WELCOME

For the first of our Football League Play-Off semi-finals we are pleased to welcome the players, officials and supporters of *Tranmere Rovers Football Club* to the County Ground. Again we also welcome the cameras of Central Television who are here broadcasting the game live.

SECOND LEG

The second leg of this play-off semi-final will be played at Prenton Park this coming Wednesday evening kicking off at 7.30pm. The game is all ticket. While we have no more seats available we still have terrace tickets on sale at the Advance Ticket Office priced £6 each.

In the second leg if the aggregate scores are level after ninety minutes extra time of fifteen minutes each way will be played. If the scores are still level the away goals rule will be applied followed if necessary by penalty kicks in accordance with the Laws of the Game, (ie 5

kicks per side taken alternately followed by sudden death).

DISCIPLINARY

In the play-offs the disciplinary rules are changed slightly from normal League games. If a player is sent off for two bookable offences he is suspended from the next play-off game.

If he is sent off for foul or abusive language he misses the next two play-off games and if sent off for violent conduct or serious foul misses three he games. Any suspensions or part thereof which remain outstanding at the end of the competition must be served at the commencement of next season.

RETAIN STUBS

Swindon Town supporters are remained to save their ticket stubs from this afternoon's game to go along with others issued this season for use should the club reach the play-off final.





A big welcome to Tranmere Rovers and their supporters. Our involvement this afternoon in the play-offs for a place in the Premier League is ample proof of how well the two teams have done this season.

Tranmere Rovers are very much like ourselves. We are not big clubs with ample financial resources but we are both very ambitious. Both sets of players have done marvellously well in getting this far.

As the League season draws to a close you look for as many advantages as you can to help you achieve your target. One can argue that it is an advantage to play the second-leg at home and in someways this is true. But there are positive aspects also in playing the first game at home. If we can hit form and secure a really convincing win today it could set us up nicely for the return leg.

You can say that our season hinges on the next couple of games. To some extent this is true. We have had a fantastic season and have



achieved a lot in some respects. We have certainly entertained a lot of people. Yet you could argue that if we don't make Wembley and don't win the final we will have little to show for our efforts.

We haven't been given £12 million of course and like Tranmere have had to forge our path without being able to strengthen our squad for the final push.

But we are in the last four so to speak, battling for that remaining ticket to the Premier League. Some argue that it is not right when the club finishing lower in the final League table can win promotion over those above them. To them I say that's how it was before a ball was kicked at the beginning of the season. It is a fact of life. We all knew the rules before we entered the competition.

Luck will come into it no doubt and we have to hope that it favours us in as much as we manage to find our true form. If you give off your best that's all that can be expected from you.

As these are my last notes of the season let me finish by thanking all our supporters for their involvement this season. You have been just great. Have a good summer.

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

close look at the state of play as
we move into the Football
League Play-Offs.

In Division 1 as expected Kevin Keegan took Newcastle United into the Premier League as champions ending their fixtures with a 7-1 thrashing of Leicester City at St James' Park. Keegan roared "You can tell the world of Roy of the Rover is still alive. You would have thought this would have been too far fetched to believe this has happened."

Watched by millions on television Newcastle were 6-0 up at the break. Andy Cole and David Kelly both smashed hat-tricks. Leicester City have to pick themselves up for today's play-off semi-final against Portsmouth at Nottingham Forest's ground.

Pompey themselves thought that they had gained the second automatic promotion place having heard that Cambridge United had equalised against West Ham United at Upton Park...what they did not know was that the goal was disallowed! An angry Warren Neill said "They say the play-offs keep the season alive. We were in the top three with huge gates. Our season was alive. It's all about money. We have played 55 games-how much money do they want?"

Even before West Ham United play a game in the Premier League they know that their bubbles could burst if Billy Bonds is unable to perform a miracle. Bonds has been told that he must sell to buy and that their wage bill of £2.6m a year

has to slashed. The Upton Park boss needs £5m to spend on four top players to prevent the Hammers going straight down as they did last year. He says "The Premier League is divided into three mini leagues. The three or four who can win it, a middle group and the rest. Our main aim must be to finish at the top of the bottom section. If there is no money to spend on new players, we must rely on what we have." Confirmation came from West Ham managing director Peter Storrie who replied "We must off load first. we have 36 professionals and this must be cut to around 28."

