

In the League meeting earlier this season at Burnden Park, Bolton won 3-0 with goals from Coleman, Thompson and De Freitas. The return fixture was due to be played yesterday (11th February).

BOLTON WANDERERS

The reputation of Bolton Wanderers as Cup specialists is well documented. A Football League club from the inception of this institution in 1888, the Wanderers have earned their greatest rewards from the glory of the Cup.

During the dark days, when they bounced up and down between the two top divisions they reached the FA Cup semi-final twelve times; twice finalists before the first world war - they lost at Everton to Notts County in 1894 and to Manchester City at Crystal Palace in 1904, both by only one goal; and then of course in 1923 they opened Wembley Stadium in that most memorable Cup Final when they beat West Ham United before a huge crowd of 126,047!

Two more successful visits to Wembley in 1926 and 1929, to gain revenge over Manchester City, and then defeat Portsmouth inscribed the club's name in the history of this most revered competition and they were back again in 1953 when, handicapped by an injury, they were then bamboozled by the mercurial wizardry of Stanley Matthews, who inspired Blackpool to a thrilling 4-3 victory.

Finally, Wembley was the stage again in 1958, when eleven home-grown players who cost the club a grand total of £110 signing on fees, beat Manchester United to lift the FA Cup for the fourth time. Not a bad record for a club that started out as a Sunday School outfit in 1874,

The League Cup was not in existence in those glorious years when Bolton Wanderers were a serious threat to all-comers and their recent history has seen them unable to recapture the glorious days of yesteryear when they were a feared and

well respected First Division club. Yet despite their sojourn in the Third Division and their struggles to climb back up the League, the Wanderers have again become one of the most feared Cup fighters in the business.

Most of their success as giant-killers has been achieved in the FA Cup — they have won through to the fifth round in each of the past three seasons when they entered the competition in round one. Amongst their victims have been Liverpool, beaten 2-0 in a replay at Anfield after drawing 2-2 at Burnden Park. Then last

season they overcame three Premiership giants in Everton (3-2), again in a replay away; Arsenal, 3-1 at Highbury after a 2-2 draw at Burnden Park; and Aston Villa 1-0... It was modest Oldham Athletic who stopped the Trotters in their tracks in the sixth round.

This season Bolton have enjoyed a similar vein of giant-killing in the Coca-Cola Cup. They had too much fizz for ailing Ipswich Town, thrashing them 3-0 at Portman Road in the first-leg of their Second Round tie - Jason McAteer, John McGinlay and Alan Thompson delivering the knock-out blows.

The second-leg was a formality, Richard Sneekes scoring the only goal to make it a 4-0 aggregate whitewash of the

Premiership side.

In the Third Round Bolton won 2-I at Sheffield United and their incredible away Cup form continued at West Ham United where the Wanderers disposed of the Hammers quite comfortably by 3-I. John McGinlay scored twice, once from the penalty spot, and David Lee claimed the other.

A third Premiership scalp was taken at Burnden Park, where Norwich City became the ninth team from the English elite to

perish in a Cup tie to the Bolton side moulded by Bruce Rioch and his assistant Colin Todd. It took just one goal, a spectacular rising shot from David Lee in the 66th minute.

So we meet this afternoon in the first-leg of the Coca-Cola Cup semi-final. To the winners the prize of a Wembley Final against either Liverpool or Crystal Palace. We are aware of the Wanderers fine away form in Cup competition and can only hope that the form-book, which seems to suggest that Bolton prefer playing Premiership teams rather than those from their own division - they went out of the FA Cup this season at Portsmouth - holds true.

BOLTON WANDERERS AND CO



KEITH BRANAGAN - Goalkeeper. Has been with the Wanderers since July 1992 when he left Millwall. Keith began his career with Cambridge United, making his Football League bow in January 1984, in a 2-0 home defeat by Carlisle United. In five years at the Abbey Stadium he clocked up 110 League games before a £110,000 transfer to Millwall in 1988. Served under manager Bruce Rioch at the Den, where he made 46 League appearances, and followed him to Burnden Park. Was an ever-present for Bolton in 1992-93 but missed most of last season through injury. Born: Fulham 10-1-66.

