

P.F.A. Award for Micky Hazard



Micky Hazard -Divisional Winner.

Micky Hazard was among the players voted by his fellow professionals as top choice in his position in Division I of the Barclays League.

This afternoon he will be presented with his P.F.A. Divisional award - the prestigious medal conferred by the P.F.A. since the awards inauguration in 1974 - announced last Sunday at the 20th Annual P.F.A. Dinner in London.

The presentation will be made by Tony Eves, Barclays Business Centre manager in Swindon. Barclays Bank is the sponsor of the Football League Championship and sponsor of the P.F.A. Awards 1993.

This is Micky Hazard's second consecutive award, the previous one being for Division Two 1992. Former Town star David Kerslake also picked up a similar award this year, the votes being cast prior to his transfer to Leeds United F.C.

Aston Villa defender Paul McGrath edged home in front of Manchester United's Paul Ince to take the Player's Player of the Year Award.

United's teenage sensation Ryan Giggs walked off with the Young Player's Award for the second year running - the first time anybody has won the trophy twice.







end of the day someone up there is trying to make it difficult for us.





side. In the final, yet four more players were booked taking the total in the competition this season to 79 yellow cards and 19 dismissals!

Wolves maintained their slim chances of reaching the playoffs with a 2-1 win over Sunderland at Molineaux last Saturday but manager Graham Turner, who has taken the club from the Fourth Division in 1988 to their present position remains under pressure. Turner however does not have any excuses: "The work going on around us at Molineaux to redevelop the ground has not helped us but it is not an excuse for any of the home games we have lost. At times we have looked capable of mounting a serious challenge for promotion but we have failed to win some important games and have often struggled against teams at the bottom."

Another club who have probably missed out on a place in the play-offs is Charlton when despite leading the table for the opening months the season have been unable to maintain a top six slot. Joint manager Alan Curbishley says however that they may still make it: "A consistent run is now needed if we are to have a realistic chance of making it. The lads however deserve a special mention for their efforts in view of our injury problems. But as always whoever pulls on a red shirt gives everything and a bit more."

Portsmouth's convincing 3-0 win over Oxford at Fratton Park last week edged the south coast side within a point of West Ham in second spot and will ensure a tight battle until the end of the season for the automatic promotion places. Much of Pompey's success this season has been due to their impressive home record where they have only conceded eight goals all season. Despite the publicity surrounding ace goalscorer Guy Whittingham much praise has been directed at central defenders Andy Awford and Kit Symons aged twenty and twenty one respectively. Both players have been linked to big money moves but both remain at Fratton Park. Symons is a great fan of his partner Awford "I'm sure Andy will become a top player and it is my bet that he will one day captain England."



Arthur Cox - Well beaten

Both the teams currently occupying the automatic promotion spots came from behind to take the share of the points in their games last Sunday. West Ham United went one down in the East End derby clash at Upton Park when Millwall's Jamie Moralee scored after just forty seconds. Two goals from Kevin Keen and Trevor Morley sent the Hammers in at the break leading 2-1 but a 77th minute strike from Keith Stevens denied West Ham full points.

At St James' Park Newcastle United were stunned when Birmingham City took a two goal lead, through new signing from Hartlepool Andy Saville and Ian Rodgerson. Two goals in as many minutes from Andy Cole and Robert Lee gave Newcastle a point to remain five points clear of second place Hammers.

Bristol City chairman Les Kew defended the Anglo Italian Cup saying that the competition had generated £1.5 million, of which half came from last Saturday's final at Wembley when Cremonese beat Derby County 3-1. Rams boss Arthur Cox said that his side were well and truly beaten by a better

The last away success was at the conditions

Peterborough United kicked off their first ever season in the First Division with a 1-0 win over Derby County at London Road last August. Chris Turner was in charge of the team he had steered to promotion and he entered the new venture with a typically down to earth appraisal of the situation, claiming: "It is going to be bloody hard - I hope the expectations are not too high."

Turner, a former player who after filling the shoes of centre-half John Wile following his £25,000 transfer to WBA in the early seventies, then continued his career with Luton and Cambridge United, must have been quietly proud at how well his team adapted to the higher level.

