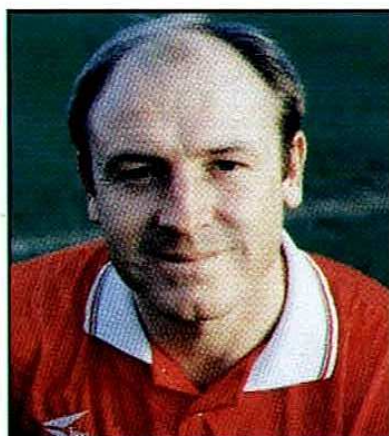

# FROM THE TOP *With* STEVE McMAHON



**It doesn't matter how long you have been in the game the magic of the FA Cup never seems to fade. I'm just sorry I won't be able to play this afternoon but that is just the way it is.**

I don't remember really what happened at Oldham but it was a complete accident. Just one of the many hazards in this game

that you have to accept as part of the profession.

There is a lot to play for this afternoon and it does not need me to repeat those old cliches about Marlow having nothing to lose and everything to gain. This is their Cup Final and we know what to expect.

We have to be confident. I believe that as long as you prepare properly and do your homework right then there is no need to fear teams from a lower status.

We will accord Marlow every respect. They have earned that by getting this far in the competition. A non-League side does not overcome League opponents in the FA Cup without a bit of spirit so we will try and make sure that our effort more than matches their enthusiasm this afternoon.

This is the start of a tough old month for us but one we should enjoy. It is a pity last Monday's match with Sunderland was called off because I fancied us getting the win over them. As for the Oldham game I didn't see enough of it to really make any judgement, but we got a point at a very difficult venue.

Since I came here I don't think our performances have been that bad. It is just that the number of draws we have had have prevented us making a significant step up the League ladder and consequently our position has not improved sufficiently to get people excited.

Yet last August everyone would have probably settled for draws at Port Vale, Stoke City and Oldham. We have achieved that yet have been somewhat disappointed because on the play, certainly in two of these games, we should have won.

So it is down to us to keep on battling and turn the draws into three pointers. But first two important Cup ties to attend to against Marlow and Millwall here on Wednesday.

Enjoy the game.

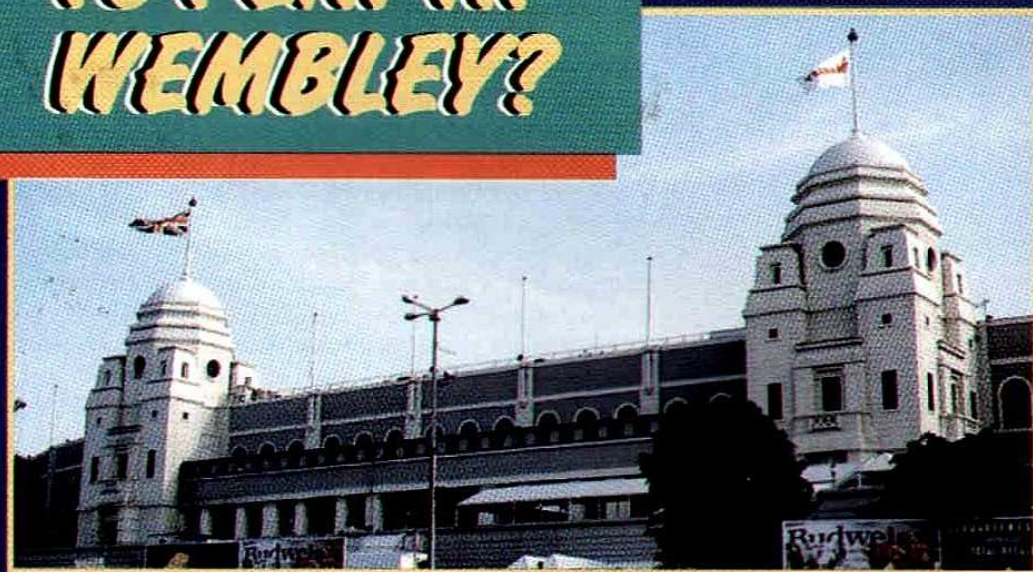

# MARLOW

**Marlow's FA Cup pedigree stretches way back to the very first competition in 1872 yet it is recent times that they have enjoyed perhaps their greatest successes.**

It was bricklayer John Caesar who brought the house down in the Second Round. The 29-year-old scored two late goals to dump Second Division Oxford United on the seat of their pants. Amazingly, the Diadora Premier Division strugglers had not won a League game at home all season.

Caesar, who had been with the club six years, played in that memorable tie at Tottenham two years ago but claimed this was "the greatest day of my career."

The irony, which no doubt Oxford will not appreciate, was that it was only the intervention of Marlow chairman Michael Eagleton that prevented Caesar being sold to Aylesbury United recently. The striker had fallen out with manager Peter Foley, the former Oxford United forward. But the chairman wanted Caesar to stay because his departure would have left the team short up front and Foley agreed.

Paul Rayson had been the hero in the First Round, when his sole strike put paid to Sutton United's Cup ambitions but there was real drama in the second round when Marlow faced up to Woking, the conquerors of Barnet.

Referee Kelvin Morton sent off Marlow goalkeeper Kevin Mitchell in the 73rd minute for handling the ball outside his area. It was a contentious decision as most observers thought Mitchell was clearly on the edge of his box.

