MIDDLESBROUGH BY JOHN NOLAN



There is a new air of optimism on Teesside since the appointment of Bryan Robson as manager last May. The former England skipper is a born winner and it did not take long for his influence to take shape.

Robbo claimed that there were two areas he was looking to improve in Boro's game. First he wanted to introduce Manchester United's passing style and secondly he wanted his players to adopt the same sort of movement off the ball as his colleagues at Old Trafford.

Explained Mr. Robson: "The players needed to understand that they could not play with the foot down on the throttle for 90 minutes throughout the season. The best way to save energy and dominate a game is by passing the ball about. With another former England favourite, Viv Anderson, who enjoyed a glorious career as a fullback with Nottingham Forest, Arsenal and Manchester United, as his assistant Robson has cleverly guided Boro into the driving seat at the head of the First Division table.

They got off to a great start with straight 2-0 victories over Burnley and Southend and did not concede a single goal in their first five League and Cup games, it being mid-September before they suffered their first defeat, at Port Vale.

The first sticky patch came in October. Following a 1-0 defeat by Tranmere at Ayresome Park, Boro unbelievably crashed 5-1 at Luton Town. Indeed, in a spell of ten games only home victories over Swindon (3-1) and Oldham Athletic (2-1) gave the fans anything to cheer about.

Then on November 20, Boro beat Wolves I-0 in a top of the table clash at Ayresome Park. John Hendrie was the scorer of that golden goal which has set them on the road towards the Premiership.

There has been just one embarrassment en route, a home defeat inflicted by Southend United, but generally Middlesbrough have looked the part of front-runners.

Bryan Robson has introduced a sweeper system for away games which has worked well. He says: "It makes the team very strong in defence, but it is by no means a defensive system because it gives our fullbacks more freedom to get forward, while our midfielders can also make forward runs in the knowledge they have an extra defender behind them." Alan Miller is the current first choice custodian with Cox and either Fleming or Morris at fullback. Vickers and Whyte are regular choices in the centre of defence with Pearson while Blackmore and Mustoe share selection alongside. In midfield Pollock and Hignett are very influential with Robson, Moore or Todd.

John Hendrie and Paul Wilkinson carry the goal threat while also in the squad are such players as Bolivian World Cup ace Moreno, 20, a £250,000 buy from FC Blooming and Derby born Andy Todd is another 20 year-old.

NEIL COX - Right Back. Big money signing from Aston Villa last summer, Neil made his 'Boro debut on the opening day of the season against Burnley. Came into the professional game with Scunthorpe United, making his League debut at Halifax Town on October 6, 1990. In February 1991 Villa paid £400,000 for his signature after only

17 League appearances but Neil was not able to hold down a regular spot in the Villa side though he did make a substitute appearance in their League Cup winning side at Wembley in 1994. Cost 'Boro a Club record £1-million, and scored his first goal for 'Boro against Swindon in October. Born: Scunthorpe 8-10-71

CURTIS FLEMING - Left Back. The popular Manchester born Irishman joined 'Boro from St Patricks in 1991 for a bargain £30,000. A tough tackler he played on the right until the arrival of Cox and has lost none of his qualities in the number three shirt. Capped by the Republic of Ireland at "B" and Under-21 levels he has now made over 100 League appearances for 'Boro but injury and suspension has hampered his progress this season. Born: 3-10-68

JOHN HENDRIE - Forward. The veteran of over 500 senior games John is a bubbly live-wire attacker with great dribbling and shooting skills that have netted him over 120 goals. Started his career as an apprentice with Coventry City and made his League debut in a 2-1 win at Tottenham in December 1981. Made only 20 further appearances, and 6 on loan to Hereford, before joining Bradford City in 1984. Netted 46 League goals in four seasons which tempted Newcastle United to part with £600,000; he then helped Leeds United to win the 2nd Div Championship. 'Boro paid £500,000 for him in 1990. Born: Lennoxtown 24-10-63.

CRAIG HIGNETT - Midfield. Was on Liverpool's books as a youngster but it was Crewe Alexandra who offered him the chance to become a professional. Made over 100 League appearances for them, finishing season 1991-92 as second top scorer with 13 goals. Likes to run at defenders and cost £500,000 when he moved to Middlesbrough during the 1992-93 season. Born: Whiston 12-1-70.



