scottish Premier League debut at St Johnstone (3-12-83), and played a couple of times for Motherwell on before joining Doncaster Rovers in '84. Three years later he signed for July Barnsley and in joined Grimsby for 1991 £50,000. Born: Dunfermline 17-9-63.

Northampton Town before

joining the Mariners in March 1989. A great favourite with the fans he is the club's penalty taker and freekick specialist. Born: Lincoln 22-6-63.

Paul Groves - Midfield. A Grimsby club record purchase in August, he cost £125,000, from Blackpool where he skippered the side. Started with career his Albion and was introduced football League Leicester City, making his debut v Huddersfield 1988. Had a spell with Lincoln on loan and in at Bloomhis two years field Road he never missed a game. Born: Derby 28-2-66.

GRIMSBY TOWN

Kevin Jobling - Defender. Now established at leftback though quite at home in midfield. Served his apprenticeship with Leicester City he made the first of his 9 First Division appearances for them at Newcastle in April 1987. In January 1988 he moved to Grimsby. Born: Sunderland 1-1-68.

John McDermott - Fullback Quite a seasoned professional having experienced two relegations and two promotions with Grimsby. Made his League debut in February 1987 at Bradford City after rising through the junior ranks. Born: Middlesbrough 3-1-69.

Clive Mendonca - Striker. The man of the moment with five goals in his opening 8 League and League Cup appearances for the Mariners. Just turned 24, Clive cost £85,000 to sign from Sheffield United. Commenced his career with the Blades, making his debut at Brighton in May 1987. Went on loan to Doncaster before joining Rotherham United. A quick pacy striker he looks an excellent prospect. Born: Tullington 9-9-68.

Tony Rees - Forward. Former Aston Villa apprentice he made his League bow for Birmingham City at West Ham United (27-8-83). Had loan spells with Peterborough and Shrewsbury before joining Barnsley. Moved on to Blundell Park in August 1989 for £50,000. Born: Merthyr 1-8-64.

Graham Rodger - Defender Signed from Luton following a loan spell in February. Born in Scotland he has been capped by England at Under-21 level and won an FA Cup winners' medal, as a substitute with Coventry City in 1987. Born: Glasgow 1-4-67.

Tommy Watson - Midfield. Graduated through the YTS making his League bow at Preston (5-9-87). Plays on the right or centre of midfield. Born: Liverpool 29-9-69.

Rhys Wilmot - Goalkeeper. Welsh international who made just 9 League appearances in 10-years at Highbury where he was in the shadows of Pat Jennings and John Lukic. Had loan spells with Hereford, Orient and Swansea before a £100,000 move to Plymouth in 1989. The arrival there of Peter Shilton put an end to his Pilgrims progress and he joined the Mariners in July for a tribunal set fee of £87,500. Born: Newport Mon 21-2-62.

Neil Woods - Forward. The Mariners top shot for the past two seasons with 8 goals last term and 13 the year previous. Served his apprenticeship with Doncaster Rovers, making his debut at Plymouth (19-3-83). Glasgow Rangers snapped him up in 1987 but a few months later he moved to Ipswich Town after just 3 appearances for the Scottish giants. Had a season with Bradford City before a £90,000 move to Blundell Park in September 1990. Born: York 30-7-66.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Alan Buckley succeeded Bobby Roberts in June 1988, and his first four years in the hot-seat he has navigated the Mariners to two promotions and to an FA Cup fifth round.

Remembererd as both player and manager at Walsall Alan in fact started his career at Nottingham Forest in 1967 when he signed on as an apprentice. Made his League debut at White Hart Lane (23-10-71), as a substitute for Neil Martin in a 6-1 defeat. He was in the starting line up for the following fixture at Huddersfield and finished the season with 10 appearances.

Turned out 8 more times for Forest the following season, netting his first League goal in a 3-2 win over Millwall on November 4th, 1972.

in the summer of 1973 Alan moved to Walsall where in the next ten years he was to become a folk-hero. breaking the Saddlers goal scoring record with 202 strikes in a career interrupted by just one season, that of 1978-79, when he scored 8 goals in 28 League appearances for Birmingham City.

As player-manager at Fellows Park Alan brought sunshine pleasure to the Black Country backwaters when he led Walsall to the semi-final of the Milk Cup. On route to the epic meeting with Liverpool they had beaten Arsenal 2-1 at Highbury, to lay a ghost. Fifty years earlier, in 1933, Walsall had climed their place in the record books of all-time giantkillers with a 2-0 win over Herbert Chapman's great aristocrats

The fast-talking Buckley was sought by Birmingham to rekindle their sagging image but when he parted company with Walsall it was to Kettering Town that he turned his attention before taking on the manager's brief at Blundell Park.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Tonight we turn the clocks back almost 55 years, to a memorable few days in January 1938, when Swindon took on Grimsby in a Third Round F.A. Cup tie. In those final few years prior to the last War, the two clubs' fortunes could hardly have been further apart.