SIMON COLEMAN - Central Defender. Signed from Sheffield Wednesday in October 1994 for £350,000, he is well known to manager Bruce Rioch who had him under his wing at Ayresome Park. Simon commenced his career with Mansfield Town, enjoying two full seasons in their senior team, before Middlesbrough parted with £400,000 to secure his services in 1989. Derby County signed him two years later and he moved on to Sheffield Wednesday last season. Born: Worksop 13-3-68.

OWEN COYLE = Forward. Joined Bolton from Airdrie for £250,000 – the fee set by a tribunal – during the summer of 1993. Previously gained experience with Dumbarton and Clydebank before moving to Airdrie in February 1990. Whilst at Broomfield Park, Owen set a Scottish record by netting three successive hat-tricks. Made his Republic of Ireland International debut against Holland in 1993-94, having already picked up Under-21 and B honours. Scored 7 goals in 30 League appearances for Wanderers in 1993-94. Born: Paisley 14-7-66.

AIDAN DAVISON - Goalkeeper, Like Branagan, made the trip to Burnden Park from Millwall, moving for £25,000 in July 1993. Aidan learned his trade with Spennymoor United and Billingham Synthonia before being given a chance of League football by Notts County, but was on the wrong end of a 3-0 defeat at Preston, in April 1989. It was his only appearance for County. He went on loan as cover at Leyton Orient, Chester and Blackpool without getting a game. Bury signed him but released him in the summer of 1991 without making an appearance and it was with Millwall where he enjoyed his best spell with 33 League appearances. Played three further games on loan to Derby. Born: Sedgefield 11-5-68.

FABIAN DE FREITAS - Striker. Dutch Under-21 International star who cost Bolton a club record £400,000 to sign from Dutch First Division side Volendam in August 1994. Stands six-feet-one and made his Football League debut at Middlesbrough on August 27,1994. His first goal in English football was netted against Swindon Town on November 1, 1994, but Fabian is still trying to adjust to the English game. Born: Paramaribo 28-7-72.

SCOTT GREEN - Midfield. Joined Bolton in March 1990 for a fee of £50,000 from Derby County, having failed to make the breakthrough into the senior side at the Baseball Ground. Made his 150th appearance for the Wanderers at the start of this season and has scored 20 goals for the club. Can also operate as a centre-forward when required. Born: Walsall 15-1-70.


DAVID LEE - Midfield. Former Blackburn Schools star he served his apprenticeship with Bury, making the first of his 208 league appearances for them at Chesterfield in August 1985. Six years later Southampton acquired his services and he made his debut in the top League against Leeds United in August 1991. Transferred

> to Bolton in December 1992, after a successful loan stint, for £275,000. Plays a wide role and scored 5 goals in 41 League games last season. Born: Whitefield 5-11-67.

> JASON LYDIATE - Central Defender, Arrived at Burnden Park from Manchester United towards the close of the 1991-92 season, making his League debut in the last game of the season - a 3-1 home win over Stoke City. Played five League games in 1993-94 and was in the side that drew 3-3 at Grimsby on the opening day of this season. Born: Manchester 29-10-71

> JASON McATEER - Midfield. Came from the relative obscurity of non-League football with Marine to become an International star. Was a regular in the Bolton "stiffs" until February 1993 when he established himself in the first team. Had made his Football League debut the previous November. Good club form led to a call-up by Jack Charlton and Jason made his International bow for The Republic of Ireland against Russia at Lansdowne Road in March 1994. Two months later he was on his way to the USA and following the World Cup Finals he had stretched his International caps to nine. Born: Birkenhead 18-6-71.

