

PLEAT'S PERSPECTIVE

A WARM WELCOME TO SUNDAY'S LEAGUE CUP SEMI-FINAL WINNERS

WELCOME to Swindon Town, their supporters, directors, officials and players. We wish them well in the second leg of their Coca-Cola Cup adventure, when they play at Bolton on Wednesday. It will be a tremendous achievement if they can succeed in getting to Wembley and have a chance of European qualification.

Today's game is especially significant for our players because we have received two heavy setbacks.

The cup return was always going to be difficult if Matthew Le Tissier was to be able to find any space or time to

The three goals in a short space of time before the interval knocked us for six. It's always difficult when you run into an inspired performer who sets his colleagues buzzing.

When we set off for Grimsby on Friday, we hoped that the setback was out of our system. Unfortunately, on the heaviest pitch we have encountered this season, we looked rather seasick.

We didn't adapt to the dreadful conditions, we showed tired legs, and at 2-0 down in seeking to score goals we left the back door even wider open.

Five-nil was not a true reflection but it didn't matter. In truth, Brian Laws suggested it was Grimsby's best performance since his arrival as manager, and it was significant that Paul Crichton, the Grimsby goalkeeper, earned their sponsors' man-of-thematch award. The game could have produced a crazy scoreline of something like 7-3.

From one of the best defensive records away from home we have now conceded 20 in our still outstanding away record of seven wins and four draws.

I have taken the cheek to rip up any abusive letters from writers who didn't write a complimentary letter when we won in splendid fashion away from home this season.

I am only interested, as I have often said, in calm, steady comment and constructive criticism.

We were poor at Grimsby, and I hope if there were underlying factors hanging over from the cup exit they are now out of our system completely.

I was very sad to learn this week of the deaths of two of our most staunch and nicest supporters.

Judge James Kingham was sadly killed in a road accident, and Councillor Frank Lester also passed away. Through the 1980's in our emerging times we enjoyed their company from time to time in our hospitality areas.

They loved Luton, the players and the club, and football gave them great pleasure. They will both be sadly missed and we send our condolences to their families.

Being in Italy last week was like a breath of fresh air. The Football League did a marvellous job in organising so efficiently the arrangements which gave my selected group of players a good opportunity to project themselves on a national stage.

No-one was disappointed, there was a collective understanding of how we wanted to play, and a comraderie that ensured that the Italians, a very talented group, found us strong opposition.

I spoke to the players about discipline, determination and diligence. They produced a dream, and I was delighted.

Our reserves have had a good result this week, winning 3-1 at Crystal Palace, and

Wayne Turner reports a very efficient team performance. A new group of youngsters are now knocking at the door.

Ben Chenery and Jamie Woodsford, a lively substitute at Grimsby last week, have accepted the natural progression, and have accepted professional terms; Kelvin Davis went to Italy; Aaron Skelton has returned again from the injury table; and David Greene is hopefully coming back to form. Our club continues to be based on looking to the future with young players.

The transfer market is more difficult than ever, with clubs protective of their better players, and deals difficult to push through. We have made a couple of offers and several enquiries, but so far there is nothing to report.


There are still 18 games left this season, and much to play for. Today we have another opportunity to get a victory at home. Let us hope we are in the right frame of mind to do just that.

LEADING THE LINE

THIS afternoon's game is vitally important to us all, and I think it would be fair to describe it as a potential turning point of our season.

After the disappointments of Southampton and Grimsby, we must bounce back today against Swindon.

After beating Oldham when we didn't enjoy the lion's share of the game, we travelled to Southampton full of optimism, as a lot of you did too, and we are very grateful for the support we received.

But after a bright start everything Southampton touched turned to gold, as Matthew Le Tissier unfortunately turned in one of his top performances. We created chances, but it was definitely their night, and there were interesting comparisons made later that night between our exit, and those of Chelsea and Sheffield Wednesday on penalties.

