Flair against Organisation at Wembley - says John Nolan

Tomorrow, Wembley Stadium stages the first of the major domestic finals when Arsenal take on Sheffield Wednesday for the Coca-Cola Cup. The League Cup of course has a special place in our affections but is it really 24-years since Rogers, Smart, Trollope and company rolled the mighty Gunners' noses in the mud?

Town's 3-1 victory over Arsenal in extra-time was one of the big upsets of all time. A red-letter day in this part of Wiltshire and Town's most spectacular achievement yet.

Since then Arsenal have been back twice more to contest the final of this competition, defeating favourites Liverpool in 1987, and failing against the Luton no-hopers a year later.

Tomorrow the Gunners contest their fifth League Cup final, Sheffield Wednesday their second. The Owls fiew in as underdogs in 1991 and shocked Manchester United when John Sheridan scored the only goal.

Arsenal will start as favourites in this first leg of the unique cup double between these two clubs and I fancy tradition to repeat itself with the fancied winners ending up the vanquished.

The two sides reflect perfectly in their styles the personalities of their respective managers. Arsenal, well organised, precise and totally professional. Wednesday, imaginative, adventurous and somewhat daring.

There is no doubt Arsenal are one of the major powers in the English game. They were strongly backed to walk off with the Premier League title this year but lost their way disappointingly in the early weeks of the campaign and only really found consistency in the latter half of the season.

It is difficult to pin-point just what went wrong. The players themselves seem somewhat bemused as one of the best defences in the game started to leak goals. Even last season, when they finished fourth, they let in only 46 goals in 42 games.

Goals too have been in short supply at the other end and though they boast, what seems on paper at least, one of the most potent attacks in the game with Alan Smith, Ian Wright and the powerful Kevin Campbell.

 Contrast this to the Sheffield Wednesday story. For much of this season the Owls have been deprived, through injury, of their two front-line strikers David Hirst and Mark Bright, yet they have continued to find the net regularly - indeed hitting seven past our visitors today, on route to the final.

Paul Warhurst is the key. The reluctant striker, who prefers to play in the centre of the defence, filled the breach and looked like a natural. The timing of his runs, the instinctive touch, are all hallmarks of a great finisher.

Yet it is in midfield where I believe this final will be decided. Arsenal have lost the services of David Hillier, their ace man-marker, with twisted knee ligaments and Danish super-star John Jensen doesn't look at home in the English game.

Likewise Anders Limpar, the Swede with the delicate touch, has not demonstrated heart for the physical battle. Paul Merson with the running power can deliver a stunning shot but there is no general at the heart of this Arsenal side.

The one man who can stabilise and prompt with cunning accuracy is Paul Davis, but he is out of favour with manager George Graham after criticising his tactics in a national newspaper.

Wednesday on the other hand have plenty of spontaneity in their side. Wembley surely is the stage for the mercurial skills of Chris Waddle to flourish. He might even impress England manager Graham Taylor - who knows

Carlton Palmer and Viv Anderson, who played in Arsenal's victorious side of 1987, can also play it off the cuff as indeed can Trevor Francis, who plays little now but has hinted he might be tempted to make an appearance in one of the two finals.

George Graham is set to sit alongside Herbert Chapman in the Highbury hall of fame, such has been his success with the Gunners, yet unless he bites his lip and brings back Paul Davis to midfield I can't see him leaving Wembley a winner on this occasion.

Season Ticket holders will have priority on their own ticket and will not have to save stubs or vouchers.





Birmingham City 4 Swindon Town 6 ... It was the talking point of the week.

I have certainly never been involved in a game like this before. Not from 4-1 down. I recall once at Tottenham we were 4-1 down and got back to 4-4 but it was nothing like this.

You just can't explain it. I was talking to Terry Cooper after the game. He was shell-shocked and to a certain degree so were we.

We fell 4-1 down then threw caution to the wind and achieved almost the impossible. To be fair you have to praise the character of the lads and the marvellous ability that enabled this comeback to be achieved.