Mitchell had earlier tipped over a ferocious 25-yarder from Fielder and then made a remarkable double save from Scott Steele and former Chelsea winger Clive Walker.

Scaffolder Richard, on loan from Sutton United, had shot Marlow ahead in the 50th minute but Woking's Mark Tucker seemed to have secured a replay when he equalised in the 88th. But enter Doctor Ceri Evans, the big centre-half who went up to head in a free-kick in the 92 minute! It was the goal that earned Marlow this Third Round trip to Swindon.

# MARLOW ABC



**JOHN CAESAR** - Striker. Consistent marksman who has now clocked up nearly 90 goals in some 300 games since making his debut in 1989. Joined Marlow from neighbours Flackwell Heath and was voted "Player of the Year" at the close of the 1992-93 season. Is a bricklayer by trade.



**CERI EVANS**

**CERI EVANS** - Central Defender. No stranger to The County Ground Ceri has played here many times for Oxford United. A New Zealander studying at Oxford University he was given his chance in League football by Oxford United with a debut game at Leicester City in April 1989. Capped over 60 times by New Zealand, including two games against England in 1991, he took last season out, after 134 appearances for the "U.s" to further his medical career and is now a Doctor working in a London hospital. Joined up with Marlow earlier this season. Born: Christchurch, N.Z 2-10-63.

**RICHARD EVANS** - Striker. Sutton United hit-man signed on loan in November. Now 27, and with loads of experience having played at Burnley, Wolverhampton Wanderers and Cambridge United as well as Wokingham and Windsor & Eton. Works as a scaffolder.

**COLIN FERGUSON** - Midfield. Formerly a youngster with Reading he was not offered a professional contract and joined Maidenhead. Then moved to Burnham where he spent seven years before switching to Marlow two seasons ago.

**MICKY FLOYD** - Left-Back. Left-sided player who has recently broken into the senior side after consistent performances in the Reserves. Made his senior bow at left-back in a 2-2 draw with Walton & Hersham in November 1994.

**KEITH HOLMES** - Midfield. Another recruit from the ranks of Oxford United where he graduated from Trainee and was then released. Came into the side in place of Les Phillips for the 2-2 draw with Walton & Hersham on November 15. Keith is 20-years of age.

**DARREN McNAMARA** - Midfield. Promising young player who gained experience with Abingdon Town and Thame before signing for Oxford City. Signed for Marlow last summer and has been a regular member of the team.

**KEVIN MITCHELL** - Goalkeeper. Made the headlines when he was sent-off in the FA Cup replay with Woking in the previous round. A talented performer who made over 600 appearances for Windsor and Eton after service with Woking, Reading and Slough. Has gained representative honours for the Football Association. Transferred to Marlow midway through the 1992-93 season and has played 100 times for the club.

**TERRY MUCKELBERG** - Right Back. Former England Schoolboy International who tried his luck with Oxford United before drifting to Kettering Town then Worcester City. Sound performer who was signed last close-season and made his Marlow debut on the opening day of the season in a 4-4 draw with St Albans City.

**DAVID MUIR** - Defender. In his first season with Marlow having previously played for nearby Burnham. Has been so impressive in the Reserves that he has now made some 13 appearances for the senior side.



# MARLOW ABC



**DAVID NOLAN** - Forward. David has now put in more than 60 appearances for Marlow after transferring to them midway through last season from another Diadora League side, Northwood. Had spent five years with them but is still only 22. More a maker of goals than a taker - he netted just seven in his first 60 games.

**LES PHILLIPS** - Midfield. Another player familiar to Swindon fans, Les clocked up more than 200 League games (it would have been more but for injury problems) in a successful career that also included a Milk Cup Winners' medal with Oxford United in 1986. Had joined Oxford from Birmingham City for a bargain £5,000 in March 1984. A Londoner from Lambeth Les served his apprenticeship with Birmingham City, making the first of his 44 League appearances for them at West Ham in February 1982. Is only 5' 8" but of compact physique. Finished his League career at Northampton Town and joined Marlow last August. Les is 32 today. Happy Birthday!

**MICHAEL PUTNAM** - Striker. Now in his second spell with Marlow having returned to the Memorial Ground last August. Is not far off his 100th appearance for the club. Has also served with Flackwell Heath, Slough Town, Chertsey, and Oxford City. Made his debut in 1987, and has played centre-half with some success this season.

**PAUL RAYSON** - Forward. A 26-year-old signed from Bicester Town this season. When Putnam moved back into defence Paul took over his number nine shirt, scoring seven goals in his first 14 games. Was on the books of Oxford United and has also played for Thame United.

**JOHN REGAN** - Central Defender. A most experienced player at this level with over 275 games to his credit. Became the first player ever to join Marlow for a fee when he signed from Hounslow in 1989. Has also played with Wycombe Wanderers and Chalfont St.Peter.

**STUART WALTON** - Goalkeeper. This is Stuart's first season with Marlow having previously been with Slough, Wycombe Wanderers, Chesham and Chertsey. Made his Marlow debut in a 1-4 defeat by Chesham United in the Diadora League last October 11th. Has represented Middlesex County FA.

**MARK WATKINS** - Forward. The most experienced player in non League football on Marlow's books having nearly made 300 appearances. A pacey forward who has also seen service with Harrow Borough, St Albans and Tring. Has been honoured with representative appearances for both the Herts Football Association and the Diadora League.