The players were obviously stunned to lose 6-0, but as we remember from Fulham earlier in the season the agony of going out after a sudden death shoot-out can be just as bad.

Sadly the defeat did not spur us on to a return to winning ways at Grimsby. They showed us in November that they were a very good footballing side, but they also applied themselves very well to conditions which didn't really suit neat football.

Having sung the praises of the defence for much of this season, it was especially disappointing to concede five goals on Saturday, and but for some excellent work by Juergen at the end of the first half it could have been more.

But good can come from these sort of results, if we apply ourselves to not letting it happen again. The long journey home from Grimsby gave everyone plenty of time for reflection, and it's not a feeling that I for one enjoy

We must still set our sights on the chase for a play-off place, as we are only nine points away, but equally remain aware of the situation behind us. Incredibly we are just eight points from a relegation place, such is the open nature of this division.


Swindon showed exactly that on Sunday, in a game which I thought was a credit to our Endsleigh League. Bolton have enjoyed an excellent run of late, but our visitors today now have every chance of reaching the final of the Coca-Cola competition at Wembley.

We enjoyed Wembley last season, but we must think of today and then look to the future. Three points can help us overcome recent disappointments, but will only be achieved by hard work, and concentrated effort for the full 90 minutes.

This is to avoid a clash with live TV coverage of the Coca-Cola Cup semi-finals on the Wednesday evening.


LUTON fan Alison Perrin achieved something the England team could not manage in 1994 playing in a soccer cup final in the USA.

ON THE OTHER SIDE

THORNE PROVES A REAL ASSET IN SWINDON'S SIDE

PETER Thorne, once rejected by Bolton because they did not consider him good enough, proved a point to the Wanderers with two goals to give Swindon the edge in last Sunday's Coca-Cola Cup semi-final first leg, writes Simon Oxley.

Thorne was snapped up from Blackburn for £250,000 and has now scored four goals in three appearances. Last August Thorne was a Rovers substitute in the Charity Shield, and now he can dream of playing at Wembley in the final of the League Cup, which Swindon won in 1969 with a

famous triumph over Arsenal.

The Robins, however, were prevented from taking their place in the following year's Fairs Cup competition as the rules then in operation prevented clubs from outside the top flight entering European tournaments.

No such restrictions apply today of course, so the benefit to any of the current four semi-finalists from actually winning the Coca-Cola Cup is immense.


On a domestic front, finalists can be expected to bank up to three quarter of a million pounds from Wembley gate receipts and prize money alone, while participation in Europe is estimated to have increased that figure to around the £3 million mark for last year's winners Aston Villa.

The second leg takes place at Burnden Park on Wednesday, but in the meantime Swindon, now under the player-managership of Steve McMahon are looking to improve their league form which has left them at the wrong end of the Division One

table.

McMahon took over at the County Ground from John Gorman after Swindon had lost 2-1 at home to Luton in November, a result which lifted the Hatters to a season's best so far of fifth place.


The Liverpool-born midfielder made his league debut for Everton at Sunderland in August 1980. He went on to register 11 goals in 100 league

games for Everton before a £300,000 transfer to Aston Villa in the summer of 1983. By then he was a seasoned England Under-21 international, having made his debut against Eire at Fratton Park in February 1981, and he continued in the squad to be part of England's European Under 21. Championship winning side in 1984.

His career in the Midlands was short-lived as Kenny Dalglish splashed out £375,000 to land him in his first major deal for Liverpool in September 1985. McMahon filled the position vacated by



Graeme Souness and by the end of the seaon he had League and Cup medals as Liverpool clinched the double.

Further trophies followed at Anfield, along with 17 England caps.

On Christmas Eve 1991, Manchester City paid £900,000 for his registration, and until his move to Swindon, McMahon was a consistent performer in the Premiership.


WELCOME TO THE JUNIOR ROBINS!