MIXU PAATELAINEN Striker, Finnish International striker with a big reputation. Bolton signed him from Aberdeen for £350,000 in the summer of 1994. Began his career with Valkeakosken Haka and arrived in Britain in 1987 to play for Dundee United. Was five seasons at Tannadice Park, scoring 33 goals in 133 Scottish League games. Joined Aberdeen in March 1992 and in his one full season scored 20 goals for the Dons to register a final impressive return of 23 goals in 75 Scottish League outings. Mixu has some 40 caps for Finland. Born: Helsinki 3-2-67.

MARK PATTERSON - Midfield. An apprentice at Ewood Park, Mark made his debut for Blackburn in the Second Division, a 6-0 defeat at Manchester City in September 1983. Netted 10 goals in 26 League appearances in 1985-86 but then withdrew to a deeper midfield role. In June 1988 he moved to Preston and in February 1990 was transferred to Bury for £80,000, where he made 42 League appearances. In January 1991 Bolton paid £65,000 for his services and he has now made over 150 appearances for the Trotters. Born: Darwen 24-5-65.

Another former Middlesbrough fullback, Jimmy joined them in March 1990 from Rangers for £250,000. Started his career though at Burnden Park, turning pro in 1983 and making 108 appearances before switching to Rangers in 1986. Played just 25 Scottish League games before Oxford gained his services for £110,000 in August 1988. Returned to Bolton in July 1993 for £300,000 and has now made a further 70 League appearances for the Trotters. Born: Bolton 8-2-66.



RICHARD SNEEKES - Midfield. A bargain buy at £175,000 last summer from Dutch Second Division club Fortuna Sittard. Began his career with Ajax where he made his debut at 16, alongside the likes of Van Basten, Koeman and Rijkaard. Was five years with them before signing with FC Vollendam. A year on and he was with Fortuna. They loaned him to the Swiss Second Division club Locarno for the 1993-94 season and Richard scored 13 goals for them in 26 appearances. Has won representative honours with Holland. Made his Football League debut as a sub at Grimsby 13-8-94; and has scored 6 goals this season. Born: Amsterdam 30-10-68.

ALAN STUBBS - Central Defender. Turned pro with Bolton in 1990 and has developed into an England "B" International-making his debut as a sub against Northern Ireland at Hillsborough in May 1994. Made his League debut against Bradford in September 1990 and has now over 150 games to his credit. Born: Kirkby 6-10-71.

ALAN THOMPSON - Midfield. Was 17 when Newcastle United introduced him to League football in November 1991. A left-sided player he cost Bolton £250,000 in the summer of 1993 and scored 6 goals in 27 League games in 1993-94. Born: Newcastle 22-12-73.



Manager Bruce Rioch

Bruce Rioch is once again emphasising his undoubtable managerial skills as he hones Bolton into one of the best Cup fighting sides in the country.

The son of a regimental sergeant major, Bruce has always been a strong disciplinarian, and his teams are consequently well organised and drilled on set-piece routines.

Born in Aldershot, in September 1947, he emerged as a very competitive and talented player and served an apprenticeship with Luton Town. Developed into an outstanding wing-half who could win the ball, pass it, dribble with it and shoot. Indeed. Bruce scored 47 goals in 149 League games for the Hatters and he was in their Fourth Division Championship side of 1968.

In July 1969 Aston Villa snapped him up and Bruce did not let them down scoring 34 goals in 154 League games in the claret and blue. Collected a runners-up trophy in the League Cup in 1971 (against Spurs).

Derby County was the next port of call and another 34 goals in 106 League games - as he helped the Rams win the League title - was followed by 3 in 30 for Everton (1976-77); 4 in 41 for Derby again (1977-79); and 6 in 71 League outings with Torquay United (1980-83).

Bruce also played on loan for Birmingham City and Sheffield United as well as in the USA with Seattle Sounders. He won 24 caps for Scotland being in their 1978 World Cup Finals squad.

Began his managerial career with Torquay, where he took over as player-manager in 1980, and in February 1985 was installed as manager of Middlesbrough. Led them from Division Three to Division One with successive promotions in 1987 and 1988.