# THE MEN IN CHARGE



**PETER FOLEY & STEVE HAYWARD**

**Peter Foley took over as manager of Marlow in the summer of 1994 having seen Oxford City through the ranks of the South Midlands Combination to promotion to the Second Division of the Diadora League.**

Peter enjoyed a successful career as a player with Oxford United, scoring regularly as he chalked up a club joint-record 90 goals in 300 games for the "U's."

Moved on to play with Aldershot, Exeter City and Gillingham, before going abroad to play in Hong Kong then Sweden. It was here that he commenced his managerial career.

Spends his days now selling life assurance.

Steve Hayward is Peter's assistant at Marlow, the partnership being forged in 1990. Steve has no Football League experience his playing career embracing Berkhamstead, Chertsey, Tring, Thame and Oxford City.



# UNDER THE SPOTLIGHT

Defender **Peter Rhoades-Brown**

**Born at Hampton on the 2nd January 1962, Peter emerged as an extremely fast and talented winger. He excelled as a schoolboy and then came under the wing of Chelsea.**

Was given an apprenticeship at Stamford Bridge and in July 1979 was signed as a professional. Made the breakthrough into senior side at the end of December 1979, when he made his debut, as a substitute for Ron Harris, in a 2-0 defeat at Wrexham.

Was in the starting line-up for the first time at Charlton (29-3-80) but did not finish the game. The following season he established himself on the left-flank, one of several fine young Chelsea graduates including Gary Chivers, Mike Fillery, John Bumstead, Micky Nutton and Colin Pates.

Ironically, scored his first League goal against Wrexham, in a 2-2 draw at Stamford Bridge on the opening day of the 1980-81 season, yet his goals contribution was disappointing and partly contributed to his displacement from the Blues team by Paul Canovile and Mickey Thomas in 1983.

In January 1984 Peter was sold to Oxford United for £50,000, after making 93 (12) League and Cup appearances in which he produced just five goals.

Enjoyed great success at Oxford helping them win the Third and Second Division League Championships and also played a prominent part in helping them reach the 1986 Milk Cup Final. But a knee injury prevented him playing at Wembley against QPR.

Another knee injury limited "Rosie" to just seven games in 1988-89 and his career at the top level was coming to a close. Is still on Oxford United's books as their Football in the Community Officer.

Joined Marlow last summer and made his debut at left-back in the 4-4 draw with St Albans City on the opening day of the season. Peter has also played for Abingdon Town and Newbury Town.







# UNIQUE MARLOW

**Marlow might not be the tip of every football fan's lips yet it might surprise you to know that this little club from deepest Buckinghamshire has played a grand and unique part in the development of the Association game, and as such is indelibly recorded in the history of football.**

Founded in 1870, they are one of the oldest clubs in the country and back in the last century, when they were known as Great Marlow, they were a major force in the land.

Marlow were not represented at the historic meeting of the Football Association, on October 16, 1871, when it was agreed that a Challenge Cup should be established but they were one of the fifteen clubs who subscribed to the cost of the silver trophy and took their place in the first ever FA Cup competition.

The fifteen participants were: Barnes, Civil Service, Crystal Palace, Clapham Rovers, Hitchin, Maidenhead, Marlow, Queens Park, Donington School, Hampstead Heathens, Harrow Chequers, Reigate Priory, Royal Engineers, Upton Park and the Wanderers.

With the exception of Queen Park of Glasgow and Donington School, which was near Spalding in Lincolnshire, all the entrants were from the London area.

The rules of the Cup Competition in those days were very simple. The Competition was open to all member clubs of the F.A. In the first two rounds the captains of the clubs tossed for the choice of the ground. All ties after the second round were played at Kennington Oval, or as the Committee might order, though in the Final Tie the Cup holders were allowed choice of venue. (The Cup winners were exempt until the Final of the following year).

Marlow met Maidenhead, on November 11, 1871, and have entered the FA Cup ever since and thus have become the only club to have played in the competition every season since its conception.

In 1882 Marlow won through to the semi-final and were soundly beaten 5-0 at the Oval by the Old Etonians who went on to win the Cup.

Professionalism came of course but Marlow still maintained their amateur tradition rejecting an invitation to become a founder member of the Southern League in 1894 in order to maintain their amateur principles. Tottenham Hotspur were subsequently offered their place and of course have gone on to become one of the most successful FA Cup competitors of all time.

While Spurs progressed Marlow dropped from the Great Western Suburban League to the Reading League. It was Hon. Secretary Alfred Davis who inspired the purchase of a new ground in 1924, and this heralded a revival. In 1930 the Spartan League

Division Two Championship was won and Marlow participated in this competition until 1965 when they joined the second division of the Athenian League.

Promotion to the Division One was secured in 1971 and then in 1984 Marlow switched to the most prestigious Isthmian League. Life was tough at this level and Marlow finished bottom of Division Two in 1985.

It was the former Queens Park Rangers star Mike Keen who revived their fortunes when he took charge. The former Northampton Town boss brought organisation and a professional aspect to the club and Marlow began a rapid rise to fortune.

Promotion to Division One was gained in one season and twelve months later Marlow were celebrating a Championship win and promotion to the Premier Division after a nail-biting two horse race with Grays Athletic.

That first season in the Premier saw Marlow struggle to find their level and only a late Houdini act stayed off what seemed an inevitable instant return to Division One. With their position maintained however, Mike Keen left to concentrate on his own business interests and his assistant, Dave Russel, took control.