In the last half-hour we played some tremendous football. Skilful, enterprising and adventurous. We actually carved them open and funny enough the better positions we got into and the easier chances we created we didn't take.

The goals seemed to come from nowhere. It was a credit to the club, a credit to the supporters, and mostly a credit to the players involved.

The support was fantastic. You went there expecting so much and at 4-1 you

must have been so disappointed. You could have turned against us very easily. But you didn't. You stayed with us; were still singing and encouraging. And at 4-2 cheering just as hard as ever.

It was great and even better that at the end of the day we could give you something to make it a nice journey home.

This win also gives us encouragement to keep going for one of the two automatic promotion slots, and if not that then a place in the play-offs.

I know many of you were a little disappointed with the performance against Luton Town last Saturday but we must keep things in perspective. That is the first time this season we have let ourselves down with our performance.

We have lost games before but have still performed. Now one bad show in 41 games with such a slim squad is not





so bad. Quite a credit in fact. We still won the match.

I think we overcame the Luton form with our showing at St Andrews' which emphasised our attacking potential.

It is another big game today with Leicester City in much the same situation as ourselves. They missed out in the play-off final last year and will want to go one stage further this time but we will be looking to half their progress this afternoon.

I'm sure Leicester will have got over their defeat at West Ham. This is another week. All we can do is pick up our points. We collected three on Monday and have won eight games out of eight at home. So we must make sure we win today to maintain that home sequence.

You know a victory achieved in the way it was at Birmingham can give you a bigger psychological boost than if we had gone there and won 2-0. To come back from the dead gives everyone a boost. The supporters; the players; the directors. Everyone.

We threw caution to the wind, played freely throwing players forward and the ball went in the back of the net ... On Monday someone up there was smiling on us. Other weeks we might not be so fortunate.

At this stage of the season it is all about getting results - not performances. It is like the National. We have to stay in there, although we have hit a few fences, and make sure we clear the last four hurdles.

One side not involved in either promotion relegation issues is Watford who have been locked in a mid-table position season. Manager Steve Perryman has had to settle for a season of consolidation due inconsistency at Vicarage Road. He said: "We have had a season that has been characterised by a good away record - but a home record which has not been up to scratch." Watford were held to a scoreless home draw to Southend United who seem to have been given a new lease of life under new manager Barry Fry.

Things are still very close at the bottom of the table. Bristol Rovers appear to already be down, however the nine clubs above them are only separated by five points.

Junior Bent took Bristol City nearer to survival with a priceless 81st minute winner over Wolverhampton Wanderers at Ashton Gate.

Ten man Sunderland were plunged deeper in trouble not only going down by the only goal at Grimsby but also having had striker Mick Harford sent off after 38 minutes for a late challenge on Rhys Wilmot. Despite the loss of Harford, Sunderland looked to be

heading for a draw before Grimsby forward Neil Woods struck the winner 11 minutes from time.

It appears that the First Division are again going to be involved in the Anglo Italian Cup next season. The competition which has had a mixed reception will have the final in 1994 played in Italy which could well see live television coverage and hopefully a sponsorship deal which will help with the costs of travelling for those involved.

The average attendance this season in the First Division is slightly down, 10,322 compared to last season's 10,502 and reflects a drop in all divisions with the exception of Division Two where the average of 6125 represents a rise of 13%.

The average gate in the Premier League is 20,876.

As h e season draws to excitina climax the fight for the two automatic promotion places appears to between the sides currently occupying the top three spots. However, as we proved on Easter Monday at St Andrews anything can happen!

Newcastle United came out of the Easter games without a point having gone down 1-0 against Wolverhampton Wanderers at Molineux then to see their game against Oxford United at St James' Park called off because of a waterlogged pitch.

Portsmouth gained maximum points with a 2-1 victory at doomed Bristol Rovers and a 3-0 home victory over Derby County on Easter Monday which saw Guy Whittingham register his 45th goal of the season in only 86 seconds.

West Ham United beat today's visitors Leicester City 3-0 in the televised game at Upton Park with on loan striker David Speedie scoring a brace.