In 1935, Grimsby had finished fifth in the First Division, Swindon were six places off the bottom of the League. Between 1936 and 1939, the Mariners reached the semi-finals of the Cup twice and the Fifth Round once. Swindon were twice dismissed in the Second Round, while in 1935/36 their hopes were killed off by non-League Southall in the First!

The Town have always enjoyed upsetting the big 'fish' and this encounter proved to be no exception. Grimsby could boast three England Internationals and they were indebted to one of them - goal-keeper George Tweedy - for keeping Swindon at bay in the first clash at Blundell Park. Far from being overawed on a First Division ground, they very nearly upset their illustrious hosts.

Only a glaring miss from insideleft Jack Bradley saved the day for the Mariners, who had struggled to contain Swindon early on and had seen them take the lead with a 27th-minute goal from winger Eddie Jones. Grimsby drew level through centre-forward Fred Tomlinson after the break, but he rarely troubled George Morrall again and the teams came back to the County Ground on the following Wednesday afternoon for the replay.

For such an occasion, the railway works and most shops closed so that workers could make the 2.15 kick-off, and they were part of the Town's biggest midweek attendance for nine years - 23,101.

Tomlinson again tried to spoil their day when he put the visitors in front from a Jimmy Dyson cross in the 25th minute. But, fortunately for Swindon, it was to be the only set back of the day. The Mariners scorer was later injured and, without the benefit of substitutes in those days, spent the latter stages hobbling along on the left wing.

The Town's centre-forward, Ben Morton, had been the Club's first-ever £1,000 signing at the end of October, but had failed to score in ten games since his transfer. He was foiled again and again by burly centre-half Harry Betmead, but five minutes from the end of normal time, he broke his 'duck'.

Tweedy for once failed to deal with a low shot from Jones out on the right and Morton was on hand to sweep the ball home. The ground erupted as the players swarmed round the goalscorer, by now covered in

mud from head to foot, his red shirt barely recognisable.

Extra-time arrived and Grimsby departed. The lanky Arthur Hetherington made space down the left flank and his low cross was given the perfect treatment by little Alan Fowler. He hit the ball first time past Tweedy for his tenth goal of the season, to send Swindon into the Fourth Round.

Now even Betmead, born on the day the Titanic went down, was powerless to stop the Mariners sinking in the County Ground mud.



David Kerslake's football is as bright and breezy as his bubbly personality and like so many gifted players at the County Ground he is revelling in the Swindon style.

The former Queens Park Rangers midfielder found a new lease of life when he moved to Wiltshire in November 1989 and though he has operated in midfield for Town on occasions he says he feels more comfortable in the rightback position.

Explains David: "I missed the start of the season and 'Buzzer' got in, so when I played at Wolves it was in midfield. It took me a while when I came to Swindon to become recognised as a fullback rather than a midfielder but I think everyone agrees this is my best position.

"It suits my style better and as a fullback in the present set-up you are virtually a midfield player anyway. I'm given the licence to get forward as much as I like.

"Glenn recognised that I was good going forward and has helped me to improve the defensive side of my game. I think he has helped every individual player to get more out of themselves with general advice about aspects of the game.

"With me he recognised one or two points that would make me a better defender. He pointed out that I was not getting tight enough to my winger. I used to let opponents run at me.

"He was right. I used to back off and then rely on my pace to get me out of trouble. Now I stick tighter and try not to give them that room."

The achilles heel of this season so far has been those late goals conceded in the final five minutes of a game. It happened again in our last home match with Oxford United. It happened in the Anglo Italian Cup tie with Brentford a few days before to add to those tales of woe against Wolves, Millwall and Bristol Rovers. So what is the problem?

"I don't know," answers David.
"We are all very aware of letting in late goals but as to why it should happen goodness knows.

"In all the games in which this has happened we have felt in total control of things. It is not a question of fitness I'm sure about that and it is not a matter of us all losing concentration or being too relaxed either.

"Sometimes it has been down to individual errors but you will always get that. But there is no glaring weakness in this department. It is more of a collective problem it is no good pointing the finger at anyone.

"Everyone is aware of the shortcoming and we have been working hard to try and eliminate it. John Gorman and Glenn worked on our collective play last week and I think we were able to iron out one or two wrinkles.