While West Ham were leaving the First Division in one direction, opponents Cambridge United left in the other falling through the trap-door into Division 2. United have not made too many friends in the game following routines set up by former manager John Beck. after their 2-0 victory over Cambridge, Hammers manager Billy Bonds said "I wasn't happy with some of the things that went on our there. I am glad we beat them."


Along with Bristol Rovers, Cambridge United were joined in the drop by Brentford last weekend who went down 4-1 against Bristol City at Ashton Gate with Leroy Rosenior scoring a hat-trick. Brentford goal-machine Gary Blissett looks set to follow former striking partner Dean Holdsworth to Wimbledon, His 28 goals will tempt Dons boss Joe Kinnear to bid £1/2m when Blissett becomes a free agent in the summer. However the 28 year old may prefer a move back to his native Manchester with City boss Peter Reid showing interest.

Birmingham City's Paul Moulden says that his 55th minute strike which saved the St Andrews side from the drop was the most important goal he has ever scored. However Moulden said that Charlton's Steve Gatting told him that he was five yards offside. "The ref gave it and that's what counts" he said.

Barry Fry put the brakes on Southend's slide just in time finishing the season off with a 2-1 win at Roots Hall over Luton Town. Under Fry United managed five wins in their last nine games to ensure first division safety.

Coming into Division 1 from the FA Premier League are Nottingham Forest who will start the season with a new manager following the retirement of Brian Clough, Middlesbrough who enjoyed just one season in the top flight and Crystal Palace who must feel shell shocked having seen the late surge from Joe Royle's Oldham Athletic culminating in a 4-3 Boundary Park win over Southampton on the last day of the season.

Up from Division 2 come Stoke City and Bolton Wanderers who gained automatic promotion with Port Vale, West Bromwich Albion, Swansea City and Stockport County all involved in the play-offs.

This is **Tranmere Rovers**' third visit to the County Ground this season and by far the most important.

After leading us 2-1 in the first game the plug was pulled when we suffered a floodlight failure. Then in the re-arranged game in February they were beaten by two David Mitchell goals.

A 3-0 home defeat was then inflicted by Newcastle United and though Rovers recovered with successive away wins at Bristol City and Brentford the continued absence of ace striker John Aldridge was reflected in a period of inconsistency.

The Irish striker's absence was also reflected in the goals for column. In the four games before his operation Rovers grabbed 11 goals - 4 of them from Aldridge. In their next seven games they netted but three times.

Such was their form that they looked like slipping out of the play-offs never mind contention for a straight promotion. Then a 2-1 win at Southend United stopped the slide and sparked an impressive run-in which has seen the Prenton Park team undefeated in their last 10 games.

The return of Aldridge was the icing on the cake and the


former Liverpool star boosted his impressive tally this season to 31 goals when he scored twice - once from the penalty spot - in a 2-1 win over Watford.

Like ourselves, John King is limited in the players he has available and there have been few changes to the line-up which includes the silky grace of Pat Nevin. The Scottish International has added more than just a touch of inspiration contributing 13 goals.

It is worth noting that their best result since mid-January, when they beat Oxford 4-0, is the 3-1 victory over us last month ... **Kenny Irons** was the hero that evening with a hat-trick.

Tranmere completed their League programme last week draw with 1-1 at a Peterborough United their line-up being: Coyne D, Higgins, Brannan, Irons. Proctor, Vickers. Martindale. Aldridge. Malkin, Nevin. Nolan. Subs: Mungall, Coyne T.


Rovers were somewhat unfortunate in this game when rookie goalkeeper, Danny Coyne, who is still 19 and a Welsh Under-21 International. was sent-off for carrying the ball outside his Peterborough scored from the resultant free-kick in the 41st minute, with defender Dave Higgins taking over in goal. Three minutes later Chris Malkin equalised.



So to the play-offs and another chance for Tranmere to add to their fantastic recent history. Roy of the Rovers has nothing on a Tranmere side that shot from Division Four to Division Two in three years and since 1988 has played at Wembley more times than any other club thanks to a Leyland DAF Cup Final, the play-offs and the Centenary celebrations.