Tranmere Rovers moved into the play-off positions after the holiday period having drawn with Millwall at The Den and beaten Barnsley 2-1 at Prenton Park. Scorer of Tranmere's second goal was Kenny

Cill. Cill.

Just like last year, Leicester City's late run for promotion has been perfectly timed. They made the play-off final last May, only to be thwarted by a suspect dive from David Speedie which presented Blackburn Rovers with the penalty that earned them a place in the Premier League.

Ironically, it was that man Speedie - this time on loan to West Ham United - who last week dented their promotion ambitions again.

The Filberts had waltzed into Upton Park full of confidence following a sequence of eight wins and one draw, which added up to their best League run for ten years. Then enter Mr Speedie to destroy them with two goals - his first for the Hammers - in a 3-0 victory for the Fast Foders

This is Leicester's worst defeat since they were trounced 7-1 by Sheffield Wednesday in a Coca-Cola Cup tie last October. It did little to enhance their confidence as they entered the final and most critical phase of the season.

Even so just two defeats in 12 games is a creditable enough record and despite the disappointment of Sunday's trip to Upton Park Brian Little's side are nicely placed to make the top six.

The matter is very much in their own hands with a midweek date against Millwall preceding this afternoon's visit here; and a date with Newcastle United at St James' Park to round off their League programme.

Never out of the top nine in Division One this season Mr Little has made changes as the campaign developed.

The most significant have come in attack where David Lowe and teenager Julian Joachim are keeping out the likes of Davidson, Ormondroyd and Gee.

All three are former Derby County stars and featured in the Leicester starting line on the opening day of the season. Bob Davidson is an experienced performer with 163 League goals to his name - six of them notched for Leicester in 25 appearances this season. Huddersfield, Halifax, Leeds United and Sheffield United are the other clubs he has served

Phil Gee made the short journey from the Baseball Ground in March 1992, as part of the deal that took Paul Kitson the other way. He had clocked up 150 games for the Rams and made his Leicester debut in a 2-2 draw with Portsmouth just after signing. He managed two goals in 14 appearances and has contributed 4 goals in 17 First Division games this season.

lan Ormondroyd was also part of that same exchange deal which made him City's record signing. But the towering striker, who has also played for Aston Villa, has struggled to fit in and has scored just twice in 26 League games this season.

Indeed, Brian Little, in an attempt to use a tall target man, experimented with Steve Walsh and the move proved a winner. It only came about after the big stopper had been out of the side through injury. The manager was so pleased with the centreback partnership of Hill and Smith that he pushed Walsh up front in their home game with Swindon to try and unsettle our back line.


It worked, Leicester winning 4-2 with the likes of Joachim and Lowe revelling in the wake of Walsh's physical presence.

The big man has shown great awareness in this role and has produced some important goals - his winner, in the last minute against Oxford United last week, being his 12th strike of the season.

At the back City are pretty settled with Gary Coatsworth on the right and Gary Mills on the left. Mills prefers to operate on the right and will probably revert to that position when former Leeds United leftback Mike Whitlow, who was on the subs bench last Sunday, is fully fit after injury.

Whitlow, who cost £250,000 just over a year ago, has looked impressive both defensively and by his support play on the flanks.

The midfield general is 28-year-old Steve Thompson whose perceptive passing has ripped the heart out of many a defence. Add to that the penatrive running of David Oldfield and



the telling crossing of Lee Philpott and you have the ingredients of City's SUCCESS

Against Oxford United goalkeeper Carl Muggleton suffered a groin injury and eventually had to go off. His place between the sticks was taken by Richard Smith who kept a clean sheet though he confesses he won't be quick to volunteer again.

Muggleton was unable to play at West Ham, his place going to Kevin Poole who made several telling saves. Poole is the third custodian to represent the club this season, local lad Russell Hoult getting a run of 11 games in the first half of the season.

Gary Coatsworth - Fullback. Signed from Darlington in October 1991 for just £15,000 he showed plenty of promise in his first three League appearances for the club in November and December 1991. A serious injury then intervened and he did not win his shirt back until this February since when he has been a regular choice at No. 2. Born: Sunderland 7-10-68.