NIGEL PEARSON

ALAN MILLER - Goalkeeper. A graduate of the FA School of Excellence at Lilleshall, Alan was on Arsenal's books as an Associated Schoolboy and then joined then from school. Was a shadow of first John Lukic then David Seaman at

Highbury and only made an handful of appearances for the Gunners. Actually made his League debut for Plymouth Argyle while on loan and had other spells with West Brom and Birmingham to gain experience. Stands 6'2" and has been capped by England at Youth and Under-21 (4) levels. Cost Boro £425,000 in the summer of 1994. Born: Epping 29-3-70.

CHRIS MORRIS - Defender, has now played over 50 games for Boro since his arrival from Glasgow in 1992 in exchange for Andy Payton. Spent the first five years of his career with Sheffield Wednesday, making his League debut at Swansea in August 1983, the first of 74 League outings (1 goal) for the Owls. Left Hillsbrough for Celtic in the summer of 1987 and won Scottish League honours. Has won more than 30 caps for the Republic of Ireland at right-back bit missed the World Cup Finals in the USA because of injury. Born: Newquay 24-12-63.

Oxford United at Norwich in August 1968. He moved to Ayresome Park for £375,000 in July 1990 and his strong running form in midfield established him as a favourite in the 'Boro side. Has now chalked up some 300 senior games in his career and though not capped by England he has been included in Under-21 squads. Born: Oxford 28-8-68.

STEPHEN PEARS - Goalkeeper. Injury at the start of the season lost him his place. An apprentice with Manchester United, Steve made his League debut while on loan to 'Boro, making 12 appearances in all in 1983-84. Returned to Old Trafford to play four games in the latter part of the '84-85 season when Gary Bailey was injured. 'Boro then paid £80,000 to clinch his transfer the summer. Born: Brandon 22-1-62.

JAMIE POLLOCK

NIGEL PLANCE - Central Defender. A £750,000 signing from Sheffield Wednesday in the close-season of 1994, Nigel made his 'Boro debut against Burnley in August. A good steady player he came out of the Midland Counties League with Heanor Town to make 181 senior appearances for Shrewsbury Town between November 81 and October 87. "The Shrews" had picked him up for £5,000 and sold him to Wednesday for £250,000. Captained the Owls to a memorable League Cup Final victory over Bryan Robson's Manchester United in 1991. Born: Nottingham 21-8-63.

JAMIE POLLOCK - Midfield. Outstanding young player developed through 'Boro's own ranks. Made his League bow in season 1990-91, while only a teenager and now, at the age of 20, he has already chalked up more than 100 League appearances. A great competitor, strong and determined in the tackle, he showed maturity beyond his years. Has found playing alongside Bryan Robson a great learning experience and the gaffer

has now asked him for more "finesse." An England Under-19 cap it seems incredible that Jamie is not a regular in the Under-21 squad. Born: Stockton 16-2-74.

STEVE VICKERS - Central Defender. Tranmere Rovers picked Steve up from Spennymoor United in 1985 and blooded him in the League football against Northampton Town, in April 1986. Established himself as a regular the following season and he had played in 311 League games for Rovers before switching to 'Boro in 1993-94 for £700,000. Born: Bishop Auckland 13-10-67.

DEREK WHYTE - Central Defender. Strong stopper centre-half signed from Celtic for £900,000 in 1992 to plug the gap left when Tony Mowbray moved the other way in November 1991. Won honours with Celtic and was only 19 when he won the first of four Scotland caps against Belgium in 1988. Has only scored twice in some 100 games for 'Boro, his second goal being last October when 'Boro lost 5-1 at Luton Town. Born: Glasgow 31-8-68.

PAUL WILKINSON - Striker. Fifty goals in his first 150 League games for 'Boro tells its own story for "Wilko"has been harassing defences since he first put on his shooting boots with Grimsby Town in January 1983, his

debut being against Charlton. His consistency led to England Under-21 honours and a transfer to Everton in March 1985, but Paul did not settle at Goodison - his stats of 6 goals in 31 First Division appearances hardly doing him justice. In 1987 Paul moved to Nottingham Forest where he scored 5 in 34 before transferring to Watford. Netted 52 goals in 134 League games before a £500,000 move to Ayresome Park where he has topped the scoring chart in each of his three seasons - 60 goals in all. Born: 30-10-64

TOMMY WRIGHT - Forward. Plays a wide role supplying crosses of quality. Served his apprenticeship at Elland Road making his League bow v Fulham in April 1983. His 81 appearances for Leeds (24 goals) were all in the Second Division and in the summer of 1986 he moved to Oldham Athletic as an orthodox striker. In August 1989 Leicester paid £300,000 and played him on the left wing. Has now made some 60 appearances for Boro after £650,000 move in the summer 1992. Capped by Scotland at Under-21. Born: Dunfermline 10-1-66.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Player - Manager Bryan Robson

Middlesbrough couldn't have gone for a higher profile appointment than that of Bryan Robson, the man they brought in during the summer of 1994 to spearhead their ambitions to become a top class club.