For most of the season Posh have been within striking distance of the play-offs, though in recent weeks the gap has somewhat widened even if Peterborough have maintained their mid-table position.

Their home goalless draw with Watford last Saturday goes some way to explaining why they have lost ground. At London Road just five wins and nine draws has cost them 18 or more points this season.

Contrast that with their away record which shows eight wins - a total only bettered by First Division leaders Newcastle United.

There are some prize scalps too with Leicester City (2-0) and Derby County (3-2) among their victims. Wins have also been posted at Southend United (1-0), Barnsley (2-1), Grimsby (3-1), Watford (2-1), Bristol City (1-0) and Brentford (1-0).

The last away success though was at the end of February at Griffin Park. Since then they have suffered successive away defeats at Sunderland (3-0) and Bristol Rovers (3-1).

Lil Fuccillo, who started the season as coach, is now the manager after Chris Turner was elevated to chairman. Under the new regime the style of play has been tailored somewhat differently with a little more emphasis now on passing in midfield.

Like us, money has been in short supply preventing a spending spree last week though the club did not think it had strengthened its attack by acquiring Kevin Bartlett from Notts County. They were somewhat surprised when the former Portsmouth striker signed for arch rivals Cambridge United!

Still one transaction which did go through saw Chris Greenman join them from Coventry City on a free transfer. Chris, a 24-year-old Bristolian, had been at Highfield Road since leaving school. He made just four First Division appearances for the Sky Blues - the first against Crystal Palace in October 1991, was at leftback. The other three at the centre of the defence.

That is where Chris made his Posh debut last Saturday in the goalless draw with Watford. The line-up was: Bennett, Bradshaw, Spearing, Cooper, Greenman, Welsh, Sterling (Howarth), McGlashan, Adcock, Philliskirk (Iorfa), Barnes.

David Robinson and Ken Charlery were very much part of the scene at the start of the season but Robinson, a central defender who had cost a club record £100,000 from Halifax, was sold to Notts County in September for £425,000. While Charlery, a £35,000 capture from Maidstone last year, moved on to Watford last October after scoring six goals in 14 games this season.



Others to contribute to the effort include fullback **Noel Luke** who arrived on a free transfer from Mansfield in 1986 and is now the longest serving player on the books. Noel made his 250th League appearance for Posh in the opening game of the season against Derby.

At the other end of the scale young Andy Curtis, who scored in the 3-2 win at the Baseball Ground, is a highly promising prospect. Andy made his League debut at Grimsby on October 3rd when he went on as a substitute.

TONY ADCOCK Striker. Signed from Northampton Town for £60,000 midway through last season. Made his League debut in a Third Division match for Colchester v Carlisle in May 1981. Went on to net 98 goals in 210 League appearances for the U's. Manchester City signed him in 1987 but he was given only 15 chances in the 2nd Division. (5 goals), and moved on to Northampton. Then had a spell with Bradford City before returning to the Cobblers. Scored 7 goals in 24 League games for Posh last season. Born: Bethnal Green 27-2-63.

BOBBY BARNES - Winger. No stranger to the County Ground, Bobby scored 13 goals in 45 League games for Town having joined us in October 1987 from Aldershot. A product of the West Ham youth policy he made his League debut v Watford in September 1980, when still 17. Gained an FA Youth Cup winners' medal with the Hammers with whom he made 43 League appearances. Had a spell on loan with Scunthorpe before signing for the Shots in 1986. Left us for AFC Bournemouth but it

was after moving to Northampton that he really hit the headlines with 37 goals in 99 League outings. A well balanced player who on his day can be devastating. Cost Posh £60,000 mid-way through last season. Born: Kingston 17-12-62.

IAN BENNETT - Goalkeeper. An ever-present in the Peterborough side this season, lan's form has attracted a whole host of Premier League scouts. Joined Newcastle United as a trainee but was released by them and joined Posh initially as a non-contract player. That was two years ago. Last season he made his debut in the Autoglass Trophy semi-final with Stoke and came into the League team for the last seven games of last season keeping a clean sheet on his debut against AFC Bournemouth (8-4-92). Born: Worksop 10-10-70.