Simon Grayson - Defence/Midfield. Snapped up from Leeds United for a bargain £50,000 in March 1992 he was an influential figure in City's late play-off drive last year. A versatile performer who can operate at fullback or in midfield he has been on the fringe of things this season with 21 First Division appearances. Born: Ripon 16-12-69.

Colin Hill - Central Defender. Dependable anchor man at the back Colin served his apprenticeship at Highbury, making the first of his 46 League appearances for the Gunners at Norwich (20-4-83). In season 1982-83 he played in 37 of Arsenal's League fixtures, scoring one goal - his only one ever in the League. Joined Brighton on loan in 1985-86 but did not play and in the summer of '86 signed for Portuguese club Maritime. A year later he moved to Colchester United and in 1989 transferred to Sheffield United. Arrived at Filbert Street on loan in March 1992 and was signed in the summer. Capped 6 times by Northern Ireland. Born: Uxbridge 12-11-63.

Tony James - Central Defender. Classy performer who had made his position his own until breaking his leg in October 1991. Was back in time to feature in City's play-off escapade. Has made only two starts this season and against Oxford his 9th sub appearance. Started his career with Lincoln City who

collected £150,000 from Leicester for his registration in August 1989. Born: Sheffield 27-6-67.

Julian Joachim Forward. The most exciting young talent in the English game today he eclipsed the performances of higher profile names, such as Nick Barmby, in the recent World Youth Championship finals in Australia - helping England finish third. A YTS graduate he was still only 18 when he made his League debut, as a sub, against Bamsley on October 3rd, 1992. Netted 4 goals in his first 6 games and had 10 goals to his name as he went into the Easter programme. Well balanced with tight control and the confidence to run at defenders his electric pace and explosive shooting power makes him very special. Has great awareness for one so young and is always willing to keep it simple.

LEICESTER CITY

David Lowe - Striker. Had spells with Everton and Liverpool before signing apprentice forms with Wigan Athletic. Made the League side in October 1982, at Reading, and was a regular for five years. Scored 16 goals in the Third Division campaign of '86-87 which prompted Ipswich Town to invest £80,000 in his future. Was top shot - 18 goals - in his first season at Portman Road. Won two England Under-21 caps while there to add to the youth honours he received with Wigan. Made a scoring debut for the Filberts at Watford last September. Out today through suspension. Born: Liverpool 30-8-65.

Gary Mills - Defence/Midfield. Acclaimed as Leicester's Player of the Year for the second time last season Gary first came to notice as a teenager with Nottingham Forest. Won a European Cup Winners' medal with them making the first of his 58 League appearances v Arsenal, in September 1978. Spent two summers with Seattle in the NASL, either side of a season with Derby County, before returning to Forest in 1983. Added another 79 games to his tally before moving across the Trent to join County in 1987. Born: Northampton 11-11-61.

Carl Muggleton - Goalkeeper. City's star man in last year's play-off final when he saved a Blackburn penalty at Wembley. Played in the first seven games of this season but then lost his place and did not return until February. Has played on loan for Chesterfield, Blackpool, Hartlepool and Stockport and spent a month with Liverpool as cover. Gained an England Under-21 cap in 1990. Born: Leicester 13-9-68.

David Oldfield - Midfield.

Another England Under-21 International David was successfully converted from attack to midfield last season. Has been at Filbert Street since January 1990 when he was swopped for Wayne Clarke after making 25 League appearances for Manchester City. Started his career with Luton as an apprentice making his League bow at Newcastle 2-4-88. Bom: Australia 30-5-68.

Kevin Poole - Goalkeeper. Apprentice at Aston Villa he made 28 League appearances for them after being blooded while on loan with Northampton. Was in the shadow of Spink at Villa Park and moved to Middlesbrough where he found himself second choice to Steven Pears. Played on loan for Hartlepool before arriving at Filbert Street for £40,000 in July 1991. Born: Bromsgrove 21-7-63.

Lee Philpott - Forward.