Took charge of Millwali in May 1990 after being axed by 'Boro just two weeks before the Ayresome Park club were to appear in their first ever Wembley final in the Zenith Data Systems Cup. Was sacked by Millwall and took over at Bolton in May 1992.

In his first season at Burnden Park Mr Rioch led the Wanderers to promotion from Division Two and in 1994 took them to the sixth round of the FA Cup - the club's best performance in that competition since 1959. And this season of course they are into the semi-final of the Coca-Cola Cup.

UNDER THE SPOTLICHT

Striker John McGinlay

An interesting character who finished 1993-94 as the First Division's leading scorer with 33 goals in all competitions and not surprisingly heads the Wanderers scorechart again this season.

Yet a few years ago he seemed to be going nowhere in particular as he toiled to establish his place in the blue shirt of Millwall.

John had come into football with Elgin City where he was spotted and given a chance by Shrewsbury Town. After a somewhat unspectacular start to his League career John suddenly blossomed, displaying all the instincts of a natural striker. His climax at Gay Meadow being the season of 1989-90 when he topped the Shrews scoring list with 26 goals!

This took his record to 27 goals in 60 League games for the Shropshire club and alerted Bury, who quickly recruited him onto the Gigg Lane staff. Nine goals in 25 League outings was all he had time for before hard-up Bury were forced to accept Millwall's cheque for £65,000 on the transfer deadline day, in March 1991.

John first stepped out for the Lions against the Tigers of Hull City, on the 16th April 1991, and he ended that campaign with one goal in two games. The young Scot didn't seem to be settling too well at The Den though his statistics for the season of 1991-92, of eight goals in 25 League appearances were a fair return.

He was in the starting line for the 1992-93 campaign and scored on the opening day in a 3-1 defeat at Watford. A second goal in a 2-1 win over Swindon, was his last for the Lions, who sold him to Bolton Wanderers for £125,000, in October 1992.



This semi-final tie between Town and Bolton Wanderers guarantees a First Division club a place in the Final of the Coca-Cola Cup for the third time in six years.

The winners, of course, meet either Liverpool, the odds -on favourites, or Crystal Palace at Wembley on April 2.

For Town boss Steve McMahon a Liverpool vs Swindon Final would be a dream come true. Steve appeared in three Wembley Finals for Liverpool but would not be able to play in this one, should it happen, as he was Cuptied earlier in the competition with Manchester City.

Town are also former winners of this competition, collecting the League Cup against all odds, when we beat Arsenal at Wembley in 1969. On that occasion we were barred from participating in the UEFA Cup competition the following season because we were a Third Division outfit.

However, the Football League have confirmed that if either Swindon or Bolton were to win the Coca-Cola Cup this year then we would be allowed to enter the UEFA Cup next season.

So who will be waiting to take on Town or Wanderers?

Logic must favour Liverpool who remain 4-6 favourites to win the competition for a record fifth time. But to reach the Final they must avoid a repeat of what happened the last time they met Crystal Palace in the semi-finals.

That memorable occasion, at Villa Park, was in 1990 in the FA Cup when Liverpool were undoubtedly the best team in the country and Palace a side struggling to establish itself under manager Steve Coppell.

When Liverpool went one-up it seemed a formality but Palace came back from that set back to win one of the most exciting FA Cup semi-finals of all time 4-3.

It was the classic Cup fairytale and of course is not the first time Liverpool have come undone when facing opposition they are expected to wipe the floor with. The name Wimbledon is forever emblazed across the history of Liverpool following their "impossible" FA Cup Final triumph over the Reds at Wembley in 1988. The only goal of the game scored by Lawrie Sanchez, who made seven Premiership appearances for us towards the end of last season.

Such shocks are soul food for the Cup spirit but this time Palace have to meet Liverpool over two legs and

in this situation the likelihood of an upset becomes even more remote. Rogue results have been part and parcel of the game since its inception but over two matches one must favour the class team.