DARREN BRADSHAW - Fullback. Another ex-Newcastle United player - Darren was released on a free transfer last summer. Started his career with Matlock Town and was introduced to League football by Chesterfield, for whom he made 18 league appearances. In 1987 he was transferred to York City who collected £10,000 for his move to St James' Park in September 1989. Capped by England at schoolboy and youth levels he was with Sheffield Wednesday as a youngster. Born: Sheffield 3-3-67.

GARY COOPER - Midfield. Has been at London Road just over a year following his deadline day signing from Maidstone United. Rated at £5,000 he had spells with Brentford and QPR as a youngster before graduating with Fisher Athletic. The Stones then gave him the opportunity of League football. Born: Edgware 20-11-65.

MARCUS EBDON - Midfield.

Arrived on a free-transfer from Everton last season after spending most of the campaign on loan to non-League Redbridge Forest. Falled to make the grade at Goodison Park but made 15 League appearances for Posh after his debut v Preston (17-8-91). A Welsh Under-21 International. Born: Pontypool 17-10-70.

PETERBOROUGH UNITED

MICK HALSALL - Midfield. Skippered Posh to successive promotions. Has now clocked up over 250 League games for the club. A former apprentice at Anfield he made his League bow with Birmingham City at WBA in March 1983. Joined Carlisle in 1984 and three years later moved on Grimsby Town. Arrived at London Road in July 1987 for £25,000. Born: Bootle 21-7-61.

LEE HOWARTH - Defender. Skippered the Great Britain Students team which participated in the World Student Games held in Sheffield last year. Was with Blackpool as a youngster before going to university and joined Posh late last season to try and resurrect his career as a centrehalf. Made his League debut at Reading (19-10-91). Born: Bolton 3-1-68.

DOMINIC IORFA - Forward. Stands 6'1", is pacey and awkward to deal with. The Nigerian was first spotted with Antwerp and brought to England by Queens Park Rangers. Made the first of his eight League appearances for Rangers as a sub v Wimbledon in the last game of the 1989-90 season. Played just once, as a sub in 1991-92 season and was transferred to Turkish club Galatasaray in January 1992. Born: Lagos 1-10-68.

JOHN McGLASHAN - Midfield. Powerfully built player who arrived in English football from Montrose when he joined Millwall in the summer of 1990. Made his League debut for the Lions v Charlton in September 1990 but never really established himself at the Den making just 16 League appearances. John, who is 6'1", played for Dundee Violet before making 68 Scottish League appearances for Montrose (11 goals). Was transferred to Petgrborough in January. Born: Dundee 3-6-67.

TONY PHILLISKIRK - Striker. A £80,000 recruit from Bolton Tony joined the Posh in October to help fire the forward line and has responded with some magnificent goals. Sheffield United it was who spotted him in the amateur ranks and signed him in 1983. Made his League debut for the Blades v Brentford in October '83. Totalled 20 goals in 80 League games before moving to Oldham Athletic after a brief loan at Rotherham. Preston was the next stop before he established himself with Bolton - 49 goals in 131 games prior to this season. Born: Sunderland 10-2-65.

TONY SPEARING - Fullback.

Developed through the youth ranks at Carrow Road he was introduced to League football at Tottenham in May 1984. Made just four League appearances in three years but after loan spells with Stoke City and Oxford

United in season 1984-85 he began to challenge. Enjoyed his best spell in 1986-87 when he made 39 League appearances for Norwich City. Left them in 1988 for Leicester where he established himself as the regular leftback until injury intercepted. Still, his 73 League games for the Filberts is his best return yet. Having lost his place at Leicester he joined Plymouth Argyle in the summer of 1991 and was a regular last season. Returned to East Anglia in January. Born: Romford 7-10-64.

WORRELL STERLING - Winger. Clever ball player with a host of tricks. Cost Peterborough £70,000 to sign from Watford in March 1989 and has been a regular ever since. Made his League bow at Old Trafford, in April 1983 - when Watford were in the old First Division; and made most of his 94 league appearances for the Hornets at that level. Made his 150th League appearance for Posh on the opening day of this season v Derby. Born: Bethnal Green 8-6-65.