Left sided winger recruited from Cambridge United last November at a cost of £300,000. Came into senior football with Peterborough United but had played only four games when Cambridge snapped him up. Played in

two promotion winning teams at the Abbey Stadium. Born: Barnet 21-2-70.

Richard Smith - Defender. Very much the local hero who made good. Richard has developed into a first-class defender. Made his League debut for Cambridge United while on loan in 1989-90. Made his 63rd League appearance for City at West Ham last week. Reads the game well, is a solid tackler and distributes the ball accurately. Not noted for his scoring talent - he has only netted twice - but his winner in last year's FA Cup third round made history. It earned City their first FA Cup win for 7 years! Born: Leicester 3-10-70.

Steve Thompson - Midfield. The anchor man in midfield most City attacks are instigated through him Bolton Wanderers was his first club - he played the first of his 335 League games for them at Derby in November 1982. Saw a move to Luton as a great chance to play top-class football but had hardly unpacked before he was told he was not wanted. Brian Little quickly stepped in to sign him in October 1991. Bom: Oldham 2-11-64.

Steve Walsh - Central Defender. Tough no-nonsense central defender who has been switched very successfully to a striking role this season. The longest serving player on the books. Steve arrived from Wigan Athletic for £100,000 in 1986. The Foxes skipper, he scored 9 goals from centreback last season. Grabbed his 12th this season against Oxford. Set to make his 234th League appearance for City today. Born: Fulwood 3-11-64.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



BRIAN LITTLE'S Barclays Manager of the Month Award for March confirms his growing reputation as one of the best young managers in the business.

As a player Brian was recognised as one of the most gifted entertainers of his generation. A firm favourite at Villa Park he netted 60 goals in 247 League appearances for Aston Villa before injury forced his retirement in 1982. His last game was at Old Trafford on the 23rd April 1980.

Capped once by England, he came on as a substitute against Wales in 1975. Brian collected League Cup Winner's medals with Villa in 1975 and 1976 against Norwich City and Everton when he scored twice in a 3-2 victory in a second replay at Old Trafford.

It was Darlington who gave him the opportunity to try his hand at management and they didn't regret the gamble. In two years Brian guided The Quakers from the GM Vauxhall Conference to the Third Division of the Football

It was this phenominal success on limited resources that tempted Leicester City to persuade him to join them as David Pleat's successor.

After signing a three year contract. Brian made a spectacular entrance in May 1991 when he arrived at Filbert Street in a helicopter. City have been flying high ever since - just missing out on promotion to the Premier League when beaten by a disputed penalty in the play-off final last year.

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

In the mid-60's two strikers with Leicester connections were signed by the Town, one in 1964 and one in 1965. The first was Frank Large, who spent just six months at the County Ground and little longer at Filbert Street and the second Ken Keyworth, who ended his career at Swindon after a six-year spell with today's visitors.

Large was a soccer nomad, making ten moves during a League career spanning some sixteen years. His goalscoring started back in his native Yorkshire where he worked for British Railways at their Holbeck locomotive depot in Leeds. From there he switched to Halifax, where he was spotted by the local League side and signed on at The Shay as an amateur. He made his League debut at Wrexham 34 years ago this month and was the club's top goalscorer for the next three seasons, before moving to London to join Queens Park Rangers in 1962.

Nine months later, Frank was on his way to Northampton, but he moved to the other County Ground after a further year, making his Swindon debut against Plymouth Argyle on March 7 1964. He scored both goals in a 2-1 win, but added only two more in nine more games that season and none in a seven match run at the

start of 1964/65. He was dropped following a 4-0 defeat at Swansea Town and was soon on his way again, this time to Carlisle United. Further moves took him to Oldham and back to Northampton, before he signed for Leicester on November 10 1967.

Frank scored eight goals in 26 games at Filbert Street before packing his bags once again in the following summer, when he returned to London to sign for Fulham. He joined Northampton for a third time in August 1969 and stayed there for three years before his final League stop at Chesterfield. After over 560 League appearances, he then signed for Kettering Town, in 1974.