Mind you, give Palace their due they too thrive on Cup football. The Londoners had not scored in the League since November 5, when they hit four past Manchester City without reply, in the quarter-final. They then had the incredible record of having scored only 15 goals in the Premiership against 17 goals in six Cup ties.

Palace have beaten Wimbledon, Aston Villa and Manchester City en route and could it be that manager Alan Smith has found the secret of inspiring the killer punch? He revealed their victory over Manchester City.



Whether Palace can find a knock-out punch to send a heavyweight such as Liverpool crashing is doubtful. All the same the money's still firmly on the Reds. How can you bet against a team that boasts the darting menace of lan Rush, Robbie Fowler and Steve McManaman?

It was Rush's goal that put paid to Arsenal in the quarter-final and having overpowered Blackburn Rovers at Ewood Park in the previous round nobody can accuse Liverpool of an easy because it has to be Liverpool vs —— in the Final



Lawrie Sanchez - winner against Liverpool at Wembley









Bolton Wanderers have a proud and enviable tradition in football that has been established through their glorious Cup tradition.

The Trotters best ever finish in the top League, the old First Division, is third - a position they have attained three times in 1891-92, 1920-21 and 1924-25; so like us their greatest glories have been lived through the magic of Cup success.

It is in the FA Cup that Bolton have really made their mark as winners four times and runners-up on three occasions.

The Wanderers first Cup triumph came in 1923 when they beat the Hammers in that famous "White Horse Final," the first ever to be staged at Wembley. Bolton won 2-0 that memorable afternoon and three years later the Lancashire side were back again to beat Manchester City 1-0.

Winners again in 1929, when they defeated Portsmouth 2-0, Bolton fans had to wait until 1958 for their next and last success, a 2-0 Wembley win over the firm favourites Manchester United.

Nat Lofthouse, was captain that day, an inspirational leader. Two minutes into the game he fired in a cross to give Bolton the lead. It demoralised United who came closest to equalising when Bobby Charlton crashed a thunderous shot against an upright. Within minutes Lofthouse had replied when he charged goalkeeper Harry Gregg and the ball over the line.

Such a goal would not be permitted today and honest Nat admits that even then it was a foul. But he got away with it and clinched the Cup for Bolton Wanderers.

Lofthouse was a powerful, absolutely fearless, striker. He was the archetype English centre-forward able to shoot powerfully with both feet and knock in headers with the power of a cannon. He made the greatest use of his physical robustness and was the master at exploiting any split-seconds of indecision or imbalance shown by an opposing defender.

In a career which spanned two decades he rattled in 285 goals in 503 senior games for the Wanderers - 255 of them in the First Division.

"I played all my football in the First Division, so never got to play at Swindon," says Nat.


He adds: "I always tried my hardest in every game but whenever we went to London I always tried to put in just a little more as I thought that maybe some of the England selectors maybe watching. Whether it had any significance I don't know but I always said to myself, 'have a good game here Lofty'."

The man who was dubbed "The Lion of Vienna" after scoring twice in England's 3-2 win over the classical Austrians in May 1952, scored 30 goals for England in just 32 appearances. None were so brave as that winner in Vienna when he broke from the halfway line, rode a desperate collision with the Austrian goalkeeper, and drove on to tuck the ball in the net.

I'd love to be playing today," says Nat, who will be here this afternoon as President of Bolton Wanderers. "The game has changed a lot. I don't think a lot of strategy was used in my day. I can remember at times coming out to train and spending a whole hour lapping Burnden Park. Then they would give us twenty minutes bodywork and then throw us the ball. But by that time we were too bloody tired to do anything with it."

Lofthouse was the greatest of Bolton Wanderers' famous centre-forwards a tradition that still holds today. The current number nine might not have a Lancashire birthright, and the same insatiable hunger for goals as did Nat, but times have changed and Mixu Paatelainen, the Finnish national striker, who has struck up a great understanding with John McGinlay Scotland's current first choice leader of the line, has brought a fresh dimension to the centre-forward role.