Russel appointed Laurie Cracker as his coach and under their new management team Marlow enjoyed some of their greatest triumphs. They won the Berks and Bucks Cup for the first time this century but more significantly won through to the First Round Proper of the FA Cup in 1989, again for the first time this century, when they took on West Bromwich Albion.

The highlight came though in season 1992-93, when little Marlow who had been there at the very beginning, battled through to a Third Round tie with Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart Lane.

The journey had commenced with a 2-1 replay win over Sittingbourne after a 1-1 draw. In the First Round Proper they were held 3-3 at home by Salisbury. It was 2-2 in replay - Marlow winning on penalties. Hopes of drawing League opposition were again dashed in the Second Round, when Marlow were drawn away to VS Rugby. No score but a 2-0 win at the second attempt earned them that plum trip to Tottenham where they were soundly beaten 5-1.

This season they have reached the Third Round again having disposed of Sutton United (1-0) and more to the point Oxford United 2-0 then Woking 2-1...The Cup spirit still runs deep in this little corner of Buckinghamshire.



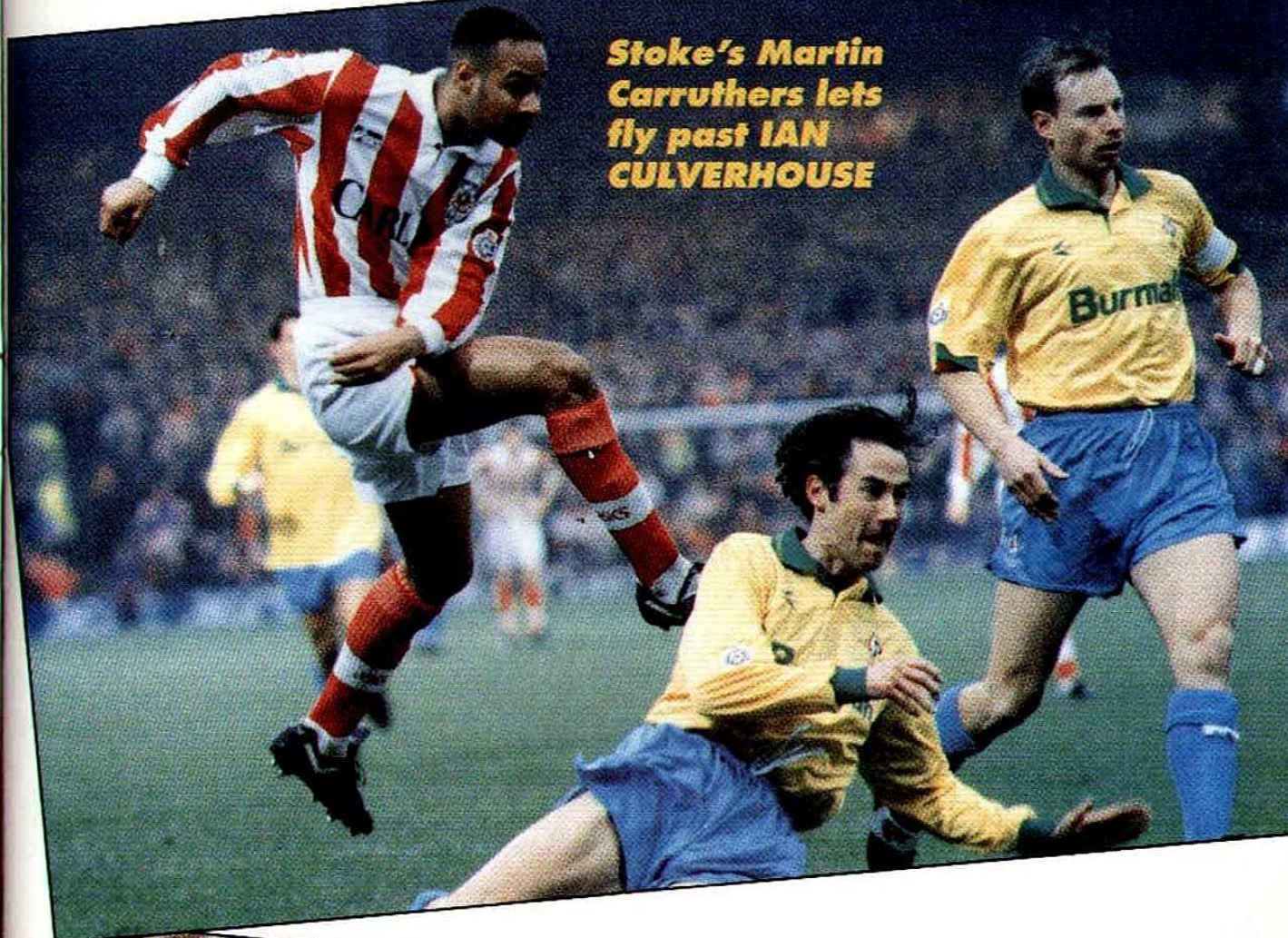

# TOWN TALK

**A new series featuring people who matter at Swindon Town .... Today Shaun Taylor talks to Colin Benson.**

**Q. Shaun. Marlow in the FA Cup. It's one of those difficult ones isn't it. Do you have any previous experience of taking on non-League opposition?**

A. Yes, when I was with Exeter City in the Fourth Division. We lost a Cup tie at Bognor Regis of all places. It is not a nice experience and one I don't want to repeat.

It is all right saying that a League side should not lose to a non-League side, or that a Premier League club should not lose to a Second or Third Division side. But it happens and it happens regularly. It is part of the magic of Cup football.