Ken Keyworth made two FA Cup Final appearances while at Leicester, in 1961 and 1963. He had signed for City in May 1958 from Rotherham United, where one of his former playing colleagues was one Danny Williams. At Millmoor, they both played as winghalves, but Keyworth later moved forwards and was leading goalscorer Filbert Street in three successive seasons, 1961/62, 1962/63 and 1963/64. He joined Coventry City in December 1964, but injury him to just restricted seven League appearances whilst there.

He was one of Danny Williams' first signings for Swindon, in August 1965, but probably not his best! Danny needed a goalkeeper, a centre-half and a centre-forward to build a side capable of challenging for a quick return to the Second Division. His choice of 'number one' proved a master stroke, when he bought fellow Yorkshireman Peter Downsborough from Halifax. For the centre of defence they chose Mel Nurse, who replaced fellow Welshman Tommy Hallett after just three games. Nurse was an inspirational captain for three seasons before going home to Wales in 1968. But Keyworth failed to fully recover from injury and after six League appearances stood down in favour of first Keith East - who went on to net 24 League and Cup goals that season - and then another newcomer, Jimmy Lawton. Swindon could only finish seventh at the end of 1965/66 and Keyworth's contract was cancelled.



Craig Maskell supped a well earned pint in the crowded players lounge at St Andrews, after playing a leading role in Town's dramatic 6-4 victory over Birmingham City.

The slightly-built hit-man carried on where he had left off with two well taken goals that took his tally this season to 21.

An amazing comeback in an amazing match for the player who celebrated his 25th birthday with a return to the first team a couple of days earlier after more than two months out nursing a deep seated groin strain

Still trying to catch his breath Craig claimed: "I was hoping to get a couple of goals against Luton on Saturday. I had to wait a couple of days but it was worth it.

"I've got to admit I found it a bit quick on Saturday after so long out. I was a little bit nervous, a little apprehensive, but having got that game out of the way I felt much sharper at Birmingham.

"My first touch was good early on which helped me to settle and the lads in midfield helped us out well. It was a good performance in the end."

It certainly proved an exhilarating experience for a player who had spent the previous 14 games looking on as a spectator. Craig admits he became very frustrated at times for he had never before been sidelined for more than ten days.

He says: "It is not the sort of experience you want. I found it quite difficult to carry on being away from the lads. They went to Spain without me as well which was hard to put up with. But it is a professional thing and

my main priority was to get fit as quickly as possible.

"Basically I hadn't played enough games in the reserves and had to get a couple more matches under my belt. As did Micky Hazard, John Moncur and Kevin Horlock.

"My problem was that I came back for the Cambridge game too soon. The hamstring was really no better so I just had to take more time off which turned out to be a couple of months in the long run.

"I have had the problem for a long time this season and it has hampered me in the past. But it feels a lot better now after a lot of treatment. Also I have taken to wearing the cycling shorts and they are great. They keep the muscles warm and supple.

"Quite a few players wear them. Lingy and John Moncur for instance and I must say they have helped quite a lof so I will continue to wear them."

Before the enforced break Craig was topping the First Division score chart with 19 goals. After such a long lay-off he must have been worried that the 'golden' touch might have deserted him.

"Definitely," he responds. "I hadn't scored for about seven games so although it was all a bit disjointed played five then dropped out and back in again for another one - and was not a continuous run, I still began to worry about it as you do.

"That is why it was so nice to come back and be involved in a game where you win like that. It showed the character of the team.

"I always felt we had a chance but obviously we struggled a bit when Shaun Taylor went off for treatment and they scored twice against ten men."

It seemed Town were set to make it 2-2 two minutes into the second-half when Craig rounded his marker and shaped to shoot for goal. The shot, alas, was little more than a pass and from the clearance Birmingham broke to make it 3-1!


A psychological knockback if ever there was one yet Craig brushed it aside and got on with his job. He explains: "Micky played it through but unfortunately it was spinning a bit wide for me. I thought about hitting it first time with my left foot but the angle wasn't good. I did the right thing checking back, made myself a yard, but didn't strike it cleanly with the right-foot.

"I was disappointed because they went straight up and scored at the other end but it turned out well at the end of the day."