John Aldridge Striker. A prolific scorer throughout a career that has spanned South Liverpool, Newport County, Oxford United - they reaped in £750,000 from Liverpool for his transfer in 1987 - and Real Sociedad. Won Championship honours while at Anfield where he scored 50 goals League appearances before his £1.1 million exodus to Spain. In June 1991 Rovers paid £250,000 to Real, with whom he had been top scorer in of his two seasons. Topped Rovers' hit list last season also with 40 League and Cup goals to equalise the Club's individual scoring record. now scored in excess 230 goals in the Football League. Born: Liverpool 18.9.58.

Ged Brannan - Defender. Versatile performer who can fill a number of defensive and midfield roles. Now in his third season as a professional he had graduated through the youth ranks at Prenton Park. Was a member of the England Under-19 squad in 1990 - 1991. Born: Liverpool 15.1.72.

Tommy Coyne - Striker.

Became Rovers' most expensive player when signed from Celtic for £350,000 in March 1993. A Republic of Ireland International he commenced his career with Clydebank and then graduated to Dundee United and Dundee before a £500,000 transfer to Celtic in 1989. Born: Glasgow

Dave Higgins - Central Defender. Originally spotted playing for a team called Eagle, in the Liverpool Sunday League, Dave joined Rovers but failed to make the grade and spent five years in non-League soccer with South Liverpool, Ellesmere Port and Caernarvon. Returned to Prenton Park in 1987 and made his League debut at Darlington (30.10.87). Born: Liverpool 19.8.61.

Kenny Irons - Midfield. A graduate of the club's youth scheme, he is an exciting sight when in full flow with the ball at his feet. Loves to run at defenders and is equally effective in a deep scheming role or on the flank. Broke into the first team in the season of 1990-1991 and scored 7 goals in 43 League appearances last season. Born: Liverpool 4.11.70.

TRANMERE ROVERS

Neil McNab Midfield. Well known to the Swindon management - Neil was six years with Spurs after joining them in 1974 from Morton. Won FA Youth Cup and Scottish Under-21 honours while at White Hart Lane; making 72 League appearances before a £250,000 move to Bolton. Brighton signed him for £225,000 in 1980 and he had loan spells with Leeds and Portsmouth before joining Manchester City. Cost Rovers £125,000 in January 1990 and had a spell on loan with Huddersfield Town last season.

Chris Malkin - Forward A former banker. Chris inscribed his name into the record books when his goal in the 1991 Play Off final at Wembley won Rovers a place in the Second Division. A natural athlete - he clocks 12 seconds for 100 metres - he ioined Rovers from local side Stork in 1988. Made his League debut v Exeter in August 1987. Born: Bebington 4.6.67.

Dave Martindale - Midfield. Cost a mere £1,500 when signed from Caemarvon in 1987. Dave had been an apprentice at Anfield but drifted into non-League circles with Southport and Runcom before impressing John King while they were at Caemarvon. Made his League bow at Scunthorpe (15.8.87). Born: Liverpool 9.4.64.

Steve Mungall - Fullback. Tramere's longest serving player - he joined them from Motherwell in 1979 and has chalked up over 600 appearances. Came as a midfield player but has shown great versatility over the years. Made his senior debut v Aberdeen in April '77 and made 20 Premier League appearances for Motherwell. Born: Bellshill 22.5.58

Pat Nevin Forward. Cost £300,000 to prise from Everton in August 1992. Came into senior football with Clyde and cost Chelsea £95,000 in 1983. Became a firm favourite at Stamford Bridge where his delicate touch and creative genius was much appreciated. Five years and over 200 games later, Everton splashed out £925,000 for the classic winger but he never really settled in at Goodison Park. A current member of the Scotland squad - he played in the European Championship Finals in Sweden. Born: Glasgow 6.9.63.

Eric Nixon - Goalkeeper. Was the Club's record signing when he moved from Manchester City for £60,000 in July 1988. Has played in all four divisions of the Football League with Rovers and was captain when they played in the 1991 Play Offs. Represented the Football League v the Italians last season. Manchester City spotted him playing for Curzon Ashton and gave him his League chance in September 1985. Born: Manchester 4.10.62.