To reach the Third Round is a tremendous achievement for a club like Marlow. Today's visit to Swindon will be their Cup Final and they will give it everything we can be certain of that.

**Q. You know what it is like from the other point of view of course?**

A. That is right. When I was a player with Bideford we used to relish taking on teams from the League, it gave us an extra incentive.

While I was with them we never got through to one of the glamour ties in the FA Cup but we played a lot of League sides in pre-season and though it was only a practice for them it always meant far more to us.

I don't know what it is, whether it is an unconscious need to prove a point or what. But when you come up against opposition from higher grade of football there is a compelling need to prove a point. You get keyed up and do your very best to rise to the occasion.

**Q. What do you know of the opposition?**

A. Well we know that they have quite a few players with League experience who used to be with Oxford United, so they are not totally unknowns to us.

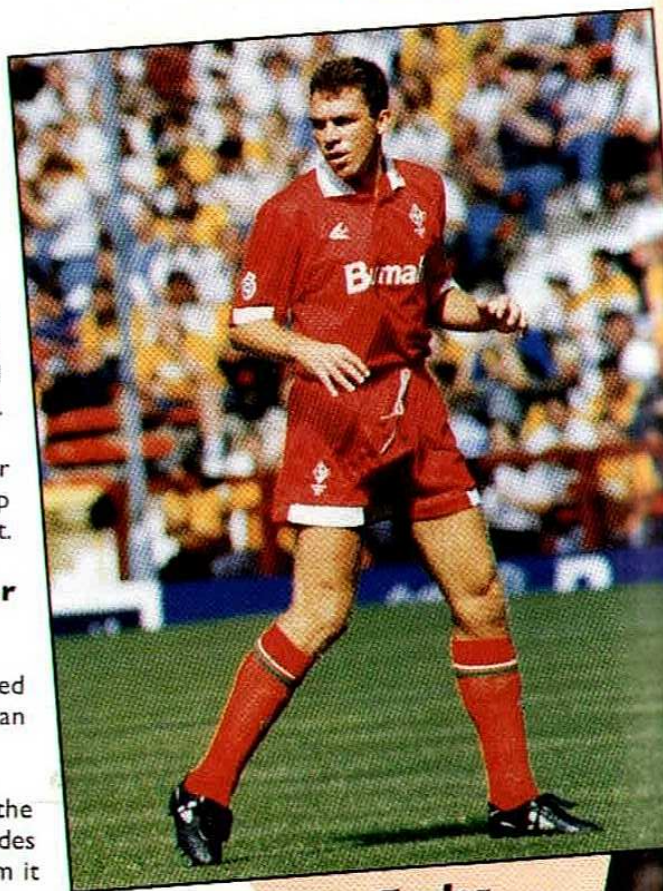
I have played against people like Ceri Evans and Les Phillips in the League and Peter Rhoades-Brown is known to everyone so Marlow are not entirely a surprise package to us.

They will give us a tough game, we expect this as they have nothing to lose and glory to gain. But we are prepared.

**Q. This is the start of a crucial period for Swindon as we take on the three "M's" Marlow, Millwall and Middlesbrough. But which is the most significant game?**

A. They are all very important. We badly need points and a win over Middlesbrough would be a great boost. But success in both the Cup competitions is equally essential to build-up our confidence.

The FA Cup is very important to all the players and a win today will put us in good spirit for the Millwall game. If we can win that we are into the semi-finals of the Coca-Cola Cup and that would make everyone feel good inside.

Last year was not such a good one for the Club. We had a fling in the Premiership but relegation is hard to take. We enjoyed the experience and want to be there again but next time we want to get there and stay there. We don't want to be the doldrums again.

Unfortunately after a good start in the First Division we find ourselves struggling again. Maybe some success over the next three games will prove the turning point and steer us towards a successful 1995.

The old year certainly ended on a low note for us, going 13 games without a win in the First Division, which just isn't good enough. Then in the last match of 1994, the boss broke his arm just 15-minutes into the game. It can only get better.



**Q. You can tell us from recent experience what Steve McMahon will be feeling right now?**

A. Yes, from what I could see he broke his arm in the same place as I did mine; and like me it was away from home. He was in a great deal of pain and had to go to hospital in Oldham straight away.

He will have been in a lot of pain all week if it is anything like mine. I suffered my break on the Saturday and did not get out of hospital in Middlesbrough until the Tuesday, which can be very frustrating when you are that far away from your family.

It took me seven weeks to get back playing but it is still not normal yet. I have to wear a brace on the arm when I'm training and playing.

I was able to start running after three or four weeks but I can imagine the boss is really fed up. He has come to a new club trying to make an impression and then first he is suspended and now he is out with a broken arm...At least he will be able to watch a lot of games.

The injury was very unfortunate as we were 1-0 ahead at the time. It was a very well worked goal with Martin Ling volleying a great shot into the corner. Oldham equalised just on half-time and then put us under a lot of pressure in the second-half. But Nicky Hammond played very well in his first game of the season to help earn us a point. It was a good result considering Oldham's recent form.

**Q. At the start of the season the talk was of promotion. Now it is about avoiding the bottom four. Where's it gone wrong?**

A. We just haven't won enough games. We started very well and were hovering around fourth and fifth places for a while then it slipped away. Our home record urgently needs improving.