And in Fabian de Freitas, a Dutch Under-21 International, and Republic of Ireland striker Owen Coyle, Bolton have plenty of back-up for their leading role. Such is the situation at Burnden Park where attack has always been the strength of their reputation... but there will never be another Nat Lofthouse OBE.

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

"initial reaction?

NICKY HAMMOND:

A. Delighted. We knew it was going to be a battle with Millwall and everyone was psyched up for it. They were all absolutely fantastic.

Q. What about that fantastic save you made from lan Dawes at 0-0?

A. Yes. It is a good job I didn't cut my nails this morning because the ball just caught the ends of my fingers - just enough to take it past the post.

But I am very very pleased. Delighted for the Club and the supporters who were magnificent tonight.

Q. Who would you fancy in the semi-final?

A. Anyone, anyone.

MARK ROBINSON:

A. Obviously delighted. It gives us a great chance of possibly getting to Wembley. We have a lot of work to do in the League before then but obviously I'm absolutely delighted. The lads are over the moon, and hopefully we can take this on to Sunday's game with Middlesbrough.

Q. What was your best moment tonight?

A. Well the first two goals were top quality. The passing for the first goal was as good as I have seen all season and obviously Jan's individualism was there for all to see.

ANDY MUTCH:

Q. Two great goals. Which gave you most personal satisfaction?

A. I think the first one really gave me most pleasure because beside it being quite a good move having just got back into the side I needed a goal or two to get my confidence back.

Jan's playing absolutely fantastically up front. He is getting goals from everywhere. That second goal was tremendous. That was the highlight for everybody.

I suppose Jan's free-kick towards the end was nice - a bit of entertainment. We were in a comfortable position - when you are three goals up you can try things like that which is nice.

But I think more importantly everybody is pleased about our commitment to the game and we got the win to get us into the semi-finals.

Q. You were so close to a hat-trick as well weren't you!

A. I was close yes. I would have been happy with one goal tonight but could have had three.

Q. Were you unsighted for the cross?

A. When the ball actually came across I thought the defender was going to toe it so I anticipated the ball was going a bit wider. As it happens he missed the ball completely so I had to check my run and obviously took the ball a little too wide then, which was a little bit unfortunate.

But at the end of the day I would have been happy just to have scored one goal tonight so to get two makes me even more pleased. So I am happy with that really.

Q. Anyone you prefer in the semi-finals?

A. I'd rather not have Liverpool if we can help it because obviously they are playing very well. It would be nice to play them in the Final and now that we have come this far that is a realistic chance over two-legs. Obviously we are not getting too excited but I think everyone is very pleased with what happened tonight.

LUC NIJHOLT:

A. To be honest I think we played like a team tonight and did very well.

Even when we came out for the second-half we knew it was all going our way because everyone was tuned in. We played very well I think.

Q. Millwall had a lot of possession second-half and put us under a bit of pressure?

A. Yeah, but you expect that. We were two up they had to go for it. We said in the dressing room the only thing they can do is come out and compete, battle for the next fifteen, twenty minutes, and if we survive that there is no problem. And we did and we actually scored a good third goal, and that was it.

Q. What was your personal highlight from this game?

A. Finishing the game. I got a knock on my hamstring in the first half and thought I would have to come off. I tried it for another ten minutes and that ten minutes became another ten minutes and all of a sudden it was 90-minutes. So I was very pleased with that.

I said to the doctor I wanted an injection at half-time but he refused because he said if he did it would pull the whole thing. He told me either I play with it or come off. So I decided to stay on and am glad I did. It worked well for us.

KEVIN HORLOCK:

A. What can you say. I thought the lads did well, stuck with it and battled through. It wasn't the prettiest game in the world but we defended well and scored three great goals.

The first two were absolutely brilliant, Mutchy got two and though the second was a tap-in I am sure he will be as happy with that as he was with the first one which was really spectacular.