"It certainly worked out all right at Torquay, though in fairness they were a very young side and just couldn't live with our passing game. It was wet and the ball was zipping about which meant you needed good control. But we closed them down very effectively as a unit and it seemed to work well.

"I don't think our problems have stemmed from the new backpass rule though it does inhibit our style somewhat. We can't play out from the back as much as we would like. Last season we knocked the ball around more in the last third of the field to try and suck opponents out of their defensive positions. Now it is much more hectic because we can't use the goalkeeper if the move we are trying to fashion does not materialise. But then if you have players who are comfortable on the ball, as we have, you should be able to work an alternative."

One aspect which David would love to improve about his own game is his scoring record he grins: "For an attacking rightback it is abysmal. I have had a couple of goes that the goalkeeper has thrown his cap on."




That game was played a year ago tomorrow and it gives an indication of the changes that have been made in that time with Jones, Shearer and Simpson all now with other clubs.

silver-thatch of Kevin Morris has become as synonimous to Swindon Town fans as the red shirts themselves. For over 22 years now the dapper figure has tended the wounded from Plymouth to Carlisle.

Kevin has been our full-time physiotherapist since 1971, having spent the previous three years on a part-time basis with the reserves while he studied for his diploma at Birmingham.

It has been a great life and he has thoroughly enjoyed it yet when he first arrived in Swindon from his native Manchester in 1957 Kevin had a very different objective in mind.

"Bert Head brought me here as a young player," recalls Kevin. "My one ambition was to be a footballer. Unfortunately I just wasn't good enough, and it didn't take me too long to realise that. Mike Summerbee and John Trollope were other aspiring professionals at the time and they were on a different planet.

"It is hard to accept that you can't be what you want to be. I desperately wanted to stay in the game and it was Harry Cousins who pointed me in the direction of physiotherapy.

"In those days of course most trainers, as they were called, were just sponge and water carriers. But things were changing and Harry urged me to get qualifications.

"He was so right and after that three year stint I qualified at the

Institute of Physiotherapy and started work with the club alongside John Nicholas.

"It was all very different then. Just a wooden hut and a ray-lamp. Now we have one of the best set-ups outside the Premier League. The Board and Management have always been very good. They have never denied us any device we have wanted to buy for the treatment of injuries."

The medical profession have made great strides in the past 20 years and Kevin says: "Football injuries haven't changed since the game began but the way of treating them has. It is remarkable what can be achieved. When I started it was quite common for players careers to be finished because of torn cartilages and tendons. Now modern surgery can rebuild a knee almost.

"There do seem to be more injuries to treat though and this is because the game is so fast today and the training is so demanding. The stress and strain on joints is phenominal."

For those players striken by the pain of muscle abuse Kevin's soothing hands and reassuring dialogue can be a comforting respite. For once on the couch Kevin becomes the patient's confidant; his councillor and often his agony aunt.

Psychology plays a big part agrees Kevin who says: "It is very difficult sometimes when someone has been dropped out of the team and brings his problems to you. In most cases it is up to the lad himself and I do my best to lift them.

"I'm also there to help the long distance injuries such as Mark Jones, who was out for 18 months. Fit young men who sud-

denly find they have lost power and function can easily become despondent ... Working at remedial exercises day in day out can become very boring. It is in situations like these that you see a player's real character.


"Take Colin Calderwood. He is one of the best professionals I have ever worked with. He worked so hard to get himself fit."


A dapper dresser, keen observer, humorist, adviser and motivator, Kevin watches over his flock like a doting father. "Every player is recorded," says Kevin. "If one takes an aspirin we log it."

Yet this loveable father figure of the dressing-room could well have left us in 1973 when he was interviewed by Nottingham Forest. Recalls Kevin: "The doctor was there and one or two others with Brian Clough. A player was on the couch and I was asked to determine his problem. I told them my job was to treat injuries not diagnose ... Mr Clough got up, squash raquet in hand, and said: "Young man. The job is yours. Whatever they are paying you at Swindon we will double.'

"I said fine draw up a contract ... 'We don't give contracts,' boomed Clough. 'If I don't like you after a week you'll be back down the motorway!""

Kevin did exactly that to return to the County Ground and continue his profession as our physio. You know, in 22 years he has missed just two games; at Wrexham in the Third Division when Danny Williams was in charge and two years ago at Barnsley when his wife was on a life support machine. It was that personal trauma that brought home to Kevin just what a great Club this is. He says: "Everyone went out of their way to help even to the players suggesting that they come in at night for treatment. I shall never forget their understanding."