"Robbo", who helped lead Manchester United to their first Championship success for 26-years was released by the Old Trafford club at the end of last season when they retained their title. A move that had several Premiership clubs seeking his playing services for this campaign. But the former England skipper decided to return to his native North East and take the reins at Ayresome Park as player-manager.

It is reported to be costing 'Boro a £1 million a year but the new boss has already made an impression both on and off the field as his team entered 1995 in poll position in the First Division Championship race.

Born at Witton Gilbert on January 11, 1957, it was back in September 1972 that Bryan joined the apprentice ranks at the Hawthorns. He had made his Football League debut at York on the 12 April 1975. At West Brom he came under the influence of Ron Atkinson and won his first England cap against Eire at Wembley in February 1980.

In October 1981 Atkinson made him Britain's costliest player when he invested £1.5 million to take him to Old Trafford. There Bryan struck up a memorable partnership with Ray Wilkins. The two captained both United and England.

"Robbo's" all action style, which saw him outting out an attack in his own area one moment then finishing off the counterattack at the other end in the next instant, made him a firm favourite at both the Club and International levels. He was unquestionably the outstanding midfield player of his generation winning 90 caps for England - captaining them in the 1982 and 1986 World Cup Finals - and scoring 73 goals in over 330 League appearances for United.

He became the first United skipper to lift the FA Cup three times and added a ECWC triumph to his many accolades.

His 26 goals for England ranks him sixth in the national side's scoring chart and of course Bryan was credited with the fastest goal ever in the World Cup Finals when he scored against in 27 seconds in 1982.

UNDER THE SPOTLICHT

Midfielder Clayton Blackmore

Just one year after a potential £600,000 move to Aberdeen, Bryan Robson picked up his former team-mate for free in August 1994. Clayton had been with Manchester United since November 1978, when he was signed as an Associated Schoolboy, and it was manager Ron Atkinson who gave him his League debut, at left-back, at Nottingham Forest on 16th May 1984.

Amazingly, after only two League appearances for United, Blackmore was capped by Wales in the summer of 1985 when he went on as a substitute at half-time against Norway. Mike England was manager of Wales at the time. It was the first of 38 full caps for the Principality. Prior to this he had won International honours for Wales at Schoolboy, Youth and Under-21 levels.

A good passer of the ball, he has an excellent football brain, reads the game well and possesses a thunderous shot. A versatile performer, Clayton operated in virtually every area of the field for United scoring 19 goals in 186 League appearances. During his time at Old Trafford, Manchester United won 2 Premiership titles, the F A Cup three times, the League Cup once, the European Cup Winners' Cup and the Super Cup.

Clayton picks out the 2-1 defeat of Barcelona in the 1991 European Winners' Cup Final as his personnel highlight of

a memorable career that is still far from over.

Just turned 30 his enthusiasm is as bright as ever. Still a great defender but capable of supporting the attack he has a great temperament and can be a cooling influence on the younger players



around him. Injuries have hampered his progress so far at Ayresome Park, limiting him to just 17 appearances before Christmas. Born: Neath 23-9-64.



After a week of hectic Cup action in both major domestic competitions it is back to the bread and butter of League action this weekend.

For Town of course this is the first game of 1995 in the First Division following the postponement of the home game with Sunderland. Middlesbrough got a game in and were 2-1 up against Barnsley at half-time when their match was abandoned. But for most teams in the League this is the second game of the New Year.

Whatever happened yesterday Middlesbrough will still go into this game with Town as League leaders. Wolves were four points behind going into their home game with Stoke City yesterday so even if they won they will still be a point short of Bryan Robson's team who now also have two games in hand.

Keith Scott, who scored in our 3-2 victory over Wolves, will have been looking to impress again, for his new Stoke City side.

Another point to mention is that Wolves will have played 14 games at home while 'Boro have only had 12 at Ayresome Park. So statistically the start to the new year couldn't be better for the leaders.

Sheffield United are the dark horses to emerge as serious promotion rivals. They were two goals up at Molineux, both scored by substitute Nathan Blake. But Wolves clawed back to draw from a John De Wolfe penalty and Neil Emblem header in the 93rd minute!