Nolan lan Fullback. Adventurous attacking defender signed from non-league Marine for around £12,000 in August 1991. A one time auto-electrician, he was on Preston's books as a YTS graduate. Sensationally picked up two Player of the Year Awards last season - his first in the senior side. Born: Liverpool 9.7.70.

Mark Proctor - Midfield. Experienced ball-winning midfielder currently on loan from Middlesbrough. former England Under-21 International who has served Nottingham Forest, Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday, Born; Middlesbrough

Steve Vickers - Central Defender. Signed in 1985 from Spennymore United, Steve made his League debut in April 1986 v Northampton Town, A Newcastle fan, he turned down the opportunity to sign for Middlesbrough as a youngster. Born: Bishop Auckland 13.10.67.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



John King, now in his second spell in charge of Rovers, has established himself as the most successful manager in the Club's history.

Born near Lords Cricket Ground in London, John moved to Liverpool at an early age and joined Everton from school. He was a ball-winning wing-half and served Everton for four years before signing for Bournemouth.

In 1960 John moved to Tranmere Rovers and was in their 1967 promotion side. He achieved another promotion with Port Vale before ending his playing days with Wigan Athletic who were then non-league.

Ron Yeats took him back to Prenton Park in 1973 as coach and two years later - when Yeats was axed - John took over the managerial seat. The following season Rovers bounced back to Division Three at the first attempt. But in 1983 they were relegated and John was sacked.

He coached Rochdale before managing Northwich Victoria who he led to to two FA Trophy finals at Wembley. Then he moved to Caernarvon where he revitalised the Club before Tranmere called on his services again in April 1987.

After a sticky start, when Rovers had to beat Exeter to stay in the League, it has been a story of success. John has led them to promotion from Division Four to the Second and to winning the Leyland DAF Cup in 1990 this one of five appearances at Wembley inside three years.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

When the Football League introduced end of season play-offs to decide promotion and relegation for 1986/87, it was not a new concept, but merely the resurrection of a system - known as 'test' matches - used back in the 1890's!

Today, we look back just back six years to May 1987, when Swindon Town became involved in those first modern-day test matches. A year earlier, the club had stormed through the Fourth Division sweeping aside and creating new records almost at will. Now, the Town were attempting a second successive promotion, but had missed the boat for an automatic slot, finishing third behind AFC Bournemouth and Middlesbrough. So they became embroiled in a playoff scrap with Wigan Athletic (4th place), Gillingham (5th) and Sunderland (20th in the Second Division). semi-finals paired the clubs in that order, with the higher placed having home advantage in the second leg, as is the case today.

A Thursday night trek to Wigan was first on the agenda, with unhappy memories of a recent trip to Springfield Park fresh in many minds. Swindon had suffered a 3-2 reverse there seven weeks earlier. having conceded two goals in the first seven minutes of the game. There was a distinct case of 'deja vu' on May 14, as Chris Thompson buried a 25-yarder after only three minutes and then David Lowe (now with play-off rivals Leicester City) inflicted more pain with a second strike after a quarter of an hour.

The Town were still two goals in arrears with twenty minutes remaining and a long dreary homeward journey looked in prospect for the travelling fans. But a 'Birmingham-style' come-back saw Swindon hit Wigan three time in a devastating sixteen-minute burst. Big Dave Bamber was first to pounce, with his 22nd goal of the season, before Jimmy Quinn grabbed an equaliser. The home crown were then silenced when Peter Coyne squeezed the winner over the line with just two minutes left.

The second leg three days later proved a stalemate, neither side managing a goal, but it meant of course that the Town had progressed to the play-off encounter with

Gillingham, the first being at one of Swindon's least loved venues down in Kent. Ironically, they had won on their previous visit to Priestfield, but it has been their first success there for 56 years!