STEVE WELSH - Central Defender. Tough tackling Scot - Steve is the skipper and a most influential player. Was pursuing a career in the army before joining Cambridge United to try his luck in the professional game. Could not make the team and played just one League game for the U's in 1990-91. Was given a free and joined Peterborough in the summer of 1991. Born: Glasgow 19-4-68.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



PASQUALE 'LIL' FUCCILLO was elevated to manager in mid-December 1992 after a highly successful term as Coach.

Born and bred in Bedford, the son of Italian parents, he joined Luton Town as an apprentice in 1973 and spent 10 years with the Hatters. Made his League debut at 19, in 1976, but a succession of serious injuries limited him to just 160 appearances (24 goals).

An industrious and highly skilled midfielder, noted for his forward surges into shooting positions, he enjoyed some of Luton's best years winning a Second Division Championship medal before participating in a side that was never out of the top seven in Division One.

In 1983 he quit to join Tulsa Roughnecks and helped them win the North American equivalent of our FA Cup with a victory over Toronto Blizzards.

Lil returned to the U.K. and played 45 League games for Southend United before joining Peterborough United. Clocked up another 82 League games with Posh before renewing his association with Chris Turner at Cambridge United.

Finished his League career in 1987 but continued to perform with Kettering Town, then Wivenhoe (Diordora Champions), before returning to London Road as Coach in January 1991.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Peterborough first visited the County Ground as a Football League club 31 years ago this week, on April 7 1962. They had previously made the journey as members of the Midland League when they held the Town to a 1-1 draw in an F.A. Cup Second Round tie in December 1955, before losing the replay at London Road.

Having been elected to the Fourth Division in 1960, Posh won it at the first attempt, hitting no less than 85 League goals at home including two 7's and three 6's. Ace marksman Terry Bly accounted for 52 of their mammoth total of 134 for the season.

Swindon kept Bly at bay in the first clash at London Road on November 18 1961, but Peterborough still went on to clinch the points. Winger Billy Hails put them ahead after a quarter of an hour, but the Town hit back with two goals in six minutes from wing-half Peter Chamberlain - making his first League appearance of the season - and an Ernie Hunt penalty. Two second-half strikes, by Roy Senior and George Hudson, gave Posh a 3-2 verdict.

That scoreline was reversed in the fixture at Swindon. On this occasion the Town were two goals up in 17 minutes, through Mike Summerbee and big Bill Atkins. Ketih Ripley pulled one back ten minutes after the interval, but Hunt's 79th minute goal proved decisive. Bly finally got his name on the scoresheet a minute from time, but it failed to change the destiny of the points.

The clubs next met at Easter 1963, following one of the worst winters for fixture chaos since the War. Peterborough, were then managed by Jack Fairbrother - who incidentally was a former playing colleague of Summerbee's father George (Nicky's grandfather) at Preston and best man at his wedding. Posh were in third place in the Third Division table when they came to the County Ground on Good Friday. But the result was not so good for leaders Swindon, performing in front of a 23,239 crowd. They had the perfect start when Emie Hunt put them ahead after only 45 seconds, but two goals in as many minutes, from Peter McNamee and Rov Horobin turned the tide in Posh's favour. Hunt struck again seven minutes after the break but the game ended 3-2 yet again when John Turley hit a 63rd minute winner.

Colchester came to Swindon on the following day and felt the full force of the backlash as they were blasted 6-1, John Stevens grabbing a remarkable six minute hat-trick either side of half-time. Peterborough completed a League 'double' when almost 15,000 turned up at London Road on Easter Monday to see them record a 3-1 victory. Senior and Turley (twice) scored for Posh with the Town's reply coming from winger Eric Weaver.

The two reverses were enough to remove Swindon from pole position, Northampton taking over on goal average, and a further defeat at Notts County themselves on the rebound from a 5-0 drubbing at Bradford Park Avenue - looked to be stifling the Town's promotion ambitions. But four wins and two draws from the final six games of the campaign were enough to take them up. A Second Division slot was secured on May 14 1963 when a single goal from Roger Smart, who celebrated his 50th birthday last week, gave Swindon victory against Shrewsbury in front of a 20,273 attendance at the County Ground.