But it was a brilliant night. We are in the semis now with everything to play for.

Q. You seemed to play at a much higher tempo tonight than you did against Marlow on Saturday?



A. Yes, it sometimes goes like that. Though the Marlow game was a big one there was a little more tension tonight. Our main priority is to get up the League because we don't want to be stuck in the relegation zone. But it was a break tonight and the lads went out there and were brilliant. We would now like to carry this performance on and get three points on Sunday against Middlesbrough.

Q. Of the other three sides who would you prefer in the semi-final?

Q. Paul, another great game?

A. Yes it was. It was sort of billed that way really - sort of getting away from the League games - and I think the performance from the Swindon players especially was tremendous. It all went right on the day.

Q. You must have been pleased with your important part in the first goal?

A. Yes it was a good move down the left and Joey and Jan did well. Joey got the final great cross in and Mutchy coming in, running right across the face, has finished it ever so well.

Then of course Jan's taken over really with the second goal. That was unbelievable.

I think the way we played defensively as a team today there was no real way they were going to get back in from two-nil down. They did put us under a lot of pressure and knocked a lot of balls in behind us. But they had nothing to lose and got a great cross in for Dave Mitchell to score on his return.

That was a bit disappointing but I think when we were 3-0 up it was a bit difficult to keep defending as we did. But the important thing is we won and we are in the hat for the semi-final draw.


Q. You seemed to go up one or two gears on the Marlow performance?

I think for a striker and a goal scorer it is so important to show other sides of yourself as a football player and I think that is the main difference this year. I have improved my all-round game.

Q. This will be your first semi-final in English football?

A. Yes. It was my first quarter-final as well. I lost three Cup Finals in Austria so it would be nice to get to Wembley and collect a winners' medal.

Q. Which of the other three teams left would you fancy most in the semi-finals?

A. I don't know. You can't tell which team will get the best out of us. Suddenly you play Liverpool and you could be happy with that draw because they could get the best out of you. We have nothing to lose so we will have a go at whoever it is.

I think the key to our success over Millwall was the team performance. Okay, you can say the three goals came out of skill but you don't get those chances if you don't put in the team effort as well.

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
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Helping the game

The former England International striker, who starred with Chelsea, Milan, Spurs and West Ham United, before becoming a TV pundit has his say on the Coca-Cola Cup.



I have always felt that this trophy should actually be played for and completed in the first half of the season with the Final taking place at Wembley on New Year's Day.

As it is it gets lost in the mists of all the other competitions such as the FA Cup, replays, and of course the run-up to the Championships and Play-Off Finals.

I happen to think that the Coca-Cola Cup is a very important competition for obvious reasons. You play the Final at Wembley, it is a great revenue puller; you get your home and away semi-final, and it gets you into Europe.

I have always felt that, over the last few years in particular, the Coca-Cola Cup Finals have been better than the FA Cup Finals. There is probably a little less tension on the day and because it is played a little bit earlier in the season, before everyone is knackered, I think the players are able to give more of their best.

For a long time I have been of the opinion that we should adopt a schedule on the lines of the Scottish League Cup which is got out of the way earlier in the season. And I don't mean that unkindly, perhaps it is the wrong phrase getting it out of the way. But the

Coca-Cola Cup should be a trophy that is played for in the first half of the season with the climax, the Final, staged on something like Boxing Day, or New Year's Day which would be perfect.

This would give the public, and the teams, and people in football, something in the middle of the season at a time when everything else is in limbo.

I mean, no one knows who is going to win the League in January. There is plenty of speculation but there are still 20-odd games to go and it would be a lovely little boost for the game if the Final of this particular trophy was played at the turn of the year.

This is how I would like to see it develop really. Because it suddenly gets lost in the melee of the FA Cup as we move into February and March; and I don't think the Football League have actually done justice to the trophy because by playing it as they do it does not assume the status it fully deserves.

I say kick-off the New Year with Coke, give it an uncluttered platform... There would probably need to be one alteration though if it was played as I suggest. You would have to introduce a one-off semi-final otherwise you would not get it in before Christmas.