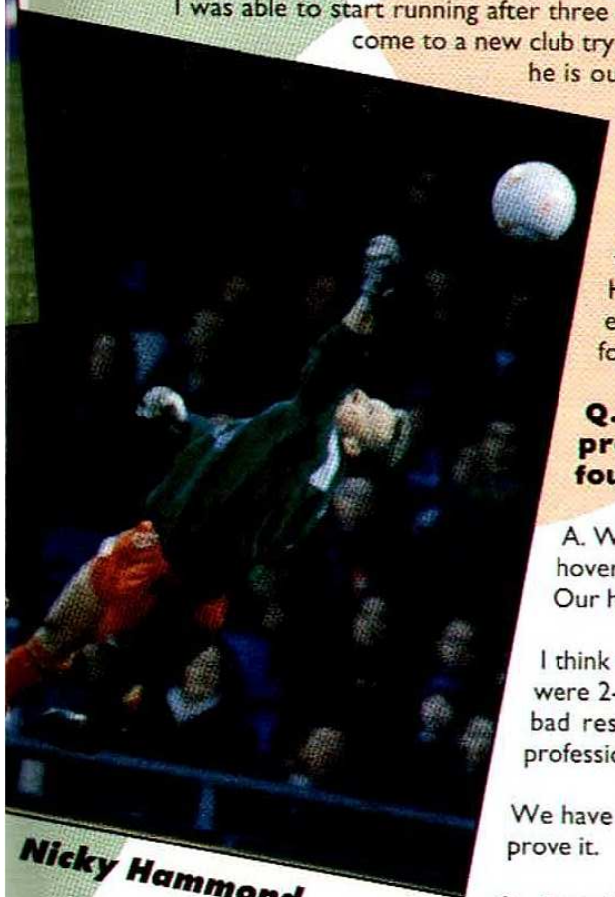
I think a lot of it is down to confidence. Home to Tranmere Rovers we were 2-1 up and lost; Port Vale we were 2-1 up and lost and these were bad results for us. It is not a matter of luck. We need to be more professional.

We have to believe we are good enough to win and then make sure we prove it.

**Q. Are the Play-Offs still a possibility?**

A. Yes but it is too early to be thinking of this. First we have to get away from the bottom end of the League table. If we can get off the bottom then maybe we will have the confidence to progress further. But first things first. We have to address our current situation and solve it. Then we can think about other matters such as promotion.

If we do this then we can look forward to a much better 1995.

There has been a lot of water under the bridge since then with some happy memories to reflect upon and some not so happy ones of course. But we will not mention Newcastle United, or relegation.**

Suffice to say we enjoyed our short sojourn in the Premiership. Who will forget our home wins over Tottenham and Coventry on successive Saturdays. The thrilling 3-3 draw here with Norwich City and the 2-2 epic with the champions, Manchester United. It all seems so long ago since we were doing battle with the elite of English football week in week out. But having experienced the game at the top level our appetite to savour the glories of the Premiership is even greater. The traditional script for this time of the year calls for a revue of the year but so much has been packed into the first five months of this season there seems hardly any room for anything else. When all said and done 1994-95 is the campaign that matters most to us all.

So what a start we had last August with Jan Aage Fjortoft and Keith Scott scoring in a 2-0 win over Port Vale. Jan made it three goals in two games with a brace at Tranmere. Alas, the Rovers scored three!

New interpretation of the codes of practice were carried out from the World Cup by FIFA, and has not been accepted without much controversy. Our former manager, John Gorman, was incensed when Paul Bodin's goal was ruled out against West Brom and the game ended goalless after the same referee turned down a penalty claim. Mr Gorman claimed that decisions like these not only cost us two points but could also cost managers their job.

Jan knows all about goals that weren't - remember his great score at Maine Road last season? He had another fine effort ruled out by a linesman at Notts County in September but thankfully netted one that did count to win the game. September proved an eventful month. We entered it in second place, just three points behind the leaders Middlesbrough, and apart from two dropped points to Derby County our home form was good. However, a 3-1 defeat here by Charlton Athletic in the Coca-Cola Cup knocked more than just a little sparkle out of the system.

It was to pave the way for one of Town's greatest come-backs at the Valley in the second leg. Nobody, not even the biggest optimists, gave us a prayer. Yet the boys bounced through on the back of Jan's first hat-trick and Joey Beauchamp's first goal in our colours. It was 4-1 to Town on the night, 5-4 on aggregate.

October opened with a 2-1 defeat at Barnsley. Town were now six points adrift of the leaders and down to fifth place. Skipper Paul Bodin scored twice in a great 3-2 win over Wolves but a 4-3 defeat at ailing

Portsmouth took the shine off that success which was followed by a 2-2 draw with Southend United and a 3-1 beating at Ayresome Park. Town were floundering in ninth position - a clear ten points behind the new leaders Wolves.

A matter for concern was the goals against column. In seven League and Cup games in October we conceded 15 goals while in the First Division our overall statistics showed that no other side in the division had conceded more goals away from home than the 16 we forfeited in six defeats and one win.

This was a matter that had to be addressed but as we slipped into November there was no improvement. Bolton slammed in three goals at Burnden Park, then Bristol City hit another three at Ashton Gate. It was to be John Gorman's last in charge as the axe fell. Andy Rowland took over team matters on a temporary basis for the home game with Burnley.