PLAYER PROFILE

A couple of days before our eventful afternoon at Griffin Park I was discussing the current situation with striker Shaun Close. While obviously disappointed not to be a regular in the starting line he refused to complain about his lot; appealing more than anything for the chance of an extended run.

Claimed Shaun: "I can't complain even if it is frustrating to have only started once this season - in the Anglo Italian Cup tie at Oxford. What I really need is a run of five or six matches to give me the chance to show what I can do.

"I'm becoming known as 'the Nearly Man" he joked. "I need that little bit of luck to convince people I'm worth keeping in the side."

Like the winning goal at Brentford - I suggested.

"Exactly," responded Shaun enthusiastically.

Truth is the dream almost came true on a hectic afternoon when Town were reduced to nine men having had both strikers, Steve White and David Mitchell, sent-off

For the opening 25 minutes of the second half Glenn kept it tight at the back. Then he brought on Shaun in a brave gamble to try and take all three points.

It wasn't the best of situations in which to prove your point for the former Spurs man was a lone figure chasing balls to the left, balls to the right, and down the middle. But he posed the Brentford defence many awkward questions and almost set up what would have been a glorious match-winning goal.

Having pulled to the right and taken the markers with him Shaun then crossed perfectly to set up Paul Bodin for the sort of chance we have seen him take in his stride. This time, alas, the Welsh International's shot screamed over the bar!

"I was just happy to get on", says Shaun.
"You feel so out of it when you are in the

reserves and not in the first-team squad. You begin to just go through the motions. Ticking over hoping you will be noticed by somebody.

"You have to perform well at that level to have any chance of promotion but it is a battle to keep your mind and your belief in yourself.

"Being on the subs bench for a first team game is much more rewarding. Just to be involved is stimulating. Thankfully I have been included for the last dozen games. You miss not playing on a Saturday. We spend all week building up for a Saturday game and the whole thing goes dead if there is no fixture as is often the case with the reserve team.

"Having got on the bench your next hope is that you will get on of course. Usually you are put on to try and change the course of a game which is a big responsibility but a great challenge.

"From the stands it all looks so easy. One player comes off the other slots in. They expect you to perform immediately. It's not that simple. The pace of the game is so quick it can take you 15 minutes or more to come to terms with the rhythm of the game.

"The crowd can get at you at times because of this. It is just a lack of understanding. Coming on in a fast moving game can be like trying to jump on a merry-go-round when it is going its fastest."

Problems or not Shaun's not meaning. He claims: "I just want to be involved even if it is only in the 13.

"I haven't made my mark here yet but there is still time. I know Glenn likes my first-touch and feels that I offer another dimension to the game. What I need to do is persuade him to start with me in the side.

"I'm not a prolific scorer - never will be. I'll score goals but will make more for others than I get. I haven't modelled myself on Peter Beardsley but feel that I

perform a similar role to him. Darting around bringing others into the play.

"I'm not a replacement for Chalkie or Dave. They go around putting themselves about and creating havoc. They are very good at upsetting defenders and charging in. That's not my game. I'm more of a target-man who flicks balls off to others.

"I'm not very tall either but I read Kevin Keegan's book and noted the importance he placed on body strength. He claimed he was like a little pocket-battleship. I'm probably in the same shape physically having worked hard with weights to improve my upper body strength.

"To be honest I don't care how big the defender is if the ball is played in low to me. In fact I get something out of being kicked by them - it is a sure sign I'm winding them up because they can't get the ball.

"When you play this way you need a good referee to protect you. Manchester United's Mark Hughes is probably the best exponent of this style. He's so strong. Again he makes more goal chances for others than he takes himself

"At Tottenham I suffered a broken foot and busted my knee-ligaments. Yet I gain real satisfaction from holding the ball up and slotting it in to other players. When the big centre-halves see my stature they think they can try it on. Whey they bounce off me they get a shock.

"All I have asked for since I came from Bournemouth is a chance to show what I can do."

Ironically that chance could be just around the corner with the impending suspensions of White and Mitchell about to seriously blunt our cutting edge. It's not the way Shaun would have wanted it to happen but if he is given the opportunity you can be assured this pocket-battleship will go in full stern ahead.



This afternoon we aim to have come back from our short break in Spain refreshed and ready for the final eight games of the season.