A one game semi-final would also be better for the smaller clubs. Crystal Palace would have a much better chance of beating Liverpool over one game than over two. The home and away basis always favours the better sides there is no doubt about that.

Whether the semis be played at Wembley or not is open for discussion. There are a lot of magnificent grounds round the country which could be utilised. If two northern sides were involved then Old Trafford is as good a venue as any. If it was two southern clubs then there is White Hart Lane, Highbury or Villa Park. So there is no problem.

As I say, I would like to see this come about because I think this is a trophy that deserves a lot more recognition than it gets when the Final comes around. As a game of football it is always good and in many ways it has become a better occasion because there is less pressure. It is a more-fun trophy than the FA Cup and I would just like to see it given more respect.

I don't know whether the Premier League Two will come about or not but certainly the game is going to move forward and Europe is obviously going to have a League of its own at some stage in the near future; and I just think our major domestic trophies could be spaced out a little bit better than they are to prepare for this inevitable development.


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

AMONGST OUR SOUVENIRS BY PAUL PLOWMAN

This year marks the 40th anniversary of the death of Harold Fleming, an indelible name in the history of Swindon Town. In the 1960's, the club commissioned local sculptor Carlton Attwood to produce a fitting tribute to the former England International and since then this statuette has been as prominent a figure in the entrance to the club's headquarters as the man himself had been on the field some two generations earlier.

One of the first 'mobile' inside-forwards, Harold could rarely be pinned down, as he weaved patterns en route to goal, and left defenders trailing in his wake. A subtle swerve of the hip and exquisite ball control would take him through, as his unfastened sleeves flapped in the breeze. The end would invariably arrive with a shot of great power from either foot. And sometimes a crude challenge to prevent one.

Harold John Fleming was born on the Wiltshire-Hampshire border, at Downton, on April 30 1887 but attended school less than a mile from the County Ground - at Sanford Street. A devout Christian, he attended theological college and was playing for St Marks F C when he came under the watchful eye of Swindon secretary - manager Sam Allen.

Just one Reserve game, against Salisbury on October 12 1907, was all that Harold needed to show his mettle. He scored twice in a 4-0 win and was given his League debut just seven days later, against Luton. On this occasion, he scored once, made two other goals and could even afford the luxury of missing a penalty as the Town again won 4-0. Fleming was soon the talk of the Town as he grabbed six goals in nine games before Christmas.

On Christmas Day, they had to get by without him, Harold preferring not to perform on a religious holidays. The Town promptly slumped to their first home defeat of the season. But the 20-year-old was soon back in the fray and was top goalscorer at the end of the season with 17 from 30 appearances. And 28 goals from just 34 games in 1908/09 brought Harold almost immediate elevation to full International status. He responded with three goals in three games. A hat-trick against Ireland in Dublin in 1912 helped him to an impressive nine in eleven appearances in an England shirt.

A few weeks after that Irish adventure, Harold was put out of the game for ten months with a groin injury, suffered in a F A Cup semi-final. Non-League Town had powered their way through to that stage of the competition for the second time in three years, but Barnsley made sure that they would go no further by

fair means or foul and Fleming's injuries left little doubt as to which were employed.

Harold was 28 when war broke out and consequently a significant slice of his career was lost - and his England days truncated. He took up duties as a physical education instructor in Cambridge, where he married Grace Haskins when hostilities ceased in 1918.

He was thirty-three by the time Swindon joined other Southern League clubs in the new Third Division in August 1920. But Harold has lost little of his old sparkle, inspiring the Town to an opening day 9-1 victory over Luton and helping himself to four goals in the process.

By 1924, Harold was only wheeled out for the big occasion. He made just five League appearances and the same number in the FA Cup. His swan-song came on April 19 when the scoreline was the same as on his debut - a 4-0 win. And as on that day, he gave the fans something to remember with one of his opportunist goals.