This encounter ran true to form. The Town looked to have weathered the storm when, from an 82nd minute free-kick, David Smith rammed the ball home. Then, three days later at The County Ground, Wiltshire hearts sank again in the 17th minute when Karl Elsey hit an unstoppable 25-yard drive past Fraser Digby. But Swindon laid seige to the visitors goal, forcing sixteen corners. Covne reduced the deficit on the hour and second-half substitute Charlie Henry levelled matters with a goal ten minutes from time.

Fortunately for the Town, no 'away goals' rule was in force, so the clubs met once again on May 29, this time at Selhurst Park, to decide the final promotion slot. Steve White put Swindon in the driving seat with an opportunist effort in only the second minute of the game and added a second mid-way through the second-half to finally kill off Gillingham's threat.



Intrigue and farce

Colin Benson delves into the original play-offs and finds all is not what it seemed.

When the Football League introduced play-offs to determine promotion and relegation issues in 1988 it was not a new concept by any means. Such a scenario was introduced to League football back in the 1800's before automatic promotion and relegation was introduced between the first and second divisions.

Until 1893 the constitution of the First Division was determined by votes so far as the open, or elective, places were concerned. However, when the First Division was increased to 16 clubs, and a Second Division of 12 clubs was introduced, for the 1892-93 season, the League, in its wisdom, determined the bottom clubs of the higher division would not be relegated automatically. Instead they would be given the opportunity to maintain their position through a series of "test matches" with the top teams from Division Two. The winners of the series to feature in the First Division.

The original format was for the three lowest clubs in Division One to meet the three top sides from Division Two in a single show-down. Thus, the bottom side in Division One, Newton Heath, (later renamed Manchester United), were given home advantage against the top side from the second, Small Heath (now Birmingham City). The winner to participate in Division One the following season.

In a dramatic tussle the Second Division champions were beaten 5-2 in a replay, after a 1-1 draw in Manchester, and consequently were not promoted. While the two teams below them in the final league table Sheffield United and Darwen, went up by virtue of beating Accrington Stanley (1-0) and Notts County (3-2) respectively.

Both Notts County and Accrington were stunned by the outcome and when it came to the construction of the two divisions at the next AGM they "could not give a definite reply as to joining the Second Division."

The outcome was that though both clubs subsequently gave notice they wanted to continue Notts County alone succeeded. The Management Committee preferring Woolwich Arsenal and Liverpool to Accrington Stanley who did not regain League status until the formation of the Third Division many years later.

So it continued with Second Division champions denied their rightful rewards by the results of the egregious test matches. That was until what was fittingly labelled "the farce" verged perilously close to creating scandal and was ended.

The sudden death principle was abandoned as "unfair" in 1896. The structure of the test matches was revised to incorporate just the bottom two and top two clubs. The format settled on was for the participants to play two of the other three contestants twice. It was a specious arrangement again designed to favour the First Division pair as two of the number did not meet at all.

The flaws in the new system were brought to a head at the end of the 1897-98 season after what looked distinctly like a fix though the reference made at the time was "arrangement."

When the last two matches came to be played Stoke City and Burnley realised that if each gained a point, from their meeting at Stoke, both would be safe. The one to keep its place, the other to gain promotion.

Providentially, it would seem, the game resulted in a goalless draw, but the innuendoes were rife and the League, prompted by bad publicity and feeling, decided it was time to put a stop to a system which often brought about a perversion of the game's values over a season's play.

History however reveals another version of that infamous match at Stoke which gives, at least, an air of plausibility to the eventual outcome of a goalless draw.

It seems the ground was in a shocking state and the referee is reported to have revealed that had it not been the last day of the season he would not have allowed the game to be played.

It appears to have developed into an afternoon of high farce with evidently no less than five balls being brought into service as spectators refused to return them when kicked into the crowd. The proceedings, it is recorded, end on a note of "high comedy."

The whole occasion seems to have been far removed from the seriousness the situation warranted and whatever may be the true inwardness of the event it was obviously impossible for the League to continue the pattern.

Incidentally the two clubs who were held to have suffered by what had transpired in the Potteries were Blackburn Rovers and Newcastle United. The way out that was found at the time was to extend the Second Division to 18 clubs with places in the First Division for all four test-match contenders.