Two goals, one a looping header, Craig does not get many of those.

"You are right, I don't. I just went up for it. There was a defender behind me who shouted for it and I just managed to get a clean header. I tried to knock the ball anywhere near the goal really for someone to head in or just be on target. Luckily for me the 'keeper came forward anticipating it to be headed down probably and the ball looped over him.

"That one got us back into the game and the run began. To have snatched a draw after being so far behind would have been a marvellous result. But you know when it got to four-all everyone wanted to go forward and go on and win the game. We felt we could do it. But by two goals? That takes some beating.





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

It was December 1913 when we beat them 4-1 in a Southern League fixture and our two meetings at the County Ground in the Football League have





I didn't know whether to have a drink afterwards because I might have woken up and found it was a dream!


The promotion race is getting interesting. I always thought we had to catch West Ham but it's Portsmouth who are racing away...Today's game with Leicester is another six pointer.

The promotion race attracts superlatives and deservedly so. For all involved there is that electric charge in the air as you step from one game

to the next.

It is high tension stuff and sensational to experience for players, management and fans alike. Only partly muffled by the excruciating pain of failure when a point, or even three, escapes your grasp.

This is the final run in of a long hard marathon that started out last August. We have all suffered the full range of emotions. Elation, after Town had given Cambridge United a soccer lesson that was to bring profound changes to their club.

Joy, as Notts County were thumped 5-1. Excitement as Town fought back from behind to overcome Newcastle United in an absolute thriller. Despair as Leicester City hit four past Nicky Hammond at Filbert Street last December.

Take of all of this. Pack it into ninety minutes and you have last Monday's epic at St Andrews.

What a game. Hardly the stuff for the feint of heart or for pressurised journalists forced to do re-write after re-write. At the interval I told my colleagues I still fancied Town to win despite being 2-1 down ... I confess however that by the 50th minute with Birmingham City leading 4-1 I had denounced Hoddle's heroes.

"Judas", I hear you cry; and well you might. Though none of us heard the cock crow thrice.

Still after the game Glenn gave the shell-shocked lads of the media their lead for Tuesday's papers. "It is Easter Monday," he enquired.

"Yes?, " came the reply in unison.

"Well we've come back from the dead."

Nobody could ever recall having played in such a game before it seemed beyond belief. Even Terry Cooper, the former England and Leeds United fullback, who now manages the Blues didn't seem as upset as one would have expected after seeing his lads lose a 4-1 lead.

Terry quipped: "It was a good game wasn't it. At the end of the day I wouldn't have minded paying ten-quid myself to see it."

The Birmingham boss claimed the game turned when Glenn pushed out from the back to play an attacking midfield role. He said: "Glenn, MacLaren and Hazard started to control midfield. They are all good players and we couldn't match them."

The six goals was an added bonus as this season in the Football League goal difference has been replaced by a new Regulation designed to encourage more attacking football.

Positions in the Barclays League are now decided on goals scored when teams are level on points. In the event that two teams are level on points and have scored the same number of goals then goals against will be taken into account with the side that has conceded the fewest given the higher position.

This innovation is unique to the Barclays League in the United Kingdom.

Monday's brilliant recovery had the pundits thumbing through the record books. Was our 6-4 win the greatest comeback in League football? I asked Jack Rollin for the facts.


The answer is not quite, though it ranks with the best. The most sensational comeback of all was at The Valley where Charlton Athletic, reduced to 10 men after 15 minutes through injury, there were no subs in those days - trailed Huddersfield Town 5-1 with 28 minutes to go, on December 21st 1957... The Valiants stormed back to win 7-6, Johnny Summers scoring five of them!

Incidently, Huddersfield are the only side ever to score six times in a Football League game and lose.

Back in December 1904 Sheffield Wednesday were 5-0 down, at home to Everton and bounced back to draw 5-5.

Then on the 4th December 1909 Newcastle United forged a 5-2 half-time lead over Liverpool at Anfield. The Reds stormed back with four second half goals to win 6-5!