HEADS DOWN FOR SOME HARD WORK

Luton Town midfielder DAVID PREECE reflects on last Saturday's 5-0 defeat at Grimsby Town......
as told to CLUBCALL 0891 121 123



Q: Not quite the tonic we were hoping for after the disappointment of Southampton.

A: No, it has been a bad week all round. It wasn't a great performance against Oldham, but we got three points and thought maybe it would be our week, but we got a hammering at Southampton and it was the same at Grimsby. We just have to pick ourselves up now.

Grimsby are a very good footballing side, and their movement up front caused us all sorts of problems. It was five going on ten!

We could have scored a few ourselves, but they aren't going in, and you can't always blame the defence. We aren't scoring goals at the other end despite having the chances.

Q: It's the \$64,000 question, but what is the solution? Was there a lack of determination at Blundell Park?

A: The lads don't go out and not try, it was just one of those days. Sometimes you get a bad performance, and hopefully come the next game it will pick up.

If you do have a bad game, hopefully someone else gets you through, but in the last two matches everyone seems to have been below par and we have to get our heads down, work hard in training and hopefully get a good result against Swindon.

But when things aren't going for you, you have to battle through, which perhaps we haven't been doing collectively, and get back to winning ways.



WHEN the Town were promoted from Division Four in 1968 they started off the following season like a train and remained unbeaten for the first eight games, quickly establishing a place at the top of the table.

Boosted by the signings of Mike Harrison from Plymouth, Laurie Sheffield from Oldham, and Brian Lewis from Coventry for the then huge total sum of £37,000, Oldham, Rotherham, Barnsley, Tranmere and Mansfield were all seen off at Kenilworth Road, while points were picked up on travels to Barrow, Gillingham and Orient.

The bubble had to burst eventually, and at Brighton on September 21, the Town went down 1-0 in a lacklustre display against a side they had hammered out of the League Cup only 10 days previously.

The barnstorming displays were now beginning to take their toll, and although a win was recorded the following week, against Torquay at Kenilworth Road, it was a very tired performance.

Injuries were now beginning to become a problem, coupled with the lack of form, and back-to-back defeats were suffered away at local rivals Watford and at that ground

where we never seem to get a result, Oakwell, Barnsley.

Win at home and lose away now seemed to be the pattern that was setting in, and in a bid to rejuvinate the side manager Allan Brown went out and signed goalkeeper Sandy Davie from Dundee United and Jack Bannister from Crystal Palace.

Both players made their debuts in the home game against Northampton at the end of October, before a crowd of 17,818, and they played their parts in a hard fought 2-1 win.

Unfortunately it was back to the by now expected away defeat in the next game, at Walsall, and we were pushed back to sixth position which was no place to be for a side backed by an ambitious board of directors who were determined to get the club back into Division One.

The next visitors to Kenilworth Road were the new pacesetters Swindon Town, who boasted the mercurial winger Don Rogers in their side.

As well as maintaining our 100 per cent home record we had a score to settle, for the Wiltshire side had rather luckily knocked us out of the FA Cup at the County Ground the previous season.

e the Robins

Luton secretary Bob Readhead was rather disappointed with the crowd of "only" 17,250 that turned up on a murky afternoon and put the low attendance down to the pockets of fog that had blanketed many local areas.

The Town welcomed back skipper Terry Branston, as well as wingers Mike Harrison and Graham French after injury, while Swindon were at full strength.

The first half honours in a fiercely contested match, belonged to Luton who had several chances to take the lead with Sheffield guilty of misses that he would normally have put away.

The game had a scorless look about it as the two midfields cancelled each other out, but in the second period Swindon decided to come out of their shell and subjected the Luton defence to a great deal of pressure.

It was only some smart saves from Davie that prevented Swindon from taking the lead, and it was therefore against the run of play when the Town went 1-0 up on the hour.

Sheffield had been guilty of a heavy challenge on Swindon goalkeeper Peter Downsborough and while he was still groggy the Town forwards exploited this weakness and pumped a succession of high balls into the area.