United manager Dave Bassett called it The Great Escape. "I thought they slipped Steve McQueen on," he quipped. Yesterday the Blades faced a difficult task against Millwall at Bramall Lane, and might well have wished they had Kirk Douglas to tame the rampant Lions.

Tranmere Rovers start their quest at Port Vale ten minutes after us this afternoon. They will probably need to do better than their goalless draw at Southend if they are to hold off Bolton Wanderers. Bolton moved alongside them on points in the New Year programmes when Simon Coleman scored the only goal against Reading from close range. Bruce Rioch's Cup aces were at Watford yesterday.

Reading of course have now filled their managerial position by putting Northern Ireland striker Jimmy Quinn and Mick Gooding in joint charge. They had lost just once in five games while looking after things following the departure of Mark McGhee to Leicester.

Yesterday they played for a sixth home win of the season against improving West Brom, who went in search of their first away League win of the season.

The Barnsley vs Luton scrap at Oakwell was an interesting one. The "Tykes" had crept up to seventh place over the holidays and are becoming a serious threat. But who knows what Luton Town will do, they are so inconsistent. Beaten seven times at home they went into the game boasting the best away record in the division with seven wins and four draws!




Watford's 0-0 draw at Ashton Gate increased Bristol City's relegation fears while Portsmouth hoisted out of the bottom four with a 2-0 home win over Burnley. Yesterday the two clashed at Fratton Park in what was possibly a nervous affair.



Both courses are being held indoors so please remember to bring trainers rather than your football boots.





Today, Nicky Hammond talks to Colin Benson.

Q. Well Nick, it must be great to get back into the first team?

A. Yes. It was a little bit of a surprise. I did not find out until an hour before the kick-off at Oldham.

Q. Can you be prepared enough with such short notice?

A. I think what we have found since the new boss arrived is that no matter what position you play, and whether you played last time out or not, everyone in the squad prepares to play in the forthcoming game. So come Saturday at two o'clock you wait for the team sheet to go up and hope your name is selected.

But everyone within the squad knows what they have to do within the team should they be selected and I was ready for it.

Q. After what was a dismal year for you in regard to selection it is a great start to 1995 isn't it?

A. That's right. It had been a difficult year for me and the team as well. But we got a good point at Oldham which isn't the easiest place to go.

I was very pleased with my performance particularly as I was a little short of match practice. I had not played too often in the Reserves of late because their fixtures clashed with those of the first team, so taking this into consideration it was good to get that one under my belt.

Q. Outfield players rightly make a lot of match fitness, claiming that they lose their edge if not given regular first team games. It has to be the same for goalkeepers where reflexes and response are so critical. Can you have your playing skills and keep them that sharp, when you are not playing?

A. There is no problem on basic-stopping. This is the basis of our everyday work so we practice these skills daily. It is the decision making and communication with other defenders that becomes flat when you are not regularly active.

I had a couple of games in the Anglo Italian Cup earlier in the season and when I came back I felt good. So I knew mentally I could turn myself back on when I was in the first team. But it is true to say it is a million miles away from sitting on the sidelines or even playing in the Reserves.

Q. The League leaders Middlesborough present a formidable examination?


A. Yes, they do but it is going to be a great game to play in. They are undoubtedly, in my mind, the side to beat this season and I think anyone who finishes above them will be the Champions.

Q. If all goes to plan we will have two ex-Arsenal goalkeepers facing up to each other from opposite ends this afternoon?

A. Alan Miller. I know Alan very well. He has done superbly well since he moved up to Ayresome Park. I am pleased for him because he was a long time in the shadows of John Lukic and David Seaman and now he has the opportunity to show what he can really do.

Arsenal are a good club to be at particularly for goalkeepers and it can be a little frustrating when you can't get in the side. You can only be play one goalkeeper and we don't have the flexibility that many outfield players have to get into the side in another shirt.

A. I think we are beginning to look a little tighter at the back, and hopefully this will remain so. We have brought lan Culverhouse in and he is going to be a superb acquisition.

We know we had to tighten up defensively. It has always been a problem with us. It was a problem earlier this season; it was a problem last season and a problem the season we got promoted even.

We played as a team and have always been a very open attacking unit scoring goals but unfortunately letting them in as well. In the last two seasons we have let too many goals in it is as simple as that. So we have to plug the gaps without detracting from our attacking force.

Q. Having won back your jersey the onus is now on you to keep your place and it is probably a little more difficult here than it is at most places as Fraser Digby is another first class candidate?