It's been a very hard season but also a really exciting one and we have still got everything to play for.

We had a lot of knock backs in our search for a loan player prior to the transfer deadline last week.

In the end we decided that we would not bring in another player just for the sake of another body unless he was of the quality to improve our squad.

With hopefully all of our long term injuries now fully fit again we really feel that we have the squad and the spirit already here to do the job. We have also been very pleased with the way Brian Marwood has settled in since coming here last month. He has given us a nice bit of quality and experience. Buying players does not always guarantee success as has been shown before at lots of clubs.

I think that it would be interesting if teams were only allowed to get their squad organised before the season starts with a maximum of say twenty five and were only allowed loan players when serious injuries occur during the campaign and not be able to keep on buying.

This would put more emphasis on the coaching and improvement of your own players and would allow the younger players more time to mature in the Reserves.

Every team would then be judged by the players you set out with and make for more loyalty amongst the players, fans and club alike.

When I think back to when I was at Celtic way back in the late 60's we hardly every bought or sold that many players at all. Nearly all the players came through the system being brought up through the Youth and Reserve Team ranks for about five years until you were ready for the first team coached on the skills and style of the team.

I remember players who became full Internationals even

after not making the first team regularly until they were 24 years old. It could not have been a bad idea as the club were twice in the European Cup Final when I was there. There was a lot of feeling for the club as loyalty was a major quality and financial rewards were given for long service. It brings stability to clubs and a family feeling with the supporters.

I can see that the fans of Swindon Town do not like parting with players they enjoy watching and I'm sure that this would keep players more satisfied and settled at clubs until the time was right for both parties to separate.

I've no doubt that I'll have a few stories about our trip to Spain in next week's programme when we meet Luton Town. Til then

Luton have been here twice since then. Beating us 2-0 on both occasions, in 1972 and '74!







Confusion clouded the event in the press box at Griffin Park last Saturday. Had Solihull referee Vic Callow sent David Mitchell off for a red

card offence or for two yellow cards?

The difference can be critical with regard to the punishment of course. The press naturally wanted to record the correct verdict.

Yes we had seen Mr Callow pull out the yellow card before the red. But he had done that a little while earlier by mistake when sending off Steve White.

This is by no means a criticism of the official who played it by the book, as indeed do all referees in this country. The thing is that Britain is the only country in Europe that abides by the directive laid down by FIFA that says when a player is cautioned for a second time the referee must display "simultaneously" both cards. The yellow for the booking; the red to indicate that it is a second caution and thus a sending-off.

It didn't take them long on the continent to discover such signals hard to clarify. Most European Associations simply altered their procedures advising their referees to show clearly first the yellow card then the red, by holding them clearly above the culprit one after the other.

Thankfully FIFA have recognised the flaw in their instructions and the rules have now been changed so that the procedure now practised on the continent will become the law as of the start of next season. But why

oh why wait for then. Why doesn't the F.A. give a directive for it to start work immediately and save us all the guess work.

It is a measure of Paul Bodin's class that when he received a pass from Shaun Close in the closing stages of the game at Brentford nearly everyone expected him to score.

Alas, on this occasion Paul was unable to add to his seven League goals this season and afterwards confided to me: "It was probably too good a ball really from Shaun.

"Looking back on it I realised I had a lot more time and could have taken it in closer. I struck it well enough. Just disappointed I didn't hit the target more than anything.

"In those positions I usually hit the target in training as well as on match days. It was just a pity it went over the bar this time.

"It was a good point in the end though. Playing with nine men against a team like that is always going to be a battle, even with eleven players. So to hold on for a point with nine we did ourselves proud to be honest.

"Until the red cards we were bossing the game. It was particularly hard to lose the two strikers for they have been playing well for us lately. Holding the ball up and playing people in. Obviously once you lose your two front men in quick succession the game is always going to be difficult to chase."

Paul of course did not travel with the Town party to Spain on Sunday. He made for Cardiff to prepare for the World Cup qualifier between Wales and Belgium. Congratulations Paul.

Todays opponents, Peterborough United have surprised a lot of people with their performances this season after winning a place in Division One through the play-off final at Wembley last May.