By the end of November Steve McMahon was installed as our new player-manager but could not take the field in his first game, a Coca-Cola Cup tie with Derby County, as he was Cup-tied. Still with Jan scoring another brace to take his total to 19 goals this season, the boss was not required. A 2-1 win over the Rams was enough to earn us a quarter-final tie here with Millwall.

Steve did make his playing debut for us at Southend United, alas it was short lived after he was shown the red card but he did last the full 90 minutes against Tranmere. Now the former England International is hoping to inspire a great 1995 and with the Coca-Cola Cup, the FA Cup and promotion still in the frame it promises to be an exciting New Year.

# PREVIEW

**The Third Round of the FA Cup is perhaps one of the most exciting of the whole competition. This is the stage when David truly does try to slay Goliath and it is fair to say that at this junction in the competition the magic of the Cup embraces a wider range of interests across the land than at any other time.**

Most outsiders will be rooting for Marlow to get the better of us this afternoon. It is a natural tendency for those with direct interest in the competitors involved to support the underdog and this particular draw had thrown up many likely upsets.

The pundits big favourite - as soon as the draw was made - for a giant killing act, was for little Wycombe Wanderers to take out West Ham United this afternoon. The Hammers have an embarrassingly poor track record in these situations and name Swindon. Hereford United and Newport County amongst their conquerors; but this time it could be different.

It was a West Ham team with the late Bobby Moore, Geoff Hurst and Martin Peters in it that came to grief, 3-1, against us at The County Ground in a Third Round replay in January 1967. Harry Redknapp was on the fringe of the team then but did not establish himself in the side until the following month. Today he is the man in charge.

Wycombe are currently third in the Second Division so they are going well but West Ham are bouncing off a class victory over Nottingham Forest and could cloud former Forest favourite Martin O'Neill's dreams by forcing a draw.

Second Division Wrexham must be a hot tip against Premiership Ipswich Town who have won once away from home this season: but a Matt Le Tissier inspired Southampton should be too strong for Southend United at the Dell; and Forest, despite their recent indifferent form, should add to the problems at Plymouth Argyle.

One of the ties of the round is Millwall v Arsenal. The Gunners proved too powerful when they met last year but there is a certain frailty about Arsenal these days who were well beaten by Leicester recently. Millwall are going great guns since beating Nottingham Forest in the Coca-Cola Cup, to earn a trip here next week, and are full of confidence. They are undefeated since then, conceding just three goals. So what price Millwall to produce the shock of the round?

Mind you, it would be an even bigger shock if little Altrincham ousted Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart Lane. Could they? Well the red Robins, who live in the shadow of Manchester United, have claimed 16 League scalps in their illustrious Cup history and it was only

the width of the crossbar and a debatable penalty decision that saved Spurs from making it 17. John King was a forceful defender in that 1979 Altrincham side. Today they call the Altrincham manager the Mr Motivator of non-League football.

Leicester City surely will not be relishing the arrival of Enfield Town. Gary Abbott is the shooting star they will be watching for his goals put paid to Cardiff City and Torquay United in the previous rounds. Yet despite their problems Leicester should make it to the Fourth Round.

Birmingham City slammed seven goals past Blackpool last week-end and no doubt enjoyed their day out but it should be a different story for the Second Division leaders this afternoon against Liverpool. The Reds are back in business following three straight wins over the holiday programme and look dead certs for victory.

Manchester United renew Cup hostilities with Sheffield United for the third time in three years and should make it another win at Bramall Lane. Leeds United will not be so assured as they take to the field at Walsall. Already K-O'd from the Coca-Cola Cup by Mansfield Town, Howard Wilkinson and his team are taking a lot of stick from their supporters. A win today is absolutely imperative.

Another Premiership side with a tricky trip to master is Norwich City, away to Grimsby Town, while Barnsley will be no walk-overs for Brian Little's Aston Villa at Oakwell.

Lots of potential here then for the proverbial Giant Killers...a day of nerves and anguish for the establishment.

## **SOUTH OF ENGLAND. FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION CUP, Qualifying Competition, Final Round**

During the first ten minutes of the Cup Tie between Swindon Town and Marlow the passing of the Swindon forwards was such that the opposing half-backs were kept in constant movement without often being able to touch the ball. However, the superior weight of the Marlow backs saved their side and they never allowed the light forwards to work close up to goal before shooting. At last a good run by Welch and Handsombody ended in Judge finding the ball in front of goal and promptly putting it through.

After this Swindon returned to the attack with redoubled energy but were unable to score-indeed, they were not able to give the goalkeeper any shots to stop. Marlow broke away occasionally but Butterworth played well in goal and saved two or three times in clever style.

Playing down-hill in the second half, Swindon soon swarmed round the Marlow goal, but the defence was equal to the occasion and as the Marlow men gradually improved the game went more in their favour. During the last half hour they had the best of the play but were unable to add to their score and so only won the match by a goal to nothing.

The Marlow men were superior in weight and speed to their opponents and their forwards went straight. The Swindon forwards almost overdid their pretty passing when near goal, and lost chances which they might have utilised if they had gone on at full speed. At the same time it must not be forgotten that the Marlow backs played in very determined fashion and either got the man or the ball when their goal was threatened.

Towards the finish the Marlow half-backs played well up to their forwards, thus repairing a weakness which had previously been very apparent.

On Saturday's form, the teams are very evenly matched, and probably the fact that Marlow had the choice of ground gave them the game.