A. It has always been the same at Swindon. You know when you are in the side you have to play your best or you are out. We all have periods when we are on top form and periods when we are a little off. You just have to make sure the off days are really limited.

Q. Do you get nervous before a game?

A. Yes, yes. I always have that sickly feeling in the stomach on the morning of a game and when I stop getting that feeling it will be the time to start worrying. It shows you are hyped up and ready to go. You need that touch of nervous tension.

If all had been well we could have seen two of England's most competitive midfield generals in opposition this afternoon. Alas, the broken arm sustained by Steve McMahon at Oldham Athletic over the holidays denies all Swindon fans that stimulating pleasure.

It's a great shame, for McMahon versus Robson has always been a top of the bill tussle within a battle. The two have clashed many a time in Liverpool v Manchester United fixtures and more recently in the big Manchester derby games. It is the clash of the titans, two midfield men with a singular ambition, undeniable commitment, and that indefinable quality that makes them able to transfer their enthusiasm to those around them.

They are born leaders and their transition towards the managerial seat is a natural progression. The fact is that both have accepted one of the hardest challenges in League football - that of player-manager.

It can be done, there are countless examples of success over the years, but it is a great strain on an individuals resources particularly if results are not too kind.

Glenn Hoddle managed to mix the two roles with great results in his stint at the County Ground. The run to promotion to the Premiership and that magnificent climax at Wembley in the Play-Off Final with Leicester City was his crowning glory. But would the former England star have persevered as a player so long had we been going through a sticky patch?

Perhaps not. When the going gets tough the tendency is for player bosses to put all their concentration into the managerial side and consequently they drift out of the playing arena. It is probably not the intention at first, but once they rest themselves the rest turns into a sustained period, then to the ultimate... hanging up of the boots.

This happened to Mick McCarthy at Millwall. Mick captained the Republic of Ireland in the 1990 World Cup Finals and was still being selected for International squads by Jack Charlton when he stopped playing. At first he was out through injury but his expected return to the Lions side never materialised as he struggled to steer Millwall back on course after a tricky period.


Once the urgency of getting back into the side has gone everything tends to slip. Managerial concerns overlap those of the player in the man and eventually the physical condition goes and the confidence to keep going at such a high level dissolves into the abyss of administration.

One can sense that happening at Loftus Road where Bryan Robson's former midfield partner, for both England and Manchester United, Ray Wilkins has assumed the player-manager title. Ray is now very much the man leaning up against the dug-out. It will be a great loss to the game if he doesn't soon pull on a shirt, tie up his boots and get out there and play.

Equally, it would be a great shame if Bryan Robson and Steve McMahon are tempted, by circumstances, to terminate their playing roles prematurely. There is always plenty of advice suggesting they are fools to attempt the impossible by trying to combine the two jobs and naturally players of senior years are consciously more concerned with their futures than the present.

Yet once those boots are hung out to dry there is no coming back. The managerial chairs will still be there of course no matter what.

As far as Middlesbrough are concerned they could have two of their management team on the pitch for Viv Anderson is still registered as a player. Now Viv is 38 years old but I saw him playing last season for Barnsley and he was man of the match - 20 years after he had come into football with Nottingham Forest. It all goes to show there is no substitute for TALENT.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW? Peter Coyne By MIKE SKINNER

Few players can say they scored a hat-trick for England - but Peter Coyne can claim two! As a 15 year-old, back in 1974, Peter grabbed three against both France and West Germany which soon earned him an apprenticeship with Manchester United.

At 17, he made his League debut for United at Villa Park. "I didn't know I would be playing until one o'clock on the day of the match", recalls Peter. "Tommy Doc came into the dressing room and told me I was sub. I remember going on at a Villa free-kick. Andy Gray scored and we lost 2-I!"

Peter's first and only full game for the Reds was at Leicester two months later. "It was a week before the Cup Final and some of the lads were rested", said Peter, who scored but, as at Villa, ended up on the losing side again. Less than twelve months later, in March 1977, Peter was released and played a few games for Ashton United before he quickly realised that he had much to offer at League level.

The first came from Old Trafford old boy Harry Gregg, then in charge at Fourth Division Crewe. Peter clearly enjoyed himself at Gresty Road, finishing top goalscorer there in three out of four seasons. But, following Harry's departure in 1981, there was a major reshuffle of the playing pack and Peter once again left the League scene.

And again Peter joined a Cheshire County League Club, Hyde United, helping them to become the last ever champions. In his first season at Ewen Fields, they did a League and Cup treble and gained promotion to the Northern Premier League.