Of course this was not accomplished without considerable opposition. The clubs, as a body, were not minded to agree to the election of Rovers and Newcastle, which was the original proposition, without a chance being given to the other contenders.

As always in these matters there was strongly divided opinions regarding the exact constitution of the two divisions. Woolwich Arsenal wanted a 16 club First Division with 32 clubs in Division Two. Aston Villa offered the variation of 18 and 24; while Burnley proposed the simple increase of two clubs in each division. This was regarded as the best suggestion for meeting the situation and was passed on a vote.



Almost 18 years after making his first pass in League football Glenn Hoddle still stands out against the rest. Guest commentator, Jim Smith, was torn between Glenn and the abrasive West Ham United fullback, Julian Dicks, for his Man of the Match' nomination during the live telecast of our final home First Division game of the season.

In the end the Portsmouth manager opted for Dicks, influenced in his deliberation not only by the fact that West Ham won the match but also because the Hammers' defender did not live up to his wild reputation.

Perhaps not the best of reasons yet very much in line with the kind of football doctrine, adopted in this country, which denied Glenn many rewards at his peak.

There is no doubt that had Glenn been a Brazilian they would have built the national side around him. In England, alas, his silky skills were questioned. His work-rate and tackling did not meet with managerial approval!

It's a sad reflection on our attitude to the game. An attitude, forged in the 1930's by Arsenal's Herbert Chapman, which placed winning above all other criteria.

At Highbury that mentality still rules. In fairness it has brought Arsenal much success. Yet though the trophy cabinet might bulge with silverware the Gunners' glory has never quite received the same acclaim as that attributed to North London rivals Tottenham Hotspur when they have mounted the winners' rostrum.

The subtle difference has been style. While Arsenal have conquered all with ruthless efficiency that leaves us in awe. Spurs have favoured a more delicate artistic approach.

Such was the background from which Glenn Hoddle emerged. A player of grace and vision who could land the ball on a sixpence from 40-yards. Those skill factors, which perhaps were more appreciated by his French admirers when he played for Monaco that they were here, are still there, he might not be able to respond with the same lightning reflexes

these days but the touch, precision and majesty of his game are still intact.

Glenn suggests that the French game was probably best suited to his unique style. He claims: "The French have a very high technical level and the pace of their game is slap bang inbetween the Italian and English games. Not too slow and too relaxed; not too hectic and fast. It is played at a rhythm that enables you to play good technical football.

"There are a lot of very good players over there and I saw it as a chance to test myself, both as a player and a person, against some of the best...

"The French mentality towards the game is different. They are more on the same wavelength that I'm on I think.

"The top teams in England have more varied ways of playing than you find on the Continent. Some teams here go out to destroy, and can be quite successful at this. Others play a hard and fast long ball game; some a more cultured format of this with the ball dropped shorter.

"On a good day our game can look wonderful but on a bad day it is horrific.

"The first thing I noticed when I returned from France was that the game was much quicker here that when I left. It is a natural progression. Athletes run faster, high jumpers jump higher, and so on. There is more emphasis on athleticism now.

"The standard in the First Division this season has been very good. The game at this level is not played at the pace of that in the Premier League but this is possibly a blessing in disguise. I think the quality of the passing has been improved because of this and this lends to better entertainment.

*From what I have seen the precision has been a general improvement all round. In the Third Division Port Vale and West Brom play some excellent football that would grace the First Division.

"Players at this level don't possess the speed of thought and vision that is displayed at the top level but by accurate passing and an improvement of the basic skills they can make themselves into better players.

"This game first has to be applied in the mind. The art of management to some extent is the art of psychology. Tapping into players and making them aware of what is required and what they are capable of.

"The strength is inside people. The art is getting players to realise this and get the best out of themselves."

For all his experience this is Glenn's first involvement in the play-offs. He says: "It is a nerve-racking period for players and managers. There is more at stake. A whole season's work. Our immediate future is on a knife edge. This is one stage of the season when the result matters more than the performance."

When it comes to performers few have succeeded more than Glenn this season. I put it to him that he has proved he can more than live at this level and there can be little question that he will carry on next season.


"It is a little early to say," he cautions. "I take it year by year and will see how I feel in pre-season. If I'm up to standard and I feel it is right for the team then I'll carry on."