From one of these, Sheffield took advantage of some hesitation and smacked a volley into the net.

Swindon now had to attack for all they were worth and consequently left gaps in defence which were increasingly exploited by the Luton forwards. From one such counter-attack French beat two defenders, and laid on an inch-perfect pass for Lewis to put the result beyond doubt with 10 minutes to go.

Whereas Allan Brown spoke of "a fine all round performance" after the match, the national press preferred to concentrate on the less savoury aspects of the clash - particularly Sheffield's foul on Downsborough and the running battle between Lewis and the Swindon captain Stan Harland.



95% response to club's new supporters survey

THANK-YOU to all Luton fans who participated in the first of our telephone surveys after the home game against Oldham. The scheme was a great success, and more of you will be contacted tomorrow for your views on this afternoon's game, and wider football issues.

There was a very high interest/response rate amongst fans contacted after the Oldham game, only seven people refused to be interviewed, and of the 134 fans contacted only three did not wish to be involved again.

This response rate of 95% (134/141) and recall rate of 98% (131/134) shows that fans are very keen to get their views aired.

Here are some of the results following the match against Oldham:

- The game rated a 7/10 for value for money, with fans giving 6/10 for Luton's performance. The highlights of the game, predictably, were

the two Luton goals, with 59% of fans claiming Dwight Marshall 33-second opener as their particular highlight.

 Supporters were given the chance to "Tell the Manager", with the vast majority saying carry on the good work. Comments were passed on about the make-up of the team, and a number of possible additions to the squad were also suggested.

- The overwhelming supporters' choice for Luton player of the match was Dwight Marshall with 56% of the vote. Wayne Biggins (16%) was second, with Scott Oakes (12%) third. About three-quarters of fans (72%) were satisfied with the performance of referee Paul Vanes, and of those unhappy, the main reasons were "inconsistency" and the "number of stoppages" in the game.

 Two thirds of supporters quizzed used the toilets at the ground, and almost one in two (45%) spent money at the refreshment stalls or in the shop. Two thirds of fans claimed to be

satisfied with the ground, but complaints have been registered and, where possible, will be acted upon.

- 31% of Town fans quizzed follow football in the Sun newspaper, 22% in the Daily Mail, 19% in the Daily Mirror and 14% in the Daily Telegraph. Locally the papers read are: Herald and Post 57%, Luton News 54% and Leader 36%.
- One in five (21%) claim to regularly tune on to Chiltern Radio, and one in eight (13%) to listen to BBC Three Counties radio.
- Luton fans were also asked for their views on the sale of John Hartson for £2.5 million to Arsenal. The overwhelming view of the supporters is that the Hartson deal was a good one for the club. 61% felt the deal was very good, 29% quite good, and 10% not good.

Supporters were also asked about the wider issues in football today, and the main concerns were: Inconsistency of referees (88%), size of transfer fees (82%) and the split between the Premier and the Endsleigh League (74%).

The full list of concerns: Inconsistent Officials (88%), Size of transfer fees (82%), Split between Premier and Endsleigh League (74%), Sleaze/corruption in the game (72%), Cost of attending games (69%), Removal of standing

facilities (58%), Behaviour of players (56%), Racism in the game (52%), Coverage by the tabloid press (46%), Supporter hooliganism (44%), New playing regulations (38%), Number of overseas players (36%), Number of games professionals play (32%), Behaviour of managers (27%).

To help fund our regular surveys, we are approaching businesses and asking if they would like to find out about the views and opinions of fans with respect to their products and services - thus we might include questions about what soft drinks fans enjoy, where they bank and so on.

Any results from questions such as these are only passed back to the businesses in terms of overall statistics, we would never pass back individual's responses, so if you are called the information you provide is completely confidential and can never be traced to you. The personal details we ask enable us to see how views differ for different types of fans - the younger fan, the female fan, the regular supporter etc.