John Gorman says: "They have surprised a few teams this season and they have a very good away record. It is going to be quite a game. We are excellent at home; they are excellent away from home.

"Since Lil took over they have mixed it up a little. They are playing a good style of football, not quite as direct as before. They are a good passing side.

"But to be honest we are on a crest at home at the moment and I feel the lads now go out expecting to win which is very good. We are playing well and their performance at Brentford emphasised the character in the side.

"We are ready for the final battle with eight games to go and we'll give everything to try and win promotion to the Premier League."

Well said John - we look forward to those little dances of delight you make down the line when things go right.





It certainly has not been the best of times for Janet Garrett to launch her career in football, but her sunny smile and warm personality is proving quite persuasive when it comes to asking hard headed business men to part with their cash.

Janet, who was installed as Town's Commercial Manager last October when Mike Sullivan left to join Millwall, is certainly not inhibited by the challenge even though she admits her only knowledge of the game before she came, initially as his assistant, was the 1966 World Cup - which she had watched on TV - and the fact that the teams changed goals at half-time.

Still, for a girl who became the first female representative for local builders merchants F.J. Reeves the sales path to corporate sponsorship and advertising at the County Ground is pretty civilised in comparison.

Recalls Janet: "We were given Hillman Imp cars and after six months intensive training let loose on unsuspecting builders. It is not easy trying to sell to men who are only used to dealing with male reps; and even harder when you are in wellies and a hard-hat and kneë-deep in mud."

Fluent in French and Italian Janet's career took her on to Courtaulds then Blick International and a life of high intensity selling on the world market. That was until the recession forced redundancies.

Says Janet: "There are not that many avenues you can go down using languages and sales. It was my other half, who is a Swindon supporter, who

persuaded me to apply for the job as Mike's assistant.

"Knowing nothing at all about football I arrived with no pre-conceived ideas at all. What I found was really nice. It was so relaxed compared to the big-business world I had been in where three or four of us would fight over one phone call to try and get the order.

"To start with most of my time was on the road as I went out selling perimeter advertising, programme advertising and matchball sponsorships.

"Nearly always I was made welcome by the clients who seem pleased to be able to talk to anyone from the football club."

"Since Mike left and I was given his place my feet haven't touched the ground. It is all very stimulating.

"Long, long hours of course and the pressure is even greater in a company of this size, every small decision could be significant. Particularly in respect to our current financial position.

"It isn't easy for the Board who conduct their business very efficiently. Targets are set of course and the main one is to get promotion to the Premier League.

"If we can achieve this it will make life in the commercial office so much easier. We have plenty of ideas which at the moment we just can't introduce because of the lack of funds. So many people have said they will back us if we are in the Premier League.

"It will not make my job easier in terms of commitment but in terms of having the finances to support our projects.

"My task now is to encourage firms who have had nothing to do with us to take a look and see what we can offer. We have facilities here that can be utilised by almost all of them. The message is by supporting Swindon Town Football Club they are supporting the town."

Janet, who hails from the Elephant & Castle, Lambeth, certainly didn't walk into the game with her eyes shut. Already she is responsible for initiating the highly successful Kid-a-Quid scheme that is sponsored by Castrol.

Says Janet: "The scheme has caught the interest of a lot of clubs who are now intending to introduce similar sponsorships.

"Our main sponsors are Burmah and I devote a lot of my time to them. They bring 40 guests to every game and I think that both the company and the club get a lot out of our association.


"This is what makes this job so rewarding. I have met so many nice people - too many to mention here from all walks of life. Supporters, sponsors, representatives. It is amazing, I have made some really good friends very quickly.

"The thing that has struck me most is the love of the people for the club. I can raise an army of volunteers, who don't get paid, but just go out and do their thing for the club ... They are all marvellous."

With a daughter of 15 and a son of 11 Janet has little time to relax. She loves driving, and loves reading but her greatest passion if for clothes ... "That is one good thing about working on Saturday, I can't go out and spend my money on a new outfit!" she jokes.







Thatcham never gave up and their goal made the final scoreline of 2-1 closer than the amount of the ball each side had.


This performance was similar to so many others this season, through winning the game too many of the players complicate things with their end product not to the standard we would expect.