The problem is, I suggested, that Glenn's own high standards are not those by which the rest of us judge him. Thus, is there not a danger that he could decide his playing days are over before they should be?

Thankfully his response leaves us full of optimism. For Glenn says: "I have to understand myself. The type of player I am and phase myself out.

"It would be selfish to say I'm going to quit just like that if I can still assist the other players on the field. I can perhaps use myself more shrewdly in the tuture...Let's get this season over first."

An appearance at Wembley would certainly provide a natural backcloth to one of England's greatest stars.



One aspect of our play is the freedom for the players to express themselves and not be frightened to enjoy their football. As we always say we want to win so badly but only by playing the game the way we believe in!


Watching the Reserves last week here at The County Ground against Crystal Palace typified this. We've introduced some of the Youth players and they have contributed well.

The play-offs are more akin to cup football yet as it happens we have never met the Rovers in either the FA Cup or Football League Cup so we are into


happens this afternoon it promises to be quite a night at Prenton Park. See you there this coming Wednesday, 19th May. Ticket details are on page three.

I suppose when it comes to the play-offs you can say we have seen it all and done it all before. Town even have the

unique distinction of being the only club to have won a final and not be promoted. It is a sad and disappointing chapter in our illustrious history and one we could definitely put right by gaining promotion to the Premier League this time around.

Mind you the odds don't favour us or Leicester City. Blackburn Rovers might well have clinched promotion to the top division last year after finishing sixth in the Second Division table but they are the only team to have achieved ultimate success from this position.

In the first year, 1987, of the modern play-offs Charlton Athletic maintained their First Division status with a 3-1 aggregate victory over Leeds United, who had finished fourth in the Second Division, in a two-leg final.

The following year, Middlesbrough, who were third in the final League table, overcame Chelsea the third from bottom club in Division One, who were fighting to maintain their status in top bracket.

In 1989 the rules of the competition were altered. The bottom three dropped down; the top two in Division Two were promoted and the teams in third to sixth places fought it out for the one remaining promotion spot.

Third placed Crystal Palace duly won through to take their place in Division One following a 4-3 aggregate victory over Blackburn Rovers.

Then in 1990, with the finals switched to sudden death affairs at Wembley Stadium, came our forlorn success over Sunderland, who incidentally had finished in sixth place, six points behind third place Newcastle United who they eliminated 2-0.

Notts County too confirmed their League standing of third place when they qualified after beating Brighton 3-1 at Wembley. Then came last year's success for Kenny Dalglish's team.

Leicester are still sore about that 1-0 defeat. They felt strongly that David Speedie took a dive to win the penalty that eventually put Blackburn up. Like us they have a score to settle at Wembley.

On paper Portsmouth and Tranmere Rovers are the in-form sides in this four club pack but then League form doesn't seem to count so much when it comes to the play-offs. Take last season for instance.

Blackburn only squeezed into the play-offs by the skin of their teeth. Their record showed just two wins in their final 10 League games - six of which had been lost. They took on a rampant Rams side that had finished with a flourish of four straight wins with just one defeat in ten games.

At Ewood Park Rovers established a 4-2 lead. In the return leg at the Baseball Ground Derby managed a win but by 2-1. It wasn't enough!

Likewise in the other semi-final Cambridge United boasted the better League finish with only one loss in 11 games. Leicester, on the other hand finished their League campaign with two defeats after five straight wins which had lifted them into contention.

It must be said that confidence was not that high at Filbert Street following a 1-1 draw at the Abbey Stadium. But the power play fizzled to nothing as City romped to a 5-0 scoreline at home.

It all goes to show you can't take anything for granted in this game - ask Steve Coppell. Of course we are disappointed to have to West Ham United and then at Barnsley last week but this is another day, another game, another dream to fulfil

Australia had wanted us to release David Mitchell for World Cup service but we are hoping he will be available for selection tonight to help shoot us into the history books. If we claim that remaining place for the Premier League we shall become the first fifth placed team to have achieved promotion.

"We love the area," says Jon. "It is so beautiful and relaxing and we would never move again. When I joined Aldershot we moved to Alton in Hampshire but could not settle so we decided to return to Norfolk after just ten months and I began my apprenticeship as a long distance commuter."