The most recent example features Newcastle United again. On September 22nd 1984, they led QPR 4-0 at Loftus Road after 45 minutes. The game finished 5-5.

The relationships between Schools Football Authorities and Football League Clubs have always been strained. Many in the game have considered the emphasis at schoolboy level has been placed more on winning than on the development of the individual. The English Schools FA Administrators on the other hand have remained fearful that the professional game would take over if given too much leeway and consequently destroy the traditional Corinthian spirit.

There are merits in both arguments yet the them and us situation which continues to prevail, does little to enhance the development of tomorrows stars.

At Swindon we are fortunate to be able to call upon the services of one of the more progressive and indeed influential members of the Schools Football Association, in Adrian Riddiford, who is our Youth Development Officer.

Adrian spent 19-years on the Council of the English Schools FA of which he was Chairman and was a prominent member of the International selection committee.

He had to stand down of course when he retired from teaching after 33 years. Adrian was head of the Upper School in Stroud specialising in geography and personal and social education.

Having been associated with the Schools FA for so long it is not surprising that Adrian supports the current set-up. He says: "In my capacity as Chairman I travelled a lot and you know our system is the envy of our neighbours on the Continent.

"In this country our schools are involved in organising physical activities within the school curriculum.

On the Continent they do not have this.

"The Germans in particular would love to operate a similar system. With no organised school activities in this direction it means the football clubs themselves have to cater for youngsters and introduce the game to them."

To my mind this is not a bad thing. For youngsters in Europe are schooled in technique and skills - participating mainly in small sided games as opposed to eleven-a-side as is the case here from the age of nine. But this is another story.

Adrian has been influential in trying to establish a better grounding for our young players. He served all schools as their representative on the Football Association Council and was very much involved in the FA's Blueprint for Soccer which introduced the successful Soccer Schools of Excellence.

He says: "Though I had to relinquish my position when I retired from teaching I have been very lucky. The Football League asked me to act as one of their representatives on the Committee which in turn asked me to continue as Chairman."

Nine years now he has been chairing this committee and says: "It gets me around the country and is helpful to the Club as well. Because of my position I know so many people and when they give me a tipoff about any outstanding schoolboys I am able to follow it up.

"The restrictions imposed on League clubs with regard to what they can do with schoolboy players has changed over the years and will continue to change. There will be more flexible use of a boys time.

"We have to remember that in the case of the older schoolboys their first priority must be their academic

work. Boys preparing for examinations have a great deal of work to do at home and the Schools FA has always tried to protect them so that they are not exploited.

"People don't consider the cost involved if clubs could call upon them more often. We would have to find more facilities to cater for them and employ more staff. We play on a Sunday at the moment. That is sufficient time."

Adrian started full-time with us in August 1991 and is justly proud of the progress already made. He points out: "We have just set up a scheme which will assure any parent that we are doing the best for their son. They can be satisfied that their children will be looked after both on and off the field.

"We make no promises to young players. I tell them they are only here until such time as another boy comes along who is better. They all understand.


"We handle about 60 boys a season on a regular basis ranging from eight-year-olds to 16. The youngsters up to 14 attend our Centre of Excellence. The older boys play in our Youth teams attending one night a week for training."

Though he holds an FA Preliminary Coaching badge Adrian does not get involved in coaching. He is more the organiser setting up schemes and ideas. He says: "I see my role as going out looking for players. John Trollope covers all the on-field work and the games.

"It is very much a team effort. It is one thing trying to find new talent. Another to look after them.

"Glenn does fifty per cent of my job in terms of media exposure. I get six to 10 letters a day from would be trialists. But the standard at this level is very high. You have to be exceptional to make the grade."

Among the exceptional that have passed through Adrian's hands are Paul Rideout, Kevin Mabbutt and David Kerslake, who was in his last selection for the England Schoolboy side in 1981.

Now playing really well we went further ahead when Rob French gained possession on the half way line to release Mark O'Driscoll with a good through ball who beat the advancing keeper for our second.


This' was an improved performance when we were in possession. We linked up with each other much better and could have won more convincingly with better finishing.