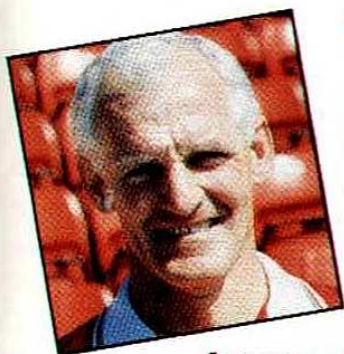

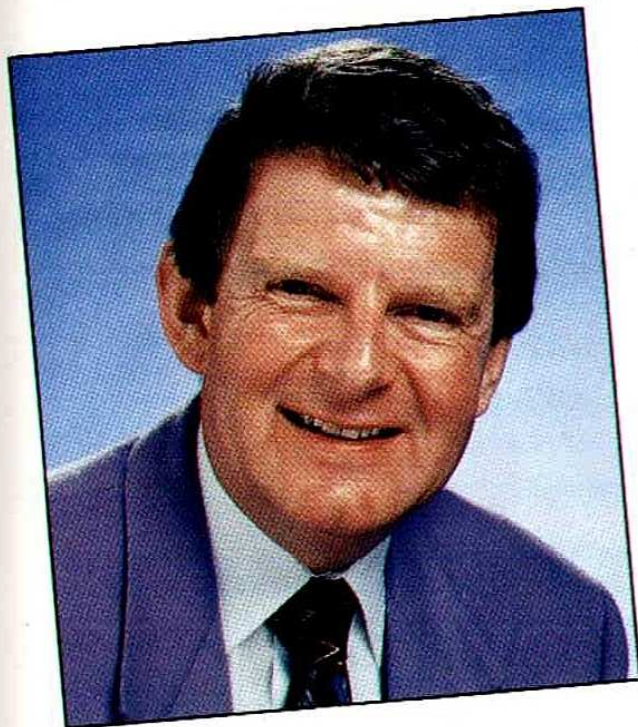

# MY VIEW

**BBC MATCH OF THE DAY COMMENTATOR JOHN MOTSON SAYS  
"MINNOWS CAN MAKE THE CUP A MINEFIELD"**



**Swindon Town supporters could be forgiven for feeling relieved that the "Match of the Day" cameras are not at The County Ground today. And this commentator can therefore write in the programme without accusations of bias!**

The reason being, that in my time with the programme, the third round of the F.A Cup has proved something of a platform for non-League clubs to upset their elders and supposedly betters in front of a nationwide audience.

My first ever F.A Cup commentary for BBC Television proves the point. Back in 1972, I was sent to the West Country to cover the third round replay between Hereford United, then in the old Southern League, and Newcastle United of the then First Division.

You won't need me to remind you that Hereford won 2-1, with hitherto unknown left winger called Ronnie Radford scoring what became the BBC's Goal of the Season. Even today, with Kevin Keegan having revived spirits on Tyneside, I get Newcastle United fans coming up to me asking me if the BBC can "wipe the tape so they never have to see that goal again! And for years

after the match, I was regarded as something of a "jinx" when I covered the Geordies for "Match of the Day".

The programme waited 17 years for another result like that one. And lo and behold, the dreaded Motson marker was on the mike again. This time the venue was Sutton, tucked away in the stockbroker belt in suburban Surrey.

The victims in 1989 were Coventry City, who 18 months earlier were FA Cup winners at Wembley. Cyrille Regis and company were out-maneuvred by Sutton United of the G.M.Vauxhall Conference, and lost 2-1.

So when the F.A Cup started last season, and my first commentary was Marlow vs Plymouth Argyle, the Diadora side had every reason to anticipate a shock result. As it happened, Peter Shilton's team won 2-0 on the day, but my goodness, how Marlow have made up for that disappointment this season.

Their first round clash with Football League neighbours Oxford United was not selected by the BBC, simply because the match was moved to a Sunday, but having produced the shock of the round there, we all know what happened when Marlow played Vauxhall Conference leaders Woking in the second round.

So what can Swindon Town fans expect today? All I can tell them is that Marlow have a real personality in their goalkeeper Kevin Mitchell, and that they also specialise in scoring late goals.

What have I said? If he plays blinder and Marlow score in the last minute, I won't be too welcome again at Swindon! But if the unexpected result occurs, maybe I will get the chance again to cover Julian Wilson's favourite team on "Match of the Day Live".

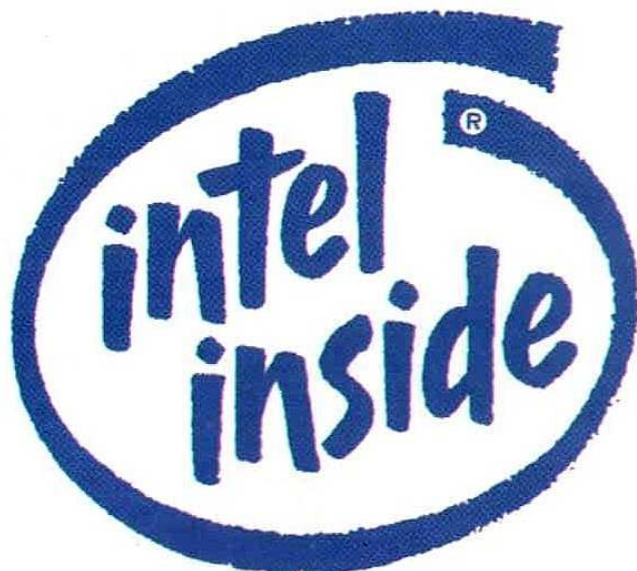