A goalkeeper, until he smashed his hand against a goalpost in a freak accident and was forced to relinquish the position. Jon's first allegiance was to Chelsea. "I can't tell you why "he says. "A friend and I spent a lot of time going to see them playing every other week at Stamford Bridge. Ray Wilkins was my favourite player.

"When I left school money was important. I became a Redcoat with Butlins at Clacton and in the winter was a turnstile operator at Carrow Road. Soon I was helping out in the ticket office on matchdays and a couple of months later a permanant position was offered to me by the club.

"Norwich City was a lovely club to work for. I became Box Office Manager and was then promoted to Assistant Secretary to Nigel Pleasants-who is now at Leeds United. We had some great times. Winning the Milk Cup Final at Wembley against Sunderland in 1985 was special and like any player who has appeared there I would love to be involved in another Wembley occasion. Fingers crossed it could be this year.

"Another happy memory was when Norwich won the FA Youth Cup by beating Everton at Goodison in a third game. We had more people at Carrow Road for the home leg in the final than we did when we played QPR a few days later in Division 1. It was brilliant to see the lads lift the trophy as I had coached them when they were in the City U17 team."

Alas, after ten years service Jon suddenly found his world taken from under him. Robert Chase had swept into Carrow Road and explains Jon "Everybody got the bullet. From manager Ken Brown downwards. Nigel, the administration staff and other management. We were all swept away."

It is an experience that still leaves a very bitter taste. Certainly at the time Jon was very disillusioned with football but through connections he had made was given a life-line by the late Dick Condon, who was Manager at The Theatre Royal in Norwich.

"I spent almost a year working in their Box Office and thoroughly enjoyed the experience" says Jon. "Dick was a brilliant man and well respected in the Theatre world and we had an understanding that if another job came my way in football I would take it. Working in the theatre was completely different to football. In general most of the stars where extremely friendly. Colin Baker, the former Dr Who was one in particular and the whole cast from 'Allo 'Allo, Rene and Co were so down to earth and genuine.

"Yet when I received a call from Southend United I could not resist. It came out of the blue and I joined them as Secretary in September 1987. I was there for a year but hated life in Essex and left to return to Pontins Holiday Centre at Pakefield in Suffolk where I had spent some time coaching

with Colin Benson

whilst at Norwich. The Canaries were the first club to introduce the American style soccer schools. The first year we spent three weeks there followed in successive years by six and then eight week stints. That's the closest I have come to becoming an alcoholic!" he muses.

Jon then answered a call from FLESA, the football admin staff union. Aldershot were in a mess in the wake of Boardroom upheaval and Jon relished the challenge.

It is at this level of the game that you learn the "hard facts of life. The Shots were in financial ruin and in his third year there Jon went through the turmoil of a winding-up order.

"It was a nightmare." he recalls, "We were in and out of Court. Then they pulled the plug on us. Everybody at the club was gutted. It was the worst day of my footballing life. We could do nothing. The bailiffs stormed in and threw us out. The doors were padlocked and the bottom just dropped out of our world.


"We were fortunate that the laws had just been changed and this meant that an administrator could be appointed. He took over and got the club going again, albeit for a year or so."

Meanwhile approaches were being made for Jon's services from other areas and in December 1990 he was appointed Secretary at Swindon Town.

Says Jon "The club in theory should have been in the old first division but spent just ten days there before being punished by the authorities for irregularities. The new administrative team had to get things back on the rails. I would like to think that we have now done that. We have achieved a completely new image for the club. We have new offices along with a computerised ticketing system. The dressing room areas have been totally altered and we have new executive facilities. We would not have been able to secure a such as sponsorship deal with Burmah had we not achieved all this.

"We have tried to create a friendly atmosphere and make this a homely club. Recent weeks have proved that the support is there if we provide the fans with what they want. Our Kid-a-Quid scheme illustrates what we are trying to achieve. There are not many places where you can watch top class football for £1."

It is schemes like this that demonstrate that Swindon Town are not only one of the most creative clubs on the field but off it as well.