Peter had been without regular employment while at Hyde but was about to fix himself up with a job in the Post Office when he received a telephone call from Lou Macari, who had just been appointed manager at Swindon. "I was caught in two minds as to what to do", said Peter, "but it took me about ten seconds to decide!" And he was soon on his way south.

Only Colin Gordon found the net more frequently for the Town than Peter in 1984/85 and in the Championship season that followed Peter collected another 14. Charlie Henry's 18 might have been under threat had Peter not suffered a stomach strain which kept him out of action for two months of the season.

It was Peter's two goals which gave Swindon an opening day victory at Bolton to start off their Third Division campaign and his last of the season at Ashton Gate prevented City from joining Town in the Play-Offs. He stayed on at The County Ground for a further two years, although his appearances in the Second Division were few.

When Mr. Macari left in the summer of 1989, Peter's days here were numbered and he went to Aldershot on loan. But a permanent move failed to materialise and he instead had the opportunity to return to the North West to sign for Colne Dynamoes in the HFS Loans League. "They were ahead by a mile and had it won by Christmas," said Peter. But further progress, to the Vauxhall Conference, was not to happen. "Their ground wasn't up to standard. The chairman, who was a multi-millionaire, just pulled out and we were all left high and dry".

Nowadays Peter, 36, works both on and off the field with his brother Ged, once on Manchester City's books. During the week they look after security at Manchester Airport and on Saturdays assist Glossop North End - where Ged is manager - in the North West Counties League.

About six or seven weeks ago, before Wolves started to slide, I picked Middlesbrough out as the team I thought would win the First Division title this season - they seemed the more complete unit - so it is no surprise to me that they come here today as the League leaders.

I had Terry Venables with me for our match when they played Wolves, and he is here again with me today. Terry was impressed with Hignett on the day. And obviously John Hendrie has played very very well for them whenever they have been on television, so he's one for Swindon fans to look out for as well.

I suppose coming from where I do - I'm an Oxford fan and we have been since my dad took me there as a six-year-old -'I know what it is like to support a team at the other end of the table. Last season when Oxford were looking at the trap door everybody said we were too good to go down but in the end we dropped out of the First Division. It's a little warning for Swindon that once you get into a rut it is a hell of a job to get out.

You have come down one division and have not won many games this season so you are going to have to turn it around and turn it around quite quickly. Again, going back to Oxford we lost games 2-1 and 1-0 which everyone said we shouldn't have lost. Then in the end you go and it is a nasty old swamp down there.

I was at your match against Marlow last week and was highly delighted you won. I live quite near Marlow and my

life has not been very comfortable since Oxford got beaten by them. But I must admit having seen Marlow play here I can see how they beat Oxford.

Though I support Oxford I remember living there when they had the great days down here. The Ernie Hunt days, the Mike Summerbee days; Stan Harland. That was a fantastic team, a great great team, and I'm not one of the Oxford supporters that hate Swindon. I hope Swindon stay in Division One and that we have derby games with you next season. To redress the balance a bit I sponsored Joey Beauchamp during his three years at Oxford and it is quite unusual for someone to move from Oxford to Swindon. I know Joey took a somewhat roundabout route but he got here.

Steve McMahon is going to find it very hard not to be out there mixing it and putting things right this afternoon. You don't see too many managers wearing shorts on the touch-line on a January afternoon as he was last Saturday. I think the hardest part for Steve is seeing things happen that he knows he could have done better - wishing to do everything himself if you like. I think it is devilishly difficult job being a player-manager.

Personally I think you have to do one or the other - I've always thought that. Playing and management are both very hard jobs in themselves and combining both is so difficult to get right. But of course Glenn Hoddle has done it here and he has carried it off successfully and off the pitch I have always been impressed by Steve.

I remember once in the 1990 World Cup Finals when England played The Republic of Ireland in Cagliari and Steve's error gave the Irish their goal in a I-I draw. When you might have expected him to turn away and hide he was quite happy to come on television and talk to me about it. I have always taken the view you learn more about people by the way they react when things are going badly rather than well and Steve got a big tick in my book that day.

I think he might have a few days here when things don't go according to plan where those sort of experiences will stand him in good stead. And I hope he does well. I really do hope he does because he has always given everything as a player and I would like if anyone can combine the two jobs it will be a fellow like Steve.

Bryan Robson is also a player-manager but he has not played that much this season. I know he has been out with injury but that might have helped him a little bit. I'm sure he would accept that the hardest part for two world-class players, as they are, is the frustration of seeing things happen from the side line






